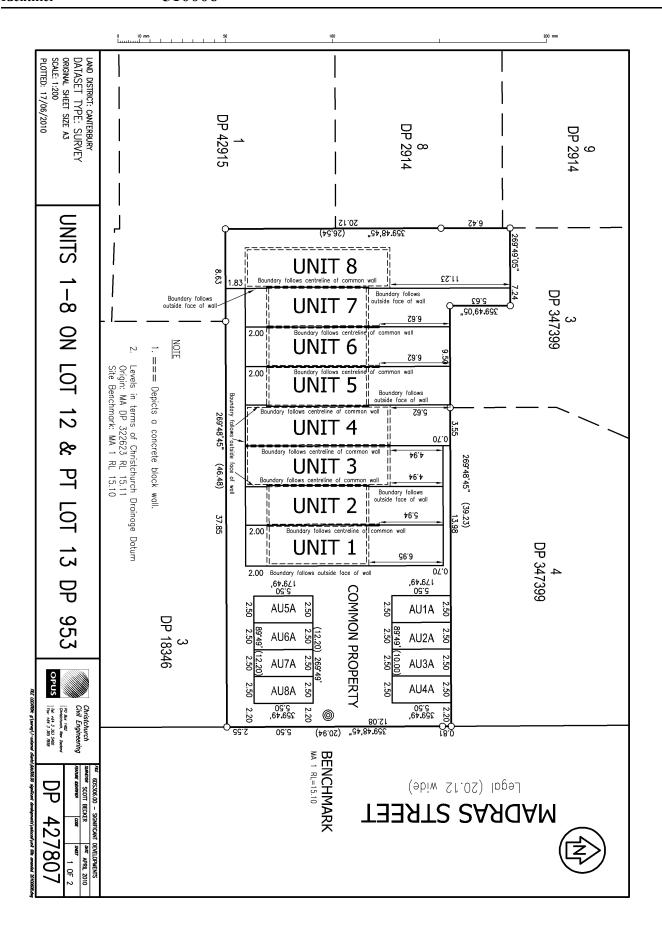

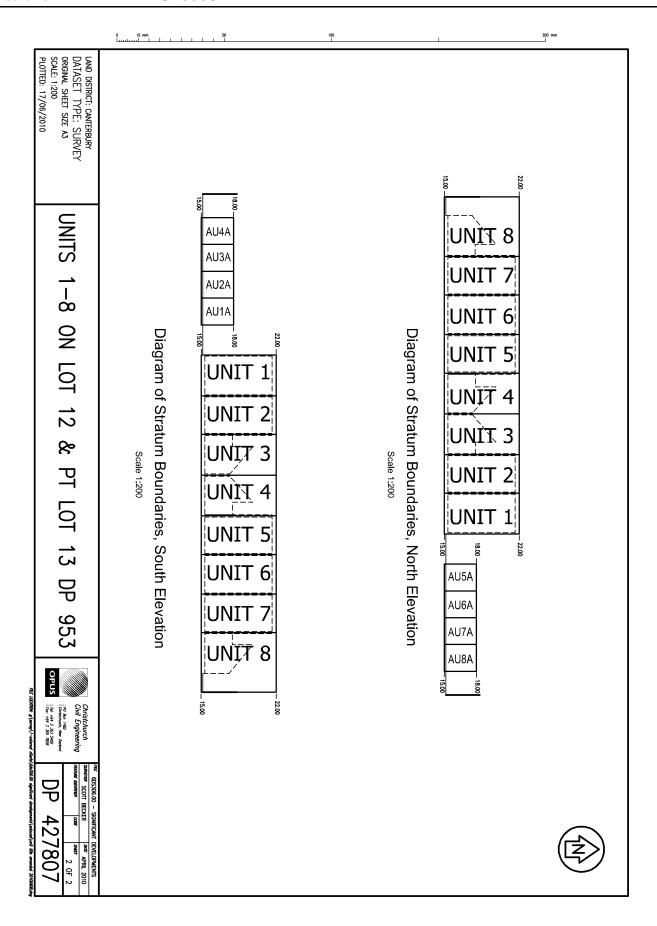

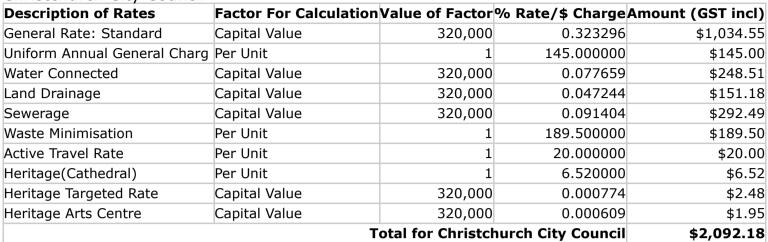

Body Corporate 427807 Operational Rules Units 1-8, 435 Madras Street
All unit owners, occupiers, tenants & body corporate must obey the operational rules,
Body Corporate operates under: Body Corporate Operational Rules June 2011 under the Unit
Titles Act 2010, plus Unit Titles Regulations 2011 (as found online Department of Building &
Housing)

An owner or occupier of a unit must not

- a) damage or deface the common property
- b) leave rubbish or recycling material on the common property
- c) create noise likely to interfere with the use or enjoyment of the unit title development by other owners or occupiers
- d) park on the common property unless the body corporate has designated it for car parking, or the body corporate consents
- e) interfere with the reasonable use or enjoyment of the common property by other owners or occupiers

An owner or occupier of a unit must dispose of rubbish hygienically and tidily in designated rubbish/recycling bins. Red bins are for general rubbish, yellow for recycling - these are collected alternate Mondays & numbered for each units use. Green is for green waste collected each Monday - please use green bins that are accessible (there is not room for all bins), but note if a unit occupier uses any green bin they are responsible for ensuring that bin is put out for collection.

Body Corporate committee consists of the 8 unit owners or a representative. For a new body corporate rule to be passed 5 of 8 units must agree. (One vote per unit, can vote personally or proxy, a proxy shall be appointed in writing).

AGM held after 20 October each year, held annually & not more than 15 months of last meeting.

Financial year is 1 November - 31 October.

At least 6 weeks notice of AGM must be given specifying date, place, hour & proposed agenda given to all unit owners/representatives.

Body Corporate Accounts are shown at AGM, self audited by committee. Minutes are to be kept of each meeting & forwarded to each owner.

Body Corporate is responsible for payment of Building Insurance. Copy of current insurance policy will be forwarded to each owner annually (renewal due in August)

Chairperson is Simon Richmond (Unit 3). Secretary is Jenny Owens (Unit 8) Payment of bills requires two signatures on cheque currently chairperson & secretary.

Monthly Gardener approved.

Remuneration to Body Corporate Chairperson with regard to EQC/Insurance repairs of \$40.00/hr

Restriction on signage - "For Sale" signs cannot be placed out front of property in communal garden areas or berm.

- I got a new valuation done this year, will check with the broker at time of renewal to see if we should get another one.
- 4. From Katharine

I would like to discuss:

- 1) the original landscape plan
- 2) adding 3 smaller conical tree/shrubs to match (but smaller) the 3 by the buildings. Since their removal it looks a bit bare and has lost some of the character that existed. The lower plants have. sadly been less effective. I've attached a photo.

-garden not wide enough for these (Thuja Smarged 1.2m diameter), also too wet probably, very high water table, only a few things grow, garden has just been replanted and will take time to look good, the trees that removed were dying and would have disrupted asphalt if they had of grown bigger, variegated elm get very large. (jenny)

Jenny variegated elms.??

The trees that got removed

I suggest we plant cypress (or another species) in pots or get advice from a landscaper. (Inga)

Cyprus would be nice or shrubs that tolerate the damp (ian)

I am a landscaper/ landscape designer the area is very wet, and narrow suitable for few species. I have planted a shrub called toa toa which will fill the space.

Building a concrete surround is not feasible, the cost would be huge, thousands and the minimum width would take up even more of the already narrow edge. Your could put in raised timber borders with pegs to support. This would look nice. I'd estimate the cost to be approx

\$800-\$1000 of this possible more as you would have to do a complete rectangle round the gate slider if you were raising the soil level. If you see below the finances may be a little tight for such work presently. Can we give the toa toa a chance to grow and then see if more needs to be done.

ACTION: I WOULD LIKE TO STAND DOWN AS GARDENER FROM THE END OF THIS YEAR (JENNY). THE NEW CHAIR OR BODY CORP TO ORGANISE A LANDSCAPE PLAN (IF THE MAJORITY THINKS WE NEED ONE, WE CAN VOTE ON THIS) AND A NEW GARDENER.

- 2) replacing the few stones that remain in the bin area with gravel for tidiness, aesthetics and the current need.
- 3) adding bark to the front area garden area
 - Soil levels high due to high root balls, this area gets very wet and it will be hard to keep bark in the garden bed. Bark gets very messy with blackbirds and the rain floats it onto paths, I can get this garden leveled with soil to tidy up? Jenny
 - I suggest we get the opinion of a professional and ask him if he can build a concrete tank that could serve as a pot for plants (for example)
 - I agree to getting a landscaping plan done (ian)
 - Are we still happy as agreed to last AGM replacing the dying vibirnum hedge with the hornbeam, stocks have been low but I can get them now. I thought I'd check in again.

ACTION: RE VOTE ON REPLACING DYING VIBURNUM HEDGE WITH HORNBEAM WHICH WILL WITHSTAND WET SOIL

- 4) replacement of the Titan boards in the individual courtyards. Many are cracking particularly around the nails/screws and rotting / bubbling at ground level. Whether this is done individually or as a group project.
 - I would say this is up to each individual (jenny)
 - I will be replacing mine in the next few months. It will be a project as the Titan board has to be cut from the sheets available and sizes vary. All units have the same Titan board and all units have it painted the same colour. It's part of the appeal of the property. They are all deteriorating some more than others. It, like many products, have been in short supply.
 - According to my property manager, except for a small area the titan boards in my courtyard don't need to be replaced. (Inga)

ACTION: UNITS INTERNAL FENCING AND GATES IS RESPONSIBILITY OF INDIVIDUAL OWNERS

- 5) Staining of block work that has occurred on the front of the building and in the carport walls.
- -staining occurred as gutters blocked and water running over sides, can look at getting these cleaned. I have arrange to get carport gutters cleaned yearly now (jenny)

The staining I was thinking of/referring to is on the east wall facing the entrance. I will attach photo's (or send separately). It seems random and in one place starts $\frac{1}{3}$ way down the wall. The guttering is on the north and south of the property. So perhaps has come from the capping?? It's very high - well above the north/south gutter line

I know where you mean, this has been there as long as I have owned. I spoke to a painter about resealing a few years ago, he said it wasn't needed but we can get another opinion. I do not know how you would get that out, you would need to replaster the entire wallI think. Infact Im working with a plasterer in the next few weeks so can show him the photos. (Jenny)

I think the expertise of a builder could be useful. (Inga)

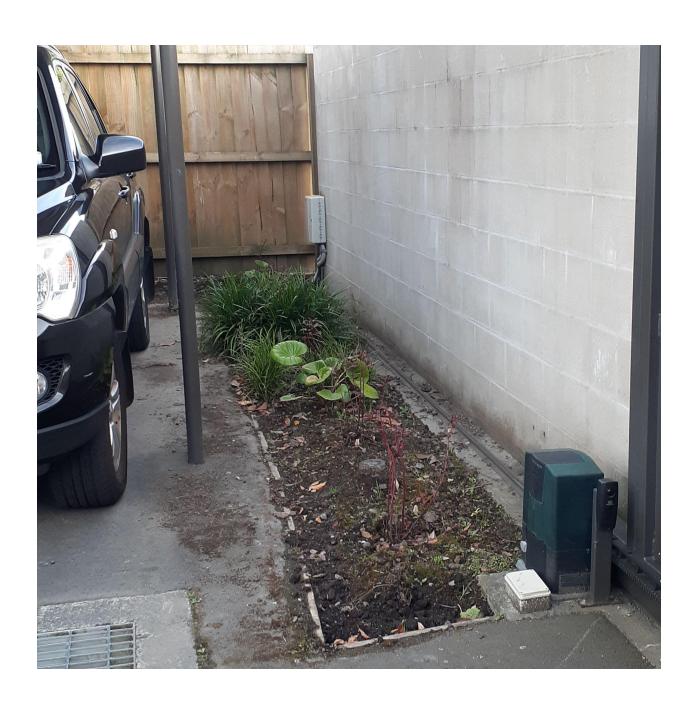
That's a good idea lan.

This pre-contract disclosure statement is provided to prospective buyers of the property in accordance with section 146(1) of the Unit Titles Act 2010.

General information

The following section contains a brief explanation of important matters relevant to the purchase of a unit in a unit title development. You should read and understand the information contained in this section and this statement before signing a contract to buy a unit in a unit title development.

You are strongly advised to obtain independent legal advice regarding any questions or concerns you have about purchasing a unit or your prospective rights and obligations as a member of a body corporate.

<u>Unit title property ownership</u>. Unit titles are a common form of multi-unit property ownership. They allow owners to privately own an area of land or part of a building and share common property with other unit owners. Unit title developments may also be structured in varied ways including staged unit title developments and layered unit title developments.

This combination of individual and shared ownership of land and buildings, often in an intensive built environment, means owning a unit title involves a different set of rights and responsibilities than traditional house and land ownership.

Unit title developments have a body corporate management structure to ensure decisions affecting the development can be made jointly by the unit owners. The creation and management of unit title developments is governed by the Unit Titles Act 2010 and supporting regulations.

<u>Unit plan</u>. Every unit title development has a unit plan, which shows the location of the principal units as well as any accessory units and common property in the

development. The unit plan is the formal record of all of the boundaries of the units, and the common property.

Ownership and utility interests. Each unit is allocated an ownership interest and a utility interest and such interests are relevant to the determination of many of the unit owner's rights and responsibilities under the Unit Titles Act 2010.

Ownership interest is a number that reflects the relative value of each unit to the other units in the development, and is used to determine a range of matters including the unit owners' beneficial share in the common property, and share in the underlying land if the unit plan is cancelled.

By default, the utility interest of a unit is the same as the ownership interest (unless it is otherwise specified on the deposit of the unit plan or subsequently changed), and is used to calculate how much each owner contributes to the operational costs of the body corporate.

Body corporate operational rules. The body corporate for a unit title development can make its own operational rules on the use of the development, and governance of the body corporate. These operational rules are subject to the provisions of the Unit Titles Act 2010 and regulations made under that Act.

All unit owners, occupiers, tenants and the body corporate must follow the body corporate operational rules that apply to their unit title development.

Transitional provisions for unit title developments created before the Unit Titles Act 2010 came into effect on 20 June 2011 apply to the body corporate rules in place at that time.

<u>Pre-settlement disclosure statement</u>. Before settlement of the sale of a unit, the seller must provide a pre-settlement disclosure statement to the purchaser, which includes information on:

- the unit number and body corporate number
- the amount of the contribution levied by the body corporate for that unit
- the period covered by the contribution
- how the levy is to be paid
- the date on or before which the levy must be paid
- whether any amount of the levy is currently unpaid and, if so, how much
- whether legal proceedings have commenced in respect of any unpaid levy
- whether any metered charges (eg, for water) are unpaid and, if so, how much
- whether any costs relating to repairs to building elements or infrastructure contained in the unit are unpaid and, if so, how much
- the rate of interest accruing on any unpaid amounts
- whether there are any legal proceedings pending against the body corporate
- whether there have been any changes to the body corporate rules.

There are legal consequences on the seller for failing to provide the pre-settlement disclosure in the timeframes required by the Unit Titles Act 2010 including delay of settlement and cancellation of the contract.

Additional disclosure statement. The buyer of a unit can request an additional disclosure statement or may request some, but not all of the information required to

be in an additional disclosure statement (specific prescribed information) at any time before whichever of these dates occurs first:

- the close of the fifth working day after they enter into the sale and purchase agreement
- the close of the tenth working day before settlement of the unit.

The seller has five working days to provide the additional disclosure statement.

The additional disclosure statement contains more information about the unit title development and the operation of the body corporate. It must include:

- contact details of the body corporate and committee (if there is one)
- the balance of every fund or bank account held by the body corporate at the date of the last financial statement
- amounts due to be paid by the body corporate
- details of regular expenses that are incurred once a year
- amounts owed to the body corporate
- details of every current insurance policy held by the body corporate
- details of every current contract entered into by the body corporate
- information about any lease of the underlying land (if the development is leasehold)
- the text of motions voted on at the last general meeting, and whether those motions were passed
- any changes to the default body corporate operational rules
- a summary of the long-term maintenance plan.

The seller may require the buyer to meet the reasonable cost of providing the additional disclosure statement. An estimate of that cost is set out in paragraph 9 below

There are legal consequences on the seller for failing to provide the additional disclosure in the timeframes required by the Unit Titles Act 2010 including delay of settlement and cancellation of the contract.

Record of title. Previously known as a computer register or certificate of title, for a unit title development this document records the ownership of a unit, contains a legal description of the unit boundaries and records any legal interest which is registered against the title to the unit (for example a mortgage or easement). A copy of the record of title for a unit should come with:

- the unit plan attached. Unit title plans were discussed earlier in this section.
- a supplementary record sheet attached. A supplementary record sheet records the ownership of the common property, any legal interests registered against the common property or base land, and other information such as the address for service of the body corporate and the body corporate operational rules.

The common property in a unit title development does not have a record of title.

<u>Land Information Memorandum</u>. A land information memorandum (LIM) is a report which provides information held by the local council about a particular property. You must order and pay for a LIM from the applicable local council.

Delivery times vary between councils. The information contained in a LIM will vary between councils, but is likely to include details on:

- rates information
- information on private and public stormwater and sewerage drains
- any consents, notices, orders or requisitions affecting the land or buildings
- District Plan classifications that relate to the land or buildings
- any special feature of the land the local council knows about including the downhill movement, gradual sinking or wearing away of any land, the falling of rock or earth, flooding of any type and possible contamination or hazardous substances
- any other information the local council deems relevant

Full details of what a local council is obliged to provide in a LIM is contained in section 44A of the Local Government Official Information and Meetings Act 1987.

<u>Easements and covenants</u>. An easement is a right given to a landowner over another person's property (for example, a right of way, or right to drain water). A land covenant is an obligation contained in a deed between two parties, usually relating to the use of one or both properties (for example a covenant to restrict one party using their property in a certain way).

Easements or covenants may apply to:

- a unit and are usually recorded on the computer register for that unit.
- common property and will be recorded on the supplementary record sheet for the unit title development.

An important condition is the immediate notification of loss or events that are likely to give rise to a claim. Failure to comply with this condition can be grounds for an Insurer to deny liability. As prompt notification of possible claims is so important a special Claims Procedure section is included in this Manual.

Therefore all demands claiming damage to Third Party property under circumstances which are, or may involve negligence or error or omission or wrongful act, must immediately be reported to us and we will report the matter to your Insurers.
- Do not admit liability or make any payments which may be construed as an admission of liability this is a Condition of the Policy.

MATERIAL DAMAGE SPECIAL RISKS

- Immediately investigate extent and cause of loss or damage.
- Call us for a Claim Form and for further instructions.

MARINE CARGO CLAIMS

- Immediately claim on the Carriers, Port Authorities or other Bailees for any missing packages.
- In no circumstances except written protest, give clean receipts where goods are in doubtful condition.
- Apply immediately for survey by Carriers and claim on Carriers for any loss or damage.
- Give notice in writing to the Carriers within three days of delivery if damage was not apparent at time of taking delivery.
- · Advise us for further instruction.

Important Information



Your Duty of Disclosure

When you enter into a contact of insurance you have a legal duty to disclose to the Insurer all facts that are material to the risk. This includes all information you know or could reasonably be expected to know that would influence a prudent insurer's decision to insure you, and if so, on what terms. This duty of disclosure is ongoing and applies not only when you enter into a contract of insurance, but also when you renew, extend, vary or reinstate a contract of insurance. Examples of information that needs to be disclosed include:

- any criminal or traffic offence or conviction
- any cancellation, refusal to renew insurance, or imposition of special terms by another insurer
- any insurance claim you have made in the past
- a change in circumstance that could increase the risk of an insurance claim

Failure to comply with your duty of disclosure may entitle an insurer refuse to pay a claim and/or treat the policy as though it never existed. If you are uncertain about whether or not a particular matter should be disclosed, please speak to your BWRS Broker.

Policy Warranties and Conditions

Your policy may contain warranties and/or conditions that impose obligations that you must comply with. Failure to comply with these warranties and/or conditions may result in your insurer avoiding your policy cover entirely and/or refusing to pay claims.

Terms of Busines

Unless otherwise agreed (in writing), the BrokerWeb Risk Service Limited (BWRS) standard terms of business apply to the provision of our advice and service. Our Terms of Business can be found on our website at bwrs.co.nz/terms-of-business.

Claims

If you suffer a loss, or become aware of a circumstance, which may give risk to a claim under your insurance policy(ies), you should:

- Act as though you are uninsured, and take steps to minimise the loss or damage
- Take reasonable steps to protect the property from further loss or damage

Notify BWRS as soon as possible

• If a criminal act is suspected, advise the Police

Full details of your general responsibilities in the event of a claim, and specific claims procedures can be found on our website at bwrs.co.nz/procedures. It is important to note that if an insurance claim is fraudulent in any way, your insurer may be entitled to refuse to pay your claim and/or treat your policy as though it never existed.

Claims Made and Occurrence Wordings

Liability insurance policies can be structured as either an Occurrence based wording, or a Claims Made wording.

An occurrence based policy is where the policy that is in place at the time of the loss is the policy that responds to the claim. Occurrence wordings are usually policies that cover physical damage to property, such as house and contents, business assets, motor vehicle or public liability.

Claims made policies operate slightly differently and are designed for liability risks where a claim may be made against you by a third party in relation to your past business activities. Policies such as Professional Indemnity, Directors & Officers Liability, Trustees Liability, Statutory Liability and Employers Liability are written on a claims made basis (some public liability policies may also contain endorsements which operate on a claim made basis).

Under a claims made policy, it is the policy that is in place at the time a claim is made against you which will respond to the loss, not the policy that was in place at the time you carried out your business activity that initiated the claim. This means that if you were to cease trading, you should continue to purchase liability insurance for a period of time to protect you against any claims that may arise out of your past activities (this is called run off cover, and we recommend that a run off policy be purchased for a minimum period of 6 years, in line with the Statute of Limitations).

Retroactive Date

Claims made policies are subject to a retroactive date. This is the date from which insurers will provide cover for your business activities. Ideally your retroactive date should be unlimited, or the date on which you started your business operations. Your claims made policy will only provide cover for claims where the cause of the claim occurred after your policy retroactive date.

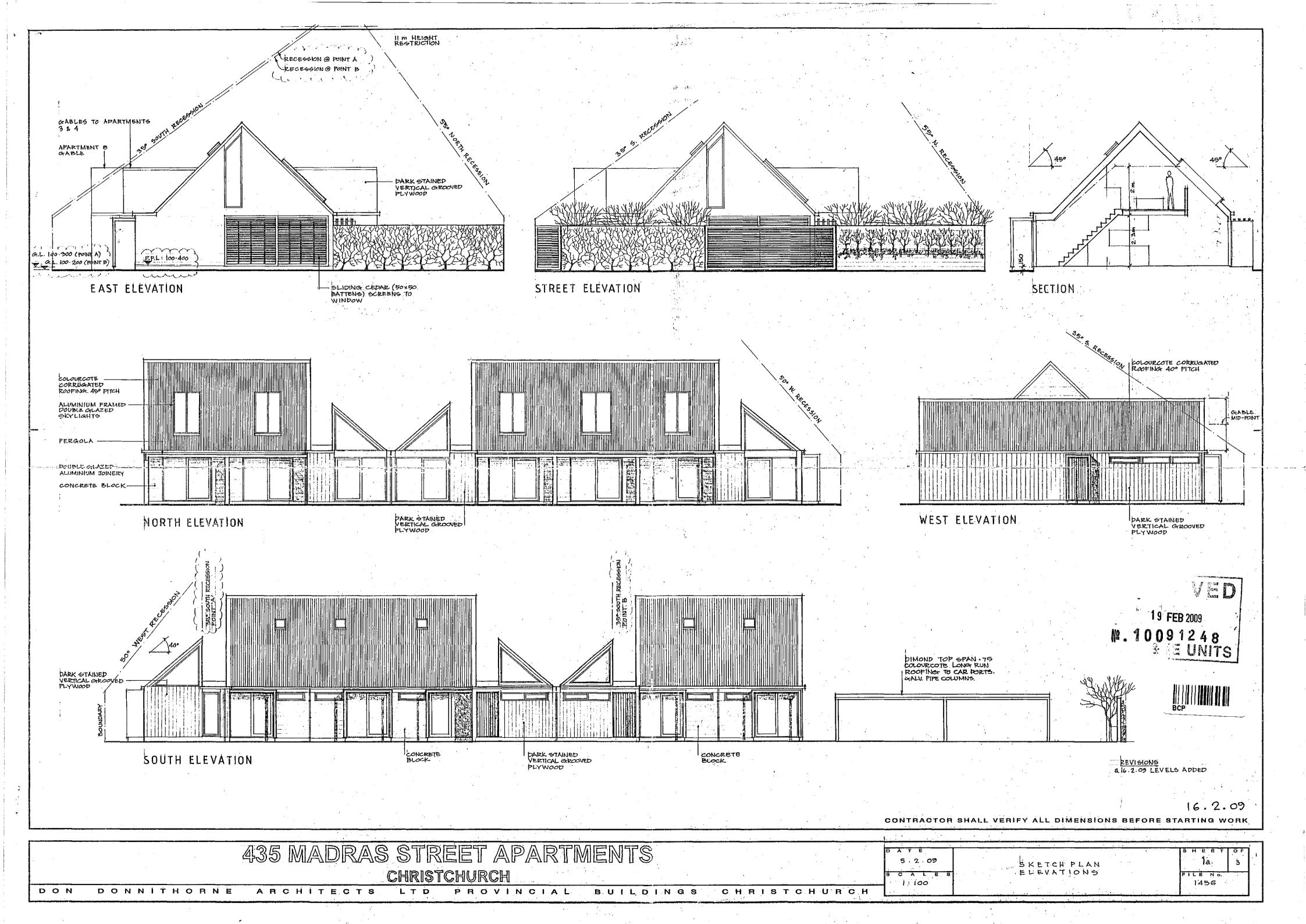

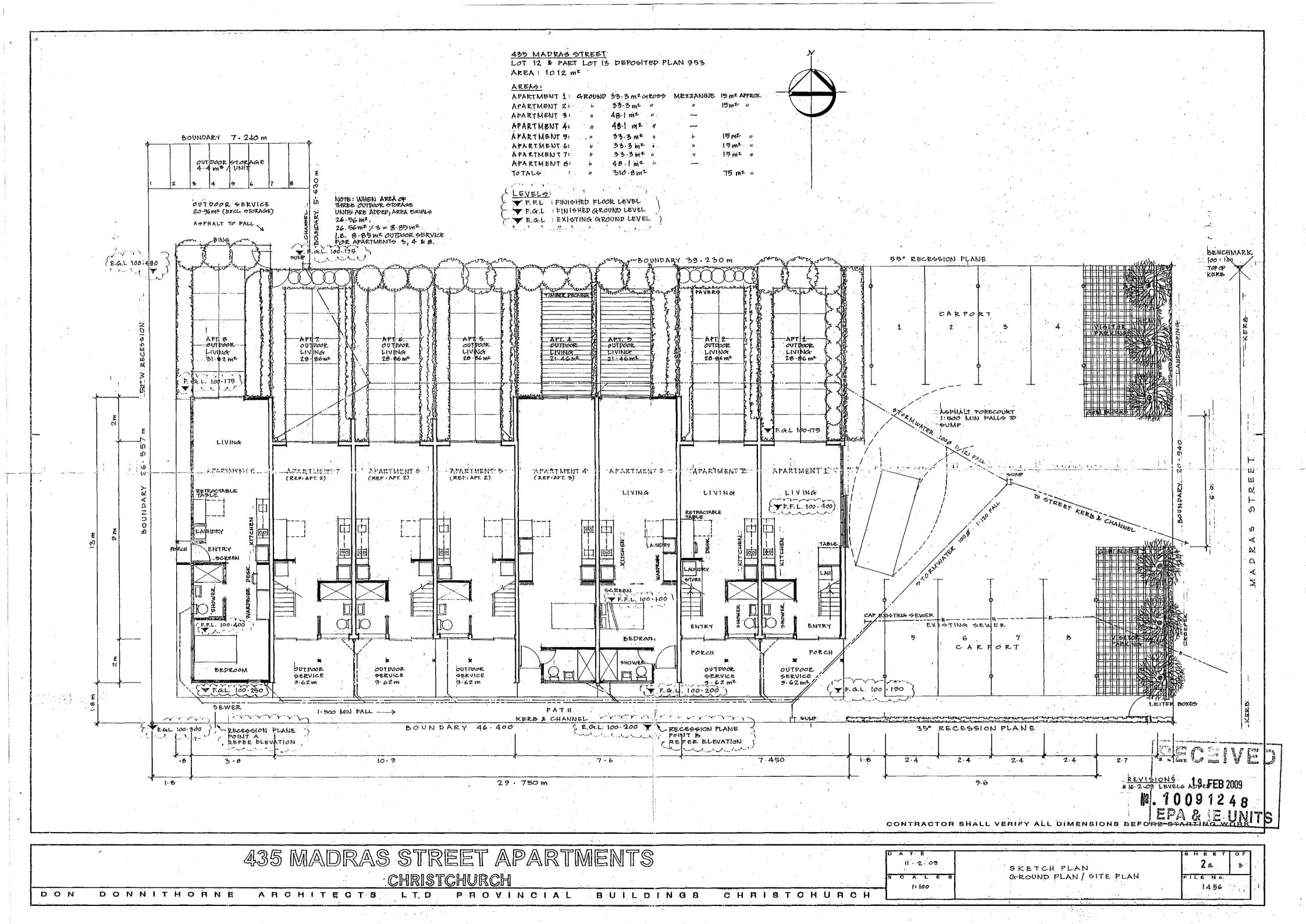

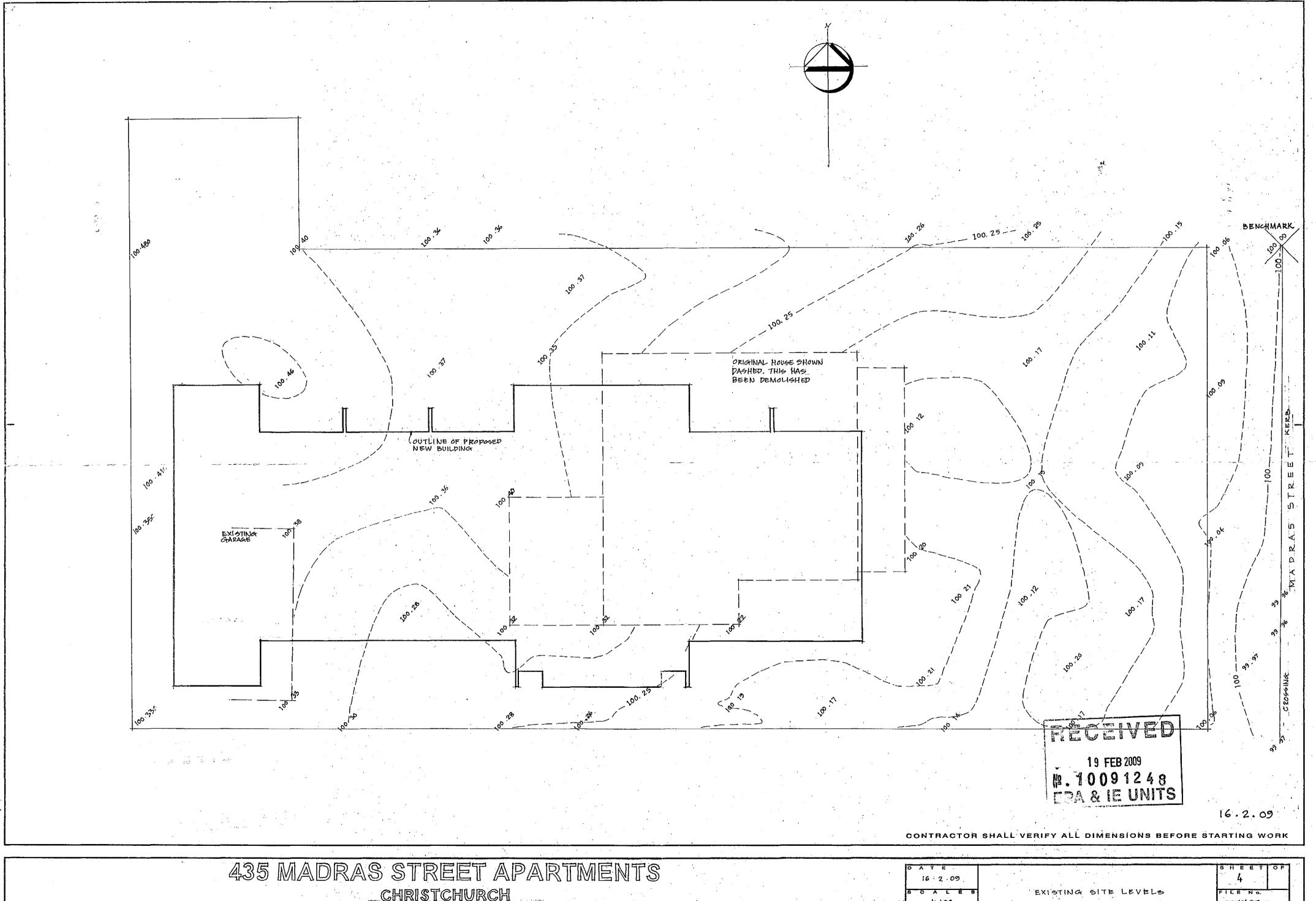
