RE: Structural & Foundation Building Inspection @164 Queenspark Dr. CHCH

A Structural & Foundation Building Inspection of the above property was carried out on the 12th February, 2020 The purpose of the inspection was to check the structural integrity of the Building and identify any areas that had been structurally damaged particularly as a result of the recent Earthquakes since 4th September, 2010 as well as subsequent aftershocks.

Building Description

The Building is single storey approximately 35 years old. It has "brick veneer" cladding plus some areas of weatherboard over timber framing walls. It also has a concrete floor with concrete perimeter foundation and Lightweight Coloursteel Roof.

The building recently has been used as a Medical Centre but is now to be converted to a residential house.

The Building is in the TC3, Blue Zone, with no apparent liquefaction within the property.

Inspection Details

The inspection included a walk around inside and outside of the house identifying any visible damage that has occurred particularly cracks and settlement which may draw structural attention.

House Exterior

• There was some minor cracks to the mortar of the exterior bricks that requires attention.

House Interior

• The interior of the building was in good condition and any minor gib lining cracks have been repaired

Ceiling

• The ceiling of the building was in good condition

Foundation Floor Slab

- Zip levels were plotted for all the building and most rooms were outside the MBIE guidelines. Refer Dwgs
- **124mm** of floor level variation has occurred throughout the concrete floor of the house that is outside the MBIE guidelines of 50mm.

Perimeter Foundation

• The concrete perimeter foundation was in good condition, that had No Structural Concerns.

Roof

- The trusses and purlins were in good condition with No Structural Concerns.
- The outside visual appearance of the roof was in good condition.

Geotech Report

Our Geotech report was carried out on 12 Dec. 2019

- The Ultimate Bearing Capacity is approximately 200kPa from 300mm to 1200mm Below Ground Level,
- The soils consist of a mostly sand from 300mm. to 1300mm depth (depth tested)

Conclusion

The house is Structurally Sound. I therefore can recommend this property as suitable for Insurance and/or Bank Loans as required.

Note the following repairs are recommended to restore the house & garage back to good condition within 6 months of the issue date of this report:

- (1) Contractor to repoint, remortar exterior bricks where required. Refer Photos 2
- (2) Contractor to rake, plaster and repaint interior of house wall linings if necessary if some minor cracking occurs during the relevelling process.

Building Concrete Floor Relevelling

- (1) It is recommended that 24 external lifting pads down to approx. 700 mm depth to be Installed around the settled section of the perimeter beam to lift the Building foundation to near level & Ensure no further settlement occurs.
- (2) The contractor is to install concrete infill between external lifting pads 1 to 24
- (3) Contractor to use Diameter 100mm Grout holes & 600mm x 600mm windows for internal relevelling & Lifting, Refer Dwgs.

Attached is a Producer Statement Design for the proposed work.

When work is in progress I will need to carry out the following to ensure the quality of the remedial work

- Inspect the contractors Work:
 - Prior to Pouring of Lifting Pads
 - Completion of re-levelling of concrete floor & building Foundations
- Issue a "Producer Statement Construction Review on satisfactory completion of the work....This will be useful to have, if in future the owner decides to sell the building

1 PRELIMINARIES & GENERAL

1.1 Project Overview

1.1.1 Contract Documents

The Contract Documents are complementary and comprise this Specification, the accompanying drawings, the Contract together with Schedules as specified below, any written documentation clarifications issued during tendering/estimating, any manufacturer/supplier information issued with this Specification, any list of agreed Subcontractors, the contract establishment letter and any other relevant correspondence, and any Site Instructions or additional details or instructions issued as Variations.

If the Architect/Designer has not been engaged to administer the Contract or observe the works, then the term Architect/Designer, where referred to in this specification, means Contract Administrator.

These Project Specific Conditions supersede the Standard Conditions where they are in conflict. Refer any ambiguity or apparent discrepancy within or between any Contract Documents to the Architect/Designer, whose interpretation shall be binding on all parties.

Ensure that all Trades are aware of all Conditions and that subcontract prices are accepted on this basis, and in a form acceptable to the Registered Master Builders Federation or the Certified Builders Association. Ensure that all persons engaged on the works are aware of all items in this specification and on the drawings that may in any way affect their section of the works.

1.1.2 Site

Relevant site conditions are believed to be correctly represented in the Contract Documents, however the Contractor (and Subcontractors where appropriate) are requested to inspect the site to ascertain for themselves the nature and extent of the works and the rights and interests that may be interfered with in the execution of the works, as no claims for additional payment will be recognised on the grounds of insufficient description.

1.1.3 Adjacent Owners

Carry out whatever actions or precautions are required to avoid or to absolutely minimise noise, dirt, dust, access, etc. inconvenience or disruption of any nature to the adjacent owners or tenants. Indemnify the Principal against any claims arising from this source.

1.1.4 Protection

Take all appropriate precautions to protect all third party property, services, etc., and indemnify the Principal against any claims arising from the construction operations. Any damage to third party property caused by construction activities or failure to protect shall be rectified as soon as possible by the person causing the damage, or by appropriately qualified trades-persons employed by the person responsible for the damage if necessary.

Suspend operations during weather which would affect the quality of work in progress. Secure the works as soon as possible against adverse weather, dust and vandals. Avoid structural damage that is

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caused by overloading.

Adequately protect all finished work and maintain until the date of Practical Completion. Each trade shall protect the work of all other trades, and each trade is responsible for making good any damage they cause to finished works. Arrange special protection as required for windows and doors, finished timber work, plumbing fittings and hardware, cabinets and other joinery, and similar items.

1.1.5 Responsibility

The Contractor will be held responsible for the full period of his legal responsibility in connection with this Contract for ensuring that all work execution, materials, and fittings, are completely in accordance with Contract requirements.

The Contractor is responsible to the Principal for the appropriateness and fitness, in relation to a reasonable expectation or requirement, of all of the materials and workmanship incorporated into the works by himself or his subcontractors; for this reason few specific guarantees are required in these contract documents. The terms and conditions of any warranty or guarantee required or provided shall not in any way negate the minimum remedies available under common law as if no warranty or guarantee had been furnished.

No apparent expression of the Architect's/Designer's reasonable satisfaction shall be deemed to be acceptance of defective materials or workmanship within the terms of the Contract or to be an authority for any Variation except where such Variation is authorised as provided for in the Contract. Instructions that are given verbally are deemed to be instructions for proper execution of the works and do not involve extra charges.

Workmanship in all trades is required to be equal to or better than recognised good trade practice. The Contractor shall provide all necessary setting out information and component dimensions for subcontractors and shall check and be responsible for the accuracy of their work.

Should any tradesperson consider that the surface finish or general conditions of previous work are unsatisfactory to ensure a proper finish for their own work thereon, that tradesperson shall give immediate notice to the Contractor or Architect/Designer as appropriate and shall not proceed until all necessary improvements have been made. Failing such notice the trade concerned will not be relieved of responsibility for a poor finish due to such unsatisfactory condition.

Specialist Finishes Subcontractors are responsible for ensuring that substrates are completely appropriate for them to achieve first class results, and to this end shall, in sufficient time, instruct the Contractor with regard any fixings, primings, sealings or whatever for the substrate that vary in any way from the substrate manufacturer's standard recommendations. The Contractor shall advise the Architect/Designer with regard these variances, and not proceed until the Architect/Designer has agreed to them.

The Contractor and all Subcontractors affected shall be jointly and severally responsible for completion of the whole of the works in a completely watertight condition and shall therefore examine all details to be satisfied that this condition can be achieved. If any detail is considered unsatisfactory the Architect/Designer shall be notified immediately and he/she will then either interpret the detail to the Contractor's satisfaction, or accept responsibility for watertightness at the points in question, always assuming reasonable workmanship.

Ensure that all materials or items incorporated into any particular construction or finish are compatible and that their individual use is approved by the manufacturers and/or suppliers of the other parts of the system.

For all electronic/electrical/mechanical operating systems all work and all necessary materials and items incidental to the primary item specified, that are incorporated into the works, shall be such as to leave a neat, efficient, easily maintained and robust installation, completely in accordance with all of the recommendations of the primary items' manufacturers. Where appropriate, source all parts of a system from a single supplier or manufacturer.

The Contractor shall make provision for all temporary works and services required for the satisfactory completion of the contract works. The Contractor shall pay all associated costs and fees; carry out all necessary maintenance, alterations and servicing requirements; and remove temporary works and services on completion of the contract works. Temporary works and services shall comply with the requirements New Zealand Building Code.

1.1.6 Specification

This Specification covers contract administration, standards, materials quality, workmanship and the scope of works only: the exact nature of the works and all specialist items, descriptions, etc., are contained on the drawings, which also take full precedence.

All clauses in all specification sections apply to their full extent and meaning to the entire Contract. Trade sections and paragraphs have been introduced into this specification for reference only and it shall not be construed that each trade section is a complete segregation of the materials and labour of that trade. The onus is on all trades to be conversant with any and all clauses which in any way affect their work.

(Be aware that the 'scope' noted in the 'Project Overview', and scope and general extent clauses within this specification, are included to provide a general indication only and must NOT be interpreted as schedules of quantities - the exact nature and extent of all aspects of the works are shown on the drawings).

1.1.7 Standards

New Zealand Standards (NZS), Australian Standards (AS), Joint Standards (AS/NZS), Acts of Parliament, Regulations made thereunder, Codes of Practice, and any specific Manufacturer's Instructions or Manufacturer's Recommendations that are referred to in these Contract Documents shall all be deemed to be the latest published edition thereof at the time of drawings issue, and shall be followed by the Contractor and all Subcontractors to the full extent applicable consistent with the intent of this Contract. Documents cited within other cited publications are deemed to form part of this specification.

Where Standards have a number of Divisions, e.g. AS/NZS 3500.1, AS/NZS 3500.2, etc., each of the Divisions relevant to this project is deemed to form part of this specification.

Retain current copies of significant cited documents and manufacturer's technical literature on the site.

1.1.8 Authorities and Charges

Comply with all relevant provisions of the NZ Building Code, and with all relevant territorial or statutory authority regulations, by-laws, obligations, etc. Give all required notices.

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The Principal has obtained a Land Use Consent. The Principal has applied for and paid for the Project Information Memoranda, the Building Consent and other approvals required for the works to start. The PIM and Building Consent will be forwarded to the Contractor as quickly as possible after they are issued by the Territorial Authority. Note: It is an offence under the Building Act to carry out work not in accordance with a Building Consent.

Should the Building Consent be subject to any conditions which modify the requirements of the Contract Documents in any way, the Architect/Designer reserves the right to negotiate any or all of these modifying conditions with the Building Consent Authority. If after these negotiations additional work is required, it will be handled as a Variation to the Contract.

1.1.9 Code Compliance Certificate

The Principal will apply for the Code Compliance Certificate (CCC) and any other licenses or approvals for the building to be used. However, Practical Completion will NOT be certified until the CCC inspection has occurred and any additional works required by the local Building Consent Authority have been completed. To this end it is recommended that the Contractor obtains all required certificates, guarantees, Producer Statements, as-built drawings, etc., required for the CCC application as work proceeds, to facilitate application for the CCC as soon as the works are completed. For his part, the Principal hereby undertakes to apply for the CCC within one day of all required material being in hand. Likewise, the Contractor should have capacity available to attend as quickly as possible to any items identified by the Building Consent Authority as being required prior to the issue of the CCC.

1.1.10 Coordination of the Works

Coordinate the works of all trades to ensure efficient progress of the works. Ensure that all holes, sleeves, penetrations, supports, etc., that are required for services are correctly incorporated as work proceeds. Identify and sufficiently forward-notify the appropriate persons of all deadlines for the supply of fittings, components, information, etc.

1.1.11 Documents Interpretation

Except where they are clearly to the contrary, all dimensions are deemed to be to the bare surface of concrete, masonry, timber framing or other basic construction material. All figured dimensions take precedence over scaled sizes. Where any detail is included in more than one drawing the larger scale detail takes precedence. Where any ambiguity exists refer to the Architect/Designer for interpretation.

The word 'provide' and the word 'fix' used separately in the Documents shall be taken to mean 'provide and fix' unless otherwise stated.

When the term 'allow' occurs in the Documents, except with reference to Monetary Allowances, the cost of the item shall be at the risk of the Contractor.

The terms 'approved', 'directed', and 'selected' when used in the Documents refers to the approval, direction or selection of or by the Architect/Designer. Please give adequate notice of when these decisions are required. 'Architect/Designer' shall mean the Architect or Designer, their representative or any Consulting Engineer engaged by the Architect/Designer.

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1.1.12 Work Shown and Mentioned

The Contract Documents show the extent and nature of the works but there is no warranty expressed or implied that they show each and every minor detail or item required to be included by the Contractor. Should any material, structural member, fixing, or item or work appear to be inadequately described, yet obviously necessary for the neat, strong and satisfactory completion of the work, it shall be incorporated into the Contract Works.

1.1.13 Site Safety

Comply with the Health and Safety at Work Act 2015 (HSWA), and with all relevant Health and Safety at Work Regulations 2016, and with all relevant WorkSafe New Zealand (WorkSafe) Approved Codes of Practice and WorkSafe Information and Guidance, particularly those for construction and building maintenance. Comply with the relevant provisions of the New Zealand Building Code, in particular Clause F5.

So far as is reasonably practicable and according to a PCBU's (person conducting a business or undertaking) primary duty of care, take all necessary steps required to make the site and the contract works safe, and to provide and maintain a safe working environment. Ensure that all those working on or visiting the site are aware of the site safety rules and are not unnecessarily exposed to hazards.

Each PCBU, so far as is reasonably practicable, must ensure the health and safety of workers, and that other people are not put at risk by its work. If more than one PCBU has a duty in relation to the same matter, each PCBU with the duty must, so far as is reasonably practicable, consult, co-operate with, and co-ordinate activities with all other PCBUs who have a duty in relation to the same matter. PCBUs can enter reasonable agreements with other PCBUs to meet their duties, but cannot contract out of their duties.

Notify WorkSafe as soon as possible when a notifiable event occurs. Take all reasonable steps to preserve the site of the notifiable event in accordance with WorkSafe requirements. Ensure that the site of the event is not disturbed until authorised otherwise by WorkSafe. Keep records of all notifiable events.

Scaffolding shall comply with all Statutory and Local Authority Regulations, with the WorkSafe 'Best Practice Guidelines for Scaffolding', AS/NZS 1576 (Scaffolding equipment), AS/NZS 4576 (Guidelines for Scaffolding), and AS/NZS 4994 (Roof edge scaffolding), and shall be maintained for the duration and removed on completion.

The use of ballistic fixings must absolutely comply with all relevant safety recommendations at all times. No rubbish fires are allowed on site. Portable/personal disc/tape players, radios and iPods must not be used anywhere on the site. No smoking on site, except in the designated location in accordance with the Smoke Free Environments Act 1990, the location of which will be determined by the Contractor, with the approval of the Principal.

A PCBU's primary duty of care includes, but is not limited to, so far as is reasonably practicable:

- providing and maintaining a work environment that is without risks to health and safety;
- providing and maintaining safe plant and structures;
- providing and maintaining safe systems of work;

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- ensuring the safe use, handling and storage of plant, structures and substances;
- providing adequate facilities for the welfare at work of workers in carrying out work for the business or undertaking, including ensuring access to those facilities;
- providing any information, training, instruction, or supervision that is necessary to protect all persons from risks to their health and safety arising from work carried out as part of the conduct of the business or undertaking;
- monitoring the health of workers and the conditions at the workplace for the purpose of preventing injury or illness of workers arising from the conduct of the business or undertaking.

Before commencing work on the site, the Contractor shall prepare and submit to the contract administrator a health and safety plan. The health and safety plan shall include, but not be limited to:

- the health and safety of all people on the site and on other properties, and the general public;
- identification of existing and potential construction hazards and risks;
- safety procedures to eliminate, isolate or minimise construction hazards;
- the equipment to be used to minimise the hazards;
- the maintenance of a register of hazards for the site;
- the name and qualifications of the site safety person;
- emergency procedures;
- first aid facilities and safety equipment;
- the methodology for notifying, recording and investigating accidents and injuries.

Carry out all construction operations in accordance with the submitted health and safety plan.

1.1.14 Variations

The Architect/Designer or Owner will issue Site Instructions (SI) to amend or clarify the works. Upon receipt of a SI the Contractor shall immediately notify the Architect/Designer if he believes there are price or timing adjustment implications. The Architect/Designer will then issue a Variation Price Request (VPR) for pricing of the possible Variation by the Contractor, within the time stipulated, or within 10 days if no time is stipulated. If the Contractor does not return the VPR within the time stipulated the Architect/Designer will assess it at reasonable rates. Once agreement is reached on price and/or timing a Variation Order (VO) for the item will be issued. Note that works covered by a SI or a VPR must NOT be actioned until the VO is issued.

When a Variation is contemplated and timing does not allow SI and VPR action the Contractor is to advise, and record in the site diary, an estimate of price and timing implications. If accepted by the Architect/Designer, a VO will be issued immediately. The Contractor shall then co-operate with the Architect/Designer to establish agreed pricing.

Claims for Variations neither priced nor estimated prior to being put in hand (but considered valid) will be incorporated into Progress Payment Certificates or the Draft Final Accounts as claimed and accepted but with a proviso allowing 5 (five) days for written objections by either the Principal or the Contractor, to any aspect of them, for further consideration.

The Main Contractor's Variations Margin agreed pre-contract will be the maximum accepted for any trade unless higher rates are nominated pre-contract and are accepted. The Main Contractor's agreed Variations Margin shown shall be deemed to include all preliminary and general costs, overheads, variation processing costs, and profit. If no margin is given, a 5% overall margin will be

applied.

Note that 'loss of anticipated profit' claims consequent upon reduction of works extent will NOT be recognised, and that the cost of processing Variations is deemed to be included in the P & G Allowance.

Also note that for Variations pricing all materials shall be charged at the actual net invoiced cost plus margin; i.e. recognised 'Trade Price', volume discounted where appropriate.

1.1.15 Progress Claims

Progress Claims shall be in writing, shall be in accordance with the requirements of the Construction Contracts Act 2002, and shall include all of the following:

- The overall amount claimed.
- The percentage completion and amount claimed for each Subcontractor. For accurate claim verification please ensure that this breakdown exactly matches the trades costs breakdown agreed-to pre-contract.
- The total Contract Sum Adjustment for any/all Variations authorised prior to the claim.
- Items covered by Monetary Allowances listed separately.
- And, if specifically requested, confirmation that amounts previously claimed on behalf of Subcontractors, certified by theOwner, and paid by the Principal, have actually been paid to the Subcontractor (apart from normal retentions).

Note that retentions will be held exactly in accordance with the Conditions of Contract.

1.1.16 Cleaning and Completion

Clear construction debris and rubbish from the works at regular intervals, and additionally if so instructed by the Owner. Clean each space thoroughly before commencing any finishing works.

In preparation for the Practical Completion inspection carry out the following:

- Clean the works thoroughly, removing all debris, surplus materials, splashes, marks, temporary markings, etc. (All cleaning methods and materials shall be as recommended by the manufacturer of the item being cleaned).
- Remove protective wrappings and coverings unless otherwise directed.
- Touch up minor painting faults, carefully matching colour, and brushing out edges. Repaint any badly marked surfaces back to suitable break-lines.
- Adjust, ease and/or lubricate as required all doors, drawers, controls and other moving parts to ensure their efficient operation.
- Any other works required to leave all spaces ready for immediate occupation and all electronic/electrical/mechanical systems fully operational.
- Clean out all spoutings, gutters, downpipes, and gullies and flush out all drains.
- Clean all sanitary appliances and check all aspects of the water services.
- Thoroughly re-inspect all aspects of the works (and have any defects fully rectified) to be certain that the works are completely ready for the Practical Completion inspection if an unreasonable number of items are noted by the Architect/Designer during the inspection it will be terminated and then rescheduled for at least a week forward to allow proper completion to be achieved. (Note that a Code Compliance Certificate must be obtained before Practical Completion will be certified. Obtain all required certificates, guarantees, as-built drawings, etc., as work proceeds to enable the CCC application to be submitted as soon as construction is completed).

2 CONCRETE

2.1 Preliminary

Refer to General Conditions of Contract and the Special Conditions in this Specification as appropriate. Read this section in conjunction with all other trade sections.

2.2 Compliance

Comply with the New Zealand Building Code 1992 including all revisions and amendments, Verification Methods where appropriate, and construction principles that are embodied in the Acceptable Solutions.

2.3 Workmanship

2.3.1 Qualifications

Where required by the NZ Building Act 2004 it is the building contractor's responsibility to ensure that all restricted building work is carried out by a Licensed Building Practitioner.

All work shall be carried out to the latest and best trade practise standards by experienced and competent tradesmen, familiar with the materials specified and installation techniques.

2.3.2 Formwork

Provide all necessary formwork to produce finished concrete to the required dimensions, surface finishes and structural tolerances (NZS 3109 table 4, note that slab surfaces shall not vary by more than 3mm from a 3m straightedge placed anywhere on the surface, and that this maximum variation shall extend over a minimum distance of 1m).

Design and construct formwork to withstand total weights and all construction loads. Formwork constructed tightly to prevent undue slurry leaks, with no wire formwork ties, and no part of the formwork ties left within required concrete cover. 20 x 20mm fillet corners. Any release agents used shall be non staining and shall be compatible with all subsequently applied finishes.

Position construction/crack control joints (except where shown otherwise) under walls or elsewhere as approved, in accordance with the following maximum criteria:

- Slabs on ground area 50 sq.m, length 7.5m.
- Suspended slabs area 150 sq.m, length 15m.
- Walls length 10m, lift 4m.

Retarders only to provide a scabbled surface at construction joints.

Formwork suitable for required F2 finish to exposed locations for subsequent plastering.

Coordinate with all trades to build in all necessary starters, fixings, anchorages, chases, sleeves, bolts, conduits, electrical / plumbing devices etc., and check their exact positioning before pouring.

Coordinate with all trades to form all necessary holes, openings etc. with their positions and sizes exactly as required.

Strike formwork without shock or vibration, and without disturbing, damaging or overloading the structure. Fill all bolt holes as soon as practicable.

2.3.3 Concreting & Curing

All concrete shall be power mixed in a plant approved by the Ready Mixed Concrete Association for required grade. All structural concrete shall have a compressive strength of 25MPa at 28 days. 19mm max aggregate, 80mm slump, and with a maximum water cement ratio of 0.55.

Where considered desirable the manufacturer may add an air entrainment agent complying with NZS 3109 and 3119. No other additives may be used without specific approval of the engineer. Mixes shall be capable of being readily placed and compacted and finished as specified. The manufacturer shall

carry out quality control testing to NZS 3104. All other concrete 20 MPa Ordinary Grade with maximum water cement ratio 0.7.

Note that appropriate cold weather pouring and curing techniques MUST be adopted if construction timing/temperatures so dictate.

Advise for inspection 24 hours before placing any concrete. Sequence and size of concrete pours to approval. No concrete pouring in wet weather. Clean out all formwork thoroughly before pouring. Handling, placing and vibration/compaction of concrete shall all be exactly to NZS 3109 requirements, and carried out by skilled operatives. Slabs power float finished to NZS 3114 U2 surface by kelly float, with steel troweling to a similar finish in corners etc., and to a U3 finish localized to resilient flooring areas.

Cure all concrete for 14 days. Do not use sprayed membranes. As soon as practicable pond all horizontal surfaces, or fully cover with polythene or hessian (kept wet). Periodically hose down all formwork. Stripped vertical surfaces shall be kept wet with perforated hoses or similar.

Form shrinkage control joints in concrete floor slabs-on-ground by saw cutting, without chipping, spalling and tearing the surface, to the locations and layout shown on the drawings. Saw cuts shall extend to a quarter of the depth of the slab. Saw cutting shall take place no later than 24 hours after initial set for average ambient temperatures above 20°C, and 48 hours for average ambient temperatures below 20°C.

2.3.4 Surface Finishes

General floor slabs - U3 finish.

Foundation sides exposed to view - F5.

2.3.5 Documentation

Concrete delivery dockets shall state job, date and time of mixer loading, grade, strength, and slump. Dockets shall be kept and forwarded to the Architect/Designer. Water must NOT be added after the concrete leaves the plant.

2.4 Concrete

2.4.1 Scope

This section sets out the requirements for the supply, forming, casting and finishing of all concrete and concrete elements, including precast concrete elements if required, and the building in of all castin items, required for the satisfactory completion of the works. All aspects of this work shall be carried out to comply with the requirements of the New Zealand Building Code and relevant Standards, and in accordance with the project design documentation, and with any relevant product manufacturers' recommendations.

The supply and fixing of reinforcing for concrete is covered in separate specification Reinforcing Steel. The supply and placing of blockwork grout is covered in separate specification section Blockwork.

The following is a list and/or general description of the extent of Insitu Concrete works, which are more specifically defined in the contract documents, required for the completion of the contract works:

2.4.2 Requirements

2.4.2.1 Safety

Comply with the Health and Safety at Work Act 2015 (HSWA), and with all relevant Health and Safety at Work Regulations 2016, and with all relevant WorkSafe New Zealand (WorkSafe) Approved Codes of Practice and WorkSafe Information and Guidance, in particular the 'OSH Guidelines For the Provision of Facilities and General Safety in the Construction Industry'.

Precast concrete shall be handled in accordance with the WorkSafe 'Approved Code of Practice for The Safe Handling, Transportation and Erection of Precast Concrete'.

Carry out all construction operations in accordance with the Contractor's project-specific Health and Safety Plan.

2.4.2.2 Quality Assurance - Option 1

Ensure that the construction of all concrete work complies in all respects with the design drawings and the specifications.

Prepare and submit details of the quality assurance procedures for concrete work for approval. These procedures should encompass all aspects of concrete construction.

The quality assurance procedure shall encompass all aspects of concrete construction including, but not limited to:

- concrete quality; and
- formwork quality; and
- construction tolerances; and
- reinforcing steel placement; and
- cast-in items; and
- concrete finishes.

Notify the name of the concrete construction representative to be responsible for the quality control of concrete work. The nominated representative shall complete and sign a written quality control checklist for each on-site concrete pour. A copy of each completed checklist shall be submitted to the Contract Administrator before pouring commences, and in sufficient time for pre-pour inspections to be carried out. The format and detail of the checklist shall be agreed to prior to the commencement of any concrete work.

Supply evidence of concrete production quality standards in advance of construction in accordance with the requirements of NZS 3109.

2.4.2.3 Tolerances

Unless specified otherwise, dimensional tolerances of concrete work shall conform to NZS 3109: Table 5.2 - 'Tolerance for insitu construction', and NZS 3109: Table 5.1 - 'Tolerance for precast components', and to NZS 3114 for off-the-form and unformed surface tolerances.

To ensure that elements such as external cladding, precast items, and lifts will properly fit the building, maintain responsibility for the accurate control of the overall set-out of the concrete structure and concrete elements.

An absolute tolerance on the position of all structural elements of 15mm shall be maintained over the full height of the structure in all directions.

Employ a registered surveyor to reset all gridlines and column positions at every second floor. Column locations, slab edge positions and positions of openings shall be adjusted to ensure that each in within 10mm of the correct position through the height of the building.

Take particular care to ensure that individual members and the building structure as a whole do not twist over the height of the building.

2.4.2.4 Erection & Temporary Works

Maintain responsibility for all erection, propping and temporary support of the works, and any other works required for the completion of the contract works, including lifting design, rigging analysis, propping and shoring design.

The extent and details of the erection systems, propping, etc., will be dependent on proposed construction methods, transport and handling methods, and construction programme. Where required, engage a Chartered Professional Engineer experienced in this type of work to undertake the design and supervision of erection systems, propping, etc. Provide written confirmation that this has been done to the Contract Administrator.

Any additional reinforcement to suit temporary erection or support methods shall be the responsibility of the Contractor.

2.4.2.5 Inspections

All stages of the concrete construction work shall be reviewed in accordance with the requirements of NZS 3109: Section 1.3, and the conditions of the Building Consent.

All inspections shall be properly documented by the Contractor. Provide all necessary quality control checklists prior to pouring and in sufficient time for pre-pour inspection.

Give notice and provide reasonable opportunity to inspect the section of work prior to pouring. Give at least 1 working day's notice of intent to place concrete in any area.

Any instructions issued shall be carried out before concrete placing commences. Unless approval is given by the Contract Administrator and/or BCA, no concrete shall be placed in that section of work.

Any concrete placed without authorisation may require removal from the works at the Contractor's expense.

2.4.2.6 Materials & Workmanship

Adhere to the requirements of NZS 3109, except where specified otherwise or instructed by the Contract Administrator.

2.4.2.7 Producer Statement

Furnish a fully completed Producer Statement when the works are sufficiently complete and are ready for application for a Code Compliance Certificate. The Producer Statement shall cover all concrete construction work completed under this section of the specification - Concrete.

In the case of exemption the reinforing is to be inspected by the engineer before pooring concrete.

2.4.3 Reinforcement

Refer to separate section Reinforcing Steel.

Store reinforcing steel material flat, clear of the ground, on evenly spaced bearers, in a secure area clear of the building works. Keep materials protected from damage and contamination at all times. Do not use damaged, distorted or defective material.

Ensure that all reinforcing is adequately supported off the ground and remains clean from delivery until placing. Before placing reinforcing steel, check that it is free of any loose mill scale and any contamination that may impair bonding to concrete.

Take all necessary measures to ensure that reinforcing steel is not damaged or displaced during concreting.

2.4.4 Formwork

Formwork shall conform to NZS 3109: Section 5, and comply with the provisions of NZS 3114 applicable to the class of surface finish specified.

Formwork and falsework shall have sufficient strength to retain and support the wet concrete being placed to the required profiles and tolerances.

The formwork surface finish shall be of suitable quality necessary to produce the specified concrete finish. Any formwork with a deteriorated or damaged surface that does not meet the requirements of the surface finish shall not be used.

Fair-faced concrete formwork shall be constructed so as to provide straight and true angles and so as to produce cast surfaces within a maximum tolerance of 5mm of the given dimensions, and without visible offsets, bulges, or misalignment of the concrete. Form neat, clean arrised edges, except where chamfers are indicated on the drawings or required to match existing detail - in which case the fillets shall form part of the mould and not be loosely placed.

Plywood formwork shall be constructed from Formply plywood sheets or C-grade faced standard plywood sheets (according to concrete finish), placed in a regular pattern and tightly butted together to avoid grout loss. The joints shall be sealed to prevent grout loss. Plywood formwork shall not be permitted to stain visually exposed concrete. Unless indicated otherwise on the drawings, timber or plywood formwork shall have 20mm fillets at the inside corners of beams, columns and walls.

The formwork face shall be adequately clean and treated with a general purpose concrete form release agent in accordance with the manufacturer's requirements. Diesel oil based products are not permitted. Care shall be taken to ensure that the release agent is kept out of contact with the reinforcement and is compatible with any subsequent paint or finish system applied to the finished concrete.

All ties and spreaders shall be of an approved type and placed so as to leave a regular, neat pattern on the concrete surface when withdrawn and filled. The ends of cast-in ties shall be set at least 40mm from the concrete surface. Wire ties are not permitted for the purpose of restraining, securing or supporting formwork.

Steel formwork shall be used where specified or appropriate, with all joints welded and ground smooth and flush to a uniform surface. All internal corners shall be formed by folding the steel, not butting.

Any surface required with a ribbed or grooved surface shall be formed by adhering battens of the appropriate profile to the form bed and/or mould, and treated generally as above.

Erected formwork shall be set and checked for dimensional accuracy and alignment before, during and after concreting, and any damaged formwork replaced. All debris shall be removed from the formwork immediately before concrete is placed.

When not in use, formwork shall be cleaned, oiled and stored flat on an even surface, and protected from exposure to moisture and contamination on all sides.

Formwork shall be removed without shock or vibration and in such a manner as to prevent damage and to permit the concrete to take the imposed stresses gradually. Do not permit bars or other tools to lever against set concrete when removing formwork. Any damage to the concrete occurring during removal shall be repaired by an approved method at the Contractor's expense.

Removal of formwork in multi-storey structures shall conform to NZS 3109: Section 5.4.5.

2.4.5 Finishes

2.4.5.1 NZS 3114

Unless specified otherwise in this specification or on the drawings, concrete finishes shall comply with the provisions of NZS 3114 applicable to the surface finish class specified.

Concrete surface finishes not specified in this specification or on the drawings shall be in accordance with Table 1 or Table 2 of NZS 3114 according to surface type, location and application/use.

2.4.5.2 Slab Finishes

Refer to the Schedule of Surface Finishes below for the finishes required unless specified otherwise in the contract documents.

Arrange the pouring to allow adequate time for floating and finishing.

Floating and any subsequent finishing shall be at the correct time to obtain the quality of compaction and finish required. No finishing work shall be carried out on any area where there is free surface water. The application of dry cement or sand to absorb free water is not permitted.

All trowelling ridges shall be removed while soft, or by subsequent light grinding. Slabs not fulfilling the standard of finish required shall be ground smooth or otherwise treated to the satisfaction of the Contract Administrator. Care shall be taken to avoid ridges where a newly poured slab meets existing edges.

2.4.5.3 Formed Finishes

Refer to the Schedule of Surface Finishes below for the finishes required unless specified otherwise in the contract documents.

Concrete which will be concealed within the finished building shall be cast with minimum grout loss, honeycombing, and without conspicuous off-sets or bulges.

2.4.5.4 Schedule of Surface Finishes

Schedule of Surface Finishes (according to application):

- Slabs to take plaster or tiles: U2 Class Finish.
- Other slabs: U3 Class Finish.
- Top surfaces of foundation beams and pads: U2 Class Finish.
- Concrete below ground: F1 Class Finish.
- Concrete to take plaster or tiles: F2 Class Finish.
- Concrete surfaces not exposed in the finished building: F3 Class Finish.
- Concrete surfaces exposed inside or outside the finished building: F5 Class Finish.
- Precast concrete surfaces exposed finishes: *F5 Class Finish* & *U3X Class Finish* as described herein (sample required).
- Feature architectural finish: F6X Class Finish as described herein (sample required).
- External walkways and landings: U5 Class Finish (soft broom).
- Exterior paving: U2E Class Finish exposed aggregate as described herein (sample required).

Description of Specific Concrete Finishes:

2.4.6 Concrete

2.4.6.1 Normal Concrete

Unless specified otherwise herein, all concrete except for 'no fines' concrete shall be Normal Concrete (N) Grade as defined by NZS 3109, produced in accordance with NZS 3104 from a New Zealand Ready

Mixed Concrete Association audited plant, with sufficient cement quantity to ensure satisfactory finish and durability.

Normal Concrete maximum aggregate size shall be 19mm. Calcium chloride shall not be used.

Cement shall comply with:

NZS 3122: 'Specification for Portland and blended cements (General and special purpose)';

NZS 3125: 'Specification for portland-limestone filler cement'.

Chemical admixtures use in Normal Concrete shall comply with AS 1478.

'No fines' concrete shall be coarse aggregate/cement/water mix without sand but with selected aggregate where necessary.

The aggregate used, and overall mix design (including the use of additives) of Normal Concrete, shall meet the provisions of Section 2 of CCANZ TR 3 Alkali Silica Reaction. Evidence of this may be required by the Contract Administrator. Use of low alkali cements or aggregates from an alternative source may be required where the aggregate contains deleterious material.

Normal Concrete used in the works shall have the following minimum strengths at 28 days unless noted otherwise on the drawings:

- Blinding concrete: 10 MPa.
- 'No fines' concrete: no minimum strength.
- Bored piles: 25 MPa.
- Foundation pads and strip footings: 25 MPa.
- Floor slab-on-grade: 30 MPa.
- Superstructure generally: 30 MPa.
- Precast concrete: 30 MPa.
- Toppings to proprietary suspended floor systems: 30 MPa.
- All other structural concrete not specifically mentioned: 25 MPa.
- Driveways, pavements, landscaping: 20 MPa.

Supply details of Normal Concrete mix designs for review prior to the ordering of any concrete.

Where a mix from the Normal Concrete range is specified with a special requirement as specified in NZS 3109, then it becomes a Special Concrete (S) - refer to Special Concrete.

2.4.7 Concreting

2.4.7.1 Handling, Placing & Compaction

All concreting shall conform to NZS 3109 unless modified in this specification.

Concrete shall be transported, handled, placed and compacted so as to:

- Prevent segregation or loss of materials;
- Produce a monolithic mass between planned joints or the extremities of members, or both;
- Completely fill the formwork to the intended level, expel entrapped air, and closely surround all

reinforcement, tendons, ducts, anchorages and embedments; and

- Provide the specified finish to the formed surfaces of the member;
- Ensure there is no contamination of the concrete;
- Ensure that the transporting, handling, placing and compaction of the concrete is complete before setting reactions have passed the point which prevents the concrete from attaining its potential fully cured properties.

Concrete shall not be pumped without the Contract Administrator's approval. Where such approval is given, only a standard 'structural' concrete mix design may be used - the use of a pump mix design will not be accepted.

Vibrators shall be used for the compaction of all concrete, including floor slabs. Immersion vibrators shall be moved to new positions as frequently as necessary to ensure uniform vibration of the whole mass and fully compacted concrete. On no account shall immersion vibrators be allowed to come into contact with the face of formwork. Vibrators shall not be used to transport concrete along the forms.

2.4.7.2 Curing & Protection

All concrete shall be cured in accordance with NZS 3109:Section 7.8.

The use of concrete curing compounds shall be only as agreed with the Contract Administrator (specifically for each occasion before it is used). Ensure that any agreed concrete curing compound is compatible with subsequent floor coverings or surface treatments, including any sealers, paints, waterproofing membranes, etc.

All concrete elements shall be protected from damage at all times. Any damaged items shall be repaired or remade to the satisfaction of the Contract Administrator.

2.4.7.3 Unfavourable Conditions

Take all necessary precautions and measures during unfavourable conditions, as required by NZS 3109: Section 7.2, to ensure quality and finish of the concrete is not compromised or reduced in any manner.

2.4.8 Construction Joints

2.4.8.1 Construction Joints

The location, type and detail of construction joints shall be as specified and shown on the drawings. Construction joints shall not be repositioned or eliminated from the locations shown on the drawings without approval. Where a construction joint is not specified or shown on the drawings, the location, type and detail of the joint must be approved before work commences.

2.4.8.2 Shrinkage-Control Joints - Saw Cutting

Shrinkage-control joints shall be formed in concrete slab-on-grade floors by saw-cut grooves to the layout and details shown on the drawings.

Saw cutting shall be carried out as soon as possible, after the concrete has set and before shrinkage cracking has occurred - typically within 24 hours of pouring, and without excessive chipping, spalling or tearing of the concrete. Saw cuts shall be straight and true and within 10mm of the true joint alignment.

Unless shown otherwise on the drawings, saw cut grooves shall extend to one quarter of the of the slab thickness, and be between 3-5mm in width. Under no circumstances shall the reinforcement through the joint be cut by saw cutting.

As detailed on the drawings, the joint shall be sealed with the specified sealant.

2.4.9 Penetrations and Detailing

Form all penetrations, rebates, fillets, nibs, upstands, and other detailing as shown on the drawings. Sleeves, conduits, pipes, cores or other penetrations shall not be cast in concrete unless they are indicated on the drawings. If not indicated, they must be approved by the Contract Administrator. All penetrations and concrete detailing shall be accurately positioned and formed at the time of pouring the concrete (without movement or displacement).

Set concrete shall not be cut, hacked or cored unless specific approval is obtained from the Contract Administrator.

2.4.10 Building In

As the work proceeds, build in all anchors, bolts, fixings, and other built-in items as shown on the drawings and as necessary for the satisfactory completion of the works.

Build in all necessary pockets, chases, grooves, pipe and cable sleeves, conduits, fixings, fittings, etc., required by other trades. Liaise with other trades and confirm the requirements and supply of all built-in items related to their work, and shall ensure that such items are supplied and/or positioned.

Unless specified as supplied by another trade or other party, all items specified or indicated on the drawings as built-in shall be supplied by the Contractor.

Where an item is not specified or shown on the drawings as built-in, submit all necessary details for approval before proceeding. Such items shall only be built-in when approved by the Contract Administrator.

Built-in items shall not be repositioned or eliminated from the locations shown on the drawings without prior approval.

Ensure that all built-in items are correctly positioned and that they are not displaced during concreting. Ensure suitable personnel are on call during concreting to correct any displacement that may occur. Advise the Contract Administrator immediately if any built-in item has been positioned incorrectly or left out.

No claim will be recognised for cutting away or drilling concrete work already executed as a result of not conforming to these requirements and making the necessary provisions beforehand.

2.4.11 Cast-In Structural Steelwork Items

All cast-in steelwork that is exposed to weather or water vapour on completion shall be hot-dip galvanised. If welding to the cast-in item is necessary, grind off the galvanising in area of welding, carry out welding, and protect the exposed bare steel with an approved cold galvanising (cold-galv) treatment in accordance with the manufacturer's requirements.

Ensure that all cast-in structural steel items are correctly positioned and that they are not displaced during concreting. Ensure that suitable personnel are on call during concreting to correct any displacement that may occur. Advise the Contract Administrator immediately if any cast-in structural steel item has been positioned incorrectly or left out.

2.4.12 Foundations

Form concrete foundations to the layout and details shown on the drawings. Concrete foundations shall be cast against formwork on each side unless otherwise approved by the Contract Administrator. Where approval is given to cast against ground, an additional 25mm thickness of concrete will be required on each unformed face to provide additional cover.

Allow to underpin or otherwise support adjacent foundations as necessary to ensure complete stability and no damage to adjacent structures at all times.

Cast in sleeves for all pipes and cables that pass through foundations - coordinate the location of each sleeve with the relevant trade.

Give notice and provide reasonable opportunity to inspect all foundation excavations before placing any tidy concrete or hardfill.

2.4.13 On-Ground Floor Slabs

2.4.13.1 Concrete Floor Slab-on-Grade

Unless specified or shown otherwise, cast ground-bearing concrete floor slabs on a damp proof membrane (DPM) sheet concrete underlay, laid over maximum 25mm thick layer of compacted sand blinding.

The concrete mix should be designed to ensure durability and shrinkage. The use of low sand percentage, a low water content, superplasticiser and air entrainment is required.

Cement content shall not be less than 300 kg/m³, regardless of the minimum specified concrete strength.

The slab shall be constructed between formed construction joints as shown on the drawings, and in a sequence so that two adjacent sections are not poured one after the other.

Immediately after screeding the slab shall be smoothed using a bull float. Finishing shall be carried out with the use of a power float; initially operated with the blades flat, and finally operated with the blades slightly tilted.

All slabs shall have construction joints or saw-cuts at not more than 5.0m intervals in each direction, unless shown otherwise on the drawings.

Along lines of saw-cuts accurately cut out alternate bars of the floor reinforcement and mark the proposed line of saw-cut from outside the pour area. The time of sawing will vary depending on weather conditions, and shall be such as to prevent uncontrolled cracking of the slab. Sawing of the joints shall commence as early as possible, typically within 12-18 hours, and when the concrete has sufficiently hardened to permit cutting without excessive chipping, spalling and tearing. Saw-cuts shall be to the depth shown on the drawings and shall be made using a self-propelled diamond-tipped floor saw machine.

2.4.13.2 Damp-Proof Membrane

Damp-Proof Membrane (DPM) - refer to separate section Waterproofing for specification of damp proof membrane.

Damp-proof membrane shall be continuous under slabs-on-ground and under foundations. Sheet DPM joints shall be overlapped minimum 150mm and continuously sealed with a pressure-sensitive tape or as recommended by the manufacturer.

Damp-proof membrane shall be turned up or down against foundations, walls and columns as appropriate, and tape-seal around protrusions and service pipes.

Protect the DPM during all operations until the floor slab is complete. Repair any damage that may occur or replace damaged DPM with new sections.

2.4.13.3 Shrinkage-Control Joints - Saw Cutting

Shrinkage-control joints shall be formed in concrete slab-on-grade floors by saw-cut grooves to the layout and details shown on the drawings.

Saw cutting shall be carried out as soon as possible, after the concrete has set and before shrinkage cracking has occurred - typically within 24 hours of pouring, and without excessive chipping, spalling or tearing of the concrete. Saw cuts shall be straight and true and within 10mm of the true joint alignment.

Unless shown otherwise on the drawings, saw cut grooves shall extend to one quarter of the of the slab thickness, and be between 3-5mm in width. Under no circumstances shall the reinforcement through the joint be cut by saw cutting.

2.4.13.4 Shrinkage-Control Joints - Crack Inducer

Shrinkage-control joints shall be formed in slab-on-grade floors with the use of cast-in ground crack inducers, installed to the layout and details shown on the drawings in accordance with the manufacturer's requirements. Unless shown otherwise on the drawings, ground crack inducers shall extend to one quarter of the of the slab thickness. Both sides of the crack inducer shall be adequately taped to the DPM to prevent displacement during pouring.

2.4.14 Epoxy Grouting of Reinforcing Bars

All epoxy grouted reinforcing bars shall comply with the following provisions and shall be subject to the approval of the Contract Administrator.

Epoxy grouting is not an alternative construction method to the details shown on the drawings.

Remedial work to rectify new concrete work must be carried out in accordance with the Contract Administrator's instruction.

Drill all epoxy grouted reinforcing bars into concrete in accordance with the design drawings - when required for connecting into existing concrete.

The holes must be drilled with hammer drills. Diamond core drilling is not acceptable.

Holes for vertical bars shall be plumb in all directions, and holes for horizontal starters shall slope downward at a 15° angle.

The depth of hole and embedment of the reinforcing bars shall be to the minimum depths shown on the drawings. Epoxy anchoring adhesive shall be Sika AnchorFix-3+ or approved equivalent high-performance, 2-part epoxy anchoring adhesive. Alternatives cannot be used without written approval of the Contract Administrator. The grout shall be non-shrink. Moisture sensitive epoxy resins shall not be used. If the hole size is larger than the minimum specified, a sand filled grout may be required. The epoxy grout shall be used strictly in accordance with the manufacturer's requirements.

Holes must be dry prior to filling with epoxy unless the epoxy used is suitable for wet holes or underwater application. If the concrete is moist then the bonding surface must be roughened to provide a depth of surface roughness of 2-3mm or more so that the loss in chemical bonding can be replaced by mechanical bonding.

All holes shall be cleaned out using a stiff-bristled wire bottle brush and an oil-free compressed-air source so that all dust and debris are removed from the side of the hole. Give notice and provide reasonable opportunity for inspection of the holes prior to placement of bars and epoxy grouting.

The hole shall be partially filled with epoxy grout prior to inserting the reinforcing bar. Holes shall be filled from the bottom up (rather than pouring from the top). Vertical holes can be filled with pourable-grade epoxy. Horizontal holes must be filled with 'plastic' epoxy using pre-filled cartridges and sealant gun. Standard cartridges shall be modified by placing plastic hosing over the cartridge nozzle of sufficient length to reach the base of the drilled hole.

After the bar has been placed in position, ensure that the epoxy fills the hole to the surface of the concrete. Top holes if necessary. Bars shall be placed in the holes, given one turn to expel air voids, and shall be fully supported (if necessary) and left undisturbed for at least 24 hours. After 24 hours horizontal bars installed at 15° angle can be bent horizontal/level.

Notify the name of the person responsible for ensuring this specification is adhered to.

Pull-out tests shall be undertaken on a minimum 15% of all epoxy grouted bars, but with a minimum of three tests for each applicable bar size. The tension test load shall not be less than 70% of the yield strength of the bar, or as otherwise directed by the Contract Administrator. All costs for testing shall be borne by the Contractor.

2.4.15 Grouting of Ducts

All ducts and associated gaps forming the interface between adjacent concrete components, where noted on the drawings, shall be grouted with Sika Grout 212 or approved equivalent high strength, shrinkage compensated, pourable cementitious grout.

Grouting shall be carried out so that air is expelled as grouting continues, and the voids between concrete units are completely filled with grout. The grout shall be mixed and placed in strict accordance with the manufacturer's requirements.

Ensure the quality assurance of mixing and placing grout at all times. Provide the grout manufacturer's testing programme, and ensure its is adhered to throughout construction. The tests shall demonstrate that grout, when placed:

- has a minimum 7-day strength of 40 MPa; and
- flows to entirely cover the interface between the concrete components/elements; and
- does not bleed mix-water to create voids at the interface; and
- does not shrink.

Clean off any spillage or leakage immediately after the completion of grouting.

Allow at least 24 hours for the grout to cure before applying any load to the grouted joint.

2.4.16 Repair & Cleaning of Concrete

2.4.16.1 Proposed Remedial Works

When the exposed concrete surfaces of the building are complete, they shall be closely inspected for faults in surface finish, damage to corners or edges, dirty marks, splashes or dribbles and visible imperfections of every kind.

Submit any proposed remedial work procedures to the Contract Administrator for approval. If proposed remedial work procedures are not approved, remedial work shall be as specified herein.

2.4.16.2 General Repair & Cleaning

All defects and imperfections shall be removed and rectified to the satisfaction of the Contract Administrator.

The removal of surface markings shall be carefully carried out with the use of wire brushing, pumice stone, carborundum stone, or washing and scrubbing - such as will remove the marks without scratching, discolouring or otherwise affecting the surrounding or underlying concrete.

Patching or filling of fair faced concrete and making good broken edges and corners shall be done with coloured sands and cement where necessary to match the colour of the surrounding concrete when dry.

Epoxy or similar adhesives shall be used when required.

2.4.16.3 Concrete Repair Using Concrete or Dry-pack

Correct all imperfections on the concrete surface necessary to produce the surface finish that conforms to NZS 3114. Unless directed otherwise, the repair of imperfections in formed concrete shall be completed within 24 hours after removal of formwork, or within 24 hours after concrete placing for unformed concrete. Otherwise, epoxy resin repairs are required.

Repairs to surfaces with a F3-finish shall be colour-matched with the parent concrete. Where necessary, limestone or marble dust shall be mixed with the sand, and white cement mixed with Portland cement to ensure a satisfactory colour match. Ensure that the texture of the repair matches the texture of the adjacent surface. Defective areas may need to be over-excavated to ensure the surface finish of the repair is rectangular or other regular shape.

Fins and encrustations shall be neatly removed from F4-finish and F5-finish specified surfaces. Encrustations shall be removed from U3-finish specified surfaces.

Where the concrete is damaged, honeycombed, fractured or otherwise defective, and where excessive depressions exist in the concrete surface, the concrete shall be removed and replaced with dry-pack, mortar, or concrete as outlined below.

Where bulges and abrupt irregularities protrude beyond the tolerances for formed surfaces as specified in NZS 3114, the protrusions shall be reduced by brush-hammering and grinding so that the surface is within the specified limits. After such dressing, the irregularities shall not exceed the tolerance specified in NZS 3114.

Dry-pack shall not be used for filling behind reinforcement or for filling hole that extend completely through a concrete section.

Mortar placed under impact shall be used for repairing defects that are too wide for dry-pack filling and too shallow for concrete filling and are no deeper than the far side of the reinforcement nearest the surface.

Formwork tie holes shall be neatly plugged with mortar filling. The mortar shall be colour-matched with the surrounding concrete.

2.4.16.4 Concrete Repair Using Epoxy Resin

Epoxy resin or epoxy resin bonded repairs shall be used when repairs have not been made within 24 hours after the removal of formwork, or not made within 24 hours after placing unformed concrete. Such repairs shall not be undertaken until the parent concrete has had a minimum of 3 weeks curing.

Imperfections to be repaired with epoxy resin shall be chipped back to sound concrete and the edges of the cavity trimmed square for a minimum depth of 3mm.

Immediately prior to carrying out a repair, the surface of the cavity shall be cleaned of all contaminants by sandblasting, or etching with a 5% solution of hydrochloric acid or other approved method. If acid-etch is used, immediately the foaming ceases the cavity shall be thoroughly flushed and cleaned with clean, fresh water, then completely dried using an appropriate heat source.

Following preparation, the surface of the cavity shall be primed with one or more coats of an approved unfilled epoxy resin prepared and cured in accordance with the manufacturer's requirements.

A compatible epoxy resin with an approved filler, or wet concrete, shall be prepared, applied to the primed surface and trowelled to a smooth finish and allowed to cure. Epoxy resin shall only be used in accordance with the manufacturer's requirements. Ensure to leave the surrounding surface clean and free from contamination.

The finished repair surface shall conform NZS 3114. Any grinding required shall be carried out using a silicon carbide or other suitable abrasive with water (wet grind).

2.5 Thermakraft Underlay, DPM & DPC

2.5.1 Scope

Supply and install Thermakraft Underlays and Membranes, as specified herein, to the locations identified on the drawings, complete with all accessories required for proper installation and performance. All aspects of this work shall be in complete accordance with Thermakraft Ltd technical information and installation requirements (check www.thermakraft.co.nz, or call 0800 806 595 for the latest editions), other relevant product manufacturers' recommendations, and as shown on the design drawings.

No substitutions are permitted for the specified products from Thermakraft Ltd.

The following is a list and a general description of the extent of the Thermakraft Underlays and Membranes works, which are more specifically defined in the contract documents, required for the completion of the contract works:

2.5.2 Requirements

2.5.2.1 Safety

Comply with the Health and Safety at Work Act 2015 (HSWA), and with all relevant Health and Safety at Work Regulations 2016, and with all relevant WorkSafe New Zealand (WorkSafe) Approved Codes of Practice and WorkSafe Information and Guidance, particularly those for construction and building maintenance.

2.5.2.2 Warranty

Thermakraft Ltd Product Warranty:

- 15 Years Warranty for all Thermakraft warranted products installed, according to the warranty conditions.
- Provide the Thermakraft Ltd Product Warranty on the manufacturer's standard warranty form.
- Commence the warranty from the date of permanent installation.

2.5.2.3 Substitutions

Thermakraft Ltd products shall be as specified herein and as indicated on the approved drawings. The substitution of Thermakraft branded products for alternative brands like products are permitted but must be checked with owner and designer.

The substitution of a specified Thermakraft product for an alternative Thermakraft branded product by the Contractor shall only be permitted with the Contract Administrator's written authorisation, and shall be at no additional cost to the Principal. Should any resultant extra work and/or redesign work be required to accommodate alternative Thermakraft branded products to satisfy design, performance and compliance requirements, then the cost of these shall be borne by the Contractor.

2.5.3 Damp-Proof Course

<u>PerrimeterDamp Proof Course</u>. A bitumen saturated, heavy Kraft lightly coated with Perlite. Available in 50mm, 75mm, 90mm, 100mm, 150mm, 200mm, 250mm and 300mm roll widths. Perrimeter DPC is used as a general damp proof course (DPC) for separating timber and wood-based products and metal from concrete, masonry, brick, and stone surfaces, and as a moisture barrier.

Also used as a concealed flashing behind brick veneer cladding in accordance with NZS 4229 and NZBC E2/AS1.

Installed in accordance with the manufacturer's requirements, and as shown on the drawings.

2.5.4 Wall Underlay

Rab board is used as wall underlay.

2.5.5 Roof Underlay

<u>Thermabar 397 Synthetic Foil</u>. A fire-retardant, self-supporting, white-faced, double-sided aluminium light diffuser foil insulation/vapour control layer, synthetic underlay. Nominal weight 218g/m². Thermabar 397 Synthetic Foil is not suitable for installation in residential or associated buildings.

Installed as a roof underlay over timber or steel roof framing on unlined and uninsulated roofs in accordance with the manufacturer's requirements, <u>BRANZ Appraisal No.1000 (2018)</u>, and as shown on the drawings.

Thermabar 397 Foil roof underlay can be used under roof claddings, or directly under roof cavity battens in accordance with Thermakraft requirements.

When used on its own as a reflective insulating vapour control layer, separate Thermabar 397 Foil from the roof cladding as detailed.

Thermabar 397 Foil roof underlay must installed in a manner that prevents ponding of water, and supported on safety mesh or netting as specified - refer to Thermakraft's requirements when used in conjunction with netting and bulk insulation.

Do not leave Thermabar 397 Foil exposed on roofs for more than a total of 30 days before covering.

Installed Location:

2.5.6 Underlay Support

Roof Underlay Support - <u>Ausmesh Safety Netting</u>. A 150mm x 300mm x 2mm diameter galvanised wire safety mesh complying with AS/NZS 4389.

Used as a support for roof underlays and non-rigid insulation, and installed in accordance with the manufacturer's requirements, AS/NZS 4389, and as shown on the drawings. Suitably jointed and tensioned when installed to avoid any sagging and to keep the roof underlay in a flat plane.

Do not walk or stand on installed Ausmesh Safety Mesh or use it as a working platform.

Installed Location:

2.5.7 Window Flashing Tape

2.5.7.1 Aluband Window Flashing Tape

<u>Aluband Window Flashing Tape</u>. A polymeric faced, bituminous modified, self-adhesive tape with a release backing paper. Designed to be used in conjunction with Thermakraft Corner Moulded Piece and Thermakraft underlays as part of the Thermakraft Window Sealing Warranty System.

Aluband Window Flashing Tape is suitable for use on timber or steel framed buildings, in conjunction with a compatible flexible underlay, around framed joinery openings as a secondary weather barrier, in NZS 3604 Wind Zones up to and including 'Extra High'.

Aluband Window Flashing Tape can be used on the sill and lintel of framed joinery openings, and to seal flashing upstands to a flexible underlay.

Physical Properties:

- Thickness: 0.65mm.
- Installation temperature range: minimum 5°C; maximum 30°C.
- Maximum UV exposure: 42 days.
- Tape width: Available in 75mm, 150mm, and 200mm wide rolls.

The width of Aluband Window Flashing Tapes used shall be selected to suit the depth of framed openings and Thermakraft installation requirements.

Installed in accordance with the requirements of the <u>Thermakraft Aluband Application & Installation Guide</u> and <u>BRANZ Appraisal No.878 (2014)</u>, to the locations and details shown on the drawings.

Aluband Window Flashing Tape should not be applied directly or indirectly (over flexible underlay) to timber that has been freshly LOSP treated. Always allow LOSP solvent to fully flash off before covering with underlay and applying Aluband Window Flashing Tape.

Do not leave Aluband Window Flashing Tape exposed to weather and UV light for more than 42 days after installation.

2.5.8 Underlay Penetration Seals

2.5.8.1 Multi-Fit Penetration Seals

<u>Thermakraft Multi-Fit Penetration Seals</u>. A range of pipe and service penetration seals consisting of soft, flexible EPDM membrane with a self-adhesive flange.

Multi-Fit Penetration Seals are part of the Thermakraft membrane system, and are a patented airtight solution for round or rectangular pipes, cables or conduits when passing through underlay barriers.

Pipe seals accommodate pipe diameters from 15mm up to 110mm. Cable seals accommodate cable diameters from 7mm up to 22mm, and 80m trunking.

Installed in accordance with the manufacturer's requirements and <u>BRANZ Appraisal No.942</u> (2017), with stand-alone flexible wall underlay over timber or steel wall framed walls on buildings situated in NZS 3604 Wind Zones up to and including 'Very High'.

Installed in accordance with the manufacturer's requirements and <u>BRANZ Appraisal No.942 (2017)</u>, with flexible wall underlay used over a rigid wall underlay on buildings situated in NZS 3604 Wind Zones up to and including 'Extra High'.

2.5.9 Co-operation

Co-operate with other trades to ensure that all preliminary and preparatory works are completed to specification and as shown on the drawings.

Coordinate with other trades to install Thermakraft Underlays, DPMs, and DPCs as required.

2.5.10 Workmanship

Where required by the NZ Building Act 2004 it is the building contractor's responsibility to ensure that all restricted building work is carried out by a Licensed Building Practitioner.

All installation work shall be carried out by experienced and competent tradespersons, familiar with the specified products and installation techniques, in accordance with the manufacturer's requirements, and to fully comply with all warranty requirements.

All cutting, joining, and fixing techniques shall be exactly as recommended by the manufacturer, and carried out with the use of suitable tools and equipment appropriate for the application. All work shall be such as to leave a neat, efficient, and weathertight installation.

2.5.11 Delivery & Handling

Store underlay rolls on end, undercover, on a flat, clean and dry surface. Keep stored materials dry, out of direct sunlight, and protected from damage and contamination at all times.

Handle materials in accordance with the manufacturer's requirements and in a manner that prevents damage to or deterioration of the product.

Do not used damaged or defective materials, or products that are beyond their designated shelf life.

Installers shall be familiar with and comply with the manufacturer's safe handling requirements and precautions for use, and shall use appropriate safety gear when handling materials.

Installers shall conform with all relevant <u>WorkSafe NZ</u> Guidelines and Codes of Practice - including the <u>OSH Guidelines For the Provision of Facilities and General Safety in the Construction Industry</u>, as well as the <u>Best practice guidelines for working on roofs</u> for roofing installations.

2.5.12 Preparation

2.5.12.1 General

Prior to installation, carry out all necessary inspections and preparatory work required, and ensure that all preliminary works by other trades has been completed to specification and as shown on the approved drawings.

Do not commence installation until all necessary preliminary works by others is complete and to the required standard. The commencement of work shall be deemed to indicate full acceptance by the installer that all preliminary works by other trades is complete.

Supporting timber framing shall comply with NZS 3604, or with NZS 3603 and AS/NZS 1170 for specific design, and have a maximum moisture content of 20% at the time of cladding installation. Allow LOSP treated timber to sufficiently flash-off before installing Thermakraft building underlays and foils.

Supporting light structural steel framing shall comply with the requirements of AS/NZS 4600 or the NASH Standard for Residential and Low-rise Steel Framing, Part 1: Design Criteria. Comply with the light structural steel framing fabricator's specifications and requirements for fixing cladding and roofing components.

Supporting heavy steel structures shall comply with NZS 3404.

2.5.13 Installation - Wall Underlay

2.5.13.1 Aluband Window Flashing Tape

Install Aluband Window Flashing Tape in accordance with the manufacturer's requirements, to the locations and details shown on the approved drawings.

Window Sills:

- Fit Thermakraft Corner Moulded Piece to the bottom corners of the opening.
- Cut Aluband Window Flashing Tape to the length of the sill trimmer plus an additional 400mm.
- Apply the tape over the underlay along the sill trimmer, with the back edge flush with the inside edge of the framing, and returned minimum 200mm up both trimming studs.
- Fold the tape minimum 50mm over the face of the underlay on the outside of the opening.
- Press the tape firmly in place over the underlay to ensure a continuous weathertight seal is maintained.

Window & Door Lintels:

- Install Aluband Window Flashing Tape to the top corners of framed window and door openings, over the underlay and 200mm along the lintel and 200mm down the trimming stud, with the back edge flush with the inside edge of the framing.
- Fold the tape minimum 50mm over the face of the underlay on the outside of the opening.
- Press firmly in place over the underlay to ensure a weathertight seal.
- Apply a 100mm strip of Aluband Window Flashing Tape at 45° over the taped outside face of each corner.

Avoid joining Aluband Window Flashing Tape. Where necessary, form joins with minimum 100mm overlap, keep any required joining to an absolute minimum.

Do not over-stretch tape during installation, and ensure adequate adhesion and weathertightness is maintained against the underlay.

Do not leave Aluband Window Flashing Tape exposed to weather and UV light for more than 42 days after installation - replace with new window flashing tape if 42 day's exposure is exceeded.

2.5.14 Installation - Roof Underlay

2.5.14.1 Thermabar 397 Light Diffuser Foil Insulation

Thermabar 397 Light Diffuser Foil Insulation shall be installed, white face down, over the specified support netting/strapping, run horizontally or vertically over the purlins, starting from the gutter/lowest point up to the ridge/highest point, extending maximum 20mm into gutters, with minimum 150mm side and end laps, lapped such that any water will be shed to the outside of the underlay, and sufficiently tensioned without sagging.

Fix at maximum 300mm centres to purlins for direct fix roof cladding, or firmly secure as show on the drawings if overlaid with battens.

Finish Thermabar 397 along roof edges and junctions, valley gutters, and at the ridge as shown on the drawings. Carefully cut underlay at roof openings at 45° angle away from each corner and lap-tape

closed to framed up-stands in accordance with Thermakraft requirements and as detailed. Leave underlay minimum 50mm distance clear of the outer liner of flue stacks.

When installed as a vapour barrier, seal all laps and edges, and all pipes and ducts etc. penetrating the vapour barrier, with Thermakraft Pure Foil Tape 403F in accordance with Thermakraft requirements.

Take all necessary care to ensure no contact with electrical cords, cables or fittings - 100mm minimum clearance is recommended - is made during installation of foil insulation.

2.5.15 Completion

Check that all underlays have been installed correctly and are properly supported, and that all underlay edges, joins and ends are correctly finished prior to closing off with claddings - all in accordance with Thermakraft installation requirements.

Check installed membranes and underlays for defective work and damage - replace and/or repair as necessary to the required standard.

Leave all of this work complete, and free of defects, and to the required standard in accordance with the manufacturer's warranty requirements.

Issue to the Owner a copy of the Thermakraft maintenance requirements and the Thermakraft product warranties for the installed products.

3 CARPENTRY

3.1 Preliminary

Refer to General Conditions of Contract and the Special Conditions in this Specification as appropriate. Read this section in conjunction with all other trade sections.

3.2 Compliance

Comply with the New Zealand Building Code 1992 including all revisions and amendments, Verification Methods where appropriate, and construction principles that are embodied in the Acceptable Solutions.

3.3 General

This section includes the receiving, stacking and storage of all Carpenter's materials and the fabrication, erection and fixing of all framing, sheathings and finishing timbers, including all work incidental to neatly finishing in other trades and all temporary work and temporary bracing.

The Carpenter shall attend upon all trades, and shall supply and fix all obviously necessary but not specifically mentioned fixings and materials.

3.4 Timber Framing

3.4.1 Scope

Supply and install timber framing to the floors, walls, roofs, and other timber framed elements, as identified and detailed on the drawings. All aspects of this work shall be in accordance with NZS 3604, product manufacturers' recommendations, and as shown on the drawings and the specification.

3.4.2 Workmanship

Where required by the NZ Building Act 2004 it is the building contractor's responsibility to ensure that all restricted building work is carried out by a Licensed Building Practitioner.

All work shall be carried out to current best trade practise by experienced and competent tradesmen, familiar with the materials and installation techniques, in accordance with NZS 3604 and as shown on the drawings.

Co-operate with other trades to ensure that all preliminary and preparatory works are completed to specification and as shown on the drawings prior to installing timber framing.

Co-ordinate with other trades to install timber framing as required.

3.4.3 Timber Framing

3.4.3.1 Timber Grade and Quality

Unless otherwise noted or specified on the drawings or specification, all framing timber shall be minimum structural grade SG 8 Radiata pine in accordance with NZS 3622.

Framing timber shall be seasoned or kiln dried, and be straight and true and free from wind, warp and distortion, and in lengths suitable for the members required, and shall have a moisture content of between 12% and 18% before installation.

Do not used damaged, faulty or defective materials.

3.4.3.2 Timber Treatment

All non-durable timber framing shall be appropriately treated against moisture and/or insect decay by treatment plants with recognised quality assurance systems that are administered by the Timber Preservation Council (NZTPC). Treatment of timber and wood-based building products shall be to the requirements of NZS 3602 as an absolute minimum, and all treated timber shall be identified and marked as required.

Carefully manage treated framing during installation to avoid accidental use of timber with a lower performance or durability treatment than that required or specified.

3.4.3.3 Storage & Handling

Check timber framing upon delivery and reject sub-standard or damaged material.

Store timber framing dry under cover, fillet stacked and well clear of the ground, and protect from damage, moisture, and contamination.

Ensure all appropriate personal protection equipment is worn at all times when handling and cutting treated framing.

3.4.3.4 Framing Installation

All timber framing members, including all dwanging, strutting, blocking, bracing etc, shall be sized, setout, fitted and fixed to the requirements of NZS 3604 and as shown on the drawings to accommodate structural loadings, cladding and lining setout and support, and the installation of other building components, fixtures and fittings.

All framing shall be erected without deviation, true to line, level, angle and plumb, and evenly aligned and square, and within the tolerances allowed in NZS 3604 Table 2.1. Framing members accurately cut, lapped, housed, joined, and seated so as to provide full contact over the bearing surfaces.

Temporarily prop, brace, tie, and secure framing members and elements as required until the framing is complete and self supporting. Leave in place for safety purposes as long as required.

Protect timber framing as required during installation against damage and moisture, and against significant variation of moisture content until ready for lining. Avoid ponding of water around floor plates.

3.4.3.5 Concrete Separation

Separate timber framing with an approved continuous damp proof course when in direct contact with concrete or masonry. Ensure that the DPC material is compatible with the timber treatment. Free draining separations to external vertical faces shall be 12mm minimum and as noted on the drawings.

3.4.3.6 Timber Re-treatment

All cut or drilled surfaces of H4 and H5 treated timber framing shall be flood coat re-treated, with a suitable product recommended by the original treatment plant, before installation.

3.4.3.7 Edge Notching and Centre Holes

The notching, checking, and boring of framing members shall be in strict accordance with the requirements of NZS 3604.

Avoided checking and cutting where possible and keep to such dimensions so as not to prejudice the purpose for which the member is used. Keep edge notching to a minimum and where possible use centrally bored holes instead.

Concealed services pipes and wiring shall not project beyond the framing face and where possible shall be beyond the lining's fixing reach.

3.4.3.8 Framing Protection

Protect timber framing as required during installation against damage and moisture, and against significant variation of moisture content until ready for lining. Avoid ponding of water around floor plates.

3.4.3.9 Built-up Framing Members

Except for jack studs, bottom plates and top plates, framing members may be substituted with builtup members in accordance with the limitations of NZS 3604 2.4.4.7 with the prior approval of the Architect/Designer only.

3.4.4 Steel Fixings

3.4.4.1 Fastenings and Connectors

Unless otherwise noted or specified, timber framing fastenings and connectors shall be as specified in the relevant fixing schedules of NZS 3604 or have an equivalent capacity as specified therein. Timber framing connectors and fixings shall comply with the product information as required in NZS 3604

2.4.6, and shall be used and installed in accordance with the manufacturer's recommendations. Predrill nail holes in split-prone framing as necessary.

3.4.4.2 Durability of Fixings & Fastenings

Unless otherwise noted or specified, the minimum durability of timber framing fixings and fastenings, excluding nails and screws, shall comply with the durability requirements of NZS 3604 Table 4.1. Galvanised steel fixing components, excluding nails and screws, shall have galvanised coating masses in accordance with NZS 3604 Table 4.2.

Unless noted or specified otherwise, the materials for nails and screws shall be as given in NZS 3604 Table 4.3.

Steel fixings and fastenings in contact with timber treated with copper based timber preservatives (H3.2 or higher) shall be in accordance with NZS 3604 4.4.4.

Stainless steel nails shall be minimum Grade 304 unless otherwise specified or noted.

3.4.4.3 Bolts and Coachscrews

Unless specified or shown otherwise, all bolted and coach screwed connections shall be M12 or M16 in accordance with the relevant fixing requirements given in NZS 3604.

Bolted and coach screwed connections shall have either a 50mm x 3mm square, or a 55mm x 3mm round, washer to each head and nut for M12 and M16 fixings. Washers shall be of the same material and durability as the bolt or coach screw.

3.4.5 Sub Floor Framing

Unless specified or shown otherwise, jack studs supporting sub-floor bearers for 2kPa floors shall be to the dimensions and spacings given in NZS 3604 Table 6.3, and be located over a supporting pile, and have the greater sectional dimension parallel with the bearer supported by the jack stud. Fix jack studs to ordinary piles in accordance with NZS 3604 6.5.2.

Jack stud size and spacing:

3.4.6 Wall Framing

3.4.6.1 Plates

Top and bottom plates shall be to the dimensions and layout shown on the drawings. Unless specified or shown otherwise, top and bottom plates shall be fixed in accordance with NZS 3604 7.5.12 and Tables 8.18 and 8.19, true to line and level or angle.

Joints in top plates shall be made over a stud or over blocking between studs, and all top plate connections shall be in accordance with NZS 3604 8.7.3. Form all holes and edge notches in top and bottom plates in accordance with NZS 3604 8.7.5.

3.4.6.2 Studs

Studs shall be to the dimensions and spacings shown on the drawings, and installed true to line and plumb in both directions between top and bottom plates.

Unless noted otherwise, non-load bearing wall studs shall be to the spacings given in NZS 3604 Table 8.4, stud width as shown on the drawings.

Form all holes and edge notches in studs in accordance with NZS 3604 8.5.1.5. Do not notch, check, cut, or bore holes in the middle third of any trimming stud.

Should the need arise, studs shall be straightened in accordance with NZS 3604 8.5.3 with prior approval from the Architect/Designer only.

Unless noted otherwise, studs in loadbearing walls for 3 kPa floor loads shall be in accordance with NZS 3604 Table 14.10.

3.4.6.3 Lintels

Lintels shall be to the dimensions and locations shown on the drawings, and installed true to line and level, and shall be supported by a 45mm thick doubling stud or jack stud fixed to a trimming stud, and secured against uplift in accordance with NZS 3604 8.6.1.8 as required.

The thickness of a lintel may be made from two or more members, where each member is the length of the lintel, in accordance with NZS 3604 2.4.4.7.

3.4.6.4 Sill & Head Trimmers

Unless specified or shown otherwise, sill and head trimmers to openings shall be the same width as the wall stud and to the thickness given in NZS 3604 Table 8.15, and installed at the required opening height true to line and level, and supported by a 45mm thick doubling stud or jack stud fixed to a trimming stud.

3.4.6.5 Dwangs

Dwangs shall be the same width and thickness as the wall stud, and installed at the centres noted on the drawings, and accurately cut and fixed in place true to line and level and flush with stud edges. Dwangs fixed in accordance with NZS 3604 Table 8.19.

3.4.6.6 Ribbon Boards

Ribbon boards shall be as dimensioned and located on the drawings, and installed on edge and checked 25mm into studs at the required height, true to line and level, and fixed in place in accordance with NZS 3604 Table 8.19.

3.4.7 Roof Framing

3.4.7.1 Ceiling Joists

Unless specified or shown otherwise, ceiling joists shall be to the dimensions and spacings given in NZS 3604 Table 10.3.

Ceiling joists shall be installed parallel true to line and plane, and shall be joined directly over framing supports and lapped minimum 300mm, or butted and flitched, in accordance with NZS 3604 10.2.1.6.5.

Do not support ceiling joists from a strutting beam.

3.4.7.2 Purlins

Purlins shall be to the dimensions and spacings shown on the drawings and as required by the cladding material, and fixed to rafters and/or trusses in accordance with NZS 3604 Table 10.10 (purlins on their flat) and/or Table 10.11 (purlins on their edge).

Purlins on their flat shall be continuous over a minimum of two spans.

Provide all necessary blocking and lateral support to purlins laid on edge in accordance with NZS 3604

10.2.1.16.6, and as detailed.

Extend purlins to form gable verges as detailed and in accordance with NZS 3604 10.2.1.15.

3.4.7.3 Roof Trusses

Roof trusses shall be Specific Engineering Design (SED) in accordance with NZBC B1/VM1 and manufactured by an accredited fabricator, and shall comply with all aspects of NZS 3604 10.2.2. Roof trusses shall be fabricated to meet the specific design requirements of the roof including, but not limited to; roof layout, pitch, and details, in accordance with the drawings and specification. Roof trusses shall be supported and fixed to the truss fabricator's specifications but shall be no less than that required by NZS 3604 Tables 10.14 and 10.15. Roof trusses shall be braced as shown on the drawings and in accordance with NZS 3604 10.3.

3.4.7.4 Roof Bracing

Roof bracing shall be as shown on the drawings and in accordance with NZS 3604 10.3 and 10.4 as necessary.

3.4.8 Ceiling Framing

Unless specified or shown otherwise, timber ceiling battens shall be to the dimensions and spacings shown on the drawings and in accordance with NZS 3604: Table 13.1, and shall be installed true to line, level and plane, and fixed to the underside of floor joists, rafters, ceiling joists or truss chords in accordance with NZS 3604: Table 13.3.

Ceiling battens shall be of Merchantable grade or better timber complying with NZS 3631.

3.5 Shadowclad

3.5.1 Scope

12mm 'Shadowclad Ultra Groove' H3.1 LOSP treated plywood cladding to the wall surfaces shown on the drawings. All aspects of the work shall be in full accordance with the Shadowclad Specification and Installation Guide (Ph 0800 326 759 to confirm date of the most recent edition).

3.5.2 Preparation

3.5.2.1 Timber Frame, Building Wrap, Vented Cavity

Coordinate with all other trades to achieve correct conditions for the cladding installation.

Check that the timber wall framing complies with NZS 3604,or specific design, has studs at maximum 600mm centres and dwangs at maximum 800mm centres, is plumb and in true alignment, includes all blocking required for cavity battens fixing at openings, joints, corners and soffits etc., and has a maximum moisture content of 20% at the time of Shadowclad installation.

Check that the building wrap as specified has been installed in accordance with NZBC requirements and the manufacturers recommendations, and with all finishing tapes, flashings etc. at windows, doors, corners and penetrations all correctly incorporated to provide a continuous seal.

Where the studs are at greater than 450mm centres, check that appropriate additional restraint is correctly installed to the wrap, to keep bulk insulation from pushing the wrap into the cavity.

Check that all preparatory materials are lapped such that any water will run down to the exterior.

3.5.2.2 Timber Frame, Rigid Barrier, Vented Cavity

Coordinate with all other trades to achieve correct conditions for the cladding installation.

Check that the timber wall framing complies with NZS 3604,or specific design, has studs at maximum 600mm centres and dwangs at maximum 800mm centres, is plumb and in true alignment, includes all blocking required for cavity battens fixing at openings, joints, corners and soffits etc., and has a maximum moisture content of 20% at the time of Shadowclad installation.

Check that the rigid air barrier as specified has been installed in accordance with NZBC requirements and the manufacturers recommendations, with all finishing tapes, flashings etc. at windows, doors, corners and penetrations all correctly incorporated to provide a continuous seal.

Check that all preparatory materials are lapped such that any water will run down to the exterior.

3.5.3 Vertical Sheet Joins

Shiplap spaced 9mm.

Shiplap spaced 2mm with H3.1 LOSP treated 65 x 18mm battens with twice 6 x 6mm weather grooves in rear.

3.5.4 Panel Finish Coating

Paint or film-forming stain, minimum film build 90 microns.

Location:

3.5.5 Aluminium Flashing Finish

Mill Finish (for powder coating by others pre installation).

3.5.6 Internal Corner Backflashings

90° Angle.

Internal W Angle.

3.5.7 External Corner Backflashings

Shadowclad 90° Angle (back flashing internal corners). A 65 x 65mm aluminium back flashing, used on Shadolwclad external corners (cavity) with timber cover boards with 6x6mm weather grooves.

3.5.8 Horizontal Z Flashing

Include horizontal 'Z' flashing for horizontal joints between panels.

3.5.9 Workmanship

All Shadowclad installation work shall be carried out by skilled tradesmen experienced in cladding work and in full compliance with NZBC E2/AS1. Upon delivery, store plywood on four evenly spaced level bearers, and protect the plywood and flashings from rain dirt etc. Handle the plywood carefully, and reject any sheets with damaged edges or faces.

3.5.10 Installation

3.5.10.1 Durability Zone B or C (Cavity, Timber Frame)

Install the ventilated cavity base strip, the cavity battens, and the Shadowclad flashings in accordance with all NZBC E2/AS1 and Shadowclad requirements. Ensure additional cavity battens are provided for cladding junctions, openings edges, corners etc. as detailed or required. Cavity battens fixed sufficiently to hold in place until the cladding is installed. Ensure special nailing pattern is followed for cavity battens where Shadowclad is used as a bracing element.

Sheet setout as drawn for expressed or battened joints, otherwise neatly set out from corners, incorporating expansion gaps at vertical joins as noted. All sheet edges fully supported. Seal all cut edges of Shadowclad with Metalex Clear, and seal 150mm up the back face in potentially damp situations.

Fix at 150mm centres to all sheet edges, 7mm in from the sheet edge (except at top or bottom laps), and 300mm centres to all intermediate supports. Minimum timber framing fixings for cavity fix are 60 \times 2.8 nails or 8g \times 65mm screws, use hot dip galvanised (or better) fixings.

Note: special fixing requirements are required when the Shadowclad forms part of the bracing element, and allow additional length to suit when fixing over a rigid air barrier.

3.5.11 Completion

Ensure base clearances to E2/AS1 are provided. Ensure that those selecting the finish coating are aware that it must have a Light Reflectance Value of 40% or more for 50 year durability of bracing panels. Ensure the appropriate persons are aware of the Shadowclad maintenance requirements noted in the Shadowclad specification literature.

3.6 James Hardie HardieFlex Sheet

3.6.1 Scope

Supply and install James Hardie 7.5mm thick HardieFlex Sheets as a fibre-cement sheet cladding material to the walls identified on the drawings, complete with all accessories. The sheets are to be finished with a paint system.

All aspects of this work shall be in complete accordance with the <u>James Hardie HardieFlex Sheet</u>

<u>Technical Specification</u> (check <u>www.jameshardie.co.nz</u>, or call 0800 808 868 for the latest edition) and other relevant product manufacturers' recommendations.

3.6.2 Elements

To the areas noted as 'Fire-rated' on the drawings, additionally comply with all relevant aspects of the James Hardie Fire and Acoustic Design Manual (check on 0800 808 868 for the latest edition) and other relevant product manufacturers' recommendations.

3.6.3 Co-operation

Co-ordinate with other trades to ensure that appropriate clearances are allowed from roofing products and associated flashings etc, that the panels correctly allow for door and window installation, and that services penetrations are correctly handled to maintain full weathertightness and panel integrity.

Ensure that other trades are aware of the James Hardie Safe Working Practices.

3.6.4 Preparation

Check that the timber framing elements are in accordance with NZS 3604, or in accordance with NZS 3603 and AS/NZS 1170 for specific design, and in accordance with James Hardie requirements. Framing shall be plumb and in true alignment, complete and suitable for the panels, and maximum moisture content as per NZS 3602. Ensure that the framing is true in line with no projections due to structural and bracing bracketry etc. Ensure that the bottom plate hold-downs are correctly installed.

Check that the building underlay or rigid air barrier has been installed in full accordance with the manufacturer's requirements and the drawings, and completely finished to all penetrations including doors, windows, services, etc. Check junctions to all other building elements and ensure that all necessary works have been completed eg. flashings etc that will enable the panels and all accessories to be installed.

Check that the ground levels are sloping away from the building so that there will be no ponding water against the building, and that the ground will be remain clear of the panels by at least 100mm at all times in accordance with E2/AS1.

3.6.5 Sealant

Flexible silicone sealant to be SIKA Silaflex MS. Use to seal the sheets and accessories in accordance with the sealant manufacturer's recommendations and to James Hardie requirements. Ensure sealant compatibility with selected finish.

3.6.6 Workmanship

All installation work shall be carried out by an LBP, or supervised by an LBP, in accordance with James Hardie HardieFlex Sheet Technical Specification and other relevant product manufacturers' recommendations.

3.6.7 Delivery & Handling

Carry all sheets on edge. Stack sheets flat on a level platform off the ground ie. use the supplied delivery pallet on level ground (if no pallet then evenly spaced bearers on level ground at 600mm crs maximum). Keep sheets and accessories dry at all times. Avoid damage to sheet edges, ends, and surfaces. Keep uPVC flashings etc. out of direct sunlight, and store all accessories on flat and avoid

damage to any. All installers to be familiar with and comply with the James Hardie Safe Working Practices in the Technical Specification, to use appropriate safety gear, and in particular to be aware to avoid breathing silica dust. Do not use any damaged or blemished sheets or accessories.

3.6.8 Installation

Fix uPVC vent strip through the building underlay or rigid air barrier. Ensure that the openings in the vent strip are kept clear and unobstructed at all times. Fix H3.1 timber cavity battens through the building underlay or rigid air barrier to the framing. Install the sheets through the timber cavity battens and building underlay or rigid air barrier to the framing in accordance with the Technical Specification, complete with all accessories eg. mouldings, sealant, underflashings, etc. Sheet joints are to be formed on framing. Install James Hardie mould accessories to complete the installation.

Horizontal control joints to be formed on cavity batten framing with a uPVC 'h' mould control joint flashing. Ensure that the battens are not fixed to the floor joists.

Horizontal drainage joints to be formed at floor joist with folded Z-flashing as per E2/AS1 requirements. Ensure the panels are not fixed to the floor joists.

Ensure that all cut edges of panels are primed prior to installation with Dulux 1 Step Prep, Resene Quick Dry, or similar. Ensure that the bottom edge of the sheet overhangs below the bottom plate by 50mm, and is clear of the ground surface by at least 100mm; the finished ground clearance shall be in accordance with E2/AS1. Install flexible flashing tape to all junctions and penetrations (including cables etc), with the addition of a pipe bandage for pipes to maintain weathertightness and air pressure resistance, and seal around.

Horizontal drainage joints to be formed at floor joist level with aluminium 'h' mould. Ensure that the sheets are not fixed to the floor joists.

Where the sheets are performing as fire-rated elements, fix sheets and all accessories in complete accordance with the James Hardie Fire and Acoustic Design Manual and other relevant product manufacturers' recommendations.

Install H3.1 finger-jointed pine timber trim, scribers, eaves moulds, etc. to complete the sheet junctions as shown on the drawings.

3.6.9 Vertical Sheet Joins

Vertical joints to be formed with uPVC jointers.

3.6.10 Fixings

Fix timber cavity battens and other accessories with galvanised nails in accordance with James Hardie requirements.

Fix sheets with galvanised nails in accordance with James Hardie requirements.

3.6.11 Timber Cover Battens

Fix timber cover battens and other timber trim accessories with jolt-head Grade 316 stainless steel nails in accordance with JH requirements, punched below the surface and flushed with exterior grade builder's fill.

3.6.12 Completion

Ensure that the sheets have been fixed correctly, that all vertical joints and accessories have been completed correctly, and that all penetrations have been taped correctly.

Check that no damage has occurred to any installed sheet element or associated component, replace as necessary.

Check that no dirt has been mounded up within 175mm of the sheets, and maintain the clearance.

Ensure that the sheets are painted within 90 days of the sheet installation, complete with all accessories and flashings.

Hand over a copy of the latest edition of the James Hardie HardieFlex Sheet Product Warranty to the client. Hand over a copy of the latest James Hardie HardieFlex Sheet Maintenance Schedule to the client.

3.7 James Hardie Pre-Cladding

3.7.1 Scope

Supply and install RAB Board 6mm fibre-cement sheet as a rigid air barrier to the walls identified on the drawings, complete with all accessories. RAB Board 6mm is suitable for use in bracing application in residential applications. All aspects of this work shall be in complete accordance with the <u>James Hardie Rigid Air Barriers Installation Manual</u> (check <u>www.jameshardie.co.nz</u>, or call 0800 808 868 for the latest edition), <u>BRANZ Appraisal No.611 (2011)</u>, and other relevant product manufacturers' recommendations. Use the James Hardie RAB Board Installation Checklist at all relevant stages of the work.

3.7.2 Elements

To the areas noted as 'Fire-rated' on the drawings, additionally comply with all relevant aspects of the James Hardie Fire and Acoustic Design Manual (check on 0800 808 868 for the latest edition) and other relevant product manufacturers' recommendations.

To the areas noted as 'Bracing' on the drawings, additionally comply with all relevant aspects of the James Hardie Bracing Design Manual (check on 0800 808 868 for the latest edition) and other relevant product manufacturers' recommendations.

3.7.3 Co-operation

Co-ordinate with other trades to ensure that appropriate clearances are allowed from roofing products and associated flashings etc, that the panels correctly allow for door and window

installation, and that services penetrations are correctly handled to maintain full weathertightness and panel integrity.

Ensure that other trades are aware of the James Hardie Safe Working Practices.

3.7.4 Preparation

Check that the timber framing elements are in accordance with NZS 3604, or in accordance with NZS 3603 and AS/NZS 1170 for specific design, and in accordance with James Hardie requirements. Framing shall be plumb and in true alignment, complete and suitable for the panels, and maximum moisture content as per NZS 3602. Ensure that the framing is true in line with no projections due to structural and bracing bracketry etc. Ensure that the bottom plate hold-downs are correctly installed.

Check that the ground levels are sloping away from the building in accordance with E1/AS1, with no ponding water against the building, and that the ground will remain clear of the sheet by at least 100mm at all times.

3.7.5 Workmanship

All installation work shall be carried out by an LBP, or supervised by an LBP, in accordance with James Hardie Rigid Air Barriers Installation Manual and other relevant product manufacturers' recommendations.

3.7.6 Delivery & Handling

Carry all sheets on edge. Stack sheets flat on a level platform off the ground eg., use the supplied delivery pallet on level ground, or minimum 4 evenly spaced bearers on level ground. Keep sheets and accessories dry at all times. Avoid damage to sheet edges, ends, and surfaces. Keep uPVC flashings and jointers out of direct sunlight, and store all accessories on flat and avoid damage to any. All installers to be familiar with and comply with the James Hardie Safe Working Practices in the Installation Manual, to use appropriate safety gear, and in particular to be aware to avoid breathing silica dust. Do not use any damaged or blemished sheets or accessories.

3.7.7 Installation

Fix sheets vertically directly to framing in accordance with the Installation Manual.

Vertical joints on framing to be sealed with a joint sealing tape, for both non-bracing and bracing applications.

Ensure that all cut edges of sheets where exposed are primed prior to installation with Dulux 1 Step Prep, Resene Quick Dry, or similar. Ensure that the bottom edge of the sheet overhangs below the bottom plate by 15mm, and is clear of the ground surface by at least 100mm; the finished ground clearance shall be in accordance with E2/AS1. Install flexible flashing tape to all junctions and penetrations (including cables etc), with the addition of a pipe bandage for pipes to maintain weathertightness and air pressure resistance. Do not use sealant.

Where the sheets are performing as bracing elements, fix sheets and all accessories in complete accordance with James Hardie Bracing Design Manual and other relevant product manufacturers' recommendations.

Where the sheets are performing as fire-rated elements, fix sheets and all accessories in complete accordance with James Hardie Fire and Acoustic Design Manual and other relevant product manufacturers' recommendations.

3.7.8 Horizontal Joints

Horizontal joints to be formed at floor joist level with a uPVC flashing. Ensure that the sheets are not fixed to the floor joists.

3.7.9 Fixings

Fix sheets with galvanised nails in accordance with James Hardie requirements.

3.7.10 Completion

Ensure that the sheets have been fixed correctly, that all vertical joints and horizontal joints have been completed correctly, and that all penetrations have been taped correctly. Check that no damage has occurred to any installed sheet element or associated component, replace as necessary. Check that no dirt has been mounded up within 100mm of the sheet, and maintain the clearance. Ensure that the cladding is installed within 90 days of the sheet installation. Hand over a copy of the latest edition of the James Hardie Rigid Air Barriers Product Warranty to the client.

4 ROOFING

4.1 Preliminary

Refer to General Conditions of Contract and the Special Conditions in this Specification as appropriate. Read this section in conjunction with all other trade sections.

4.2 Compliance

Comply with the New Zealand Building Code 1992 including all revisions and amendments, Verification Methods where appropriate, and construction principles that are embodied in the Acceptable Solutions.

4.3 Metalcraft Roofing - Longrun Roofing

4.3.1 Scope

Supply and install the selected Metalcraft Roofing as a Roof Cladding to the roofs identified on the drawings complete with all accessories. All aspects of this work shall be in complete accordance with

Metalcraft Roofing guides and technical manuals, (check 0800 766 369 for the latest editions), and other relevant product manufacturers' recommendations, and as shown on the drawings.

No substitutions are permitted for Metalcraft Roofing Roof Cladding.

4.3.2 Co-operation

Co-operate with other trades to ensure that roof framing has appropriate spacings, alignments and fixings, and is in accordance with the drawings and NZS3604, and coordinate to ensure that all timber members required for ridges, hips, valleys, barges, penetrations, junctions with vertical faces, etc. are correctly in place.

Note and co-ordinate with the installer of the rainwater system specified.

Ensure that each section of roof is waterproofed as soon as possible after preparatory work is complete; allow to carry out the works in several operations if necessary to comply with this condition.

4.3.3 Material

Steel, 0.55mm BMT.

4.3.4 Product

Colorsteel Endura.

4.3.5 Profile

Metalcraft Roofing profile 'Corrugate'.

Location:

4.3.6 Colour

Colour to be selected by owner

4.3.7 Components & Accessories

Roof Flashings. Roof flashings shall be fabricated from the same material and coating as the roofing material, to maintain durability and compatibility requirements.

Unless otherwise noted or specified, flashings shall be formable grade 0.55 BMT, to the same standards as the profiled sheets, and notched or provided with a soft edge when installed across the cladding profile - in accordance with the manufacturer's requirements.

Flashings, flashing fastenings and fastening frequency shall be in accordance with the manufacturer's technical literature and the NZMRM Code of Practice.

Do not construct flashing joints and flashing junctions in a manner that rely entirely on sealant to maintain weathertightness.

4.3.8 Installation

All installation work shall be carried out by experienced and competent tradesmen who are familiar with the techniques and materials specified. All handling and fixing techniques, and all jointing and sealing materials and techniques, shall be exactly as recommended by Metalcraft Roofing. Handle

roofing without scratching, distortion or other damage, store on even bearers, and keep dry until installed.

Set-out the roofing sheets exactly square to building axis and maintain this accurate setout throughout the works, and set-out to lap sheets away from the prevailing wind. Install the underlay running up and down the slope with minimum 300mm side laps. Do NOT install any fixings to the underlay (to avoid dissimilar metals/electrolysis) - install the underlay length by length as the roofing proceeds and ensure it is taut and evenly lapped when the roofing screws are installed.

Ensure all roofing accessories are installed as the sheets are laid.

Protect the coated surface from damage at all times; replace the whole sheet where a significant depth of the coating has been damaged. Completely clean off all drill and power saw swarf and poprivet shanks as the work proceeds (at least daily, and keep them and other rubbish out of the spoutings). Remove trade debris from the roof and from the site progressively, and on completion leave the roof and rainwater system completely clean.

Do not use black lead pencils for marking prefinished roof cladding - permanent marking may result. Observe cladding manufacturer's recommendations where flues discharge above roofs, and for the installation of solar heating panels. Do NOT weld Colorsteel products. NO abrasive disc cutters, no soldering, no lead head nails or lead edged flashings, no touch-up paints, and do not slide tools down the roof.

Screw fix, screws to comply with AS3566 (Self-drilling construction screws) Class 4 and in accordance with Metalcraft Roofing recommendations. (Do NOT use stainless steel screws to fix prepainted cladding). Use only low carbon (<15%) non-conductive sealing washers. Screw at centres as required by Metalcraft Roofing Products, to fully comply with the Wind Zone requirements, purlins spacings etc. Screws for Colorsteel should be factory prepainted for an accurate colour match.

Use fixing systems that will accommodate thermal expansion for long lengths and/or dark colours. Fastening clips and brackets fixed in accordance with Metalcraft recommendations.

All jointing techniques, fixings and sealants to be in accordance with Metalcraft recommendations, as noted on the drawings, and shall be compatible with the roofing material and finish.

Ridges, hips, and barge flashings etc. shall all be matching Colorsteel or other, and as noted and detailed on the drawings. Soft zinc flashing edges neatly dressed down where required, plumbing penetrations custom flexible rubber flashed (fully sealed), and instruct the Plumber that no copper (or brass) pipes are to discharge on to the roof.

4.3.9 Completion

Sweep down completed roof and clean out spouting, gutters and rainwater pipes. Remove debris and unused material from site.

Issue to the Main Contractor a copy of the Metalcraft Roofing maintenance requirements together with the relevant Metalcraft Roofing Warranty for the completed works.

4.4 Metalcraft Roofing - Rainwater & Fascia Systems

4.4.1 Scope

Supply and install the selected Metalcraft Rainwater & Fascia Systems to the roofs identified on the drawings complete with all accessories. All aspects of this work shall be in complete accordance with Metalcraft Rainwater & Fascia Systems guides and technical manuals, (check 0800 766 369 for the latest editions), and other relevant product manufacturers' recommendations, and as shown on the drawings.

No substitutions are permitted for Metalcraft Rainwater & Fascia Systems products.

4.4.2 Co-operation

Co-operate with other trades to ensure that all preliminary and preparatory works, including membranes, wraps, framing, claddings and trims, and any other related works, are completed to specification and as shown on the drawings.

Coordinate with trades the locations of pipes, outlets, cables, meter boards and other fittings installed by others.

4.4.3 Material

Steel - 0.55mm BMT.

4.4.4 Product

Colorsteel Endura.

4.4.5 Spouting Profile

Box Gutter 175mm.

4.4.6 Downpipe Profile

Round Downpipe. Round downpipe diameters shall be to the Metalcraft range as noted on the drawings, and manufactured from the material specified.

Rectangular Downpipe, 75mm x 55mm.

4.4.7 Preparation

Check all aspects of preparatory works, including but not limited to:-

Check that the timber framing complies with NZS 3604, is in true alignment and includes all blocking required for joints, corners and soffits etc., and has a maximum moisture content of 24% at the time of Metalcraft Rainwater & Fascia Systems installation.

Check that all preparatory materials are lapped such that any water will run down to the exterior.

4.4.8 Installation

4.4.8.1 Workmanship

All installation work shall be carried out by experienced and competent tradesmen who are familiar with the techniques and materials specified. All handling and fixing techniques, and all jointing and sealing materials and techniques, shall be exactly as recommended by Metalcraft Roofing. Handle spouting and fascia without scratching, distorting or damaging.

Protect the coated surface from damage at all times; replace the whole section where a significant depth of the coating has been damaged. Completely clean off all drill and power saw swarf as the work proceeds.

Screw fixings shall be in accordance with Metalcraft Roofing requirements and as noted on the drawings, and of a compatible material and finish with the fascia, spouting, and spouting brackets. Exposed screws should be factory prepainted for an accurate colour match. Support brackets fixed in accordance with Metalcraft Roofing recommendations.

4.4.8.2 Spouting

Screw fix spouting brackets, true to line, at maximum 900mm centres and to falls as shown on the drawings. Form spouting joints and downpipe droppers in strict accordance with Metalcraft recommendations. Locate downpipe droppers to the set-out shown on the drawings.

4.4.8.3 Downpipes

Downpipes and spreaders setout and installed complete with bends as shown on the drawings. All joints lapped and sealed to Metalcraft recommendations. Screw fix down pipes plumb to walls with matching support brackets. Direct downpipes into stormwater system as noted on the drawings.

4.4.8.4 Completion

Clean up thoroughly and remove debris and unused material from site.

Issue to the Main Contractor a copy of the Metalcraft Roofing Rainwater Systems maintenance requirements together with the Metalcraft Roofing Rainwater Systems Warranty for the completed works.

4.5 Workmanship

4.5.1 Guarantees

The whole of the roof covering work shall be complete in all respects and absolutely watertight. Commencement of roofing works by any Subcontractor indicates their full agreement to and acceptance of an unwritten guarantee to maintain the whole of their work in a satisfactory and watertight condition, and to arrange and pay for any damage consequential upon the failure of their materials or workmanship, for the periods stated below, irrespective of the 90 day general maintenance period.

- Butyl roofer ten years from completion.
- Galvanised steel roofer two years after completion.

- Aluminium roofer ten years after completion.
- Acrylic/f.glass roofer ten years after completion.

4.5.2 Co-operation

Co-operate with other trades to ensure that framed roofing substrates have appropriate spacings, alignments and fixings, and to ensure that sheet roofing substrates have the correct edge and central fixings, appropriate alignments and gradients, edge priming if necessary, and are completely clean.

Ensure that each section is waterproofed as soon as possible after preparatory work is complete; allow to carry out the works in several operations if necessary to comply with this condition.

4.5.3 Alternatives

Tenderers are invited to submit a price variation for similar roofing products. Consideration of finished roofs in the alternative product and the extent that drawings will need to be modified to incorporate it will be the main items in the decision on the alternative proposed.

4.6 Roofing Systems - Profiled Steel

4.6.1 Scope

Supply standard corrugated profile 0.55BMTxG300 galvanized steel roofing and install it to the areas shown on the Roof Plan. All handling and fixing techniques, and all jointing and sealing materials and techniques, shall be exactly as recommended by the roofing manufacturer.

4.6.2 Preparation

Co-operate to ensure that roof framing has appropriate spacings and fixings, is in accordance with NZS 3604, and coordinate to ensure that all timber members required for ridges, hips, valleys, barges, penetrations, junctions with vertical faces, etc. are correctly in place. Lap sheets away from the prevailing wind. Set-out the roofing sheets exactly square to the building axis and maintain this throughout the works.

4.6.3 Fixings

4.6.3.1 Fixings - Corrugated Steel Roofing

Screw fix with screws that comply with AS 3566 (Self-drilling construction screws) Class 3 or 4. Use only low carbon (15% or less content) non-conductive sealing washers. Screw at centres as advised by the local Rollformer, to fully comply with the Wind Zone requirements, purlins spacings etc. Use fixing systems that will accommodate thermal expansion for long lengths. NO use of abrasive disc cutters.

4.6.4 Flashing

Ridges, hips, and barge flashings etc. shall all be matching galvanized steel, and as detailed. Soft edge flashings very neatly dressed down where required, plumbing penetrations custom flexible rubber flashed (fully sealed), and instruct the Plumber that no copper (or brass) pipes are to discharge on to the roof.

4.6.5 Completion

Protect the galvanizing from damage at all times; replace the whole sheet where a significant depth of the coating has been damaged. Completely clean off all drill and power saw swarf and pop-rivet shanks as the work proceeds (at least daily, and keep them and other rubbish out of the spoutings).

4.7 Underlay, Foil & DPC

4.7.1 Scope

Supply and install Underlays, Foil and DPC materials, as specified herein, to the locations identified on the drawings, complete with all accessories required for proper installation and performance. All aspects of this work shall be in accordance with the product manufacturer's technical literature and installation requirements, other relevant product manufacturers' recommendations, and as shown on the design drawings.

This specification should be read in conjunction with other relevant specification sections as they are interrelated.

4.7.2 Requirements

4.7.2.1 Safety

Comply with the Health and Safety at Work Act 2015 (HSWA), and with all relevant Health and Safety at Work Regulations 2016, and with all relevant WorkSafe New Zealand (WorkSafe) Approved Codes of Practice and WorkSafe Information and Guidance, particularly those for construction and building maintenance.

4.7.2.2 Inspections

Inspections shall take place at each of the stages as scheduled in the Building Consent. Confirm a written programme to facilitate these inspections, including notification when each stage of the work is ready for inspection.

If this contract is for exemption the Registard Roofing instaler will provide a PS3 at compleation of works and it will be lodged with the property file. The Owner is responsable for sorting this.

4.7.2.3 Co-operation

Co-operate with other trades to ensure that all preliminary and preparatory works are completed to specification and as shown on the drawings.

Coordinate with other trades as required to install underlays, foils and DPC.

4.7.2.4 Workmanship

Where required by the NZ Building Act 2004 it is the building contractor's responsibility to ensure that all restricted building work is carried out by a Licensed Building Practitioner.

All installation work shall be carried out by experienced and competent tradespersons, familiar with the specified products and installation techniques, in accordance with the manufacturer's requirements, and to fully comply with all warranty requirements.

All cutting, joining, fixing and sealing techniques shall be exactly as recommended by the manufacturer, and carried out with the use of suitable tools and equipment appropriate for the application. All work shall be such as to leave a neat, efficient, and weathertight installation.

4.7.2.5 Delivery & Handling

Inspect materials for damage and defects upon delivery; reject any damaged or defective products, and immediately contact the supplier for replacement. Do not used damaged or defective products, or products that are beyond their designated shelf life.

Store underlay rolls on end, under cover in a clean, dry environment, in accordance with the manufacturer's recommendations. Keep stored products dry, out of direct sunlight, and protected from damage, moisture and contamination at all times.

Handle products in accordance with the manufacturer's requirements, and in a manner that prevents damage to the product and does not reduce its performance.

Installers shall be familiar with and comply with the manufacturer's safe handling requirements and precautions for use, and shall use appropriate safety gear when handling materials.

Installers shall conform with all relevant <u>WorkSafe NZ</u> Guidelines and Codes of Practice - including the <u>OSH Guidelines For the Provision of Facilities and General Safety in the Construction Industry</u>, and the Best practice guidelines for working on roofs for roofing installations.

4.7.2.6 Completion

Check underlay, flashing tape, etc., have been installed correctly, and that all edges, joins and ends are correctly finished prior to closing off with wall/roof cladding.

Check for damage and defective work - replace and/or repair as necessary to the required standard in accordance with the manufacturer's requirements.

Leave all of this work complete, free of damage and defects, and to the standard required for the installation of subsequent cladding and/or roofing, and in accordance with all warranty requirements.

Remove all associated rubbish and excess material from the site.

5 ALUMINIUM JOINERY

5.1 Preliminary

Refer to General Conditions of Contract and the Special Conditions in this Specification as appropriate. Read this section in conjunction with all other trade sections.

5.2 Compliance

Comply with the New Zealand Building Code 1992 including all revisions and amendments, Verification Methods where appropriate, and construction principles that are embodied in the Acceptable Solutions.

5.3 Aluminium Windows & Doors

5.3.1 Alternatives

The materials and elements specified indicate the required standards for these works. Alternatives which are equal to or superior to these materials and elements may be tendered for approval.

Thermal performance (NZBC H1/AS1) must be as required to meet the Designer's Thermal Evaluation.

5.3.2 Installation Type

5.3.2.1 Timber Frame Installation - Cavity Construction

All windows (and aluminium frame external doors) installation work shall be exactly in accordance with NZBC E2/AS1, the Windows Association's Windows Installation System (WANZ:WIS), and details on the drawings or supplied by the windows manufacturer.

Check framing alignment, and that window openings are square and the correct size for fitting tolerances.

Prepare framing openings by neatly cutting the building wrap at 45° into the corners, turning wrap through the frame depth and fixing to the inside face, flashing the bottom corners with moulded

plastic and over-flashing the full sill and 200mm up the jambs with the specified flexible flashing tape, stapled to hold the stretched external corners. At head corners install flashing tape 200mm each way from the corners.

Install the WANZ extruded aluminium support bar with built in drainage and ventilation to NZBC E2, to provide continuous support to the window unit. Install the head cavity closer, positioned to provide a 15mm drip edge to the cladding.

Set shims or pack as necessary and install the frames exactly true and square, blocked-up off the support bar as required. Use appropriate separators between aluminium and other materials, and fix securely with due regard for any anticipated movements and for linings, trim etc.

Install the head flashing, extending 35mm up behind the cladding (and in turn over-flashed with an additional piece of wrap cover extended up under the wrap or flashing or eaves above), sloping at 15° down to the exterior, and turning down to cover the top of the aluminium frame by at least 10mm, before finishing with a 5mm 45° 'kick out'. Upstand the head flashing ends as detailed. Install jamb flashings/ sealant or scribers as detailed.

After frames installation install closed cell backing rods as required and expanding foam air-seal the gap between framing and liners.

5.3.3 Interior Finish

Architraved.

5.3.4 Reveal

Timber reveals for paint finish with all sides primed. Min treatment H3.1 or hardwood

5.3.5 Glass Platform

Single Glazed.

5.3.6 Finish

5.3.6.1 Powder Coated Aluminium - Semi Gloss

Polyester powder coating in accordance with WANZ Powder Coating Quality Assurance System and AAMA 2603-98 performance is required.

5.3.7 Hardware

Hardware colour matched to Aluminium Joinery.

Hinges, stays, catches, fasteners, latches, locks and furniture as offered by the window and door manufacturer. Key alike all lockable window hardware able to be keyed alike.

Account for all keys and deliver separately to the site manager. Factory fit all required and scheduled hardware.

5.3.8 Workmanship

These windows will be manufacturerd in workshops containing all mechanical equipment appropriate for the work, and by experienced and competent tradesmen who are familiar with the techniques and materials specified.

The manufacturer will co-ordinate with other trades to establish the exact sizes for all frames before fabrication. Frames and sashes will be fabricated true, square, rigid, and 'out of wind', with all joints strongly mechanically fixed, and with mitres tight and fully sealed. Potential thermal, wind and seismic movements will be accommodated within the construction. All cavities will drain to the exterior, and all drilling swarf etc. will be removed during fabrication.

Stays, hinges, running gear and glazing will be installed as scheduled (the Designer will be notified if any scheduled hardware of fixing position appears to be inappropriate for this project).

Hardware will be fixed true to line and position, and adjusted and oiled as required for correct operation.

Glass will be cut true and square, sized to provide correct edge clearances, blocked into place as required, and all units will be delivered either pressure fit, pocket glaze, or beaded/wedged, unless site glazing is required. Glazing gaskets will be compatible with all adjacent materials, and cut 1% over-length to absolutely avoid stretching during installation. Frames will be braced etc. as necessary for transportation to the site.

Flashings as detailed will be supplied. Flashing materials will be compatible with the windows.

5.3.9 Delivery and Installation

Comply with the New Zealand Building Code 1992 including all revisions and amendments, Verification Methods where appropriate, and the construction principles that are embodied in the Acceptable Solutions.

Arrange for delivery of windows to the site only when a suitable storage situation is available for them, handle the windows in accordance with the manufacturers requirements, avoid any frame distortion, avoid rubbing damage, avoid contact with concrete, plaster, mud etc. and keep them dry. Retain protective coverings for as long as possible, and remove them at completion.

Experienced and competent tradesmen who are familiar with the techniques and materials specified shall carry out all installation work. Fix in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions. Take utmost care to avoid damage to anodized or powder coated surfaces - correction of any such disfigurement requires written authority - replace any badly damaged items.

Use fixings compatible with the materials involved, as recommended by the windows manufacturer and to comply with the DWP requirements, basically aluminium or Type 316 stainless steel where exposed externally; galvanized to AS/NZS 4680, 610g/m2, may be used where not exposed.

Thoroughly check all preparatory work to openings prior to installation, including underlay, corner seal tapes, adjacent cladding, pre-installed flashings, waterproofing systems etc. as appropriate. Use

inert barriers or coatings to prevent contact between dissimilar metals or between aluminium and concrete.

Install flashings as detailed and supplied by the windows manufacturer, installed tightly and neatly with absolute minimum tolerances, with head weathering jamb, jamb weathering sill, and sill open (draining) to exterior. Except where the window is recessed all head flashings shall extend 30mm minimum beyond the frame.

Air-seal all frame perimeters to adjacent structure to a depth of 15 - 20mm with expanding foam or appropriate sealant including a PEF rod at head, sill and jambs to retard the spread of sealant.

Weather-seal frame jambs etc. to adjacent surfaces (or to each other) as detailed or as required by the windows manufacturer, to achieve a fully watertight installation. In preparation for sealant the joints shall be clean, dry, and primed if necessary. Insert closed cell polyethylene backer rods or a polyethylene tape slip layer if required. Mask adjacent surfaces if appropriate, install the sealant fully in accordance with the sealant manufacturer's recommendations, and finish to even smooth surfaces.

Remove trade debris progressively, appropriately clean any affected adjacent surfaces, thoroughly clean the windows, check that all hardware is in full working order, and provide safety indication of the glass for the balance of adjacent works.

6 PAINTING & DECORATING

6.1 Preliminary

Refer to General Conditions of Contract and the Special Conditions in this Specification as appropriate. Read this section in conjunction with all other trade sections.

6.2 Compliance

Comply with the New Zealand Building Code 1992 including all revisions and amendments, Verification Methods where appropriate, and construction principles that are embodied in the Acceptable Solutions.

Comply with all relevant provisions and recommendations of:

6.3 General

6.3.1 Alternatives

The materials specified in this section or on the drawings indicate the required standards for these works. Alternatives which are considered equal to or superior to these may be tendered for approval (in writing, and they must NOT be used unless they are approved in writing).

6.3.2 Preparation

No painting or varnishing or other surface coating work shall be undertaken unless the surfaces to be coated are in a correct and proper condition to ensure first class results.

Inspect the works of other trades on which Painter work is scheduled and report to the Main Contractor and the Architect/Designer any defects or irregularities that would affect the permanency or finish of the painting work, and do not proceed until the defects or irregularities have been completely rectified. Failure to examine and report will be construed as an acceptance that all preparatory works are completely satisfactory.

This clause does not relieve the Painter of any of the usual preparatory work to surfaces customarily performed by this trade.

Clean down all surfaces with sugar soap, strippers, mould killers, etching agents, etc. as required. Sand or rub all sharp edges off exterior timbers and other materials as appropriate before painting. Finish rub down ALL surfaces. Ensure that the moisture content of all substrates is appropriate. Remove locks, fastenings, and similar hardware before painting and refix on completion. Remove all electrical switch and power plates before painting and refix them on completion. Mask adjacent surfaces as required to a true line and remove the masking on completion. Dust and wipe down all

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surfaces for Painter work and completely remove all dust, rubbish, dirt etc. from areas involved immediately prior to commencement. To each area of the works complete all surface preparation before applying paint to any surface.

6.3.3 Protection

Take adequate precautions to prevent paint spots falling on prefinished or similar surfaces, and extreme care to keep absorbent materials (e.g. cedar, sawn framing, decking, paving) completely clean during all adjacent painting work. Correction of any such disfigurement shall be to the Architect/Designer's approval.

6.3.4 Qualifications

All work by the Painting Subcontractor shall be of the highest reasonable standard, and executed by experienced and competent tradesmen to the Architect/Designer's approval.

6.3.5 Workmanship

Strictly adhere to all Manufacturers' instructions.

Strictly observe Manufacturers' requirements with regard to surface and air temperatures for painting. No work shall be carried out on surfaces that are not completely dry, and no external work shall be carried out during damp or wet conditions.

In all finishes any irregularities or brushmarks or dust etc. in each preceding coat shall be rubbed down to provide a smooth clean surface for the following coat. Each coat shall be finished over all surfaces before a further coat is applied, and each coat shall be completely dry before subsequent coats. Finish broad areas before painting trim, paint ceilings before walls and walls before joinery, trim and other items.

Each coat and the full completed system shall be of uniform finish, colour, texture and sheen, shall have proper covering of thin edges, corners, end grain etc. and shall be free of blemishes such as runs, sags, fat edges, entrained hairs, brush marks, starved patches etc.

6.3.6 General

The schedules indicate the general extent of the works to be carried out but are in no way exhaustive in their description of the actual items for painter work. Complete all work necessary for the proper and entire completion of the works. All items and portions of items reasonably inferable but not specifically mentioned are deemed included, i.e. cupboard interiors, the top and bottom of doors, unseen cabinetry tops, etc. All doors shall have equal painter work on ALL surfaces.

Where timber work is specified for priming before fixing the priming shall be thoroughly brushed in to all surfaces, and all exterior timber work for paint finishing shall be fully primed within one week of fixing. Should more than one month elapse between priming and undercoating the timber shall be fully reprimed.

Stopping up work shall be carried out immediately the priming or sealing coat is dry, and shall be solidly placed to finish clean and dry. Stopping tinted to match the timber for clear finished work.

Paint putties within one month of glazing timber frames; paint to impinge on glass to assist sealing.

6.3.7 Materials

All Painter materials shall be ready mixed and delivered in unopened containers. Materials shall be used only for the purpose and in the manner intended by the manufacturer; any apparent scheduled discrepancy in this respect shall be referred to the Architect/Designer immediately for clarification.

Where surfaces are specified to be finished in a particular manner or material, all preparatory work, priming, or undercoating, that is necessary to ensure a proper finish shall be provided, irrespective of any apparent omission herein.

Thinning shall only be to manufacturer's specification. Thoroughly stir as required to lift any settled pigment and ensure the paint is homogeneous. Paints shall be factory or shop tinted to the colour required. Undercoats shall be fully tinted to match the final colour scheduled. All paints shall have the finished film thickness that is specified by the manufacturer (checked by monitoring the coverage per litre).

6.3.8 Completion

Allow to touch up to approval any Painter work which is damaged during the finishing works of other trades. Replace all hardware, remove all masking, covers, containers etc., thoroughly clean all affected surfaces, and leave all spaces ready for immediate occupation. Avoid scratching or abrading glass or hardware during any cleaning.

7 PLUMBING

7.1 Preliminary

Refer to General Conditions of Contract and the Special Conditions in this Specification as appropriate. Read this section in conjunction with all other trade sections.

7.2 Compliance

Comply with the New Zealand Building Code 1992 including all revisions and amendments, Verification Methods where appropriate, and construction principles that are embodied in the Acceptable Solutions.

Comply with all relevant provisions and recommendations of:

7.3 General

Carry out all works necessary to leave the water, waste, vent and soil systems serving the sanitary fittings and the plumbing hardware shown on the drawings or specified below in correct working order complete with all ancillary systems (safetrays, floor drains, overflows, relief valves, etc.) required, and with all normal incidentals customarily installed by this trade.

Comply with the Building Code, Territorial Authority By-laws and statutory authority Regulations as appropriate. Obtain all necessary permits and consents, serve all necessary notices, arrange for all tests and pay all fees and customary charges in connection with the required works.

7.4 Rheem Domestic Electric Water Heaters

7.4.1 Scope

Supply, install and commission the selected Rheem Domestic Electric Water Heaters to the locations shown on the drawings, complete with all necessary fittings and accessories for proper operation and functionality. All aspects of this work shall be in strict accordance with Rheem technical literature and installation requirements (check www.rheem.co.nz, or call 0800 657 336 for the latest editions), other relevant product manufacturers' recommendations, with all relevant Standards, Regulations and Acts, and the Plumbing specification, and as shown on the drawings.

No substitutions are permitted for Rheem Domestic Electric Water Heaters.

7.4.2 Mains Pressure Electric Water Heaters

Rheem 312025 Mains Pressure Electric Vitreous Enamel Water Heater. 25 litre storage capacity, mains pressure supply, single electric heating element. Galvanised steel casing - suitable for indoor installations only, 405mm diameter x 385mm high, left hand connection.

Maximum 70°C, minimum 60°C thermostat settings. 1000kPa maximum working pressure.

240V/50Hz electrical connection, 2.4kW maximum load.

Standard magnesium anode. 15kg approximate weight when empty.

Location:

7.4.3 Co-operation

Co-operate with other trades to ensure that all preliminary and preparatory works are completed to specification and as shown on the drawings prior to installation.

Co-ordinate with all trades to install Rheem Domestic Electric Water Heaters and accessories as required.

7.4.4 Workmanship

Rheem Domestic Electric Water Heater installation shall be carried out by experienced tradesmen, familiar with the specified products and installation techniques, under the direct supervision of a NZ certified Registered Plumber, in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions and with the requirements of AS/NZS 3500.4, AS/NZS 3000, NZBC G12, and with all local codes and regulatory authority requirements.

Electrical wiring and prescribed electrical work (by others) shall be carried out by a qualified electrician in accordance with the electrical standards and regulations and the Electrical specification.

Adequately protect all surrounding work surfaces during installation. Any damage to fittings or finished surfaces shall be made good by the appropriate trade at the Plumber's expense.

7.4.5 Delivery & Handling

Store Rheem Domestic Electric Water Heaters and accessories under cover on a flat surface in accordance with the manufacturer's recommendations. Keep products clean and dry, and protect from damage and contamination. Do not use damaged or defective products. Handle Rheem products in accordance with the manufacturer's recommendations.

7.4.6 Installation

Install the selected Rheem Domestic Electric Water Heaters, complete with accessories, to the locations shown on the drawings in accordance with the Rheem Installation Instructions and complying with the New Zealand Building Code.

Ensure that the required clearances are provided for the servicing and removal of the water heater and accessories, and that the water heater information label / rating plate and thermostat can be viewed and read when installed.

Ensure that the pipework is correctly sized and that a non-return valve is installed on the cold water line to the water heater. Provide a 50mm minimum clear opening around pipes and fittings connected to the water heater that pass through the support platform or floor.

Where required, install a safe tray below the water heater to prevent water damage to the building or property in the event of a leak.

Install a suitable moisture barrier under indoor water heaters installed on a concrete surface that is not fully cured or prone to dampness.

Ensure that the water heater sacrificial anode, if fitted, is the correct anode type. Seismically restrain water heaters in accordance with NZBC G12/AS1 6.11.4, or Section 203 of NZS 4603, or with the specific design shown on the drawings.

Connect Rheem water heaters to the mains pressure hot and cold water system, with all necessary safety devices, valves, fittings and accessories, to achieve the required operation performance and functionality.

Install relief valve drains to expansion control valves and pressure relief valves in accordance with NZBC G12/AS1 or AS/NZS 3500.4, and follow all requirements when water heaters are located where freezing is likely.

Electrical connections to water heaters must be made in complete accordance with AS/NZS 3000 and the Rheem Installation Instructions. A 20mm flexible conduit is required for the electrical cable to the water heater. The power supply to the water heater must not be switched on until the water heater is filled and a satisfactory megger reading is obtained.

Commission Rheem Domestic Electric Water Heaters in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions.

7.4.7 Completion

Check that the Rheem Domestic Electric Water Heaters have been installed correctly and have been commissioned and are operating at the required performance and functionality. Check that pipework connections are leak free. Check that the water heaters are properly restrained against earthquake forces.

Check for damage, defects, faults and leaks and replace/repair as necessary.

Leave the works area clean and free of rubbish. Remove rubbish and waste material from the site.

Issue to the Owner a copy of the Rheem Domestic Electric Water Heater maintenance requirements and a copy of the Rheem Warranty for the installed water heaters.

Issue all As-Built Documentation required to the relevant parties.

7.5 Workmanship

7.5.1 Co-operation

Co-operate with all other trades. Attend upon Concretor, Drainlayer and Carpenter to set out the exact positions of pipe runs before adjacent work is put in hand, and to ensure that all pipes, sleeves, fixings, flashings etc. are correctly incorporated into the structure as construction proceeds.

7.5.2 Workmanship

All plumbing work shall be carried out by, or under the direct control of, properly qualified tradesmen, and shall be to recognised high standards.

The cutting away and checking of timbers shall be limited to such dimensions as will not prejudice the purpose for which the timber is used; observe NZS 3604 restrictions on the holing and checking of

joists and beams. Chasing and checking of other materials only to approval. Install seismic restraints to storage tanks and HWCs.

Weatherseal wherever pipes, screws, bolts or other fastenings penetrate an external surface, and particularly roofing; seal with gaskets, flashings (and overflashings if necessary) or mastic as appropriate - any damage that results from failure of such seals will be made good at the Plumber's expense.

Adequately protect all surfaces. Any damage to fittings or surfaces made good by the appropriate trade at the Plumber's expense.

7.5.3 Pipework

Joints between pipes of different materials shall always be to the approval of the TA Plumbing Inspector.

Pipework set-out neatly with a minimum number of bends, and more or less parallel to and at right angles to structural elements - avoid diagonal piping.

All internal pipework shall be concealed except where otherwise is either shown or approved. Exposed pipework shall be accurately and neatly run. Arrange all pipework (and particularly traps) in a manner which will allow maximum future accessibility for repairs or maintenance. Arrange for access panels to any primary maintenance positions, and install conveniently located isolating valves for each group of fittings. Wingbacks securely and squarely fixed. Crox unions usually acceptable only at the final connection to fittings. Install white plastic flanges where pipes penetrate linings in visible locations.

Where pipes are covered with nail fixed linings and trim ensure that their positions are marked on the linings to minimise the risk of subsequent nailings penetrating the pipe. Any such damage shall be rectified immediately, with all consequential damage made good.

Set pipework out in straight runs to even gradients. Fix all pipes to the structure sufficiently to fully support and to prevent sagging or vibration. Clips and saddles shall be the same material as the pipe. Exterior pipes on stand-off brackets. Fixings to the exterior or damp locations shall all be hot dip galvanized unless otherwise noted. Sleeves for pipes or drains penetrating concrete or masonry shall be uPVC, 20mm minimum larger internal diameter than the external diameter of the pipe, finished flush with concrete or masonry, and packed and mastic sealed.

Close open ends of the systems during construction to prevent the entry of foreign matter.

7.5.4 Temperature Movement

All work shall respect in full all probable thermal movements - layouts, fixings and jointings shall be arranged to allow thermal movement without risk of prejudice to watertight conditions, or risk of damage from straining of the pipes which will generate failures.

In particular, observe best local trade practice to avoid problems arising from freezing conditions.

7.5.5 Excavation

Allow to carry out all excavation that is required to suit the services installed by this trade. Check for other services before excavation. Trenches true to line and level, base of trenches clear of loose material, and shore trenches as required to suit the ground conditions. Backfilling shall be carried out by this trade, and be to the requirements specified in Siteworks.

7.5.6 Testing

All plumbing services shall be completed in stages which will allow for proper testing under normal working pressures prior to the application of insulation, concealment or other enclosure. Testing of piped water services shall be by hydrostatic testing in accordance with AS/NZS 3500.1 and shall not show any leakage when subjected to a hydrostatic pressure of 1500kPa for a period of not less than 30 minutes. All leaks remedied and retested. On completion the whole of the plumbing services to be subjected to full operational tests in the presence of the plumbing inspector, with any defects revealed in these tests properly remedied.

7.5.7 Warranties

Warranty cards and manufacturer's guarantees for all items supplied and installed by this trade shall be correctly filled in and handed over at Practical Completion.

7.6 Materials

7.6.1 Materials

Materials shall be delivered with packaging and labeling intact. Incidentals (jointing compounds, PTFE tape, seals, washers, silfos, solvent cements, etc.) shall be completely appropriate for the application involved. The use of imperfect items or items damaged in any way is always subject to approval.

7.6.2 Alternatives

The materials and elements specified indicate the required standards for these works. Alternatives which are equal to or superior to these materials and elements may be tendered for approval.

7.6.3 Materials Separation

Separate dissimilar metals in any circumstances which could produce contact or electrolytic action by a water film, with thick plastic tape, bituminous felt or other inert material. Pipes in contact with or built into concrete or masonry shall be fully spiral wrapped in Denso tape or equal.

8 DRAINLAYING

8.1 Preliminary

Refer to General Conditions of Contract and the Special Conditions in this Specification as appropriate. Read this section in conjunction with all other trade sections.

8.2 Compliance

Comply with the New Zealand Building Code 1992 including all revisions and amendments, Verification Methods where appropriate, and construction principles that are embodied in the Acceptable Solutions.

8.3 General

Carry out all required works to leave the sewer and stormwater systems shown on the drawings in correct working order complete with all normal incidentals.

Comply with Local Authority By-laws and Health Department Regulations as appropriate. Obtain all necessary permits and consents, serve all necessary notices, arrange all tests and pay all fees and customary charges in connection with the works.

8.4 Workmanship

8.4.1 General

Carry out all required works to leave the sewer and stormwater systems shown on the drawings in correct working order complete with all normal incidentals. Comply with Local Authority By-laws and Health Department Regulations as appropriate. Obtain all necessary permits and consents, serve all necessary notices, arrange all tests and pay all fees and customary charges in connection with the works.

8.4.2 Co-operation

Cooperate with all trades and attend upon the Concretor and Plumber to set out exact pipe runs before any adjacent work is put in hand and ensure that all sleeves etc. are correctly incorporated as work proceeds.

8.4.3 Materials

All pipes and other materials shall comply with the appropriate Standards, and shall be protected from damage of any kind until installation is complete. All incidentals appropriate for the applications involved. Concrete shall be 17.5MPa and as specified under Concretor, Mortar shall be as specified in Blocklayer.

8.4.4 Workmanship

All drainlaying shall be carried out by, or under direct control of, properly qualified tradesmen, and shall be to recognised high standards. Ensure cast-in items are installed when required so that no delay is caused by this trade. Adequately protect all adjacent surfaces - clean down to remove dirt etc., and any damage shall be made good by the appropriate trade at the Drainlayer's expense.

On completion of drainlaying clean up full area affected by this trade to the condition it was in before drainlaying commenced.

Site is to be returned as close as possible to its present condition on completion of the contract.

8.4.5 Excavation

As required for sewer and stormwater. Check for other service lines before excavation - the Drainlayer is responsible for making good any damage. Trenches true to line and with even gradients between gullies, soil stack terminations or downpipes, etc.

Keep the bottom of trenches clear of loose material. All pipes shall be laid in appropriate bedding material, compacted as required. Shore trenches if required to suit ground conditions. Backfilling shall be by this trade, to the standards required in Siteworks.

The contract will not be deemed to be complete until the Electrician has provided an Electrical Certificate of Compliance (made available to the Contractor in time for the Code Compliance Certificate application).

Obtain all necessary permits and consents, serve all notices and pay all fees in and customary charges connection with the works.

The position of switches, light and power outlets and other fittings, although shown specifically in some instances, are in general only shown diagrammatically. The exact location of each of these items will be as directed on site by the Architect/Designer; the Electrician shall give reasonable notice of when this information is required. Items positioned in contravention of this shall be repositioned if directed, including rewiring if necessary, all at the Electrician's expense.

Unless drawn (on 1:20 wall elevations) or specified otherwise the mounting height to the centreline of the following items above the floor shall be:

- -1000mm for lighting switches;
- -2000mm for wall mounted lights;
- -2100mm for the bayonet of pendant lights;
- -300mm for power points, except at benches.

(Notify the Architect/Designer if either the actual fitting or mounting position seem to make the mounting height noted above inappropriate).

Warranty cards and manufacturers guarantees for items supplied and installed by this trade shall be filled in correctly and handed over at Practical Completion. Arrange all circuits to obtain an optimum balance of the system, and check and reconnect where necessary to achieve this on completion. Leave the works clean and tidy and in full operational order.

9.3.2 Co-operation

Co-operate with all other trades and attend upon the Concretor and Carpenter to set out all required penetrations and to ensure that all wiring and fittings are correctly incorporated as work proceeds. The Carpenter will provide and fix all necessary dwangs and timber supports in locations determined by the Electrician.

9.3.3 Workmanship

All electrical work shall be carried out by, or under the direct control of, registered tradesmen, and shall be to recognized high standards. All work shall be such as to leave a neat, efficient and robust installation. Neatly label switchboards to identify each circuit.

The cutting away and checking of timbers shall be limited to such dimensions as will not prejudice the purpose for which the timber is used; observe NZS 3604: 2011 restrictions on the holing and checking of joists and beams. Chasing and checking of other materials shall be only to approval.

Adequately protect all surfaces. Any damage to fittings or surfaces made good by the appropriate trade at the Electrician's expense.

9.3.4 Wiring

Joints within cable runs will not normally be accepted. TPS cable shall be adequately supported, and clipped at regular intervals. At terminations all strands of conductors shall be fully secured in a terminal block or clamped under a screw head washer; do not cut away any strands. Wiring which terminates in enclosed fittings and/or where subject to heat liable to cause deterioration, shall be high temperature type, with the tails made off with heat resisting sleeves, to protect the permanent wiring.

Wire lights in 1.5mm 3 core - 7.5 amps loading max per circuit (allow for 100w to all light fittings unless identified otherwise).

Wire power outlets in 2.5mm 3 core - 7 maximum GPO singles or doubles per circuit. Assess power outlets for specific equipment and allow accordingly.

Conceal all wiring except as noted on drawings or below. All wiring cast into concrete shall be run in conduit pipes. All cables shall be stranded (single core is unacceptable).

Wire more or less parallel to and at right angles to the structural elements - avoid any diagonal wiring. Layout of the principal distribution wiring shall be to approval. Position all wires to minimise the risk of damage from subsequent nailing of linings etc.

Generally, do not run TPS horizontally within timber walls except in the area up to 300mm above floor. Wire in the ceiling framing and drop vertically to outlets and switches.

Wire exterior lighting in screened cable.

10 SPECIALIST SERVICES & EQUIPMENT

10.1 Preliminary

Refer to General Conditions of Contract and the Special Conditions in this Specification as appropriate. Read this section in conjunction with all other trade sections.

10.2 Compliance

Comply with the New Zealand Building Code 1992 including all revisions and amendments, Verification Methods where appropriate, and construction principles that are embodied in the Acceptable Solutions.

Comply with all relevant provisions and recommendations of:

1170.2:2011(AS/NZS) Structural design actions - Wind actions

AS/NZS 4505:2012 Garage doors and other large access doors

10.3 Dominator Garage Doors

10.3.1 Scope

Supply, install, and commission the selected Dominator Garage Doors to the locations identified on the drawings, complete with all accessories for proper installation and system operation. All aspects of this work shall be in strict accordance with the manufacturer's technical literature and installation requirements (check www.dominator.co.nz, or call 03 384 5145 for the latest editions), other relevant product manufacturers' recommendations, and as noted and detailed on the drawings.

No substitutions are permitted for Dominator Garage Doors.

10.3.2 Residential Sectional Doors

Dominator Milano Sectional Door. Steel sectional door with a horizontal, fine pencil-rib pattern.

Door Panels: manufactured from COLORSTEEL® pre-painted steel, or powder coated steel - Dulux

Duralloy® standard colours; textured wood grain or smooth finish - texture and colour as specified.

Door Guides: two-piece roll-formed track guides; nylon wheels with ball bearings.

Hinges: full sized hinges spanning the panel length.

Weather Seal: deep cushioning neoprene base weather strip. Option for mohair jamb-edge weatherstrips available.

Opening operation: manual or automatic (as specified). External locking for manual doors.

Face mounted installation - fastened to the interior face of the wall opening.

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10.3.6 Co-operation

Co-operate with other trades to ensure that all preliminary and preparatory works are completed to specification and as shown on the drawings.

Co-ordinate with other trades as required to install Dominator Garage Doors and mechanical openers and associated cabling, to the required tolerances and functionality

Confirm Dominator Garage Door opening site-measurements, fixing types, and other necessary information prior to manufacture.

10.3.7 Workmanship

Where required by the NZ Building Act 2004 it is the building contractor's responsibility to ensure that all restricted building work is carried out by a Licensed Building Practitioner.

All installation and commissioning work shall be carried out to fully comply with the Dominator Ltd Warranty, by experienced and competent installers, familiar with the specified products and installation techniques, in accordance with the manufacturer's installation requirements and as shown on the drawings. All work shall be such as to leave a neat, efficient and robust installation.

Electrical wiring (by others) shall be carried out by a qualified Electrician in accordance with the Electrical Standards and Regulations. The Electrician shall provide the power supply; the Door Installer shall commission and verify the operation of the door.

Issue to the Owner a copy of the manufacturer's maintenance requirements and a copy of the Dominator Product and Installation Warranty when commissioning is complete.

10.3.8 Delivery & Handling

Store Dominator Garage Doors and accessories undercover, off the floor on a flat, even and level surface and as recommended by the manufacturer. Keep components and accessories dry and protected from damage and contamination at all times. Do not use damaged or defective products and materials.

Handle components and accessories in accordance with the manufacturer's requirements and in a manner that prevents damage, distortion or deterioration to the door and accessories - including surface marking.

10.3.9 Preparation

Check all aspects of preparatory works, including but not limited to:

Check that the door opening has been formed to the dimensions and details shown on the drawings, and that the opening is square and true to plane, with jambs plumb and parallel, and head/lintel true to level.

Check threshold rebates are correctly size and formed to suit the door operation.

Check door installation clearances for headroom, sideroom and backspace.

10.3.10 Installation

Install and commission the specified Dominator Garage Doors to the required operation and functionality in accordance with the manufacturer's installation requirements and as shown on the drawings, complete with sliding carriage assemblies, operating controls and other accessories

necessary for proper operation.

Installation tolerances shall not exceed Dominator recommendations. Door tracks and guides shall be accurately aligned and fixed plumb and parallel, and the door head true to level. Fixing type and spacing shall be appropriate for the door size and operation, with allowance for imposed wind loads, in accordance with Dominator requirements. Unless specified otherwise, fixings shall be hot-dip galvanised.

10.3.11 Completion

Check that the Dominator Garage Doors have been installed correctly, and that all moving and locking components and controls have been commissioned to the required tolerances and functionality. Check for damage and defects - replace or repair as necessary.

Leave this work complete and in full working order to the required operating performance and functionality.

Remove all rubbish and excess material from site.

Issue to the Owner a copy of the manufacturer's maintenance requirements and a copy of the Dominator Ltd Product and Installation Warranty for the completed works.

Ceiling diaphragms

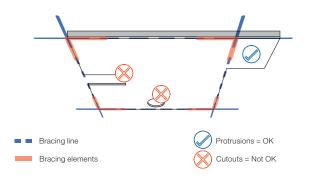


FIGURE 21: DIAPHRAGM BRACING LINING SPACINGS

GIB® plasterboard ceiling diaphragms are stiff and strong horizontal elements which effectively transfer loads to bracing walls. They themselves do not have a bracing unit rating but are used when bracing lines exceed 6m separation. The basic shape of a ceiling diaphragm is square or rectangular. Protrusions are permitted but cut-outs are not. The length of a ceiling diaphragm shall not exceed twice its width. Dimensions are measured between supporting bracing lines. Supporting bracing lines shall have a bracing capacity no less than the greater of 100 bracing units or 15 bracing units per metre of diaphragm dimension, measured at right angles to the line being considered, see figure 21.

Limitations for GIB® plasterboard ceiling diaphragms

Ceiling diaphragms may be constructed using any GIB® plasterboard provided perimeter fixing is at;

150mm centres for: Diaphragms up to 7.5m in length, no steeper than 15°.

100mm centres for: Diaphragms up to 7.5m in length, no steeper than 45°. Diaphragms up to 12m in length, no steeper than 25°.

Diaphragms outside these parameters must be specifically designed.

General fixing requirements for GIB® Ceiling Diaphragms:

- Linings must be installed over the entire area of the diaphragm.
- Fastening must be no less than 12mm from sheet edges and not less than 18mm from sheet ends.
- Sheets must be supported by framing members (e.g., ceiling battens) spaced at no more than 500mm centres for 10mm GIB® plasterboard and at no more than 600mm centres for 13mm GIB® plasterboard.
- Sheets within the diaphragm area may be fastened and finished conventionally in accordance with the publication entitled, "GIB® Site Guide". All joints shall be GIB® Joint Tape reinforced and stopped. It is recommended that sheet butt joints are formed off framing and back-blocked (see "GIB® Site Guide").

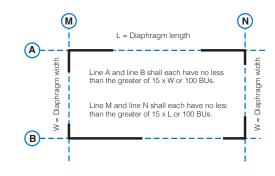
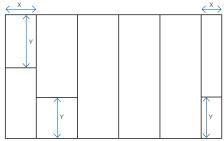
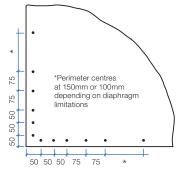


FIGURE 22: GIB® CEILING DIAPHRAGM SHEET WIDTHS AND LENGTHS

- Use full width sheets where possible. At least 900mm wide sheets with a length not less than 1800mm shall be used. Sheets less than 900mm wide but no less than 600mm may be used provided all joints with adjacent sheets are back-blocked (see "GIB® Site Guide" and figure 22).
- Fasteners are placed at the specified centres around the ceiling diaphragm with the corners fastened using the GIB EzyBrace® fastener pattern.

FIGURE 20: PROTRUSIONS AND CUTOUTS

Ceiling battens in ceiling diaphragms

Ceiling diaphragms may be constructed using steel or timber ceiling battens.

Battens shall be spaced at a maximum of:

- 500mm for 10mm GIB® plasterboard.
- 600mm for 13mm GIB® plasterboard.

Timber battens shall be fixed in accordance with the requirements of NZS 3604:2011.

Metal battens shall be GIB® Rondo® battens with two external flanges of 8mm to allow direct screw fixing to roof framing.

GIB® Rondo® metal battens shall be fixed with 2/32mm x 8g GIB® Grabber® Wafer Head Self Tapping screws to supporting framing.

GIB® Rondo® metal battens must be fixed directly to the roof framing. If a clip system has been used, a timber block (min 300mm) or a continuous timber member can be fixed alongside the bottom chord to permit a direct connection to the batten, see figure 26.

For GIB® Rondo® metal battens, a GIB® Rondo® metal channel or metal angle is required at the perimeter of the diaphragm. The perimeter channel shall be fastened to the top plate with 32mm x 8g GIB® Grabber® Wafer Head Self Tapping screws or 32mm x 7g GIB® Grabber® Dual Thread screw at 300mm centres maximum.

Linings are fastened to metal using 25mm x 6g GIB® Grabber® Self Tapping screws and to timber framing using 32mm x 6g GIB® Grabber® High Thread screws. Alternatively 32mm x 7g GIB® Grabber® Dual Thread screws can be used in both cases. Fastener centres are specified on p.18.

Coved ceiling diaphragms can be achieved by using nominally $32 \times 32 \times 0.55$ mm proprietary galvanised metal angles ("back-flashing") at the changes in direction. These angles shall be:

- Fastened at 300mm on each edge to metal battens using 32mm x 8g GIB® Grabber® Wafer Head Self Tapping screws or 32mm x 7g GIB® Grabber® Dual Thread screws.
- Fastened to timber framing using 32mm x 7g GIB®
 Grabber® Dual Thread screws when linings are installed.

FIGURE 26: GIB® RONDO® METAL CEILING BATTEN INSTALLATION

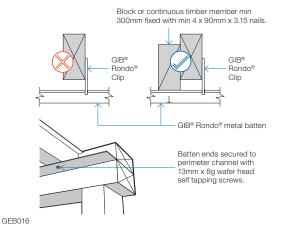
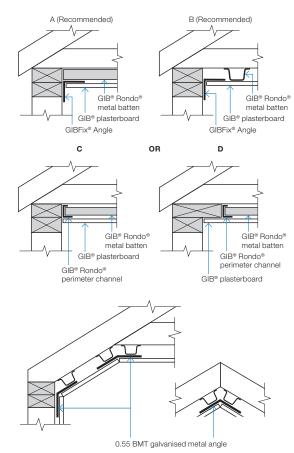
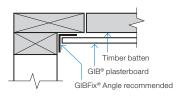


FIGURE 27: GIB® RONDO® METAL CEILING BATTENS WITH CORNER ANGLES

Openings in ceiling diaphragms

SMALL OPENINGS

Small opening (e.g. down lights) of 90 x 90mm or less may be placed no closer than 90mm to the edge of the ceiling diaphragm.

LARGE OPENINGS

Openings are allowed withing the middle third of the diaphragms length and width. Fixing of sheet material to opening trimmers shall be at 150mm centres. Neither opening dimension shall exceed a third of the diaphragm width. Larger openings or openings in other locations require specific engineering design.

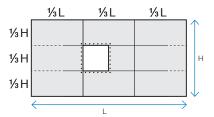
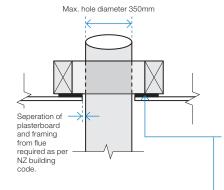
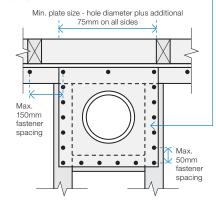


FIGURE 25: FIREPLACE FLUES AND RANGE HOOD OPENINGS

Where fireplace flue or range hood openings are required in a ceiling diaphragm use a galvansed metal backing plate as shown in figure 25, with a maximum hole diameter of 350mm.

Figure 25 can also be used for range hood openings in walls.

FIGURE 24: LARGE OPENINGS IN CEILING DIAPHRAGMS

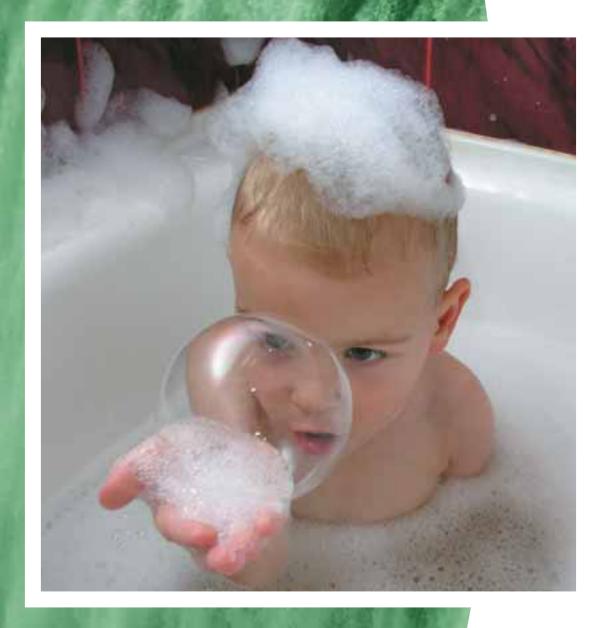

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Introduction

THIS PUBLICATION

This publication is not intended as the definitive guide on wet area construction and wet area systems, but rather as a helpful guide to best practice around areas where there is intermittent water exposure and splash zones within residential and non-residential buildings – in particular, areas covered by the New Zealand Building Code (NZBC), Clause E3 Internal Moisture.

The information herein is designed to be helpful to designers, contractors and home-owners wishing to achieve a result that is easy to incorporate into modern design, simple and clear to construct, and that will satisfy the needs, requirements and expectations of both the NZBC and the end user.

Wet areas in the home often require relatively frequent and expensive renovation or repair, often because of the ingress of water to the structure of the building.

It is important to introduce materials and systems which have been specially designed to cope with the conditions that are common in wet areas, and to ensure they are installed correctly, using best practice, and are compatible to form a complete wet area system.

The code numbers shown with each "typical detail", e.g. GAW-D030, match the code numbers for drawings available as downloads on the GIB® website at www.gib.co.nz

WHAT IS A WET AREA?

Generally, wet areas are described as spaces to where fresh water is reticulated, such as bathrooms, toilets, laundries and kitchens. Wet areas fall into two categories; these are well explained and documented in the NZBC, Clause E3.

- 1. Water splash areas These are areas subject to intermittent splash of liquid water around sanitary fittings and appliances such as baths, vanities, laundry tubs, sinks, etc. These areas are required to have an impervious, easily cleaned surface.
- 2. Shower enclosures These are areas subject to more frequent, larger quantities of water, and include shower enclosures and shower over bath areas. The NZBC E3/AS1 requires these areas to be impervious, and specifically excludes any paint and wallpaper finishes. Where ceramic tile or stone finishes are applied, E3/AS1 requires that they "shall be laid on a continuous impervious substrate or membrane".

The requirements of these wet areas are described on page 6 of this publication and in full in Clause E3 of the NZBC. Clause E3 also refers to other requirements not covered in this publication, such as ventilation, condensation control and overflow management, which will require separate consideration. Ongoing maintenance of wet areas is also important to maximise the life of the wet area.

GIB AQUALINE®

Although able to cope with infrequent short-term exposure, standard gypsum plasterboard will have a shortened life expectancy when frequently exposed to water or moisture.

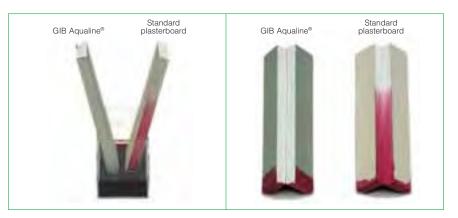
The NZBC does not call for water resistant linings in wet areas but it is highly desirable to incorporate lining materials which will maintain their integrity longer when exposed more frequently to water or steam and particularly to one-off events such as leakages or flooding of a room.

GIB Aqualine® is ideal in such situations because it features a water resistant wax polymer impregnated core.

Unlike other commonly used substrates, the GIB Aqualine® core not only resists penetration of water through the lining into the framing behind, but also resists water "wicking" up the core, a common cause of long-term damage where a water resistant lining has not been used.

GIB Aqualine® will maintain its integrity for extended periods, particularly where wicking over large areas can destroy the integrity of the interface between the lining and paint or wallpaper surfaces or between the lining and the tile adhesive.

The illustrations below graphically show the difference between GIB Aqualine® and standard plasterboard after a two-hour soak test in red dye.

Handling and Storage

- GIB Aqualine® must be stored under cover, stacked flat and clear of the floor with sufficient support to avoid sagging

COMPLIANCE WITH THE NEW ZEALAND BUILDING CODE (NZBC)

Structure - Clause B1

The design and material specification for steel and timber framing used in GIB Aqualine® systems must be in accordance with the performance requirements of NZBC Clause B1 (Structure). See Bracing in Wet Areas on page 5.

Durability - Clause B2

When installed and maintained in accordance with this literature, GIB Aqualine® tiled or vinyl covered systems have a serviceable life of at least 15 years. They comply with the requirements of NZBC Clause B2 (Durability) for use in wet areas directly exposed to liquid water, e.g. showers, showers over baths and splash-backs.

When used as a general wet area lining and maintained under normal dry internal conditions, GIB Aqualine® systems have a serviceable life of at least 50 years and comply with NZBC Clause B2 (Durability) for use within toilets, kitchens, bathrooms and laundries not directly exposed to liquid water.

Spread of Fire - Clause C3

GIB® Fire Rated Systems provide passive fire protection in accordance with the requirements of NZBC Clause C3 (Spread of Fire). When GIB Aqualine® is substituted into fire rated systems in place of the equivalent thickness GIB Fyreline®, the Fire Resistance Rating (FRR) of that system will be maintained.

COMPLIANCE WITH THE NEW ZEALAND BUILDING CODE (NZBC) continued

Internal Moisture - Clause E3

When installed in accordance with this literature, tiled or vinyl covered GIB Aqualine® systems may be used in areas directly exposed to liquid water, such as showers, to provide an impervious and easily cleaned wall surface. These systems comply with the requirements of NZBC Clause E3 (Internal Moisture).

Hazardous Building Materials - Clause F2

At no stage during handling, installation, or serviceable life does GIB Aqualine® constitute a health hazard. It therefore meets the provisions of NZBC Clause F2 (Hazardous Building Materials). Dust resulting from the sanding of stopping compounds may be a respiratory irritant and the use of a suitable facemask is recommended.

Ventilation - Clause G4

NZBC Clause G4 (Ventilation) requires buildings to have a means of collecting or otherwise removing steam generated from laundering, utensil washing, bathing or showering. To prolong the life of interior linings and surface finishes and to minimise the risk of moisture related problems such as condensation and mould growth, adequate heating and mechanical ventilation must be provided in kitchens, bathrooms and laundries.

Airborne and Impact Sound - Clause G6

GIB® Noise Control Systems can be used to provide ratings for Sound Transmission Class (STC) and Impact Insulation Class (IIC) in accordance with the requirements of NZBC Clause G6 (Airborne and Impact Sound). When GIB Aqualine® is substituted into GIB® Noise Control systems in place of the equivalent thickness GIB® Standard plasterboard or GIB Fyreline®, the STC and IIC rating of that system will be maintained. When GIB Aqualine® is substituted in place of the equivalent thickness GIB Noiseline®, a small performance loss may occur. For further information contact the GIB® Helpline 0800 100 442.

LIMITATIONS

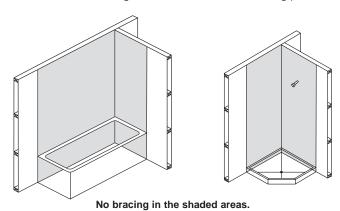
- GIB Aqualine® must not be used for bracing purposes in shower cubicles or above baths (see Bracing in Wet Areas below)
- Do not use GIB Aqualine® where it may be exposed for extended periods to humidities of 90% RH and above. Such areas include group shower or steam rooms as well as moisture and chlorine rich environments such as indoor swimming pools
- GIB Aqualine® must not be directly applied to solid plaster (gypsum or cement), wood based sheet linings or similar materials, masonry or concrete. GIB Aqualine® may only be applied to these materials where timber strapping or steel furring channels are installed
- GIB Aqualine® must not be installed over a vapour barrier or a wall acting as a vapour barrier
- · Cracked or damaged sheets must never be used
- GIB Aqualine® must not be used in external applications
- GIB® plasterboard must not be exposed to temperatures in excess of 52°C for prolonged periods. Heat-generating devices may
 include halogen lighting, cooking elements, radiant heating, solid fuel exhausts and fire surrounds. Consult the appliance
 manufacturer for installation details.

BRACING IN WET AREAS

Bracing elements are required to have a durability of 50 years. GIB® bracing elements are not to be located in shower cubicles or behind baths because of durability requirements, the likelihood of renovation, and practical issues associated with fixing bracing elements to perimeter framing members.

Otherwise, GIB® Bracing Systems can be used in water-splash areas as defined by NZBC Clause E3/AS1, provided these are maintained impervious for the life of the building.

GIB Aqualine® can be used in place of GIB® Standard plasterboard in GIB® bracing elements. GIB Aqualine® can be used in place of GIB Braceline® in GIB® bracing elements 900mm or longer, provided the perimeter of the element is fixed with GIB Braceline® Nails or GIB Braceline® screws at 100mm centres, using the GIB Braceline® corner fixing pattern.

NEW ZEALAND BUILDING CODE

E3.3.4 requires impervious and easily cleaned surfaces to all surfaces adjacent to sanitary fixtures or laundering facilities.

E3.3.5 requires that surfaces of building elements likely to be splashed or contaminated in the course of the intended use of the building must also be impervious and easily cleaned.

E3.3.6 requires that surfaces of building elements likely to be splashed must be constructed in a way that prevents water from penetrating behind linings or into concealed spaces (e.g. wall cavities).

Walls in wet areas therefore need to be addressed according to whether they fall within the scope of one of the following descriptions:

- 1. Wall surface likely to be splashed
- 2. Shower walls. Although not a requirement of NZBC it is highly recommended that the wall surfaces within 150mm of the top edge of a bath, and the vertical faces immediately under the edge of a bath, are treated in the same way as for a shower wall.

WALL SURFACES IN AREAS LIKELY TO BE SPLASHED

Suitable linings include:

- a. Integrally waterproof sheet material (e.g. polyvinylchloride) with sealed joints
- b. Ceramic or stone tiles having 6% maximum water absorption, waterproof grouted joints, and bedded with an adhesive specified by the tile manufacturer as being suitable for the tiles, substrate material and the environment of use
- c. Cement based solid plaster or concrete having a steel trowel or polished finish (semi-gloss or gloss paint must be used if a paint finish is required)
- d. Cork tile or sheet sealed with waterproof applied coatings
- e. Monolithic applied coatings having a polished, non-absorbent finish (e.g. terrazzo)
- f. Sheet linings finished with vinyl coated wallpaper, or semi-gloss or gloss coating
- g. Water resistant sheet linings finished with decorative high pressure laminate or factory applied polyurethane or resin
- h. Modular or multiple lining units which are themselves impervious and easily cleaned, and are installed with impervious joints
- i. Timber or timber-based products such as particleboard sealed with waterproof applied coatings.

NB: Floor surfaces and floor/wall junctions are required by E3 to be impervious.

SURFACES IN SHOWERS AND AROUND BATHS

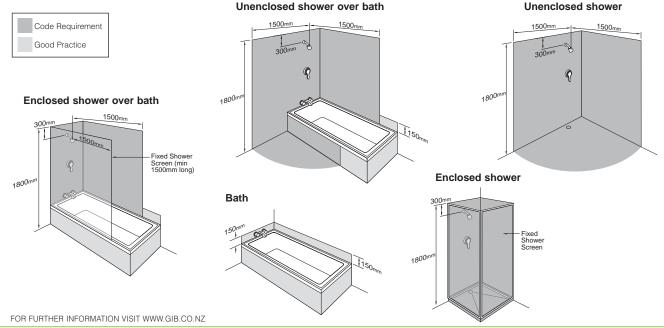
Suitable linings include all of the above, but NOT including items (d) and (f) from the above list.

Note that a waterproof membrane complying with AS/NZS 4858: 2004 **MUST** be applied to all lining materials used under ceramic tiles in these areas.

The waterproof membrane must extend to a 1500mm horizontal radius from a shower rose unless the shower is contained within a fixed enclosure. A shower curtain does not constitute a fixed enclosure.

Particleboard manufacturers recommend that in wet areas, panels should be protected with a suitable wet area membrane or an integrally waterproof sheet material. Some local authorities call for this treatment on all timber based floors. Local requirements should be checked before proceeding.

Dark grey shaded areas in the diagrams below represent the minimum extent of wall surfaces requiring impervious sheet materials or waterproof membranes prior to tiling. Light grey shaded areas represent good practice.





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WALL SURFACES SURROUNDING COOKTOPS

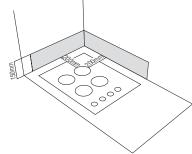
The protection of combustible surfaces surrounding gas cooking appliances is covered by NZS 5261. Consult the current version of this standard to ensure compliance.

However, as a guide the following options are acceptable for wall surfaces within 200mm of the periphery of a gas element to a height of 150mm above the element for the full dimension (width and depth) of the cooktop surface area:

- 5mm ceramic tiles on GIB® plasterboard
- 5mm toughened glass on GIB® plasterboard
- or any system that can be demonstrated to meet the requirements of Clause 2.6.2.6 of NZS5261.

Because of the moisture generated by cooking, it is highly recommended that GIB Aqualine® is used in kitchen areas.

GIB® plasterboard products must not be exposed to temperatures in excess of 52°C for sustained periods. Check with the appliance manufacturer that this requirement will be met. However, it would be unusual for surfaces outside 200mm to exceed 52°C for sustained periods.



PENETRATIONS AND SEALANTS

As leaks and water ingress typically occur at junctions between building elements and at penetrations, it is essential that particular attention is given to these details at the time of installation. Lack of attention to detail can result in water damage that could remain undetected for a long time.

- Ensure that all cut-outs for pipe penetrations are made neatly, and slightly oversize, with a hole saw. These penetrations should be of a diameter no more than 12mm greater than that of the pipe
- Sealants should be of a mould inhibiting type and be neutral cure. Neutral cure silicones will generally meet these requirements
- Surfaces should be dry and free from dust before application, a minimum of a 4mm joint width provided and the depth should not exceed the width
- Gun a bead of silicone sealant to the full depth of the GIB Aqualine® in the following locations:
 - Around all tap/pipe bodies
 - The gap between the bath rim and the bottom edge of the GIB Aqualine[®]
 - Between the upstand of preformed shower bases and the bottom edge of the lining
 - Where an impervious junction is required at the floor/wall line, carefully seal the gap between the bottom edge of the board and the finished floor. Leave a 5-10mm gap at the bottom of the GIB Aqualine® wall lining for this purpose, ensuring the gap is free from dirt and dust
- Do not locate shower heads or taps on fire rated or intertenancy walls. Should this be unavoidable then refer to the publication *Penetrations in GIB® Fire Rated Systems*. Always use tested and approved proprietary solutions.

WATERPROOF MEMBRANES

- A waterproof membrane must be applied to all lining materials used as a substrate for ceramic tiles in a shower or shower over bath situation
- The wall surface in a shower or shower over bath situation is not complete and ready for tiling until coated with a waterproof membrane over the lining and the jointed areas shown shaded on page 6
- Only in-situ waterproofing materials which are manufactured to AS/NZS 4858:2004 "Wet Area Membranes" are recommended and applied to manufacturer's recommendations. Typically, these types of membranes are not suitable for paint and wallpaper finishes
- Waterproof membranes must be fully cured and dry prior to application of tiling adhesives
- Embed reinforcing mats in the membrane at all internal corners of the shower (including floor/wall junctions)
- Preformed sheet membranes are also available and may be more suitable where curing times or specialist skills are an issue
- The details shown in this technical literature are generic in nature. For accurate detailing, follow the specifications provided by the supplier of the proprietary waterproof membrane.

TILING

GIB Aqualine® is suitable as a substrate for tiling up to the following weights:

- 10mm GIB Aqualine® up to 20kg/m²
- 13mm GIB Aqualine® up to 32kg/m².

Note: Most ceramic and porcelain tiles weigh less than 20kg/m².

For further information on tiling consult the BRANZ Good Practice Guide - Tiling.



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FLEXIBLE SHEET VINYL - SHOWERS AND OTHER WET AREAS

- GIB Aqualine® is a suitable substrate for flexible vinyl wall finishes in wet areas of residential, commercial or institutional buildings
- Framing requirements and installation procedures for the GIB Aqualine® substrate shall be as per page 10 or 11, except that the lining gap at the floor should be reduced to 5mm when a pencil cove detail is used
- The installation of galvanised steel reinforcing angles (32 x 32 x 0.55mm) behind internal GIB Aqualine® corners is recommended for sheet vinyl applications in showers or shower over bath situations (see illustration page 14)
- The GIB Aqualine® lining must be jointed and stopped to a paint quality finish (Level 4) trowel marks can telegraph through even a commercial grade 2mm vinyl
- · A commercial grade vinyl is recommended for the wall finish in commercial or institutional bathrooms and showers
- In areas directly exposed to liquid water, all joints in flexible sheet vinyl must be heat welded
- Installation of the flexible vinyl must be carried out strictly in accordance with the specifications provided by the suppliers/manufacturers of the vinyl.

RIGID SHEET SHOWER LININGS

- The manufacturers/suppliers of thin (usually 2-3mm) and rigid acrylic shower linings commonly recommend direct adhesive fixing to wall linings using solvent-based adhesives
- Water temperature changes will cause movement of the thin acrylic sheet, which in turn will stress the adhesive and wall lining substrate
- Do not preseal or paint areas which are to be covered by the rigid shower linings
- The wall surface must be free of dust before installation of the lining
- Suppliers of rigid sheet acrylic shower linings recommend a minimum of 24 hours for the adhesive to cure fully prior to the shower being put into service
- Care must be taken to ensure that rooms are adequately ventilated and the adhesive is fully cured before the shower is used
- Consult the manufacturer/supplier of the shower lining for full installation details.

RENOVATIONS

Bathrooms, kitchens and laundries are the most renovated rooms in the house, partly due to fashion considerations and partly because of damage sustained by ingress of water and moisture within those spaces.

In most cases when renovating these rooms it is often easier and more cost-effective to remove the existing linings and replace them with GIB Aqualine®. This allows for a completely new start in the room and offers sound substrates for new surfaces such as tiling and painting, where otherwise flaking paint or damaged plasterboard may compromise good and sound finish or practice. At the very least re-lining will:

- · Allow for inspection of framing where damage may have occurred and provide the opportunity to repair such damage
- Allow plumbing and electrics to be checked and altered or replaced where required
- · Provide the opportunity to install thermal and acoustic insulation and water resistant linings where appropriate
- · Make the job easier.

MAINTENANCE

Lack of maintenance is frequently the cause of premature and often very expensive failure of components and building elements within wet areas.

It is important to regularly inspect and repair any potential problem before it becomes a major problem and expensive to reinstate. Good maintenance should include:

- Ongoing ventilation. At the very least, good passive ventilation (e.g. window vents); but good active ventilation (e.g. extraction fans) of an appropriate size for the room is recommended
- Impervious coatings and surfaces should be checked for wear and damage and maintained and recoated before ingress of water to the substrate occurs
- Regular cleaning with appropriate cleaners so that build-up of matter, such as mould, is well controlled
- Sealants at junctions and penetrations should be checked for adhesion on a regular basis and replaced where adhesion failure to substrates occurs
- Where pipe leaks have become evident, however small, they should be repaired promptly and any area around such leaks dried
 out completely before any other repairs are carried out.

Non-residential and Apartments

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High-rise and commercial wet areas can generally be divided into four separate categories:

HIGH-RISE APARTMENTS AND INTERTENANCY

Wet areas in apartment complexes are generally covered by Clause E3 of the NZBC and will have the same requirements as shown for residential applications. However, apartment buildings will also involve intertenancy walls requiring noise control and fire resistance.

Generally, noise control and fire resistance are the first consideration and then the water resistance is added to those systems.

For noise control, GIB Aqualine® can substitute for the equivalent thickness GIB® Standard plasterboard or GIB Fyreline®.

For fire resistance, GIB Aqualine® can substitute for GIB Fyreline® of equivalent thickness.

In all cases the prescribed noise control or fire resistance system specifications must be followed completely as presented in the GIB® publications GIB® Noise Control Systems and GIB® Fire Rated Systems.

Refer to typical details on page 25.

The NZBC for intertenancy calls for special consideration to be given to preventing water from travelling from one tenancy to another. This calls for a waterproof membrane to all wet area floors with upstands to walls and the inclusion of floor wastes. It is important to avoid penetrations such as taps, shower roses, etc. in intertenancy walls as this will compromise fire and

OFFICE, WORKPLACE AND SCHOOLS

These wet areas are generally no different in requirements to those shown in this publication or those of high-rise apartments, and are treated in the same manner.

As there is often a higher impact requirement in commercial applications, 13mm GIB Aqualine® is the minimum thickness recommended.

These areas are often finished in sheet vinyl or ceramic tiles and GIB Aqualine® is an ideal substrate, particularly in the case of sheet vinyl where a high quality finish is required to minimise telegraphing of imperfections in the substrate.

HEALTHCARE AND HOSPITALS

This industry will generally have special requirements for wet areas. GIB Aqualine® will generally satisfy specific design needs in healthcare facilities and in particular is an ideal substrate for the preferred finish of sheet vinyl.

PUBLIC AMENITIES AND SPORTS CLUBS

Public amenities and sports clubs often have a high demand for impact resistance, therefore 13mm GIB Aqualine® should be used, and suitable impact resistant wall coverings considered, such as heavy duty sheet vinyl or ceramic tiles over waterproof membrane to 1200mm high.

Also full consideration should be given to the usage of the amenity and whether high pressure or chemical cleaners will be used or if the amenity may be subject to vandalism.

Because of extreme humidity and presence of chemicals, GIB Aqualine® is not suitable for enclosed swimming pool areas. Contact the GIB® Helpline on 0800 100 442 for further assistance.



Non-tiled Walls - Timber Framing

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If bracing, noise control or fire rating considerations exist, consult the relevant GIB® technical publication, e.g. GIB® Fire Rated Systems, GIB® Noise Control Systems, GIB® Bracing Systems, for the appropriate information.

Wall Framing

Framing dimensions must comply with the requirements of NZS 3604:1999.

- The moisture content of timber framing shall be 18% or less at the time of lining
- Studs shall be spaced at 600mm centres maximum for both 10mm and 13mm GIB® plasterboard
- Nogs to be evenly spaced with a maximum spacing of 1350mm. Alternatively, nogs may be staggered 150mm maximum either side of a horizontal joint line
- Nogs are not required behind horizontal joints except in shower situations or specific fire or noise control systems.

Fasteners

- 10mm GIB Aqualine® minimum 25mm x 6g GIB® Grabber® High Thread Drywall Screws or 30mm x 2.8mm GIB® Nails
- 13mm GIB Aqualine® minimum 32mm x 6g GIB® Grabber® High Thread Drywall Screws or 30mm x 2.8mm GIB® Nails.

Fastener Centres

- 300mm centres to top and bottom plates and to perimeter studs
- Single fasteners to each stud where the horizontal joint crosses the studs
- Place fasteners 12mm from sheet edges
- Daubs of GIBFix® adhesive at 300mm centres to intermediate studs
- Do not place adhesive at sheet edges or under fasteners. Sheet edges at door or window openings can be adhesive fixed unless forming part of the perimeter of a bracing element.

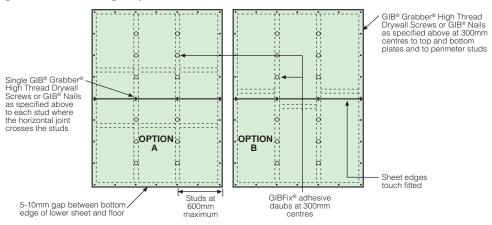

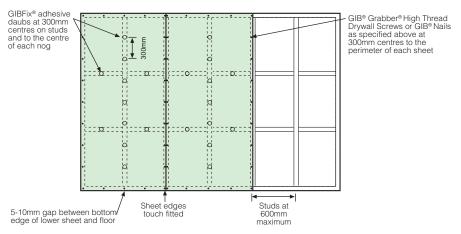

Wall Framing

- Ensure that the studs are placed with the open side facing in the same direction (see GIB® Site Guide).

Fasteners

• 25mm x 6g GIB® Grabber® Self Tapping Drywall Screws.

Fastener Centres

- 300mm centres to top and bottom channels and to end studs
- Single screws to each stud where the horizontal joint crosses the studs

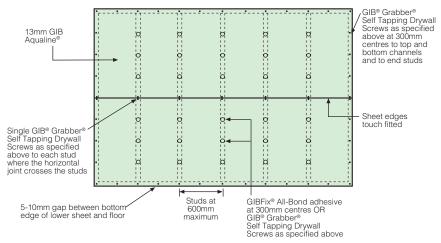

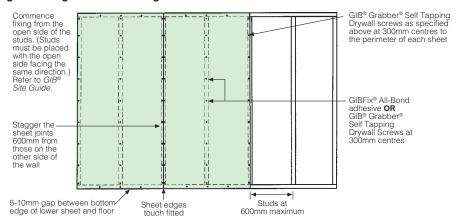

Wall Framing

Framing dimensions and spacing must comply with the requirements of NZS 3604:1999 or relevant NZ Standard.

- Prior to lining in tiled areas (shower cubicles and shower over bath only) the internal corners shall be reinforced with a minimum 32 x 32 x 0.55mm galvanised metal angle. Each side of the angle shall be fastened to the framing with 30mm galvanised clouts at 300mm centres
- Steel stud systems do not generally require nogs except as below:
 - Adjacent to each pipe penetration and behind sink and tub flashings
 - Between all studs above bath flanges and preformed shower bases
- For impact protection in shower cubicles or shower over bath situations it is important that all sheet joints are made on solid framing. This may require either vertical fixing of the GIB Aqualine® or the installation of some additional nogs.

Fasteners

- For 10mm GIB Aqualine® use minimum 25mm x 6g GIB® Grabber® Drywall Screws

- GIB® Grabber® Drywall Screws at 100mm centres to perimeter of wall and to all intermediate studs

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW FIRST.

Construction of the wall.

The wall referred to in these instructions is ex 100mm x 50mm wooden framework. In reality this may mean a 94mm x 47mm or 90mm x 45mm wooden framework. Although not shown, the unit covered in this HowTO may also be fitted into other types of wall materials (steelstud, concrete, brick, etc.).

For concrete or masonry type walls: fix a 100mm x 50mm timber fixing plate into the opening on both sides and under the head. Fix these in place with ø10mm x 98mm long countersunk masonry anchors at 400mm centres.

Lintel or trimmer sizes.

CS Cavity Sliders are non-loadbearing units. They require the lintel (or trimmer, ceiling joist or structural component) directly above the track to span the full trim size opening width. Timber lintels sized from NZS3604 are acceptable if the weight of the door leaf/leaves is less than 75kg/m total door width. If heavier, specific design is required for all other kinds of structural components and for the timber lintels.

The hole in the wall.

Calculation of how big the hole in the wall framing should be to fit in this unit:

CS AluSealed Single unit

Height = door leaf height + 95mm (Also EO, SERV, SS, HI)

Height = door leaf height + 105mm (SF Only)

Width = (door leaf width x 2) + 30mm (Also SERV, SF, SS, HI) Width = (door leaf width x 2) - 70mm (for EO only)

Standard clearances under the door.

With this CS AluSealed unit sitting hard on top of the concrete or timber floor, the clearance under the door leaf ranges between 22 - 30mm (adjustable). The majority of these standard clearances is taken up by the floor covering (e.g. carpet, tiles etc.).

Modified clearances under the door.

If you require more than 30mm clearance under the door: pack the CS AluSealed unit off the floor by the extra amount you need.

If you need less than 22mm clearance under the door leaf (e.g. for polished timber floors) there are three options to do this:

- CS FOR DOORS can supply special seals that can be fitted to the bottom of the door leaf.
- **B*** A door leaf up to 15mm taller can be fitted.
- C* The whole cavity can be made up to 15mm shorter.
 - (*B & C are only available when pre-ordered.)

Contamination of the top track.

Never drill, nail or screw through the centre section of the track. Make sure no dirt, grit or aluminium swarf gets into the track. This could impair the smooth running of the carriages.

Fixing cavity slider to the floor

Installing the cavity slider 100% plumb and level will NOT guarantee a correctly sliding door. If any of the wall, lintel, floor and door are not plumb and straight this can cause the door to slide incorrectly into the pocket. It is for this reason that the skirting block fixing (found at the base of the cavity slider behind the split jambs) is only secured once you have ensured door is running parallel to the cavity pocket.

Go to page **3** (overleaf)



NOW FOR THE INSTALLATION ITSELF.

1 Remove packaging and check components.

Lay the CS AluSealed unit flat on the ground in front of the door opening. Remove the transportation cleat (if still fitted) from the bottom plate assembly. (Take out the two screws and the three staples.)

Check for any obvious product defects.

Lay the unit on its back and sight the gap to check for normal clearances (drawing **T**). If anything looks out of specification or you are unsure, contact CS <u>before</u> beginning your install.

2 Fit the door leaf (if not already fitted). Refer to 'Fitting your own door', overleaf).

3 Fit the closing jamb to the unit (U & W).

Ensure the closing jamb plate is fitted to the top of the closing jamb as shown (drawing **W**) with the bent lug towards the face side of the closing jamb. Fit the closing jamb using 2 screws 8 gauge x 25mm long, as supplied.

For NoClosingJamb (NCJ) detail option ignore this (refer to the Additional HowTO Information sheet).

4 Place the whole unit into the framed opening in the wall (drawing U).

Check that the jack studs on both sides of the door opening are plumb in both directions.

5 Fix the aluminium back stud.

Plumb-up the two aluminium split jambs (drawing **U**). Use a level!

While keeping the split jambs plumb, pack behind the aluminium back stud as shown. Screw the aluminium back stud including the packing to the $100\,\text{mm}\times50\,\text{mm}$ jack stud through the pre-punched holes.

Timber studs: use 8 gauge x 29mm wood screws. **Steel** studs: 8 gauge x 29mm self-tapping screws (For NCJ detail option the track should butt into the finished wall lining. Refer to the Additional HowTO Information sheet).

6 Level the track (drawing W).

The track must be fitted level and straight.

The track for all units with doors over 910mm wide must be fixed to the lintel at 600mm centres through the aluminium flanges on both sides of the track (drawing **W**). Fit the first screws 50mm back from the closing jamb end of the track.

For **timber** lintels: Use 8 gauge screws penetrating the lintel by at least 25mm.

For **light steel** lintels (under 2mm wall thickness): Use 8 gauge self-tapping screws which penetrate the lintel by at least 5mm.

For heavy steel lintels:

Use M5 machine bolts and nuts.

For Full-Height (FH) detail option:

The bottom of the track should finish flush with the underside of the finished ceiling (refer to the Additional HowTO Information sheet).

7 Fix the closing jamb (if required) (drawing U).

Plumb closing jamb. Use a level!

Pack and screw to the jack stud through the pre-drilled holes in the centre of the closing jamb.

First: fix the top of the closing jamb (drawing **U**). **Second**: fix the bottom of the closing jamb.

For **timber**: use 8 gauge x 50mm wood screws For **steel**: use 8 gauge self tapping screws. Ensure that the distances between the closing jamb and the split jamb are the same.

The distance at the bottom must never be more than the distance at the top.

Measure this carefully!

Fix between the top and bottom. Use a straight edge to make sure that the closing jamb is straight. Aluminium plugs are supplied to cover the fixing holes. Put these in <u>only</u> when you are satisfied with the complete installation!

8 Fix the bottom plate assembly (drawing X). The door must slide parallel with the bottom plate assembly (see the 2 sets of black A-A arrows).

If not, gently tap the front of the assembly to the left or right until it does.

The door should now slide smoothly and fit into the recess in the closing jamb, leaving parallel gaps on either side between the door leaf and the closing jamb.

Fix the skirting block fixing to the floor only when the cavity pocket has been adjusted so that the <u>door closes neatly into the closing jamb and slides parallel to the bottom plate</u> of the cavity slider.

Fix the bottom plate assembly to the floor as follows:

- ¶ To concrete floors: Fix with Ø8mm x 90mm masonry anchors through the pre-drilled holes in the skirting fixing blocks of the bottom plate. (See the red stamped arrow on the timber).
- I To timber floors: Fix the bottom plate assembly with ø3.15mm x 75mm nails on either side in the centre of the skirting fixing block thickness. (See the red stamped ⊕ on the timber).

 Pre-drill ø3mm holes for these nails.
- 9 Adjust the door height (drawing V). Use the small end of the spanner supplied to rotate the hexagonal nut at the bottom of the carriage hanger shaft. Adjust the doors for plumb.

To raise door: Rotate spanner from left to right. To lower door: Rotate spanner from right to left. Note: The top of the hanger shaft screws into a self-locking nut. If the hexagonal nut is turned downwards too far, the shaft will become loose from the self-locking nut. If the turning resistance suddenly feels much easier, you have gone too far.

10 Fit the head jambs (drawing W).

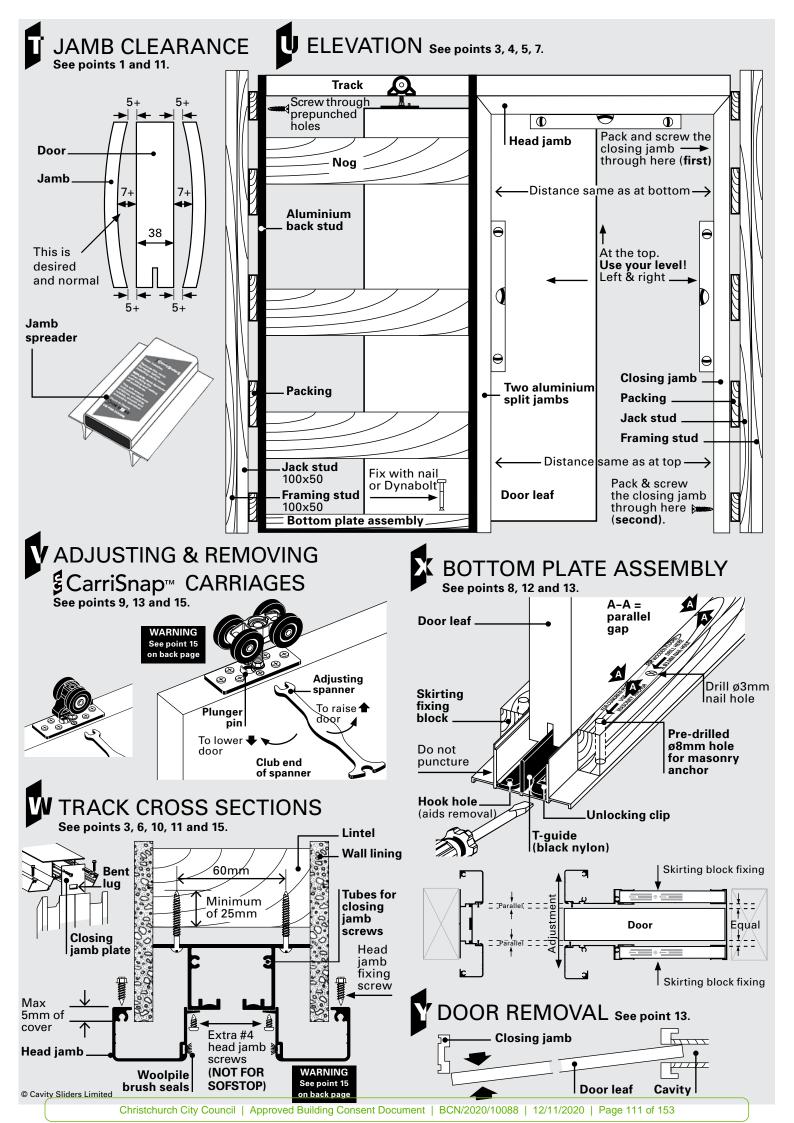
Before fitting head jambs, check that you have the desired clearance under the door and that the door is plumb (instruction 9).

Slide the head jambs into place between the vertical jambs. (For NCJ refer to the Additional HowTO Information sheet).

'Flush up' the joints. Then screw them into place with the 8 gauge x 19mm long hex head screws (as supplied) through both ends at the top of the head jambs.

For doors wider than 1000mm, screw fixing with 4 gauge x 10mm long pan pozi screws may be required. Fix these through the small flange of the head jamb that rests on the underside of the track. NOTE: These screws are **NOT** required for CS SofStop units.

FINISHING THE INSTALLATION.

11 Fixing the wall linings.

Where possible, the supplied 'jamb spreader' (drawing T) should be inserted into the cavity slider opening prior to fixing wall linings and architraves.

Wherever possible, linings should only be glued on. Use short drywall screws to hold linings in place until glue is dry. For 13mm linings use maximum 28mm long drywall screws. We recommend sealing the inside of the plasterboard linings prior to fixing.

Note: When fixing wall linings above the head jambs do not allow the linings to finish lower than 5mm below the top of the head jamb (drawing **W**).

12 If fitting skirtings (drawing X).

When you fix the skirtings, make sure that you do **not** puncture the aluminium extrusion of the bottom plate assembly.

The maximum length of the panel pins are the combined thicknesses of the skirting and the wall lining **plus** 17mm.

Do not hammer too hard against the bottom plate. This may damage the channel through which the door leaf runs.

13 Removing the door leaf (drawing V & Y).

Begin by removing the head jamb from one side (if fitted).

Fit the club end of the adjusting spanner over the hexagonal nut at the bottom of the hanger pin (drawing \mathbf{V}).

Use the extended part of the spanner to press down the plunger pin that protrudes up from the mounting plate. Once this plunger is fully depressed, slide the spanner sideways towards the plunger pin.

The whole carriage (including the shaft) will now disengage from the mounting plate.

It is not always easy to slide the spanner sideways. You may need to relieve the door's weight by putting a wedge between door and floor. If you need to remove the T-guide: lift the unlocking clip (drawing X) and pull the black nylon T-guide forward. Use a hook to aid removal if required.

To remove the carriages: Slide them out of the notched end of the track.

14 Fitting your own door (drawing Z).

- a) At the bottom of the door leaf cut a groove to the dimension and tolerance shown (drawing Z).
 Make it central to the door thickness and absolutely straight.
- b) Drill mounting plate holes to the correct size and depth as marked (drawing **Z**).
- c) Fix both mounting plates to the door. Make sure they are placed exactly in the centre of the door thickness.
- d) Load the carriages through the notched end of the track.
- e) Position the door underneath the carriages.
 Raise the door up so that the round head of the wheel hanger shaft lines up with the keyhole shaped hole in the mounting plate (drawing **Z**).

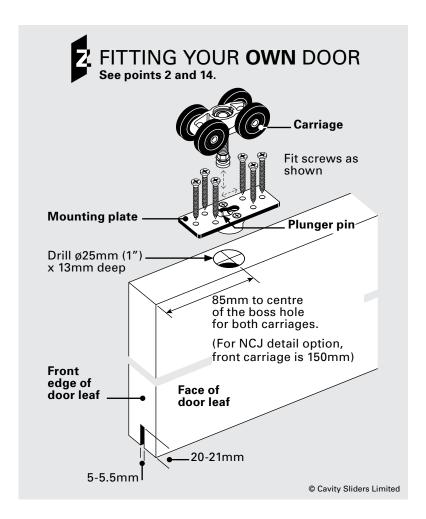
 Go to page

f) Depress the plunger using the wheel hanger shaft head and slide sideways until it snaps into locked position. Repeat for the other carriage.

15 WARNING (drawing V and W).

CS Cavity Sliders require the track running surface to be clean and free of any contamination or damage. For smooth reliable service, the tyres on the carriage should not be chipped, dented or have swarf embedded in the tyre.

Please take extra care with the carriages to avoid any damage during the installation process.

Remove the transportation cleat (if still fitted) from the bottom plate assembly. (Take out the two screws and the three staples.)

Check for any obvious product defects. Lay each unit on its back and sight the gap to

check for normal clearances (drawing **V**). If anything looks out of specification or you are unsure, contact CS <u>before</u> beginning your install.

2 Fit the door leaves (if not already fitted). Refer to 'Fitting your own doors' (Page 4, instruction 12, drawing Z).

3 Place both units as a pair into the framed opening in the wall.

Ensure that the tracks are connected neatly together with alignment pins provided (drawing **Y**). These fit into the track screw tubes.

Check that the jack studs on both sides of the door opening are plumb in both directions.

4 Fix the aluminium back studs.

Plumb-up the two aluminium split jambs (drawing **U**). Use a level!

While keeping the aluminium split jambs plumb, pack behind the aluminium back studs as shown. Screw the aluminium back studs including the packing to the 100mm x 50mm jack stud through the pre-punched holes.

Timber studs: use 8 gauge x 29mm wood screws. **Steel** studs: 8 gauge x 29mm self-tapping screws.

5 Level the tracks (drawing U and Y).

The tracks must be fitted level and straight. The tracks must be fixed to the lintel at 600mm centres through the aluminium flanges on both sides, starting 50mm back from the track meeting point. The screw heads must pull hard up under the aluminium flanges (drawing Y).

For **timber** lintels: Use 8 gauge screws penetrating the lintel by at least 25mm.

For **light steel** lintels (under 2mm wall thickness): Use 8 gauge self-tapping screws which penetrate the lintel by at least 5mm.

For heavy steel lintels:

Use M5 machine bolts and nuts.

For **Full-Height** (FH) detail option:

The bottom of the track should finish flush with the underside of the finished ceiling (refer to the Additional HowTO Information sheet).

6 Fix the bottom plate assembly

(drawing **W**). The doors must slide parallel with the bottom plate assembly (see the 2 sets of black **A-A** arrows). If not, gently tap the front of the assembly to the left or right until they do.

The doors should now slide smoothly and butt neatly together when both doors are closed. Fix the skirting block fixing to the floor only when the cavity pocket has been adjusted so that the **door closes neatly into the closing jamb and slides parallel to the bottom plate** of the cavity slider.

6 Fix the bottom plate assembly to the floor as follows:

To concrete floors:

Fix with ø8mm x 90mm masonry anchors through the pre-drilled holes in the skirting fixing blocks of the bottom plate. (See the red stamped arrow on the timber).

1 To **timber** floors:

Fix the bottom plate assembly with ø3.15mm x 75mm nails on either side in the centre of the skirting fixing block thickness. (See the red stamped \bigoplus on the timber). Pre-drill ø3mm holes for these nails.

7 Adjust the door heights (drawing X).

Use the small end of the spanner supplied to rotate the hexagonal nut at the bottom of the carriage hanger shaft.

Adjust the doors for plumb, making sure they butt neatly together when closed (no gaps).

To raise door: Rotate spanner from left to right. To lower door: Rotate spanner from right to left.

Note: The top of the hanger shaft screws into a self-locking nut. If the hexagonal nut is turned downwards too far, the shaft will become loose from the self-locking nut. If the turning resistance suddenly feels much easier, you have gone too far. With the head jambs not yet fitted, now is a good time to adjust where the doors stop.

The black plastic stop fitted to the mount plate is what contacts the track stop.

Using a 4mm Allen key, loosen the track stops and push them towards the cavity pockets. Gently slide each door towards the centre closed position (where the tracks meet) and then open again. Lock the track stops in place and test that the doors finish where you need them to stop.

8 Fit the head jambs (drawing Y).

Before fitting head jambs, check that you have the desired clearance under the door and that the door is plumb (instruction 7). Slide the head jambs into place between the vertical jambs. 'Flush up' the joints. Then screw them into place with the 8 gauge x 19mm long hex head screws (as supplied) through both ends at the top of the head jambs.

For doors wider than 1000mm, screw fixing with 4 gauge x 10mm long pan pozi screws may be required. Fix these through the small flange of the head jamb that rests on the underside of the track. NOTE: These screws are not required for CS SofStop units.

For Serveries units (SERV) the sill (not included unless asked for) should be fitted neatly between the vertical jambs.

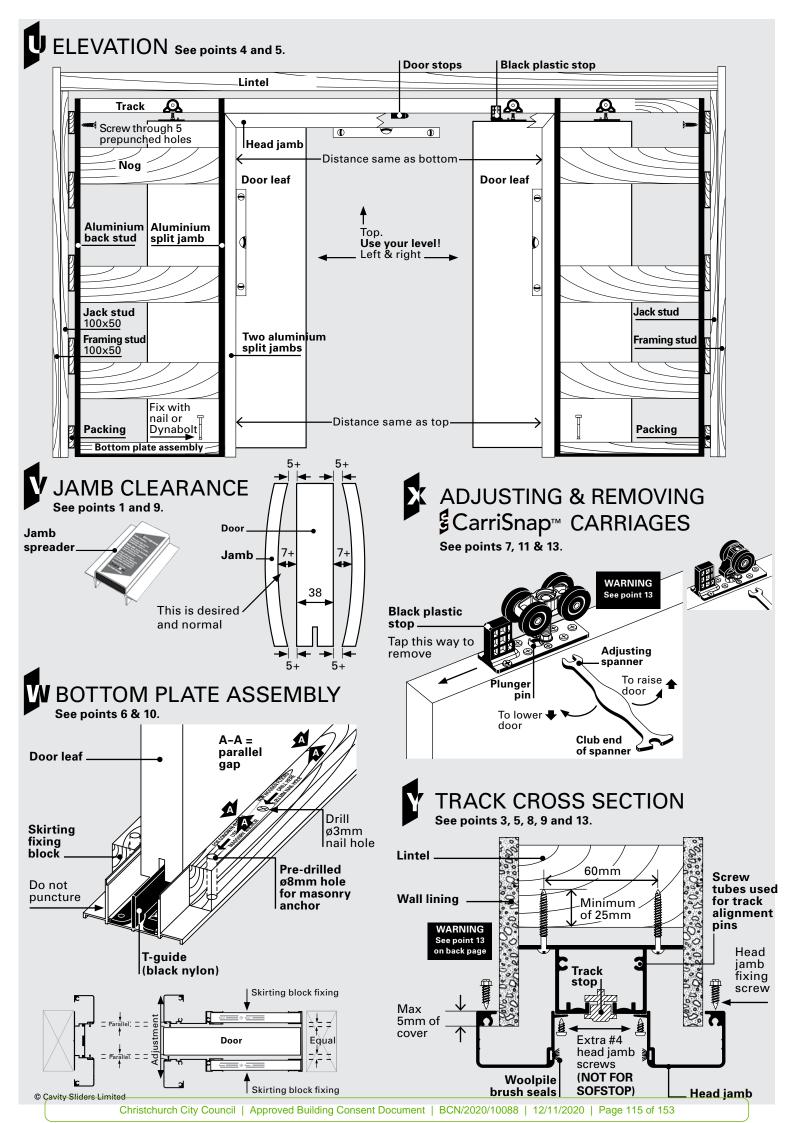
FINISHING THE INSTALLATION.

9 Fixing the wall linings.

Where possible, the supplied 'jamb spreader' should be inserted into the cavity slider opening prior to fixing wall linings and architraves (drawing \mathbf{V}).

Wherever possible, linings should only be glued on. Use short drywall screws to hold linings in place until glue is dry.

Go to page 4 (overleaf)



We recommend sealing the inside of the linings prior to fixing.

Note: When fixing wall linings above the head jambs do not allow the linings to finish lower than 5mm below the top of the head jamb (drawing **Y**).

10 If fitting skirtings (drawing W).

When you fix the skirtings, make sure that you do **not** puncture the aluminium extrusion of the bottom plate assembly.

The maximum length of the panel pins are the combined thicknesses of the skirting and the wall lining **plus** 17mm.

Do not hammer too hard against the bottom plate. This may damage the channel through which the door leaf runs.

11 Removing the door leaves (drawing X).

Begin by removing the head jamb from one side (if fitted).

Fit the club end of the adjusting spanner over the hexagonal nut at the bottom of the hanger pin $(drawing \mathbf{W})$.

Use the extended part of the spanner to press down the plunger pin that protrudes up from the mounting plate. Once this plunger is fully depressed, slide the spanner sideways towards the plunger pin.

The whole carriage (including the shaft) will now disengage from the mounting plate.

It is not always easy to slide the spanner sideways. You may need to relieve the door's weight by putting a wedge between door and floor.

Do the same with the other carriages.

Finally, remove the black plastic stop that is tightly fitted into the mounting plate at the front of each door leaf. Remove this by tapping it out in the direction shown using a hammer and drift (drawing **X**).

If you want to take the carriages out: Slide them towards the centre of the opening.

Use a 4mm Allen key to remove the track stops fitted in the middle where the doors meet.

12 Fitting your own doors (drawing **Z**).

At the bottom of the door leaf cut a groove to the dimension and tolerance shown (drawing **Z**). Make it central to the door thickness and absolutely straight.

Drill mounting plate holes to the correct size and depth as marked (drawing **Z**).

Fix both mounting plates to the door. The larger of the two mounting plates (the one with the black plastic stop) fits closest to the leading edge of the door. Make sure the black plastic stop is facing the leading edge of the door.

Remove the track stops from the centre of each track (drawing Y) by loosening the two stainless steel cap screws.

Slide the stops to the centre of the track where they will drop out through the carriage access slot.

Load the carriages into the track through the notch in the track.

Position the door underneath the carriages.

Go to page 5

12 Raise the door up so that the round head of the wheel hanger shaft lines up with the keyhole shaped hole in the mounting plate (drawing **Z**).

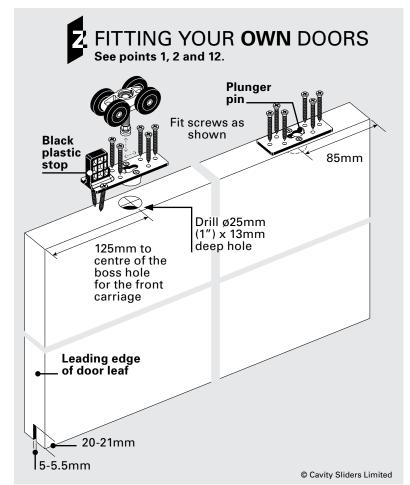
Depress the plunger using the wheel hanger shaft head and slide sideways until it snaps into locked position. Repeat for the other carriages.

Re-fit the track stops to the tracks with each rubber buffer part pointing towards the cavity pocket. Temporarily tighten the cap screws. Continue at instruction 3 on page 3.

13 WARNING (drawing X and Y).

CS Cavity Sliders require the track running surface to be clean and free of any contamination or damage. For smooth reliable service, the tyres on the carriage should not be chipped, dented or have swarf embedded in the tyre.

Please ensure you take extra care with the carriages to avoid any damage during the installation process.

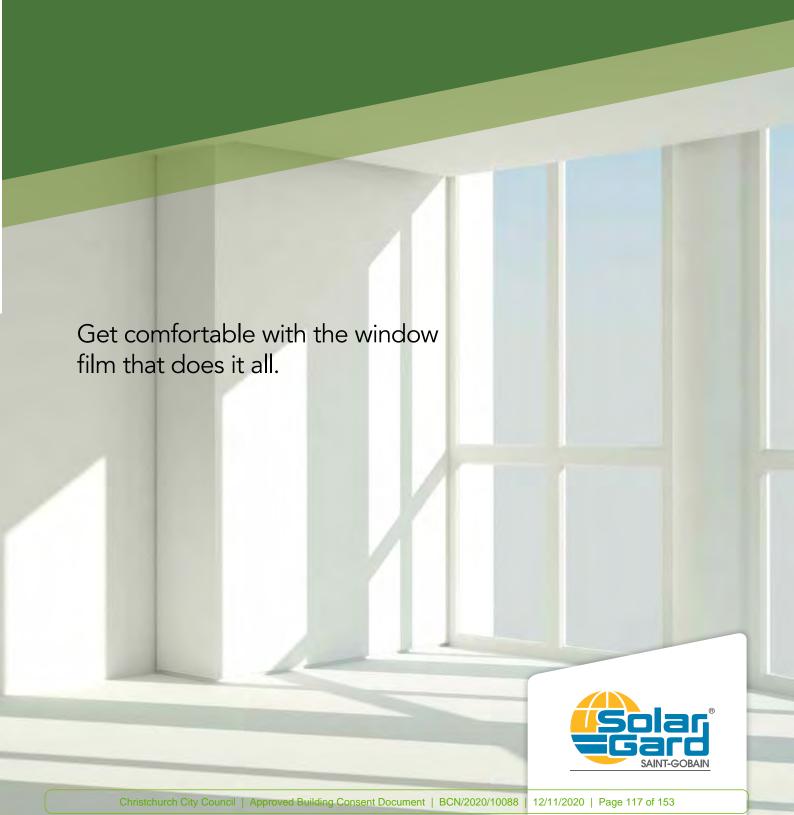

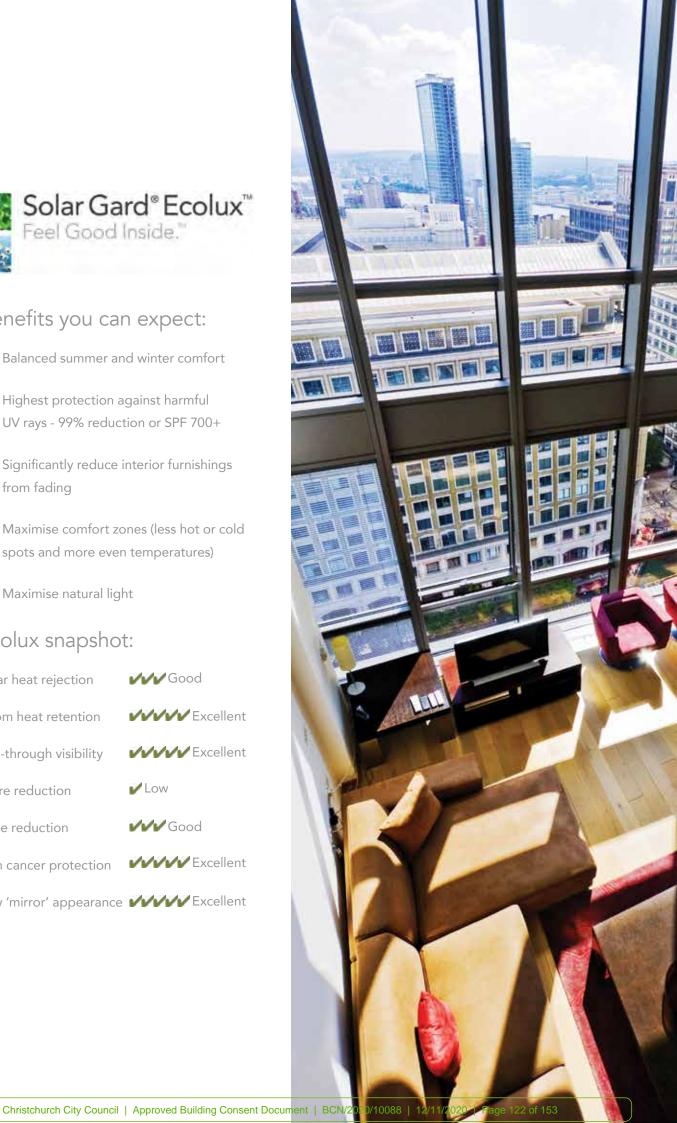

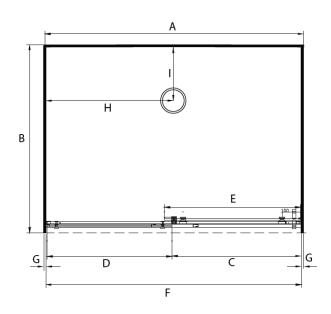

CLEANING AND MAINTENANCE

Bathroom products are used often and the following is our suggestion on how to clean and care for them.

Shower Wall

We use Durosan premium quality sanitaryware grade Acrylic. It is, by design, very robust and chemical resistant. A soft damp cloth with non-abrasive cleaners should be used. Use only non-abrasive cleaners that are recommended for acrylic products.

Shower Tray and Bath

We manufacture our Shower Trays and Baths using a Solid Acrylic Surface. Most other shower trays are manufactured using a veneer acrylic surface. The great advantage is that small scratches can be removed easily by using fine cutting compound. Again, the same basic cleaning methods as the wall are recommended.

Shower Doors and Glass

All glass is compliant to AS/NZS 2208. We suggest that the glass surfaces are wiped down or squeegeed following use to remove excess water. For best results use a trusted glass cleaner.

Metal Framework

Should be cleaned using a soft damp cloth with non-abrasive cleaner. Note that on round showers, the bottom rollers are easy release for ease of cleaning. If chemical spray cleaners are used, avoid direct contact with the rollers and guides and ensure the shower is rinsed off to avoid residue build up.

Weather Seals and Drip Strips

Can be removed if required for cleaning, and can be replaced when they no longer look their best. Refer to the spare parts and accessories section of our website for more details.

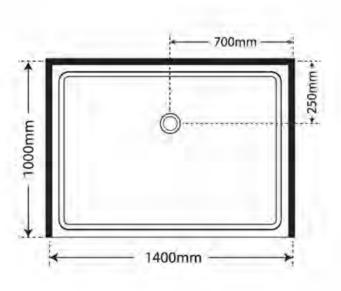

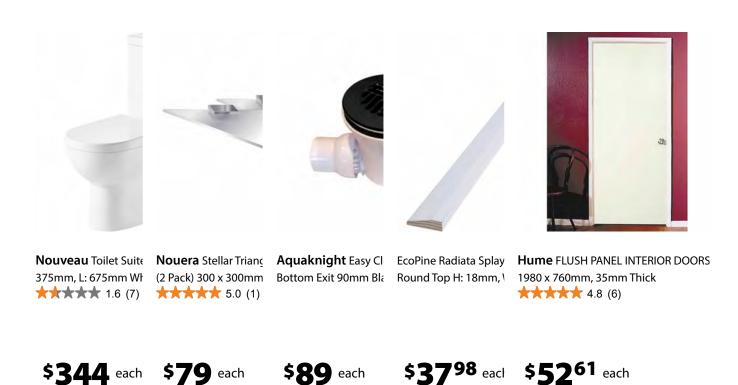

BATHROOM EXTRACTOR FAN: SELECTION GUIDE FAN REGULATIONS

WHAT THE LAW STATES

New Zealand Building Code G4 Ventilation (summarised):

"Buildings shall have a means of collecting or otherwise removing: cooking fumes and odours; steam from laundering, utensil washing, bathing and showering; odours from sanitary and waste storage spaces; poisonous or flammable fumes and gases".

- Natural Ventilation for the above is acceptable as long as opening windows in each room have an area of 5% or more of the floor area of the room.
- For internal rooms without natural ventilation, mechanical ventilation (extraction fans) must be installed to extract the air at given rates. Residential requirements are listed below.
- Where fans are used to remove moisture and other contaminants from kitchens, bathrooms and laundries in housing, the exhaust air must be ducted to the outside at the flow rates mentioned below.
- Extraction of wet rooms (e.g. bathroom, toilet, laundry) must be kept separate from kitchen extraction.

MOISTURE AND CONDENSATION

Factors that affect condensation and moisture include:

- Bathroom size and materials used on the floor, walls, and ceiling
- · Size and type of shower and showerhead
- Cold surfaces such glass, mirrors, tiles, wet-wall linings, cold uninsulated ceiling linings, etc.
- Cold air sources (i.e. an open window)
- Water pressure

INDUSTRY RECOMMENDATIONS

- The mentioned flow rates below are minimum allowable. In general these would not be enough to overcome excessive moisture and condensation problems encountered in modern homes.
- The ventilation industry has a "Recommended Air-Changes per Hour" approach solution. i.e. An air flow rate sufficient to remove/replace the total volume of air in a given room a specified number of times each hour.
- Obviously fans will not necessarily be left running for an hour - a fact which is taken into consideration in the formula.



Bathrooms

*25 l/s



Laundries

*20I/s



Toilets

*25 l/s

* minimum flow rates are of a fan installed with ducting and grilles, measured at the inlet grille with an anemometer.

TIPS FOR REDUCING CONDENSATION AND AIDING EXTRACTION

The following tips will ensure that the system is able to run as efficiently as possible:

- Keep windows closed (specifically in winter): cold outside air mixing with warm inside air will cause an increase in condensation.
- **Ensuring sufficient makeup air:** in order for the fan to function efficiently, fresh air is needed to replace the extracted air. A 20mm gap under the door, or a door grille, will provide sufficient makeup air during a shower.
- Heating: using a bathroom heater to warm the room before a shower will assist in reducing condensation.
- Post shower: after a shower, keep the fan running for at least 5 minutes, and also keep the bathroom door open to
 aid extraction.

EXTRACTION SELECTION

CHOOSING A FAN

AIR CHANGES PER HOUR (ACH)

The number of times the total room volume of air is changed each hour. Refer to the table below for the recommended Air Changes Per Hour based on the room type.

Application Description	Air Changes Per Hour
Bathrooms	11 - 15
Toilets	6 - 10
Laundries - (with ducted drier)	6 - 10
Laundries - (without ducted drier)	10 - 30

Always use the higher number (15 for bathrooms, 10 for toilets) when calculating the fan requirements.

Note:

Fan performance is tested under free-air confitions, unless otherwise stated. Free-air testing does not include ducting, grilles or a bathroom environment.

WORKING OUT THE RIGHT FAN FOR THE JOB

- Calculate the room volume in metres (L x W x H).
 e.g. bathroom of 2m x 3m x 2.4m = 14.4 m³
- Multiply the room volume by the recommended air changes per hour for that room. Always use the higher limit
 - e.g. bathroom of 14.4 m^3 x 15 ACH = 216 m^3/hr .
- The result is the minimum fan performance required in cubic metres per hour.
 - e.g. a fan capable of at least 216 m³/hr for above bathroom

Select a fan with a higher performance than this figure.

If you know the Litres/Second (I/s):

 $I/s \times 3.6 = m^3/hr$. (e.g. 25 $I/s \times 3.6 = 90m^3/hr$).

If you know the Cubic Metres/Hour (m³/hr):

 $m^3/hr \div 3.6 = I/s$. (e.g. 200 $m^3/hr \div 3.6 = 55.55 I/s$).

FAN PERFORMANCE

The following factors may affect the extraction performance of a fan, resulting in a pressure drop of the system:

- **Type of grilles:** the more open the grille, the less the air restriction
- **Type of ducting:** rigid ducting allows air to pass through more efficiently
- **Length of ducting**: the longer the ducting, the more the pressure drop (approx. 1Pa/m)
- Installation of ducting: compressing the ducting to pass through joists and timber can restrict airflow.
 Wrinkled ducting causes turbulence and reduces airflow.
- **Number of duct bends:** sharp bends greatly restrict air flow

Note:

Stated extraction rates are "free air" values and do not account for grille type or duct run restrictions.

EXTRACTION SELECTION

WET AREA ZONE GUIDE

When considering where in the room to place an extractor fan, you must consider the wet areas.

Zone 1: This is the zone directly within the shower or bath up to 2.25 metres above the floor and 150mm around the bath/shower cubicle. An SELV fan or an inline fan kit will be required in this zone.

For example if a fan is mounted directly over the bath or shower it must be a low voltage fan (SELV).

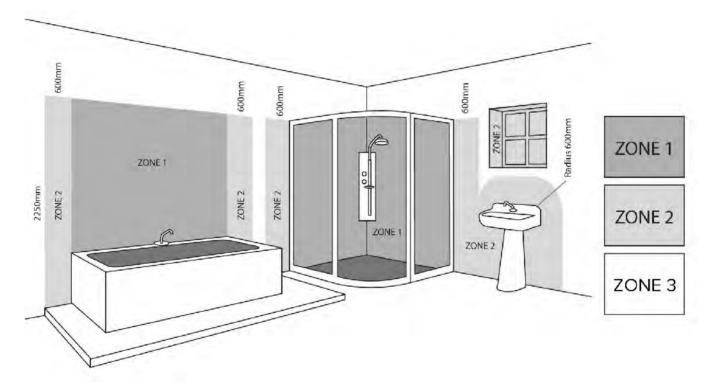
Zone 2: This zone is 0.6 metres horizontally outside of zone 1 and up to 2.25 metres above the floor.

Zone 3: The outer layer is zone 3, which is 2.4 metres horizontally outside of zone 2 and 2.25 metres above the floor.

Zone 1: Requires an SELV Fan or an Inline fan kit.

Zone 2: Any fan model can be used.

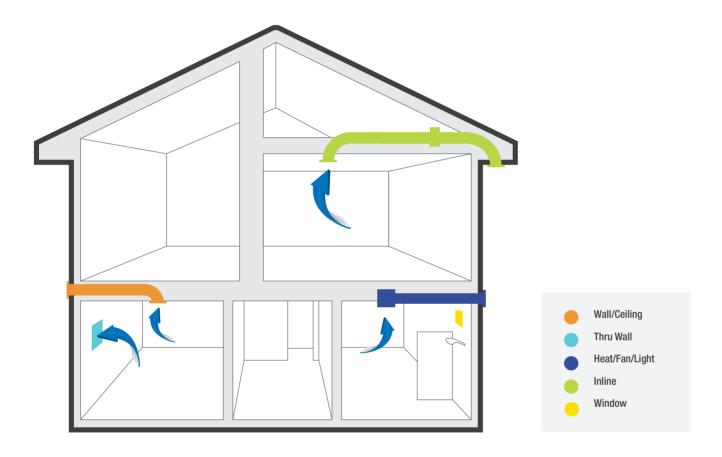
If the performance required falls between two fans, it is recommended you select the one handling the most air, as grille type and duct run length will reduce the stated 'free air' performance.

EXTRACTION SELECTION

FAN TYPES

Location of your extraction fan will depend on the physical constraints of your room. The wet area zone guide (shown on the previous page) will help you decide the most suitable physical installation to meet your requirements. Within the various mounting options there are other features available, such as:

- TIMER (maintain fan operation for a set time after the room is vacated).
- PULLCORD (switch at fan, instead of wall switch control).
- AUTO-SHUTTER (electrically operated shutters inside the fan closed when the fan is not running to stop draughts).



Ceiling Mounted Fan

Designed for low-pitch roofs or between floors, where there is no ceiling access. Also available with heat lamps & lighting.

Thru Wall Fan Kit

Used where the bathroom is on an external wall, or there is no ceiling space for an inline fan.

Window Mounted Fan

Used in situations where an existing window fan is being replaced, or where there is no available external wall space and no ceiling space access.

Inline Mounted Fan Kit

Most common bathroom installation, the fan is mounted in the ceiling space with the grille directly above the source of the steam.

Generally this type of installation is quieter as the fan is not directly in the room.

Thru Roof Kit

Used where there is limited access to the roof space, or where there is no soffit available. Thru Roof Kits can be used with any extraction fan, or use a Thru Roof Fan Kit with the fan mounted within the cowl.

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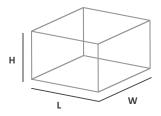
Choose the right fan

Extraction fans should preferably be placed as close as possible to the steam source (e.g. over or near the shower). In-line fans are the most common solution as the grille can be placed directly above the steam source. Work through the steps below to identify the right fan for your application.

1. Calculate your room size

Calculate the volume of your room in cubic metres (m³). E.g: 2.8m x 2.6m x 2.4m = 17.47m³.





2. Identify your extraction requirements

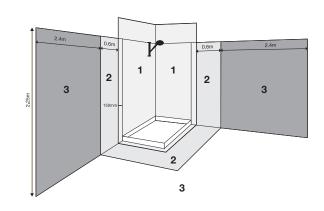
Air Changes Per Hour - ACH - is the term used to describe an airflow rate sufficient to remove/replace the total volume of air in a given room at a specified number of times each hour. Using the table below, multiply your calculated room size by the applicable ACH to identify the Performance required for your fan.

3. Consider your location

When considering where in the room to place an extractor fan, you must consider the wet areas. In New Zealand, the height of Zone 1 is 2.25m or, the height of the fixed plumbing connection, whichever is higher. Refer to the zones in the adjacent chart and diagram to identify if the location of your fan requires a Low Voltage or In-line Fan.

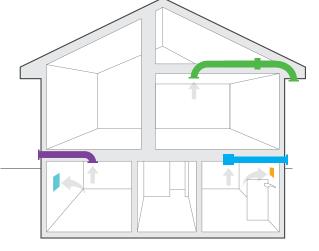

This building has been releveled and the structure and levels have been inspected by engineers Mike Wilton consulting limited in way of PS4. Deborah Wilson architectural designer and technician inspected the building on 22/09/2020 after the relevel.

Roof:

Corrugated roof and flashings and Solatube look sound on the outside and inspection of ceilings did not show water damage. The roof insulation will be checked and topped up if needed when alterations and new heat ducting and wireing is done. Down pipes need to be reconnected into existing Stormwater drains.



Flashing cap over brick and windows looks sound with no signs of moisture on the inside walls and no sign of mould or dampness.



Windows where checked and open and close freely.



Cladding is brick veneer it looks sound but need some mortar repairs due to historic damage. Existing windows and doors are sound and open freely some windows will need to be replaced to allow for adequate ventilation to new habitable spaces and a new door for egress from new lounge and new laundry.

The Sewage pipes need to be reconnected once new plumbing is in place. And new gully traps as required. Ground clearance of 150mm to unfinished ground and 100mm to paving around building and foot paths need to be established.

An addition was done in 2007 and has fire rated walls this may have been part of the requirements for a commercial property, the minimum set back from boundary is 1.77m this is more than adequate for a domestic house.



Pads for post at entry terrace needs to be rebuilt as instructed by engineer.



Shiplap weatherboards look sound but need restaining.

The internal linings are sound with only a few damaged panels of GIB. Once the new rooms have been reconfigured the walls will be braced.

The existing walls are insulated with pink batts some of the lining has been removed so this could be inspected.

The concrete slab has been releveled and structurally repaired, some small repairs to surface is required for floor finishes. New carped and vinyl will be laid once the building work is finished.

Glazing the extension built in 2007 is fully glazed with double glazing, and all new windows and doors will be double glazed. The Bay window is single glazed and will have a low E film applied to the inside windows to reduce heat loss.

There will be a new heat pump ducted in roof space to provide cost effective heating.

This building is more that adequate as a house once altered, its located in a residential community and has the right setbacks from internal and road boundary's. It will have sufficient light and ventilation to habitual space and it is well insulated. And has enough parking and outdoor area which will be landscaped, with direct access off the new lounge.

Permitted activity

Based on the information submitted, the project for alterations and change of use from medical rooms
to a dwelling, with changes to layout of dwelling and construction of detached garage and mudroom.
These works comply with all relevant rules and is a permitted activity under the Christchurch District
Plan. No resource consent is required.

Land characteristics and hazards

Development levels and flooding

Development levels

- Recommended Finished Floor Level (Outbuilding): It is noted that the garage (accessory building to principal use not intended for human habitation) is outside the scope of Building Code Clause E1.3.2 (Performance E1.3.2 shall only apply to Housing, Communal Residential and Communal Non-Residential buildings) however it is recommended that a minimum finished floor level of at least 13.07m RL in terms of Christchurch Drainage Datum be adopted to avoid potential inundation of the building. Where it is proposed to construct an outbuilding lower than the recommended level (and whether or not a notice under Section 73 of the Building Act is required) the outbuilding must comply with the following:
 - The structure will need to withstand a 1% AEP (100 year return period annual exceedance probability) event.
 - The durability of the floor and lower wall areas, at least up to the height of potential flood levels, must not be susceptible to damage in the event of flooding and must meet the Building Code (particularly B1.3.1 and 2). This can be met by a concrete nib wall up to the floor level stated above, or by unlined walls constructed of treated timber.
 - Power sockets must be above the recommended floor level stated above.
- Floor Level Consideration Pursuant To District Plan: This property is located within an area affected by rules/development standards in the District Plan which include floor level as an assessment matter and you are advised to refer to the planning section of this document for any implications of these matters in relation to your specific project. Min recommended level is 13.13m RL.
- **Building Location Certificate:** The Christchurch City Council requires that a Building Location Certificate (Form B-081) be completed for sites where minimum levels are set in relation to flood limitation or where durability must be assessed. A Registered Surveyor is required to specify levels in terms of a stated datum and origin point, to measure ground and foundation levels at critical points and to determine building setbacks from boundaries. This information, together with areas of departure from approved Building Consent and/or Resource Consent documentation, is to be submitted on the Certificate signed by the surveyor. The Building Location Certificate provides Council with an appropriate level of verification that the building has been located in compliance with the approved project documentation. The signed Certificate is to be provided to the Council's Code Compliance Assessor at such time as may be necessary to verify consent conditions.

- Origin of Levels: The building site is located in an area where there is potential for flooding to occur. Before the Council can consider whether to issue a Building Consent you will need to provide existing ground levels (and proposed ground levels if filling is to take place) and proposed finished floor levels which are to be shown on the building consent plans in terms of *Christchurch Drainage Datum* (CDD) established by, or under direct supervision of, a Registered Surveyor using either:
 - A Christchurch City Council benchmark sourced from https://canterburymaps.govt.nz; or
 - A precise levelled benchmark from *LINZ Canterbury Earthquake Precise Levelling Height Dataset V1.1.* Note: Levels obtained from this dataset will need to be adjusted by +9.043m to bring them in terms of Christchurch Drainage Datum. The Canterbury Earthquake Precise Levelling Height Dataset V1.1 can be sourced from https://www.linz.govt.nz/data/geodetic-system/standards-specifications-and-publications/published-papers-presentations.

Ground conditions

Technical Category

- TC3: Liquefaction damage is possible in future large earthquakes. Deep geotechnical investigation (or assessment of existing information) may be required (depending on the degree of damage, and in particular for a rebuild) and depending on the geotechnical assessment, might require specific engineering input for foundations.
 - Options for new foundations: Three broad types of residential foundations have been established to meet the varying vertical settlement and lateral spreading requirements. These are:
 - deep piles
 - site ground improvements
 - surface structures with shallow foundations

Each has different capabilities to accommodate various levels of vertical settlement and lateral spreading, and requires different constraints with respect to the configuration and weights of superstructure. The overall process of selecting and documenting foundation systems and details for houses in TC3 is a specific engineering design process that requires Chartered Professional Engineering input. Depending on the assessed ground conditions and options selected by the engineer, some elements can be adopted and specified directly from the January 2013 MBIE guidance document *Guidance: Repairing and Rebuilding Houses Affected by the Canterbury Earthquakes* without further engineering design. These include Types 1 and 2 Site Ground Improvement methods (section 15.2) and the Type 1 and 2 Surface Structures (section 15.4).

- Options for foundation repairs: Refer to section 14 of the January 2013 MBIE guidance document *Guidance: Repairing and Rebuilding Houses Affected by the Canterbury Earthquakes*. Minor cracks (<5mm) in concrete floors and foundation beams can be repaired in accordance with Appendix A4 of those guidelines. No geotechnical investigation will be required in these cases.
- Superstructure repairs only with no foundation damage: If no foundation damage is present that
 requires repair and specific engineering design then superstructure repairs can proceed using
 guidance from Part A, section 7 of the January 2013 MBIE guidance document: Guidance:
 Repairing and Rebuilding Houses Affected by the Canterbury Earthquakes.

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• Geotechnical considerations: The scope of a deep geotechnical investigation must be determined by the geotechnical professional responsible for giving advice on the property in question. The geotechnical professional must be either a CPEng geotechnical engineer or a PEngGeol engineering geologist with competence, suitable relevant training, and experience in foundation investigation and liquefaction assessment. Refer to Part C of the January 2013 MBIE guidance document Guidance: Repairing and Rebuilding Houses Affected by the Canterbury Earthquakes.

Services

Critical issue: Authorisations

• **Authorisation For The Discharge Of Stormwater:** Specialist input is required from the *Three Waters & Waste Unit*. The SI-SWATER procedure has been started in 'Connect'.

Reticulated systems

- Water Related Services Pipework Within Private Property: The laying of sewer, stormwater and water supply pipework within private land which will remain in private ownership requires a building consent, compliance with the New Zealand Building Code, and must be installed by a person holding an appropriate registration under the *Plumbers, Gasfitters And Drainlayers Act 2006*. Evidence of compliance is provided through the issue of a code compliance certificate upon completion of the works.
- **Protection Of Private Drainage Systems:** The private drainage systems must be protected in an approved manner where they could be damaged by vehicular traffic, impact, tree root penetration, or any other source.
- Re-Use Of / Extensions To Existing Private Sanitary Sewer And Stormwater Systems: The sanitary sewer and stormwater systems already serving the property may be re-used to serve the new proposal providing:
 - Any extensions to pipework must be laid at sufficient depth to ensure protection and that adequate fall is available to serve the furthermost part of the site.
 - The existing private pipework within the private property is proven to be in a satisfactory condition. This may require CCTV inspection.
 - Any potential building connections must be able to meet the requirements of the New Zealand Building Code.
- Interceptor / Silt Traps: Where surface water drainage is proposed to connect directly to any open or
 piped stormwater system under the Council's control a master trap or silt trap, or similar device,
 situated in an approved position within the premises, will be required.

Construction nuisance
