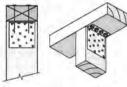

Produc

- 1.1 The Tekton® Weatherization System consists of Tekton® Building Wrap, One Piece Sill Tape or Protecto Sill System (flexible flashing tapes), Tekton Seam Tape and TRADE-SEAL. The system is used behind wall cladding systems and around framed joinery openings as a secondary weather resistant barrier for walls.
- 1.2 The Tekton® Building Wrap is fixed directly to the outside of the external wall framing, and is also wrapped around the inside face of the framing at openings. Tekton Seam Tape is applied over the joints of the installed flexible wall underlay. The One Piece Sill Tape or Protecto Sill System is then 'moulded' into the opening over the building wrap to cover both the face and edge of the opening framing, and also at joinery heads to seal flashings to the flexible wall underlay. The Protecto Wrap Tapes are also used for sealing punctures and tears in the flexible wall underlay. TRADE-SEAL is used to seal all penetrations through the flexible wall underlay.

- 2.2 The Tekton® Weatherization System has been appraised for use as a flexible wall underlay on steel framed buildings within the following scope:
- the scope limitations of NZBC Acceptable Solution E2/AS1, Paragraph 1.1 with regards to building height and floor plan area; and,
- with absorbent and non-absorbent wall claddings installed over an 18 mm minimum drained cavity; and,
- with masonry veneer in accordance with NZBC Acceptable Solution E2/AS1; and.
- · situated in NZS 3604 Wind Zones up to, and including 'Very High'.
- 2.3 The Tekton® Weatherization System has been appraised for use as a flexible wall underlay over rigid wall underlays on timber and steel framed buildings within the following scope:
- the scope limitations of NZBC Acceptable Solution E2/AS1, Paragraph 1.1 with regards to building height and floor plan area; and,
- with absorbent and non-absorbent wall claddings installed over an 18 mm minimum drained cavity; and,
- · with masonry veneer in accordance with NZBC Acceptable Solution E2/AS1; and,
- · situated in NZS 3604 Wind Zones up to and including 'Extra High'.

2.4 The Tekton® Weatherization System has also been appraised for use on building subject to specific weathertightness design. Building designers are responsible for the building design and for the incorporation of Tekton® Weatherization System into their design in accordance with the declared properties and the instructions of Marshall Waterproofing NZ/AUS Ltd.

New Zealand Building Code (NZBC)

3.1 In the opinion of BRANZ, the Tekton® Weatherization System if designed, used, installed and maintained in accordance with the statements and conditions of this Appraisal, will meet, or contribute to meeting the following provisions of the NZBC:

Clause B2 DURABILITY: Performance B2.3.1 (a) not less than 50 years, B2.3.1 (b) 15 years and B2.3.2. The Tekton® Weatherization System meets this requirement. See Paragraphs 9.1 – 9.2

Clause E2 EXTERNAL MOISTURE: Performance E2.3.2. The Tekton® Weatherization System contributes to exterior walls meeting this requirement. See Paragraphs 12.1 and 12.2.

Clause F2 HAZARDOUS BUILDING MATERIALS: Performance F2.3.1. The Tekton® Weatherization System meets this requirement and will not present a health hazard to people.

3.2 This is an Appraisal of an **Alternative Solution** in terms of New Zealand Building Code compliance.

- 4.1 System components supplied by Marshall Waterproofing NZ/AUS Ltd are as follows:
- Flexible wall underlay Tekton® Building Wrap is a synthetic breather-type building membrane available in rolls 2740 mm wide and 37 m long or 1370 mm wide and 74 m long. The product is manufactured from coated spun bonded polypropylene.

Flexible flashing tape (1) – One Piece Sill Tape is a
polyethylene faced, modified SBS rubberised asphalt, self
adhesive flashing tape. It is available in rolls 150 mm wide,
20 m long and 1 mm thick.

• Flexible flashing tape (2) – Protecto Sill System comprises Protecto Wrap Detail Tape, Protecto Wrap Sill Tape and Protecto Tak spray on primer. Both the tapes are based on modified SBS rubberised asphalt and Protecto Tak is a solvent based spray on adhesive primer. Protecto Wrap Detail Tape is supplied as a 150 mm wide, 15 m long and 1.0 mm thick roll, Protecto Wrap Sill Tape is supplied as a 50, 150, 200 mm wide, 30m long and 0.5mm thick roll and Protecto Tak is supplied in 369 g can.

TRADE-SEAL is an EPDM sleeve bonded to a carrier material of spun-bonded high density polyethylene film 150 micron thick. The carrier material is backed with a self adhesive layer. The TRADE-SEAL is available with various diameter EPDM sleeve sizes to accommodate different size wall

penetrations.

 Adhesive tape – Tekton Seam Tape is a thin polypropylene joining adhesive tape, available in rolls 48 mm wide and 50 m long. 4.2 Accessories used with the system which are supplied by the building contractor are:

 Staples, clouts or other temporary fixings to attach the building wrap to the framing, and polypropylene tape, galvanized wire or mesh as set out in NZBC Acceptable Solution E2/AS1, Paragraph 9.1.8.5 where required to support the building wrap.

Handling and Storage

5.1 All products must be kept clean and dry at all times prior to use by storing under cover so that they are protected from the weather and damage. Rolls of Tekton® Building Wrap must be stored on end.

6.1 Refer to the Appraisals listing on the BRANZ website for details of the current Technical Literature for the Tekton® Weatherization System. The Technical Literature must be read in conjunction with this Appraisal. All aspects of design, use, installation and maintenance contained in the Technical Literature and within the scope of this Appraisal must followed.

Timber and Steel Framing

7.1 Studs must be provided at maximum 600 mm centres.Dwangs must be fitted flush between studs at maximum 1200 mm centres.

General

- 7.2 The Tekton® Weatherization System is intended for use as an alternative to conventional building papers which are fixed over timber or steel framed walls in order to limit the entry of wind into building cavities, and to act as a secondary barrier to wind-driven rain.
- 7.3 The Tekton® Weatherization System is intended for use behind wall cladding systems and at joinery openings as a secondary defence against water penetration into francavities.
- 7.4 The 'moulding' of One Piece Sill and Protecto Sill System Tapes into openings over the building wrap as an internal flashing system provides a seamless, physical waterproof barrier at that point. When it is installed at a slope forward, or when 'dammed' at the back of the sill trimmer with the likes of an air seal, the flashing tapes will direct moisture to the outside of the framing. One Piece Sill and Protecto Sill System Tapes are manufactured from modified SBS rubberised asphalt and therefore will self-seal around most common fasteners used to fix joinery to framing.
- 7.5 The system will also provide a degree of temporary weather protection during construction. However, it will not make the building weathertight and some wetting of the underlying structure is always possible before the building is closed-in. Hence, as with all other temporary weather protection systems, the building must be closed-in and made weatherproof before moisture sensitive materials such as wall or ceiling linings and insulation materials are installed.
- 7.6 The Tekton® Weatherization System is also suitable for use as an air barrier to walls that are not lined, such as attic spaces at gable ends, as called up in NZBC Acceptable Solution E2/AS1, Paragraph 9.1.4 (c). Refer to Table 1.

7.7 TRADE-SEAL when used with Tekton® Building Wrap, provides an alternative solution to the pipes and services penetrations specified in NZBC Acceptable Solution E2/AS1, paragraph 9.1.9.3 and Figure 68.

Note 1: Further testing of Tekton® Building Wrap was completed to determine the effect of the high pH level on the wall underlay and materials it is likely to come into contact with during its serviceable life. The testing confirmed that the high pH had no adverse effects on the building wraps performance, or the performance of other materials.

The Tekton® Weatherization System is suitable for under wall cladding as a wall underlay system as called up in NZBC Acceptable Solution E2/AS1, Table 23 on timber framed buildings, except that it must not be used with non-absorbent metal based wall claddings such as sidings or metal based weatherboards in direct fixed installations. Tekton® Weatherization System is suitable for use under cavity based wall claddings as a non-absorbent synthetic wall underlay system as called up in NZS 2295, Table 2.4 on steel framed buildings.

7.9 In cavity installations where the cavity battens are installed at greater than 450 mm centres, the wall underlay must be supported between the battens to prevent the wall underlay bulging into the cavity space when bulk insulation is installed in the wall frame cavity in accordance with the requirements of NZBC Acceptable Solution E2/AS1, Paragraph 9.1.8.5.

7.10 When the Tekton® Weatherization System is used in conjunction with LOSP (light organic solvent preservative) treated timber, the solvent from the timber treatment must be allowed to evaporate (generally at least one week) prior to the installation of the system.

Structure

8.1 The Tekton® Weatherization System is suitable for use in all Wind Zones of NZS 3604 up to, and including, 'Very High' when used as a flexible building underlay, and all Wind Zones of NZS 3604 up to, and including, 'Extra High' when used as an overlay for rigid building underlays.

Durability

Serviceable Life

9.1 The system meets code compliance with NZBC Clause B2.3.1 (a), not less than 50 years where the cladding durability requirement or expected serviceable life is not less than 50 years, e.g. behind masonry veneer, and code compliance with NZBC Clause B2.3.1 (b), 15 years where the cladding durability requirement is 15 years. This is provided it is not exposed to the weather for a total time of more than 60 days when using either Protecto Sill System Tapes or the One Piece Sill Tape. The product also must not be exposed to the weather or UV light at any time in service.

9.2 The exterior cladding must be maintained weathertight at all times for the Tekton® Weatherization System to have a serviceable life equal to that of the cladding.

Control of Internal Fire and Smoke Spread

10.1 The Tekton® Building Wrap component of the system has an AS 1530 Part 2 Flammability Index of 0. It therefore meets the requirements of NZBC Acceptable Solution C/AS1 Part 6, Table 6.2 for surface finish requirements for suspended flexible fabrics, and therefore it may be used with no restrictions in all buildings.

Outbreak of Fire

11.1 The system must be separated from chimneys and flues in accordance with the requirements of NZBC Acceptable Solution C/AS1 Part 9, for the protection of combustible materials.

External Moisture

12.1 The system is used to assist the control of moisture behind wall claddings by ensuring moisture which may occasionally penetrate the wall cladding is directed back to the exterior of the building.

12.2 The system is suitable for use with wall claddings complying with NZBC Acceptable Solution E2/AS1 or a valid BRANZ Appraisal, and where exposed up to, and including 'Very High' winds as defined by NZS 3604.

Appendix of the second

Installation Skill Level Requirements

13.1 Installation must always be carried out in accordance with the Technical Literature and this Appraisal by a competent tradesperson with an understanding of the wall wrap and weatherization system installation.

System Installation

14.1 The system must be installed in accordance with NZBC Acceptable Solution E2/AS1, or when used with BRANZ Appraised wall claddings, in accordance with any instructions given in the Appraisal, along with the instructions given in the Technical Literature.

14.2 Tekton® Building Wrap building wrap must be fixed first to the external face of the timber wall framing and as per NZS 2295 for steel framed buildings installed over all openings in the framing then cut and dressed into all sides of the openings.

14.3 Openings are dressed with lengths of One Piece Sill or Protecto Sill System Tapes where required and adhered to the Tekton Building Wrap. The tape is 'fanned' around the corners onto the face of the Tekton Building Wrap and folded over the outside edge of the opening framing. All surfaces must be clean and dry prior to the installation.

14.4 Any other components of the cladding system or joinery installation, such as sill trays, other flashings or seals should be installed as instructed by the cladding or joinery manufacturer. - Note 1: Further testing of Tekton® Building Wrap was completed to determine the effect of the high pH level on the wall underlay and materials it is likely to come into contact with during its serviceable life. The testing confirmed that the high pH had no adverse effects on the wall underlay performance, or the performance of other materials.

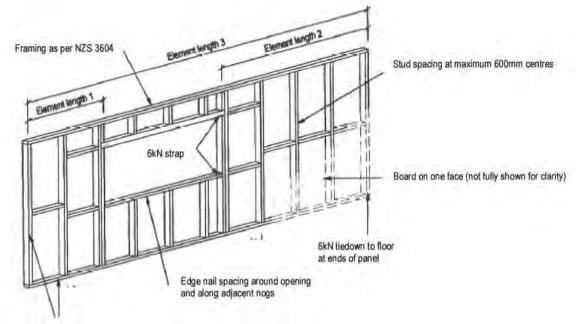

Where such action is considered, the manufacturer should be consulted in the first instance.

Do not install a Metro if there is any sign of visible

This Metro wood fire has been tested to and complies with AS/NZS2918:2001 when installed in accordance with this manual. Please ensure you are fully conversant with this relevant standard and the contents of this manual. Correct installation is critical to the safe operation and performance of this wood fire.

of the flue system, (i.e. there must not be any 150mm flue pipe exposed).

Please take particular note of the following:

- It is recommended that Metro's be installed with a Metro ECO flue system which has been developed to enhance the performance of Metro wood fires. Any alternative metres of 150mm diameter flue pipe.
- flue system must have a minimum flue pipe length of 4.2
- All flue pipe joints must be sealed and riveted. The bottom of the flue pipe in particular MUST be fully sealed into the flue outlet of the Metro wood fire.

In New Zealand, the Metro must be bolted through the

- floor protector into the floor to comply with the seismic restraint provisions of AS/NZS2918:2001 All Metro's are extremely heavy, varying in weight from
- 85kgs up to 150kgs. During the installation process do not lift the appliance by yourself, and take care not to damage the panel coating.

The 150mm active flue pipe must be fully encased from the ceiling to the underside of the flashing cone at the top

Assembling your Metro wood fire

All Metro wood fires are packed in a single heavy-duty carton, and bolted to a wooden pallet. Having removed the packaging and located this manual, familiarise yourself with the illustrations on pages 2 & 3, and proceed as detailed below.

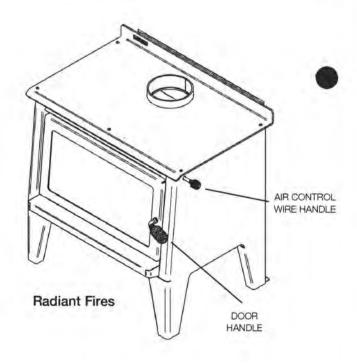
Please note: you should only assemble this wood fire if you are suitably experienced in wood fire assembly and installation.

Note: The Metro carton shows the model Metro you are about to install, enabling you to select the apppropriate model's assembly instructions.

Metro Radiant Fires

These Metro's are supplied virtually fully assembled. Packed inside the firebox you will find bricks in a cardboard wrapper, a wire door handle and the air control wire handle.

- Remove the two securing bolts located at the base of each rear leg which secure the Metro to the wooden pallet, and carefully "walk" the Metro off the pallet.
- Open the door fully and fit the side bricks to each side of the firebox. Location lugs are fitted to the base and rear of the firebox to retain the side bricks in position. Refer to Diagram 2.
- Attach the door handle to the door latch assembly by screwing it on clockwise.
- Attach the air control wire handle by screwing it on clockwise.



Assembling your Metro wood fire

Metro Pedestal Fires

To minimise freight damage, the pedestal base has been packaged inside the firebox. Please note: you should only assemble this wood fire if you are suitably experienced in wood fire assembly and installation.

To safely assemble your Metro, please proceed as follows: -

- Safely remove straps by cutting straps with scissors.
- Lift off carton, turn upside down (use to hold all discarded packaging).
- Lift off the top grille and place somewhere safe. Be careful not to chip the enamel coating.
- Open the door 90 degrees and lift the door off the hinge and place somewhere safe. Be careful not to chip the enamel coating.
- Remove the pedestal packed in a cardboard wrap
- Remove the pedestal mount plate
- Remove pedestal heat shield (Xtreme & Euro models only)
- Remove the side bricks, door handle and the bolt bag
- Remove the 2 tek screws at the base of the inside of the firebox that are fixing the wood fire to the pallet.
- It is recommended that 2 people work together with this step. Grab the underneath top of the firebox door opening with one hand, holding the flue spigot with the other, slowly lift the front of the wood fire all the way back and rest the wood fire on it's rear heat shield on the floor. Remove the packaging pallet.
- Xtreme & Euro models only Fit the pedestal heat shield over the 4 bolts as shown in Diagram 1, with the open edge facing the front of the Metro (up)
- Position the pedestal with its front facing over the 4 bolts and fit the washers and nuts supplied, check to ensure the pedestal is correctly aligned and securely tighten the nuts
- It is recommended that 2 people work together with this step. Grab the flue spigot with one hand and the other hand underneath the top of the firebox door opening, lift upwards standing the wood fire onto it's pedestal.
- Re-fit the door and top grille
- Open the door fully and fit the side bricks to each side of the fire box. Location lugs are fitted to the base and rear of the firebox to retain the side bricks in position. Refer to Diagram 2.

Note: The ECO Tiny Ped model utilises a slightly different pedestal to that detailed in Diagram 1. The rear panel on the pedestal must be turned around with the return fold facing back the opposite way.

All Metro Models

Check to ensure the top baffle is in its correct position in the top chamber of the firebox. It should be resting on four support lugs (two on each side of the firebox). The baffle must be hard back against the rear of the firebox with the "promet extension" (white board) or return front steel edge of the baffle facing forward as illustrated in Diagram 2.

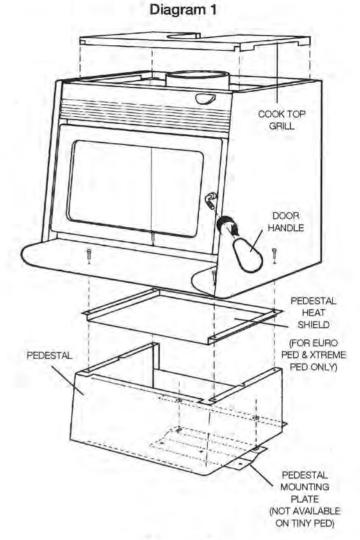
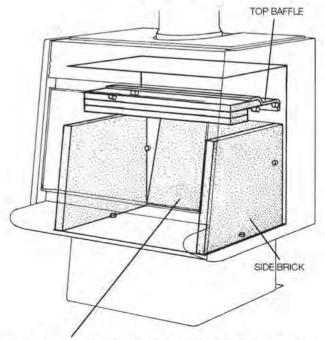

Note: The ECO Wee Ped has an additional "3rd brick" which fits to the rear face of the firebox, locating under/into a bracket provided in the middle of the firebox's rear face, under the top baffle.

Direct vent option

The ECO Xtreme Ped, ECO Euro Ped, ECO Wee Curve and ECO Euro Rad models have the option to be installed as "Direct Vent" appliances, thereby drawing all primary and secondary combustion air from outside the home. Once connected, this direct venting option ensures the air that is heated within the home, stays in the home improving efficiency and reducing fuel usage.

Note: Connection of the Metro's direct vent inlet to outside the home is optional. If not connected these Direct Vent models still offer greatly improved performance and lower emissions due to the unique pre-heated air path for all primary and secondary combustion air that these models consume.

Direct Vent Options

Three "Direct Vent kits" are available to connect the ECO DV Metro to an air supply from outside the living environment of the home. The kits available include:

- DV WALL KIT For installations when the Metro is installed against an outside wall.
- DV FLOOR KIT—For installations onto a floor which has a free air supply below it.
- DV CEILING KIT- For installations when the Metro is installed against an internal wall and on a concrete floor

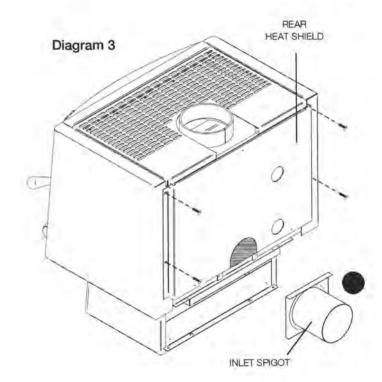
(DV Ceiling kit goes into the wall cavity, then up inside the wall into the ceiling cavity, where the air supply is drawn from)

Installing the Direct Vent Option

Remove the rear heatshield from the Metro wood fire by unscrewing the four self tapping screws illustrated in Diagram 3 and proceed as follows:

- Remove the section of panel illustrated with a "hatch", from the mid/bottom section of the rear heatshield. This section to be removed has been pre-punched and only requires a few small tabs to be cut.
- Take the "inlet spigot" supplied in the "Direct Vent kit" and slide it fully down into position into the brackets provided on the rear of the firebox.
- Replace the Metro's rear heatshield with the four screws previously removed.

The Metro wood fire is now ready for installation once you have pre-fitted the Direct Vent kit into the wall or floor. Full instructions for this procedure are supplied with the Direct Vent kits.



Floor protector size, construction & fitting

Pioneer manufacture an extensive range of what Pioneer term "Ash Floor Protectors" which comply with the minimum floor protector requirement of AS/NZS 2918:2001, and can be installed with any freestanding Metro wood fire.

Metro freestanding wood fires do not require an insulated floor protector as they comply with the minimum floor protector requirements of AS/NZS 2918:2001. These minimum floor protector requirements are;

- They must be of adequate size to give appropriate wall, rear and front clearances/projections as detailed below and in the chart illustrated on page 6. Note;
- The floor protector must extend 200mm horizontally to the rear and each side directly below the door opening, and 300mm forward of the door opening.
- The upper surface of the floor protector must be made of non combustible material.
- A suitable floor protector for a Metro freestanding wood fire is therefore any non-combustible material which could include:
- Ceramic tiles with grouted joints fixed directly to timber flooring.
- A sheet of toughened glass, panel steel etc. laid directly onto a wooden or other combustible floor.

Note: If being installed onto a concrete or non-combustible floor a floor protector is not required.

Metro Radiant Series

Lift the Metro onto the floor protector and using a tape measure to ensure that the minimum wall clearances and front floor protector projections as detailed in the chart on page 6 are met or exceeded. Once the Metro's location on the floor protector is established and if the installation is in New Zealand, seismic restraint is required.

or or coach bolts if a wooden floor, secure through the holes provided at the base, behind both rear legs.

Note; the anchors must pass through the floor protector and securely anchor the Metro to the floor.

Metro Pedestal Series

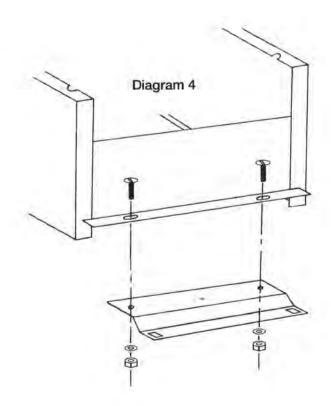
These models (excluding the ECO Tiny Ped) are supplied with a "pedestal mounting plate". Refer to Diagram 1 on page 3. Place the mounting plate on the floor protector with the two slots at the rear. A flue centre hole is marked on this plate and a chart is attached enabling you to locate the position of the Metro without placing the Metro onto the floor protector. Once the location of this mounting plate is established, secure it through the floor protector into the floor using a minimum of two of the four holes provided, diagonally opposite each other. Suitable anchors are as detailed below left for the Metro Radiant Series.

Alternative Metro Mount Plate Installation

For installations when it is desirable to position the assembled Metro prior to bolting down, it is possible to "invert" the mounting plate and use it as a means of bolting the Metro directly to the floor, through the floor protector. Refer to Diagram 4 and note;

- Rotate the mount plate 180 degrees so the label faces downwards.
- Remove the two "slide nuts" from the rear face of the mount plate.
- Secure the mount plate to the pedestal with 6mm bolts through holes provided as illustrated.

You can then bolt down the Metro through the two rectangular slots in the rear edge of the mount plate. These slots are more accessible than bolting direct through the pedestal, and it also eliminates the need for spacers.



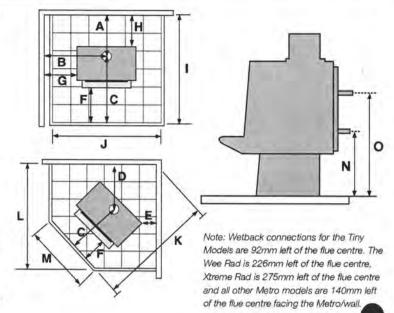
Clearance chart

Measurements listed below are the minimum required, stated in millimetres. Measurements are taken from the following reference points as illustrated:

- From the nearest combustible wall or surface (A, B, D, E, G, H)
- From the Metro's flue centre (A, B, C, D)
- From the outermost point of the Metro's cabinet construction (E, F, G, H)
- To the edge of the ash floor protectors non-combustible surface (C, F, I, J, K, L, M)

The Metro ECO Euro Ped & ECO Xtreme Ped installed with a "Pioneer Double Flue Shield with side extensions fitted" reduces minimum corner clearance E from 170mm to 110mm. In this situation use the LTD Euro Ped chart for ECO Euro Ped measurements E, D, K & L.

Note: If you are installing any of the above wood fires onto a Pioneer 1150 corner floor protector the flue shield side extensions MUST be fitted. The Metro Wee Rad corner clearance can be reduced by fitting specific Wee Rad corner shields. See chart below for clearances.

Wetbacks

If the home is in a classified "clean air zone", and dependent on requirements/restrictions which may be imposed by your local council, you may or may not be able to install a water heating device. If in doubt consult your local Metro retailer. Only Pioneer's cast jacket wetback system should be fitted to a Metro; alternative wetbacks will void the Metro's emission approvals and may seriously affect the performance of the appliance and void the owner's warranty.

te; Wetback systems are not suitable for use in locations where the er supply has lime content, lime build up inside the coil will eventually block the coil causing the wetback to fail.

The wetback is fitted to the inside rear of the firebox, with the connection pipe heights illustrated and detailed on the previous page 6. Please note:

- Wetback connections for the Tiny models are 92mm left of the flue centre. The Wee Rad is 226mm and Xtreme Rad is 275mm left of the flue centre. All other Metro models are 140mm left of the flue centre, facing the Metro/wall; the return pipe connection is directly above the inlet connection.
- The Wee Rad, Xtreme Rad & Xtreme Rad Base wetback position is to the outside left hand side wall. See specific instruction in the 'Rad Wetback' box for these appliances.
- Reduced height pedestals are available for certain models to reduce wetback connection heights.

 It is recommended the return pipe has a minimum rise of 1 in 12; performance will reduce as the distance to the storage cylinder increases.

To fit the wetback proceed as follows: (Unless Wee or Xtreme Rad models, then please follow instructions in the wetback box)

- Remove the rear panel of the Metro by removing the four pozi drive screws. Remove the two pre-punched knockouts from this panel.
- Two further knockouts will be visible on the inner rear heatshield; remove these also. Once these are removed 6mm nuts will be visible through the knockout holes.
- Open the Metro's door and locate two bolts securing the pressed washers which are visible on the left hand side of the firebox for both inlet and outlet connection points.
- A further three bolt heads will also be visible on the inside rear wall of the firebox; these are threaded into the 6mm thick firebox. Remove all three.
- 5. Using the tube of sealant supplied with the wetback, apply a liberal bead of sealant around both the two connection pipes and also the outer circumference of the wetback which will face the inside rear wall of the firebox. This will completely seal the wetback to the inside rear wall of the fire on installation.
- 6. Fit the wetback into the firebox and carefully pass the connection pipes through the holes in the rear of the firebox. Securely attach the wetback using the three bolts previously removed from the rear face of the firebox, fitting them through the slots provided in the wetback's jacket.
- The wetback is now ready for connection to the storage cylinder by a registered plumber.

Flue installation

It is recommended that all Metro freestanding wood fires be installed with the energy efficient Metro ECO flue system which comes complete with a detailed installation manual. This installation manual must be presented with your application to gain consent with your local council.

A copy of the installation manual can be downloaded from www.metrofires.co.nz, under Flue Systems, or a copy can be obtained from your Metro retailer. Any alternative flue system must comply with and be installed as detailed in AS/NZS 2918:2001, and a copy of the installation manual must also be presented with your application to gain consent with your local council.

All Metro's require a 150mm diameter flue. Please note:

 All joints in the flue pipe must be sealed with Pioneer fire cement (or similar) and riveted.

- The base of the flue pipe must be sealed into the outlet of the Metro's flue stub. This is critical for optimum operation.
- · Refer "Important Information" on page 2.
- The flue systems 150mm diameter flue pipe must terminate a minimum of 4.6 metres above the top surface of the floor protector.

Pioneer Flueshield

All Metro's have been tested with a Pioneer double flue mounted shield. For the Metro to be installed with minimal clearances as the clearance chart states, only the Pioneer double mounted flue shield can be used. All other flue shields will invalidate the installation.

The Metro can be installed without a flue shield, if this is the case it needs to be installed as AS/NZS 2918:2001 stipulates.

Congratulations on the purchase of your Metro wood fire

This low-emission, slow combustion appliance is designed to give you many years of warmth and service, subject to the following key factors. These key factors, if not adhered to are the major causes of unsafe installation, poor performance and flue blockages and product failure.

- Your Metro wood fire must be installed correctly. Metro recommend a competent and suitably qualified installer.
- 2. The only fuel to be used in this appliance shall be wood that meets the following criteria.
 - Less than 25% moisture,
 - Has not been treated with preservatives or impregnated with chemicals or glue,
 - Is not chipboard, particle board, or laminated board, and
 - Is not painted, stained or oiled
- The appliance shall be operated at all times in accordance with the "Installation and Operating Instructions" supplied with each appliance.
- Metro's should only be installed with Metro EGO Flue Systems.
- 5. Coal must not be used as a fuel.

Please also note the following important points:

- In New Zealand a building consent is required from your local building authority. The homeowner is responsible for obtaining this consent.
- As correct installation is critical to the performance and safe operation of your Metro, it is recommended your Metro be installed by a registered installer or a person suitably qualified in the installation of wood fires. Your Metro retailer will be able to arrange professional installation for you.
- During the very first fire your Metro will give off an odour and fumes as the firebox paint cures. Do not be alarmed; open all windows and externally opening doors in that room and close any internally opening doors. This curing

- process will last for approximately one hour and is likely to happen this one time.
- Properly seasoned (dry) timber is necessary for the Metro to operate efficiently; firewood that contains a high moisture content will result in flue pipe blockages and reduce the heat output.

Note: Softwood usually takes 12 months to season - Hardwood can take up to 24 months to season - Wood must be stored in a location that enables air circulation. Unseasoned wood stored in a closed woodshed without air circulation will still be unseasoned 12 months later.

- It is critical that the fire not be operated with over worn, faulty or missing door seals. Door seals will harden over time and become over-worn (3-4 year's) this will cause air to leak into the fire, causing the appliance to 'over fire'.
- It is critical that the fire not be operated with over worn faulty or missing bricks, baffle plate, baffle extension (white board on the baffle plate)
- It is critical that the fire not be operated with cracked, or broken door glass.

Please note, the above 3 points require regular inspection/ maintenance (every time the ash bed is cleaned out, generally 3-5 times a season) and if not maintained will void the firebox warranty. Please ensure you keep your proof of purchase/ receipt on any parts you buy.

- For optimum performance fuel must be loaded so the logs lay "front to rear" in preference to laying across the width of the firebox. Spaces should be left between the logs to enable oxygen to get to as much of the surface of the fuel as possible.
- A small hot fire loaded frequently is more efficient than a large fire burning on a low setting.
- Your Metro is covered by a full unconditional 12 month warranty on replacement parts, and a 10 year firebox warranty. See page 15 for warranty conditions.

Where to install a Metro wood fire in your home

Wood fires are usually installed in the main living area, which is the section of the home that is usually kept the warmest, being the area in the home most frequently occupied. However, before deciding on the best location for your Metro wood fire you may wish to consider:

- Water heating. If you are intending to have a wetback it is important that the wood fire is as close as practically possible to the water storage cylinder.
- Split level homes are best heated when the wood fire is installed on the lower level, as the heated air will rise to the higher levels.
- Building construction is another consideration. Specified clearances from walls, curtains etc must be maintained

and you need to ensure no structural beams or internal gutters etc are directly above your preferred site. If you have a two storey dwelling you need to consider the second storey to ensure you don't have the flue directly outside a second storey window.

Generally, you can install your Metro in your home anywhere that suits you; Pioneer offer various fan systems to transfer heat to sections of the home that are not heated sufficiently. It is necessary if using a fan system that the Metro you have purchased has sufficient output to heat the total area you wish to heat. Your Metro retailer or installer will be able to advise if you are uncertain.

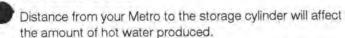
Optional wetbacks

If your home is in a classified "clean air zone", and dependent on requirements/restrictions which may be imposed by your local territorial authority (council) you may or may not be able to install a water heating device. If in doubt consult your local Metro retailer.

Water heating is another key feature of your Metro wood fire, and on offer are a number of options depending on the model you have purchased. Metro offer a 2kW wetback suitable for the Tiny Rad and Tiny Ped. All other ECO Metro's can be fitted with the ECO wetback or Rad wetback in Wee Rad, Xtreme Rad & Xtreme Rad Base. R1 and R2 models cannot be fitted with a wetback.

Note: Wetbacks are not suitable for use in locations where the water supply has lime content. Lime build up inside the coil will eventually block the coil causing the wetback to fail.

Other considerations are:



Your climate & the manner in which you will 'fire' your Metro.

Cost Savings

Wetbacks can enable substantial power savings, dependent on the climate in the area in which you live. If you live in a cold climate you are likely to use your Metro for many months of the year, in which case a Pioneer wetback will reduce or even eliminate your water heating costs over those months, If however you live in a warmer climate and use your Metro for only a few hours a day over the colder months, electricity savings will be considerably less.

Water Pressure

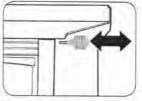
A common misconception is that you must have a low-pressure system to have a wetback; this is not true. You must have a "vented" system and high-pressure cylinders are usually not vented. However you can install an "indirect" cylinder which contains a secondary coil inside the storage cylinder, enabling you to have a wetback while retaining a high-pressure system.

Getting to know your Metro wood fire

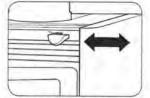
Operating your Metro wood fire is simple and you will quickly learn how to get the best from it. First take a minute to familiarise yourself with your new Metro.

- Raise the door handle anticlockwise until the latch releases, then slowly pull the door open. You will note that if you let the door go before it is at 90° to the appliance, it will fall closed. This is a safety feature that ensures the door cannot fall open if it is not latched securely. For the door to remain open, you must open it fully.
- There is a single air control making your Metro easy to adjust. This control moves from left to right, which is "low to high".

The Metro Radiant Series have a wire air control handle located at the upper right hand side of the appliance. Simply pull out to increase burn rate or push in to reduce burn rate.







ALL OTHER SERIES AIR CONTROL

All other model Metro's have an air control knob located on the upper front of the appliance.

Slide this control knob gently from right to left until you reach a stop. This is a pre-set "low" position. Your Metro must not be operated at a lower burn rate than this pre-set low allows.

Operating your Metro wood fire

If your Metro has only been installed within the past few days, the fire cement seal at the base of the flue will not be fully cured. To ensure the cement sets without blistering it is recommended you burn 2-3 sheets of loosely crumpled newspaper at a time, approximately once every hour over a 6-8 hour period.

During the very first fire your Metro will give off an odour and fumes as the firebox paint cures. Do not be alarmed. Open all windows and externally opening doors in that room and close any internally opening doors. This curing process will last for approximately one hour and is likely to happen this one time.

Start up

Place a quantity of loosely crumpled newspaper on the base of the firebox until it is approximately 50% full of paper, or place firelighters on the base of the firebox. Add dry kindling and move the air control knob fully to the right, being the "full open" position.

Light the paper at two or three locations across the front of the door opening and leave the door slightly ajar resting on the latch pin if necessary for a few minutes while the fire establishes. Once the kindling is burning well, open the door and add 2-3 small logs at a time until you have a well-established fire. Usually this will take approximately 30 minutes, during which time the air control should be set on "high" and the door should be closed, except for the initial few minutes and when fuel is being added.

Normal operation

Once the fire is well established, regulate the air control to achieve the desired burn rate and heat output. As you move the air control to the right, burn rate, firebox temperature and heat output will increase, if you move the control to the left they will decrease.

Note:

- Always open the air control fully prior to opening the door, then open the door slowly.
- When loading logs, place them end-on, "front to back"; air spaces should be left between the logs to enable oxygen to get to as much of the surface of the fuel as possible.
- Every time you refuel, leave the air control on "high" for a minimum of 20-25 minutes.
- Never use the door to force wood into the firebox, as this
 is likely to break the glass.

Cooking

All Metro's are designed to enable cooking of soups, stews and casseroles etc, and your Metro will easily boil a flat bott stainless steel kettle. The Radiant Series have a dedicated cooking top enabling large pots to be placed on the cook top, while all other models have a lift-off grille.

Note: Metro's supplied with a lift-off top grille have this feature to enable the grille to be removed for cleaning if you have a spill. The lift-off top grille must be left on when cooking, because if removed the wall temperatures next to the appliance may become excessive and the top of the firebox is generally too hot to cook on directly. Please note: Although very durable, Metro's in a satin stainless look are not recommended to be used to cook on.

Cleaning and maintenance for your Metro wood fire

The Radiant Series and the Wee & Xtreme Ped painted wood fires are coated with "Pioneer Metallic Black" high temperature paint and will require periodic repainting.

All other model Metro's are coated with either;

- Vitreous enamel is extremely durable and designed to last the life of the appliance. As vitreous enamel is glass, a solid or heavy object dropped or banged against a panel could chip the enamel surface.
- Selected model Metro's are offered in a stainless steel look. Although very durable it is not recommended that Metro's with this finish be used to cook on.

All model Metro's can be cleaned with a damp cloth when the appliance is not operating.

Door glass

Providing your fuel is properly seasoned, under normal operating conditions the air-wash design of the Metro's firebox keep the door glass clear. If the glass requires cleaning you may use either a razor blade scraper or an oven cleaner.

If your door glass breaks it must be replaced with 5mm thick ceramic glass which is available from your local Metro retailer.

Door seals

Over time, usually 3-4 years, the door and glass seals will become hard and cause air to leak into the firebox, causing the appliance to 'over fire'. Your Metro retailer stocks replacement woven fibreglass door and glass seals, which need replacing when they become hard and over worn.

The door of your Metro is easily removed. Hold it in both hands and lift the hinge end of the door up and over the top hinge pin, then lower the door from the bottom hinge pin.

Side bricks

Hair-line cracks are not uncommon and are a result of the intense heat within the Metro's firebox, coupled with chanical damage caused by accidental impact when fuel is being loaded. However if the side bricks become cracked to the extent that they start to break up, they must be replaced.

Door adjustment

Provision is available on both sides of the door to enable adjustment.

To adjust the hinge end of the door, open the door fully, loosen the top hinge nut and slightly lift the latch end of the door; you will see the hinge assembly move back 1-2mm which will usually be sufficient. Retighten, then repeat by loosening the lower hinge nut, this time applying a slight downwards pressure onto the door to move the lower hinge assembly back a similar distance, then retighten.

The door latch is also adjustable, as the latch pin on the right side of the firebox is fitted through a slot which enables the latch pin to be loosened, moved back and re-tightened.

Ash removal

Over a period of time ash will build up in the base of the Metro's firebox and require removal. The time this build-up takes depends on the density and cleanliness of your fuel.

To remove the excess ash your Metro should not be operating.

- Open the door, and using a hearth shovel or similar, empty the excess ash directly into a steel or non-combustible container.
- If the ash is not disposed of immediately, be careful where you store it, as the ash can retain heat for many days and become a fire hazard.
- You must leave a bed of ash in the base of the firebox approximately 10mm deep; this insulates the base of the firebox and improves combustion.

Top baffle

This is a 'sacrificial' part of the firebox and should be checked monthly. Usually only the "Promet" (white board) front/underneath section needs to be replaced when it starts to disintegrate.

Note: Cracks in the promet are not uncommon and have no adverse effect on the operation of your Metro. These cracks are the result of intense heat coupled with expansion and contraction.

Note: Burning wood which is not properly seasoned, i.e. to 25% moisture content or more, will expedite this disintegration.

Flue systems

Should be checked annually, particularly the bottom end of the lower flue section at its rear lock formed joint. If deterioration is noticed contact your Metro retailer or installer.

The flue pipe should also be swept a minimum of once a year, or as required during the winter season. If smoke enters the room when you open the Metro's door this usually indicates the flue pipe is becoming restricted and needs cleaning. The frequency of flue pipe cleans depends on many factors, with the main variables being:

- The seasoning of the wood. If not properly seasoned you will require frequent flue pipe cleans.
- The density of the wood. Softwoods generally result in more creosote build-up in the flue pipe. Pioneer produce a telescopic fluebrush system which is available from your Metro retailer.

To clean the flue pipe of your Metro, proceed as follows:-

- Open the Metro's door fully, reach inside with the palm
 of your hand face-up and extended, lift the top baffle
 approximately 20mm, then lift it forward out through the
 door opening, placing it on a sheet of newspaper you have
 placed on the front of the floor protector.
- · Close the door and slide the air control to the left.
- Once on the roof, remove the cowl from the top of flue system and sweep the flue pipe using a 150mm-diameter flue pipe brush as detailed in the instructions provided with the fluebrush.
- Once the flue pipe is clear, clean and refit the cowl.
 Remove the excess soot which has fallen into the firebox, leaving a layer of ash 10mm deep on the base of the firebox, then refit the top baffle.

Note: the baffle must be fitted so its rear is touching the back of the firebox; if uncertain refer to page 3 in the installation section at the rear of this manual, which shows illustrations of the baffle location.

Troubleshooting your Metro wood fire

If your Metro is installed correctly, your fuel is dry and you operate it correctly you will find it to be a pleasure to use. Metro's many years of experience within the wood heating industry has shown that 99% of customer dissatisfaction is due to:

- unseasoned fuel
- · faulty installation
- operational error or a combination of the above 3 points

The following may be of assistance if you are experiencing any of these problems.

SMOKE ENTERS THE ROOM WHEN THE METRO'S DOOR IS AJAR: (POSSIBLE REASONS AND SOLUTIONS)

Check flue pipe joints:

If the flue pipe joins are not sealed correctly, smoke will not draft up the flue pipe as well as it should. The flue pipe join connecting into the flue spigot on top of the Metro is most critical, if this is not sealed correctly, smoke will enter the room when the door is ajar. To check this join is sealed correctly, run a match or lighter flame around the join, if the flame is sucked into the spigot, then it's not sealed. This check needs to be done when the fire is not going, be sure to check the rear of the join as that is where the biggest gap is, due to the seam in the flue pipe, which is always on the rear of the flue pipe.

Ensure the fuel you are using is correctly seasoned:

If you are burning unseasoned fuel (wet), the fire will cause nothing but problems. The Metro won't deliver much heat, it will be lazy, it will smoke into the room when the door is ajar, and the door glass will run black.

Flue pipe length is too short:

Add more flue pipe as the longer the flue system, better the draft of smoke up the flue pipe. Please note, if you did not purchase the Metro ECO Flue System, you will not have the ECO Cowl which increases draft. We highly recommend the Metro ECO Cowl is fitted, this will increase the draft, if you already have an ECO Cowl and smoke is still entering the room, add another 600mm length of flue pipe.

Downdraft:

If you have checked all of the above and the fire is still smoking into the room, it's possible there may be a down draft issue. Down draft is something that is not fixed with a single fix, it's purely trial and error, things to try: -

- "H" Cowl, designed purely for downdraft issues, but if you have an ECO Cowl fitted as standard, you will also need to add another 600mm of flue pipe to compensate as the H Cowl is shorter in length
- Directional Cowl, designed for high wind areas

Air control setting:

Ensure the air control setting is on high before opening the door to reload, this will increase the draft of smoke up the flue pipe.

If your Metro didn't smoke, but its starting too and is getting worse:

The pipe is in need of a clean. It is recommended that the flue pipe to be cleaned every season, however if you are burning the fire on low a lot, or are using unseasoned fuel, flue pipe cleans will be required more frequently.

Correct operation:

Modern day wood fires need to be operated hard and fast, more so than low and lazy to ensure the firebox and flue pipe runs hot and efficient. If the fire and flue pipe is up to temperature it will perform extremely well, the smoke will draw up the flue pipe with ease, and the fire will produce good amounts of heat, if the fire is operated on low a lot of the time, the door glass will run black, the flue pipe will tend block up more frequent, and the fire will end up smoking into the room when reloading. It's better to have a small fire running hard and fast, rather than a big fire running low and lazy.

OTHER ISSUES THAT YOU MAY EXPERIENCE

I can smell smoke in the room after a low burn cycle

The smell is creosote that will be seeping through the flue pipe joints or out of the flue spigot onto an external surface, thus creating the smell in your room. The cause will be either unseasoned fuel or incorrect operation on low burn cycles. Creosote is very corrosive and excessive buildups will result in the flue pipe and potentially the flue spigot and upper burn chamber failing. Failure of flue pipe or firebox due to creosote build up is not covered under warranty as creosote build up is only possible from either unseasoned fuel or incorrect operation.

The Metro is noisy as it heats up and cools down

There will always be some expansion and contraction noise as the Metro heats and cools, however this can usually be reduced substantially by loosening three nuts at the rear of the appliance. To remedy, locate the 25mm deep cavity at the reof your Metro between the "rear panel" and the "inner rear hishield", you will see a 6mm nut and two 6mm bolt heads in this cavity. Using a 10mm ring or open ended spanner, loosen all three so they are finger tight only.

On all non-DV model Metro's the air channel that allows the combustion air to enter the fire is fitted to the top underneath of the door opening, it's fitted with two M6 bolts, slightly loosen these bolts.

Note: Is not applicable on the ECO DV models.

The Metro won't turn down as much as it did

The door itself may need readjusting, the hinge and latch is slotted and allows for movement, loosen the hinge and move back a few mm, this will make the door seal tighter which will stop air leaking into the fire. The door and glass seals may be in need of replacing, which is generally needed every 3-4 years. Refer page 11, Door adjustment.

Warranty details for your Metro wood fire



Metro wood fires are manufactured in New Zealand, using the highest quality of materials, workmanship and the latest manufacturing techniques, which is why we offer a full 10 year firebox warranty and 1 year parts warranty for peace of mind.

Metro Warranty (NZ Consumer laws apply to this warranty)

Pioneer Manufacturing Limited (Pioneer) warrants the steel firebox against defective materials and workmanship which would render it unfit for normal domestic use, from the date of purchase by the original consumer, for a period of 10 years.

Components including panel coating, door retainers, door seals, glass, trim, baffle & bricks are warranted for a period of 1 year from the date of original purchase for domestic use against defective materials and workmanship.

All associated accessories including, but not limited to, fans, flue systems, flue shields, wetbacks, tool sets, ash pots etc, covered by a 1 year warranty against defective materials and workmanship.

It is recommended, but not a condition of this warranty, that a full service/inspection of the Metro wood fire be carried out at the end of each winter season.

Warranty Conditions:

- The Metro wood fire must be installed, operated and maintained strictly in accordance with the building code and this installation and operation manual.
- The Metro wood fire must be installed and used in a domestic application.
- This warranty covers appliance like for like replacement or repair at the manufacturer's discretion but excludes freight, travel, installation, labour and/or any other associated costs.
- Pioneer or their agents are not liable for any loss or expense direct or indirect arising from the failure of any part or operation of the appliance.
 - Operation of this appliance in violation of the warnings in this operation and installation manual will void this warranty.
- Your Metro wood fire must be regularly maintained and we recommended it is also serviced annually. Proof of servicing may be required. If a wood fire is not regularly maintained and serviced, the life span will be reduced. If your Metro wood fire has been neglected, by not being regularly maintained and serviced, warranty may be declined.

- It is critical that the fire not be operated with over worn, faulty or missing door seals. Door seals will harden over time and become over-worn (3-4 year's) this will cause air to leak into the fire, causing the appliance to 'over fire'.
- It is critical that the fire not be operated with over worn, faulty or missing bricks, baffle plate, baffle extension (white board on the baffle plate)
- It is critical that the fire not be operated with cracked, or broken door glass.

Please note, the above 3 points require regular inspection/ maintenance (every time the ash bed is cleaned out, generally 3-5 times a season) and if not maintained will void the firebox warranty. Please ensure you keep your proof of purchase/ receipt on any parts you buy.

 A claim under this warranty should be directed to the retailer who supplied the Metro wood fire. If this is not possible write direct to the manufacturer stating details of fault, serial number of your Metro, date and proof of purchase and name of retailer where the Metro was purchased.

Warranty Exclusions: This manufacturer's warranty does not cover:

- Service calls which are not related to any defect in the product (i.e. operational, installation or fuel issues). The cost of a service call will be charged if the problem is not found to be a product fault.
- Defects caused by factors other than normal domestic use or use in accordance with the product's operation manual.
- Defects caused through the product being operated in an "over-fired" manner resulting in sections of the firebox operating excessively hot to the point that sections glow red. (Note – This will result in distortion of the firebox)
- Defects to the product caused by accident, neglect, misuse or act of God.
- The cost of repairs carried out by non-authorised repairers or the cost of correcting such unauthorised repairs.
- Required maintenance as set out in this manual.

Service under this manufacturer's warranty must be provided by a repairer authorised by Pioneer Manufacturing Ltd. Such service shall be provided during normal business hours.

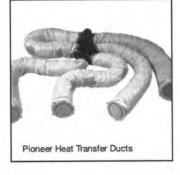






















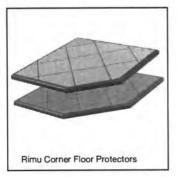








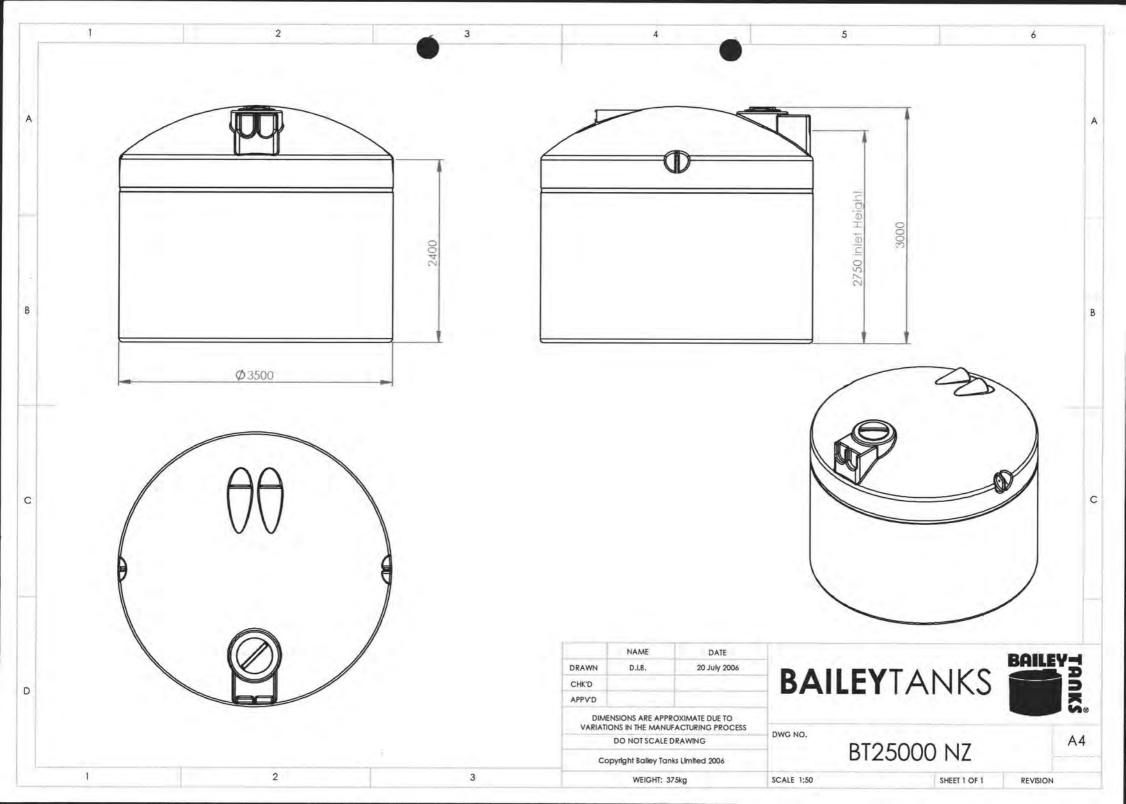

A pressure-limiting valve of 500kPa max rating must be fitted. Failure to install a pressure limiting valve where required will void the warranty.

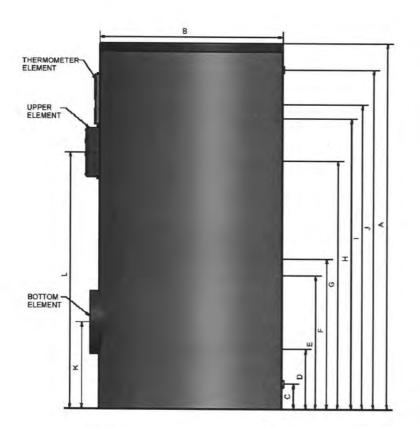

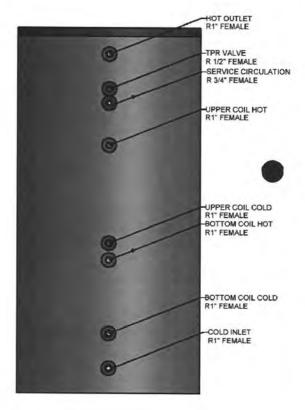

ABOUT YOUR WATER HEATER

- GreenGlo & GreenGlo Max is a high technology storage tank, backed up by new manufacturing methods offering quality of goods to consumers.
- The main goal of producing GreenGlo water heaters is heating and storing potable hot water in a main pressure storage tank using electricity. GreenGlo also offers optional heating equipment such as solar, gas and wetback. Potable hot water is stored in the main water storage tank separately from the heating fluids in the coils.
- The heating fluid, which is heated in the heat source, is circulated between the heat source and cylinder's coil. The warmed fluid takes its heat from the heat source and transmits to the water heater.
- GreenGlo cylinders inner surface is enamelled. The process used is a double enamelling process that coats the inside surface of the cylinder.
- GreenGlo cylinders are protected by a magnesium anode rod in order to prevent cathode corrosion. The magnesium anode rod ought to be checked and replaced if required, every 36 months by a certified plumber, and can be done by following this manual page 16.
- 6. GreenGlo exterior surface is covered by 40 kg/m³ and 50 mm polyurethane insulation (except 800D and 1000D) in order to diminish the loss of the heat. The GreenGlo 800D and 1000D insulation is removable. This convenience allows easy delivery and access through narrow doorways. Do not remove covers unless essential and only after receiving specific instructions from GreenGlo service desk
- GreenGlo is an indoor tank and shall be install in a well vented space to prevent condensation
- 8. There is a choice of double or single or double coil GreenGlo depending on the application needed. I.E. if the cylinder will be heated with a wetback or a solar system, GreenGlo single coil water heater would be appropriate. On the other hand, if the cylinder will be heated with both wetback and a solar system, GreenGlo double coil would be appropriate.

WATER QUALITY

GreenGlo water heaters have been manufactured to deal with most local body water supplies. Desired water quality levels:

pH Level between 6.5 and 8.5

Chlorides: up to 200 ppm
Total Dissolved Solids (TDS) up to 1000 mg/L

Saturation Index between -0.8 and +0.8

If your water quality or the heating liquids are outside the above range, you should fit appropriate water filtration.

Caution:

If water TDS is above 600 mg/L, there is a possibility of hydrogen gas accumulating in the top of the water heater during long periods of no use. If the water heater has not been used for more than 2 weeks:

- Open the hot water tap and let water flow for 1 minute.
- Hydrogen gas is flammable; therefore make sure that there is no smoking, sparks or naked flames near the tap.
- Do not operate any hot water appliance such as a washing machine or a dishwasher prior to the above procedure.

REGULAR CARE

Six Monthly:

Near the top of the water heater you will find the TPR Valve (Temperature Pressure Relief Valve). Raise the lower lever and gently release some water into the relief pipe.

Note:

- If water does not flow down the relief pipe, or if water does not stop flowing once you released the lever, contact your plumber
- It is normal for the valve to release small amount of water during heating cycles
- Never block the relief drain pipe

Five yearly maintenance:

A qualified plumber should check and if needed replace the sacrificial anode in the water heater as per pages 16 & 17 Consider also replacement of the TPR valve, and clean coils of the cylinder via the clearing door if needed



PLUMBING CONNECTION

Delivering and mounting the GreenGlo cylinder

- The product should be kept away from sharp tools during loading or delivering and ports should be protected.
- The product should not be left or placed where it's exposed directly to weather such as direct sunlight, rain snow etc.
- Chose a dry and well vented space. Access moisture may cause tank condensation and may void the warranty.
- Mount the bottom of the tank clear of the floor. Usage of a drain tray is highly recommended
- If the product is installed on the floor, the floor must be dry and moistureproof. Consider a drainage tray when required.
- If possible leave headroom of half water heater length so the anode can be inspected or replaced. Remember you may have to remove the entire water heater later for servicing as per pages 16 & 17.
- Cylinder must be strapped and mounted in accordance to NZS3500.4
- GreenGlo Limited does not accept any responsibility, if the product is physically damaged or operates inefficiently due to wrong handling
- The product must be carried vertically if in doubt, fasten the bolts of the upper and lower dome prior to installation

Basic Plumbing connection of the Water heater

- The size of the GreenGlo tank needs to be chosen carefully in order to maintain the hot water supply demand.
- Start with the Basic Diagram of page 7 before conducting any specific application connection
- Fit the cold inlet valves prior to commissioning the cylinder
- Ensure that the TPR Valve is fitted and that the service circulation is plugged off or connected prior to filling up the cylinder with water
- Lag all hot water pipes coming out of the water heater

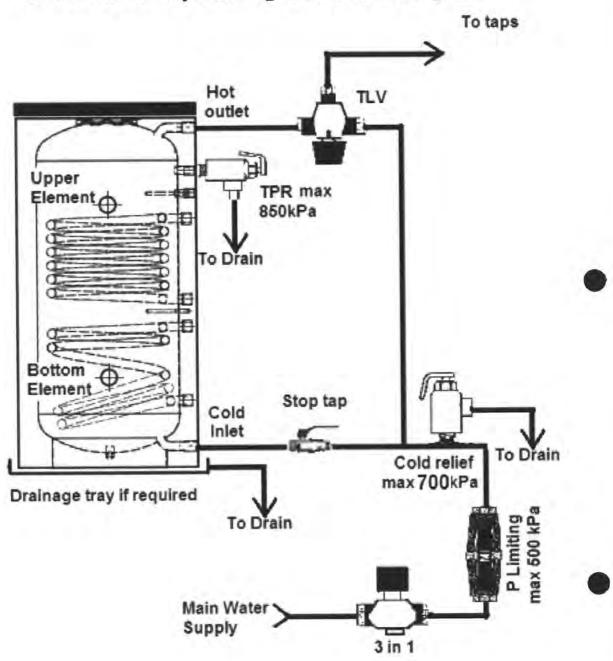
Plumbing Connection of additional applications

- Simply follow the diagrams and the notes of page 8 to 12

GreenGlo basic plumbing connection diagram

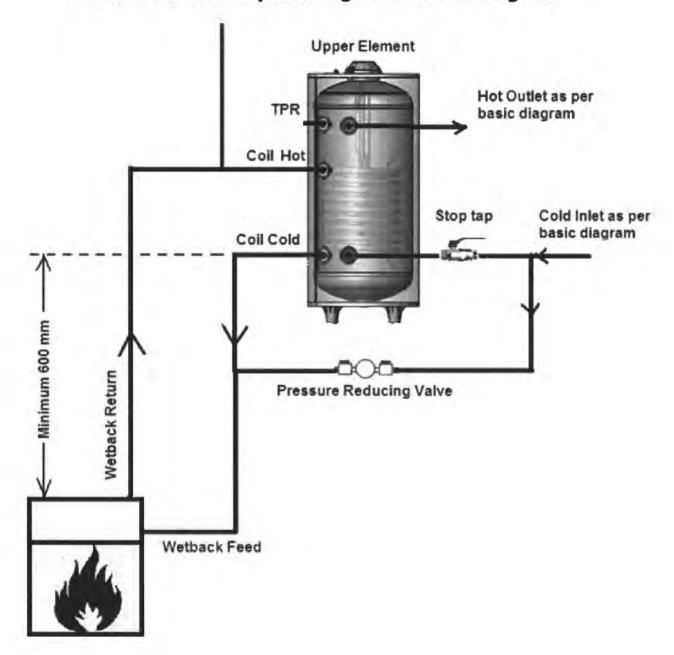

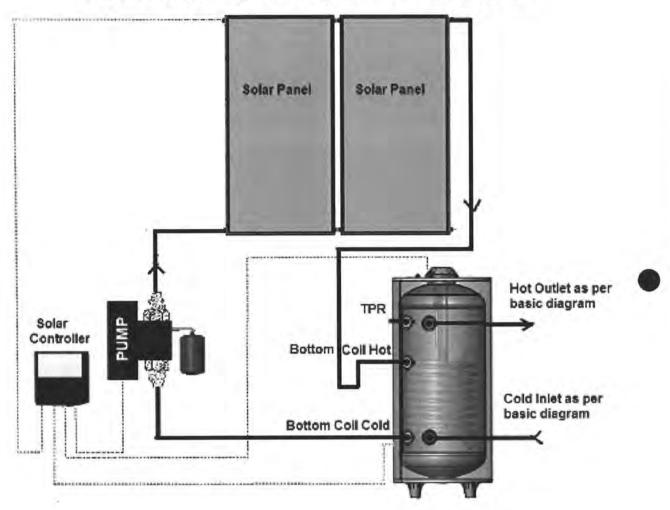

GreenGlo Solar plumbing connection diagram

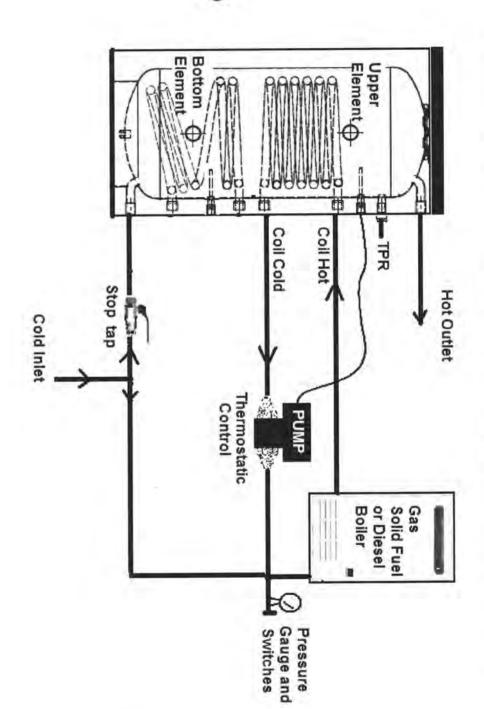

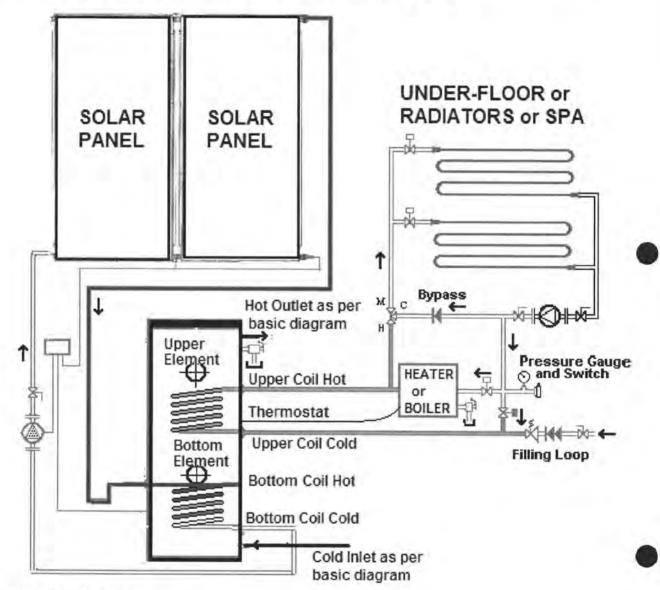

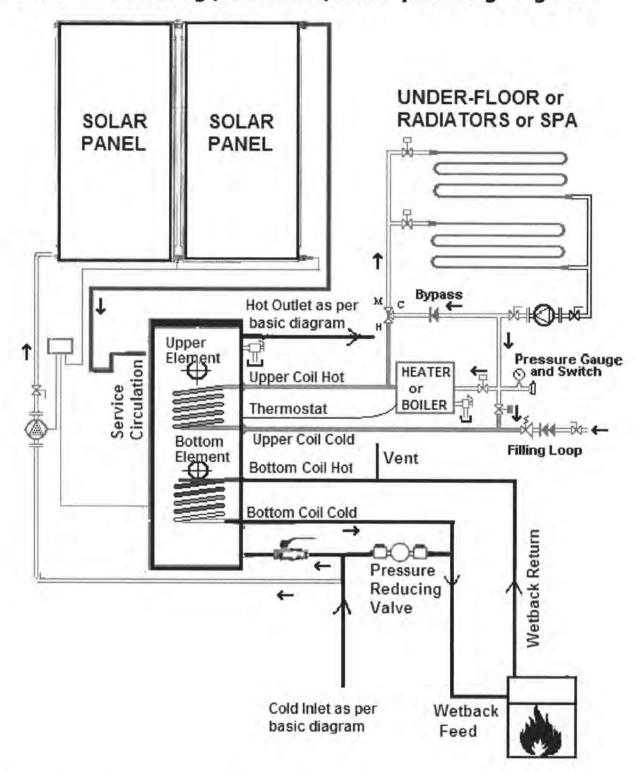

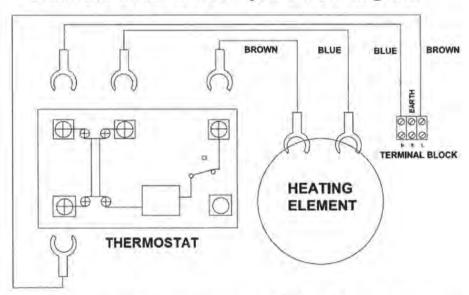

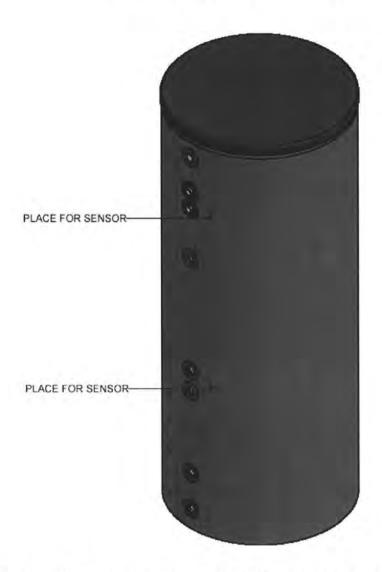


GreenGlo 180S to 500D pre-wired diagram

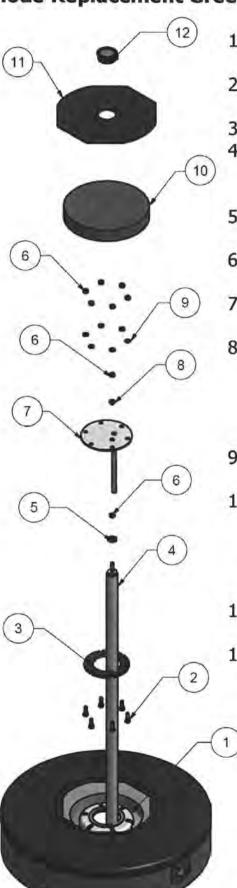

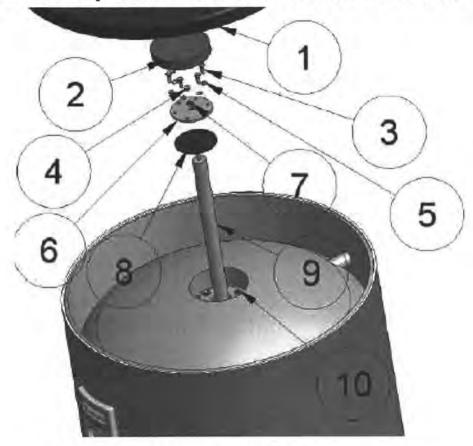

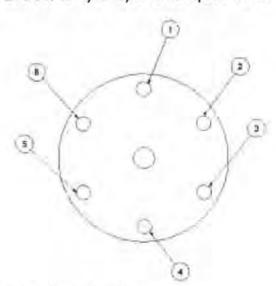

E2/AS1 allows corrugate to be used vertically on walls with a risk matrix of 19, but the 18 mm rib height and loser lap detail on corrugate are not as effective as the 36 mm rib height and tighter overlap of the LT7 profile, in providing better weather tightness.

The open ribs of LT7 will allow an air passage up the profile, should condensation require drying.

Having viewed the elevations and details as supplied by Mike Robertson, A.D.Architecture, We recommend flashings cover the wall cladding a minimum cover of 100 mm. and the LT7 is stop ended.

Provided this is achieved, Dimond confirm the LT7 used as vertical wall cladding, on a non cavity wall, will meet the performance criteria in clause E2 of the New Zealand Building code, for a period of not less than 15 years provided it is maintained in line with the guidelines and details contained in The Dimond current literature.

This covers the cladding against perforation as a result of corrosion for a period of 15 years. This statement is based on over 30 years past performance of the LT7 profile in N.Z. used as both commercial and residential applications.

- (b) 2004, must refuse to issue a code compliance certificate for the building work until it has received –
 - evidence that the development contribution has been paid or made by the owner to the Council; or
 - (ii) a copy of written evidence that the existing dwelling on the site has been demolished.
- (c) The Council may, under section 208(d) of the Local Government Act 2002, register the development contribution under the Statutory Land Charges Registration Act 1928 as a charge on the title of the land in respect of which the development contribution was required.

Take all practical steps to make the site and the contract works safe and to provide and maintain a safe working environment. Ensure that all those working on or visiting the site are aware of the rules governing site safety, are properly supervised and are not unnecessarily exposed to hazards.

Identify any significant hazards.

Maintain proper procedures for dealing with any emergencies that may arise. Immediately investigate accidents, identify their cause and maintain a register of accidents and serious harm. Provide a copy of any report which the contractor is required to make to a public authority on any accident which is associated with carrying out the contract works and results in serious harm to any person.

Refer to individual work sections for detailed requirements on this project.

1.9 SUSPENSION OF HAZARDOUS WORK

On the request of the contract administrator, acting on reasonable grounds, suspend any identified hazardous activities and proceed to eliminate, isolate or minimise them in order to comply with the Act, without prejudice to any other rights of the principal under the contract.

1.10 SITE SAFETY PERSON

Appoint a suitably qualified site safety person to co-ordinate site safety and to attend all site meetings.

1.11 HEALTH AND SAFETY PLAN

Prepare and submit to the contract administrator before commencing work on site a health and safety plan. Include in that plan all people on site and the general public, as well as the following items and any other necessary item:

- identification of existing and potential construction hazards and risks
- safety procedures to eliminate, isolate or minimise construction hazards
- the equipment to be used to minimise the hazards
- the maintenance of a register of hazards for the site
- the name and qualifications of the site safety person
- emergency procedures
- first aid facilities and safety equipment
- the methodology for notifying, recording and investigating accidents and injuries.

Keep a copy of the plan in the site office

1.12 COMPLY WITH SITE SAFETY PLAN

Carry out all construction operations in accordance with the submitted health and safety plan.

1.13 INFORM EMPLOYEES OF HAZARDS

Inform employees and others on the site of:

- hazards they may be exposed to while working
- hazards they may create while working which could harm others
- how these hazards may be minimised
- emergency procedures
- the location of first aid facilities and safety equipment.

1.14 HEALTH AND SAFETY REGULATIONS, CODES AND GUIDES

Comply with:

- Relevant New Zealand safety legislation including "Health and Safety in Employment Regulations 1995".
- OSH publications including "Guidelines for the provision of facilities for general safety in the construction industry".
- Relevant codes of practice, guides, guidelines and standards.

Until further regulations are made under the Health and Safety in Employment Act 1992 to cover them, the enactments repealed by the Act continue in force until revoked.

1.15 **EXPLOSIVES**

Do not use explosives except with the written approval of the territorial authority/office of OSH. Comply with their safety requirements and use construction blasters holding a current certificate of competence issued under the Health and Safety in Employment Regulations 1995.

1.16 POWDER-ACTUATED FASTENING TOOLS

Powder-actuated fastening tools to be used only by workers holding current certificates of competence in their name, issued under the requirements of the Health and Safety in Employment Regulations 1995.

1.17 SMOKE FREE REQUIREMENTS

Do not smoke on site except in a designated location, in accordance with the Smoke Free Environments Act 1990. This location to be determined by the contractor with the agreement of the contract administrator.

1.18 RESTRICTIONS

Do not:

- light rubbish fires on the site
- bring dogs on to or near the site
- bring radios/audio players on to the site.

1270 CONSTRUCTION

GENERAL

This GENERAL section relates to common requirements for construction issues including: -

- Quality assurance
- Noise and nuisance
- Set out
- Common execution requirements
- Common materials requirements
- Supply of spare materials
- Common requirements for samples and tests
- Final presentation and cleaning
- Commissioning

Quality control and assurance

1.1 QUALITY ASSURANCE

Carry out and record regular checks of material quality and accuracy, including:

- Concrete quality and finish.
- Dimensional accuracy of structural column locations (following completion of foundations).
- All perimeter columns and frames for plumb.
- Levels of all floors relative to the site datum.
- Framing timber moisture content.

Where any material, quality or dimension falls outside specified or required tolerances, obtain written direction from the contract administrator. Where building consent approval is affected, confirm remedial action with the Building Consent Authority.

Provide all materials, plant, attendances, supervision, inspections and programming to ensure the required quality standards are met by all project personnel.

Noise and nuisance

1.2 LIMIT CONSTRUCTION NOISE

Minimise the effects of noise generation by including in the planning of the work such factors as placing of plant, programming the sequence of operations and other management functions. Limit construction noise to comply with the requirements of NZS 6803, the requirements of the Resource Management Act sections 326, 327 and 328 and the Health and Safety in Employment Regulations clause 11.

1.3 ACCEPTABLE NOISE LEVELS

Refer to NZS 6803 Tables 2 and NZS 6803, tables 3 for the upper limits of construction work noise in residential and industrial areas over the various time periods, particularly 0730 to 1800 hours. Note also the allowed adjustments and exemptions in NZS 6803, 6. Do not exceed these limits.

1.4 PROVIDE INFORMATION TO NEIGHBOURS

Provide information to neighbours of any noise generation from the site liable to constitute a problem. Explain to them the means being used to minimise excessive noise and establish with them the timings most suitable for the noise generating work to be carried on.

Discuss with any complainant the measures being used to minimise noise. Where possible modify these measures to accommodate particular circumstances. Finally, determine the sound level at the location under discussion using methods and observation reporting as laid down in NZS 6803. If the noise level is above the upper limits of NZS 6803, tables 2 and NZS 6803, tables 3, cease the noise generating operation and remedy the problem.

1.5 DIRT AND DROPPINGS

Remove dirt and droppings deposited on public or private thoroughfares from vehicles servicing the site to the satisfaction of the appropriate authorities and the contract administrator.

1.6 DAMAGE AND NUISANCE

Take all precautions to prevent damage and nuisance from water, fire, smoke, dust, rubbish and all other causes resulting from the construction works.

Set-out and tolerances

1.7 SURVEY INFORMATION

Locate and verify survey marks and datum points required to set out the works. Record and maintain their position. Re-establish and replace disturbed or obliterated marks.

1.8 SET-OUT AND DATUM

Set out the work to conform with the drawings. Establish a permanent site datum to confirm the proposed building ground floor level and its relationship to all other existing and new building levels.

1.9 SET-OUT BY LICENSED CADASTRAL SURVEYOR

Before commencing construction provide the contract administrator with a certificate prepared by a licensed cadastral surveyor that the set-out is complete and that the building is accurately placed on the site.

During construction provide the contract administrator with a certificate, prepared by the same licensed cadastral surveyor confirming the set-out of the foundations and grid lines. Necessary adjustments are to be determined and agreed to by the contract administrator before proceeding further.

1.10 CONFIRM HEIGHT IN RELATION TO BOUNDARY

Provide a certificate prepared by a licensed cadastral surveyor that the building has been constructed within the allowed height in relation to boundary. Provide the certificate to the local authority. Provide a copy of the certificate to the contract administrator

1.11 USE OF SET-OUT INSTRUMENTS

Permit without charge, the use of instruments already on site for checking, setting out and levels.

1.12 CHECK DIMENSIONS

Check all dimensions both on drawings and site, particularly the correlation between components and work in place. Take all dimensions on drawings to be between structural elements before linings or finishes, unless clearly stated otherwise.

1.13 TOLERANCES

All work to be level, plumb, and true to line and face. Unless otherwise specified in specific work sections of this specification, tolerances for structural work shall comply with the following:

Execution

1.14 EXAMINE PREVIOUS WORK

Before commencing any part of the work carefully examine the previous work on which it may depend. Report in writing to the contract administrator defects that may affect the quality of the proposed work and obtain instructions. Commencing work on any part means that previous work is accepted as being satisfactory for work of the required standard.

1.15 WORKER QUALIFICATIONS

All work to be level, plumb, and true to line and face. Employ only experienced workers familiar with the materials and techniques specified.

1.16 MINIMISE DELAYS DUE TO WEATHER

Use appropriate techniques and methods to prevent damage and minimise delays due to weather.

Materials

1.17 NEW PRODUCTS AND MATERIALS

Materials and products to be new unless stated otherwise, of the specified, and complying with all cited documents.

1.18 COMPATIBILITY OF MATERIALS AND FINISHES

Ensure all parts of a construction or finish are compatible and their individual use approved by the manufacturers and suppliers of other parts of the system. Source all parts of a system from a single manufacturer or supplier.

1.19 STORING PRODUCTS AND MATERIALS

Take delivery of and store products, materials and components in accordance with codes of practice and the product manufacturer's or supplier's stated requirements. Maintain the proper condition of any protective packaging, wrappings or supports during delivery, unloading and storage.

1.20 HANDLING PRODUCTS AND MATERIALS

Handle products, materials and components in accordance with codes of practice and the manufacturer's or supplier's stated guidelines. Avoid distortion and any contact with potentially damaging surfaces or conditions.

1.21 SUBSTRATE CONDITIONS

Ensure substrate conditions are within the manufacturer's or supplier's stated guidelines both before and during the installation of any material, product or system. Obtain written instructions on the necessary action to rectify unsatisfactory conditions.

1.22 INSTALLING PRODUCTS AND MATERIALS

Install in accordance with the manufacturer's or supplier's technical literature. Ensure that all installers are familiar with the required substrate conditions and the manufacturer's or supplier's specified preparation, fixing and finishing techniques.

1.23 COMPLY WITH STANDARDS

Comply with the relevant and/or cited Standard for any material or component. Obtain certificates of compliance when requested by the contract administrator.

1.24 CONDITION OF MATERIALS AND COMPONENTS

To be in perfect condition when incorporated into the work.

1.25 INCOMPATIBLE MATERIALS AND METALS

Separate incompatible materials and metals with separation layers, sleeves or gaskets of plastic film, bituminous felt or mastic or paint coatings, installed so that none are visible on exposed surfaces.

Samples and tests

1.26 SAMPLES AND PROTOTYPES

Where specified in the work sections, submit samples, prepare sample panels, and construct prototypes for review as to appearance, form and conformance with the drawings and specifications. Submit all information required to assist the review process, including technical data, manufacturer's literature, independent appraisals and producer statements.

Timing for the provision and review of samples, sample panels and prototypes to be included in the contract programme. Allow a minimum of 10 working days for each review. Proceed only after instructions to proceed have been issued in writing by the contract administrator.

In situ work may be incorporated in the finished work if so confirmed, otherwise allow to remove completely and replace.

1.27 CONTROL STANDARD

Obtain the contract administrator's confirmation of material, component and work samples which then become the quality control standard. Remove from the site any rejected samples. Retain confirmed samples with care on site for comparison throughout the contract. Remove from the site when no longer required.

Spares

1.28 SPARES

Collect, protect and store safely all spare materials required under the contract. Give the contract administrator an inventory of all spares.

Final presentation and cleaning

1.29 REMOVE TEMPORARY PROTECTION

Remove all temporary markings, coverings, labels and protective wrappings unless instructed otherwise.

1.30 REPLACE DAMAGED MATERIALS

Replace all materials or component damaged during the works to the standard of and integral with the original.

1.31 COMPLETE ALL SERVICES

Ensure all services are complete and operational, with all temporary labelling removed, required labelling fixed and service instructions provided.

1.32 CLEANING BY CONTRACTOR

Clear the contract works of all construction materials, waste, dirt and debris. Clean the contract works including:

- Wipe all surfaces to remove construction dust
- Clean out service ducts and accessible concealed spaces
- Clean out all gutters and rainwater heads
- Wipe dust from both sides of glass. Take particular care when removing paint or cementitious materials to not damage the glass.
- Remove adhesive residue left by labels and other temporary protection/markings
- Clean out the interior of all cabinetry
- Wash down external concrete including driveways and concrete masonry. Take care when waterblasting to not cause damage to the surface or allow water to enter the building.
- Remove rubbish and building material from the area immediately adjacent to the contract works

1.33 CLEANING BY COMMERCIAL CLEANER

Use a commercial cleaning firm to clean the whole of the interior of the building, including all appliances, equipment, fittings, surfaces and finishes to leave it without any blemish. Cleaning to include:

- Clean and wash down all external surfaces to remove dirt, debris and marking.
- Clean all interior surfaces including cabinetwork, joinery, sanitary and hardware items.

- Vacuum or polish all floor finishes.
- Clean and polish all glass, both sides.

Commissioning

1.34 MOVING PARTS

Adjust, ease and lubricate all doors, windows, drawers, hardware, appliances, controls and all moving parts to give easy and efficient operation.

1.35 SECURITY AT COMPLETION

Remove any temporary lock cylinders and complete final keying prior to handing over keys to the principal on completion of the works. Leave the works secure with all accesses locked. Account for all keys/cards/codes and hand to the principal along with an itemised schedule, retaining a duplicate schedule signed by the principal as a receipt.

2210 PREPARATION AND GROUNDWORK

GENERAL

This section relates to the clearance, excavation and backfilling of the site area in preparation for:

- footings and floor slabs
- backfilling behind basement retaining walls

Documents

1.1 DOCUMENTS

Refer to the general section 1233 REFERENCED DOCUMENTS. The following documents are specifically referred to in this section:

NZS 3604

Timber-framed buildings

OSH

Approved code of practice for safety in excavation and shafts for

foundations

1.2 SITE SAFETY

Provide adequate support for all excavations. Cover holes and fence off open trenches and banks.

1.3 ARCHAEOLOGICAL DISCOVERY

If fossils, antiquities and other items of value are found refer to the general section 1220 PROJECT for actions to be taken with archaeological discovery.

2. PRODUCTS

2.1 EXCAVATED CLEAN FILL

Clean, free of contamination, mineral soil from other formations in the excavation which may be selected and approved as suitable for filling by having grading and moisture content properties that will allow recompaction to 95% of maximum density.

2.2 SAND FILL

Clean sand of such grading in particle size to achieve mechanical compaction to 90% maximum density.

2.3 HARD FILL

Scoria or crushed rock to GAP (General All Passing) 40 grading.

2.4 GRANULAR FILL

Approved screened crushed gravel or scoria, graded in size from 20mm to 7mm, clean. When tested with a standard sieve of 4.75 opening no material is to pass.

2.5 DRESSING COURSE

Scoria to GAP 20 grading, or "dirty footpath scoria", or equivalent "all in" graded crushed metal aggregate.

2.6 FREE-DRAINING AGGREGATE

Scoria or crushed gravel graded 50 to 14 clean.

EXECUTION

3.1 WASHOUT BAY FOR TRUCK

Provide a designated area for trucks to be washed down to avoid mud and dirt being carried off site.

3.2 EXCAVATION GENERALLY

Carry out excavation, using plant suitable for the purpose, to the guidelines set by the OSH publication: Approved code of practice for safety in excavation and shafts for foundations.

3.3 BURNING OF MATERIALS

Burning of materials is not permitted on site.

3.4 PROTECT EXISTING WORK

Protect from damage existing buildings, structures, roads, paving and services nominated on the drawings as being retained.

3.5 PROTECT TREES

Protect from damage trees, shrubs, natural site features and existing landscaped areas nominated on the drawings as being retained. Ensure existing levels are undisturbed beneath the dripline of retained trees.

3.6 EROSION CONTROL

Ensure measures are in place to contain silt dislodged as a result of water infiltration and to prevent it being carried off site with stormwater.

3.7 SURFACE PREPARATION

Comply with NZS 3604, section 3.5, **Site preparation**. Remove all turf, vegetation, trees, topsoil, stumps, uncontrolled fill and rubbish from the area to be built on.

3.8 UNDERGROUND ELEMENTS AND SERVICES

Break out and remove old foundations, slabs, drainage pipes, manholes, tanks, cables and redundant services. Report for instructions when any unexpected voids, made-up ground or services are encountered. Seal off the ends of drains or remove to territorial authority approval.

3.9 STOCKPILE TOPSOIL

Stockpile excavated topsoil on site where directed. Keep separate from other excavated materials. Spread and level where directed before completion of the works.

3.10 GENERAL EXCAVATION

Trim ground to required profiles, batters, falls and levels. Remove loose material. Protect cut faces from collapse. Keep excavations free from water.

3.11 ROCK EXCAVATION

If rock is found at any level above the underside of the structural foundations, or above required base levels for site service trenches, immediately notify the owner. Obtain written instructions from the owner on the proposed approach to rock excavation, or consequent alterations to subgrade construction. Confirm any changes with the territorial authority.

3.12 FOUNDATION EXCAVATION

Take foundation excavations to depths shown. Keep trenches plumb and straight, bottoms level and free of soft spots, stepped as detailed and clean and free of water.

3.13 STANDARD OF COMPACTION

Place fill in layers of not more than 150mm and compact to achieve 95% of maximum dry density. For granular fill material, the fill shall be compacted to 80% of saturated dry density.

3.14 GRANULAR BASE FOR SLABS

To conform to NZS 3604, section 7.5.3, **Granular base**. Consolidate with a vibrating roller. Blind the surface with 20mm of coarse sand or sand/cement and roll ready to receive a damp-proof membrane.

3.15 GENERAL BACKFILLING

Obtain written confirmation from the owner before using any excavated material. Compact approved backfilling in 150mm layers with the last 200mm in clean topsoil, lightly compacted and neatly finished off.

3.16 SURPLUS MATERIAL

Remove surplus and excavated material from the site.

EXECUTION

Conditions

3.1 STORAGE

Take delivery of and accept all materials and accessories dry and undamaged. Store on timber fillets on hard ground protected from weather, contamination and damage in a secure area clear of any building operation.

Handle and store reinforcing steel and accessories without damage or contamination. Ensure reinforcement is clean and remains clean so that at the time of placing concrete it is free of all loose mill scale, loose rust and any other contamination that may reduce bonding capacity. Store steel fabric flat.

3.2 HANDLING

Avoid distribution and contact with damaging substances. Do not drag sheets across each other and other materials. Protect edges and surface finishes from damage.

Application - RibRaft® floor system

3.3 SITE CLEARANCE

Clear the slab area of any vegetation and topsoil down to the subgrade level.

3.4 BUILDING PLATFORM

Create a building platform to a level surface approximately 330mm below finished floor level. Cut and/or fill sloping sites. Confirm finished floor level.

3.5 POST-CUT INSPECTION

Inspect and confirm that the soil conditions are as anticipated by the geotechnical investigation and report and conform to the requirements of the **Firth** RibRaft[®] manual. Refer to **Firth** RibRaft[®] Floor System Manual Section 1 - Design Information, 3.5 Foundation Soils.

3.6 TEMPORARY BUILDING PLATFORM DRAINAGE

Construct suitable drainage to keep excessive ground water off the building platform during and after construction as required.

3.7 HARDFILL

Place hardfill and ensure it is spread and compacted with mechanical compaction.

3.8 UNDERGROUND SERVICES

Ensure underfloor services are installed in the subsoil or hardfill in locations as shown on the drawings and according to **Firth** RibRaft[®] floor system requirements. Refer to **Firth** RibRaft[®] Floor System Manual Section 2 - Installation Information, 3.4 Plumbing and Services.

3.9 BLINDING LAYER

Spread GAP 7 blinding layer to a minimum 500mm past the outside edge of the slab, compact to a level layer no greater than 50mm thick and no higher than 305mm below finished ground level.

3.10 FORMWORK

Construct formwork as required, well braced and tied to remain in position, straight and plumb during construction. Ensure formwork will provide for the topping depth, including rebates and the required concrete finish.

3.11 INSTALL DAMP-PROOF MEMBRANE

Apply DPM to the prepared basecourse extending to the outside of all edge beams or fold and staple up the inside of the formwork. Overlap all joints in the DPM sheets a minimum 150mm. Tape laps and penetrations with 50mm wide pressure sensitive plastic tape. Ensure DPM is not damaged during the construction process. Repair all damage to DPM before proceeding with following procedures.

3.12 PLACE POLYSTYRENE PODS

Place polystyrene pods in a regular waffle pattern using the spacers in the specified grid pattern to fit the floor plan. Cut pods on site with a saw or suitable hot wire as required. Cut holes for services and trim around piles as required on site.

3.13 INSTALL SPACERS

Install spacers and locations to the Firth RibRaft® floor system requirements.

Form standard ribs between pods using **Firth** 100mm spacers. Place the spacers at a minimum of one spacer along each edge of each pod or part pod. The ribs in both directions form a waffle pattern throughout the slab.

Form the edge beam using **Firth** 300mm spacers. Place the spacers at 1200mm centres maximum along the perimeter of the slab at least and one spacer per pod or part pod.

Form ribs to support loadbearing walls using **Firth** 300mm spacers. Place the spacers at a minimum of one spacer along the edge of each pod or part pod.

3.14 PLACE REINFORCING STEEL: RIB STEEL

Place rib reinforcing steel in the bottom of the internal ribs and supported in the correct position by the **Firth** spacers. Lap all steel 480mm minimum. At the junction with the edge beam, each rib steel bar shall sit on top of the edge beam bars and extend to the outermost bar. Allow for 75mm cover to the edge of the beam. Place 1 x HD12 bar in each 100mm wide rib and 2 x HD12 bars in each 300mm wide rib.

3.15 PLACE REINFORCING STEEL: EDGE BEAM STEEL

Place the two edge beam reinforcing bars in the bottom of the edge beam and supported in the correct position by the **Firth** spacers. Tie one edge beam bar below the mesh at the perimeter of the area covered by the polystyrene pods. Lap all steel 480mm minimum. At corners, the inner bottom bars and the top bars cross each other and extend to 75mm from the outside face of the edge beam. Tie these bars together where they cross. Tying of edge beam steel is only required at corners.

3.16 PLACE REINFORCING STEEL: RE-ENTRANT CORNER STEEL

Place two D10 bars, 1200mm in length across the corner. Tie to the top of the mesh at re-entrant corners at 200mm centres with 50mm side cover from the internal corner.

Install specified steel to Firth RibRaft® Floor System Manual Section 2 - Installation Information, 3.9 Reinforcing Steel. Ensure specified minimum cover requirements are maintained.

3.17 PLACE REINFORCING MESH AND CHAIRS

Place reinforcing mesh over the pods and support on the mesh chairs spaced at 1200mm centres minimum, with two mesh chairs minimum placed per pod and with one mesh chair minimum per part pod. Lap mesh 225mm minimum and tied at all laps.

3.18 FORM SLAB AND OPENING REBATES

Form rebates, as detailed on drawings.

Form a minimum 50mm rebate in slab for masonry veneer construction with a width dependent on the veneer width, cavity width and overhang. Waterproof the rebate with a bituminous sealer on both the vertical and horizontal faces.

3.19 STARTERS FOR MASONRY WALL CONSTRUCTION

Install wall starter bars in the correct position for the masonry block series being used to NZS 4229 and RibRaft® manual.

3.20 UNDERFLOOR HEATING

Where underfloor inslab heating system is required ensure installation is completed to manufacturer's requirements.

3.21 TOPPING SLAB DEPTH

85mm minimum plus additional cover as required.

3.22 PRE-PLACEMENT INSPECTION

Arrange for excavations, formwork and reinforcement to be inspected and passed by the Building Consent Authority.

3.23 CONCRETE PLACEMENT AND COMPACTION

Ensure the rib and edge beam canals are clean, free of debris. Pour the floor in a single pour using only **Firth** Raftmix[™] or **Firth** Raftmix[™] Pump concrete and ensuring that the pods remain in position during placing. Pour concrete onto the top of each pod prior to filling the ribs around the pod to help prevent them from floating and lifting.

Use **Firth** Raftmix[™] for placement in the floor directly from the concrete truck chute or **Firth** Raftmix[™] Pump concrete for placement in the floor by concrete pump.

Compact concrete using a suitable poker vibrator for the ribs and ground beams and into all corners of the formwork. Screed as required. Confirm levels with a laser level.

3.24 CONCRETE FINISHING

Float and trowel to provide a U3 finish to NZS 3114: table 2, Classes of floor, exterior pavement and invert finishes.

3.25 CONCRETE CURING

Curing of the concrete slab must take place immediately after finishing the concrete to NZS 3109 by one of the following curing methods:

- ponding or continuous sprinkling of water

- placing a wet covering or plastic membrane over the slab
- the use of liquid membrane curing compounds

3.26 SHRINKAGE CONTROL JOINTS

Cut shrinkage control joints as shown on the plans after hardening to a depth of 25mm within 24 hours in summer or 48 hours in winter.

Where shrinkage control joints have not been shown on the plans, position the shrinkage control joints to coincide with major changes in the floor plan. Agree position of shrinkage control joints with the designer.

Bay dimensions formed by the shrinkage control joints to be limited to a maximum ratio of length to width of 2 to 1 with a maximum dimension of 6 metres. Place the shrinkage control joints over the 100mm wide internal ribs wherever possible. Where a shrinkage control joint runs along the line of a 300mm wide loadbearing rib, locate the cut directly above one edge of the 300mm rib. Do not place supplementary reinforcing bars (including re-entrant corner steel) across any shrinkage control joints.

3.27 CLEAN OUT SHRINKAGE CONTROL JOINTS

Clean out control joints. If required fill with suitable flexible sealant.

Application - other concrete work

3.28 PLACE CONCRETE

Do not place fresh concrete against the preceding layer after more than 45 minutes, or such lesser time as required by the circumstances, to NZS 3109: clause 7.4, Handling and placing.

3.29 SCREED THE SURFACE

Screed the concrete surface by straight edge or vibrating screed immediately after compaction and to tolerances in NZS 3109: table 5.2, Tolerances for in situ construction.

3.30 CONCRETE FINISHING

Screed and provide a U3 finish to NZS 3114: table 2, Classes of floor, exterior pavement and invert finishes.

Finishing

3.31 STRIKE FORMWORK

Strike formwork after at least 12 hours after the slab has been finished without damaging or overloading structure.

3.32 SURFACE DEFECTS

Make good surface defects immediately after forms are stripped. Make good hollows or bony areas with suitable patching mortar, finished to the same tolerances as the parent concrete. Fill any tie rod holes with 1:2 mortar.

Completion

3.33 LEAVE

Leave work to the standard required by following procedures.

3.34 CLEAN UP

Clean up surrounding areas following completion of the concrete placement.

3.35 REMOVE

Remove debris, unused materials and elements from the site.

Type to NZS 3604, section 4, **Durability**, and of the size and number for each particular types of joint as laid down in the nailing schedules of NZS 3604, sections 6-10.

2.4 BOLTS AND SCREWS

Bolts and screws of engineering and/or coach type complete with washers, to the requirements of NZS 3604, section 4, **Durability**, and of the number and form required for each particular junction to NZS 3604, sections 6-10.

2.5 NAIL PLATES

Comply with the requirements of NZS 3604, section 4, **Durability**, and of the number and form required for each particular junction to NZS 3604, sections 6-10. Plates to the plate manufacturer's design for the particular locations as shown on the drawings.

2.6 CONNECTORS

Comply with the requirements of NZS 3604, section 4, **Durability**, and of the number and form required for each particular junction to NZS 3604, sections 6-10. Connectors and structural brackets to the connector manufacturer's design for particular locations shown on drawings.

2.7 CORROSION RISKS

For exterior timber, timber in damp areas and timber subject to occasional wetting, use stainless steel (or equivalent) fixings, connectors, etc, in all zones, with the timber treatments CuAz (Preservative code 58) and ACQ (Preservative code 90).

2.8 FLASHINGS

Set out framing in accordance with the requirements of NZS 3604 and as required to support sheet linings and claddings.

3.6 FRAMING WALLS

Frame to required loading and bracing complete with lintels, sills and nogs, all fabricated and fastened to NZS 3604, section 8, Walls.

3.7 FRAMING ROOFS

Frame to required loading and bracing complete with valley boards, ridge boards and purlins. Design and fit roof trusses complete with anchorage. All fabricated and fastened to NZS 3604, section 9, **Posts** and 10, **Roof framing**.

3.8 FRAMING CEILINGS

Frame to required loading and bracing complete with runners and battens set out to support ceiling lining. All fabricated and fastened to NZS 3604, section 13, **Ceilings**. Trim for openings in ceilings and hatches to NZS 3604 section 13.3, **Openings in ceilings**. Provide blocking for water tanks located in the ceiling space to NZS 3604, section 13.4, **Water tanks in roof space**.

3.110 POLYETHYLENE DPC TO TIMBER

Lay polyethylene DPC under treated and untreated timber, including LOSP treated timber, of all timber framed walls on concrete in a single layer with 50mm overlaps at joints to provide a waterproof barrier. Lay DPC between dissimilar materials where required.

Application - Interior trim

3.9 NAIL FIX

Use full lengths. Fit with scribed internal joints, mitred external joints and returned on itself at stop ends. Fix plumb, level and true to line and face using 40mm or 50mm brads to suit, ensuring fixing to a minimum depth of 25mm into framing timber. Leave secure and with no movement possible. Punch brads and fill with stopping compound to maintain the smooth surface.

3.10 ADHESIVE FIX

Use full lengths. Fit with scribed internal joints, mitred external joints and returned on itself at stop ends. Fix plumb, level and true to line and face using wallboard adhesive.

3.11 PNEUMATIC FASTENER FIX

Use full lengths. Fit with scribed internal joints, mitred external joints and returned on itself at stop ends. Fix plumb, level and true to line and face using resin coated narrow crown staples. Use fastener length to provide fixing depth into timber frame equal to the moulding thickness. Leave secure and with no movement possible. Fill with stopping compound to maintain the smooth surface.

3.12 PUNCH

Punch all nail heads below the face of trim ready to receive stopping, as specified under painting preparation.

3.13 COMPLETION

3.14 COMPLETE

Ensure the work is complete with all flashings, finishings and trim properly installed so the cladding system is completely weathertight.

Replace damaged or marked elements. Remove unused materials from the site.

3.5 WRAP/UNDERLAY GENERALLY

To comply with Marshall Innovations Limited specification for **Tekton® Weatherization System**, BRANZ Appraisal 621 - The **Tekton® Weatherization System** and BRANZ
Appraisal 548 - Tekton® Building Wrap.

Face branded side of the wrap/underlay away from the framing. Run horizontally and extend from upper side of the top plate to the underside of bearers or wall plates supporting ground floor joists, or below bottom plates on concrete slabs.

Ensure horizontal laps no less than 75mm with the direction of the lap ensuring that water is shed to the outside. End laps to be made over framing and be no less than 150mm wide.

3.6 FIXINGS

Fix the wrap/underlay into place using 6mm to 8mm zinc plated staples, hot dip galvanised large head clouts, tek screws or proprietary wrap/underlay fixings. Care to be taken when fixing in windy conditions, due to large sail area created by roll widths.

3.7 POSITION ROLL

Position roll against the framing with a short length of wrap/underlay free of the roll. Align the guide marks printed on the **Tekton**[®] **Building Wrap** with visible studs and nail/staple to the framing.

3.8 FIX TO FRAMING

Unroll wrap/underlay across framing and fix to all framing members at a maximum of 300mm centres. Keep straight and taught over framing. Unroll wrap/underlay across framing and fix to all framing members at a maximum of 300mm centres. Keep straight and taut over framing.

3.9 WRAP/UNDERLAY OVER OPENINGS

Run wrap/underlay over any openings and leave covered until windows and doors are ready to be installed.

3.10 FORM OPENINGS

Form openings by cutting wrap/underlay at a 45 degree diagonal in from each corner. Fold and staple wrap/underlay to the inside of the framed opening and trim excess wrap/underlay to finish flush with internal face of framing.

3.11 APPLY SEAM TAPE

Apply **Tekton® Seam Tape** to all horizontal and vertical building wrap/underlay joints. Lap joint to sit halfway under the tape width. Press all tape firmly into position to enhance adhesion. Use **Tekton® Seam Tape** to repair small rips, punctures or tears in the building wrap/underlay and tape into place. Ensure overlapping material extends at least 150mm beyond the damaged area.

3.12 INSTALL PENETRATION SEAL

For pipe and conduit penetrations of the cladding/wrap/underlay use the appropriate sized **TRADE-SEAL**, to ensure a tight fit around the pipe. Install the **TRADE-SEAL** to Marshall Innovations Limited requirements. Push back the collar to fit the cavity width. Ensure the **TRADE-SEAL** exposure to weather and UV does not exceed 90 days.

3.13 SILL TAPE GENERALLY

To comply with Marshall Innovations Limited specification for **Tekton® Weatherization**System, BRANZ Appraisal 621 - The **Tekton® Weatherization System** and BRANZ Appraisal 591 - One Piece Sill Tape

3.14 PREPARATION

Ensure all surfaces are clean, dry and free of any dust or sharp protrusions. When used in conjunction with LOSP treated timber, the solvent must be allowed to evaporate prior to installation of the tape. Do not install when temperature is below 5 degrees.

3.15 PRIMER/ADHESIVE

Warm One Piece Sill Tape in cooler conditions before applying. In extreme conditions use Protecto Tak Primer to enhance adhesion.

3.16 SILL AREA

Measure and mark 150mm up from the left hand side bottom corner of opening. Measure sill length. Measure and cut a length of **One Piece Sill Tape** 300 mm longer than sill length. Roll up the cut length with branded face to inside of the roll. Peel back 50mm of backing paper to expose black adhesive. Align **One Piece Sill Tape** with 150mm mark on jamb and flush with inside edge of the opening. Apply tape down frame and into corner. Ensure divided side of tape faces to the outside of the opening.

When the sill jamb junction is reached ensure tape is pressed firmly into corner. Continue removing backing paper and sticking **One Piece Sill Tape** across the length of the sill and up the other jamb. Keep tape flush with inside edge of opening.

Fold the upper front piece of branded flap back into opening to expose lower section of combination tape. Starting at one end, remove release film and fold flexible membrane around onto the face of opening (Do not overstretch membrane). For ease of installation, adhere middle and ends of membrane onto face of opening before removing release film. Fold the branded flap forward and cut at corners. Fold branded flap over the top of the exposed membrane.

3.17 TOP CORNERS

Cut a 300mm length of **One Piece Sill Tape**. Remove the backing paper and fold tape in half, keeping adhesive membrane to the outside of fold. Position tape into corner. Adhere tape down side, then across top of opening. Press tape firmly into corner. The divided side of tape must face to the outside of opening.

Fold branded flap back into opening to expose lower section of combination tape. Remove release film and fold flexible membrane onto face of opening. (Do not overstretch membrane). For ease of installation adhere ends of membrane onto the face of opening before removing release film.

Fold branded flap forward and cut at corners. Fold branded flap over top of exposed membrane.

When correctly installed to top corners, the tape should extend 150mm down the jamb and 150mm across the lintel and be folded 50mm approx. out onto face of opening.

After installation of **One Piece Sill Tape** firmly smooth all tape to ensure maximum adhesion and ensure it is covered within 4 weeks. Adhesion increases after tape has been in place for a period of time.

3.18 HEAD FLASHING

For the taping of head flashings use **Protecto Wrap Head Flashing Tape** with **Protecto Tak** primer.

3.19 REPAIRS

Repair **One Piece Sill Tape** by covering with a second piece of tape that extends 50mm beyond the damaged area. Ensure tape surface is clean and dry before overlaying.

Lay DPM under concrete floor substrate over sand binding, in a single layer with 150mm overlaps at joints to provide a waterproof barrier.

When continuous metal cladding etc. Runs along a long continuous timber member and is directly fixed to it, the timbers equilibrium moisture content (EMC) to be 18% or less. For flashings in this situation (sometimes called transverse flashings) the framing EMC to be maximum 16%, and preferably as low as 12%. Transverse flashings can be temporarily tacked in place and final fixing done when moisture content is acceptable.

3.3 STORAGE

Take delivery of and accept packs of roofing dry and undamaged on delivery. Reject all damaged material. Store on a level firm base clear of the ground, with packs well ventilated and completely protected from weather and damage. Do not allow moisture to build up between sheets.

1.6 QUALIFICATIONS

Roofers to be **Metalcraft Roofing** Approved Installers, or experienced, competent roofers familiar with **Metalcraft Roofing** products.

1.7 MAINTENANCE INSTRUCTIONS

Provide one bound copy of all relevant **Metalcraft Roofing** maintenance information on completion of the roofing work.

Performance

1.8 FIXINGS, WIND

Design and use the fixings appropriate for the wind zone (R) and topographical classification (T) of this site and building height; as required by NZS 3604, or by wind

loads given by AS/NZS 1170. 2. Allow for specific loadings at corners and the periphery of the roof, where localised pressure factors apply. Confirm with Metalcraft Roofing the fastener type and fixing pattern for the load capacity required.

1.9 CO-ORDINATE

Co-ordinate to ensure substrate and preparatory work is complete and other work programmed in the order required for access and completion of the roof.

1.10 PERFORMANCE

Accept responsibility for the weather-tight performance of the completed roofing system, including all penetrations through the roof and junctions with walls and parapets.

2.26 WIRE NETTING

75mm galvanized hexagonal wire netting to AS/NZS 4534.

2.15 BITUMINOUS SELF-SUPPORTING ROOFING UNDERLAY

Thermakraft 215™, bituminous self-supporting roofing underlay to NZS 2295.

2.1 METALCRAFT ROOFING PROFILES

MC700

2.2 FLASHINGS GENERALLY

Formable grade 0.55mm BMT for galvanized, Zincalume® and pre-coated steel, and 0.90mm BMT for aluminium to the same standards as the profiled sheets, notched where across profile or provided with a soft edge.

2.3 FLASHINGS TO VERGE, RIDGE AND HIP

Supplied by Metalcraft Roofing to match or to suit the roofing.

Components

2.4 FASTENERS GENERALLY

Minimum Class 4 durability and not less than the roofing material being fixed. Screw fasteners to be head stamped identifying the manufacturer and class.

2.5 FIXING SCREWS

To AS 3566. Screws appropriate to the roofing material and the supporting structure, and wind load as required by **Metalcraft Roofing**, and with a durability not less than the material fixed.

2.6 RIVETS

Sealed aluminium, minimum diameter 4.8mm.

Accessories

2.7 SEALANT

Neutral curing silicone or polymer sealant as required by **Metalcraft Roofing** and used as directed.

2.8 CLOSURE STRIPS

Polyurethane profiled closed cell foam strips to fit the sheet profile.

EXECUTION

Conditions

3.1 INSPECTION

Inspect the roof framing and supporting structure to ensure that it is complete and fully braced ready for roofing and free from any misalignments or protrusions that could damage the roofing.

3.2 FRAMING TIMBER MOISTURE

When continuous metal cladding etc. Runs along a long continuous timber member and is directly fixed to it, the timbers equilibrium moisture content (EMC) to be 18% or less. For flashings in this situation (sometimes called transverse flashings) the framing EMC to be maximum 16%, and preferably as low as 12%. Transverse flashings can be temporarily tacked in place and final fixing done when moisture content is acceptable.

3.3 STORAGE

Take delivery of and accept packs of roofing dry and undamaged on delivery. Reject all damaged material. Store on a level firm base clear of the ground, with packs well ventilated and completely protected from weather and damage. Do not allow moisture to build up between sheets.

3.4 HANDLING

Avoid distortion and contact with damaging substances, including cement. Do not drag sheets across each other or other materials. Protect edges and surface finishes from damage. Use soft, flat sole shoes when fixing and for all other work on the roof.

3.5 SEPARATION

Isolate dissimilar materials in close proximity as necessary by painting the surfaces or fitting separator strips of compatible materials. Place isolators between metals and treated timber and cement based materials. Do not use unpainted lead sheet in contact with or allow water run-off onto galvanized steel or Zincalume[®].

Application

3.6 SET-OUT & LAYING

Carefully set out to allow cover flashings of equal width at the ends of the building. Lay sheets with side laps away from the prevailing wind ensuring ends of sheets are true to line. Check during fixing to eliminate creep or spread and use string lines along purlin centres to keep fastenings in line.

3.7 FORMING

Form stop-ends and downturns to Metalcraft Roofing recommendations.

3.8 END LAPS

End laps are not recommended, except where specifically detailed to **Metalcraft Roofing** requirements.

3.9 THERMAL MOVEMENT

Roof fixing and jointing to conform with **Metalcraft Roofing** requirements for thermal movement.

3.10 FIXING GENERALLY

Install and fix in accordance with the **Metalcraft Roofing** and Cladding Systems Manual and the NZMRM NZ Metal roof and wall cladding - Code of practice and to **Metalcraft Roofing** required fixing patterns and details for each area of the building roofing. Use only screws as required by **Metalcraft Roofing**. Paint colour matched fixings and accessories before installation.

3.12 WIRE NETTING

Lay 75mm galvanized wire netting at right angles across the purlins and drawn taunt before fixing. Tie edges of netting together with galvanized wire clips.

3.14 ROOF UNDERLAY

Lay vertically over purlins on wire netting with a 150mm side lap. Fix securely to purlins with galvanized fixing clips. Lay underlay to avoid excessive dishing between purlins. Scribe around and fit neatly to all penetrations. Avoid prolong exposure by installing the

roof immediately. Installation to comply with NZBC E2/AS1 8.1.5.1, Underlay support and NZMRM Code of Practice.

3.15 GUTTER AND UNDER FLASHINGS

Lay Thermakraft 215™ bituminous breather type underlay cut to width by manufacturer for use as an underlay to valley and apron flashings. Lap under flashings with adjoining underlays. Fix Thermakraft 210™ bituminous breather type underlay soffit liner from top plate down 150mm past ribbon plate.

3.11 MARKING AND CUTTING

Cut only by shearing tools. Do not use black lead pencils for marking Zincalume[®], Colorsteel[®] products.

3.12 FIX SHEETS

Fix sheets in place using the fastening system required by **Metalcraft Roofing** for specified profiles, making due allowance for dynamic local wind pressures on the building and thermal movement in the sheet.

3.13 FLASH

Flash roof to parapets, walls and penetrations to detail in Metalcraft Roofing installation manual and to the NZMRM NZ Metal roof & wall cladding - Code of practice and Metalcraft Roofing requirements. Cut accurately and fix using sealant and rivets to detail and to Metalcraft Roofing requirements to form a weatherproof cover. Ensure flashings are designed and installed to avoid water ponding.

3.14 FIX RIDGES AND HIPS

Cut accurately and fix using primary fasteners to the purlins. Join using neutral curing silicone or polymer sealant and sealed rivets to detail and to the NZMRM NZ Metal roof and wall cladding - Code of practice. Ensure flashings are designed and installed to avoid water ponding.

3.15 FIX VERGE AND CAP FLASHINGS

Cut accurately and fix using primary fasteners to the purlins. Join using neutral curing silicone or polymer sealant and sealed rivets to detail and to the NZMRM NZ Metal roof and wall cladding - Code of practice. Ensure flashings are designed and installed to avoid water ponding.

3.16 PENETRATIONS

Flash and overflash all penetrations through the roof.

3.17 PENETRATIONS AND JUNCTIONS

Check that adjoining walls and parapets are prepared ready for the installation of the roofing. Confirm that openings have been prepared ready for the installation of skylights and other penetrations through the roof. Required work includes the following:

- underlay turned up at wall and parapet lines
- underlay finished and dressed off to all openings, ready for the installation of skylights and other penetrations
- roofing installation neatly finished to all sides of openings and to all wall and parapet iunctions
- installation of flashings (those required to be installed prior to installation of penetrating elements and/or wall linings).

Completion

3.18 REPLACE

Replace damaged or marked elements.

3.19 LEAVE

Leave this work complete with all necessary flashings, undercloaks, valleys, ridges and hips all properly installed as the work proceeds so the finished roof is completely weathertight.

3.20 REMOVE

Remove all trade rubbish, swarf and unused materials from the roof and surrounds daily during the work. Sweep down at the end of each day, and clean out spoutings, gutters and rainwater pipes on completion of the roof. Remove debris, unused materials and elements from the site.

1.10 PERFORMANCE - WINDOWS AND DOORS

1.11 STRUCTURALWEATHER-TIGHTNESS

1.12 DESIGN PARAMETERS - NON SPECIFIC DESIGN

Design the installation to the wind zone parameters of NZS 3604, table 5.1. Refer to SELECTIONS for wind zone.

Finishes

1.13 CERTIFY COATINGS - POWDER COATING

Certify on request, compliance with this specification and support with control and sampling records. Test for film thickness to BS 3900, part C5, method No. 4, using method (b) or to AS/NZ 1580.108.1 for certifying thickness and method (a) where any dispute arises as to the thickness provided.

The coating should be applied by an applicator who can certify that the coating has been applied in accordance with the specification.

PRODUCTS

Materials

2.1 ALUMINIUM EXTRUSIONS

Alloy designation to comply with AS/NZS 1866. Branded and extruded for anodising or powder coating.

2.2 ALUMINIUM SHEET AND STRIP

Complying with AS/NZS 1734 of suitable thickness. Rolled for anodising or powder coating.

Alloy designation: 5251 - H16 or 5005 - H16

2.3 STAINLESS STEEL SHEET AND STRIP

Type: 316 austenitic steel Finish grade: 2B (satin lustre)

2.4 GLASS

Refer to the glazing section for glass types and installation.

Reveals

2.5 REVEALS - TIMBER PAINTED

Timber reveals for paint finish with all sides primed grooved for wall linings or flush finished for architraves.

Flashings

2.6 FLASHINGS GENERALLY

To NZBC E2/AS1, 9.1.10 **Windows and Doors**. Material, grade and colour of head flashings to match the window frames. Ensure that materials used for head, jamb and sill flashings are compatible with the window frame materials and fixings and cladding materials.

Components for installation - cavity systems

2.7 WANZ CAVITY CLOSER

Flashing device (unperforated) to close the cavity above the window or door unit to direct water that occasionally penetrates the wall cladding into the cavity spaces adjacent to the window.

2.8 WANZ SUPPORT BAR

Extruded aluminium support bar with built in drainage and ventilation to NZBC E2/AS1, and support bar location bracket, to provide continuous support to the window unit. Size to suit cladding type.

Components

2.9 GLAZING GASKETS

Thermoplastic rubber. Do not stretch glazing gaskets during installation. Measure and cut gaskets 5-10% over length before installation.

2.10 HARDWARE AND FURNITURE

Hinges, stays, catches, fasteners, latches, locks and furniture as offered by the window and door manufacturer. Refer to SELECTIONS for type and finish. Key alike all lockable window hardware able to be keyed alike.

2.11 SAFETY STAYS

Stainless steel non releasable restrictors to limit window opening to NZBC F4/AS1, Table 2, Acceptable opening sizes for barriers.

2.12 FIXING BRACKETS

Designed by manufacturer to specific design.

2.13 WEATHERING/INSTALLATION SEALANT

Building sealant used in accordance with manufacturer's instructions for weather sealing aluminium frames to the cladding, complying with US Federal Specification TT S 0011534A, or a one-part polyurethane moisture curing, elastic joint sealant of medium modulus (± 25% movement) to US Federal Specification TT S 00230C.

Finishes

2.14 DURALLOY POWDER COATED ALUMINIUM

Polyester powder organic coating in accordance with WANZ Powder Coating Quality Assurance System and AS 3715.

3. EXECUTION

Conditions - generally

3.1 DO NOT DELIVER

Do not deliver to site any elements which cannot be unloaded immediately into suitable conditions of storage.

3.2 UNLOAD WINDOW JOINERY

Unload, handle and store elements in accordance with the window manufacturer's requirements.

3.3 AVOID DISTORTION

Avoid distortion of elements during transit, storage and handling.

3.4 PREVENT DAMAGE

Store windows and doors on site in a clean and dry environment in such a manner as to prevent damage to prefinished surfaces. Stack the units in a vertical position resting on their sills, with layers interleaved between to prevent rubbing. Keep paper and cardboard wrappings dry.

3.5 PROPRIETARY ELEMENTS

Fix in accordance with the window manufacturer's requirements.

3.6 PROTECTIVE COVERINGS

Retain protective coverings and coatings to BRANZ BU 337 and keep in place during the fixing process. Provide protective coverings and coatings where required to prevent marking of surfaces visible in the completed work and to protect aluminium joinery from following trades. Remove protection on completion.

3.7 ADDITIONAL PROTECTION

Supply and fix additional protection as necessary to prevent marking of surfaces which will be visible on completed work.

Conditions - fixings and fastenings

3.8 SUPPLY OF FIXINGS

Use only fixings and fastenings recommended by the manufacturer of the component being fixed and to comply with the ULS wind pressure stated in SELECTIONS. Ensure fixings and fastenings exposed to the weather are of aluminium, or Type 316 stainless steel or if not exposed to the weather may they be hot-dip galvanized steel with a coating weight of 610 g/m² complying with AS/NZS 4680.

3.9 INSTALLATION FIXING

To NZBC E2/AS1, 9.1.10.8, Attachments for windows and doors. Fix windows/doors through reveal to frame with a pair of 75 x 3.15mm minimum galvanised jolt head nails or a pair of 8 gauge x 65mm minimum stainless steel screws. Fix at a maximum of 450 centres along all reveals and a maximum of 150mm from reveal ends. Ensure fixings do not penetrate metal flashings.

Install packers between reveals and framing at fixing points, except at the head.

Assembly

3.10 FABRICATION

Fabricate frames as detailed on shop drawings. Install glazing, hinges, stays and running gear as scheduled. Provide temporary bracing and protection. Temporarily secure all opening elements for transportation.

3.11 TIMBER / PVC REVEALS

Before fixing to aluminium frames, ensure that timber reveals which are being painted have been primed on all surfaces. Securely fix reveals through aluminium fin.

3.12 HARDWARE GENERALLY

Factory fit all required and scheduled hardware. Account for all keys and deliver separately to the site manager.

3.13 SAFETY STAYS

Factory fit safety stays to all windows scheduled for safety stays and to all windows where safety stays are required to comply with NZBC F4/AS1 4.0, Opening windows.

Installation - windows and doors

3.14 SUPPLY OF FIXINGS

Use only fixings and fastenings recommended by the manufacturer of the component being fixed and to comply with the ULS wind pressure stated in SELECTIONS.

3.15 EXPOSED FIXINGS AND FASTENINGS

Ensure fixings and fastenings exposed to the weather are of aluminium, or Type 304 stainless steel.

3.16 PROTECTED FIXINGS AND FASTENINGS

Fixings and fastenings not exposed to the weather may be hot-dip galvanized steel with a coating weight of 610 g/m² complying with AS/NZS 4680.

3.17 CORROSION PROTECTION

Before fixing, apply suitable barriers of bituminous coatings, stops or underlays between dissimilar metals in contact, or between aluminium in contact with concrete.

3.18 CONFIRM PREPARATION OF EXTERIOR WALL OPENINGS

Confirm that exterior wall openings have been prepared ready for the installation of all window and door frames. Do not proceed with the window and door installation until required preparatory work has been completed.

Required preparatory work includes the following:

- wall cladding underlay/building wrap to openings finished and dressed off ready for the installation of window and door frames to NZBC E2/AS1:9.1.5 Wall underlays to wall openings.
- Full height 20mm jamb battens to NZBC E2/AS1 figure 72A (direct fix only)

- claddings neatly finished off to all sides of openings

- installation of flashings (those which are required to be installed prior to frames).
- application of waterproof sealer to all door and window sills in concrete floor or concrete sill situations. To door sills only, apply a suitable membrane over the sealer
- all in accordance with the shop drawings, where applicable.

3.19 INSTALLATION

Fix to comply with the reviewed shop drawings and installation details including flashings and bedding compounds, pointing sealants and weathering sealants.

3.20 INSTALLATION CAVITY CONSTRUCTION

Install to WANZ Installation System details and drawings including WANZ cavity closers, sill support bars and support angles.

For thresholds with support bars fixed through membranes, pre-fill support bar screw holes with silicone sealant to NZBC E2/AS1, figure 62(d).

3.21 INSTALL FLASHINGS

Install flashings to heads, jambs and sills of frames as supplied and required by the window manufacturer and as detailed on the drawings. Finish head flashings to match window finish.

Place all flashings so that the head flashing weathers the jamb flashings, which in turn weathers over the upstand of the sill flashing. Ensure that sill flashings drain to the outside air.

Except where window/door frames are recessed, ensure that head flashings over-sail unit by 30mm minimum at each end.

3.22 COMPLETE AIR SEAL

To NZBC E2/AS1;9.1.6 **Air seals**. Form an air-tight seal by means of proprietary expanding foam or sealants used with PEF backing rods, applied between the window / door reveal and structural framing to a depth of 10 - 20mm, to provide a continuous air tight seal to the perimeter of the window or door.

3.23 FIX HARDWARE

Fix all sash and door hardware and furniture as scheduled.

Application - jointing and sealing

3.24 SEAL FRAMES ON SITE

Seal frames to each other and to adjoining structure and finishes, all as required by the window and sealant manufacturer and to make the installation weathertight.. In very high and extra high or greater wind zones, seal between the window head and the head flashing. Do not seal the junction between the sill member and the cladding or sill flashing which must remain open.

3.25 PREPARE JOINTS

Ensure joints are dry. Remove loose material, dust and grease. Prepare joints in accordance with the sealant manufacturer's requirements, using required solvents and primers where necessary. Mask adjoining surfaces which would be difficult to clean if smeared with sealant.

3.26 BACK UP

When using back-up materials do not reduce depth of joint for sealant to less than the minimum required by the manufacturer of the sealant. Insert polyethylene rod or tape back-up behind joints being pointed with sealant.

3.27 SEALANT FINISH

Tool sealant to form a smooth fillet with a profile and dimensions required by the sealant manufacturer. Remove excess sealant from adjoining surfaces, using the cleaning materials nominated by the sealant manufacturer and leave clean.

Cleaning

3.28 REMOVE TRADE DEBRIS

Remove trade debris by appropriate means on a floor by floor basis as each floor is completed and again before any work is covered up by others. Arrange for general removal.

3.29 TRADE CLEAN

Trade clean window frames, operable windows and doors, glass and other related surfaces inside and out at the time of installation to remove marks, dust and dirt, to enable a visual inspection of all surfaces.

Completion

3.30 PROTECTIVE COVERINGS

Retain protective coverings and coatings and keep in place during the fixing process. Provide protective coverings and coatings where required to prevent marking of surfaces visible in the completed work and to protect aluminium joinery from following trades. Remove protection on completion.

3.31 REPLACE

Replace damaged, cracked or marked elements.

3.32 PROTECTION

Protect finishes against damage from adjacent and following work.

3.33 IN-SITU TOUCH-UP TO POWDER COATED ALUMINIUM

In situ touch-up of polyester or fluoropolymer coated aluminium is only permitted to minor surface scratching. Otherwise replace all damaged material.

3.34 SAFETY

Indicate the presence of transparent glasses for the remainder of the contract period, with whiting, tape or signs compatible with the glass type. Indicators other than whiting must not be applied to the glass surface. Masking tape must not be used for this purpose.

3.35 MANIFESTATIONS

Apply manifestations to comply with NZS 4223.3, 303.1 Manifestations.

4555 GARAGE DOORS

GENERAL

This section relates to the manufacture, supply and installation of garage door systems including required opening/operating systems.

Documents

1.1 DOCUMENTS REFERRED TO

Documents referred to in this section are:

NZS 1170.5 Structural design actions - Earthquake actions - New Zealand

Documents listed above and cited in the clauses that follow are part of this specification. However, this specification takes precedence in the event of it being at variance with the cited document.

Performance

1.2 LOADS - SPECIFIC DESIGN

Garage doors complete with hinges, roller assemblies and fasteners to comply with wind and seismic load performance requirements to NZS 3604, table 5.4, AS/NZS 1170 and NZS 1170.5.

1.3 RESPONSIBILITY FOR PERFORMANCE

Accept responsibility for the structural and weathertight performance of the completed garage door installation.

Performance - Wind (design by contractor)

2.5 JOINTS - SOLDER

Eutectic solder of 60% tin/40% lead using a suitable proprietary flux.

EXECUTION

Conditions

3.1 DELIVERY

Keep flashings dry in transit. Take delivery of flashings in an undamaged condition. Reject all damaged materials.

3.2 STORAGE

Store materials and accessories on a level, firm base, in dry conditions, well ventilated, out of direct sunlight and completely protected from weather and damage. Ensure storage areas are away from current work areas. Cover to keep dry until fixed.

3.3 HANDLING

Avoid distortion and contact with potentially damaging surfaces/substances. Do not drag flashings across each other, or across other surfaces. Protect edges, corners and surfaces from damage.

3.4 SUBSTRATE

Do not commence work until the substrate is of the standard required by the installer for the specified flashings, level and in true alignment.

3.5 PROTECT

Protect surfaces, window and door joinery, and finishes already in place, from the possibility of damage during the installation process.

3.6 CONFIRM LAYOUT

Before commencing work confirm the proposed installation of the flashings and expansion joints and other visual considerations of the finished work.

3.7 CO-ORDINATE INSTALLATION

Co-ordinate installation of flashings with associated trades.

Application

3.8 INSTALLATION

Install flashings in accordance with NZMRM - CoP and in compliance with NZBC E2/AS1, 4.0 Flashings. For very high wind zones and where the pitch of the roof is below 15° the flashing joint laps shall be sealed with sealant at each end of the lap to prevent the ingress of water.

Refer to NZBC E2/AS1 Table 7 for general dimensions of flashings.

3.9 FIXINGS

Fix flashings with fasteners appropriate to the situation. For fixing flashings with proprietary brackets or clips ensure they are aligned to allow for movement and are compatible with the flashing material.

Fix screws with the shank perpendicular to the surface of the flashing with the washer fitted firmly against the flashing. Screws to be compatible with the flashing material.

Rivets 'blind' or 'pop' are to be sealed when used. Aluminium rivets are compatible with zinc or AZ coated steel. Monel and stainless steel rivets can be used to fix galvanized steel flashings. Minimum diameter of rivet to be used is 4.0mm. Drill hole 1mm larger than the rivet size. Seal head of rivet with neutral cured silicone.

3.10 JOINTING - SEALANTS

Clean surfaces to be lapped using a solvent ensuring all traces of the solvent are removed with a clean rag. Apply sealant by gun in a continuous bead of approximately 5mm diameter. Width of sealant when compressed should not exceed 25mm. Sealant joints shall be mechanically fixed for strength. Refer to NZMRM - CoP for details.

3.11 JOINTING - SOLDER

Solder joints in galvanized steel and non-ferrous metals when specified with lead/tin solder. Clean joint ensuring it is dry and free of grease immediately prior to applying a proprietary flux. Lap the flashing 25mm in the direction of the water flow and fasten the lap with rivets or screws at 50mm centres. Completely sweat the joint to avoid leaving any flux residue. Wash down the joint to remove any trace of flux.

3.12 FINAL INSPECTION

A final inspection by the installer to take place after completion of the flashing work. Any defects or subsequent damage to be made good.

Unless otherwise specified or shown on the drawings, install waterproof membranes as follows: -

- To 150mm minimum around the sides and along walls horizontally 150mm minimum.

Splashback to a vanity

- To 300mm minimum up wall behind the vanity.

- To the floor level at least twice the width of the vanity and 500mm min beyond it at each end.

LIQUID WATERPROOFING MEMBRANE 3.10

Apply the selected liquid waterproof membrane system to the membrane manufacturer's requirements and in accordance with AS 3740 and to BRANZ Good practice guide -Tiling, 7.0 Waterproofing interior wet areas.

Application - tile installation

3.11 TILE FIXING GENERALLY

To AS 3958.1. Apply adhesive, prepare and fix tiles by the method required by the adhesive manufacturer and tap them firmly into place.

3.12 FITTING TILES

Ensure cut edges are smooth and installed without jagged or flaked edges. Do not install single tiles in more than one piece. Maintain the heights of wall tile work in full courses to the nearest dimension. Within allowed tolerances, ensure corners of tiles are flush and level with corners of adjacent tiles. Keep joint lines, including mitres, straight and of an even width. Fully bed trim units, moulded or shaped pieces and other accessories with an appropriate bedding material. Fix accessories level, plumb and true to the designated projection at detailed locations and heights.

3.13 MOVEMENT JOINTS

Provide movement joints with a minimum width of 4mm, carried through tile and bedding and where substantial movement is anticipated, through the rigid sheet to the structure. Install joints over expansion joints, at junctions between different backgrounds, abutting other materials, at storey heights horizontally and 3 to 4 metres vertically, at internal corners and at junctions with floors and columns. Ensure joints are clean, formed, filled and with sealant inserted to the sealant manufacturer's requirements.

3.14 TILE FINISH AND JOINTS

Ensure finished surfaces are flat and true to a tolerance of \pm 4mm in 2 metres from the required plane. Clean surplus bedding material from joint spaces and tile surface. Ensure joint widths are consistent throughout the installation with 1.5mm width for dust-pressed tiles and 6mm for extruded tiles, measured at the tile face. Ensure joint alignment is consistent throughout the installation and to a tolerance of \pm 4mm in 2 metres from the detailed joint alignment.

3.15 THIN BED FIXING

Apply adhesive to a maximum 3mm bed thickness with a minimum of voids.

Occasionally remove a tile as fixing proceeds to check the maintenance of adequate contact with the adhesive.

Grouting

3.16 APPLY GROUTING

Remove spacers. Apply grouting mix to as large an area as can be worked before setting commences. Work with a grouting tool back and forth until joints are completely filled with no adhesive showing. Avoid damage to the surface of tiles, using masking tape where necessary. Finish to the depth of the cushion and flush with surface to cushion edge and square edge tiles. Remove surplus grout with a damp cloth and tool the joints to finish the grout uniform in colour, smooth and without voids, pinholes or low spots.

Cleaning

3.17 CLEAN TILES

Upon completion of setting and grouting, thoroughly sponge and wash the tiles to leave them completely clean and without blemish. Finally polish glazed tiles with a clean dry cloth.

Completion

3.18 ROUTINE CLEANING

Carry out routine trade cleaning of this part of the work including periodic removal all debris, unused and temporary materials and elements from the site.

3.19 DEFECTIVE OR DAMAGED WORK

Repair damaged or marked elements. Replace damaged or marked elements where repair is not possible or will not be acceptable. Adjust operation of equipment and moving parts not working correctly. Leave work to the standard required for following procedures.

Follow the cork supplier's requirements for working temperatures and conditions before, during and after laying. Protect work from solar heat gain and switch off underfloor heating during and for 48 hours either side of the work period.

3.3 DO NOT START

Do not start work before the building is enclosed, wet work is complete, doors are hung and lockable, finishes and trim complete and good lighting is available.

3.4 INSPECT

Inspect the substrate to ensure it is a suitable finish. Do not start work if it will not allow work of the required standard

3.5 PROTECTION

Protect adjoining work surfaces and finishes during the cork tile installation.

3.6 TECHNIQUE

Before beginning the installation confirm the proposed layout of material, location of seams and other visual considerations of the finished work.

3.7 LAYING GENERALLY

Carry out the whole of this work to NZS/AS 1884, BRANZ BU 330 and the flooring manufacturer's requirements.

Application - substrate preparation

3.8 PREPARING NEW CONCRETE

Clear substrate of debris, clean off surface contamination and carry out surface repairs using a proprietary levelling compound. Carefully feather out at perimeters of repaired areas. Grind level, then vacuum to remove dust. Check for moisture content by hygrometer to BRANZ BU 330 and do not commence laying until readings for the whole area show 75% relative humidity or less.

Application - laying

3.9 CORK TILE PREPARATION

Follow the cork supplier's recommendations for working temperatures and conditions before, during and after laying. Protect work from solar heat gain and switch off underfloor heating during and for 48 hours either side, of the work period.

3.10 CORK APPLICATION

Apply adhesive as required by the supplier of the cork tiles.

3.11 LAY CORK TILES

Lay tiles point to point. Firmly roll on to the adhesive to avoid leaving corners or edges sitting proud.

3.12 LEAVE CORK TILE

Leave cork tile surfaces free of adhesive, dirt and debris.

Timber/plywood with steel grippers to carpet manufacturer's requirements, constructed of sufficient pins and nails so as to withstand a minimum stretching force of 6580N over a 1220 mm length.

EXECUTION

Conditions

3.1 DELIVERY

Take delivery of materials and goods and store on site and protect from damage. Accept rolls of carpet and accessories undamaged and dry.

3.2 HANDLE AND STORE

Handle carpet on flat dollies using carpet cradles, with probes on fork- lifts and without sharp bending or folding. Store carpet in flat bins with a maximum height of three rows. Keep dry. Protect from damage.

3.3 INSPECTION

Before starting work inspect the substrate to ensure that it will allow work of the required standard, and that all fittings and fixtures around which the carpet is to be scribed are in place.

3.4 PROTECTION

Protect adjoining work surfaces and finishes during the carpet installation.

3.5 TAPE

Tape for binding and seaming using type and width required by the carpet manufacturer to suit the specified carpet and the standard of performance required.

3.6 LAYOUT

Plan the general layout so that:

- seams run lengthways

- traffic runs along the seam
- light from windows is not across the seam
- pile faces away from the light source.

3.7 TEMPERATURE

Acclimatise carpet to a room temperature above 15°C through the whole of the installation.

3.8 FLOOR PREPARATION

Prepare floor and check conditions required for laying to AS/NZS 2455.1, section 2.

Application - substrate preparation

3.9 PREPARING NEW CONCRETE FLOOR

To be level, smooth, clean, cured and dry. Remove loose material and dust. Refer to 6192 FLOORING SUBSTRATE PREPARATION.

3.10 PREPARING NEW WOOD PRODUCT FLOOR

To be level, sanded smooth and dry with loose material and dust removed. Check for moisture content and do not commence laying until readings for the whole area show a moisture content of:

8 - 12% for air conditioned buildings

10 - 14% for intermittently heated buildings

12 - 16% for unheated buildings

3.11 INSTALLATION, UNDERLAY

Installation to underlay manufacturer's requirements. Lay at right angles to the carpet direction.

3.12 INSTALLATION, CONVENTIONAL SYSTEM

Tape carpet joints, fix grippers to floor and install underlay and carpet to AS/NZS 2455.1, section 3. Stretch carpet tight in both width and length evenly without bowing, square with walls.

3.13 UNDERLAY TO STAIRS

Cut underlay into pads to cover tread and riser and to the width of the stair carpet less 50mm. Fix to tread and riser to prevent movement and wrinkling.

3.14 LAYING TO STAIRS

Provide a minimum additional length of carpet equivalent to one tread and riser to allow for shifting. Conceal by substituting for the underlay at the top or bottom of the stair flight. Fit stair nosing as detailed and to the nosing manufacturer's requirements.

3.15 FIXING TRIMS

Fix binder bars, carpet to carpet bars, and trims to all junctions with other materials and to carpet edges, to the carpet manufacturer's requirements. Ensure that junctions with other materials are neatly formed, with bars and trim securely fastened to the substrate, 20mm from each end and at a maximum of 100mm centres.

EXECUTION 3.

Conditions

EXECUTION 3.1

To conform to manufacturer's requirements and those methods, practices and techniques contained in AS/NZS 2311, the MPNZA Specification manual, and OSH Guidelines for the provision of facilities and general safety in the construction industry.

3.2 PREPARE

Prepare surfaces to the coating manufacturer's requirements.

COATED SURFACES 3.3

Ensure that substrate surfaces are able to achieve the specified finish.

PRE-PRIMED SURFACES 3.4

Sand down any breakdown or damage of the primer to a sound surface and immediately re-prime.

3.5 BRUSH DOWN

Brush down surfaces immediately before application, to remove dust, dirt and loose material.

3.6 COMPATIBILITY

Check that materials are as required by the paint manufacturers for the particular surface and conditions of exposure, and that they are compatible with each other. Use paint from the same manufacturer for each paint system. If not compatible, obtain instructions before proceeding.

3.7 TREATED SURFACES

Where surfaces have been treated with preservatives or fire retardants, check with the treatment manufacturer that coating materials are compatible with the treatment and do not inhibit its performance. If they are not compatible, obtain instructions before proceeding.

3.8 ANCILLARY SURFACES

The coatings listed in schedules and elsewhere are of necessity simplified. Coat ancillary exposed surfaces to match similar or adjacent materials or areas, except where a fair-faced natural finish is required or items are completely prefinished. In cases of doubt obtain instructions before proceeding.

3.9 HARDWARE

Do not paint hinges or hardware that cannot be removed. If items can be removed, carefully remove hardware, fixtures and fittings before commencing work. Set aside where they cannot be damaged or misplaced and replace on completion.

3.10 PROTECTION

Use dropsheets, coverings and masking necessary to protect adjoining fixtures, fittings and spaces from paint drops, spots, spray and damage.

Preparation - unpainted and pre-primed timber and wood based products

3.11 MOISTURE CONTENT

Ensure moisture content at the time of application is near to the equilibrium moisture content pertaining to the particular locality in which the timber is used, without any excessive moisture content gradient between core and surface.

3.12 PREPARING DRESSED TIMBER

Ensure dressed timber is smooth, free from raised or woolly grain, planing burrs or other machining defects. Slightly round or ease sharp edges to ensure they can be properly coated. Sand timber to bring up to a smooth finish along the direction of the grain. Sand timber back to new condition timber that has been weathered.

3.13 PREPARING ROUGH SAWN TIMBER

Thoroughly brush along the direction of the grain to remove dust and dirt.

3.14 PREPARING PRE-PRIMED TIMBER

Check pre-prime coat for damage, powdering, weathering or loss of adhesion. Where primer is sound, thoroughly brush along the direction of the grain to remove dust and dirt. If there is doubt, sand back and re-prime.

3.15 TIMBER SPECIES

Check that the preparation and paint system is suitable for the timber species.

3.16 PREPARING DAMAGE AND DEFECTS

Scrape clean loose or soft material holes, depressions, resin or gum pockets, knot holes, surface splits, checks, or any localised decay. Apply primer and/or sealer specified and fill these areas with linseed oil putty or other appropriate filler.

3.17 FIXINGS

Take timber fixings below the painted or clear finished surface. Leave corrosion resistant timber fixings flush with clear finished surfaces.

3.18 CLEANING

Remove grease and oil by wiping down with solvent or water-based degreasing agent. Remove resin by wiping down with solvent or water-based degreasing agent or heating and scraping. Remove sanding dust. Bad staining may be untreatable and require replacement of timber, discuss with paint manufacturer and main contractor.

Preparation - unpainted linings

3.19 PREPARING PLASTERBOARD

Check that joints are prepared to a smooth level surface finish. Fill cracks and surface imperfections with the sheet manufacturer's required stopping compound and lightly sand smooth. Remove dust. Surface moisture content not to exceed 12% at time of coating.

Preparation - painted surfaces generally

3.20 SURFACE PREPARATION

Refer to the Manufacturer's specification sheets and product data sheets. Carry out the preparatory work required by them for each of the substrates.

For interior surfaces such as paper faced plasterboard use the Manufacturer's recommended finishing compound as an aid to achieving a Level 5 finish.

3.21 MOULD

Sterilise surface mould by washing or sponging the whole surface with a one part sodium hypochlorite household bleach to three parts clean water solution. Allow bleach to act for 30 minutes and wash off with clean water. Wash cloths and sponges regularly in clean water. Reapplication may be necessary. Treat with anti-mould solution to the treatment manufacturer's requirements.

3.22 GAP FILLING

Fill cracks, holes, indented and damaged surfaces with putty, plaster filler, wood filler, or plastic wood, as appropriate and in accordance with the paint manufacturer's requirements. Allow to dry or set before sanding back level with the surface. Prime coat or seal the timber before using putty. Wet cement or gypsum base plasters before applying filler. Use only Portland cement base types, or water-insoluble organic-based gap fillers in exterior or wet areas.

Application - before applying final coatings

3.23 OFF-SITE WORK

Carry out off-site preparation and coating under cover, in a suitable environment and with adequate lighting. Store items both before and after coating in a clean, dry area, protected from the weather and mechanical damage, properly stacked and spaced to permit air circulation and to prevent sticking of surfaces.

3.24 PRIMING JOINERY

Before priming preservative treated timber ensure that any cut surfaces have been retreated. Liberally coat end grain, allow to soak in and then recoat. Ensure LOSP. treated joinery has dried sufficiently to lose odour.

3.25 CONCEALED JOINERY SURFACES

Apply off-site coatings to all surfaces including those which will be concealed when incorporated into the building.

3.26 CONCEALED METAL SURFACES

Apply primer to suit the coating system to all metal surfaces which will be concealed when incorporated into the building.

3.27 DOORS

Prime or seal and paint all six faces of doors before hanging.

Application - generally

3.28 PAINTING GENERALLY

Comply with the paint manufacturer's requirements and any additional requirements in this specification.

3.29 MIXING

Thoroughly mix paints. Lift any settled pigment and ensure the paint is homogenous.

3.30 ENVIRONMENT

Paint exterior surfaces only in favourable weather conditions:

- warm dry days without frost or heavy dews
- avoid painting in direct sunlight any surfaces that absorb heat excessively
- as far as possible apply paint in the temperature range 15°C to 25°C
- do not paint if temperatures fall outside the range of 10°C and 35°C unless paints with the necessary temperature tolerance have been specified
- do not apply solvent borne paint if moisture is present on the surface

3.31 SEQUENCE OF OPERATIONS

Painting work to generally follow the following sequences:

- complete surface preparation before commencing painting
- apply paint in the specified sequence using the specified paint
- allow full drying time between coats to the paint manufacturer's requirements
- do not expose primers, undercoats and intermediate coats beyond manufacturers stated instructions before applying the next coat
- finish broad areas before painting trim
- ensure batch numbers of tins are matched for whole areas
- internally, paint ceilings before walls and walls before joinery, trim and other items

3.32 PAINT APPLICATIONS

Select brush, roller, or pad and apply paint to the requirements of the paint manufacturer and to obtain a smooth even coating of correct thickness, uniform gloss and colour.

3.33 DRYING TIME

Before handling or applying the next coat of paint, give each coat the full drying time as required by the paint manufacturer. Ensure that surfaces are dry and that condensation does not occur before the paint reaches surface-dry condition.

3.34 LIGHTLY SAND

Lightly sand primers, sealers, undercoats and intermediate coats to remove dust pick-up, protruding fibres and coarse particles. Remove dust immediately before applying the next coat.

3.35 DEFECTIVE WORK

Correct defective work immediately and re-coat as required, following precisely the paint system specified.

3.36 EACH COAT

Each coat of paint and the completed paint system to have the following qualities and properties:

- uniform finish, colour, texture, sheen and hiding power
- the specified number of coats applied
- no blemishes such as runs, sags, crinkling, fat edges, entrained paint skins, hairs, dust, bare or starved patches, cracks, brush marks, ladder marks and blistering
- proper covering of corners, crannies, thin edges, cracks, end grain and other difficult places of application

Completion

3.37 CLEAN

Clean adjoining surfaces, glass and fittings of any paint contamination. Clean off glass indicators at completion of the building works. Clean glass inside and out to a shining finish.

3.38 CLEAN EQUIPMENT

Use the Manufacturer's environmental wash system for the cleaning of water-based paint and plasters from brushes, rollers, plastering or spray equipment to separate the solids from the water component for safe disposal.

3.39 LEAVE

Leave the whole of this work uniform in gloss and colour, of correct thickness, free from painting defects, clean and unmarked and to the standard required by following procedures.

3.40 REMOVE

Remove dropsheets, coverings and masking to leave surrounding surfaces and areas clean, tidy and undamaged. Remove debris, unused materials and elements from the site.

2.1 RAINWATER STORAGE TANK

Above ground tank manufactured from polyethylene to AS/NZS 4766 and to AS 2070.
 Tanks to be fitted with a secure fitting lid to provide internal access for cleaning or inspection.

Accessories

2.2 TANK FITTINGS

Fittings kit supplied with the tank for complete installation.

2.3 UPVC PIPES AND FITTINGS

Unplasticised PVC pipe and fittings to AS/NZS 1260.

2.4 POLYETHYLENE PIPES AND FITTINGS

High density polyethylene pipe and fittings to AS/NZS 4130.

2.5 WATER PUMP

Pump designed to pressurised water supply from tank into the building.

2.6 TANK VENT

Vent with insect proof stainless steel mesh fitted on top of the tank.

2.7 FIRST FLUSH WATER DIVERTER

Wall mounted or underground system specific to installation. To prevent the first flow of water from the roof entering the water storage tank.

2.8 FILTER SYSTEM

Inline cartridge filter housing fitted between the first flush diverter and the inlet, or a 955 micron filter tank screen system fitted within the tank.

2.9 TANK VACUUM SYSTEM

Designed to suck from the bottom of the tank when the tank is full to overflowing. System to include anti siphon device.

Uniseals for pipe connections to the top of the tank.

2.10 TANK BASE BEDDING

Clean sand or concrete 100 to 150mm thick.

2.11 CONCRETE

To NZS 3104: Prescribed mix 17.5 MPa: For in situ tank base and water pump pad.

EXECUTION

Conditions

3.1 SITE ACCESS

Transportation on site to the position of the tank is at the risk and responsibility of the contractor. Make provision for manoeuvring and unloading of tank

Application - site

3.2 SITE EXCAVATION FOR ABOVE GROUND TANK

Select level site, free of sharp protrusions. Form solid pad with a bed of sand or concrete, screeded level to a minimum depth of 50mm. Extend pad 500mm pass base of tank. On a sloping site excavate fully into bank and provide 600mm clearance from the tank to the base of the cut. Do not place tank on any fill, over in ground pipes, cables or underground structures.

3.3 ABOVE GROUND TANK INSTALLATION

Position tank on the prepared compacted level base.

3.4 LAYING AND JOINTING

Lay in straight lines between changes of line or grade from the lower end of the drain with sockets pointing uphill. Set each pipe true to line and grade and each joint completed before the next pipe is laid.

Application - fittings

3.5 WATER PUMP INSTALLATION

Install pump on a solid base bolted down through base plate. Place weather tight housing over the pump and secure to base. Connect to water supply and power supply

3.6 BACK FLOW PREVENTION DEVICES

Install to AS/NZS 2845.1, to AS/NZS 3500.1 and to NZBC G12/AS1.

Application - connections

3.7 FIRST FLUSH WATER DIVERTER

Install either adjacent to the tank or underground, first flush water diverter. Connect downpipes from the roof gutter to the first flush water diverter. Connect the first flush diverter to the top of the tank. Refer to manufacturer's installation details.

3.8 FILTER INSTALLATION

Install proprietary in-line filter before the inlet connection.

3.9 INLET CONNECTION

Install inlet pipe into top of tank at manufacturer's designated mounting area using a Uniseal type connection.

3.10 OUTLET CONNECTION

Install pipe to manufacturer's installation details. To the outlet connect a floating arm draw-off to deliver water from 100mm below the surface. From the base connection run a flexible hose to the pump. Install ball valve in line between base connection and water pump. Support all pipework at outlet.

3.11 OVERFLOW PIPE

Install pipe to manufacturer's installation details and connect into stormwater system or directed away from base of tank into garden.

3.12 PIPE SEALS

Insert Uniseals in clean cut holes of the correct size. Insert Uniseal into hole with widespread facing the pipe to be inserted. Lubricate the pipe with detergent and push through the Uniseal. Use only on top of tank connections.

3.13 ELECTRICAL CONNECTION

Installation to AS/NZS 3000. Allow to connect up water pump and water treatment unit to the power supply as provided.

Commissioning

3.14 POST INSTALLATION TESTING

Tempering valve to comply with NZS 4617 Tempering (3-port mixing) valve and NZBC G12/AS1, 5.0 Water supplies, G12/AS1, table 4, G12/AS1, figure 16, and G12/AS1, 6.14 Safe water temperatures.

2.4 CIRCULATING PUMP

Electrical circulating pump complete with pressure switch, electrical connections and fittings.

2.5 TEMPERATURE CONTROL PANEL

Proprietary control panel with temperature sensors to automatically control the use of the circulating pump.

2.6 TIME CLOCK

Proprietary time clock suitable to automatically control the use of the electric booster to the water storage cylinder.

3. EXECUTION

Conditions

3.1 DELIVERY

Take delivery of the solar water heating system and all accessories. Reject any damaged components.

3.2 STORAGE

Store materials and accessories on a level, firm base, in dry conditions, out of direct sunlight and completely protected from weather and damage. Ensure storage areas are away from current work areas. Cover to keep dry until installed.

3.3 BUILDING STRUCTURE

Confirm the building structure is to the standard required by the manufacturer's accredited installer for the installation of the solar water heating system. Install the unit on a roof area that has been constructed to NZS 3604, section 10, **Roof framing** and NZBC B1/AS1, and be capable to take the filled weight of the unit.

3.4 CONFIRM LAYOUT

Before commencing work confirm the proposed location of solar water heating collector, layout of pipe runs and positions of valves and pumps.

3.5 CO-ORDINATE SERVICES

Co-ordinate and co-operate with other sub-trades to avoid any conflict with the installation of the system with other subcontractors work.

3.6 PROTECT SURFACES

Protect surfaces, equipment and finishes already in place from the possibility of damage during the installation process.

3.7 INSTALLATION

Install solar water heating system to required configurations and to the (MoBIE) DBH Solar water heaters - Guidance for supplies, installers and building consent authorities - December 2009.

Locate the heater as close as possible to the most frequently used hot water outlet. Locate in a position as close as possible to the existing hot water heater in pre-heater configurations. Install the solar water heater at least 2.5 metres above the highest hot water outlet to be serviced to provide adequate flow. Complete installation of the solar water heating system to AS/NZS 3500.4, 6 Installation of solar water heaters.

3.8 POSITIONING OF COLLECTOR

To NZBC G12/AS1, 4.0 Location of Solar Water Heaters. Locate the solar water heating collector so as to be clear of shade 3 hours either side of solar noon at any time of the year. Install at an angle \pm 20° of the angle of latitude and facing as close as possible to true north. Position the unit as high as possible on the roof to provide the greatest head of water.

3.9 MOUNTING OF COLLECTOR

Install the solar water heating collector to the manufacturer's installation manual, either directly to the roof structure or on a suitable designed frame fixed to the roof structure. Do not rely on the pipe connections for structural strength. To fix the unit to a roof in non-cyclonic conditions select a position on the roof, free of shade of at least 3 metres square. For a tiled roof remove a row of tiles above the unit to expose the rafters, move the unit into place and secure the stainless steel straps to the unit using the M10 bolts supplied. Screw the straps into the rafters and replace the tiles. For a profiled steel roof secure the straps as for a tiled roof. Fix the straps through the peak of the roofing profile into a purlin below using self-tapping stainless steel screws. Isolate the fixing straps from the roofing material with a strip of neoprene rubber.

For fixing solar water heating systems in cyclonic locations use brackets that comply with AS/NZS 1170.2.

3.10 PLUMBING CONNECTIONS

Plumbing connections are to be carried out by a registered plumber and are to comply with AS 3500.1, 2 Materials and products and to AS3500.4, 2 Materials and products and the manufacturer's installation manual.

3.11 WET BACK CONNECTION FOR OPEN VENTED INSTALLATION

Connect wetback from a solid fuel heater to the solar water heating system. The piping between the solar water heating system and the wet back to be at least 20mm diameter. Kept pipe length to a minimum. The pipe returning from the wet back outlet to the solar water heating system should not at any location be less than a 30° angle to the horizontal plane. No valves or constrictions are allowed in the inlet or outlet path between the solar water heating system and the wet back. Fit a thermostat and solenoid valve set at a maximum temperature of 90°C to provide over-heating protection.

3.12 INSTALL ELECTRIC CIRCULATING PUMP

Install primary circulating pump and controller, to draw the colder water from the lower section of the container and to circulate the water through the collectors before returning it to the container. Support the pump rigidly on a properly designed base and the piping system arranged so that no perceptible vibration is transmitted to the collector or the building. Fit the controller in an accessible position with a warning notice affixed to the inside of the controller box showing the voltage used, the control wiring diagram and identification of control components fitted and the name of the supplier.

3.13 TEMPERING VALVES

Install the tempering valve that is part of the system. Where a circulating pump is installed then the tempering valve must be fitted after the circulating pump. Where a circulating pump is not fitted then a regulating device may need to be fitted to the cold water inlet to the tempering valve to avoid a large differential pressure between hot and cold water supplies. Fit a non return valve to the tempering valve.

3.14 ELECTRICAL CONNECTIONS

Connect the solar water heating system with a fixed wiring connection to the weatherproof junction box positioned at the top of the installation. Run wiring in either metal or uPVC conduit. The electrical circuit to have an isolating switch fitted at the electrical switch board to provide a means of isolating the installation in compliance with AS/NZS 3350 1 7.12.2. The element requires a 10 amp single-phase electrical supply for the 1.2kW and 2.4kW elements, or a 15 amp single-phase electrical supply for the 3.6kW element.

Ensure that the cold water inlet pipe and the hot water outlet pipe are earthed. Fill the storage tank with water before the power supply is turned on.

3.15 INSTALL TIME CLOCK

Install a time clock in a position for easy access.

3.16 FROST PROTECTION

Fit frost protection mechanism to the solar water heating system to the manufacturer's recommendations.

Commissioning

3.17 POST INSTALLATION TESTING

Test and commission the completed system to manufacturer's installation manual and AS/NZS 3500.4, 11 Testing and commissioning.

3.18 CLEANING

Bond together and to earth all plumbing fittings not adequately isolated, to AS/NZS 3000; the Electricity (Safety) Regulations 2010 and the fitting manufacturer's requirements.

3.6 MAIN EARTH

Provide a plastic toby box or uPVC tube to contain and protect the earth pin. Fix the connecting earth wiring closely and securely against wall surfaces.

3.7 EARTH LEAKAGE PROTECTION

RCD protection installed to AS/NZS 3000.

3.8 DOMESTIC INSTALLATIONS

Install RCD protection 30mA at the distribution board for all final sub circuits controlling socket outlets or lighting points, or directly connected hand held electrical equipment to AS/NZS 3000.

3.9 HIGH RISK AREA INSTALLATIONS

Use fixed wired RCD protected socket outlets to 30mA or 10mA in areas that may represent increased risk of electric shock to the user:

- Areas frequented by infants (AS/NZS 3000 recommends 10mA)
- Wet areas: bathrooms, laundries, kitchens
- Near pools and water features
- Where intended for use with cleaning equipment
- Hand held tools subject to movement in use, i.e. workshops, garages

3.10 SET-OUT

Unless specifically detailed, the position of outlets and equipment shown on drawings is indicative of requirements. Study documents and site conditions to ensure no conflict with other services or features will arise. Resolve conflicts and discrepancies before proceeding with work affected. Confirm on site the exact location, disposition and mounting heights of all outlets, fittings, equipment, penetrations, and use of exposed wiring. Fix outlet items level, plumb and in line.

3.11 CABLING

Install wiring systems to AS/NZS 3000.3

Adhere to this standard at all times to all requirements.

Basic requirements or recommendations:

All cabling run concealed. No TPS cable laid directly in concrete. Locate holes in timber framing for the passage of cables at the centre line of the timber member. Install cable in conduits where required to pass through concrete or underground. In walls run cabling horizontally and vertically in straight lines. In ceilings either run cabling along ceiling framing or attached to catenary wires. Clip cabling to ceiling framing/catenary wires.

3.12 CABLING CIRCUITS

Install all circuits with the appropriately rated cable and circuit protection. Install with a maximum of 8 light switch units or 4 double or single switched socket units on any circuit. Minimum 2 lighting circuits per floor. Separate circuits for all electric heating appliances. Kitchen sockets to be on at least two different circuits.

3.13 WALL BOXES

Flush mounted in cavity construction and selected as appropriate to fit products to be mounted. Fix vertically mounted wall boxes to studs. Fix horizontally mounted switched socket outlet wall boxes to solid blocking or nogs. Fix switch panel wall boxes to solid blocking.

3.14 SWITCH AND SOCKET UNITS

Fit all single and double switch units and socket at the following heights (to the centre of the unit) unless shown otherwise on the drawings.

Switch units:

1000mm

Socket units:

150mm above work benches

400mm elsewhere

Mount light switches and switch socket outlets vertically and socket units horizontally. Label all switch units that control electrical equipment or special lighting circuits by colour filled engraving on the switch.

3.15 ISOLATING SWITCHES

Locate isolating switches in agreed positions when not specifically shown on the drawings.

3.16 LIGHT FITTINGS

Install light fittings in locations and at heights detailed, and in accordance with the fitting manufacturer's requirements.

3.17 EXTRA LOW VOLTAGE LIGHTING

Where remote transformers are used for ELV lamps, connect from transformer to lamp with minimum 2.5mm² conductor, to ensure voltage drop in transformer and conductor

does not exceed 0.8 volts. Lamps rated at 50 watt or greater to be wired so as to connect no more than one lamp per transformer, located as close as practicable to the lamp. Ensure transformers and rear of light fittings are adequately ventilated and clear of any thermal insulation.

3.18 RECESSED LIGHT FITTINGS - CLEARANCE TO INSULATION

Non-residential applications:

The clearance between insulation and recessed downlights:

- Leave 100mm gap to AS/NZS 3000, figure 4.9.
- Provide larger gaps where required by the downlight manufacturer.

Residential applications:

- Ensure new recessed downlights are one of the new classes classified in AS/NZS 60598.2.2; CA 80, CA 135, IC and IC - F.
- Classification type CA 80, CA 135, to AS/NZS 60598.2.2; insulation can abut the sides (wrapping around the sides)
- Classification type IC and IC F, to AS/NZS 60598.2.2; insulation can abut and cover over the top of the downlight
- Provide larger gaps where required by the light manufacturer.
- In a retrofit situation where the insulation is non-approved or unknown, ensure 100mm clearance from the insulation to AS/NZS 3000, figure 4.9.

3.19 HOT WATER SYSTEM

Wire as a separate circuit through a wall-mounted isolating switch, with the cable from switch to element encased in flexible PVC conduit, clamp fixed at each end. Hot water cylinders, thermostats and 3000 watt element supplied and fitted as specified under the hot and cold water system section/s.

3.20 TELEPHONE WIRING

Install telephone cable to telephone outlet positions shown on the drawings. Install in conduit for outlets on masonry surface. Fix and connect outlets to NZ Telecom requirements and terminate wiring at incoming terminal block.

3.21 DATA WIRING

Install data wiring to outlet positions shown on the drawings. Install in conduit for outlets on masonry surface.

3.22 TV CABLING

Run cabling concealed below the roof and fit outlets where shown on the electrical drawings. Ensure the system is suitable for high quality reception of all VHF and UHF channels - Sky TV installation practices minimum. Cable penetrations through the cladding to be weatherproofed to comply with NZBC E2/AS1.

3.23 SMOKE ALARMS

Install smoke alarms to NZBC F7/AS1 and to the alarm manufacturer's requirements, fitted neatly and without damage to the surrounding finish.

3.24 SURGE PROTECTION

Install surge protection devices to manufacturer's requirements and in accordance with AS/NZS 3000. When fitting medium protection at the switchboard, protect the device by a dedicated MCB.

3.25 ELECTRIC POWERED FITTINGS AND EQUIPMENT

Install and wire fittings and equipment to individual fittings and equipment manufacturer's requirements. Refer to the drawings for required layouts and locations for equipment. Refer to SELECTIONS for schedules of fittings.

3.26 BATHROOM ELECTRICAL FIXTURES

Install electrical fixtures specified in other parts of this specification. Connect the following bathroom and toilet electrical items:

Heated towel rails: Install to manufacturers requirements and installed in accordance with AS/NZS 3000 and NZBC G9/AS1.

Exhaust fans: Install exterior ducted fans to manufacturer requirements. Installed in accordance with AS/NZS 3000 and NZBC G4/AS1.

Security System

3.27 SECURITY SYSTEM

Install to the system manufacturer's requirements, control panel, detectors and associated equipment fitted neatly and without damage to surrounding finishes. Installation of security equipment to AS/NZS 2201.1 Intruder alarm systems - Client's premises - Design, installation, commissioning and maintenance. All 230V mains power connections to the security panel are to be in accordance with AS/NZS 3100. The 230V power is to be switched using a Schneider single gang isolator switch or similar.

3.28 COMPLETION

Leave installation operating correctly, with equipment clean and all lamps operational.

E2/AS1 allows corrugate to be used vertically on walls with a risk matrix of 19, but the 18 mm rib height and loser lap detail on corrugate are not as effective as the 36 mm rib height and tighter overlap of the LT7 profile, in providing better weather tightness.

The open ribs of LT7 will allow an air passage up the profile, should condensation require drying.

Having viewed the elevations and details as supplied by Mike Robertson, A.D.Architecture, We recommend flashings cover the wall cladding a minimum cover of 100 mm. and the LT7 is stop ended.

Provided this is achieved, Dimond confirm the LT7 used as vertical wall cladding, on a non cavity wall, will meet the performance criteria in clause E2 of the New Zealand Building code, for a period of not less than 15 years provided it is maintained in line with the guidelines and details contained in The Dimond current literature.

This covers the cladding against perforation as a result of corrosion for a period of 15 years. This statement is based on over 30 years past performance of the LT7 profile in N.Z. used as both commercial and residential applications.
