Special condition 1 – Payment

General condition 14 is replaced with the following:

14. Deposit

- 14.1 The purchaser must pay the deposit:
 - (a) to the vendor's licensed estate agent; or
 - (b) if there is no estate agent, to the vendor's legal practitioner or conveyancer; or
 - (c) if the vendor directs, into a special purpose account in an authorised deposit-taking institution in Victoria specified by the vendor in the joint names of the purchaser and the vendor.
- 14.2 If the land sold is a lot on an unregistered plan of subdivision, the deposit:
 - (a) must not exceed 10% of the price; and
 - (b) must be paid to the vendor's estate agent, legal practitioner or conveyancer and held by the estate agent, legal practitioner or conveyancer on trust for the purchaser until the registration of the plan of subdivision.
- 14.3 The purchaser must pay all money other than the deposit:
 - (a) to the vendor, or the vendor's legal practitioner or conveyancer; or
 - (b) in accordance with a written direction of the vendor or the vendor's legal practitioner or conveyancer.
- 14.4 Payments may be made or tendered:
 - (a) up to \$1,000 in cash; or
 - (b) by cheque drawn on an authorised deposit-taking institution; or
 - (c) by electronic funds transfer to a recipient having the appropriate facilities for receipt.

However, unless otherwise agreed:

- (d) payment may not be made by credit card, debit card or any other financial transfer system that allows for any chargeback or funds reversal other than for fraud or mistaken payment, and
- (e) any financial transfer or similar fees or deductions from the funds transferred, other than any fees charged by the recipient's authorised deposit-taking institution, must be paid by the remitter.
- 14.5 At settlement, the purchaser must pay the fees on up to three cheques drawn on an authorised deposit-taking institution. If the vendor requests that any additional cheques be drawn on an authorised deposit-taking institution, the vendor must reimburse the purchaser for the fees incurred.
- 14.6 Payment by electronic funds transfer is made when cleared funds are received in the recipient's bank account.
- 14.7 Before the funds are electronically transferred the intended recipient must be notified in writing and given sufficient particulars to readily identify the relevant transaction.
- 14.8 As soon as the funds have been electronically transferred the intended recipient must be provided with the relevant transaction number or reference details.
- 14.9 Each party must do everything reasonably necessary to assist the other party to trace and identify the recipient of any missing or mistaken payment and to recover the missing or mistaken payment.
- 14.10 For the purpose of this general condition 'authorised deposit-taking institution' means a body corporate for which an authority under section 9(3) of the *Banking Act 1959 (Cth)* is in force.

Special condition 2 – Acceptance of title

Where the purchaser is deemed by section 27(7) of the Sale of Land Act 1962 to have given the deposit release authorisation referred to in section 27(1), the purchaser is also deemed to have accepted title in the absence of any prior express objection to title.

Special condition 3 – Tax invoice

General condition 19 is replaced with the following:

- 19.3 If the vendor makes a taxable supply under this contract (that is not a margin scheme supply) and:
 - (a) the price includes GST; or
 - (b) the purchaser is obliged to pay an amount for GST in addition to the price (because the price is "plus GST" or under general condition 19.1(a), (b) or (c)), the purchaser is not obliged to pay the GST

Special condition 4 - Electronic conveyancing

- 5.1 Settlement and lodgement of the instruments necessary to record the purchaser as registered proprietor of the land will be conducted electronically in accordance with the *Electronic Conveyancing National Law*. The parties may subsequently agree in writing that this special condition 8 applies even if the box next to it is not checked. This special condition 8 has priority over any other provision to the extent of any inconsistency.
- 5.2 A party must immediately give written notice if that party reasonably believes that settlement and lodgement can no longer be conducted electronically. Special condition 8 ceases to apply from when such a notice is given.
- 5.3 Each party must:
 - (a) be, or engage a representative who is, a subscriber for the purposes of the *Electronic Conveyancing National Law*.
 - (b) ensure that all other persons for whom that party is responsible and who are associated with this transaction are, or engage, a subscriber for the purposes of the *Electronic Conveyancing National Law*, and
 - (c) conduct the transaction in accordance with the Electronic Conveyancing National Law.
- 5.4 The vendor must open the Electronic Workspace ("workspace") as soon as reasonably practicable. The inclusion of a specific date for settlement in a workspace is not of itself a promise to settle on that date. The workspace is an electronic address for the service of notices and for written communications for the purposes of any electronic transactions legislation.
- 5.5 The vendor must nominate a time of the day for locking of the workspace at least 7 days before the due date for settlement.
- 5.6 Settlement occurs when the workspace records that:
 - (a) the exchange of funds or value between financial institutions in accordance with the instructions of the parties has occurred; or
 - (b) if there is no exchange of funds or value, the documents necessary to enable the purchaser to become registered proprietor of the land have been accepted for electronic lodgement.
- 5.7 The parties must do everything reasonably necessary to effect settlement:
 - (a) electronically on the next business day, or
 - (b) at the option of either party, otherwise than electronically as soon as possible –if, after the locking of the workspace at the nominated settlement time, settlement in accordance with special condition 8.6 has not occurred by 4.00 pm, or 6.00 pm if the nominated time for settlement is after 4.00 pm.
- 5.8 Each party must do everything reasonably necessary to assist the other party to trace and identify the recipient of any missing or mistaken payment and to recover the missing or mistaken payment.
- 5.9 The vendor must before settlement:
 - (a) deliver any keys, security devices and codes ("keys") to the estate agent named in the contract,
 - (b) direct the estate agent to give the keys to the purchaser or the purchaser's nominee on notification of settlement by the vendor, the vendor's subscriber or the Electronic Network Operator;
 - (c) deliver all other physical documents and items (other than the goods sold by the contract) to which the purchaser is entitled at settlement, and any keys if not delivered to the estate agent, to the vendor's subscriber or, if there is no vendor's subscriber, confirm in writing to the purchaser that the vendor holds those documents, items and keys at the vendor's address set out in the contract, and give, or direct its subscriber to give, all those documents and items and any such keys to the purchaser or the purchaser's nominee on notification by the Electronic Network Operator of settlement.

Special condition 5 - Condition of the Property

- 6.1 The land and buildings (if any) as sold hereby and inspected by the purchasers are sold on the basis of existing improvements thereon and the purchaser shall not make any requisition or claim any compensation for any deficiency or defect in the said improvements as to their suitability for occupation or otherwise including any requisition in relation to the issue or non-issue if Building Permit and/ or completion of inspections by the relevant authorities in respect of any improvements herein.
- 6.2 The property and any chattels are sold:
 - (a) In their present condition and state of repair;
 - (b) Subject to all defects latent and patent;
 - (c) Subject to any infestations and dilapidation;

- (d) Subject to all existing water, sewerage, drainage and plumbing services and connections in respect of the property;
- (e) Subject to any non-compliance, that is disclosed herein, with the Local Government Act or any Ordinance under that Act in respect of any building on the land; and
- (f) Subject to all easements, covenants, leases, appurtenant easements and restrictions (if any) as set out herein or attached hereto whether known to the Vendor or not. The purchaser should make his own enquiries whether any structures or buildings are constructed over any easements prior to signing the contract, otherwise the purchaser accepts the location of all buildings and shall not make any claim in relation there to.
- 6.3 The purchaser acknowledges and agrees that the purchaser has made its own independent enquires on all matters and does not rely on anything stated by or on behalf of the Vendor.
- 6.4 The purchaser agrees not to seek to terminate rescind or make any objection requisition or claim for compensation arising out of any of the matters covered by this clause.
- 6.5. No failure of any buildings or improvements to comply with any planning or building legislation regulations or bylaws or any planning permit constitutes a defect in the vendor's title or affects the validity of this contract.

6.6 The purchaser further acknowledges that any improvements on the property may be subject to or require compliance with Victorian Building Regulations, Municipal By-Laws, relevant statutes and/or other regulations thereunder and any repealed laws under which the improvements were or should have been constructed. Any failure to comply with any one or more of those laws or regulations shall not be deemed to constitute a defect in title and the purchaser shall not claim any compensation whatsoever nor require the vendor to comply with any of the abovementioned laws and regulations or carry out any final inspections including any requirement to fence any pool or spa or install smoke detectors. The purchaser shall not make any requisition or claim any compensation for any deficiency or defect in the said improvements as to their suitability for occupation or otherwise including any requisition in relation to the issue or non-issue of Building Permits and/or completion of inspections by the relevant authorities in respect of any improvements herein. The purchaser agrees not to seek to terminate, rescind or make any objection, requisition or claim for compensation in relation to anything referred to in this special condition.

Special condition 6 – Deposit

In the event that the purchaser fails to pay the full deposit on the due date, this contract is voidable at the option of the vendor.

Special condition 7 – Loan

The purchaser acknowledge that should this contract be subject to finance and in the event that finance is not approved then the purchaser must provide written proof on a formal decline letter generated by the lender or lending institution to which the finance was applied by the purchaser.

Any decline letters from brokers or any loan originator are not accepted. Failure to comply of this special condition will render the contract of sale unconditional.

Any requests an extension or variation to the Finance Due Date, the Purchaser must pay the Vendor' representative \$110 at the settlement for each request.

Special condition 8 - Plan of Subdivision

- 1. The purchaser acknowledges that as at the Day of Sale if the Plan of Subdivision has not been registered by the Registrar of Titles pursuant to Part 4 of the Subdivision Act or Section 97 of the Transfer of Land Act (as the case may be).
- 2. The Vendor shall as it own cost and expense procure registration of the Plan of Subdivision.
- 3. If the Plan of Subdivision is not registered within 48 months after the day of sale, the Purchaser may after the expiration of that 18 months but before the plan of subdivision is so registered rescind this contract by notice in writing to the other party and the Deposit shall then be repaid to the Purchaser in full.
- 4. The Vendor reserves the right to make alteration to the Plan of subdivision necessary to secure its approval by the Registrar of Titles and (subject to the provisions of Section 9AC of the Sale of Land Act) the purchaser shall make no objection or requisition or claim any compensation in respect of any excess or deficiency whether in areas, boundaries, measurements, occupations, or otherwise on the ground that the plan of subdivision as registered by the Registrar of Titles does not agree in measurement or otherwise with the Plan of Subdivision or the Property as inspected by the Purchaser.
- 5. The Purchaser undertakes that he/she will not lodge a Caveat against the Title to the land hereby sold pending approval of the Plan of Subdivision by the Registrar of titles.

Special condition 9 - Nomination

The purchaser may no later than 14 days before the due date for settlement nominate a substitute or additional person to take a transfer of the land, but the named purchaser remains personally liable for the due performance of all the purchaser's obligations under this contract.

The purchaser has to pay the professional fees to Vendor's Conveyancer of \$220 for the nomination.

Special condition 10 – Rescheduled Settlement

Without limiting any other rights of the Vendor, if the purchaser fails to settle on the due date for settlement as set out in the particulars of this Contract (Due Date) or requests an extension or variation to the Due Date, the Purchaser must pay the Vendor' representative \$330 at the settlement for each request.

Special condition 11 - Owners Corporate Certificate to be provided

If the contract has Owners Corporate Certificate to be provided, the purchaser must acknowledge this and is not agreeable to rescind, object to requestion, make a claim or terminate the contract based on this condition. The Owners Corporate Certificate will be provided in a timely manner and made available to the purchaser and purchasers representative as soon as it is issued.

Special condition 12 - Re-sale Deed

For the Sale of this land to take effect, both Vendor(s) and Purchaser(s) will be required to enter into a Re-Sale Deed prior to settlement date. The Re-Sale Deed will be obtained by the Vendor from Developer's (head Vendor) lawyers. The Purchaser(s) acknowledge and agree to:

- a) Allow any cost incurred by the Vendor for obtaining Re-Sale deed from Developer's (Head Vendor) Lawyers via adjustments at settlement.
- b) Execute the Re-Sale deed and deliver them to Vendor's Conveyancer at least seven (7) days prior to settlement date.

General Conditions

Contract signing

1. ELECTRONIC SIGNATURE

- 1.1 In this general condition "electronic signature " means a digital signature or a visual representation of a person's handwritten signature or mark which is placed on a physical or electronic copy of this contract by electronic or mechanical means, and "electronically signed" has a corresponding meaning.
- 1.2 The parties consent to this contract being signed by or on behalf of a party by an electronic signature.
- 1.3 Where this contract is electronically signed by or on behalf of a party, the party warrants and agrees that the electronic signature has been used to identify the person signing and to indicate that the party intends to be bound by the electronic signature.
- 1.4 This contract may be electronically signed in any number of counterparts which together will constitute the one document.
- 1.5 Each party consents to the exchange of counterparts of this contract by delivery by email or such other electronic means as may be agreed in writing.
- 1.6 Each party must upon request promptly deliver a physical counterpart of this contract with the handwritten signature or signatures of the party and all written evidence of the authority of a person signing on their behalf, but a failure to comply with the request does not affect the validity of this contract.

2. LIABILITY OF SIGNATORY

Any signatory for a proprietary limited company purchaser is personally liable for the due performance of the purchaser's obligations as if the signatory were the purchaser in the case of a default by a proprietary limited company purchaser.

3. GUARANTEE

The vendor may require one or more directors of the purchaser to guarantee the purchaser's performance of this contract if the purchaser is a proprietary limited company.

4. NOMINEE

The purchaser may no later than 14 days before the due date for settlement nominate a substitute or additional person to take a transfer of the land, but the named purchaser remains personally liable for the due performance of all the purchaser's obligations under this contract.

Title

5. ENCUMBRANCES

- 5.1 The purchaser buys the property subject to:
 - (a) any encumbrance shown in the section 32 statement other than mortgages or caveats; and
 - (b) any reservations, exceptions and conditions in the crown grant; and
 - (c) any lease or tenancy referred to in the particulars of sale.
- 5.2 The purchaser indemnifies the vendor against all obligations under any lease or tenancy that are to be performed by the landlord after settlement.

6 VENDOR WARRANTIES

- 6.1 The vendor warrants that these general conditions 1 to 35 are identical to the general conditions 1 to 35 in the form of contract of sale of land published by the Law Institute of Victoria Limited and the Real Estate Institute of Victoria Ltd in the month and year set out at the foot of this page.
- 6.2 The warranties in general conditions 6.3 and 6.4 replace the purchaser's right to make requisitions and inquiries.
- 6.3 The vendor warrants that the vendor:
 - (a) has, or by the due date for settlement will have, the right to sell the land; and
 - (b) is under no legal disability; and
 - (c) is in possession of the land, either personally or through a tenant; and
 - (d) has not previously sold or granted any option to purchase, agreed to a lease or granted a pre-emptive right which is current over the land and which gives another party rights which have priority over the interest of the purchaser; and
 - (e) will at settlement be the holder of an unencumbered estate in fee simple in the land; and
 - (f) will at settlement be the unencumbered owner of any improvements, fixtures, fittings and goods sold with the land.
- 6.4 The vendor further warrants that the vendor has no knowledge of any of the following:
 - (a) public rights of way over the land;
 - (b) easements over the land;
 - (c) lease or other possessory agreement affecting the land;

- (d) notice or order directly and currently affecting the land which will not be dealt with at settlement, other than the usual rate notices and any land tax notices;
- (e) legal proceedings which would render the sale of the land void or voidable or capable of being set aside.
- 6.5 The warranties in general conditions 6.3 and 6.4 are subject to any contrary provisions in this contract and disclosures in the section 32 statement.
- 6.6 If sections 137B and 137C of the Building Act 1993 apply to this contract, the vendor warrants that:
 - (a) all domestic building work carried out in relation to the construction by or on behalf of the vendor of the home was carried out in a proper and workmanlike manner; and
 - (b) all materials used in that domestic building work were good and suitable for the purpose for which they were used and that, unless otherwise stated in the contract, those materials were new; and
 - (c) domestic building work was carried out in accordance with all laws and legal requirements, including, without limiting the generality of this warranty, the *Building Act* 1993 and regulations made under the *Building Act* 1993.
- 6.7 Words and phrases used in general condition 6.6 which are defined in the *Building Act* 1993 have the same meaning in general condition 6.6.

7. IDENTITY OF THE LAND

- 7.1 An omission or mistake in the description of the property or any deficiency in the area, description or measurements of the land does not invalidate the sale.
- 7.2 The purchaser may not:
 - make any objection or claim for compensation for any alleged misdescription of the property or any deficiency in its area or measurements; or
 - (b) require the vendor to amend title or pay any cost of amending title.

8. SERVICES

- 8.1 The vendor does not represent that the services are adequate for the purchaser's proposed use of the property and the vendor advises the purchaser to make appropriate inquiries. The condition of the services may change between the day of sale and settlement and the vendor does not promise that the services will be in the same condition at settlement as they were on the day of sale.
- 8.2 The purchaser is responsible for the connection of all services to the property after settlement and the payment of any associated cost.

9. CONSENTS

The vendor must obtain any necessary consent or licence required for the vendor to sell the property. The contract will be at an end and all money paid must be refunded if any necessary consent or licence is not obtained by settlement.

10. TRANSFER & DUTY

- 10.1 The purchaser must prepare and deliver to the vendor at least 7 days before the due date for settlement any paper transfer of land document which is necessary for this transaction. The delivery of the transfer of land document is not acceptance of title.
- 10.2 The vendor must promptly initiate the Duties on Line or other form required by the State Revenue Office in respect of this transaction, and both parties must co-operate to complete it as soon as practicable.

11. RELEASE OF SECURITY INTEREST

- 11.1 This general condition applies if any part of the property is subject to a security interest to which the *Personal Property Securities Act* 2009 (Cth) applies.
- 11.2 For the purposes of enabling the purchaser to search the Personal Property Securities Register for any security interests affecting any personal property for which the purchaser may be entitled to a release, statement, approval or correction in accordance with general condition 11.4, the purchaser may request the vendor to provide the vendor's date of birth to the purchaser. The vendor must comply with a request made by the purchaser under this condition if the purchaser makes the request at least 21 days before the due date for settlement.
- 11.3 If the purchaser is given the details of the vendor's date of birth under general condition 11.2, the purchaser must
 - (a) only use the vendor's date of birth for the purposes specified in general condition 11.2; and
 - (b) keep the date of birth of the vendor secure and confidential.
- 11.4 The vendor must ensure that at or before settlement, the purchaser receives—
 - (a) a release from the secured party releasing the property from the security interest; or
 - (b) a statement in writing in accordance with section 275(1)(b) of the *Personal Property Securities Act* 2009 (Cth) setting out that the amount or obligation that is secured is nil at settlement; or
 - (c) a written approval or correction in accordance with section 275(1)(c) of the Personal Property Securities Act 2009 (Cth) indicating that, on settlement, the personal property included in the contract is not or will not be property in which the security interest is granted.
- 11.5 Subject to general condition 11.6, the vendor is not obliged to ensure that the purchaser receives a release, statement, approval or correction in respect of personal property—

- (a) that-
 - (i) the purchaser intends to use predominantly for personal, domestic or household purposes; and
 - (ii) has a market value of not more than \$5000 or, if a greater amount has been prescribed for the purposes of section 47(1) of the Personal Property Securities Act 2009 (Cth), not more than that prescribed amount; or
- (b) that is sold in the ordinary course of the vendor's business of selling personal property of that kind.
- 11.6 The vendor is obliged to ensure that the purchaser receives a release, statement, approval or correction in respect of personal property described in general condition 11.5 if—
 - (a) the personal property is of a kind that may or must be described by serial number in the Personal Property Securities Register; or
 - (b) the purchaser has actual or constructive knowledge that the sale constitutes a breach of the security agreement that provides for the security interest.
- 11.7 A release for the purposes of general condition 11.4(a) must be in writing.
- 11.8 A release for the purposes of general condition 11.4(a) must be effective in releasing the goods from the security interest and be in a form which allows the purchaser to take title to the goods free of that security interest.
- 11.9 If the purchaser receives a release under general condition 11.4(a) the purchaser must provide the vendor with a copy of the release at or as soon as practicable after settlement.
- 11.10 In addition to ensuring that a release is received under general condition 7.4(a), the vendor must ensure that at or before settlement the purchaser receives a written undertaking from a secured party to register a financing change statement to reflect that release if the property being released includes goods of a kind that are described by serial number in the Personal Property Securities Register.
- 11.11 The purchaser must advise the vendor of any security interest that is registered on or before the day of sale on the Personal Property Securities Register, which the purchaser reasonably requires to be released, at least 21 days before the due date for settlement.
- 11.12 The vendor may delay settlement until 21 days after the purchaser advises the vendor of the security interests that the purchaser reasonably requires to be released if the purchaser does not provide an advice under general condition 11.11.
- 11.13 If settlement is delayed under general condition 11.12 the purchaser must pay the vendor—
 - interest from the due date for settlement until the date on which settlement occurs or 21 days after the vendor receives the advice, whichever is the earlier; and
 - (b) any reasonable costs incurred by the vendor as a result of the delay—
 - as though the purchaser was in default.
- 11.14 The vendor is not required to ensure that the purchaser receives a release in respect of the land. This general condition 1.14 applies despite general condition 11.1.
- 11.15 Words and phrases which are defined in the *Personal Property Securities Act* 2009 (Cth) have the same meaning in general condition 11 unless the context requires otherwise.

12. BUILDER WARRANTY INSURANCE

The vendor warrants that the vendor will provide at settlement details of any current builder warranty insurance in the vendor's possession relating to the property if requested in writing to do so at least 21 days before settlement.

13. GENERAL LAW LAND

- 13.2 The remaining provisions of this general condition 13 only apply if any part of the land is not under the operation of the *Transfer of Land Act* 1958.
- 13.3 The vendor is taken to be the holder of an unencumbered estate in fee simple in the land if there is an unbroken chain of title starting at least 30 years before the day of sale proving on the face of the documents the ownership of the entire legal and equitable estate without the aid of other evidence.
- 13.4 The purchaser is entitled to inspect the vendor's chain of title on request at such place in Victoria as the vendor nominates.
- 13.5 The purchaser is taken to have accepted the vendor's title if:
 - (a) 21 days have elapsed since the day of sale; and
 - (b) the purchaser has not reasonably objected to the title or reasonably required the vendor to remedy a defect in the title.
- 13.6 The contract will be at an end if:
 - (a) the vendor gives the purchaser a notice that the vendor is unable or unwilling to satisfy the purchaser's objection or requirement and that the contract will end if the objection or requirement is not withdrawn within 14 days of the giving of the notice; and

- (b) the objection or requirement is not withdrawn in that time.
- 13.7 If the contract ends in accordance with general condition 13.6, the deposit must be returned to the purchaser and neither party has a claim against the other in damages.
- 13.10 General condition 17.1 [settlement] should be read as if the reference to 'registered proprietor' is a reference to 'owner' in respect of that part of the land which is not under the operation of the *Transfer of Land Act* 1958.

Money

14. DEPOSIT

- 14.1 The purchaser must pay the deposit:
 - (a) to the vendor's licensed estate agent; or
 - (b) if there is no estate agent, to the vendor's legal practitioner or conveyancer; or
 - (c) if the vendor directs, into a special purpose account in an authorised deposit-taking institution in Victoria specified by the vendor in the joint names of the purchaser and the vendor.
- 14.2 If the land sold is a lot on an unregistered plan of subdivision, the deposit:
 - (a) must not exceed 10% of the price; and
 - (b) must be paid to the vendor's estate agent, legal practitioner or conveyancer and held by the estate agent, legal practitioner or conveyancer on trust for the purchaser until the registration of the plan of subdivision.
- 14.3 The deposit must be released to the vendor if:
 - (a) the vendor provides particulars, to the satisfaction of the purchaser, that either-
 - (i) there are no debts secured against the property; or
 - (ii) if there are any debts, the total amount of those debts together with any amounts to be withheld in accordance with general conditions 24 and 25 does not exceed 80% of the sale price; and
 - (b) at least 28 days have elapsed since the particulars were given to the purchaser under paragraph (a); and
 - (c) all conditions of section 27 of the Sale of Land Act 1962 have been satisfied.
- 14.4 The stakeholder must pay the deposit and any interest to the party entitled when the deposit is released, the contract is settled, or the contract is ended.
- 14.5 The stakeholder may pay the deposit and any interest into court if it is reasonable to do so.
- 14.6 Where the purchaser is deemed by section 27(7) of the Sale of Land Act 1962 to have given the deposit release authorisation referred to in section 27(1), the purchaser is also deemed to have accepted title in the absence of any prior express objection to title.
- 14.7 Payment of the deposit may be made or tendered:
 - (a) in cash up to \$1,000 or 0.2% of the price, whichever is greater; or
 - (b) by cheque drawn on an authorised deposit-taking institution; or
 - (c) by electronic funds transfer to a recipient having the appropriate facilities for receipt.

However, unless otherwise agreed:

- (d) payment may not be made by credit card, debit card or any other financial transfer system that allows for any chargeback or funds reversal other than for fraud or mistaken payment, and
- (e) any financial transfer or similar fees or deductions from the funds transferred, other than any fees charged by the recipient's authorised deposit-taking institution, must be paid by the remitter.
- 14.8 Payment by electronic funds transfer is made when cleared funds are received in the recipient's bank account.
- 14.9 Before the funds are electronically transferred the intended recipient must be notified in writing and given sufficient particulars to readily identify the relevant transaction.
- 14.10 As soon as the funds have been electronically transferred the intended recipient must be provided with the relevant transaction number or reference details.
- 14.11 For the purpose of this general condition 'authorised deposit-taking institution' means a body corporate for which an authority under section 9(3) of the *Banking Act 1959 (Cth)* is in force.

15. DEPOSIT BOND

- 15.1 This general condition only applies if the applicable box in the particulars of sale is checked.
- 15.2 In this general condition "deposit bond" means an irrevocable undertaking to pay on demand an amount equal to the deposit or any unpaid part of the deposit. The issuer and the form of the deposit bond must be satisfactory to the vendor. The deposit bond must have an expiry date at least 45 days after the due date for settlement.

- 15.3 The purchaser may deliver a deposit bond to the vendor's estate agent, legal practitioner or conveyancer within 7 days after the day of sale.
- 15.4 The purchaser may at least 45 days before a current deposit bond expires deliver a replacement deposit bond on the same terms and conditions.
- 15.5 Where a deposit bond is delivered, the purchaser must pay the deposit to the vendor's legal practitioner or conveyancer on the first to occur of:
 - (a) settlement;
 - (b) the date that is 45 days before the deposit bond or any replacement deposit bond expires;
 - (c) the date on which this contract ends in accordance with general condition 35.2 [default not remedied] following breach by the purchaser; and
 - (d) the date on which the vendor ends this contract by accepting repudiation of it by the purchaser.
- 15.6 The vendor may claim on the deposit bond without prior notice if the purchaser defaults under this contract or repudiates this contract and the contract is ended. The amount paid by the issuer satisfies the obligations of the purchaser under general condition 15.5 to the extent of the payment.
- 15.7 Nothing in this general condition limits the rights of the vendor if the purchaser defaults under this contract or repudiates this contract, except as provided in general condition 15.6.
- 15.8 This general condition is subject to general condition 14.2 [deposit].

16. BANK GUARANTEE

- 16.1 This general condition only applies if the applicable box in the particulars of sale is checked.
- 16.2 In this general condition:
 - (a) "bank guarantee" means an unconditional and irrevocable guarantee or undertaking by a bank in a form satisfactory to the vendor to pay on demand any amount under this contract agreed in writing, and
 - (b) "bank" means an authorised deposit-taking institution under the Banking Act 1959 (Cth).
- 16.3 The purchaser may deliver a bank guarantee to the vendor's legal practitioner or conveyancer.
- 16.4 The purchaser must pay the amount secured by the bank guarantee to the vendor's legal practitioner or conveyancer on the first to occur of:
 - (a) settlement;
 - (b) the date that is 45 days before the bank guarantee expires;
 - (c) the date on which this contract ends in accordance with general condition 35.2 [default not remedied] following breach by the purchaser; and
 - (d) the date on which the vendor ends this contract by accepting repudiation of it by the purchaser.
- 16.5 The vendor must return the bank guarantee document to the purchaser when the purchaser pays the amount secured by the bank guarantee in accordance with general condition 16.4.
- 16.6 The vendor may claim on the bank guarantee without prior notice if the purchaser defaults under this contract or repudiates this contract and the contract is ended. The amount paid by the bank satisfies the obligations of the purchaser under general condition 16.4 to the extent of the payment.
- 16.7 Nothing in this general condition limits the rights of the vendor if the purchaser defaults under this contract or repudiates this contract except as provided in general condition 16.6.
- 16.8 This general condition is subject to general condition 14.2 [deposit].

17. SETTLEMENT

- 17.1 At settlement:
 - (a) the purchaser must pay the balance; and
 - (b) the vendor must:
 - (i) do all things necessary to enable the purchaser to become the registered proprietor of the land; and
 - (ii) give either vacant possession or receipt of rents and profits in accordance with the particulars of sale.
- 17.2 Settlement must be conducted between the hours of 10.00 am and 4.00 pm unless the parties agree otherwise.
- 17.3 The purchaser must pay all money other than the deposit in accordance with a written direction of the vendor or the vendor's legal practitioner or conveyancer.

18. ELECTRONIC SETTLEMENT

- 18.1 Settlement and lodgment of the instruments necessary to record the purchaser as registered proprietor of the land will be conducted electronically in accordance with the Electronic Conveyancing National Law. This general condition 18 has priority over any other provision of this contract to the extent of any inconsistency.
- 18.2 A party must immediately give written notice if that party reasonably believes that settlement and lodgment can no longer be conducted electronically. General condition 18 ceases to apply from when such a notice is given.

18.3 Each party must:

- (a) be, or engage a representative who is, a subscriber for the purposes of the Electronic Conveyancing National Law,
- (b) ensure that all other persons for whom that party is responsible and who are associated with this transaction are, or engage, a subscriber for the purposes of the Electronic Conveyancing National Law, and
- (c) conduct the transaction in accordance with the Electronic Conveyancing National Law.
- 18.4 The vendor must open the electronic workspace ("workspace") as soon as reasonably practicable and nominate a date and time for settlement. The inclusion of a specific date and time for settlement in a workspace is not of itself a promise to settle on that date or at that time. The workspace is an electronic address for the service of notices and for written communications for the purposes of any electronic transactions legislation.
- 18.5 This general condition 18.5 applies if there is more than one electronic lodgment network operator in respect of the transaction. In this general condition 18.5 "the transaction" means this sale and purchase and any associated transaction involving any of the same subscribers.

To the extent that any interoperability rules governing the relationship between electronic lodgment network operators do not provide otherwise:

- (a) the electronic lodgement network operator to conduct all the financial and lodgment aspects of the transaction after the workspace locks must be one which is willing and able to conduct such aspects of the transaction in accordance with the instructions of all the subscribers in the workspaces of all the electronic lodgement network operators after the workspace locks;
- (b) if two or more electronic lodgement network operators meet that description, one may be selected by purchaser's incoming mortgagee having the highest priority but if there is no mortgagee of the purchaser, the vendor must make the selection.
- 18.6 Settlement occurs when the workspace records that:
 - (a) there has been an exchange of funds or value between the exchange settlement account or accounts in the Reserve Bank of Australia of the relevant financial institutions or their financial settlement agents in accordance with the instructions of the parties; or
 - (b) if there is no exchange of funds or value, the documents necessary to enable the purchaser to become registered proprietor of the land have been accepted for electronic lodgment.
- 18.7 The parties must do everything reasonably necessary to effect settlement:
 - (a) electronically on the next business day, or
 - (b) at the option of either party, otherwise than electronically as soon as possible –

if, after the locking of the workspace at the nominated settlement time, settlement in accordance with general condition 18.6 has not occurred by 4.00 pm, or 6.00 pm if the nominated time for settlement is after 4.00 pm.

- 18.8 Each party must do everything reasonably necessary to assist the other party to trace and identify the recipient of any missing or mistaken payment and to recover the missing or mistaken payment.
- 18.9 The vendor must before settlement:
 - (a) deliver any keys, security devices and codes ("keys") to the estate agent named in the contract,
 - (b) direct the estate agent to give the keys to the purchaser or the purchaser's nominee on notification of settlement by the vendor, the vendor's subscriber or the electronic lodgment network operator;
 - (c) deliver all other physical documents and items (other than the goods sold by the contract) to which the purchaser is entitled at settlement, and any keys if not delivered to the estate agent, to the vendor's subscriber or, if there is no vendor's subscriber, confirm in writing to the purchaser that the vendor holds those documents, items and keys at the vendor's address set out in the contract, and

give, or direct its subscriber to give, all those documents and items and any such keys to the purchaser or the purchaser's nominee on notification by the electronic lodgment network operator of settlement.

19. GST

- 19.1 The purchaser does not have to pay the vendor any amount in respect of GST in addition to the price if the particulars of sale specify that the price includes GST (if any).
- 19.2 The purchaser must pay to the vendor any GST payable by the vendor in respect of a taxable supply made under this contract in addition to the price if:
 - (a) the particulars of sale specify that GST (if any) must be paid in addition to the price; or
 - (b) GST is payable solely as a result of any action taken or intended to be taken by the purchaser after the day of sale, including a change of use; or
 - (c) the particulars of sale specify that the supply made under this contract is of land on which a 'farming business' is carried on and the supply (or part of it) does not satisfy the requirements of section 38-480 of the GST Act; or
 - (d) the particulars of sale specify that the supply made under this contract is of a going concern and the supply (or a part of it) does not satisfy the requirements of section 38-325 of the GST Act.
- 19.3 The purchaser is not obliged to pay any GST under this contract until a tax invoice has been given to the purchaser.
- 19.4 If the particulars of sale specify that the supply made under this contract is of land on which a 'farming business' is carried on:
 - the vendor warrants that the property is land on which a farming business has been carried on for the period of 5
 years preceding the date of supply; and

- (b) the purchaser warrants that the purchaser intends that a farming business will be carried on after settlement on the property.
- 19.5 If the particulars of sale specify that the supply made under this contract is a 'going concern':
 - (a) the parties agree that this contract is for the supply of a going concern; and
 - (b) the purchaser warrants that the purchaser is, or prior to settlement will be, registered for GST; and
 - (c) the vendor warrants that the vendor will carry on the going concern until the date of supply.
- 19.6 If the particulars of sale specify that the supply made under this contract is a 'margin scheme' supply, the parties agree that the margin scheme applies to this contract.
- 19.7 In this general condition:
 - (a) 'GST Act' means A New Tax System (Goods and Services Tax) Act 1999 (Cth); and
 - (b) 'GST' includes penalties and interest.

20. LOAN

- 20.1 If the particulars of sale specify that this contract is subject to a loan being approved, this contract is subject to the lender approving the loan on the security of the property by the approval date or any later date allowed by the vendor.
- 20.2 The purchaser may end the contract if the loan is not approved by the approval date, but only if the purchaser:
 - (a) immediately applied for the loan; and
 - (b) did everything reasonably required to obtain approval of the loan; and
 - (c) serves written notice ending the contract, together with written evidence of rejection or non-approval of the loan, on the vendor within 2 clear business days after the approval date or any later date allowed by the vendor; and
 - d) is not in default under any other condition of this contract when the notice is given.
- 20.3 All money must be immediately refunded to the purchaser if the contract is ended.

21. BUILDING REPORT

- 21.1 This general condition only applies if the applicable box in the particulars of sale is checked.
- 21.2 The purchaser may end this contract within 7 days from the day of sale if the purchaser:
 - obtains a written report from a registered building practitioner or architect which discloses a current defect in a structure on the land and designates it as a major building defect;
 - (b) gives the vendor a copy of the report and a written notice ending this contract; and
 - (c) is not then in default.
- 21.3 All money paid must be immediately refunded to the purchaser if the contract ends in accordance with this general condition.
- 21.4 A notice under this general condition may be served on the vendor's legal practitioner, conveyancer or estate agent even if the estate agent's authority has formally expired at the time of service.
- 21.5 The registered building practitioner may inspect the property at any reasonable time for the purpose of preparing the report.

22. PEST REPORT

- 22.1 This general condition only applies if the applicable box in the particulars of sale is checked.
- 22.2 The purchaser may end this contract within 7 days from the day of sale if the purchaser:
 - obtains a written report from a pest control operator licensed under Victorian law which discloses a current pest infestation on the land and designates it as a major infestation affecting the structure of a building on the land;
 - (b) gives the vendor a copy of the report and a written notice ending this contract; and
 - (c) is not then in default.
- 22.3 All money paid must be immediately refunded to the purchaser if the contract ends in accordance with this general condition.
- 22.4 A notice under this general condition may be served on the vendor's legal practitioner, conveyancer or estate agent even if the estate agent's authority has formally expired at the time of service.
- 22.5 The pest control operator may inspect the property at any reasonable time for the purpose of preparing the report.

23. ADJUSTMENTS

- 23.1 All periodic outgoings payable by the vendor, and any rent and other income received in respect of the property must be apportioned between the parties on the settlement date and any adjustments paid and received as appropriate.
- 23.2 The periodic outgoings and rent and other income must be apportioned on the following basis:
 - the vendor is liable for the periodic outgoings and entitled to the rent and other income up to and including the day of settlement; and
 - (b) the land is treated as the only land of which the vendor is owner (as defined in the Land Tax Act 2005); and
 - (c) the vendor is taken to own the land as a resident Australian beneficial owner; and
 - (d) any personal statutory benefit available to each party is disregarded in calculating apportionment.

23.3 The purchaser must provide copies of all certificates and other information used to calculate the adjustments under general condition 23, if requested by the vendor.

24. FOREIGN RESIDENT CAPITAL GAINS WITHHOLDING

- 24.1 Words defined or used in Subdivision 14-D of Schedule 1 to the *Taxation Administration Act 1953 (Cth)* have the same meaning in this general condition unless the context requires otherwise.
- 24.2 Every vendor under this contract is a foreign resident for the purposes of this general condition unless the vendor gives the purchaser a clearance certificate issued by the Commissioner under section 14-220 (1) of Schedule 1 to the *Taxation Administration Act 1953 (Cth)*. The specified period in the clearance certificate must include the actual date of settlement.
- 24.3 The remaining provisions of this general condition 24 only apply if the purchaser is required to pay the Commissioner an amount in accordance with section 14-200(3) or section 14-235 of Schedule 1 to the *Taxation Administration Act 1953 (Cth)* ("the amount") because one or more of the vendors is a foreign resident, the property has or will have a market value not less than the amount set out in section 14-215 of the legislation just after the transaction, and the transaction is not excluded under section 14-215(1) of the legislation.
- 24.4 The amount is to be deducted from the vendor's entitlement to the contract consideration. The vendor must pay to the purchaser at settlement such part of the amount as is represented by non-monetary consideration.
- 24.5 The purchaser must:
 - (a) engage a legal practitioner or conveyancer ("representative") to conduct all the legal aspects of settlement, including the performance of the purchaser's obligations under the legislation and this general condition; and
 - (b) ensure that the representative does so.
- 24.6 The terms of the representative's engagement are taken to include instructions to have regard to the vendor's interests and instructions that the representative must:
 - (a) pay, or ensure payment of, the amount to the Commissioner in the manner required by the Commissioner and as soon as reasonably and practicably possible, from moneys under the control or direction of the representative in accordance with this general condition if the sale of the property settles;
 - (b) promptly provide the vendor with proof of payment; and
 - (c) otherwise comply, or ensure compliance, with this general condition;

despite:

- (d) any contrary instructions, other than from both the purchaser and the vendor; and
- (e) any other provision in this contract to the contrary.
- 24.7 The representative is taken to have complied with the requirements of general condition 24.6 if:
 - (a) the settlement is conducted through an electronic lodgment network; and
 - (b) the amount is included in the settlement statement requiring payment to the Commissioner in respect of this transaction.
- 24.8 Any clearance certificate or document evidencing variation of the amount in accordance with section 14-235(2) of Schedule 1 to the *Taxation Administration Act 1953 (Cth*) must be given to the purchaser at least 5 business days before the due date for settlement
- 24.9 The vendor must provide the purchaser with such information as the purchaser requires to comply with the purchaser's obligation to pay the amount in accordance with section 14-200 of Schedule 1 to the *Taxation Administration Act 1953 (Cth)*. The information must be provided within 5 business days of request by the purchaser. The vendor warrants that the information the vendor provides is true and correct.
- 24.10 The purchaser is responsible for any penalties or interest payable to the Commissioner on account of late payment of the amount.

25. GST WITHHOLDING

- 25.1 Words and expressions defined or used in Subdivision 14-E of Schedule 1 to the Taxation Administration Act 1953 (Cth) or in A New Tax System (Goods and Services Tax) Act 1999 (Cth) have the same meaning in this general condition unless the context requires otherwise. Words and expressions first used in this general condition and shown in italics and marked with an asterisk are defined or described in at least one of those Acts.
- 25.2 The purchaser must notify the vendor in writing of the name of the recipient of the *supply for the purposes of section 14-255 of Schedule 1 to the *Taxation Administration Act 1953 (Cth)* at least 21 days before the due date for settlement unless the recipient is the purchaser named in the contract.
- 25.3 The vendor must at least 14 days before the due date for settlement provide the purchaser and any person nominated by the purchaser under general condition 4 with a GST withholding notice in accordance with section 14-255 of Schedule 1 to the *Taxation Administration Act 1953 (Cth)*, and must provide all information required by the purchaser or any person so nominated to confirm the accuracy of the notice.
- 25.4 The remaining provisions of this general condition 25 apply if the purchaser is or may be required to pay the Commissioner an *amount in accordance with section 14-250 of Schedule 1 to the *Taxation Administration Act 1953 (Cth)* because the property is *new residential premises or *potential residential land in either case falling within the parameters of that section, and also if the sale attracts the operation of section 14-255 of the legislation. Nothing in this general condition 25 is to be taken as relieving the vendor from compliance with section 14-255.
- 25.5 The amount is to be deducted from the vendor's entitlement to the contract *consideration and is then taken to be paid to the vendor, whether or not the vendor provides the purchaser with a GST withholding notice in accordance with section 14-255 of Schedule 1 to the *Taxation Administration Act 1953 (Cth)*. The vendor must pay to the purchaser at settlement such part of the amount as is represented by non-monetary consideration.

- 25.6 The purchaser must:
 - (a) engage a legal practitioner or conveyancer ("representative") to conduct all the legal aspects of settlement, including the performance of the purchaser's obligations under the legislation and this general condition; and
 - (b) ensure that the representative does so.
- 25.7 The terms of the representative's engagement are taken to include instructions to have regard to the vendor's interests relating to the payment of the amount to the Commissioner and instructions that the representative must:
 - (a) pay, or ensure payment of, the amount to the Commissioner in the manner required by the Commissioner and as soon as reasonably and practicably possible, from moneys under the control or direction of the representative in accordance with this general condition on settlement of the sale of the property;
 - (b) promptly provide the vendor with evidence of payment, including any notification or other document provided by the purchaser to the Commissioner relating to payment; and
 - (c) otherwise comply, or ensure compliance, with this general condition;

despite:

- (d) any contrary instructions, other than from both the purchaser and the vendor; and
- (e) any other provision in this contract to the contrary.
- 25.8 The representative is taken to have complied with the requirements of general condition 25.7 if:
 - (a) settlement is conducted through an electronic lodgment network; and
 - (b) the amount is included in the settlement statement requiring payment to the Commissioner in respect of this transaction.
- 25.9 The purchaser may at settlement give the vendor a bank cheque for the amount in accordance with section 16-30 (3) of Schedule 1 to the *Taxation Administration Act 1953 (Cth*), but only if:
 - (a) so agreed by the vendor in writing; and
 - (b) the settlement is not conducted through an electronic lodgment network.

However, if the purchaser gives the bank cheque in accordance with this general condition 25.9, the vendor must:

- (c) immediately after settlement provide the bank cheque to the Commissioner to pay the amount in relation to the supply; and
- (d) give the purchaser a receipt for the bank cheque which identifies the transaction and includes particulars of the bank cheque, at the same time the purchaser gives the vendor the bank cheque.
- 25.10 A party must provide the other party with such information as the other party requires to:
 - (a) decide if an amount is required to be paid or the quantum of it, or
 - (b) comply with the purchaser's obligation to pay the amount,

in accordance with section 14-250 of Schedule 1 to the *Taxation Administration Act 1953 (Cth)*. The information must be provided within 5 business days of a written request. The party providing the information warrants that it is true and correct.

- 25.11 The vendor warrants that:
 - (a) at settlement, the property is not new residential premises or potential residential land in either case falling within the parameters of section 14-250 of Schedule 1 to the *Taxation Administration Act 1953 (Cth)* if the vendor gives the purchaser a written notice under section 14-255 to the effect that the purchaser will not be required to make a payment under section 14-250 in respect of the supply, or fails to give a written notice as required by and within the time specified in section 14-255; and
 - (b) the amount described in a written notice given by the vendor to the purchaser under section 14-255 of Schedule 1 to the *Taxation Administration Act 1953 (Cth)* is the correct amount required to be paid under section 14-250 of the legislation.
- 25.12 The purchaser is responsible for any penalties or interest payable to the Commissioner on account of non-payment or late payment of the amount, except to the extent that:
 - (a) the penalties or interest arise from any failure on the part of the vendor, including breach of a warranty in general condition 25.11; or
 - (b) the purchaser has a reasonable belief that the property is neither new residential premises nor potential residential land requiring the purchaser to pay an amount to the Commissioner in accordance with section 14-250 (1) of Schedule 1 to the *Taxation Administration Act 1953 (Cth)*.

The vendor is responsible for any penalties or interest payable to the Commissioner on account of non-payment or late payment of the amount if either exception applies.

- 26.3 Each party must do all things reasonably necessary to enable this contract to proceed to settlement, and must act in a prompt and efficient manner.
- 26.4 Any unfulfilled obligation will not merge on settlement.

27. SERVICE

- 27.1 Any document required to be served by or on any party may be served by or on the legal practitioner or conveyancer for that party.
- 27.2 A cooling off notice under section 31 of the *Sale of Land Act 1962* or a notice under general condition 20 [loan approval], 21 [building report] or 22 [pest report] may be served on the vendor's legal practitioner, conveyancer or estate agent even if the estate agent's authority has formally expired at the time of service.
- 27.3 A document is sufficiently served:
 - (a) personally, or
 - (b) by pre-paid post, or
 - (c) in any manner authorized by law or by the Supreme Court for service of documents, including any manner authorised for service on or by a legal practitioner, whether or not the person serving or receiving the document is a legal practitioner, or
 - (d) by email.
- 27.4 Any document properly sent by:
 - (a) express post is taken to have been served on the next business day after posting, unless proved otherwise;
 - (b) priority post is taken to have been served on the fourth business day after posting, unless proved otherwise;
 - (c) regular post is taken to have been served on the sixth business day after posting, unless proved otherwise;
 - (d) email is taken to have been served at the time of receipt within the meaning of section 13A of the *Electronic Transactions (Victoria) Act 2000.*
- 27.5 In this contract 'document' includes 'demand' and 'notice', 'serve' includes 'give', and 'served' and 'service' have corresponding meanings.

28. NOTICES

- 28.1 The vendor is responsible for any notice, order, demand or levy imposing liability on the property that is issued or made before the day of sale, and does not relate to periodic outgoings.
- 28.2 The purchaser is responsible for any notice, order, demand or levy imposing liability on the property that is issued or made on or after the day of sale, and does not relate to periodic outgoings.
- 28.3 The purchaser may enter the property to comply with that responsibility where action is required before settlement.

29. INSPECTION

The purchaser and/or another person authorised by the purchaser may inspect the property at any reasonable time during the 7 days preceding and including the settlement day.

30. TERMS CONTRACT

- 30.1 If this is a 'terms contract' as defined in the Sale of Land Act 1962:
 - (a) any mortgage affecting the land sold must be discharged as to that land before the purchaser becomes entitled to
 possession or to the receipt of rents and profits unless the vendor satisfies section 29M of the Sale of Land Act
 1962: and
 - (b) the deposit and all other money payable under the contract (other than any money payable in excess of the amount required to so discharge the mortgage) must be paid to a legal practitioner or conveyancer or a licensed estate agent to be applied in or towards discharging the mortgage.

 - (f) the purchaser must maintain and operate the property in good repair (fair wear and tear excepted) and keep the property safe, lawful, structurally sound, weatherproof and free from contaminations and dangerous substances;
 - (g) the property must not be altered in any way without the written consent of the vendor which must not be unreasonably refused or delayed;
 - (h) the purchaser must observe all obligations that affect owners or occupiers of land;

(i) the vendor and/or other person authorised by the vendor may enter the property at any reasonable time to inspect it on giving 7 days written notice, but not more than twice in a year.

31. LOSS OR DAMAGE BEFORE SETTLEMENT

- 31.1 The vendor carries the risk of loss or damage to the property until settlement.
- 31.2 The vendor must deliver the property to the purchaser at settlement in the same condition it was in on the day of sale, except for fair wear and tear.
- 31.3 The purchaser must not delay settlement because one or more of the goods is not in the condition required by general condition 31.2, but may claim compensation from the vendor after settlement.
- 31.4 The purchaser may nominate an amount not exceeding \$5,000 to be held by a stakeholder to be appointed by the parties if the property is not in the condition required by general condition 31.2 at settlement.

- 31.6 The stakeholder must pay the amounts referred to in general condition 31.5 in accordance with the determination of the dispute, including any order for payment of the costs of the resolution of the dispute.

32. BREACH

A party who breaches this contract must pay to the other party on demand:

- (a) compensation for any reasonably foreseeable loss to the other party resulting from the breach; and
- (b) any interest due under this contract as a result of the breach.

Default

33. INTEREST

Interest at a rate of 2% per annum plus the rate for the time being fixed by section 2 of the *Penalty Interest Rates Act* 1983 is payable at settlement on any money owing under the contract during the period of default, without affecting any other rights of the offended party.

34. DEFAULT NOTICE

- 34.1 A party is not entitled to exercise any rights arising from the other party's default, other than the right to receive interest and the right to sue for money owing, until the other party is given and fails to comply with a written default notice.
- 34.2 The default notice must:
 - (a) specify the particulars of the default; and
 - (b) state that it is the offended party's intention to exercise the rights arising from the default unless, within 14 days of the notice being given -
 - (i) the default is remedied; and
 - (ii) the reasonable costs incurred as a result of the default and any interest payable are paid.

35. DEFAULT NOT REMEDIED

- 35.1 All unpaid money under the contract becomes immediately payable to the vendor if the default has been made by the purchaser and is not remedied and the costs and interest are not paid.
- 35.2 The contract immediately ends if:
 - (a) the default notice also states that unless the default is remedied and the reasonable costs and interest are paid, the contract will be ended in accordance with this general condition; and
 - (b) the default is not remedied and the reasonable costs and interest are not paid by the end of the period of the default notice.
- 35.3 If the contract ends by a default notice given by the purchaser:
 - the purchaser must be repaid any money paid under the contract and be paid any interest and reasonable costs payable under the contract; and
 - (b) all those amounts are a charge on the land until payment; and
 - (c) the purchaser may also recover any loss otherwise recoverable.
- 35.4 If the contract ends by a default notice given by the vendor:
 - (a) the deposit up to 10% of the price is forfeited to the vendor as the vendor's absolute property, whether the deposit has been paid or not; and
 - (b) the vendor is entitled to possession of the property; and

- (c) in addition to any other remedy, the vendor may within one year of the contract ending either:
 - retain the property and sue for damages for breach of contract; or (i)
 - resell the property in any manner and recover any deficiency in the price on the resale and any resulting (ii) expenses by way of liquidated damages; and
- the vendor may retain any part of the price paid until the vendor's damages have been determined and may apply (d) that money towards those damages; and
- (e) any determination of the vendor's damages must take into account the amount forfeited to the vendor.

Due diligence checklist

What you need to know before buying a residential property

Before you buy a home, you should be aware of a range of issues that may affect that property and impose restrictions or obligations on you, if you buy it. This checklist aims to help you identify whether any of these issues will affect you. The questions are a starting point only and you may need to seek professional advice to answer some of them. You can find links to organisations and web pages that can help you learn more, by visiting the Due diligence checklist page on the Consumer Affairs Victoria website (consumer.vic.gov.au/duediligencechecklist).

Urban living

Moving to the inner city?

High density areas are attractive for their entertainment and service areas, but these activities create increased traffic as well as noise and odours from businesses and people. Familiarising yourself with the character of the area will give you a balanced understanding of what to expect.

Is the property subject to an owners corporation?

If the property is part of a subdivision with common property such as driveways or grounds, it may be subject to an owners corporation. You may be required to pay fees and follow rules that restrict what you can do on your property, such as a ban on pet ownership.

Planning controls

Can you change how the property is used, or the buildings on it?

All land is subject to a planning scheme, run by the local council. How the property is zoned and any overlays that may apply, will determine how the land can be used. This may restrict such things as whether you can build on vacant land or how you can alter or develop the land and its buildings over time.

The local council can give you advice about the planning scheme, as well as details of any other restrictions that may apply, such as design guidelines or bushfire safety design. There may also be restrictions – known as encumbrances – on the property's title, which prevent you from developing the property. You can find out about encumbrances by looking at the section 32 statement.

The local council can advise you if there are any proposed or issued planning permits for any properties close by. Significant developments in your area may change the local 'character' (predominant style of the area) and may increase noise or traffic near the property.

Building laws are in place to ensure building safety. Professional building inspections can help you assess the property for electrical safety, possible illegal building work, adequate pool or spa fencing and the presence of asbestos, termites, or other potential hazards.

Ask the vendor if there is any owner-builder insurance or builder's warranty to cover defects in the work done to the property.

Utilities and essential services

Does the property have working connections for water, sewerage, electricity, gas, telephone and internet?

Unconnected services may not be available, or may incur a fee to connect. You may also need to choose from a range of suppliers for these services. This may be particularly important in rural areas where some services are not available.

Buyers' rights

Do you know your rights when buying a property?

The contract of sale and section 32 statement contain important information about the property, so you should request to see these and read them thoroughly. Many people engage a lawyer or conveyancer to help them understand the contracts and ensure the sale goes through correctly. A quorum was not achieved at the Annual General Meeting held on 07.09.2023, there being less than 50% of lots or lot entitlement represented. Therefore, in accordance with Section 78 of the *Owners Corporations Act 2006*, all resolutions made at the meeting are interim resolutions.

Owners wishing to object to the resolutions made at this meeting have 29 days from the date of the meeting to notify the Manager in writing of their objections, seeking a Special General Meeting to be held.

Interim resolutions will become resolutions of the owners corporation 29 days from the date of the meeting if there are only 25% or less of objections, based on lot entitlements, to the decisions made, seeking a Special General Meeting to be called.

Section 78 Owners Corporations Act 2006.

78. Can a general meeting proceed even without a quorum?

- (1) Subject to sub-section (4), if there is not a quorum, the general meeting may proceed but all resolutions are interim resolutions.
 - (1A) Subject to subsections (1B) and (1C), the manager of an owners corporation may pass an interim resolution at a general meeting of the owners corporation if no lot owner is present (whether in person or by proxy) at the meeting.
 - (1B) The manager must not pass an interim resolution under subsection (1) that
 - (a) affects the contract of appointment of the manager; or
 - (b) involves an amount that is greater than 10% of the annual budget of the owners corporation; or
 - (c) if the annual budget has not been set for the relevant year, involves an amount that is greater than 10% of the annual budget of the owners corporation for the previous year.
 - (1C) An owners corporation, by ordinary resolution, may exclude or alter the power of the manager to make an interim resolution under subsection (1A).
- (2) Notice of all interim resolutions and the minutes of the meeting at which the interim resolution is made must be forwarded to all lot owners within 14 days of the meeting.
- (3) The minutes must be accompanied by a notice setting out the effect of sub-section (4).
- (4) Interim resolutions become resolutions of the owners corporation—
 - (a) subject to paragraphs (b) and (c), 29 days from the date of the interim resolution; or
 - (b) if notice of a special general meeting is given within that 29 day period and the meeting is held within 28 days after the notice is given, only if confirmed at that meeting; or
 - (c) if notice of a special general meeting is given within that 29 day period and the meeting is not held within 28 days after the notice is given, at the end of that 28 day period.

Note: The effect of sub-section (4) is that an interim resolution cannot be acted on for 29 days after it is made but if notice of a special general meeting is given within that 29 day period, the interim resolution cannot be acted on until the resolution is confirmed at that meeting (which must be held within 28 days after the notice is given) or if the meeting is not held, until the end of that 28 day period.

- 17.2. **IT WAS RESOLVED** to consider action to be taken in respect of any arrears owing by members to the owners corporation and, if appropriate, to provide the manager with a standing authority to take action in the Victorian Civil and Administrative Tribunal for the recovery of overdue fees and charges.

18. Dispute Resolution

Strata Manager advised that under Part 10 of the Owners Corporation Act 2006, there have been three disputes lodged.

- **19. General Business -** the following items were raised:
 - a) Hard rubbish collection service from Boroondara Council is not available to owners/residents, as the building has a private waste contractor. Owners/residents need to arrange their own disposal of hard rubbish. Alternatively, owners can request the building caretaker to provide this service, with the cost to be met by the relevant lot owner.
 - b) **Visitors' carpark** Members discussed the inability of visitors to apartments to obtain parking space in the visitor's car park and resolved that additional signage clarifying parking rules be installed. Manager to obtain a quote to resolve visitor parking issue from KCL Lawyers.
 - c) Damage to/interference with operation of the car stacker the Committee Chair advised the meeting of a case where a faulty remote had resulted in a car stacker door not closing and where, in an attempt to remedy the situation, the resident had pulled the emergency release cord, disconnecting the gate and so making the bank of stackers inoperable. The OC Committee had previously determined that the callout costs should be recovered from the unit owner but had agreed to put the facts of the case to the owners in the AGM. The meeting considered the facts of the case and, noting that it was not appropriate for other owners to bear the costs, determined that the decision to pass the callout costs to the unit owner should stand.

The meeting confirmed the policy that whenever someone causes damage to the car stacker or interferes with its operation due to their actions, and the responsible renter or owner can be identified, the expense for fixing the issue will be on-charged to the relevant apartment owner as a special levy.

- d) Refrigeration Unit manager to reissue a Final Notice to Rectify Breach to Lot G10, regarding a noisy refrigeration unit that was installed in November 2022 without the Owners Corporation approval.
- **20. Meeting Closure -** Manager thanked those in attendance and closed the meeting at 6.40pm.

The owners corporation requests you ensure a copy is provided to all guests, residents and/or tenants to ensure their compliance with the rules. Committee Report to AGM – 7 October 2023

As this is the first AGM for about 18 months (due to the change in financial year – see below), the report will cover 2022 and 2023 to date.

- 1. Change in financial year: Your Committee decided to change the Owners' Corporation financial year from a calendar year to the financial year, July to June. This decision was taken because more than half the units are rented and financial year data will be of greater benefit to those owners.
- 2. Building servicing arrangements: The building is quite complex compared to a private house and includes a number of systems that require regular servicing. Not all these systems were identified at handover. Your Committee believes that we now have in place appropriate servicing arrangements for these and they are included in the budget where appropriate. They include:
 - a. Garage entry door
 - b. Front entry door
 - c. Car stacker
 - d. Fire services
 - e. Rainwater recycling pumps and filters
 - f. Water sumps and pumps
 - g. Lift
 - h. Entry communications systems
 - i. Garage fan systems
 - j. Shop waste removal and grease pit cleaning (shop responsibility)
 - k. Basement ground vapour monitoring and exhaust.
- 3. Car stacker: The car stacker is currently operating effectively with only minor breakdown issues.
 - a. Most technician callouts are the result of user errors rather than machine faults. Some of these errors, such as the gate being left open, are readily addressed by other users. Where the user causing the damage can be identified, the cost of the technician callout has been on-charged to that user. In some cases, owners/tenants are using the stacker without an induction and as a consequence have caused damage. All users are reminded that an induction is required before using the stacker.
 - b. The Committee is aware that some owners have not passed on remotes and keys for the stacker to tenants, or to purchasers on sale of the unit. Keys and remotes are not a responsibility of the

Owners' Corporation. However, keys that operate from the car stacker console can be purchased by owners only from the Manager (Mayfield). The system installed by the developer for remote operation of the stacker is the intellectual property of Car Stackers International (CSI), the installers of the system. Owners (only) can purchase new remotes can be purchased from CSI for \$1,750 after seeking approval from the Owners' Corporation Manager (Mayfield). New batteries for remotes can also be installed by CSI for \$120.

- 4. Window cleaning: Quotes are being sought for cleaning of building windows (excluding balcony windows) and the building façade. This should occur in the next month or so.
- 5. Shop issues: During the year it was necessary to issue breach notices to the Chinese Grocery units for inappropriate garbage wrapping and installation of inappropriate replacement air-conditioning. These issues are on-going.
- Other breach notices: During the reporting period a number of other breach notices were issued for excessive noise, and inappropriate disposal of cigarette butts.
- 7. Building defects: In 2022, your Committee arranged a building inspection to identify building issues that remain (for a period) the responsibility of the builder (Hamilton Marino/Orange) The builder has begun remediation. Key issues addressed include roof door leaks, sealing of garage to reduce water ingress, repair of peeling paintwork on building exterior, and fire signage on the ground floor. Your Committee will continue to monitor building defects.
- 8. Maintenance plan: As instructed at the last AGM, your Committee arranged for a consultant to draw up a maintenance plan. The plan is designed to identify major items of future expenditure that may need to be funded over a period of years. Analysis of the report by your Committee has not been completed, but because of the fee increase proposed for the next year, the Committee has decided to defer for this year any proposal to set up a maintenance fund. This will be given further consideration in the coming year.
- 9. Roof space lease: Your Committee has discovered that, prior to settlement with first buyers, the developer (as the Owners' Corporation) entered into a 99 year lease with itself covering various parts of the

building. The purpose of the lease was to ensure the commercial premises could instal needed facilities. As this is no longer necessary, and it is inappropriate to have a third party control parts of the building, your Committee has begun discussions with the developer to have the lease cancelled. These discussions are on-going.

- 10. Hard rubbish collection inquiries: Apartments are not eligible for hard rubbish collection by the Council. Residents requiring hard rubbish removal will need to make their own arrangements.
- 11. Resident responsibility for building cleanliness: The Committee Chair advised that some residents have asked if all residents could be asked to take more responsibility for keeping the building in good order by not littering, and drawing attention to cleaning that might be required (see something say something).
- 12. Finance: This will be discussed under the Finance agenda. Your Committee has endeavoured to contain costs wherever possible in the face of constantly increasing charges in key items such as electricity, gas, and garbage collection and insurance. While the Owners' Corporation remains in a positive cash position, an increase in Owners' Corporation #1 fees will be necessary to meet expenditure in 2023/2024.

As Chair of your Committee, I would like to express my thanks to the original Committee members (John Short and Richard Seeley), and co-opted member Bhaskar Bannerjee, for their work over the last 18 months.

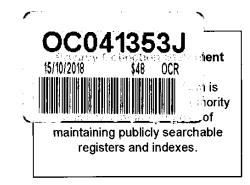

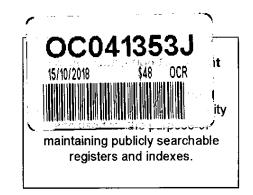

RULES

- 1. Health, safety and security
- 1.1 Health, safety and security of Owners, Occupiers and Guests
 - (a) An Owner or Occupier must not, and must take all reasonable steps to ensure that a Guest does not:
 - (1) use or permit any Lot, the Common Property or Services to be used for any purpose which is or may be illegal or harm the reputation of the Development or which does or may cause a nuisance or hazard to any other Owner or Occupier or Guest of any Owner or Occupier;
 - (2) move any article likely to cause damage or obstruction through the Common Property without first notifying the Owners Corporation or the Manager in sufficient time to enable a representative of the Owners Corporation or the Manager to be present;
 - (3) do or permit anything to be done which may invalidate, suspend or increase the premium for any insurance policy effected by the Owners Corporation without the prior written consent of the Owners Corporation;
 - (4) obstruct any fire appliance or fire appliance cupboard, stairway, landing or lift lobby or permit them to be obstructed;
 - (5) use or interfere with any fire safety equipment, except in the case of an emergency, or obstruct any fire stairs or fire escape;
 - (6) install deadlocks or peep holes that breach the fire regulations set out in Part 7 Division 2 of the Building Regulations 2006 or may void the Owners Corporation's insurance policy;
 - (7) throw objects or allow objects to fall from a lot or the Common Property; or
 - (8) exceed the floor loadings for the Lot.
 - (b) An Owner or Occupier must:
 - (1) ensure the Lot complies with the fire regulations set out in Part 7 Division 2 of the Building Regulations 2006, and
 - (2) lock the windows and external doors of the Lot when the Lot is unoccupied and keep the Owner's Storage Space secured except when storing or removing goods.

- (3) permit access to the Lot to such authorised window cleaners and maintenance staff as are appointed by the Owners Corporation to clean the windows of the building and / or clean the facade of the building or carry out maintenance, and if the Lot Owner is not available at the designated time, to provide keys if required.
- (c) The Owners Corporation may arrange and operate a security system to monitor the Common Property, and if it does so:
 - the Owners Corporation is responsible for control of the security system and may engage employees, agents or contractors to operate the system;
 - (2) the security system may, at the discretion of the Owners Corporation, include:
 - (A) the issue of security access cards, devices, codes or systems upon conditions, including payment of a deposit;
 - (B) the right (upon complaint) to remove any person from the Common Property or to refuse admission to any person it considers likely to be a nuisance or a security risk;
 - (C) the right to enter upon any part of the Development to maintain its security;
 - (D) the right of admission to any person subject to limits on the time of use and the parts of the Common Property that may be used or the manner of use and the right to revoke that right of admission at any time on reasonable grounds;
 - (E) that parts of the Common Property are secured against entry; and
 - (F) security patrols, locks and other security devices or procedures to implement or operate it; and

Common Property or in or on a lot) arising because:

- (A) the security system is not operating; or
- (B) the security system fails to operate as intended.

1.2 Infectious diseases

- (a) An Owner or Occupier must, if any infectious disease, which may require notification because of any law, affects any person in a Lot, give or cause to be given, notice of that fact and any other information which may be required about the disease, to the Owners Corporation.
- (b) The Owner must pay to the Owners Corporation the expense of disinfecting the affected lots (if that is necessary) and replacing any article or thing the destruction of which may be rendered necessary by that disease.

1.3 Storage of flammable liquids and other dangerous substances and materials

An Owner or Occupier must not and must take all reasonable steps to ensure that a Guest does not:

- (a) store flammable substances in or on a Lot or the Common Property without the written consent of the Owners Corporation;
- (b) store or accumulate in or on any Lot or the Common Property any matter or substance that is likely to cause fire, danger to life or property; or
- (c) store or accumulate in or on a Lot or the Common Property wood, metal, plastics, vehicles, appliances, bric-a-brac, vegetation, glass, bottles or any other flammable items,

but this rule does not apply to:

- (d) chemicals, liquids, gases or other material used or intended to be used for domestic purposes, or
- (e) any chemical, liquid, gas or other material in a fuel tank of a motor vehicle or internal combustion engine.

2. Management and administration

2.1 Management and administration of Common Property and Services

The Owners Corporation will manage and administer the Common Property and the Services except to the extent delegated to the Manager.

2.2 Functions of Manager

The Manager may carry out all functions delegated to him by the Owners Corporation.

2.3 Repair and maintenance of Common Property and Services

- (a) Except for the purposes of repair and maintenance where written consent of the Owners Corporation has been obtained, an Owner or Occupier must not do anything or allow anything to be done on or for the Lot or the Common Property so that:
 - any support or shelter provided by the Lot or the Common Property for any other lot or the Common Property is interfered with;
 - (2) the structural and functional integrity of any part of the Common Property or any other Lot is impaired; or
 - (3) the passage or provision of Services through the Lot or the Common Property or any other Lot is interfered with.
- (b) An Owner or Occupier must compensate the Owners Corporation for any damage to the Common Property or property owned by the Owners Corporation caused by the Owner or Occupier or a Guest.
- (c) An Owner or Occupier must:
 - (1) not instruct any employee, agent or contractor or workman engaged by the Owners Corporation unless specifically authorised so to do by it;
 - (2) direct to the Manager all requests for the Owners Corporation to consider giving directions on a particular matter to an employee, agent, contractor or workman.

2.4 Apportioning of cost of Services

- (a) The Owners Corporation must not seek payment or reimbursement for a cost or charge from an Owner or Occupier that is more than the amount that the supplier would have charged the Owner or Occupier for the same goods or services.
- (b) If a supplier has issued an account to the Owners Corporation, the Owners Corporation cannot recover from the Owner or Occupier an amount which includes any amount that is able to be claimed as a concession or rebate by or on behalf of the Owner or Occupier from the relevant supplier.
- (c) Sub-rule 2.4(b) does not apply if the concession or rebate:
 - (1) must be claimed by the Owner or Occupier and the Owners Corporation has given the Owner or Occupier an opportunity to claim it and the Owner or Occupier has not done so by the payment date set by the relevant supplier; or

(2)is paid directly to the Owner or Occupier as a refund.

2.5 Breach of the Rules or Rules of Use

A breach of the Rules of Use is a breach of these Rules and the Owner or Occupier must pay to the Owners Corporation any costs incurred by the Owners Corporation to enforce or make good a breach of the Rules or Rules of Use.

3. **Use of Common Property**

3.1 **Use of Common Property**

- An Owner or Occupier must not, and must take all reasonable steps to ensure that a Guest does not:
 - (1)obstruct the lawful use and enjoyment of the Common Property by any other person entitled to use the Common Property;
 - (2)use the Common Property or the Services or permit the Common Property or the Services to be used in a way which unreasonably interferes with or prevents their use by other Owners or Occupiers or their Guests;
 - (3) without the written approval (which may state a period for which the approval is granted) of the Owners Corporation, use any portion of the Common Property for his or her own purposes as a garden;
 - (4) do or permit to be done in or upon the Common Property or the Services anything that may make any insurance for the Development void or voidable or by which the rate or premium of any insurance may increase;
 - (5)keep any animal on the Common Property or in or on Services after the Owners Corporation has resolved that the animal is a danger or is causing a nuisance and given reasonable notice of the resolution to the Owner or Occupier to remove the animal (but this sub-rule does not apply to an animal that assists a person with an impairment or disability);
 - (6)fail to remove an animal that is the subject of a notice under sub-rule (5);
 - (7)hold or permit to be held any auction sale in a lot or on the Common Property;
 - (8)allow a bicycle to be stored anywhere (including in a lot) other than in the areas of the Common Property fitted with bicycle racks and designated by the Owners Corporation or the Manager for that purpose; or

- (9)bring or move a bicycle into a lot or the foyer, stairwells, lifts, hallways, garden areas, walkways, balconies or other parts of the Common Property. designated by the Owners Corporation or its Manager from time to time.
- (b) An Owner or Occupier must and must take all reasonable steps to ensure that Guests use the Services strictly under the Rules of

3.2 Vehicles and parking on Common Property

An Owner or Occupier must not, and must take all reasonable steps to ensure that a Guest does not:

- use or permit to be used any part of a Car (a) Space other than to park a vehicle and must not sub-let or grant any licence to any person to use a Car Space without the consent in writing of the Owners Corporation other than an Occupier;
- (b) use or permit to be used any part of a Car Space for the purposes of storage;
- use or permit to be used any part of the (c) Common Property or a Car Space or any parking space to wash, clean or repair any vehicle;
- (d) park or leave a vehicle or permit a vehicle:
 - to be parked in a parking space which is a part of a Lot other than a Car Space or in a parking space situated on Common Property which is allocated to another Lot; or
 - (2)on the Common Property so as to obstruct a driveway, pathway, entrance or exit to a Lot or part of a lot or a parking space; or
 - (3)to be parked or left in any place other than in a Car Space,

but this sub-rule does not prevent a Guest from using a Car Space situated on the Common Property and specified for the use of Guests by the Owners Corporation or the Manager;

- fail to comply with any directions of the (e) Manager or the Owners Corporation about Guest car parking; or
- (f) load and unload vehicles other than entirely within the Development at the locations and at times which cause minimum interference with other vehicles and other than strictly within any Rules of Use.

3.3 Damage to common property

An Owner or Occupier must not, and must take all reasonable steps to ensure that a Guest does not:

damage or alter the Common Property or a structure that forms part of the Common

Property without the prior written approval (which may state a period for which the approval is granted and may specify the works and conditions to which the approval is subject) of the Owners Corporation;

- (b) damage a lawn, garden, tree, shrub, plant or flower on the Common Property or
- (c) without obtaining the prior written approval of the Owners Corporation, mark, paint, drive a nail through or into, screw into or otherwise deface, penetrate or damage a structure that forms part of the Common Property.

3.4 Use of equipment, Services and amenities on Common Property

An Owner or Occupier must not and must take all reasonable steps to ensure that a Guest does not:

- use or permit the Common Property or the Services to be used for any purpose other than that for which they were designed;
- (b) without the prior written consent of the Owners Corporation, damage or remove any article from the Common Property placed there by direction or authority of the Owners Corporation or use the article for other than its intended use;
- without the prior written authority of the Owners Corporation or the Manager, interfere with the operation of any Services or equipment installed on the Common Property;
- (d) modify any air conditioning, heating or ventilation system or associated ducts servicing a Lot without the prior written consent of the Owners Corporation;
- (e) install covering to any Storage Area without the prior written consent of the Owners Corporation; or
- (f) install a covering to any Storage Area which does not comply with the fire regulations set out in Part 7 Division 2 of the Building Regulations 2006.

3.5 Drying of laundry on common property or external or visible areas of lots

An Owner or Occupier must not, and must take all reasonable steps to ensure that a Guest does not, hang any clothes or articles from or on the outside of a Lot or the Common Property or on or from any balcony, entrance or landing of a Lot or the Common Property.

3.6 Deposit of rubbish and other material on Common Property

- (a) An Owner or Occupier must not, and must take all reasonable steps to ensure that a Guest does not:
 - store or keep waste or garbage other than in the waste management bins or recycling bins located in the waste

- and refuse room of the Development as specified by the Owners Corporation; or
- (2) leave any rubbish or other materials on the Common Property.
- (b) An Owner or Occupier must and must take all reasonable steps to ensure Guests:
 - (1) keep all garbage and refuse within the Lot in tidy and secure containers and place the Owner's or Occupier's garbage or refuse for collection under the hygiene local laws or regulations of the City of Boroondara that apply from time to time;
 - (2) remove the garbage and refuse from the Lot only as under the Rules of Use and at the times designated by the Owners Corporation;
 - appropriately contain and wrap all wet garbage to prevent spillage;
 - (4) ensure that the disposal of garbage or waste does not adversely affect the health, hygiene or comfort of an Owner, Occupier, Guest or any other person lawfully using the Common Property;
 - (5) ensure any ashes, dust, cleaning refuse, scourings, broken glass, metal pieces and similar materials are appropriately wrapped; and
 - (6) dispose of rubbish properly and recycle it where appropriate.

4. Lots

4.1 Use of Lots

An Owner or Occupier must, and must take all reasonable steps to ensure that their Guests do:

- (a) comply with all laws about the Lot including, any requirements, notices or orders of any governmental authority and the terms (so far as they are applicable to an Owner or Occupier) of any agreement under section 173 of the Planning and Environment Act 1987 (Vic) affecting the Lot or the Common Properties;
- (b) use the Lot only for residential purposes as permitted under the City of Boroondara Planning Scheme;
- (c) not use a Storage Space other than for storage of goods;
- (d) not change door locks to the Lot or depart from any Owners Corporation mandated registered key system;
- (e) not misuse plumbing and electrical apparatus;
- (f) keep the Lot clean, free of vermin and in good repair;

- (g) keep all balconies clean, tidy and well maintained;
- (h) keep the Car Space free of oil, coolant, brake fluid and water and pay the cost incurred by the Owner's Corporation if the Owners Corporation exercises its right to clean the Car Space;
- clear on each and every day the contents of (i) the Lot's mail receiving box;
- promptly replace any broken or cracked (j) glass in a Lot;
- (k) not install a safe in the Lot without submitting to the Owners Corporation a structural engineering report about the proposed installation and obtaining the prior written consent of the Owners Corporation to that installation;
- (I) not dispose or permit disposal of cigarette butts, cigarette ash or any other materials on or over any balconies or terraces forming part of the Lot;
- (m) not install any external wireless, television aerial, sky dish receiver, satellite dish or receiver or any other apparatus to any part of the Lot; and
- (n) not damage, pierce, drive a nail through or into, screw into or otherwise deface, penetrate or damage any water proofing membrane that is part of any balcony or terrace which is part of the Lot.

4.2 Change of use of lots

An Owner or Occupier of a Lot must give written notification to the Owners Corporation if the Owner or Occupier changes the existing use of the Lot in a way that will affect the insurance premiums for the Owners Corporation.

4.3 Leasing of a lot

- An Owner may lease a Lot but only: (a)
 - (1)by a written lease or tenancy agreement and, if it is a tenancy agreement, if it complies with the provisions of the Residential Tenancies Act 1997 (Vic); and
 - (2)if that lease or tenancy agreement obliges the tenant to comply with the Rules and the Rules of Use; and
 - (3)if the Owners Corporation so requires, if the tenant signs an agreement confirming acceptance of the Rules and Rules of Use.
- (b) An Owner who leases the Lot must take all reasonable steps, including any action available under a lease or tenancy agreement, to ensure that any tenant of the Lot and any Guest of that tenant complies with the Rules and the Rules of Use.

(c) An Owner or Occupier of a Lot must not lease, sub-lease, license, rent, hire or otherwise deal with a lot or permit a Lot to be leased, sub-leased, licensed, rented, hired or otherwise dealt with, for any period less than thirty calendar days.

4.4 External appearance of Lots

An Owner or Occupier must not, and must take all reasonable steps to ensure that a Guest does not:

- install a screen or barrier to prevent entry of animals or insects, unless the device, screen or barrier is soundly built with transparent mesh and its frame is coloured to match the colour of the window frame or door frame in which it is situated nor allow the screen or barrier installed to be other than in good order and repair;
- allow any balcony or terrace area which (b) forms part of any Lot to be unkempt or unsightly and, when cleaning, cause other than minimal disturbance to other Owners and Occupiers;
- (c) make structural alterations to a Lot without the written consent of the Owners Corporation;
- (d) display any placard, advertisement or sign in or upon the Lot or upon the Common Property unless the Owners Corporation first consents in writing and then only under the terms and conditions specified in the consent and subject to any town planning or other requirements of the City of Boroondara (this rule includes home offices but excludes the);
- (e) display any advertising material, logo or signwriting to any external window or glazing or external solid face of a Lot without the written consent of the Owners Corporation (this rule includes home offices);
- permit any signage advertising a Lot for sale (f) or lease on a Lot or Common Property;
- install basketball hoops or similar devices on (g) a Lot or the Common Property;
- (h) install any fixtures, fittings, blinds or antennae which affect the appearance of the
- (i) allow any glazed portions of the Lot or the Common Property that surrounds the Lot to be tinted or treated; or
- paint, finish or fail to maintain the exterior of (j) the Lot in a clean state or otherwise alter the external facade of any Lot or the Common Property.

4.5 Window furnishings

An Owner or Occupier must not install blinds, curtains or other coverings on the interior of any windows or doors which directly face the outside of a Lot unless the surface of the blinds, curtains or

other coverings which faces that outside is a taupe or white colour.

4.6 Lots not properly maintained

An Owner must comply with sections 48, 49 and 50 of the Act.

5. Works

5.1 Works Requirements

An Owner must not and must ensure the Occupier does not undertake any Works within or about or for a Lot except under the following requirements:

- (a) the Works may only be undertaken after all requisite permits, approvals and consents under all relevant laws have been obtained and copies given to the Manager and then strictly under those permits, approvals and consents, and
- (b) the Works must at all times be undertaken in a reasonable manner which minimises any nuisance, annoyance, disturbance and inconvenience from the Works to other Owners or Occupiers;

5.2 Requirements before proceeding with Works

An Owner must not proceed with any Works until the Owner:

- (a) submits to the Owners Corporation plans and specifications of any Works proposed by the Owner which affect the external appearance of the Development or any of the Lots or Common Property or which affect the Development's structure or Services or the fire or acoustic ratings of any component of the Development;
- (b) supplies to the Owners Corporation any further particulars of those proposed Works the Owners Corporation requests to enable the Owners Corporation to be reasonably satisfied that those proposed Works accord with the aesthetic and orderly development of the Development and do not endanger the Development or any part of it;
- (c) receives written approval for those Works from the Owners Corporation which may be given subject to the condition that the reasonable costs of the Owners Corporation (which may include the costs of a building practitioner engaged by the Owners Corporation to consider the plans and specifications) are met by the Owner; and
- (d) pays the reasonable costs referred to in (c) to the Owners Corporation.

5.3 Directions and Supervision

An Owner must ensure that the Owner and the Owner's employees, agents and contractors undertaking Works comply with the proper and reasonable directions of the Owners Corporation and Manager about the method of building operation, means of access, use of the Common

Property, on site management and building protection and hours of work (and the main Development entrances and lobbies as determined by the Manager must not be used for the purposes of taking building materials or building workmen to and from the relevant lot unless the Owners Corporation gives written consent to do so) and that the employees, agents and contractors are supervised in carrying out the Works to minimise any damage to or dirtying of the Common Property and Services.

5.4 Contractors or tradespersons only to use designated areas

An Owner must ensure that any contractor or tradesperson may only use the basement, lift lobbies or other areas specifically designated by the Owners Corporation for entry and exit by the Manager. The expenses of such external and common area works shall be the responsibility of and be paid by the Owner of the Lot requiring the proposed external works and/or the Owners Corporation.

5.5 Owner to make good damage

An Owner must immediately make good all damage to, and dirtying of, the Development, the Common Property, the Services or any fixtures fittings and finishes caused by the Works and if the Owner fails to do so within a reasonable period of time the Owners Corporation may in its absolute discretion make good the damage and dirtying and if so the Owner must indemnify and keep indemnified the Owners Corporation against any costs or liabilities incurred by the Owners Corporation in so making good the damage or dirtying.

5.6 Times for work on or in lots

An Owner or Occupier must not and must take all reasonable steps to ensure that a Guest does not:

- (a) permit any tradesman, contractor or other person carrying out any Works to be on or in the Lot or the Common Property:
 - (1) on any public holiday or a Sunday; or
 - (2) before 7.00 am or after 6.00 pm Monday to Friday; or
 - (3) before 9.00 am or after 6.00 pm on a Saturday;

except in the case of an emergency which includes:

- (A) an interruption to gas, water, electricity, telephone, drainage, sewerage or a similar service;
- (B) a leak or similar problem requiring prompt attention; or
- (C) cracking or a similar problem likely to affect the immediate

safety of the building in which the Lot is situated.

6. Behaviour of persons

6.1 Behaviour of Owners, Occupiers and Guests on Common Property

- (a) An Owner or Occupier must not and must take all reasonable steps to ensure that a Guest does not:
 - (1) unreasonably create any noise or behave in a manner likely to interfere with the peaceful enjoyment of any person entitled to use the Common Property but this rule does not apply to the making of noise if the Owners Corporation has given written permission for the noise to be made;
 - (2) encourage birds by feeding them;
 - (3) consume alcohol on, allow consumption of alcohol on, or the taking of glassware onto, the Common Property;
 - (4) use or allow to be used in or on the Common Property, skateboards, roller skates or roller blades;
 - (5) smoke in the stairwells, lifts, foyers or vehicle parking spaces or the parts of the Common Property the Owners Corporation or the Manager designates from time to time;
 - (6) dispose of cigarette butts, ash or any other rubbish over a balcony; or
 - (7) use the Lot for any purpose that may be illegal or injurious to the reputation of the Development or which may cause a nuisance or hazard to any other Owner or Occupier or their Guests.
- (b) An Owner or Occupier must and must take all reasonable steps to ensure that a Guest must;
 - (1) when on Common Property or in or on any part of a lot visible from another lot or from Common Property be adequately clothed and not use language or behave in a manner likely to or which does cause offence or embarrassment to an Owner, Occupier, Guest or to any person lawfully using Common Property;
 - (2) observe the terms of any notice displayed in any part of the Common Property by authority of the Owners Corporation or by the Manager at his discretion of any statutory authority; and
 - (3) comply with the Rules and the Rules of Use.

6.2 Noise and other nuisance control

An Owner or Occupier must not and must take all reasonable steps to ensure that a Guest does not:

- (a) use hammer drills or jack hammers in a lot between the hours of 2.00 pm and 10.00 am on weekdays or on weekends at all; or
- (b) make or allow to be made noise from music or machinery which may be heard outside the Lot between the hours of 11.00 pm and 8.00 am.

7. Dispute resolution

7.1 Dispute resolution, including internal grievance procedures, hearing procedures and communication procedures

- (a) The grievance procedure set out in this rule applies to disputes involving an Owner, Manager, Occupier or the Owners Corporation.
- (b) The party making the complaint must prepare a written statement in the Approved Form.
- (c) If there is a grievance committee of the Owners Corporation, it must be notified of the dispute by the complainant.
- (d) If there is no grievance committee, the Owners Corporation must be notified of any dispute by the complainant, regardless of whether the Owners Corporation is an immediate party to the dispute.
- (e) The parties to the dispute must meet and discuss the matter in dispute, along with either the grievance committee or the Owners Corporation, within 14 working days after the dispute comes to the attention of all the parties.
- (f) A party to the dispute may appoint a person to act or appear on his or her behalf at the meeting.
- (g) If the dispute is not resolved, the grievance committee or Owners Corporation must notify each party of his or her right to take further action under Part 10 of the Act.
- (h) This process is separate from and does not limit any further action under Part 10 of the Act.

8. Notices

8.1 Notice of damage to Common Property

An Owner or Occupier must promptly notify the Owners Corporation or its Manager of any damage to or defect in the Common Property or any personal property of the Owners Corporation.

8.2 Notice of accidents or faults

An Owner or Occupier must promptly notify the Owners Corporation of any accident to or fault in:

- (a) the water pipes, gas pipes, electrical fixtures or installations; and
- any equipment or construction (including exit lights) required to ensure the safety of persons using the Common Property.

9. Compliance with Rules by Guests

An Owner or Occupier must take all reasonable steps to ensure that the Guests of the Owner or Occupier comply with these Rules.

10. Special Rules for the Developer

Up until the sale and settlement of the last lot owned by the developer within the development, nothing in these Rules will prevent or hinder the Developer from completing construction for improvements being the Lots and Common Property and nothing in these Rules will prevent or hinder the Developer from selling or leasing any Lot and without limitation the Developer may:

- (a) use any Lot as a display Lot to assist in the marketing sale and/or leasing of other Lots;
- (b) place anywhere on a Lot or on the Common Property signs and other materials relating to the sale or leasing of Lots;
- (c) conduct in a Lot or anywhere on the Common Property an auction sale or leasing of a Lot;
- (d) use in any way it considers necessary any part of the Common Property for the purpose of selling or leasing Lots;
- use in any way it considers necessary any part of the Common Property to facilitate completion of construction works;
- (f) erect such barriers, fences, hoardings, signs as it deems necessary to facilitate any works to be carried out in relation to the development on the Land;
- (g) take exclusive and sole possession of any part or parts of the Common Property as it may need to have exclusive possession of in order to carry out any works in relation to the development on the Land;
- (h) exclude any Occupier of a Lot and its invitees from any part of the Common Property as may be necessary in order to carry out and works in relation to the completion of the development on the Land;

- (i) grant rights to use or access through or over the Common Property to third parties on such terms and conditions as the Developer thinks fit; use whatever right of way and/or points of egress and ingress to any part of the Land as necessary to carry out and works and to block for whatever period as necessary any rights of way or points of egress and ingress to the Land in order to carry out any works;
- (j) assign all or part of the benefits of the rights granted to it hereunder to any third party or parties for a fixed term at its discretion.

11. Commercial Lots

The Owner or Occupier of a Commercial Lot must not use that Lot or any part of the Common Property for any trade or business nor permit others to do so unless;

- the planning scheme governing the use of that Lot permits the trade or business to be carried on from that Lot; and
- any requirements in respect of the trade or business stipulated by any relevant authority from time to time are complied with; and
- the trade or business can be carried on, and is carried on, without causing undue nuisance to the Proprietors or Occupiers of other Lots.

Without limiting any other rule, the Owner or Occupier of any Lot used as a restaurant, café, grocer or for other commercial purposes must (unless otherwise permitted by the Owners Corporation);

- take out its own bins on each garbage collection day and bring the bins in before 8am on each collection day;
- avoid unnecessary noise when filling bins;
- ensure lids on bins are securely closed at all times and ensure that bins are kept clean;
- d. ensure all cardboard and paper waste is cut up or folded so as to fit in bins;
- store all bins within appropriate areas of the Lot and must not store bins or leave garbage on Common Property;
- f. comply with all health, noise and other regulations in carrying on the business from the Lot and any other requirements of the Owners Corporation; and
- g. all times maintain any Common Property licensed to it in good order and otherwise in accordance with the terms and conditions of any licence or consent granted by the Owners Corporation.

12. Definitions

In these Rules unless the context otherwise requires the following definitions apply:

"Act" means the Owners Corporations Act 2006 (Vic);

"Approved Form" means the form prescribed under the Owners Corporation Regulations 2007;

"Car Space" means an Owner's Car Space being part of an Owner's lot as shown in the Plan of Subdivision;

"Common Property" means any common property as shown and described on the Plan of Subdivision as Common Property No 1 as applicable;

"Commercial Lot" means a lot for commercial or retail use.

"Development" means the development on the land in the Plan of Subdivision including the buildings located at 76 - 78 Doncaster Road, Balwyn North VIC 3104:

"Guest" means a person who is a guest, visitor, invitee, family member or friend of an Owner or Occupier of a lot;

"Lease" includes rent, let and license the Lot or any part of it;

"Lot" means the lot on the Plan of Subdivision owned or occupied by that Owner or Occupier;

"Manager" means the building manager or the manager appointed by the Owners Corporation;

"Occupier" means a person who occupies a lot on the Plan of Subdivision;

"Owner" means an owner of a lot on the Plan of Subdivision;

"Owners Corporation" means Owners Corporation No. 1 and 2 of the Plan of Subdivision as applicable;

"Plan of Subdivision" means Plan of Subdivision No 745772N;

"Regulations" means the Owners Corporations Regulations 2007 (Vic);

"Rules" means the rules in this document;

"Rules of Use" means any directions, notices or rules of use made by the Manager or the Owners Corporation from time to time for the proper management and administration of the Common Properties;

"Services" means the services, installations, facilities, plant or equipment provided to the Development;

"Storage Space" means that part of a Lot that is designed or intended for use as a storage space or unit; and

"Works" means any construction, alteration, repair, refurbishment, addition, renovation, or fitting out of a

lot, building, other structure and plant and equipment to be used to provide Services.



Schedule 2—Model rules for an owners corporation

Regulation 11

1 Health, safety and security

1.1 Health, safety and security of lot owners, occupiers of lots and others

A lot owner or occupier must not use the lot, or permit it to be used, so as to cause a hazard to the health, safety and security of an owner, occupier, or user of another lot.

1.2 Storage of flammable liquids and other dangerous substances and materials

- (1) Except with the approval in writing of the owners corporation, an owner or occupier of a lot must not use or store on the lot or on the common property any flammable chemical, liquid or gas or other flammable material.
- (2) This rule does not apply to—
 - (a) chemicals, liquids, gases or other material used or intended to be used for domestic purposes; or
 - (b) any chemical, liquid, gas or other material in a fuel tank of a motor vehicle or internal combustion engine.

1.3 Waste disposal

An owner or occupier must ensure that the disposal of garbage or waste does not adversely affect the health, hygiene or comfort of the occupiers or users of other lots.

1.4 Smoke penetration

A lot owner or occupier in a multi-level development must ensure that smoke caused by the smoking of tobacco or any other substance by Sch. 2 rule 1.4 inserted by S.R. No. 147/2021 reg. 14.

the owner or occupier, or any invitee of the owner or occupier, on the lot does not penetrate to the common property or any other lot.

1.5 Fire safety information

A lot owner must ensure that any occupier of the lot owner's lot is provided with a copy of fire safety advice and any emergency preparedness plan that exists in relation to the lot prior to the occupier commencing occupation of the lot.

2 Committees and sub-committees

2.1 Functions, powers and reporting of committees and sub-committees

A committee may appoint members to a sub-committee without reference to the owners corporation.

3 Management and administration

3.1 Metering of services and apportionment of costs of services

- (1) The owners corporation must not seek payment or reimbursement for a cost or charge from a lot owner or occupier that is more than the amount that the supplier would have charged the lot owner or occupier for the same goods or services.
- (2) If a supplier has issued an account to the owners corporation, the owners corporation cannot recover from the lot owner or occupier an amount which includes any amount that is able to be claimed as a concession or rebate by or on behalf of the lot owner or occupier from the relevant supplier.

- (3) Subrule (2) does not apply if the concession or rebate—
 - (a) must be claimed by the lot owner or occupier and the owners corporation has given the lot owner or occupier an opportunity to claim it and the lot owner or occupier has not done so by the payment date set by the relevant supplier; or
 - (b) is paid directly to the lot owner or occupier as a refund.

4 Use of common property

4.1 Use of common property

- (1) An owner or occupier of a lot must not obstruct the lawful use and enjoyment of the common property by any other person entitled to use the common property.
- (2) An owner or occupier of a lot must not, without the written approval of the owners corporation, use for the owner or occupier's own purposes as a garden any portion of the common property.
- (3) An approval under subrule (2) may state a period for which the approval is granted.
- (4) If the owners corporation has resolved that an animal is a danger or is causing a nuisance to the common property, it must give reasonable notice of this resolution to the owner or occupier who is keeping the animal.
- (5) An owner or occupier of a lot who is keeping an animal that is the subject of a notice under subrule (4) must remove that animal.
- (6) Subrules (4) and (5) do not apply to an animal that assists a person with an impairment or disability.

(7) The owners corporation may impose reasonable conditions on a lot owner's right or an occupier's right to access or use common property to protect the quiet enjoyment, safety and security of other lot owners, including but not limited to imposing operating hours on facilities such as gymnasiums and swimming pools.

4.2 Vehicles and parking on common property

An owner or occupier of a lot must not, unless in the case of an emergency, park or leave a motor vehicle or other vehicle or permit a motor vehicle or other vehicle—

- (a) to be parked or left in parking spaces situated on common property and allocated for other lots; or
- (b) on the common property so as to obstruct a driveway, pathway, entrance or exit to a lot; or
- (c) in any place other than a parking area situated on common property specified for that purpose by the owners corporation.

4.3 Damage to common property

- (1) An owner or occupier of a lot must not damage or alter the common property without the written approval of the owners corporation.
- (2) An owner or occupier of a lot must not damage or alter a structure that forms part of the common property without the written approval of the owners corporation.
- (3) An approval under subrule (1) or (2) may state a period for which the approval is granted, and may specify the works and conditions to which the approval is subject.

(4) An owner or person authorised by an owner may install a locking or safety device to protect the lot against intruders, or a screen or barrier to prevent entry of animals or insects, if the device, screen or barrier is soundly built and is consistent with the

(5) The owner or person referred to in subrule (4) must keep any device, screen or barrier installed in good order and repair.

colour, style and materials of the building.

5 Lots

5.1 Change of use of lots

An owner or occupier of a lot must give written notification to the owners corporation if the owner or occupier changes the existing use of the lot in a way that will affect the insurance premiums for the owners corporation.

Example

If the change of use results in a hazardous activity being carried out on the lot, or results in the lot being used for commercial or industrial purposes rather than residential purposes.

5.2 External appearance of lots

- (1) An owner or occupier of a lot must obtain the written approval of the owners corporation before making any changes to the external appearance of their lot.
- (2) An owners corporation cannot unreasonably withhold approval, but may give approval subject to reasonable conditions to protect quiet enjoyment of other lot owners, structural integrity or the value of other lots and/or common property.
- (3) The owners corporation cannot unreasonably prohibit the installation of sustainability items on the exterior of the lot, including by prohibiting the installation of a sustainability item only on aesthetic grounds.

- (4) The owners corporation may require that the location of a sustainability item, or the works involved in installing a sustainability item, must not unreasonably disrupt the quiet enjoyment of other lot owners or occupiers or impede reasonable access to, or the use of, any other lot or the common property.
- (5) The owners corporation may impose reasonable conditions on the installation of a sustainability item on the exterior of the lot related to the colour, mounting and location of the sustainability item provided that these conditions do not increase the cost of installing the sustainability item or reduce its impact as a sustainability item.

5.3 Requiring notice to the owners corporation of renovations to lots

An owner or occupier of a lot must notify the owners corporation when undertaking any renovations or other works that may affect the common property and/or other lot owners' or occupiers' enjoyment of the common property.

6 Behaviour of persons

6.1 Behaviour of owners, occupiers and invitees on common property

An owner or occupier of a lot must take all reasonable steps to ensure that guests of the owner or occupier do not behave in a manner likely to unreasonably interfere with the peaceful enjoyment of any other person entitled to use the common property.

6.2 Noise and other nuisance control

(1) An owner or occupier of a lot, or a guest of an owner or occupier, must not unreasonably create any noise likely to interfere with the peaceful enjoyment of any other person entitled to use the common property.

(2) Subrule (1) does not apply to the making of a noise if the owners corporation has given written permission for the noise to be made.

7 Dispute resolution

- (1) The grievance procedure set out in this rule applies to disputes involving a lot owner, manager, or an occupier or the owners corporation.
- (2) The party making the complaint must prepare a written statement in the approved form.
- (3) If there is a grievance committee of the owners corporation, it must be notified of the dispute by the complainant.
- (4) If there is no grievance committee, the owners corporation must be notified of any dispute by the complainant, regardless of whether the owners corporation is an immediate party to the dispute.
- (5) The parties to the dispute must meet and discuss the matter in dispute, along with either the grievance committee or the owners corporation, within 28 calendar days after the dispute comes to the attention of all the parties.

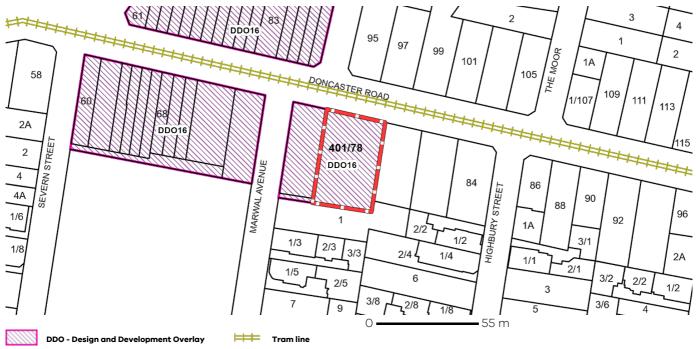
