Safety near underground cables and services

MainPower is committed to providing a safe, secure and reliable electricity supply to all customers.

This fact sheet is designed to inform you about safety around electricity, particularly underground cables.

Working near electricity cables

Serious personal injury can result from damaging underground services during excavation and ground penetration. Supply disruption and repairs can be costly and extremely irritating to customers.

The positions where cables are buried are subject to reasonable tolerance however, the depth of cover may have changed since installation.

It is your responsibility to verify the position and depth of cables before excavation.

Steps to ensure safe digging

- Obtain up-to-date plans from the relevant local authorities.
- Use a cable locator, if possible, to mark-out the underground services before commencing work.
- Practice safe digging procedures.
- The Worksafe Guide for Safety with Underground Services sets out agreed work methods and preferred work practices for the location and excavation of underground services. Underground council services

All contractors are reminded of their legal responsibility to take all practicable steps to locate and protect existing services. In the road corridor, service plans and a Corridor Access Request (CAR) permit need to be obtained through the Beforeudig website (www.beforeudig.co.nz). The Beforeudig service helps contractors to determine the location of any underground services before excavating. For service plans on private property, and lateral locations for work on private property that will not extend into any part of the road reserve, contact the Waimakariri District Council's Customer Services team at office@ wmk.govt.nz.

Using engineers & other professionals

If an engineer has been engaged to carry out various site inspections you will need to provide copies of his/her site notices to us and a producer statement, a PS4 from the engineer confirming the building elements designed and inspected by the engineer were completed in accordance with the approved design.

Confirmation of installation of products

We require producer statements, warranties & installation certificates from various installers as a way of confirming products have been installed in accordance with the manufacturer's recommendations. These are commonly required for exterior claddings, wet area tanking, membrane roofing/decking and effluent fields. Energy certificates such as electrical and gas certificates need to be provided too. You will need to provide these to us prior to the issue of the Code Compliance Certificate.

Applying for a Code Compliance Certificate (CCC)

When you are satisfied your project is complete please book a final inspection and complete and sign *form* 6, application for Code Compliance Certificate which is enclosed with your building consent. You should have this form ready for when the building Inspector arrives on site to carry out the final inspection. Please note all outstanding monies must be paid prior to the issue of the CCC.

Grant or refuse a CCC

We are required to make a decision to grant or refuse a CCC if you do not formally apply for a CCC within two years of the granting of the building consent. The date your consent was granted is the date at the bottom of the building consent form. If you do not apply for a CCC or arrange an extension with us within the two year period we may carry out an inspection of the building work. An additional fee applies for this work.

Lapsing of your consent

Your building consent will lapse if building work has not commenced within 12 months after the date of issue of the building consent. The issue date is deemed to be the day you paid for the consent. In saying this we understand things don't always run smoothly so you can apply for a time extension which we may agree to. A fee applies for this.

Occupational Health and Safety and the Labour Department to be notified prior to any disturbance of asbestos or hazardous materials on site during demolition or construction.

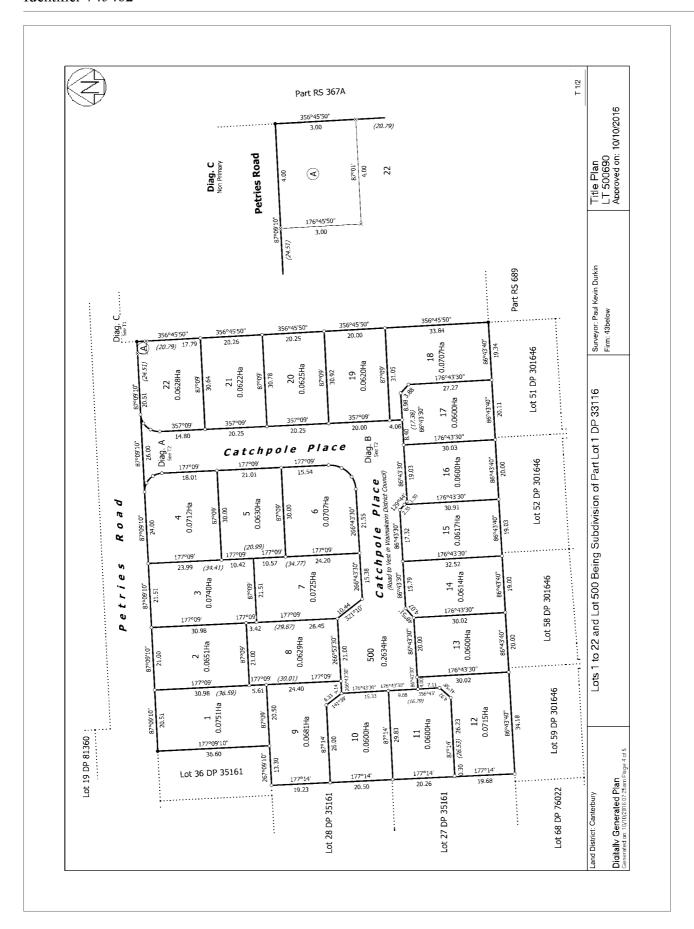

Two Roads Subdivision Stage 1 - Technical Classification Geotechnical Report

1 Introduction

GW Woodend Limited has recently subdivided a 1.7ha area of rural land into 22 residential lots with associated roading and drainage. This development is Stage 1 of the wider Two Roads residential development and located off Petries Road in Woodend.

A geotechnical subdivision assessment was carried out in 2012 prior to the release of the Ministry of Business, Innovation and Employment (MBIE) Guidelines which provides guidance for geotechnical investigation and classification of subdivisions in the Canterbury Region.

In order to provide an updated Technical Category Classification for the Two Roads Stage 1 development, GW Woodend Limited has engaged Aurecon to carry out additional geotechnical testing and confirm the Technical Category Classification of the site on a lot by lot basis using the latest MBIE Guidelines and methodologies.

Our work was carried out as an extension our existing 30 June 2015 agreement with GW Woodend Limited for the Two Road Woodend Subdivision. Our limitations are presented at the end of this report. This report shall be read as a whole.

This Revision 2 report incorporates minor amendments and clarifications, and supersedes all previous revisions.

2 Geotechnical Testing

Three sets of geotechnical testing have been carried out across the site as follows:

- Kirk Roberts (2012) Seven CPT tests (CPT001 to 007) were carried out by Kirk Roberts in 2012 for the previous site owner as part of the original subdivision assessment. These tests were undertaken to refusal at depths between 4.5m and 14.8mbgl.
- Elliott Sinclair (2016) Six CPT tests (CPT01 to 06) carried out by Elliott Sinclair in July 2016 at Lots 5, 9 and 20 to confirm the Technical Category Classification of these three lots only.
 These tests were all carried out to a depth of 10m.
- Aurecon (2016) 10 CPT tests (CPT101 to 110) were carried out by Aurecon in two phases.
 McMillan's Drilling Group carried out five CPT tests (CPT101 to 105) on Lots 16-19 and 21 on
 the 29 September 2016. Phase 2by Land Test to carried out an additional five CPT tests
 (CPT106 to 110) on Lots 2, 6, 7, 13 and 15 on 13 October 2016. The tests were extended to
 effective refusal or a maximum of 10m depth.



We have used all of the CPT data above in our liquefaction and Technical Category Classification assessments and the CPT test locations are shown on the Figure 1 attached.

3 Ground Conditions

Based on the geotechnical testing to date, the site is underlain by variable interbedded layers of silts and sands with some lenses of organic-slit material and an intermediate sandy-gravel / gravelly-sand layer. This gravely layer becomes sandier and less dense towards the eastern side of the site.

Groundwater was recorded by Elliott Sinclair at 1.7mbgl during their July 2016 assessment. This matches the groundwater level we encountered during the bulk excavation of the ground remediation works on the adjacent Two Roads Stage 2 area and the stand pipe piezometer installed in the southwest corner of Stage 2 on the northern side of Petries Road. Groundwater is expected to vary seasonally or following periods of drought or heavy precipitation.

4 Liquefaction Hazard Assessment

We have undertaken a liquefaction hazard assessment using the method prescribed in the MBIE Guidelines using both the 2016 Aurecon and the 2012 Kirk Roberts CPT data and reviewed the results of the 2016 Elliott Sinclair assessment which uses the same MBIE methodology as our assessment. Additionally, ground damage has been assessed under the various MBIE design level earthquake events using the Liquefaction Severity Number (LSN) methodology detailed in T&T (2013) and using the method of Ishihara (1985).

Accounting for seasonal variation and the measurement of groundwater during a dry winter period, for design purposes we have assumed a groundwater table at 1.5m depth.

The results of our assessment are summarised in Table 1 appended to this letter. Based upon our assessment there is no distinct geological feature causing higher liquefaction induced settlements (i.e. an old infilled river channel etc.), but the variability in the thickness and density of the sand and silty-sandy soils.

Based upon this assessment and review of Elliott Sinclair's assessments for Lots 5, 9 and 20 we make the following comments:

Lots 1 to 7, 9 to 15, 17, 18, 21 and 22

The calculated liquefaction induced ground deformations are within the limits of a Technical Category 2 (TC2) classification, i.e. minor to moderate ground damage could be expected in a future major seismic event.

Lots 8, 16, 19 and 20

Lots 8, 16, 19 and 20 in their natural form were identified as being noncompliant with the requirements of a TC2 classification based on an indexed liquefaction induced reconsolidation settlement criteria. The wider site is underlain by interbedded silty-sandy soils. However the sand content increases in these lots resulting an increase theoretical reconsolidation settlement in the areas with the higher sand content in the surficial soils.

5 Liquefaction Risk Mitigation

The following liquefaction hazard mitigation is recommended for the site:



Lots 1 to 7, 9 to 15, 17, 18, 21 and 22

No additional liquefaction risk mitigation is required for these lots other than an enhanced TC2 type of foundation system.

Lots 8, 16, 19 and 20

In order to ensure a TC2 classification across the entire site and provide additional seismic resilience we recommend that the 1.2m thick geogrid reinforced gravel ground improvement layer is constructed below and extending at least 1m beyond the building footprint of new houses. The ground improvement works have been based upon *Type G1d Shallow Densified Crust Treatment* option presented in Section 15 of the MBIE (2012) Guidelines. With this ground improvement implemented a TC2 foundation system can be used at these sites. An indicative cross section of this capping layer is appended to this report.

6 Foundation Recommendations

The following foundation recommendations are made for residential houses to be built at the site:

Lots 1 to 7, 9 to 15, 17, 18, 21 and 22 - Natural Ground

With Lots 1 to 7, 9 to 15, 17, 18, 21 and 22 TC2 foundation are required as outlined in Section 5 of the MBIE (2012) Guidelines. In accordance with the Guidelines standard shallow lot specific shallow geotechnical investigations are required during the detailed house design to assess the lot specific ground conditions and bearing capacity values. These shallow investigations should be undertaken by the designer of the house foundation to confirm appropriate foundation types and shallow bearing capacities.

Lots 8, 16, 19 and 20 - Capping Layer

With Lots 8, 16, 19 and 20 it is recommended the houses are:

- Founded directly onto the underlying gravel capping layer utilising the 200kPa bearing capacity TC2 type enhanced slab foundations (Options 2 to 4 in Section 5.3.1 of the MBIE Guidelines), or a suspended timber floor (based upon the recommendations in Section 5.3.2 of the MBIE Guidelines / NZS3604:2011) with the design pro rata to use 200kPa bearing capacity.
- To provide the best seismic resilience houses should:
 - Be formed from conventional one to two storey residential construction
 - o Single storey only if heavy cladding and roofing is used
 - o Up to two storeys if light to medium weight cladding and roofing is used.
 - The structural form should be restricted to timber frame (or light weight cold-rolled steel equivalent).

These foundations systems can be founded directly onto the underlying gravel. With the enhanced raft foundation options all topsoil and silty-sandy soil should be removed below the entire house footprint and if required replaced with compacted hardfill (95% of maximum dry density).

Due to the presence of the geogrid reinforcement within the gravel, and the capping function that the geogrid reinforced gravel raft preforms, penetrations through the geogrid must be avoided. Houses build in these lots should not have basements protruding through the



capping layer. Underfloor hydraulic services and conduits (wastewater, stormwater etc.), where possible should be designed in such a way that they do not penetrate through the geogrid reinforcement either and stay within the upper 900mm of the reinforced gravel layer.

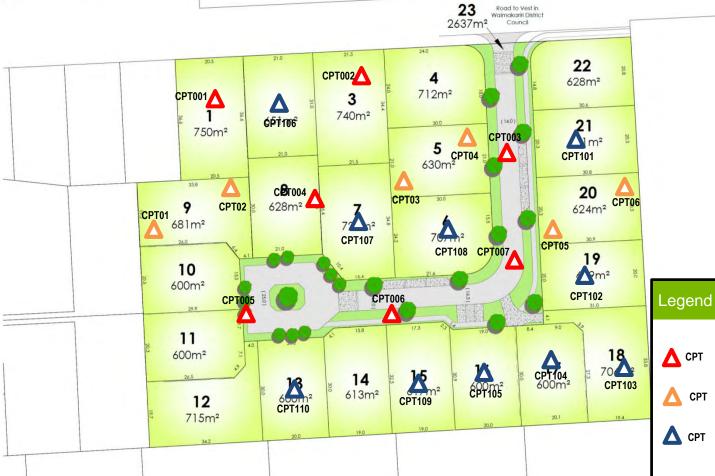

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Cresco Engineers New Zealand Limited has been engaged to provide engineering design service in respect of the Clause B1 of the New Zealand Building Code for the foundation of a residential dwelling at the address reported in the footing of this document.

Ground performance assessment, ground improvement design, superstructure design (included anchor plates and bolts) are outside the scope of this document.

The site has been classified Technical Category (TC2) as defined within the Guidelines "Repairing and rebuilding houses affected by the Canterbury earthquakes" issued by MBIE – Liquefaction damage is possible in future large earthquakes. Standard enhanced foundation rebuild options in accordance with MBIE Guidance are suitable to mitigate against this possibility.

For this building a waffle slab consistent with Option 4 MBIE Clause 5.3 has been designed.

For this project a 300 mm deep reinforced concrete waffle slab-on-ground with edge beams 300 mm wide and internal biaxial ribs wide at 750 mm x 750 mm centers has been specifically designed.

Specific design considerations allowed a reduction of the overall depth of the foundation notwithstanding the compliance of the structure with New Zealand regulations and performance set out at clause 5.4 of the MBIE Guidelines.

Information about the building (number of floors, roof and cladding types) is contained within the paragraphs titled "Geometry" and "Loads".

Information about the ground shallow bearing capacity is contained within the paragraph titled "Ground".

Information about construction materials is contained within the paragraph titled "Materials".

- Note 1 The fastener type and length must be as required for the relevant FRR system using the perimeter fixing pattern illustrated for the relevant bracing specification.

INTRODUCTION

Scope of use

This document is a guide to wall bracing of light timber frame (LTF) buildings constructed in accordance with NZS3604:2011 Timber Framed Buildings and presents a simple and efficient method for calculating and incorporating bracing resistance. This information draws on recent experiences from seismic activity in New Zealand and seeks to minimise earthquake damage to plasterboard linings in LTF buildings.

This document outlines the main principles of bracing design and construction using GIB® plasterboard products and systems. Further detailed information can be found in the GIB® Bracing Supplement by visiting gib.co.nz/library. This 'live' online document is updated continuously in response to market feedback and Winstone Wallboards' development initiatives.

Finish quality — framing and substrates

Home owners are increasingly demanding a high quality of interior finish. Finish quality is heavily influenced by the substrate to which linings are fixed. Detailed information on 'Levels of Finish' is given in AS/NZS 2589 and the latest version of the GIB® Site Guide.

New GIBFix® Framing System

With increased NZ Building Code requirements and growing customer demand for thermal efficiency and high quality interior finishes, traditional framing practices present problems such as multiple framing members at wall intersections creating thermal 'bridges' and cavities where insulation cannot be installed effectively.

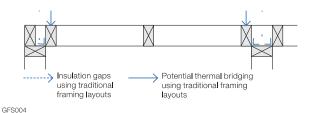
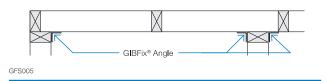


FIGURE 2: GIBFIX® FRAMING SYSTEM (ALTERNATIVE LAYOUT)

Figure 1 shows a traditional wall framing layout. Figure 2 shows the alternative GIBFix® Framing System layout.

Multiple timber framing members also take longer to dry resulting in an increased risk of fastener pops and blemishes resulting from timber frame movement.

The GIBFix® Framing System offers better thermal efficiencies and minimises potential joint imperfections resulting from interior linings being fixed to multiple timber framing members.

The GIBFix® Framing System can be used in conjunction with GIB EzyBrace® Systems.

Bracing resistance is not affected by the GIBFix® Framing System if the use of this alternative timber framing layout is preferred. Refer to the GIBFix® Framing System literature for more information.

Bracing ratings apply whether fixing is directly into timber or into the metal components, provided correct construction details, fastener types and centres are applied.

FIGURE 1: TRADITIONAL WALL FRAMING LAYOUT

NEW GS2-NOM Bracing Element

The new GS2-NOM bracing element allows most homes to be braced with a single lining type and less fixings so that a high quality finish is maintained throughout.

GS2-NOM permits the contribution of 'nominally fixed' internal walls. Higher performance elements are commonly specified on external walls and where limited wall area is available or adjacent to significant openings.

Winstone Wallboards recommends the use of the GIBFix® Framing System in conjunction with GS2-NOM elements. Key benefits of this approach include:

- Reduced potential for fastener pop and joint cracking of plasterboard linings.
- Enhanced thermal performance.
- Allows internal walls lined with GIB® plasterboard on both sides and fastened off as per the standard fixing requirements of the current GIB® Site Guide to contribute bracing resistance.
- Potentially reduces the amount of fasteners!
- Encourages more even bracing distribution throughout the building.
- 1. Actual savings dependent on building and bracing design.

INTRODUCTION

Compliance with the NZ Building Code

NZBC CLAUSE B1 - STRUCTURE

The design and material specification for steel and timber framing used in conjunction with this literature must be in accordance with the performance requirements of NZBC Clause B1. GIB EzyBrace® Systems comply with the requirements of NZS 3604:2011, when designed and installed in accordance with this publication and relevant technical literature. NZS 3604:2011 is an acceptable solution to NZBC Clause B1.

NZBC CLAUSE B2 — DURABILITY

Under normal conditions of dry internal use GIB EzyBrace® Systems have a service life in excess of 50 years and satisfy the requirements of NZBC Clause B2. When in conditions of dry internal use, the components specified in this literature satisfy the requirements of NZBC Clause B2.

GIB® EzyBrace® Systems must not be specified in areas where 15 year durability applies and where linings are subject to direct water pressure, e.g. shower cubicle or shower over bath situations.

NZBC CLAUSE F2 — HAZARDOUS BUILDING MATERIALS

Under normal conditions of use, during handling, installation or serviceable life, the products detailed in GIB EzyBrace® Systems do not constitute a health hazard and meet the provisions of the NZBC Clause F2.

NZBC CLAUSE H1 - ENERGY EFFICIENCY

Buildings must be constructed to achieve an adequate degree of energy efficiency and the building envelope must provide adequate thermal resistance. The required thermal resistance (R-value) of timber framed external walls depends on climate zone but is commonly in the range from R 1.9 to R 2.0.

Where applicable drawings related to GIB EzyBrace® Systems have been produced for CAD design. These are identified by a unique number in the bottom corner of each detail box. CAD design details can be found at gib.co.nz/library.

Appraisal

GIB EzyBrace® Systems 2016 have been appraised by the Building Research Association of New Zealand (BRANZ), Appraisal No. 928 (2016) GIB EzyBrace® Systems, 2016.

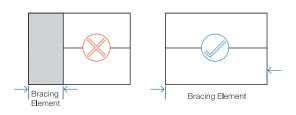
It is of prime importance to comply with the details of design, construction and workmanship in this document.

Bracing resistance

WALL BRACING LAYOUT

When designing the bracing layout, carefully consider the final finished appearance and utilise full wall lengths where possible, avoiding unnecessary fastenings in the centre of a clear wall. Using the available wall length provides additional bracing and achieves improved aesthetics.

BRACING DISTRIBUTION

Distribute bracing by drawing a grid pattern of bracing lines along and across the building. Bracing lines must coincide as much as possible with the wall bracing elements. Pairs of elements may be counted on a single line provided they are no more than 2 metres apart and parallel. See figure 4.

Locate bracing evenly throughout the building and as close as practical to corners of external walls.

Space bracing lines no more than:

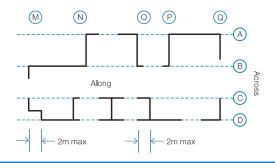
- 6 metres for standard construction with any GIB® plasterboard ceiling, or
- 7.5 metres where dragon ties in accordance with NZS3604:2011 have been installed, or
- 12 metres with a GIB® plasterboard ceiling diaphragm.

The construction of ceiling diaphragms is described in detail on p.18–20.

NZS3604:2011 requires that no bracing line shall have a capacity less than the greater of:

- 100 Bracing Units (BUs), or
- 15 x the external wall length (BUs) for bracing lines coinciding with external walls, or
- 50% of the total demand (D) divided by the number of lines
 (n) in the direction being considered (BUs).

The NZS3604 'rules' are merely minimum guidelines and compliance with them does not in itself ensure even distribution. The designer is responsible for checking distribution. Poor distribution can cause torsional effects and localised or more significant damage in an earthquake event.

GIB EZYBRACE® SYSTEMS

The GIB EzyBrace® Specification Numbering System (and sub-components thereof) is protected by copyright and makes specification and identification of GIB EzyBrace® Systems transparent.

- 'GS' stands for GIB® Standard.
- 'BL' for GIB Braceline®
- 'P' for plywood.
- '1' and '2' for linings one or both sides.
- 'N' stands for 'no specific panel hold-down fixings'.
- 'H' stands for 'specific panel hold-down fixing' required.
- 'NOM' stands for 'nominal plasterboard fixing'. This refers to the standard fixing method used to install plasterboard as shown in the current GIB® Site Guide.

Where specific hold-down fixings are specified, refer to p.15-16. GIB HandiBrac® is fully contained within the framing cavity and does not interfere with lining installation and quality of finish.

Where no specific hold-down fixings are required, the minimum NZS3604:2011 bottom plate fixings apply.

Full bracing element construction details are provided in this technical literature.

Bracing demand

GIB EZYBRACE® CALCULATOR

The GIB EzyBrace® calculator is a software tool to determine the wind and earthquake bracing demand and to design the bracing resistance for light timber-framed buildings constructed in accordance with NZS 3604:2011.

The updated GIB EzyBrace® calculator combines an up-to-date user-friendly interface with the latest knowledge relating to the performance of GIB® plasterboard in light timber-framed structures when subjected to high winds or earthquakes. The calculator can be down-loaded free of charge by visiting gib.co.nz/ezybrace and can be installed on either Microsoft® or Apple® Mac environments.

DEMAND

Wind and Earthquake 'Demand' calculates the forces a structure must be able to resist during its 'design life'. The GIB EzyBrace® calculator's Demand sheet determines the number of Bracing Units required depending on building location, building dimensions and materials used. The Demand sheet closely follows the familiar format of our Excel based GIB EzyBrace® calculator, and includes additional features such as a pop-up help facility explaining required input.

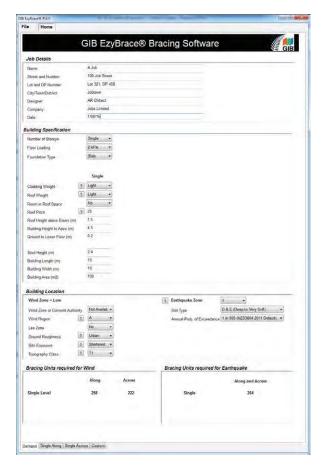
Bracing resistance sheets ('tabs') are added depending on the building specification entered. For example, subfloor bracing resistance tabs only show when a 'subfloor' foundation type has been selected.

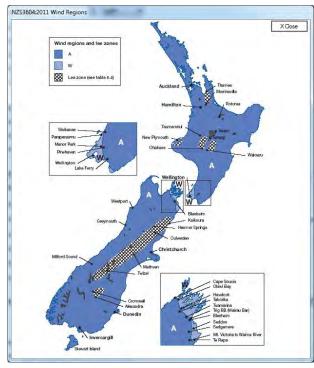
The Demand sheet gives the designer the option to select a longer earthquake return period which represents a higher earthquake design force. The default for buildings constructed in accordance with NZS3604:2011 is an earthquake that has a 10% chance of being exceeded within the assumed 50 year 'design life' of a light timber framed residential structure, a 'return period' of 500 years.

Many commercial and public buildings are designed for the more stringent requirement of a 10% probability of exceedance in a 100 or 250 year life expectancy.

Software functionality

Innovations adopted in the GIB EzyBrace® 2016 bracing 'resistance' calculation sheets include the ability to easily add and delete lines and elements during calculations.

The software compares bracing resistance achieved with demand and for wall bracing lines incorporating external walls, the external wall length can now be entered to check minimum bracing units required on that line. The NZS 3604:2011 rules and associated software output are not the only check. Designers must additionally check the building layout to ensure adequate bracing distribution.

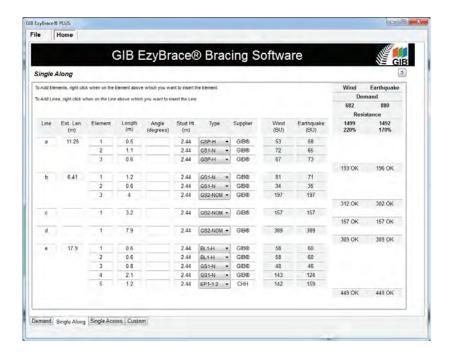
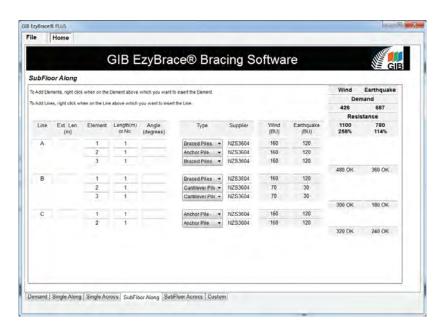


FIGURE 7: GIB EZYBRACE® 2016 - SUBFLOOR BRACING RESISTANCE CALCULATION SHEET

Figures 6 and 7 show screen shots of the Wall and Subfloor Resistance Sheets respectively.

FIGURE 6: GIB EZYBRACE $^{\circ}$ 2016 — WALL BRACING RESISTANCE CALCULATION SHEET

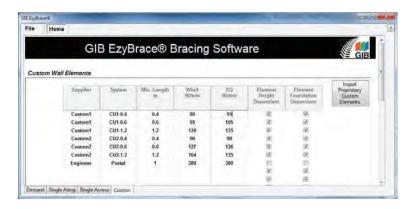

Software functionality

Help can be accessed by pressing the ? symbol which displays a window with further information.

The GIB EzyBrace® 2016 software has a number of options that can be accessed via the File tab at the top left hand corner of the window. The options include: New, Save, Save As, Open, Recent and Print.

- The New option closes any opened job ready for the input of a new job.
- The Save option saves the currently opened job to the same filename and the Save As option saves the job to a new filename.

- The Open option prompts for the name of an existing job.
- The Recent option displays a list of the ten latest jobs and allows for the selection of one of these jobs to be opened.
- The Print option displays the print screen. In this screen, a
 print preview is displayed. The print preview can be copied
 to the clipboard by clicking the right-hand mouse button.
 Also on the print screen is the option to choose which
 pages are to be printed and the option to print the output

GIB® plasterboard linings

When fixing part sheets of GIB® plasterboard, a minimum sheet width of 300mm applies for bracing elements. Horizontal fixing is recommended. If fixing vertically, full height sheets shall be used where possible. Where sheet end butt joints are unavoidable they must be formed over nogs or over the studs and fastened at 200mm centres. Alternatively, and preferably, sheet end butt joints may be back-blocked.

When a GIB® Bracing element has been designated for a section of wall, BU ratings cannot be increased by incorporating additional proprietary bracing elements within that same section of wall.

LIMITATIONS

- GIB® plasterboard must be stacked flat and protected from the weather.
- GIB® plasterboard must be handled as a finishing material.
- GIB® plasterboard in use must not be exposed to liquid water or be installed in situations where extended exposure to humidities above 90% RH can reasonably be expected.
- GIB EzyBrace® Systems must not be used in showers or behind baths.
- It is highly recommended not to install GIB® plasterboard in any situation where external claddings are not in place or the property is not adequately protected from the elements.
- If GIB® plasterboard is installed under these conditions, the risk of surface defects such as joint peaking or cracking is greatly increased.

GIB EzyBrace® Systems in water-splash areas

When GIB® plasterboard is installed in locations likely to be frequently exposed to liquid water it must have an impervious finish. Examples are adhesive fixed acrylic shower linings or ceramic tiles over an approved waterproof membrane over GIB Aqualine® The NZBC requires 15 years durability in these situations. Bracing elements are required to have a durability of 50 years. Bracing elements are not to be located in shower cubicles or behind baths because of durability requirements, the likelihood of renovation, and practical issues associated with fixing bracing elements to perimeter framing members. Otherwise GIB EzyBrace® Systems can be used in watersplash areas as defined by NZBC Clause E3, provided these are maintained impervious for the life of the building.

For futher design details refer to the current GIB Aqualine® Wet Area Systems literature.

Renovation

When relining walls during the process of renovation, ensure that bracing elements are reinstated (check the building plans).

Openings in bracing elements

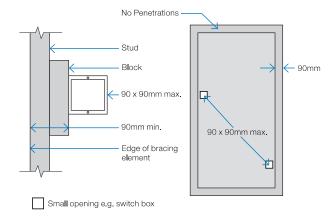
SMALL OPENINGS

Small openings (e.g. power outlets) of 90 x 90mm or less may be placed no closer than 90mm to the edge of the braced element. A block may need to be provided alongside the perimeter stud as shown below.

LARGE OPENINGS

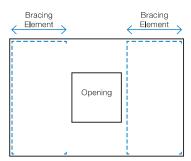
Openings above 90 x 90mm such as switch boards, recessed cabinets and TV's etc. should be placed outside of the bracing element or locate bracing on the other side of the wall framing.

Timber framing

General framing requirements such as grade, spacings and installation shall comply with the provisions of NZS 3604:2011. To achieve the published bracing performance the minimum actual framing dimensions are 90 x 45mm for external walls and 70 x 45mm for internal walls.

As a minimum the use of Kiln Dried Stress Graded timber for all wall, roof and mid-floor framing members is recommended.

GIBFix® Framing System (alternative layout)

Practices recommended as part of the GIBFix® Framing System aim to increase timber framing efficiencies, reduce reliance on unnecessary framing at wall junctions and minimise surface imperfections that commonly arise from constructing plasterboard junctions over multiple timber members. GIBFix® Angles fixed to a single timber framing member are introduced to tie together plasterboard junctions, improving seismic resilience and decrease the risk of future defects due to timber movement. The GIBFix® Framing System can be used in conjunction with the GIB EzyBrace® System.

Note: GIBFix® Angles and 32mm x 7g GIB® Grabber® Dual Thread Screws may also be used in traditional wall framing layouts and in GIB EzyBrace® Systems.

When the GIBFix® Framing System is used a minimum of 2 equally spaced nogs for walls between 2.4m and 3m in height are required at corners and wall junctions.

When used in GIB EzyBrace® systems GIBFix® Angles must run from top to bottom on all applicable studs. If 2 GIBFix® Angles are required on a stud they must be overlapped by a minimum of 300mm with 2/32mm 7g GIB® Grabber® Dual Thread Screws penetrating through both GIBFix® Angles.

For full specification details refer to GIBFix® Framing System literature available at gib.co.nz/gibfix.

Guidelines for intersection walls

GIB® Bracing Elements may have intersecting walls with a minimum length of 200mm. Fasteners are required around the perimeter of the bracing element. Vertical joints at T-junctions shall be fixed and jointed as specified for intermediate sheet joints. The bracing element length must be no less than 900mm.

Where a Wall Bracing Element is interrupted by a T-junction the element is deemed to be continuous for the whole length (900mm minimum in the example illustrated).

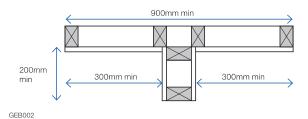


FIGURE 13: WALL INTERSECTION (GIBFIX® FRAMING SYSTEM)

When fixing part sheets of GIB® plasterboard to the side of a T-junction, a minimum width of 300mm applies for bracing elements. See figures 12 and 13.

FIGURE 12: WALL INTERSECTION (TRADITIONAL WALL FRAMING)

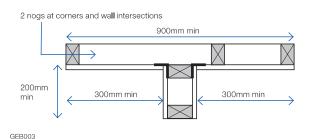


FIGURE 14: CORNER INTERSECTION (GIBFIX® FRAMING SYSTEM)

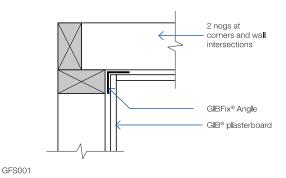
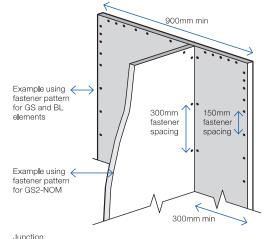


FIGURE 15: WALL INTERSECTION FASTENER PLACEMENT

Top plate connections

For top plate connections refer to NZS3604:2011 section 8.7.3.

Parapets and gable end walls

Bracing elements must be fixed from top plate to bottom plate. Fixing to a row of nogs is not acceptable unless either:

A continuous member such as an ex 90 x 45mm ribbon plate is fixed across the studs just above a row of nogs at the ceiling line, as shown in figure 16.

or

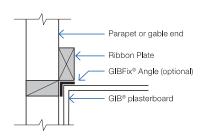
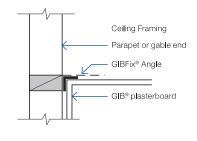


FIGURE 17: PARAPETS AND GABLE ENDS WITH GIBFIX® ANGLE

GIBFix® Angle as shown in figure 17. The angle is fixed to a row of nogs with 30 x 2.5mm galv flat head nails or 32mm x 7g GIB® Grabber® Dual Thread Screws at 300mm centres.

Bottom plate fixing

TIMBER FLOOR

For elements with an 'N' specification use $2/100 \times 3.75$ mm hand or $3/90 \times 3.15$ mm power-driven nails at 600mm centres.

In addition, for elements with an 'H' specification, use GIB HandiBrac® panel hold-down fixings at each end of the bracing element, see p.16.

CONCRETE FLOOR — EXTERNAL WALL BRACING ELEMENTS

For bracing elements with an 'N' specification fix external wall plates in accordance with NZS 3604:2011.

Use GIB HandiBrac® panel hold-down fixings at each end of bracing elements with an 'H' specification and minimum intermediate fixings as required by NZS 3604:2011.

CONCRETE FLOOR — INTERNAL WALL BRACING ELEMENTS

For bracing elements with an 'N' specification fix plates in accordance with NZS 3604:2011 or use 75 x 3.8mm shot-fired fasteners with 16mm discs spaced at 150 and 300mm from end-studs and 600mm centres thereafter.

For bracing elements with an 'H' specification use GIB HandiBrac® panel hold-down fixings at each end of the element and minimum intermediate fixings as required by NZS 3604:2011.

FIGURE 16: PARAPETS AND GABLE ENDS WITH RIBBON PLATE

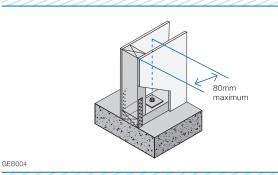
Bracing strap installation

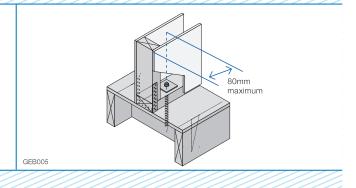
Care needs to be taken with the installation of the bracing strap. It should be checked in to be flush with the face of the stud providing a flat substrate for the plasterboard and positioned in such a way that the corner fastenings of the bracing element are not affected by it. Keeping the strap to the edge of the end stud as shown will allow the corner fastenings to be installed without having to penetrate the bracing strap.

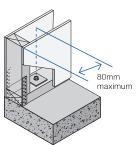
400 x 25 x 0.9mm galvanised strap to pass under the plate and up the other side of the stud. Six 30 x 2.5mm flat head galvanised nails to each side of the stud. Figure 18 shows the preferred positioning of the GIB HandiBrac® panel hold-down brackets within the GIBFix® Framing System layout and where they are required by bracing systems with an 'H' in the specification code.

Note that, in corners and at wall junctions, a single GIB HandiBrac® can serve 'H' type bracing elements in both directions, but additional intermediate concrete anchors may need to be installed to meet the minimum requirements of NZS 3604:2011 for bottom plate fixing.

The GIB HandiBrac® is fixed to the stud which has the GIBFix® Angle.

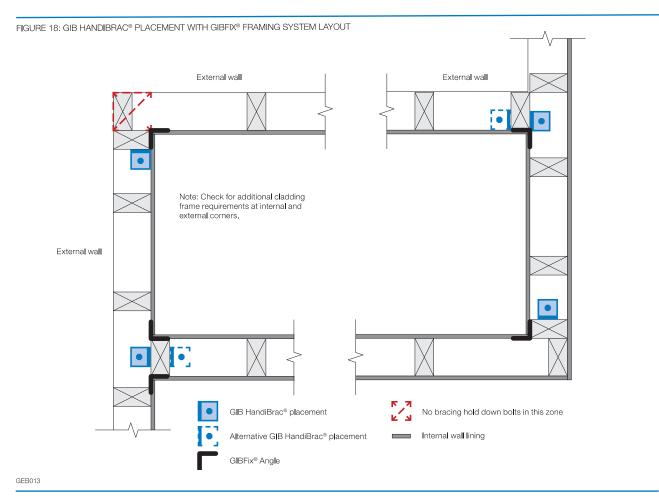
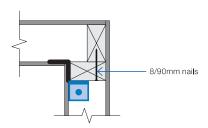


FIGURE 19: STUD CONNECTION FOR 'H' TYPE BRACING ELEMENTS WITH SHEET MATERIAL BOTH SIDES

For bracing elements with sheet material both sides of the wall connect corner studs using 8/90mm gun nails as shown in figure 19.

Ceiling diaphragms

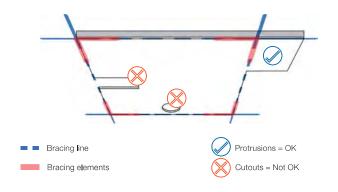


FIGURE 21: DIAPHRAGM BRACING LINING SPACINGS

GIB® plasterboard ceiling diaphragms are stiff and strong horizontal elements which effectively transfer loads to bracing walls. They themselves do not have a bracing unit rating but are used when bracing lines exceed 6m separation. The basic shape of a ceiling diaphragm is square or rectangular. Protrusions are permitted but cut-outs are not. The length of a ceiling diaphragm shall not exceed twice its width. Dimensions are measured between supporting bracing lines. Supporting bracing lines shall have a bracing capacity no less than the greater of 100 bracing units or 15 bracing units per metre of diaphragm dimension, measured at right angles to the line being considered, see figure 21.

Limitations for GIB® plasterboard ceiling diaphragms

Ceiling diaphragms may be constructed using any GIB® plasterboard provided perimeter fixing is at;

150mm centres for: Diaphragms up to 7.5m in length, no steeper than 15°.

100mm centres for: Diaphragms up to 7.5m in length, no steeper than 45°. Diaphragms up to 12m in length, no steeper than 25°.

Diaphragms outside these parameters must be specifically designed.

General fixing requirements for GIB® Ceiling Diaphragms:

- Linings must be installed over the entire area of the diaphragm.
- Fastening must be no less than 12mm from sheet edges and not less than 18mm from sheet ends.
- Sheets must be supported by framing members (e.g., ceiling battens) spaced at no more than 500mm centres for 10mm GIB® plasterboard and at no more than 600mm centres for 13mm GIB® plasterboard.
- Sheets within the diaphragm area may be fastened and finished conventionally in accordance with the publication entitled, "GIB® Site Guide". All joints shall be GIB® Joint Tape reinforced and stopped. It is recommended that sheet butt joints are formed off framing and back-blocked (see "GIB® Site Guide").

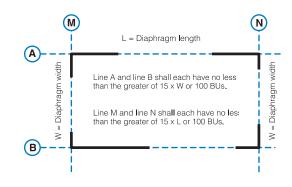
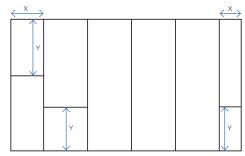
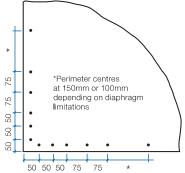


FIGURE 22: GIB® CEILING DIAPHRAGM SHEET WIDTHS AND LENGTHS

- Use full width sheets where possible. At least 900mm wide sheets with a length not less than 1800mm shall be used. Sheets less than 900mm wide but no less than 600mm may be used provided all joints with adjacent sheets are back-blocked (see "GIB" Site Guide" and figure 22).
- Fasteners are placed at the specified centres around the ceiling diaphragm with the corners fastened using the GIB EzyBrace® fastener pattern.

FIGURE 20: PROTRUSIONS AND CUTOUTS

Ceiling battens in ceiling diaphragms

Ceiling diaphragms may be constructed using steel or timber ceiling battens.

Battens shall be spaced at a maximum of:

- 500mm for 10mm GIB® plasterboard.
- 600mm for 13mm GIB® plasterboard.

Timber battens shall be fixed in accordance with the requirements of NZS 3604:2011.

Metal battens shall be GIB® Rondo® battens with two external flanges of 8mm to allow direct screw fixing to roof framing.

GIB® Rondo® metal battens shall be fixed with 2/32mm x 8g GIB® Grabber® Wafer Head Self Tapping screws to supporting framing.

GIB® Rondo® metal battens must be fixed directly to the roof framing. If a clip system has been used, a timber block (min 300mm) or a continuous timber member can be fixed alongside the bottom chord to permit a direct connection to the batten, see figure 26.

For GIB® Rondo® metal battens, a GIB® Rondo® metal channel or metal angle is required at the perimeter of the diaphragm. The perimeter channel shall be fastened to the top plate with 32mm x 8g GIB® Grabber® Wafer Head Self Tapping screws or 32mm x 7g GIB® Grabber® Dual Thread screw at 300mm centres maximum.

Linings are fastened to metal using 25mm x 6g GIB® Grabber® Self Tapping screws and to timber framing using 32mm x 6g GIB® Grabber® High Thread screws. Alternatively 32mm x 7g GIB® Grabber® Dual Thread screws can be used in both cases. Fastener centres are specified on p.18.

Coved ceiling diaphragms can be achieved by using nominally $32 \times 32 \times 0.55$ mm proprietary galvanised metal angles ("backflashing") at the changes in direction. These angles shall be:

- Fastened at 300mm on each edge to metal battens using 32mm x 8g GIB® Grabber® Wafer Head Self Tapping screws or 32mm x 7g GIB® Grabber® Dual Thread screws.
- Fastened to timber framing using 32mm x 7g GIB®
 Grabber® Dual Thread screws when linings are installed.

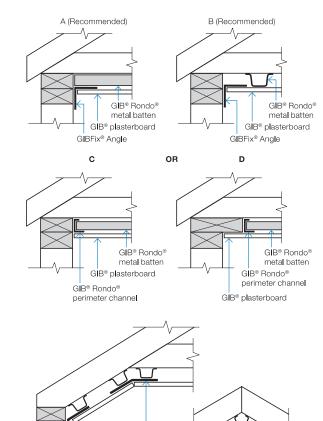

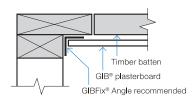

Openings in ceiling diaphragms

SMALL OPENINGS

Small opening (e.g. down lights) of 90 x 90mm or less may be placed no closer than 90mm to the edge of the ceiling diaphragm.

LARGE OPENINGS

Openings are allowed withing the middle third of the diaphragms length and width. Fixing of sheet material to opening trimmers shall be at 150mm centres. Neither opening dimension shall exceed a third of the diaphragm width. Larger openings or openings in other locations require specific engineering design.

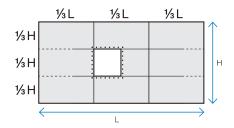
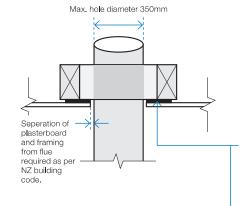


FIGURE 25: FIREPLACE FLUES AND RANGE HOOD OPENINGS

Where fireplace flue or range hood openings are required in a ceiling diaphragm use a galvansed metal backing plate as shown in figure 25, with a maximum hole diameter of 350mm.

Figure 25 can also be used for range hood openings in walls.

FIGURE 24: LARGE OPENINGS IN CEILING DIAPHRAGMS

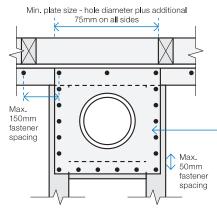

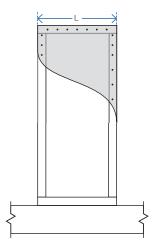

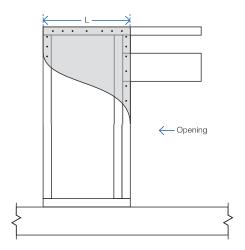

FIGURE 29: GS BRACING ELEMENTS (OPTION A)



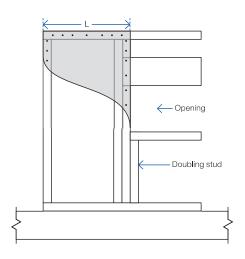

FIGURE 31: GS BRACING ELEMENTS (OPTION C)



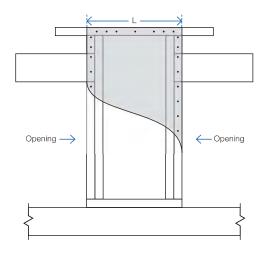

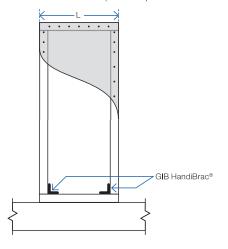

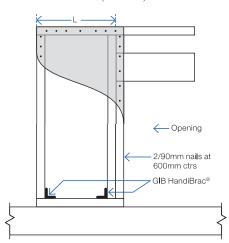

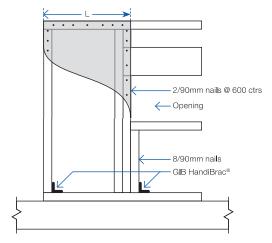

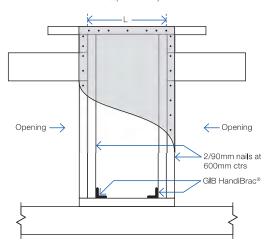
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FIGURE 34: BL BRACING ELEMENTS (OPTION B)

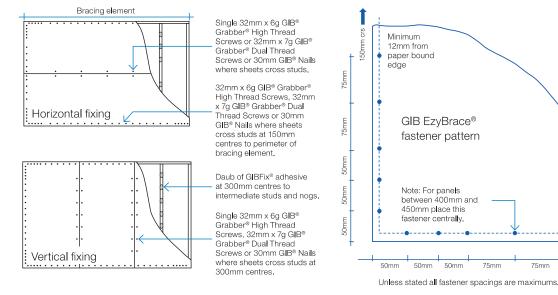

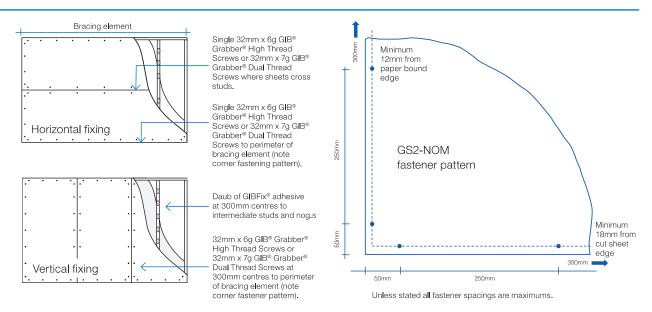

FIGURE 37: SCREW FIX FOR OPENINGS

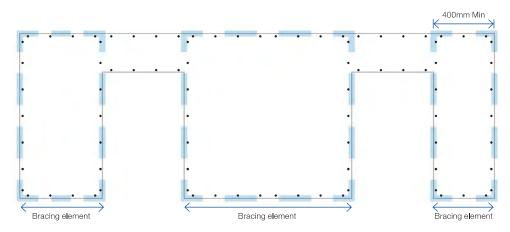
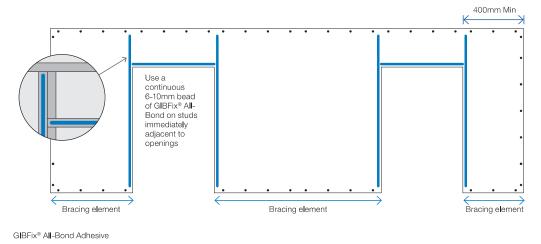
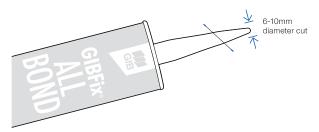


FIGURE 38: SCREW AND ADHESIVE FIX FOR OPENINGS

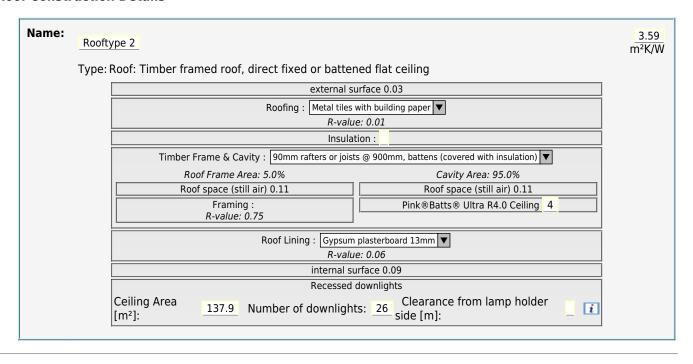


Wall Construction Details

1. GENERAL

- (b) Throughout this specification, reference is made to various New Zealand Building Code acceptable solutions (NZBC __/AS_) and verification methods (NZBC __/VM_) for criteria and/or methods used to establish compliance with the Building Act 2004
- (c) Reference is also made to various Standards produced by Standards New Zealand (NZS, AS/NZS, NZS/AS), overseas standards (AS, BS) and to listed Acts, Regulations and various industry codes of practice and practice guides. The latest edition (including amendments and provisional editions)
- (d) Site Safety and Environmental Compliance; G.J. Gardner Homes will make a site specific hazard assessment for each site, in accordance with Acceptable Solution 1 of section F5 of the NZ Building Code. Where the company considers it is necessary to fully exclude the public from the site, temporary fencing in the form of 2m high galvanised chain link netting shall be erected.
- (e) LM is defined as lineal metres

2. EXCAVATION and FILL

(a) Waffle slabs with gravel raft: Refer to plans for foundation excavation depth. The Builder shall supply and place compacted hardfill and blinding sand to suit the required finished floor level.

Plumbers, Gasfitters and Drainlayers Act 2006

EXTENT OF WORK -

Work in this section of the contract comprises all surface and foul water drainage up to above ground level to connect to plumbers work. Include all pipes and specials, inspection points, fittings, construction of manholes, all gully traps and connections for terminal vents, soil and waste pipes. The drainlayer shall confer with the plumber and shall arrange with the contractor before the foundations are laid to fix the exact position of all connections of wastes and drains.

STANDARD OF WORK -

Experienced and licensed tradesmen to the satisfaction of GJ Gardner Homes shall carry out the whole of the work. The drainage contractor shall allow and arrange for all tests.

MATERIALS -

All materials shall be in accordance with relevant NZ Standards and manufacturers' requirements

CONNECTION TO EXISTING DRAINAGE -

The drainlayer is responsible for verifying the position and depth of the connection and commence laying his drains to this point.

DRAIN TRENCHES -

The excavation of trenches shall be accurately made with base clean and true grade so that no unnecessary filling is required. Adequate width shall be allowed in accordance with depth of drain to enable laying and jointing to be properly carries out. Trenches shall be kept firm and dry and shall be opened up only in lengths that can be protected, utilised and refilled within a reasonable time. See NZBC G13/2 fig. 8 for proximity to buildings. Trenches are to be backfilled with excavated material.

LAYING OF DRAINS -

All drains are to be adequately supported in the bottom of the trench. The pipes are to be laid to straight lines and even grades in accordance with NZBC G13/AS2 table 2 for sizes and gradients. Drains shall be tested to completely tight in accordance with NZS7643: section 11 and NZS4452: section 11.

Backfill drain lines in 150mm layers, without disturbing or damaging drains. Finish off with 150mm of excavated material slightly mounded above the finished ground line to allow for natural settling.

FITTINGS -

The site plan shows the proposed layout of the system, please note, this is diagrammatical and may change at the discretion of the drainlayer due to site conditions. Additional fittings that are normally required, such as inspection points and inspection bends, etc, which may be required but are not specifically shown, must be allowed for by the drainlayer to comply with normal practice under the regulations.

JOINTING OF PIPES -

The pipes are to be joined in a proper manner and provided with adequate maintenance and inspections points as per NZBC G13/AS2.

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FALL IN DRAINS -

The whole of the soil and stormwater drain system is to be laid at a regular and even fall.

GULLY TRAPS -

Supply and install all gully traps where shown in accordance with NZBC G13/AS2, 100mm min. above finished ground level. All gully traps are to be fitted with plastic gratings and also a grating or perforated plate above the wastes discharging into it. At least one gully trap (ORG) has its overflow rim at least 150mm below the overflow level of the lowest fixture served by the system.

SEWER AND STORMWATER MAIN CONNECTIONS -

If there is no supplied laterals to the site then the drainlayer shall arrange for the council to provide connections to main public lines where provided and the owner shall pay all charges in connection therewith after first being advised at an early stage by the drainlayer of the need to pay any charges.

COMPLETION -

Supply a 1:100 scale as-built drawing of drains and fittings to the Territorial Authority on completion.

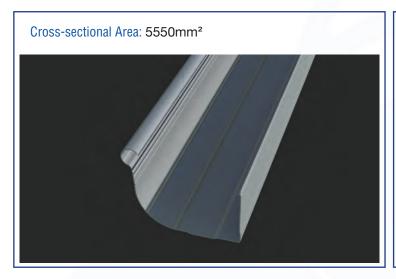


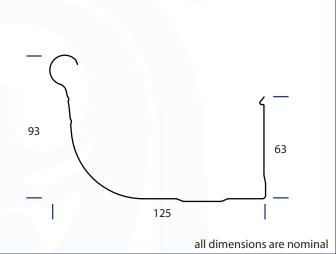

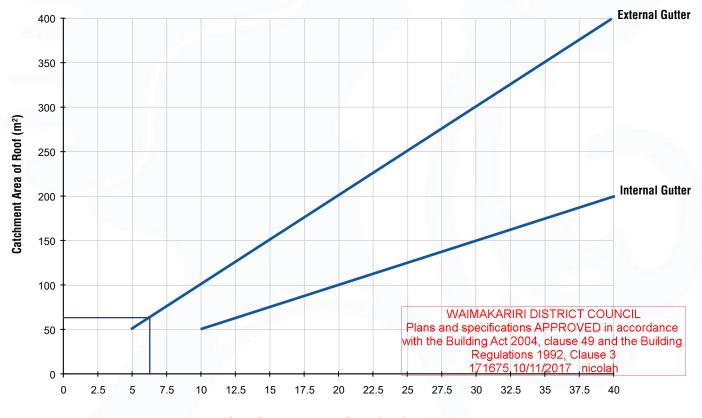

 - Fixings staples, clouts, screws or proprietary wrap fixings, or other temporary fixings to attach
 the wall wrap to the framing.

- 7.3 The material also provides a degree of temporary weather protection during early construction. However, the product will not make the building weathertight and some wetting of the underlying structure is always possible before the building is closed in. Hence, the building must be closed-in and made weatherproof before moisture sensitive materials such as wall or ceiling linings and insulation materials are installed.
- 7.4 Tekton® Building Wrap must not be exposed to the weather or ultra violet light for a total of more than 60 days before being covered by the wall cladding.
- 7.5 Tekton® Building Wrap is suitable for use under wall claddings as a wall underlay as called up in NZBC Acceptable Solution E2/AS1, Table 23, except that it must not be used with non-absorbent wall claddings such as vinyl or metal based sidings or weatherboards in direct fixed installations. Stucco Plaster

Installation Information

Installation Skill Level Requirements

13.1 Installation must always be carried out in accordance with the Technical Literature and this Appraisal, by competent tradespersons with an understanding of wall wrap installation.

Wrap Installation

- 14.1 Tekton® Building Wrap must be fixed to all framing members at maximum 300 mm centres with hot-dip galvanised, large-head clouts 20 mm long, zinc plated 6-8 mm staples, self-drilling screws, or proprietary wrap fixings. The membrane must be pulled taut over the framing before fixing.
- 14.2 Tekton® Building Wrap must be run horizontally and must extend from the upper-side of the top plate to the under-side of the bearers or wall plates supporting ground floor joists, or below bottom plates on concrete slabs. Horizontal laps must be no less than 75 mm wide, with the direction of the lap ensuring that water is shed to the outer face of the membrane. End laps must be made over framing and be no less than 150 mm wide.
- 14.3 The wall underlay should be run over openings and these left covered until windows and doors are ready to be installed. Openings are formed in the membrane by cutting on a 45 degree diagonal from each corner of the penetration. The flaps of the cut membrane must be folded inside the opening and stapled to the penetration framing. Excess wall underlay may be cut off flush with the internal face of the wall frame.
- 14.4 Tekton® Building Wrap can be added as a second layer over head flashings in accordance with the requirements of NZBC Acceptable Solution E2/AS1, Paragraph 9.1.10.3.
- 14.5 When fixing the product in windy conditions, care must be taken due to the large sail area created by wide roll widths.
- Any damaged areas of Tekton® Building Wrap, such as tears, holes or gaps around service penetrations, must be repaired. Damaged areas can be repaired by covering with new material lapping the damaged area by at least 150 mm and taping, or by taping small tears.

14.7 The Technical Literature must be referred to during the inspection of Tekton® Building Wrap installations.

A range of these tests were completed before and after Tekton® Building Wrap was exposed to ultra-violet light.
- 15.3 The Flammability Index of Tekton® Building Wrap has been evaluated in accordance with AS 1530.2.

Other Investigations

- 16.1 A durability opinion was given by BRANZ technical experts.
- 16.2 Site inspections were carried out by BRANZ to assess methods used for the installation of Tekton® Building Wrap, and to examine completed installations.
- 16.3 The marketer's Technical Literature, including installation instructions, have been examined by BRANZ and found to be satisfactory.

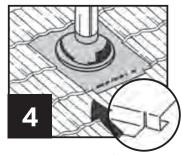
Trim Dektite cone to suit pipe size using sharp tin snips.



After lubricating the flue with water, slide Dektite down to the tile level.



Form an anti-capillary fold then place upper edge of base under up-stream tiles.



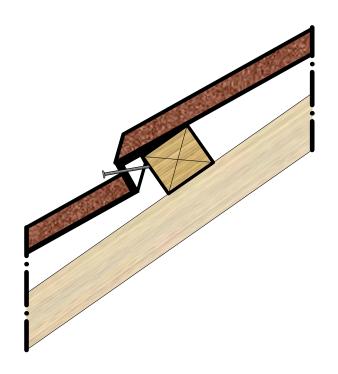
Dress base to profile, cut tabs on the bottom corners and fold under to stop wind lift.



Tiles are secured to the battens by nailing through the nose of the upper tiles and through the back up stand of the lower tile into the side of the battens. The positioning of the nails and the number of nails per tile are determined by the type and length of the tile (refer to pages 23-28; NAIL POSITIONING). The tiles should be fastened two courses above the tiles that are being laid.

Apply weight when nailing. The person nailing should stand on tile being installed facing the eaves.

Gun nailers can also be used to securely fasten the tiles.







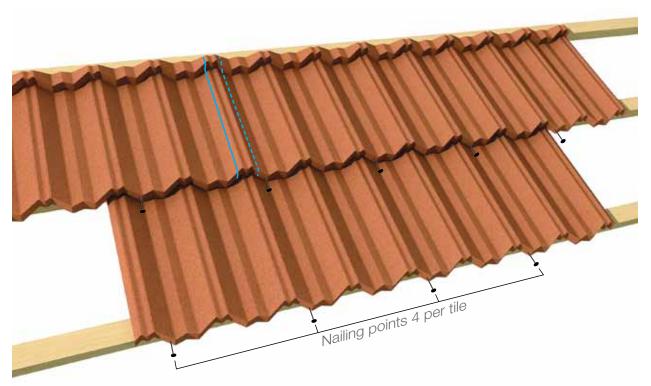


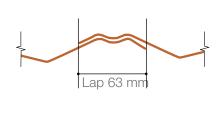
The correct positions for nailing different profiles are shown below. Correct nailing ensures good holding of the tile and ample penetration of the nail, at the same time restricting nail penetration to a maximum of two thicknesses.

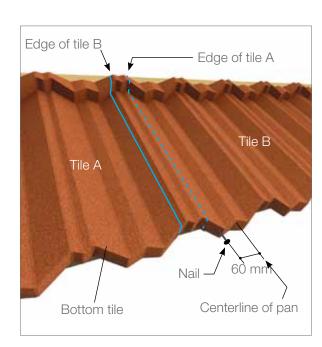
NOTE: In areas prone to extremely strong winds, installation must meet the local standards and by-laws and nailing should be at 7 points per tile (8 points per Classic tile).

CLASSIC TILES

Nails should be approximately 60 mm to the side of the centre of the pan of the tile and close to the bottom of the downturned flange.

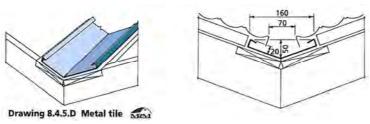
Valley Design

Gerard Roofs Combination Valleys are designed to meet the requirements for roof drainage on catchment areas that feed into the valley as indicated in the NZ Metal Roof and Wall Cladding Code of Practice (MRM Code of Practice).

The capacity of a valley gutter is determined in a different manner than that for normal gutters that are flat or very near to flat. By definition a valley is a gutter at the internal intersection of two sloping planes of roof cladding where the roof pitch is greater than 8°. Because the minimum slope of a valley is greater than 5.5° the discharge rate is greater than that of a flat gutter and as the roof pitch increases, the rate of flow, and therefore the catchment area that can be drained, increases proportionately.

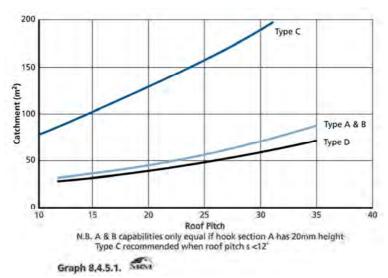
Valley gutters must be designed for the greatest rainfall likely in the area in a 50 year return period (ARI). The valley capacity must be capable of discharging the total roof catchment area above the valley plus half the area of any dormer.

Gerard Roofs Combination Valley dimensions are very similar to those in the MRM Code of Practice shown as drawing 8.4.5.D (Figure 1)

A Gerard Roofs Combination Valley is specifically designed based on the information supplied in the MRM Code of Practice and in use history by Gerard Roofs. It can be used for catchment areas that do not exceed the line of Valley Type D for the pitch shown on Graph 8.4.5.1. (Figure 2).

E2/AS1 requires a valley to be 250 mm wide or 160 mm wide as being suitable for a catchment area of up to 16 m^2 for roof pitches down to 12.5°. The catchment area of $16 m^2$ for a pitch of 12.5^0 aligns with MRM graph 8.4.5.1, however beyond 12.5^0 it does not take into account the flow rates and increase in catchment area that the valley can cope with.

Technical Statement

Scope

Mapegum WPS Wet Area Membrane is for use in buildings where an impervious waterproof membrane is required to floors and walls to prevent damage to building elements and adjoining areas.

Mapegum WPS is designed to be used where a quicker curing time is required, such as in cool or humid conditions.

The membrane must be protected from physical damage by the application of ceramic or stone tile finishes.

New Zealand Building Code (NZBC)

Special Conditions

Installation requirements

Installation of the membranes must be completed by trained applicators, approved by MAPEI New Zealand Ltd

Installation of substrates must be completed by trades persons with an understanding of internal wet area construction, in accordance with instructions given within the MAPEI New Zealand Ltd Technical Literature.

Substrates must be dry, clean and stable before installation commences. Surfaces must be smooth and free from nibs, sharp edges, dust, dirt or other materials such as oil, grease or concrete form work release agents.

The relative humidity of the concrete must be 75% or less before membrane application. All voids, cracks, holes, joints and excessively rough areas must be filled to achieve an even and uniform surface. Junctions of substrate abutments, such as at wall/floor and wall/ wall junctions must have a reinforcement installed as set out in the Technical Literature.

Substrates must be primed with suitable primer and allowed to cure before the Mapegum WPS is installed

Special requirements

Installation must not be undertaken where the substrate surface temperature is below 10°C or above 35°C.

Mapegum WPS must be thoroughly stirred before application with a slow speed mechanical mixer.

The membrane must be applied in a minimum of two coats at the rates set out in the Technical Literature. Subsequent coats must be applied in an opposite direction to the previous coat.

The total finished system thickness of the Mapegum WPS must be a minimum of 1.0 mm.

Reinforcement fabric or Mapeband PE 120 is bedded into the wet layer between coats to provide movement protection at wall/wall and wall/floor junctions, or any other areas such as joints in the flooring substrate, floor cracks, or around penetrations in the membrane. In all other situations, reinforcement provisions as set out in this Appraisal and the Technical Literature apply.

Maintenance requirements

No maintenance of the membranes will be required provided significant substrate movement does not occur and the tile finish remains intact.

Regular checks must be made of the tiled areas to ensure they are sound and will not allow moisture to penetrate. Any cracks or damage must be repaired immediately by repairing the tiles, grouts and sealants.

In the event of damage to the membranes, the tiling must be removed and the membrane repaired by removing the damaged portion and applying a patch as for new work.

Drainage outlets must be maintained to operate effectively, and ceramic or stone tile finishes must be kept clean.

Ardex WPM 001 (Superflex Bathroom & Balcony Premixed 1 Part) is a tough, ready to use waterproofing membrane specifically designed for use under tiles. Ardex WPM 001 has been uniquely formulated with synthetic microfibres to increase its strength and eliminate the need for a separate reinforcement mat. Ardex WPM 001 is based on the most advanced acrylic polymer technology, and is totally resistant to reemulsification once cured.

Ardex WPM 001 is flexible, safe to use, low in odour, and is fully compatible with polymer modified tile adhesives. Ardex WPM 001 is one of the fastest drying one part acrylic membranes on the market – normally ready to tile in 48 hours @ 23°C.

The waterproofing membrane shall be Ardex WPM 001: a one part acrylic modified fibre reinforced membrane formulated to provide a tough, long lasting water barrier under tiling systems.

SHELF LIFE

12 months when stored in the original unopened packaging, in a dry place at 23°C. Do not store in direct sunlight. Replace lid tightly after use. Use remaining contents from part used containers within 3 months.

COVERAGE

Two coats are recommended for an effective waterproof membrane.

Coverage will vary depending on the porosity of the surface.

One 20kg (15 litre) unit will cover approximately 7.5-15m² (based on two coats) depending on area requirements between wall and floor surfaces to be treated. Refer Table I.

DRYING TIMES

Recoat time

1-2 hours at (23°C/50% RH) between first and second coats. Alternatively, if a polyester mat is used between coats then the second coat can be applied whilst the first coat is still wet.

Dry through

The slowest drying areas are those where the membrane has been applied over a silicone bond breaker, eg. wall and floor junctions. The membrane cannot be tiled over until these critical areas are completely dry. Ardex WPM 001 is totally dry in 48 hours at 23°C/50% RH, but can take up to 72 hours at 10°C/50% RH in corners or for thick films.

Fully cured

The shower should not be used until the membrane has reached its full strength. Ardex WPM 001 membrane is fully cured after 3 days at 23°C, or after 5 days at 10°C.

Drying times will vary depending on humidity, surface temperature and surface porosity.

Do not apply on substrates where the surface temperature is below 10°C or above 35°C.

CLEANING

Wash hands, brushes, rollers, etc, with water while the membrane is still fresh. Remove cured material with mineral turpentine.

SAFETY PRECAUTIONS

Do not use the product in the following situations:

- Areas subject to negative hydrostatic pressure or rising damp, unless treated with Ardex WPM 300.
- Where the substrate is wet wet surfaces can be sealed with one coat of Ardex WPM 300 at a coverage rate of 3.0 square metres per litre and allowed to cure overnight.
- Where rain is imminent.
- Where the membrane will be left exposed and subjected to regular foot traffic.
- On glazed, glass or other totally impervious surfaces (eg. areas pre-treated with water repellants).
- Where the surface temperature is below 10°C or greater than 35°C.
- All floor areas must have adequate falls either built into the substrate or achieved with a sand/cement screed prior to application of the Ardex WPM 001.

For substrates or situations other than those listed contact Ardex.

USER NOTES

APPLICATION

Apply Ardex WPM 001 by brush or roller. A medium nap (12-15mm pile) paint roller is recommended. New rollers should be dampened with water before being used for the first time.

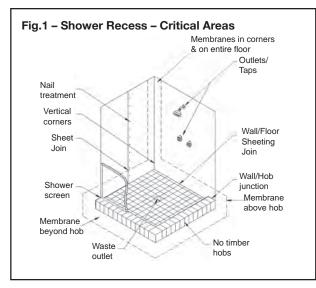
For best results with a paint brush use a good quality, 50mm long bristle variety.

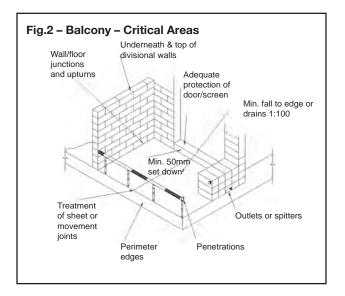
To achieve the required dry film thickness per coat, application must consist of laying the product onto the surface and light finish the surface. Do not try to apply in the same manner as a building paint. A conventional building paint is normally applied at 25-40 micrometers wet film thickness while Ardex WPM 001 needs to be applied at between 0.5 and 1.0 mm per coat depending on product and application (Refer Table 1).

Critical Areas: INTERNAL WET AREAS

- 1. Construction should be in accordance with Australian 3740 2004 Waterproofing of wet areas within residential buildings.
- 2. All render and tile bed requirements should be completed before application of the membrane and tiles or other floor coverings should be direct bonded to the membrane.
- Ensure wall & floor sheets are installed as per sheet manufacturer's recommendations.
- 4. Ensure suitable brick/concrete hobs are used (do not use timber).

- Ensure that falls to the waste are min 1:60 (ie. approx. 30mm in 2mtr)) before waterproofing.
 Ensure outlet pipes are fixed securely and that the waste or drainage flanges are recessed into the floor.
- 6. Avoid sheet joints in shower recess floor. Ensure that sheets are securely fixed to the wall at the bottom edge, and sheet joints are sealed with a neutral cure silicone sealant spread approximately 6mm on either side of the joint.
- Treat nail and screw holes with neutral cure silicone sealant.
- 8. Seal the perimeters of taps, shower outlets and waste outlets with neutral cure silicone sealant.
- 9. Apply a bead of neutral cure silicone sealant to all horizontal and vertical corners.
- 10. Apply a bead of neutral cure silicone sealant to the junction of the hob or angle and walls. Spreading the sealant to 6mm on either side of the joint.
- 11. Waste outlets shall incorporate a puddle flange or similar in accordance with AS3740 & the top surface shall be set flush with the surface to which the membrane is to be applied. A bead of neutral cure silicone shall be applied across the intersection of the puddle flange and the screed/ floor.
- 12. Apply the membrane to the entire shower recess floor and down into waste or drainage flange. Apply the membrane over the hob and at least 150mm beyond the outside edge of the hob (ideally to entire wet area floor).
- 13. Apply the membrane 1800mm up the walls or to the height of the shower rose within the shower recess.
- 14. Install the shower screen to inside edge of the hob.





BALCONIES AND DECKS

- Ensure that the deck is constructed with falls to edge/drains of min 1:100 (ie. 20mm in 2m) or else achieve the fall with a sand/cement screed.
- 2. Ensure a min set down (step down) of 50mm to the finished floor level (ie. top of tiles).
- 3. Ensure suitable flashing is installed, ideally prior to the installation of the balcony screen/sliding door.
- 4. Treat any sheet joints with a neutral cure silicone prior to waterproofing.
- 5. Prepare and seal all wall/floor junctions with a bead of neutral cure silicone.
- 6. Apply the membrane up the step down and as far up underneath the screen door flashing as possible (ideally waterproof prior to installing door).
- 7. Where possible, apply the membrane prior to building divisional walls, or other items such as planter boxes.
- 8. Apply the membrane to the entire balcony floor and at least 50mm up the wall above the top surface of the finished tiles and finished below the wall drainage vents.
- Apply the membrane to the top of the parapets and divisional walls, or else install suitable metal capping.
- 10. Apply the membrane down over the front edge of the balcony onto the drip rail.
- 11. Carefully seal any gaps around balcony penetrations prior to applying the membrane.
- 12. Apply the membrane down into outlets and drains, ensuring excess material is removed.
- 13. Ensure all weep holes are above the membrane application area.

APPLICATION NOTES

Surface preparation

- Ensure all surfaces are structurally sound and totally dry. The pores of concrete surfaces should be open (absorbent surface). All sheet substrates must be securely fixed in accordance with the manufacturers instructions.
- Falls to outlets of at least 1:60 or approx. 30mm in 2mtr (wet areas) or 1:100 externally, must be achieved prior to tiling.
- The surface to be coated should be free from dust, oil, paint, curing compounds and any other contaminating materials.
- Damaged concrete should be repaired (leveled) and surface defects including all cracks and sharp protrusions should be treated prior to the application of the membrane.

- Remove laitance on concrete or screeds by mechanical means.
- Highly dense (>40MPa) or steel trowelled concrete should be roughened by suitable mechanical means (shot blasting, grinding, etc).

Priming

The primer is a critical part of the waterproofing system. Apply one coat of Ardex WPM 265 (Sheltercoat/ Superflex Water Based Primer) by brush or roller to all areas to be waterproofed including the floor waste. Allow the primer to completely dry prior to the application of the Ardex WPM 001 membrane. This will take around 20-30 minutes depending upon weather conditions and porosity of the substrate. Coverage is approximately 6m² per litre. Plastic (eg. PVC) pipes should be primed with a solvent based plumbers pink primer. Prime metal surfaces with a suitable metal primer such as epoxy polyamide primer.

GENERAL APPLICATION

Crack preparation Cracks <2mm:

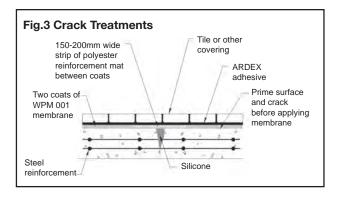
Clean and remove any loose particles in the crack. Prime the crack and adjacent area carefully with Ardex WPM 265 and allow to dry before applying two coats of Ardex WPM 001 membrane in a band at least 200mm wide equidistantly across the crack, along the length of the crack.

Cracks 2-6mm:

(Refer Fig. 3) Prepare and prime the crack as above. Apply a bead of neutral cure silicone into the crack and extend it 6mm either side. Apply a 300mm wide band of Ardex WPM 001 equidistantly across the crack along the entire length of the crack. Place a 190mm wide band of Ardex "Deckweb" polyester woven cloth reinforcement over the applied membrane. Thoroughly wet out the cloth preferably using a fluted roller, and remove all creases in, or air pockets under the mat. Immediately apply a second coat to completely fill the mat.

Cracks >6mm:

Contact your local Ardex representative.

Movement/construction joints

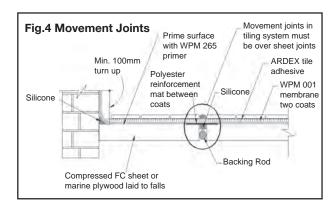
Movement joints (<6mm)

Use same procedure as in crack preparation.

Clean and prime the joint before filling it with a bead of neutral cure silicone and extending it 6mm each side of joint. Apply a 300mm wide band of Ardex WPM 001 equidistantly across the crack along the entire length of the crack. Place a 190mm wide band of Ardex "Deckweb" polyester woven cloth reinforcement over the applied membrane. Thoroughly wet out the mat and remove all creases in, or air pockets under the mat. Immediately apply a second coat to completely fill the mat.

Construction joints (>6mm)

Use the same procedure as above, but replace the reinforcing mat with 120mm of Ardex Coving Bandage. Note: if tiling, movement joints should be taken to the surface of the tiles. Fill the joints between the tiles immediately above the movement joints with an appropriate joint sealant. (Refer Fig.4)



Corners & coving areas

After priming with Ardex WPM 265 and allowing to dry, apply a generous bead (12mm) of neutral cure silicone sealant to seal all junctions between two substrates in coving areas and corners. Smooth over the silicone so that it extends 6mm up the wall and 6mm over the floor and allow to touch dry.

Apply a first coat of Ardex WPM 001 to the area and allow the membrane to dry.

Apply a second coat ensuring that excess product is removed from the junction (the final dry film thickness should be minimum of 1.0mm). Alternatively, if a polyester reinforcement mat is used between coats then the second coat can be applied as soon as the mat is fully bedded into the first coat.

WALL/FLOOR JUNCTION

After priming with Ardex WPM 265 and allowing to dry, apply a generous bead (12mm) of neutral cure silicone sealant to seal all junctions between two substrates. Smooth over the silicone so that it extends 6mm up the wall and 6mm over the floor and allow to touch dry. Place a 190mm wide band of Ardex "Deckweb" polyester woven mat reinforcement over the applied membrane. Thoroughly wet out the cloth and remove all creases in, or air pockets under the mat. Immediately apply a second coat to completely fill the mat. The Ardex WPM 001 should be applied to at least 100 mm up the wall surfaces as per the recommendations for the application of Ardex WPM 001 to floors.

Walls

Two coats of Ardex WPM 001 are required to achieve a minimum total dry film thickness of 0.5mm.

After priming with Ardex WPM 265 and allowing to dry, apply two coats of Ardex WPM 001 (to achieve a minimum dry film thickness of 0.5mm) in two opposite directions. Wall sheet joints should be treated with a neutral cure silicone, PVC duct tape or base jointing compound. In balcony situations take the membrane up underneath any existing cover flashing or install appropriate flashing. Allow the first coat to dry before applying the second coat.

Floors

Two coats of Ardex WPM 001 are required to achieve a minimum total dry film thickness of 1.0mm. The flooring recommendations should be extended at least 150 mm up all perimeter walls.

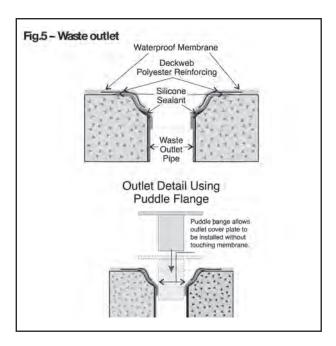
Prime the surface with Ardex WPM 265 and allow to dry.

Apply the first coat over the primed surface and allow it to dry (1-2 hours at 23°C, 50%RH) before applying a second coat in an opposite direction. In shower recesses a drainage flange must be installed on all timber/sheeted floors, and are strongly recommended on all other substrates. Where possible rebate the flange into the floor. Seal the perimeter of the flange with neutral cure silicone treatment. If a flange is not installed the membrane must be applied down into the pipe. (Refer Fig.5) Allow the membrane to dry completely before tiling. Refer drying times above.

Waste Outlet

Prime the surface with Ardex WPM 265 and allow to dry. Surfaces of the outlet flange must be primed with an appropriate primer.

Apply Ardex WPM 001 over the adjacent floor surface extending down into the waste outlet flange overlapping the edge of flange by at least 30mm. Place Ardex "Deckweb" polyester woven mat reinforcement over the applied membrane. Thoroughly wet out the cloth and remove all creases in, or air pockets under the mat. Immediately apply a second coat to completely fill the mat. (Refer Fig. 5)

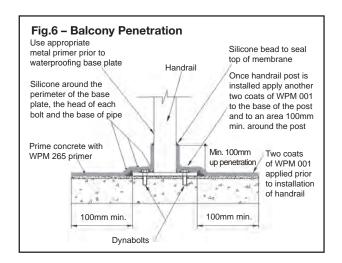


Balcony penetrations (Refer Fig.6)

All upstands are to be mechanically fixed through the membrane, which must be fabricated with a base plate flange.

Prime the metal with an appropriate metal primer such as an epoxy polyamide primer and allow to dry. Apply a 10mm bead of neutral cure silicone around the perimeter of the penetration. Apply the first coat of Ardex WPM 001 on the substrate and the flanged metal.

Allow first coat to dry before applying a second coat ensuring a finished dry film thickness of no less than 1.0mm is achieved. Place a suitable flashing collar around the penetration sealing it with a suitable sealant.



Tiling systems

It is advisable to conduct a flood test of the shower once the membrane has cured (normally after 72 hours), and before the tiling commences. A broad range of Ardex tile adhesives can be used over Ardex membranes. Contact Ardex or your nearest Ardex stockist for advice on the most suitable system.

1 Application and scope

1.1 APPLICATION

Axon® Panel is manufactured by James Hardie using an advanced lightweight cement composite. Base composition is portland cement, ground sand, cellulose fibre and water. Axon Panel has vertical grooves along the panel. It is classified as lightweight wall cladding suitable for residential and light commercial buildings using timber framing.

- Axon Panel is ideal for achieving feature walls in areas such as gable ends and entrance ways.
- Axon Panel is primed on the face to take a suitable paint finish in any colour.
- Axon Panel 133 Smooth the grooves on the face panel are nominal 10mm wide x 2.25mm deep and spaced at 133mm centres.
- Axon Panel 133 Grained the grooves on the face panel are nominal 10mm wide x 2.25mm deep and spaced at 133mm centres. Between the grooves is a look of traditional woodgrain texture.
- Axon Panel 400 Smooth the grooves on the face panel are nominal 10mm wide x 2.25mm deep and spaced at 400mm centres.

Specifier

If you are a specifier or other responsible party for a project, ensure that the information in this document is appropriate for the application you are planning and that you undertake specific design and detailing for areas which fall outside the scope of these specifications.

Installer

If you are an installer ensure that you follow the design, moisture management principles, associated details and material selection provided by the designer. All of the details provided in this document must be read in conjunction with this specification.

Make sure your information is up to date

1.2 SCOPE

The scope of this specification for the use of Axon Panel is limited to buildings which fall within the scope limitations of 'Acceptable Solution E2/AS1 paragraph 1.1' of the New Zealand Building Code (NZBC).

This document is intended for use by architects, designers and specifiers who may be involved with the specification of Axon Panel.

This manual covers the use of Axon Panel for both construction methods i.e. direct fixed to framing or cavity construction, used in external walls of timber framed buildings up to 2.5kPa.

Please refer to E2/AS1 for further information regarding the selection of construction methods to be used for fixing claddings.

1.3 DETAILS

Various Axon Panel figures are provided in the Details section of this document. This specification and details in dwg, dxf, jpg and pdf file format are also available for download at www.jameshardie.co.nz.

All dimensions shown are in millimetres unless noted otherwise.

1.4 SPECIFIC DESIGN

For use of Axon Panel outside this published scope, the architect, designer or engineer must undertake specific design.

For advice on designs outside the scope of this specification, Ask James Hardie on 0800 808 868.

2 Design

2.1 COMPLIANCE

Axon Panel complies with E2 of the NZBC as an alternate

Axon Panel cladding has been tested as per E2/VM1 of the NZBC and it passes the test performance requirements. Axon Panel also complies with durability requirements of 'B2' clause of the NZBC.

2.2 RESPONSIBILITY

The specifier or other party responsible for the project must run through a risk matrix analysis to determine which construction method is to be used. The designer must also ensure that the figures published in this specification are appropriate for the intended application and that additional detailing is performed for specific design or any areas that fall outside the scope of this specification. The designers should ensure that the intent of their design meets the requirements of the NZBC.

All New Zealand Standards referenced in this manual are current edition and must be complied with.

James Hardie conducts stringent quality checks to ensure that any product manufactured falls within our quality spectrum. It is the responsibility of the builder to ensure that the product meets aesthetic requirements before installation. James Hardie will not be responsible for rectifying obvious aesthetic surface variations following installation.

2.3 SITE AND FOUNDATION

The site on which the building is situated must comply with the NZBC Acceptable Solution E1/AS1 'Surface Water'.

Foundations design must comply with the requirements of NZS 3604 'Timber-framed Buildings' or be as per specific engineering design.

The grade of adjacent finished ground must slope away from the building to avoid any possibility of water accumulation in accordance with the NZBC requirements.

2.4 SURFACE CLEARANCES

The clearance between the bottom edge of cladding and paved/ unpaved ground must comply with section 9.1.3 of E2/AS1. The finished floor level must also comply with these requirements These clearances must be maintained throughout the life of the building.

Axon Panel must overhang the bottom plate on a concrete slab by a minimum of 50mm as required by NZS 3604.

Axon Panel must have a minimum clearance of 100mm from paved ground, and 175mm from unpaved ground. On roofs and decks, the minimum clearance must be 50mm.

Do not install external cladding such that it may remain in contact with water or ground. Refer Figures 3 and 18.

2.5 MOISTURE MANAGEMENT

It is the responsibility of the specifier to identify moisture related risks associated with any particular building design.

Wall construction design must effectively manage moisture, considering both the interior and exterior environments of the building, particularly in buildings that have a higher risk of wind driven rain penetration or that are artificially heated or cooled.

Walls must include those provisions as required by the NZBC Acceptable Solution E2/AS1 'External Moisture'. In addition all wall openings, penetrations, junctions, connections, window sills, heads and jambs must incorporate appropriate flashings for waterproofing. The other materials, components and installation methods used to manage moisture in external walls, must comply with the requirements of relevant standards and the NZBC.

For further guidance on designing for weathertightness refer to BRANZ Ltd, and the Ministry of Business Innovation and Employment (MBIE) updates on the following websites respectively, www.branz.co.nz and www.building.govt.nz

2.6 STRUCTURE

2.6.1 Timber framing

Timber-framed buildings must be designed in accordance with NZS 3604 (Timber-framed Buildings). When the framing is provided as per the specific engineering design, the framing stiffness must be either equivalent to or more than the stiffness requirements of NZS 3604.

For timber frame walls longer than 12m it is best pratice to allow for construction joints to accommodate movements generated due to timber shrinkage or deflections etc.

2.6.2 Wind loading

Axon Panel is suitable for use in all wind zones in New Zealand up to and including EH as defined in NZS 3604.

A specific design is required for all situations where the buildings falls outside the scope of NZS 3604 and E2/AS1.

2.7 BRACING

Axon Panel direct fixed can be used to achieve structural bracing when fixed with stainless steel HardieFlex™ nails. For further information refer to the James Hardie Bracing Design Manual.

Axon Panel installed to CLD Structural Cavity Battens as per this specification cannot be used to achieve structural bracing. However, bracing can be achieved by using James Hardie rigid air barrier board installed direct to framing instead of a flexible underlay or by using Villaboard® Lining bracing system on the internal face.

2.8 FIRE RATED WALLS

Axon Panel when direct fixed with HardieFlex nails to external walls can achieve fire ratings up to 60/60/60 to comply with C/AS1 of the NZBC when the walls are constructed in accordance with the current James Hardie 'Fire and Acoustic Design Manual'.

When using Axon Panel fixed to CLD Structural Cavity Battens, a fire rating of up to 60 minutes can be achieved using RAB® Board in conjunction with the fire rated system requirements as specified in the James Hardie 'Fire and Acoustic Design Manual'. Ask James Hardie on 0800 808 868 for further information.

Axon Panel is classified as a non-combustible material suitable for use on walls close to boundary.

2.9 ENERGY EFFICIENCY

External walls constructed as per this technical specification using Axon Panel, bulk insulation, where the area of glazing is 30% or less of the total wall area comply with the requirements for walls in the NZBC Acceptable Solution H1/AS1 (NZBC Clause H1 Energy Efficiency), Replacement Table 1. To meet thermal insulation requirements for the construction, the bulk insulation as specified in Table-1 must be used. This insulation may be substituted with insulations having higher R-values. The thermal insulation of a wall gets affected when the depth of the timber framing is increased or decreased. The calculation used in Table 1 is based on a timber framing size 90 x 45mm and using an internal lining material such as James Hardie Villaboard® Lining or a 10mm plasterboard.

Total construction R-Value depends on the insulation material used and the framing ratio. The insulation material R-Values specified in this table are for studs spaced at 600mm c/c and nogs spaced at 800mm c/c.

To achieve higher R-Values of construction the wall insulation material must be replaced with an insulation material having higher R-Values to suit the requirements.

For further guidance on insulation requirements refer to the current edition of 'House Insulation Guide' published by BRANZ.

3 Framing

3.1 GENERAL

This Axon Panel technical specification is only suitable for timber-framed buildings. Other framing materials are subject to a specific engineering design.

3.2 TIMBER FRAMING

3.2.1 Dimensions

A minimum 45mm wide stud is required.

3.2.2 Structural grade

Minimum timber grade requirement is No. 1 framing grade or MSG6 as per NZS 3604. The grading of timber must comply with the AS/NZS 1748 and NZS 3631 requirements.

3.2.3 Durability

The external framing must be treated to a minimum H1.2 treatment. Refer to the NZBC Acceptable Solution B2/AS1 'Durability' for further information about the durability requirements.

For timber treatment and allowable moisture content information refer to NZS 3602 (Timber and Wood-Based Products for use in Buildings) and NZS 3640 (Chemical Preservation of Round Sawn Timber) for minimum timber treatment selection and treatment requirements.

Also refer to the framing manufacturer's literature for further guidance on timber selection. Framing must be protected from moisture at site in accordance with the recommendation of the framing manufacturers.

3.2.4 Frame construction

The framing must fully support all panel edges. The framing must be rigid and not rely on the cladding panel for stability.

Timber framing sizes and its set-out must comply with NZS 3604 and as specified in this specification.

In case of gable end trusses sitting on top plates of the external wall frame, the frame size must comply with the minimum timber sizes stipulated for wall frames in Section 8 of the NZS 3604.

For timber frame walls longer than 12m, it is best practice to allow for construction joints to accommodate movements generated due to timber shrinkage or deflections generated by loadings etc.

3.3 STEEL FRAMING

Refer to James Hardie Steel Frame Technical Specification about the installation of Axon Panel to steel frame.

3.4 CONSTRUCTION METHODS

3.4.1 Direct fixed

For direct fixed construction method the following framing is required:

- Studs at 600mm c/c maximum
- A minimum 45mm stud width is required at vertical panel joints
- Nogs/dwangs are required at 1200mm c/c maximum.

3.4.2 CLD Structural Cavity Batten

For cavity construction method the following framing is required:

- When studs are spaced at 600mm centres maximum, the nogs/dwangs must be provided at 800mm centres maximum
- When studs are spaced at 400mm centres then the nogs/dwangs may be provided at 1200mm centres
- An extra stud is required in internal corners. Refer to Figure 21.

3.5 TOLERANCES

In order to achieve the required performance and an acceptable wall finish, it is imperative that framing is straight and true.

Framing tolerances must comply with the requirements of NZS 3604. All framing shall be made flush.

Preparation

4.1 FLEXIBLE UNDERLAY OR HOMERAB PRE-CLADDING

Flexible underlay or HomeRAB® Pre-Cladding must be provided as per the requirements of the NZBC Acceptable Solution E2/ AS1 'External Moisture' and NZS 3604. The flexible underlay must comply with Table 23 of E2/AS1 and AS/NZS 4200.1. The flexible underlay must be fixed in accordance with E2/AS1, NZS 3604 and AS/NZS 4200.2 and the underlay manufacturer's recommendations.

Walls which are not lined on the inside face (e.g. garage walls or gable ends) must include a rigid sheathing or an air barrier behind the cladding which complies with the requirements of the NZBC Acceptable Solution E2/AS1 Table 23. For attached garages, flexible underlays must be selected in accordance with the NZBC Acceptable Solution E2/AS1, paragraph 9.1 3.4. HomeRAB Pre-Cladding is suitable for use in these applications. It must be installed in accordance with the James Hardie Rigid Air Barriers installation manual.

4.2 RIGID AIR BARRIER

For EH wind zone or Specific Engineering Design projects where the wind pressures are higher than 1.5kPa (ULS), RAB Board (6mm) must be used. Refer to the James Hardie rigid air barriers installation manual for information regarding its installation. For buildings within the scope NZS 3604 HomeRAB Pre-Cladding Lining (4.5mm) or flexible underlays can be used.

4.3 VENT STRIP

The James Hardie uPVC cavity vent strip must be installed at the bottom of all walls constructed using the drained and ventilated cavity construction method. It is important that the openings in the vent strip are kept clear and unobstructed to allow free drainage and ventilation of cavities. James Hardie uPVC vent strip has an opening area of 1000mm²/m length.

4.4 FLASHING

All wall openings, penetrations, intersections, connections, window sills, heads and jambs must be flashed prior to panel installation. Please refer to moisture management requirements in Clause 2.5. The flexible underlay or RAB Board must be appropriately taped around the penetrations and lapped/taped to flashings. Materials must be lapped in such a way that water tracks down to the exterior of a building. James Hardie will assume no responsibility for water infiltration within the wall due to poor installation of flashings or flexible underlays. The selected flashing materials must comply with the durability requirements of the NZBC. For information refer to Table 20 of clause E2 of the NZBC.

When using a James Hardie rigid air barrier board the entire framing around window opening must be sealed with a flashing tape. The tape must be finished over the face of James Haride rigid air barrier board. The flashing tapes like SUPER-STICK Building Tape® by Marshall Innovations or 3M™ All Weather Flashing Tape 8067 by $3M^{\text{TM}}$ are recommended for use with James Hardie rigid air barrier board. Refer to the tape manufacturer's literature for further information regarding their installation.

4.5 JUNCTIONS AND PENETRATIONS

Refer to Clause 2.5 of this specification for moisture management requirements. All windows and doors must be detailed as per the requirements of this specification. James Hardie has developed the window details for Axon Panel which meet the requirements of E2 'External Moisture', an approved document of the NZBC. Refer to Figures 8 to 10 and 24 to 26.

5 Batten installation

Note: This specification is not for timber cavity battens. Refer to separate technical specification from James Hardie.

5.1 CLD STRUCTURAL CAVITY BATTENS

Buildings with a risk score of 7-20 calculated in accordance with Table 2 of Acceptable Solution E2/AS1 of the NZBC, require Axon Panel to be installed on a cavity. CLD Structural Cavity Battens provide airspace between the frame and the panel and are used to fix cladding into them.

CLD Structural Cavity Battens are made of a low density fibre cement formulation which enables them to have extra strength and durability. CLD Structural Cavity Batten is sealed on all sides and is suitable to fix Axon Panel installed as per this technical specification, and it can withstand the design wind pressures exerted on a cladding within the scope of NZS 3604.

The CLD Structural Cavity Battens are made 2450mm long and 19mm thick. The battens are fully sealed on all sides.

5.2 BATTEN LAYOUT

CLD Structural Cavity Battens must be fixed to the wall framing over flexible underlay or James Hardie rigid air barrier. The smoother face of batten should face towards the cladding.

CLD Structural Cavity Battens are suitable to withstand wind pressures up to 2.5kPa (ULS). For batten fixing, refer to section 5.4. Ensure the battens are straight and provide a flat surface to fix Axon Panel to. Site cut ends of battens must be sealed on site with Dulux[®] Acraprime 501/1 sealer or Resene Quick Dry.

The battens are run continuously over the studs but they must not be run continuously over the floor joists. There must be a 15mm gap between the battens at floor joist level to allow for structural shrinkages and deflections. Refer to Figure 27.

CLD Structural Cavity Battens can be butt jointed over the studs within the floor height. The batten ends must be cut between 20° to 45° and be installed in a way that the butt joint deflects the moisture to the exterior. The ends must be sealed and jointed with the adhesive sealant before butting them together. Refer to

The designer must ensure that the CLD Structural Cavity Battens are not used in situations where design wind pressures are above 2.5kPa (ULS).

CLD Structural Cavity Battens must always be at least 300mm in length.

5.3 INTERMEDIATE SUPPORT

Where studs are at 600mm centres an intermediate means of restraining the flexible underlay and insulation from bulging into the cavity shall be installed. An acceptable method to achieve this is using a:

- 75mm galvanised mesh; or
- polypropylene tape at 300mm centres fixed horizontally and drawn taut.

No intermediate supports are required:

- when studs are spaced at 400mm centres; or
- when RAB Board instead of flexible underlays are used.

5.4 BATTEN FASTENERS

The CLD Structural Cavity Batten must be fixed to the framing as specified in Table 2. The fasteners must be driven at a minimum distance of 50mm from the batten ends.

For fastener durability information, refer to Clause 6.2 of this

CLD Structural Cavity Battens less than 400mm in height must have fixings at maximum 150mm centres.

Battens must be fixed over studs.

Panel fixing

6.1 GENERAL

Axon Panel must be kept dry and under cover whilst in storage or during the installation. Every endeavour must be made to keep framing dry once panel fixing commences. All site-cut panel edges must be sealed prior to installation.

- The shiplap jointing of panels is only suitable for vertical fixing of panels.
- Do not fix in the groove of Axon Panel.
- Ensure the sheets are from the same batch.
- It is recommended to fix from the centre of the panel and work outwards.
- Do not overdrive fasteners.
- Fixings must be finished flush with the panel surface.

6.2 FASTENER DURABILITY

Fasteners must meet the minimum durability requirements of the NZBC. NZS 3604 specifies the requirements for fixing material to be used in relation to exposure conditions and are summarised in Table 3.

Also refer to the NZBC Acceptable Solution E2/AS1 Table 20 and 21 for information regarding the selection of suitable fixing materials and their compatibility with other materials.

6.3 FASTENER — TYPE, SIZE AND LAYOUT

6.3.1 Direct fix

Axon Panel must be fixed to framing using the fixings as specified in Table 4 below and follow the edge distance required for nails as shown in the details. Refer to Figures 2 and 4.

Notes:

- 1. Brad nail fixing method is only suitable up to very high wind speed zones. Do not use this method for EH wind zones described in NZS 3604 or SED projects.
- 2. Nails must be finished flush with panel surface.
- 3. Special fixing arrangements are required for bracing and fire-resistance rated wall systems.

For more information Ask James Hardie on 0800 808 868.

When fixing the panels using nail guns, refer to the nail gun manufacturer for information about nails and the type of nail gun to be used.

Note: Do not use 'D' head nails.

6.3.2 CLD Structural Cavity Batten Method

This panel fixing method can be used up to 2.5kPa wind pressure. Axon Panel is only fixed into the CLD Structural Cavity Batten as per this method.

Adhesive sealant

A polyurethane adhesive sealant Seal N Flex-1 manufactured by Bostik or SikaFlex 11FC by Sika are recommended for use in the installation of these products. Apply a 6mm continuous bead of this adhesive sealant over the face of the CLD Structural Cavity Batten before fixing the Axon Panel. Refer to Figure 19, 20 and 21.

When using external box corner flashing, use a 10mm thick bead of adhesive over the aluminium box corner flanges. Refer to Figure 22.

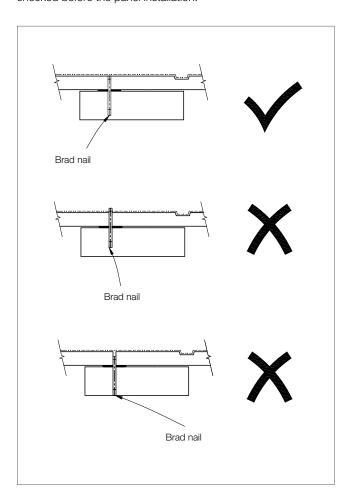
Note: Do not use excessive adhesive.

6.3.3 Cavity construction using timber cavity battens

When fixing Axon Panel using timber cavity battens, these details are available at www.jameshardie.co.nz or Ask James Hardie on 0800 808 868.

6.4 PANEL LAYOUT

All panel edges must be supported by the framing. The shiplap joint must be formed vertically. The framing centers must be checked before the panel installation.



Fix Axon Panel to CLD Structural Cavity Battens using one of the following fixings specified in Table 5. The edge distance at panel corner must be minimum 75mm vertically from panel corners. Refer Figure 17.

- 2. Nails must be finished flush with panel surface.

7 Jointing

7.1 GENERAL

Axon Panels are fixed to form a shiplap joint at vertical edges. The panels have factory-made edges to suit this jointing.

7.2 VERTICAL JOINT

Direct fixed

Axon Panels are shiplap jointed keeping a gap of 1-2mm between the panels. A 50mm wide 3259 Inseal sealing tape is used under the joint over the face of the timber stud where direct fixed construction method is used. A flexible sealant must be applied to the full length of the shiplap joint before the panels are jointed. The edge distance for a HardieFlex nail must be 18mm min. Refer to Figure 4.

Cavity construction

Fix the CLD Structural Cavity Batten over the studs and it runs behind the entire length of the shiplap joint with a 50mm overhang below the bottom plate and finishes flush with the bottom edge of panel. Refer to Figures 16 and 17. The vertical shiplap joint is formed along the centre line of the batten. A bead of sealant is applied to the vertical edge of the Axon Panel to seal the shiplap joint before fixing the panels. Refer to Figure 19. The edge distance for a brad nail must be 16mm and 18mm. Refer Figures 14 and 19.

8 Finishing

7.3 HORIZONTAL JOINT

At floor joist levels a horizontal joint must be provided to accommodate the movement resulting from timber joist shrinkage and settlement. A JH 9mm panel aluminium horizontal 'h' mould is used to form a horizontal joint. Use the aluminium 'h' mould jointer to cover over the butt joint of 'h' mould. A purpose made metal 'Z' flashing or a James Hardie uPVC flashing could also be used to flash the horizontal joint. Refer to Figures 11, 12 and 27.

7.4 EXTERNAL CORNER

A JH 9mm panel aluminium box corner mould is used to form the external box corner. The site-cut sheet edges must be sealed before butting them into the box corner. Refer to Figure 7.

Do not run the box corner flashing continuously over the floor joist. On a two storey construction the aluminium box corner is finished under the aluminium 'h' mould. A uPVC corner under flashing must be used under the box corner when in this situation. Refer to Figure 12.

For CLD Structural Cavity Batten external corner refer to Figure 22.

The bead of adhesive must be 10mm thick to accommodate for the thickness of the aluminium.

7.5 INTERNAL CORNER

Direct fixed internal corner is formed using a uPVC corner under flashing or an 80mm wide Inseal sealing strip behind the panel edges. The joint is filled with the flexible sealant. Refer to Figure 6.

For CLD Structural Cavity Batten internal corner joint detail refer to Figure 21.

7.6 FLASHING MATERIAL DURABILITY

Please refer to Table 20 of E2/AS1 of the NZBC regarding the durability requirements of various flashing materials.

8.1 PREPARATION

Painting of Axon Panel is mandatory to meet the durability requirements of the NZBC and 15 year James Hardie product warranties. Axon Panel must be dry and free of any dust or grime before painting. The panels must be painted within 90 days of their installation. There is no restriction on the LRV of paint to be applied on the Axon Panel.

When using uPVC flashings, dark colours should be avoided as it will affect the durability of uPVC flashing. The LRV of paint must be above 40% when using uPVC flashings.

Dark paints can be used when using the aluminium flashings.

Panels are pre-primed and are suitable for site applied acrylic paints. Pre-finished panels can also be installed using exposed head fasteners.

In order to seal cut edges or sanded patches, Dulux 1 Step, Resene quick dry, Taubmans Underproof Acrylic Primer Undercoat or a similar product should be applied. The primer should be compatible with the paint to be used.

Where panels are fixed with brad nails, the nail heads must be finished flush with panel surface. The nail gun should be set to nail "proud" of the panel surface and nail heads to be manually finished flush with surface. The nail heads can be skimmed over with an exterior grade 2 part builders fill if required. The skimmed area must be primed prior to site-applied finishing.

For site-applied finishes where brad nails are used. James Hardie recommends an undercoat and a minimum of two coats of acrylic paint. Follow the paint manufacturer's recommendations to prepare the surface and to adequately cover and conceal the panel fixings.

8.2 FLEXIBLE SEALANT

All sealants used must comply with the relevant requirements of the NZBC. Their application and usage must be in accordance with manufacturer's instructions. Check with sealant manufacturer prior to coating over sealants. Some sealant manufacturers do not recommend coating over their products.

9 Storage and handling

When storing Axon Panel, boards must be laid flat on a smooth level surface. Edges and corners must be protected from chipping.

To ensure optimum performance, store panels under cover and keep dry prior to fixing. If the panels become wet, allow them to dry thoroughly before fixing.

Do not carry panels on the flat, carry in the vertical position to avoid excessive bending.

10 Maintenance 11 Product

information

The extent and nature of maintenance will depend on the geographical location and exposure of the building. As a guide, it is recommended that basic normal maintenance tasks shall include but not be limited to:

- Washing down exterior surfaces every 6-12 months*
- Re-applying of exterior protective finishes if necessary**
- Maintaining the exterior envelope and connections including joints, penetrations, flashings and sealants that may provide a means of moisture entry beyond the exterior cladding.
- · Cleaning out gutters, blocked pipes and overflows as required
- Pruning back vegetation that is close to or touching the building
- The clearance between the bottom edge of Axon Panel and the finished ground must always be maintained.

*Do not use a water blaster to wash down the cladding.

*In extreme coastal conditions or sea spray zones, wash every 3-4 months.

**Refer to your paint manufacturer for washing down and recoating requirements related to paint performance.

11.1 MANUFACTURING AND **CLASSIFICATION**

Axon Panel is an advanced lightweight cement composite building product. The basic composition is portland cement, ground sand, cellulose fibre and water. The panels are easily identified by the name 'Axon Panel' printed at regular intervals on the back face of panel.

CLD Structural Cavity Battens are manufactured using a low density fibre cement formulation. The basic composition is Portland cement, ground sand, cellulose fibre and water and proprietary additives. The battens are sealed on all sides.

Axon Panel is manufactured to AS/NZS 2908.2 'Cellulose-Cement Products Part 2: Flat Sheets' (ISO 8336 'Fibre Cement Flat Panels') standards in New Zealand. James Hardie New Zealand is an ISO 9001 'Telarc' certified manufacturer.

Axon Panel is classified Type A, Category 3 in accordance with AS/NZS 2908.2 "Cellulose-Cement Products".

For Safety Data Sheets (SDS) visit www.jameshardie.co.nz or Ask James Hardie on 0800 808 868.

11.2 PRODUCT MASS

Axon Panel is manufactured in 9.0mm thickness and has a mass of 12.1kg/m2 at EMC.

Axon Panel cladding is defined as a Light Weight Wall Cladding (not exceeding 30kg/m2) as per NZS 3604.

11.3 DURABILITY

11.3.1 General

Axon Panel installed as per this technical specification will meet the durability requirements for claddings as required under clause 'B2-Durability' of the NZBC.

11.3.2 Resistance to moisture/rotting

Axon Panel has demonstrated resistance to permanent moisture induced deterioration (rotting) and has passed the following tests in accordance with AS/NZS 2908.2:

- Heat Rain (Clause 6.5).
- Water Permeability (Clause 8.2.2).
- Warm Water (Clause 8.2.4).
- Soak Dry (Clause 8.2.5).

11.3.3 Control of External Fire Spread

Axon Panel is assessed as per Appendix C C7.1.1 and is classified as 'Non-Combustible Material' which is suitable for use as external wall cladding and complies with requirements of Paragraph 5.4 of the NZBC Acceptable Solution C/AS1 and Paragraph 5.8.1 of Acceptable Soluations C/AS2 to C/AS6 of the NZBC.

11.3.4 Alpine regions

In regions subject to freeze/thaw conditions, Axon Panel must not be in direct contact with snow or ice build up for extended periods, e.g. external walls in alpine regions must be protected where snow drifts over winter are expected.

The Axon Panel has been tested in accordance with AS/NZS 2908.2 Clause 8.2.3.

Hole-Forming

For smooth clean cut circular holes:

- Mark the centre of the hole on the sheet.
- Pre-drill a 'pilot' hole.
- Using the pilot hole as a guide, cut the hole to the appropriate diameter with a hole saw fitted to a heavy duty electric drill.

For irregular holes:

- Small rectangular or circular holes can be cut by drilling a series of small holes around the perimeter of the hole then tapping out the waste piece from the sheet face.
- Tap carefully to avoid damage to sheets, ensuring that the sheet edges are properly supported.
