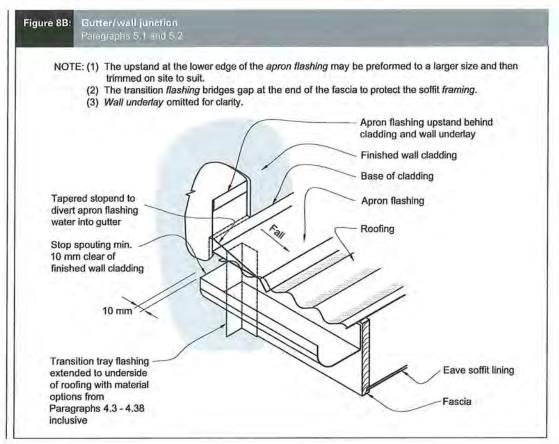

### 5.2 Gutters, barges and fascias

Where *eaves* gutters/spoutings, barges or fascias terminate against *claddings*, these shall be installed after the wall *cladding*, and after any protective finishes have been applied.

Eaves gutters/spouting, barges and fascias shall terminate so as to leave a gap of 10 mm from the finished wall cladding as shown in Figure 8B.

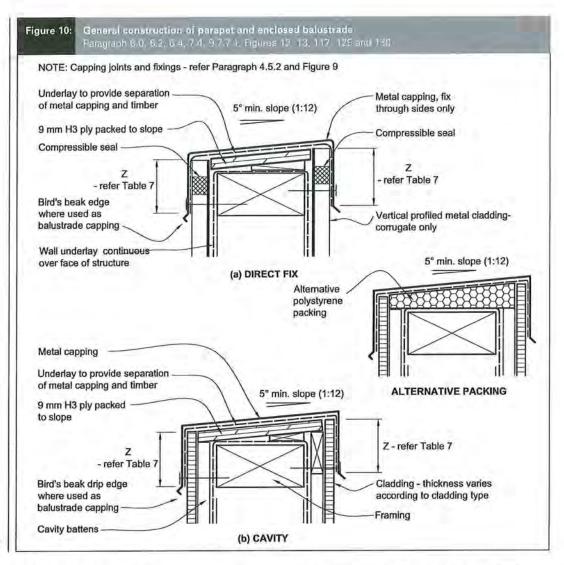
### COMMENT:

Amend 5 Aug 2011 It is important to ensure the wall cladding behind eaves gutters/spoutings, barges and fascias is protected by the surface coating to prevent moisture penetration through the unsealed cladding.

### 5.3 Soffits

Eaves shall be enclosed by installing soffit linings direct fixed to framing and comprising minimum 4.5 mm fibre cement sheet, or 7 mm H3 plywood, with joints, fixings and finishes as shown in Paragraphs 9.7 and 9.8. Soffit linings shall be finished to fascias, barges and wall claddings as outlined in Figure 8A generally, or Figure 114 for flush finished fibre cement. Wall underlays shall not be required behind soffit linings.

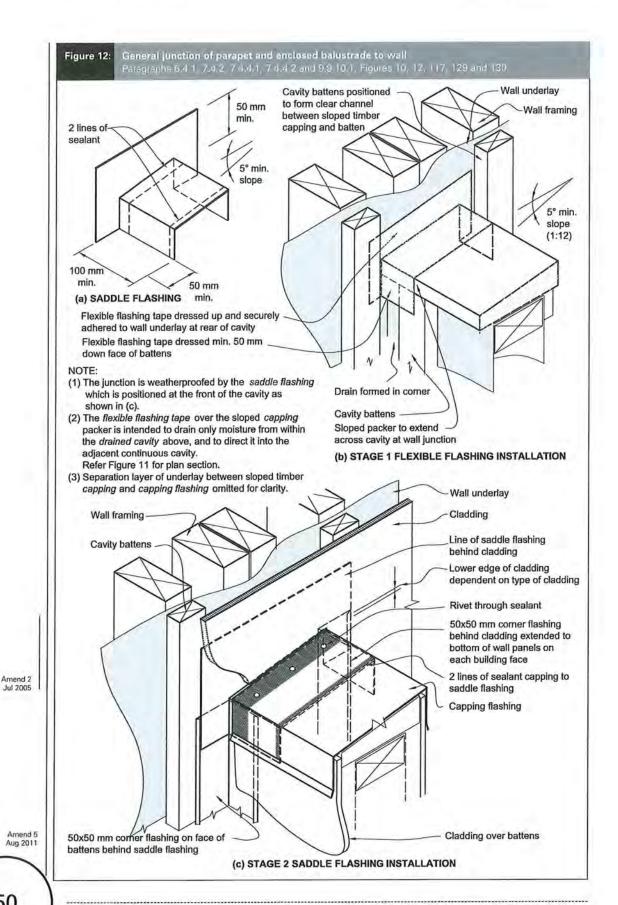

### 6.4 Metal cappings

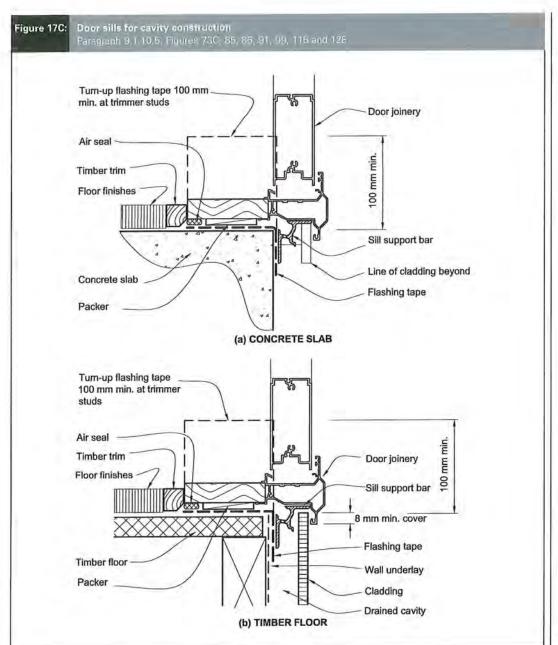
Metal cappings installed over parapets and enclosed balustrades, shall be as outlined in Paragraphs 6.0 and 7.4, and comply with the following requirements:

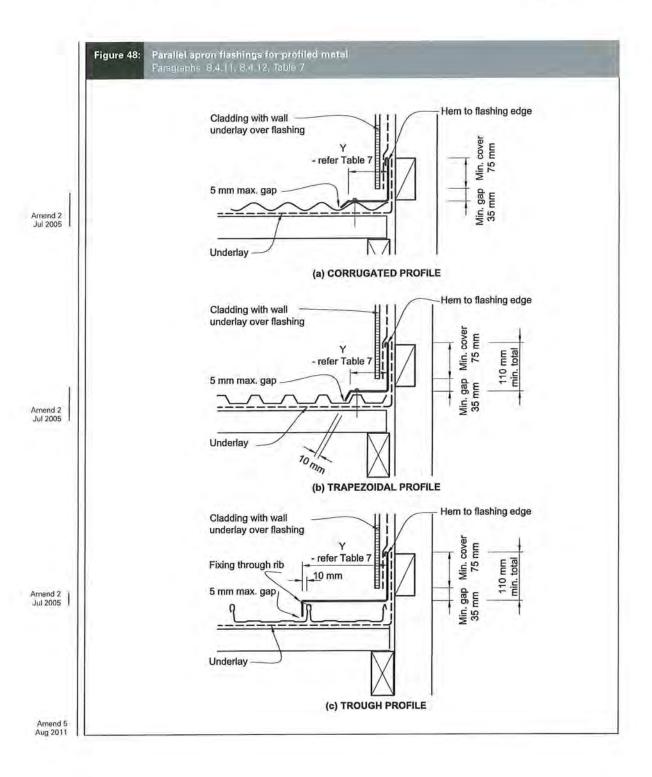
- Tops of cappings shall be free of any penetrations,
- b) Slope of top shall be 5° (1:12) minimum,
- c) The cover at the sides of the capping shall be in accordance with Table 7,

- d) All cappings shall have drip edges. The details shown in Figure 5 are acceptable minimum drip edges for parapets,
- e) Cappings shall be separated from underlying timber by roof underlay as shown in Figure 10,
- f) Lengths of capping shall be joined as shown in Figure 9 (b) or Figure 9 (d),
- g) External corners of cappings shall be as shown in Figure 9 (e),
- h) Expansion joints shall be provided for joined cappings with a combined length exceeding:

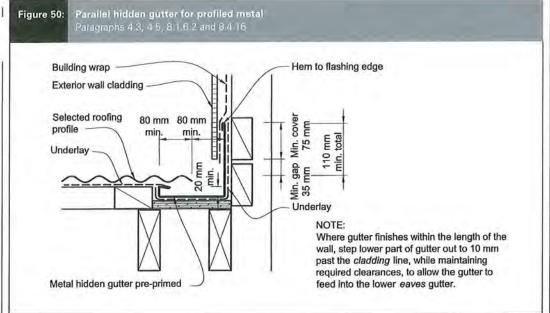

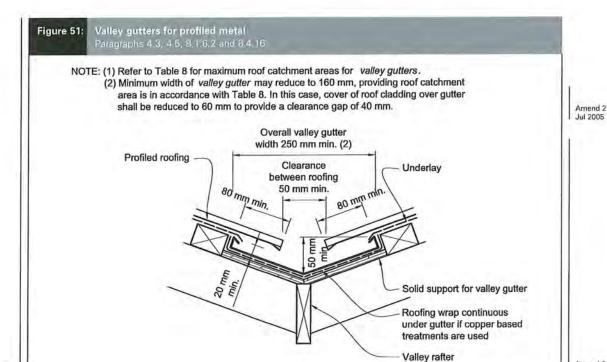

### 8.5 Membrane Roofs and Decks

### 8.5.1 Limitations

This Acceptable Solution is limited to membranes composed of butyl or *EPDM* installed over plywood substrates for:

a) Roofs with a minimum fall of 2° (1:30),

- b) Decks with:
  - i) a minimum fall of 1.5° (1:40),
  - ii) a maximum area of 40 m<sup>2</sup>,

- iii) no steps in level within deck area except into gutters,
- iv) no integral roof gardens, and
- v) no downpipe direct discharge to deck,

c) Internal gutters with a minimum fall of 1 in 100, with no cross seams in the gutters, and

 d) Decks with removable raised surfaces to give level access as shown in Figure 17A.

The application of directly applied wearing or decorative surfaces to *membranes* is not covered in this Acceptable Solution.

### COMMENT:

EPDM and butyl rubber membranes are subject to damage when on trafficable roof-decks. A suitable wearing surface will help reduce such damage.

Increases in slopes from the previous version recognise deflection tolerances in NZS 3604 and in-service loadings by *building* owners.

### 8.5.2 General

Amend 2 Jul 2005 Closed-in construction spaces under membrane roofs and decks require adequate ventilation to prevent the accumulation of moisture under the membrane. Maintain a minimum gap of 20 mm between the underside of the substrate and any insulation, and for membrane roofs greater than 40 m<sup>2</sup>, refer to manufacturer's details for roof cavity vents and/or substrate vent requirements.

COMMENT:

Refer to Paragraph 1.5 for qualification of installers.

### 8.5.3 Plywood substrates

Plywood shall be:

- a) A minimum of 17 mm complying with AS/NZS 2269,
- b) At least CD Grade Structural plywood with the sanded C face upwards, and
- c) H3 with treatment type compatible with membrane and adhesives used, and kiln dried after treatment.

The compatibility of LOSP-treated timber must be checked with *membrane* suppliers.

### 8.5.4 Butyl and EPDM

Butyl rubber and *EPDM* rubber sheet and system components used for *membrane* roofing or *decks* shall:

  - ii) 1.5 mm for decks, and

- c) Have adhesives, primers, seam tapes and pre-formed components where supplied by the manufacturer that:

- are part of a complete system approved by the manufacturer or supplier of the membrane.

### 8.5.5 Installation

### 8.5.5.1 Plywood

Substrates must be dry when *membranes* are applied. The plywood and timber substructure must be a maximum moisture content of 20% when a *membrane* is adhered.

This will generally require substrates to be covered to prevent rain wetting, or to be pre-primed to avoid moisture uptake.

Manufacturers' recommendations should be consulted, as some require a lower moisture content in order to validate guarantees.

Plywood substrates shall be fixed according to the following requirements:

- a) Panels shall be laid with staggered joints (brick bond),
- b) Panels shall be laid with the face grain at right angles to the main supports,
- c) Supports in b) shall be at 400 mm maximum centres,
- d) The edge of sheets shall be supported with dwangs or framing,
- e) External edges shall be chamfered with a minimum radius of 5 mm,
- f) A 20 mm H3.2 triangular fillet shall be used at the base of any 90° upstand, and
- g) Shall be fixed:
  - i) with 3 mm gaps between all sheets,
  - i) using 10 g x 50 mm stainless steel countersunk head screws,
  - iii) at 150 mm centres on edges, and
  - iv) at 200 mm centres in the body of the sheets.

### 8.5.5.2 Butyl and EPDM

Seam tapes shall be used on all joints of:

a) Roofs or decks with falls less than 5° (1:12),

- Penetrations through the membrane where butyl or EPDM flashing is required,
- d) EPDM membrane, and
- e) Butyl membranes that contain EPDM.

### COMMENT:

Coloured butyl membranes contain EPDM, which makes them more difficult to adhere properly.

Seams should be aligned parallel to the fall of the deck to minimise ponding.

Where a penetration is made through the *membrane* subsequent to laying, the *flashing* should be installed by the applicator of the *membrane* system.

All joints in the plywood and junctions of plywood with other materials shall have 25 mm polyethylene release tape applied before application of the *membrane*.

### 8.5.6 Roof and deck drainage

Membrane roofs and decks shall be constructed to provide:

- a) Falls as shown in Figure 56 and details in Figures 57–64
- b) A minimum of 100 mm below an adjoining threshold as shown in Figure 62
- c) Membrane upstands against all walls, parapets, or enclosed balustrades extending to a minimum level of 150 mm above deck level as shown in Figure 62.

### COMMENT:

If the clearance of the *cladding* from the *deck* or *roof* surface is at the minimum of 35 mm, give an overlap of 115 mm to the *cladding*.

- d) Water discharging either:
  - i) into a roof or gutter outlet with a minimum diameter of 75 mm as shown in Figure 64 with either:
    - · an overflow as shown in Figure 63 (c) or
    - an extra outlet, with both outlets sized to take the full required capacity.
       or.

- ii) a scupper, into a gutter, or rainwater head, as shown in Figure 63 (a) and (b).
- e) Gutters formed with continuous butyl or *EPDM* strip complying with Paragraph 4.3.9, with no cross-joints.

COMMENT:

Refer to E1/AS1 for specific drainage requirements outside the scope of this Acceptable Solution.

Seams in gutters are particularly difficult to form at outlets through *enclosed balustrade walls*, and the risk of failure is high. Failure of a seam can result in damage to underlying *walls*.

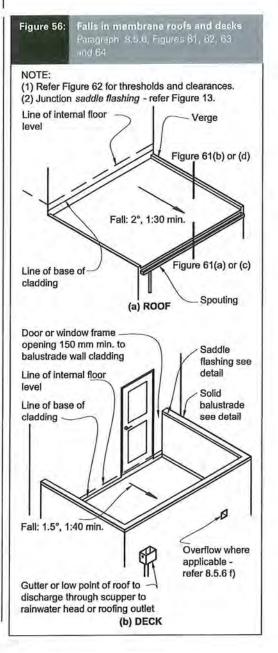

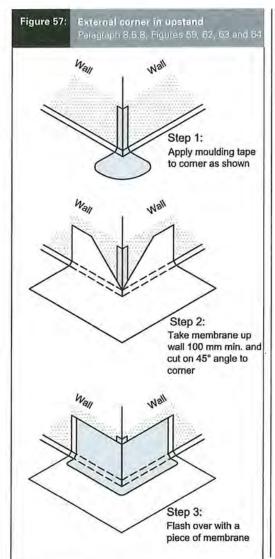

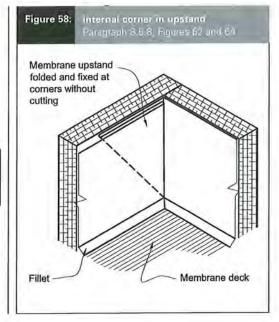

### 8.5.8 Junctions

All junctions of *roof* or *deck* to *walls*, *parapets* and *enclosed balustrades* shall be made *weathertight* using the following appropriate details:

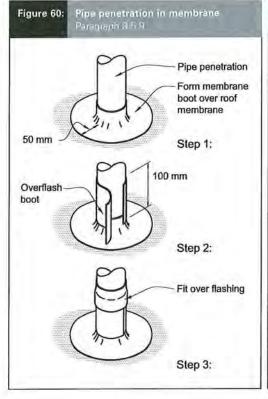
- a) Figure 57: External corner in upstands,
- b) Figure 58: Internal corner in upstands,
- c) Figure 61: Verges and eaves,
- d) Figure 62: Junctions of decks and walls, and
- e) Drainage details to Paragraph 8.5.6.

### Wall Claddings

### General

Wall claddings shall meet the requirements of NZBC E2.3.2 to E2.3.7, and comply with the provisions of Paragraph 9.1.1 to Paragraph 9.9.

Claddings in Extra High wind zones require:

- a) Rigid underlays to Paragraph 9.1.7.2
- b) Drained cavities to Paragraph 9.1.8
- c) Hooks and hems on flashing upstands, and additional 25 mm height to Paragraph 4.6.

### 9.1.1 Limitations

This Acceptable Solution is limited to the wall cladding systems listed in Paragraph 3.3. Table 3 lists wall cladding systems that shall be used for buildings with varying risk scores.

The method of establishing the level of risk associated with the use of a specific wall cladding is given in Paragraph 3.1. Based on this risk score, a wall cladding may require the inclusion of a drained cavity as described in Paragraph 9.1.8.

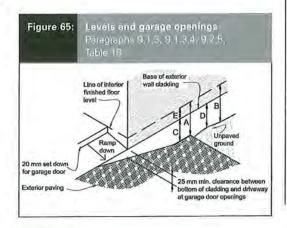
Clearances to roof claddings and decks shall be minimum 35 mm - refer to Table 7 and Figure 18.

Clearances shall be measured to:

- a) The finished plane of any adjacent horizontal surface, or
- b) The top surface of any adjacent sloped or horizontal apron flashing.

This keeps the bottom edge of the cladding dry, and allows cleaning and painting of the bottom surfaces.

### 9.1.3.1 Concrete slabs

Slab levels shall be set to allow reinstatement of final landscaped ground levels as outlined in Figure 65 and Table 18.

NZS 3604 may require greater ground clearances depending on floor type and materials.

- b) Overlap the concrete slab by 50 mm, and
- c) Be offset horizontally by a minimum of 6 mm for *direct fixed claddings* to prevent capillary action.

9.1.3.4 Garages and openings to garages

- d) linings to garage walls adjoining habitable spaces
- e) weather resisting garage doors
- f) window and door details (where included) to Paragraphs 9.2 to 9.9.

- b) For walls with direct fixed claddings,
   be offset horizontally from a concrete foundation wall by a minimum of 6 mm
- c) Have no direct connection between subfloor spaces and drained cavities.

Where claddings require drained cavities, care must be taken to ensure air from the subfloor space cannot enter the cavity. This is important, as moisture levels in subfloor air can be high.

### 9.1.4 Barriers to airflow

This Acceptable Solution requires external walls to have barriers to airflow, in the form of:

- a) Interior linings with all joints stopped for wind zones up to Very High, or
- Rigid underlays (and drained cavities) for buildings in Extra High wind zones – refer to Paragraph 9.1.7.2
- c) Where walls are not lined, such as attic spaces at gable ends, an air barrier complying with Table 23, fixed to framing prior to fixing cladding or cavity battens
- d) For attached garages, underlays to Paragraph 9.1.3.4.

### COMMENT:

The primary function of air barriers and air seals is to moderate airflows at junctions and inside the wall cavity.

Airflows in certain weather conditions encourage significant amounts of water to move along their path, and it is therefore important to manage airflow in *cavity walls* with barriers and *air seals*.

In the absence of internal *linings*, an air barrier is required to support wind pressures at locations such as gable ends and unlined garage spaces. Air pressure drop is not always across the internal *lining*, indicating the wall underlay acts as an air barrier as well.

Window, door and other penetration openings shall be provided with flexible air seals to minimise the risk of airflows carrying water into the building wall. The air seal shall be:

- a) Provided between the reveal or frame and the wrapped opening (for example of use, refer to Figure 81),
- b) Installed over a closed cell polyethylene foam (PEF) backing rod, or similar

- c) Made of:
  - i) self-expanding polyurethane foam, or
  - ii) sealant complying with:

### COMMENT:

Some sealants can react with bitumen based *flashing* tape, preventing full curing of the sealant. Where necessary, consult sealant manufacturers for application requirements.

Backing rods are used for sealant and for self-expanding polyurethane foam as there is a danger foam will expand to the outside of the *wall* and form a moisture bridge to the interior.

For further information refer to ASTM C1330 for backing rod material performance.

### 9.1.7 Wall underlay

- **9.1.7.1** Flexible *wall underlays* shall be in accordance with Table 23, and shall:
- a) Be run horizontally,
- b) Have upper sheets lapped over lower sheets to ensure that direction of laps will allow water to be shed to outside of the wall underlay,

- be lapped not less than 75 mm at horizontal joints,
- d) Be lapped not less than 150 mm over studs at vertical joints, and
- e) Extend 35 mm below bottom plate or bearer,

- **9.1.7.2** Rigid wall underlays, in association with drained cavities (including direct fixed corrugated profiled metal), are required in Extra High wind zones. Refer to Table 3 and Table 23. Rigid underlays are also required to external walls of attached garages that are unlined. Refer Paragraphs 1.1.1 and 9.1.3.4 c).

Rigid wall underlays shall be in accordance with Table 23, and shall:

- a) Be minimum 7 mm H3 plywood, or 6 mm fibre cement sheet
- b) Be installed with sheet edges fixed over solid framing
- c) Be over-fixed with a flexible wall underlay from Table 23 and installed as in Paragraph 9.1.7.1

Some proprietary systems may not require the addition of a flexible *underlay* 

- d) Have flexible underlay folded into opening reveals as in Paragraph 9.1.5 a)
- e) Have cavity battens at maximum 600 mm centres
- Be finish flushed with underside of bottom plate or bearer.

### COMMENT:

Sloped heads require specifically designed kick-out flashings at bottom edges of head flashings.

Where width outlined in Paragraph 9.1.10.1 are beyond the limits for sill and head trimmer *framing* in NZS 3604 specific engineering design of the *framing* is required.

Certain aluminium joinery sections and installation requirements may not be able to meet the details of this Acceptable Solution, especially in regard to window facing cover, sill support, window fixing, and sill flashing requirements. The window details in these cases require specific design.

In critical areas a specifier may require a second layer of ARDEX WPM 3000X (Shelterseal 3000X) to be applied with laps staggered to the first layer.

### SHELF LIFE

12 months when stored in the original unopened packaging, in a dry place at 23°C. Do not store in direct sunlight. Replace lid tightly after use. Use remaining contents from part used containers within 3 months.

### COVERAGE

Two coats are recommended for an effective waterproof membrane.

Coverage will vary depending on the porosity of the surface.

One 20kg (15 litre) unit will cover approximately 7.5-15m<sup>2</sup> (based on two coats) depending on area requirements between wall and floor surfaces to be treated. Refer Table I.

### **DRYING TIMES**

### Recoat time

1-2 hours at (23°C/50% RH) between first and second coats. Alternatively, if a polyester mat is used between coats then the second coat can be applied whilst the first coat is still wet.

### Dry through

The slowest drying areas are those where the membrane has been applied over a silicone bond breaker, eg. wall and floor junctions. The membrane cannot be tiled over until these critical areas are completely dry. Ardex WPM 001 is totally dry in 48 hours at 23°C/50% RH, but can take up to 72 hours at 10°C/50% RH in corners or for thick films.

### **Fully cured**

The shower should not be used until the membrane has reached its full strength. Ardex WPM 001 membrane is fully cured after 3 days at 23°C, or after 5 days at 10°C.

Drying times will vary depending on humidity, surface temperature and surface porosity.

Do not apply on substrates where the surface temperature is below 10°C or above 35°C.

### CLEANING

Wash hands, brushes, rollers, etc, with water while the membrane is still fresh. Remove cured material with mineral turpentine.

### SAFETY PRECAUTIONS

Do not use the product in the following situations:

- Areas subject to negative hydrostatic pressure or rising damp, unless treated with Ardex WPM 300.

### **APPLICATION**

Apply Ardex WPM 001 by brush or roller. A medium nap (12-15mm pile) paint roller is recommended. New rollers should be dampened with water before being used for the first time.

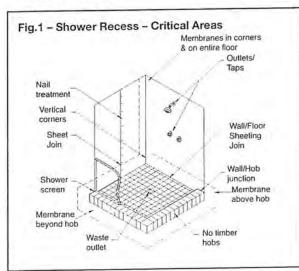
For best results with a paint brush use a good quality, 50mm long bristle variety.

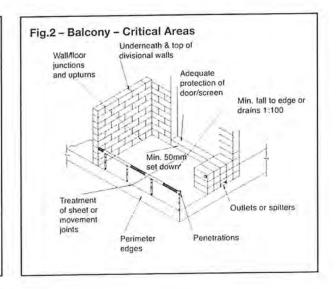
To achieve the required dry film thickness per coat, application must consist of laying the product onto the surface and light finish the surface. Do not try to apply in the same manner as a building paint. A conventional building paint is normally applied at 25-40 micrometers wet film thickness while Ardex WPM 001 needs to be applied at between 0.5 and 1.0 mm per coat depending on product and application (Refer Table 1).

### Critical Areas: INTERNAL WET AREAS

- Construction should be in accordance with Australian 3740 - 2004 Waterproofing of wet areas within residential buildings.
- All render and tile bed requirements should be completed before application of the membrane and tiles or other floor coverings should be direct bonded to the membrane.
- Ensure wall & floor sheets are installed as per sheet manufacturer's recommendations.
- Ensure suitable brick/concrete hobs are used (do not use timber).

- Ensure that falls to the waste are min 1:60 (ie.
  approx. 30mm in 2mtr)) before waterproofing.
  Ensure
  outlet pipes are fixed securely and that the waste or
  drainage flanges are recessed into the floor.
- 6. Avoid sheet joints in shower recess floor. Ensure that sheets are securely fixed to the wall at the bottom edge, and sheet joints are sealed with a neutral cure silicone sealant spread approximately 6mm on either side of the joint.
- Treat nail and screw holes with neutral cure silicone sealant.
- Seal the perimeters of taps, shower outlets and waste outlets with neutral cure silicone sealant.
- Apply a bead of neutral cure silicone sealant to all horizontal and vertical corners.
- Apply a bead of neutral cure silicone sealant to the junction of the hob or angle and walls. Spreading the sealant to 6mm on either side of the joint.
- 11. Waste outlets shall incorporate a puddle flange or similar in accordance with AS3740 & the top surface shall be set flush with the surface to which the membrane is to be applied. A bead of neutral cure silicone shall be applied across the intersection of the puddle flange and the screed/ floor.
- 12. Apply the membrane to the entire shower recess floor and down into waste or drainage flange. Apply the membrane over the hob and at least 150mm beyond the outside edge of the hob (ideally to entire wet area floor).
- Apply the membrane 1800mm up the walls or to the height of the shower rose within the shower recess.
- 14. Install the shower screen to inside edge of the hob.





### **BALCONIES AND DECKS**

- Ensure that the deck is constructed with falls to edge/drains of min 1:100 (ie, 20mm in 2m) or else achieve the fall with a sand/cement screed.
- Ensure a min set down (step down) of 50mm to the finished floor level (ie. top of tiles).
- Ensure suitable flashing is installed, ideally prior to the installation of the balcony screen/sliding door.
- Treat any sheet joints with a neutral cure silicone prior to waterproofing.
- Prepare and seal all wall/floor junctions with a bead of neutral cure silicone.
- Apply the membrane up the step down and as far up underneath the screen door flashing as possible (ideally waterproof prior to installing door).
- Where possible, apply the membrane prior to building divisional walls, or other items such as planter boxes.
- Apply the membrane to the entire balcony floor and at least 50mm up the wall above the top surface of the finished tiles and finished below the wall drainage vents.
- Apply the membrane to the top of the parapets and divisional walls, or else install suitable metal capping.
- 10. Apply the membrane down over the front edge of the balcony onto the drip rail.
- 11. Carefully seal any gaps around balcony penetrations prior to applying the membrane.
- Apply the membrane down into outlets and drains, ensuring excess material is removed.
- Ensure all weep holes are above the membrane application area.

### **APPLICATION NOTES**

### Surface preparation

- Ensure all surfaces are structurally sound and totally dry. The pores of concrete surfaces should be open (absorbent surface). All sheet substrates must be securely fixed in accordance with the manufacturers instructions.
- Falls to outlets of at least 1:60 or approx. 30mm in 2mtr (wet areas) or 1:100 externally, must be achieved prior to tiling.
- The surface to be coated should be free from dust, oil, paint, curing compounds and any other contaminating materials.
- Damaged concrete should be repaired (leveled) and surface defects including all cracks and sharp protrusions should be treated prior to the application of the membrane.

- Remove laitance on concrete or screeds by mechanical means.
- Highly dense (>40MPa) or steel trowelled concrete should be roughened by suitable mechanical means (shot blasting, grinding, etc).

### Priming

The primer is a critical part of the waterproofing system. Apply one coat of Ardex WPM 265 (Sheltercoat/ Superflex Water Based Primer) by brush or roller to all areas to be waterproofed including the floor waste. Allow the primer to completely dry prior to the application of the Ardex WPM 001 membrane. This will take around 20-30 minutes depending upon weather conditions and porosity of the substrate. Coverage is approximately 6m² per litre. Plastic (eg. PVC) pipes should be primed with a solvent based plumbers pink primer. Prime metal surfaces with a suitable metal primer such as epoxy polyamide primer.

### GENERAL APPLICATION

### Crack preparation Cracks <2mm:

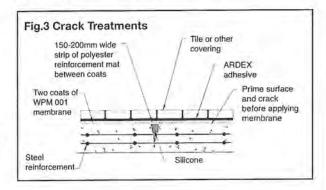
Clean and remove any loose particles in the crack. Prime the crack and adjacent area carefully with Ardex WPM 265 and allow to dry before applying two coats of Ardex WPM 001 membrane in a band at least 200mm wide equidistantly across the crack, along the length of the crack.

### Cracks 2-6mm:

(Refer Fig. 3) Prepare and prime the crack as above. Apply a bead of neutral cure silicone into the crack and extend it 6mm either side. Apply a 300mm wide band of Ardex WPM 001 equidistantly across the crack along the entire length of the crack. Place a 190mm wide band of Ardex "Deckweb" polyester woven cloth reinforcement over the applied membrane. Thoroughly wet out the cloth preferably using a fluted roller, and remove all creases in, or air pockets under the mat. Immediately apply a second coat to completely fill the mat.

## Movement/construction joints

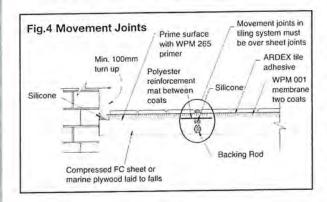
## Movement joints (<6mm)

Use same procedure as in crack preparation.

Clean and prime the joint before filling it with a bead of neutral cure silicone and extending it 6mm each side of joint. Apply a 300mm wide band of Ardex WPM 001 equidistantly across the crack along the entire length of the crack. Place a 190mm wide band of Ardex "Deckweb" polyester woven cloth reinforcement over the applied membrane. Thoroughly wet out the mat and remove all creases in, or air pockets under the mat. Immediately apply a second coat to completely fill the mat.

## Construction joints (>6mm)

Use the same procedure as above, but replace the reinforcing mat with 120mm of Ardex Coving Bandage. Note: if tiling, movement joints should be taken to the surface of the tiles. Fill the joints between the tiles immediately above the movement joints with an appropriate joint sealant. (Refer Fig.4)



#### Corners & coving areas

After priming with Ardex WPM 265 and allowing to dry, apply a generous bead (12mm) of neutral cure silicone sealant to seal all junctions between two substrates in coving areas and corners. Smooth over the silicone so that it extends 6mm up the wall and 6mm over the floor and allow to touch dry.

Apply a first coat of Ardex WPM 001 to the area and allow the membrane to dry.

Apply a second coat ensuring that excess product is removed from the junction (the final dry film thickness should be minimum of 1.0mm). Alternatively, if a polyester reinforcement mat is used between coats then the second coat can be applied as soon as the mat is fully bedded into the first coat.

#### WALL/FLOOR JUNCTION

After priming with Ardex WPM 265 and allowing to dry, apply a generous bead (12mm) of neutral cure silicone sealant to seal all junctions between two substrates. Smooth over the silicone so that it extends 6mm up the wall and 6mm over the floor and allow to touch dry. Place a 190mm wide band of Ardex "Deckweb" polyester woven mat reinforcement over the applied membrane. Thoroughly wet out the cloth and remove all creases in, or air pockets under the mat. Immediately apply a second coat to completely fill the mat. The Ardex WPM 001 should be applied to at least 100 mm up the wall surfaces as per the recommendations for the application of Ardex WPM 001 to floors.

#### Walls

Two coats of Ardex WPM 001 are required to achieve a minimum total dry film thickness of 0.5mm.

After priming with Ardex WPM 265 and allowing to dry, apply two coats of Ardex WPM 001 (to achieve a minimum dry film thickness of 0.5mm) in two opposite directions. Wall sheet joints should be treated with a neutral cure silicone, PVC duct tape or base jointing compound. In balcony situations take the membrane up underneath any existing cover flashing or install appropriate flashing. Allow the first coat to dry before applying the second coat.

#### **Floors**

Two coats of Ardex WPM 001 are required to achieve a minimum total dry film thickness of 1.0mm. The flooring recommendations should be extended at least 150 mm up all perimeter walls.

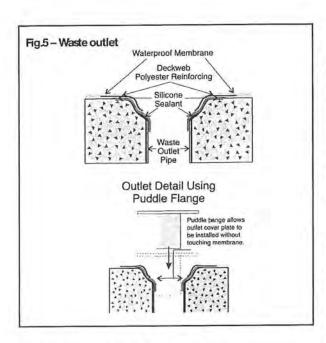
Prime the surface with Ardex WPM 265 and allow to dry.

Apply the first coat over the primed surface and allow it to dry (1-2 hours at 23°C, 50%RH) before applying a second coat in an opposite direction. In shower recesses a drainage flange must be installed on all timber/sheeted floors, and are strongly recommended on all other substrates. Where possible rebate the flange into the floor. Seal the perimeter of the flange with neutral cure silicone treatment. If a flange is not installed the membrane must be applied down into the pipe. (Refer Fig.5) Allow the membrane to dry completely before tiling. Refer drying times above.

#### **Waste Outlet**

Prime the surface with Ardex WPM 265 and allow to dry. Surfaces of the outlet flange must be primed with an appropriate primer.

Apply Ardex WPM 001 over the adjacent floor surface extending down into the waste outlet flange overlapping the edge of flange by at least 30mm. Place Ardex "Deckweb" polyester woven mat reinforcement over the applied membrane. Thoroughly wet out the cloth and remove all creases in, or air pockets under the mat. Immediately apply a second coat to completely fill the mat. (Refer Fig. 5)

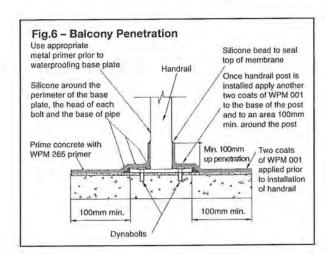


Balcony penetrations (Refer Fig.6)

All upstands are to be mechanically fixed through the membrane, which must be fabricated with a base plate flange.

Prime the metal with an appropriate metal primer such as an epoxy polyamide primer and allow to dry. Apply a 10mm bead of neutral cure silicone around the perimeter of the penetration. Apply the first coat of Ardex WPM 001 on the substrate and the flanged metal.

Allow first coat to dry before applying a second coat ensuring a finished dry film thickness of no less than 1.0mm is achieved. Place a suitable flashing collar around the penetration sealing it with a suitable sealant.



#### Tiling systems.

It is advisable to conduct a flood test of the shower once the membrane has cured (normally after 72 hours), and before the tiling commences. A broad range of Ardex tile adhesives can be used over Ardex membranes. Contact Ardex or your nearest Ardex stockist for advice on the most suitable system.

## 1 PRELIMINARY AND GENERAL

## 1.1 DOCUMENTS

The contract documents comprise:

Architectural drawings numbered 1 to 15 inclusive.

 This specification including the structural design and specification from Spencer Holmes.

 The Standard Conditions of Contract 2011 of the New Zealand Institute of Architects.

## 1.2 GENERAL INTENT

The drawings and specification are to be read together and anything shown and not specified or vice versa, shall be referred to the Architect for clarification.

## 1.3 PROTECTION AND DAMAGE

The Contractor shall provide for the protection of all existing flooring. Any damage arising from activities under this contract shall be made good.

Any damage whatsoever, sustained by the property of adjoining or other owners or arising from causes attributable to the building contract, shall be made good by the contractor at his own expense.

## 1.4 DIMENSIONS

All figured dimensions shall take preference over scaled dimensions. Dimensions are shown from rough structural or framing faces unless indicated otherwise.

Where any discrepancy occurs as between or within the drawings and specification, it shall be reported to the Architect before proceeding with the section of the work affected.

## 1.5 INSPECTION OF SITE

Before the submission of any tender any intending bidder must visit the site of the contract fully to familiarise himself with the nature of the site conditions and the work that is required. He must further peruse all of the drawings and details relating to the work and this specification. Thus he may become fully informed as to the scope and character of his work, and no extra can be claimed.

#### 1.6 INSURANCES

The Owner shall effect and maintain insurance of the existing structure and the contract works in the joint names of the Owner and Contractor.

The Contractor shall effect and maintain General Public Liability Insurance, Contractor's Equipment and Plant, and Motor Vehicle Public Liability Insurance.

## 1.7 MATERIALS AND WORKMANSHIP

Provide all labour, materials, temporary work and everything necessary for the due and proper completion of the work.

All materials shall be the best of their respective kinds, qualities, classes or grades specified. Materials for which a New Zealand Standard exists, shall comply with the relevant requirements. In the absence of a New Zealand Standard the appropriate British Standard is applicable.

Workmanship is to be in accordance with best trade practice. Work is to be accurately set out, structurally sound, true to line and face and neatly executed and finished.

#### 1.8 ATTENDANCE

The Contractor shall allow the use of ordinary scaffolding, special scaffolding, plant, power, working space and water to all sub contractors, separate contractors and others as and when required by them for the efficient execution of the contract.

The Contractor shall ensure that all sub contractors, separate contractors and others take delivery of their equipment, supplies, and materials as required and place them in the appropriate positions for the efficient execution and completion of their respective contracts and in compliance with the contractor's planning programme.

The Contractor shall allow for fixing all equipment that is shown to be built in or is necessary to be fixed but which is not necessarily specified in the trade section to be fixed by sub contractors.

## 1.9 PRINCIPALS' RIGHT OF ENTRY

The Principals reserves the right to carry out any other work they may require during the progress of this contract. The contractor shall cooperate if called upon to assist.

#### 1.11 ENCLOSURES

No portion of the building under construction shall be used as a store, office, workshop or for any other purpose without the permission of the Owner.

## 1.12 FINISHINGS

Should the contractor or any sub contractor consider that the work of any other trade or the condition of any surface is not in a satisfactory condition to ensure a proper finish for his work thereon, he shall notify the contractor and the Architect and shall not proceed until the necessary alteration or improvement has been made. Failing such notice the Contractor or sub contractor concerned will not be relieved of responsibility for a poor result due to such unsatisfactory condition. Application of materials to a surface will be considered as an acceptance of the surfaces to be satisfactory.

## 1.13 RUBBISH AND CLEANING

The Contractor shall remove all rubbish at frequent intervals and shall take all reasonable precautions to protect finished surfaces from damage or disfigurement. NO FOOD SCRAPS TO BE LEFT ON SITE. As soon as they are installed, all floors, windows, and other fittings shall be thoroughly cleaned out and at completion the building shall be left clean and tidy and ready for immediate possession.

## 1.14 CONSENTS, NOTICES AND FEES

Conform in all respects to the requirements of the Local Authority and of other controlling bodies. Obtain all licences, consents and permits, give all notices and pay all fees required by all Authorities having jurisdiction, in accordance with their latest regulations and requirements.

All work shall be carried out in accordance with the New Zealand Building Code. The Building Consent issued by the Territorial Authority (TA) confirms that the contract documents comply with this code.

Should additional inspections be required by the TA due to faulty or non-complying work being put in place and requiring re-inspection to ensure compliance then the cost of any additional inspections shall be met by the Main Contractor and not from the Provisional Sum.

## 1.17 TELEPHONE INSTALLATION

Allow for attendance on Spark for the installation of copper and fibre connections within the house and for the installation of underground copper and fibre for broadband. Generally this will consist of the installation of cable reticulation, associated equipment and telephone. Seal entries and make good after the running of cables. Ensure that surface wiring is not allowed and that work is concealed wherever practicable.

## 1.18 GUARANTEES AND WARRANTIES

Where under this contract a guarantee or warranty is normally given in respect of any material, article, workmanship or performance as a matter of trade practice, the Contractor shall provide such guarantee or warranty.

If the material, article, workmanship or performance fails within the period specified (if not specified then for two years) after completion of the contract, the guarantor or warrantor shall forthwith on demand by the Principal, cause such fault or deterioration to be made good without cost to the Principal.

Every guarantee or warranty shall be in favour of the Principal and shall be capable of being assigned by the Principal to any subsequent owner.

All labour shall be guaranteed for **two (2) years**.

## 1.19 AVOIDANCE AND NUISANCE

Where the Contractor and/or Subcontractor fails to carry out any specified requirements under the contract, installs unspecified equipment and/or materials without the Architect's approval, substitutes a lesser product and/or material specified, carries out substandard work that requires rectification and re-inspection or places work and/or fittings incorrectly, or fails to complete the works by the specified completion date of time for completion, or such extended date of time as may be determined in accordance with the Conditions of Contract, the Contractor and/or Subcontractor shall be liable for the cost of the additional supervision time, administration and expenses incurred by the Architect as a result of the default by the Contractor and/or Subcontractor. Such costs will be calculated in accordance with N.Z.I.A. "Agreement for Architect's Service" on a time charge basis and deducted from the monies owing to the Contractor under the contract.

Clearing of rubbish, vegetation and topsoil.

Excavate for foundations for the extension. Stockpiling and spreading of excavated topsoil.

## 2.2 WASTE MANAGEMENT

Waste disposal to landfills and cleanfills shall be minimised, with recycling or reuse the preferred method of disposal. Where possible, excavated topsoil and clean fill shall be kept on site.

## 2.3 CLEARING AND STRIPPING

All vegetation and rubble over the area affected by the site works shall be removed. Topsoil shall be removed from the area affected by the siteworks and stockpiled as directed. Excavated topsoil shall be free from grass and roots and stockpiled on site in mounds as directed by the Principal. Surplus topsoil shall be removed from site.

## 2.4 EXCAVATION

The site shall be excavated to suit finished levels. If the sub base material is unsuitable as foundation, then excavate further until a satisfactory sub grade is reached. All excavation footings shall be minimum 300 mm below normal ground level or to solid. Where excavations are too deep, bring up to the required levels with compacted hardfill.

Excavations for foundations, trenches for drains, etc shall be true to level and grade. Keep excavations dry until building operations are complete. Care shall be taken to see that all drains are clear, sealed and undamaged before backfilling commences.

Conforming with NZS 3604, 3.5 Site preparation, remove all turf, vegetation, trees, topsoil, stumps and rubbish from the area being built on.

Break out and remove underground elements and redundant services. Report for instructions when unexpected voids, made-up ground or services are encountered. Seal off the ends of drains or remove to utility operator approval.

#### 1.9 GENERAL EXCAVATION

Trim ground to required profiles, batters, falls and levels. Remove loose material. Protect cut faces from collapse. Keep excavations free from water.

## 1.10 EXCAVATION FOR FOUNDATIONS

Take foundation excavations to depths shown. Keep trenches plumb and straight, bottoms level and solid, stepped as detailed and clean and free of water.

## 1.11 INADEQUATE BEARING

If bearing is inadequate then excavate further and backfill with material as follows:

Service trenches: Hardfill

#### 1.13 GENERAL BACKFILLING

Compact backfilling in 150 mm layers, with the last 200 mm in clean topsoil, lightly compacted and neatly finished off.

Refer to Structural Engineer Drawings for specific product, material, accessories and finish selections.

## 1.1 FALSEWORK AND FORMWORK

Use falsework and formwork of sufficient strength to retain and support the wet concrete to the required profiles and tolerances. Select formwork finish to produce the specified finished quality.

#### 1.2 SURFACE FINISHES

To comply with NZS 3114, section 105, or as denoted on the drawings. Formwork linings and surface finishes as nominated for both fair face and concealed or exposed surfaces. Surface tolerances to comply with NZS 3114, sections 104 and clause 105.3.2.

#### 1.3 DAMPPROOF MEMBRANE

Apply membrane to prepared basecourse with 150 mm laps between sheets. Tape seal laps and penetrations with 50 mm wide pressure sensitive plastic tape. Refer to drawings for perimeter details.

#### 1.4 CASTING IN

Build in grounds, bolts and fixings for wall plates and bracing elements, holding down bolts, pipes, sleeves and fixings as required. Form pockets, chases and flashing grooves as required. No grounds exceeding 100 mm in length. Minimum cover on conduits 40 mm. Do not encase aluminium items in concrete. Do not paint steel embedded items more than 25 mm into the concrete encasement. Cut back form ties to specified cover and fill the cavities with mortar. Wrap all pipes embedded in concrete with tape to break the bond and to allow for expansion.

#### 1.5 CONSTRUCT FLOOR SLABS

Construct in accordance with NZS 3604, 7.5 Concrete slab-on-ground floors for timber buildings. Lay to true and straight surfaces, screeded, floated and steel (manual or power) trowelled finish. Tolerance on flatness: maximum 3 mm gradual deviation over a 3 metre straight-edge, to the requirements of NZS 3114, section 104.

#### 1.6 SAW CUTS

Refer Structural Engineer Drawings.

Pour floor slabs cast on the ground in areas no greater than 25 square metres, with a maximum ratio of length to breadth of 1:1.5. Cut slabs where indicated on the drawings and as required to control shrinkage cracking. Carry out cutting as soon as possible, without causing tear-out of aggregate and before shrinkage cracking has occurred, generally within 24 hours of pouring. Where saw cuts are made, cut out 100 mm of every second wire of the mesh for a length of 50 mm each side of the saw cut position. Saw cuts: 1/3rd slab depth, or 30 mm minimum.

#### 1.7 SURFACE REPAIRS

Make good surface defects as soon as forms are stripped. Make good hollows or bony areas with 1:2 mortar, finished to the same tolerances as the parent concrete. Fill tie rod holes with 1:2 mortar.

#### 1.8 STRIKE FORMWORK

Strike formwork without damaging or overloading structure.

Clean out saw cuts.

#### 3. EXECUTION

#### Conditions

#### 3.1 COMPLIANCE

Comply with NZS 4210.

#### 3.2 TOLERANCES

Construct within the tolerances set out in NZS 4210: clause 2.6.5, Tolerances and clause 2.7, Laying the units, unless specified otherwise on the drawings or in this specification. Lay blocks with jointing of consistent thickness throughout.

Lay masonry to an even, plane surface with no deviation exceeding 3mm in 3 metres on any surface in view in the finished work.

#### 3.3 CHECK BASE

Check that the base concrete on which masonry is being built is true to line and level, to ensure that work can be taken up true and plumb with 10mm thick bed and perpendicular joints. If more than 20mm thickness of mortar bed is needed to correct inaccuracies obtain written direction on remedial action.

#### 3.4 CONSTRUCTION JOINTS

Ensure the structural integration of all masonry with adjacent concrete work by providing well roughened, retarded construction joints at all junctions.

All construction joints between grout and concrete and between grout and grout similar to Type B as described in NZS 3109, clause 5.6.3, prepared using an approved retarder, except that the roughness at fine grout surfaces may be ±1.5mm above and below the average level. Use a "double strength" retarder if necessary to suit the high cement content of the grout.

Vertical joints between masonry and concrete to achieve full structural integration across the joints. Allow to construct concrete work first with prepared vertical construction joints at block junctions the same as for horizontal construction joints. Lay masonry so that all courses have open ends abutting the existing concrete work.

#### 3.5 COVER

All cover shall be in accordance with NZS 3109; 3.8 Cover and 3.9 Tolerances for reinforcement.

#### 3.6 STARTER POSITIONS

Check the location of starter reinforcement before block laying commences, or by a dry trial lay up of the first course. Do not attempt to correct misplacement by cranking bars. Where misplacement exceeds the location tolerance obtain written directions before proceeding further.

#### 3.7 MOISTURE CONTENT

Ensure that blocks are air-dry prior to laying. If necessary to reduce excess absorption of water from the mortar, some dampening of the surface is permissible but no surface water may be present at the time of placing mortar.

#### 3.8 PROTECTION

Keep fair face block walls clean of mortar droppings, grout splashes, or stains of any kind as the work proceeds and before any droppings set and protected from weathering prior to sealing to avoid instances of efflorescence and staining.

#### 3.9 WEATHER PRECAUTIONS

When extreme temperatures prevail, either below 4°C or above 27°C, make adjustments to construction as listed in NZS 4210: clause 2.18, Cold weather construction, and clause 2.19, Hot weather construction. Do not use expansive grout for filling in temperatures below 5°C.

## Application

#### 3.11 BONDING PATTERN

Unless specifically shown or described otherwise in SELECTIONS/drawings, lay masonry in stretcher bond with full masonry bonding at intersections

#### 3.12 OPEN-ENDED DEPRESSED WEB MASONRY

Use open-ended depressed web masonry throughout all courses in fully grouted walls.

#### 3.13 CUTTING

Cut using a masonry saw to provide clean, accurate cuts.

#### 3.16 BOTTOM COURSE

For fully grouted walls use inverted open-end depressed web bond beam masonry for the first course, to permit clean-out of grout space at the base.

#### 3.22 CLEAN OUT HOLES

Use special clean-out masonry or saw off a 100mm x 200mm high section of face shell at the base of all cells containing reinforcement, to form clean out and inspection holes.

#### 3.23 GROUT SPACE

Ensure that grouting cells at reinforcement locations are continuously clear by removal of projecting mortar.

## 3.24 TIE REINFORCING STEEL

Tie vertical reinforcing steel to starter bars. Lay and tie horizontal bars as the work proceeds.

#### 3.25 REINFORCEMENT LAPS

Laps 40 diameters, except as noted otherwise on the drawings.

#### 3.26 BRACING

Provide temporary lateral bracing to the wall where necessary to ensure stability and until final supporting construction is in place.

#### 3.27 NON EXPOSED MASONRY

To be laid to the same tolerances as fair face masonry. Joints to be tooled and struck off flush.

#### 3.28 TOOLED JOINTS

Finish joints on exposed masonry by tooling to produce a neat, slightly concave joint. Do not use raked joints on exterior walls. Mortar joints around openings to be flush. Refer to the drawings for details.

#### 3.29 CONTROL JOINTS

Refer to NZS 4210: clause 2.10, Methods of controlling wall movements, generally and to clause 2.10.2, Vertical control joints, for location; not more than 6 metres apart.

Debond reinforcement passing through control joints 150mm each side for single walls and 300mm one side for 2 walls. Rake out and prime adhesion faces of vertical control joints between masonry and between masonry and concrete as required by the sealant manufacturer. Use masking tape to avoid over-run of sealant onto the block face. Provide a backing strip to limit sealant depth to 10mm, and insert sealant, all to the manufacturer's requirements.

Grouting of bond beams at control joint locations to be discontinuous unless specifically noted otherwise.

#### Application - grouting

#### 3.30 INSPECTION

Inspect clean-out holes prior to grouting. Ensure that cells are clean and reinforcement is correctly placed. Mortar back the clean-out hole shell. If holes are covered in the completed work, boxing across the face may replace the shell infill. Brace hole infills to prevent blowouts during grouting.

Notify when work is ready for inspection.

#### 3.31 EXTENT OF GROUTING

Only those cells with reinforcing or where fixing devices occur shall be filled with grout. EsiBloc™ mortarless masonry to be solid filled, with EsiBloc Fill™.

#### 3.34 GROUTING, LOW LIFT

Fill masonry walls to NZS 4210: clause 2.14, The low lift grouting method, up to a maximum height of 1200mm. Consolidate by rodding and then prepare a construction joint to NZS 4210: clause 2.16, Horizontal construction joints, before repeating the sequence.

#### 3.35 LIMIT RATE

Limit rate of pour to avoid hydrostatic blowouts.

## Application - ancillary work

#### 3,36 HOLES AND CUT MASONRY

Provide all necessary holes, pockets and chases. Cut blocks when non-standard shapes are required. When cut masonry units are used, ensure vertical joints in adjacent courses are no closer than 100mm. Subsequent cutting away of masonry to form holes is not permitted.

#### 3.37 BUILT IN ELEMENTS

As the work proceeds, mortar in place elements such as sills, copings, lintels, and steps.

#### 3.38 BUILT IN FIXINGS

Build in all necessary plugs, bolts, ties, metal flashings, dowels, fastenings and fixings required by this and other work sections. Co-operate with others to meet this requirement. Fixings only permitted into filled cells.

#### 3.39 ELECTRICAL WORK

Ensure that provision for and fitting of boxes, conduit and pre-wiring are made and done as the work proceeds under the direction of the electrician.

3.40 SEALANT

Apply appropriate sealant where required to the manufacturer's specifications.

3.41 WEATHERPROOFING AROUND OPENINGS

Refer to architectural drawings for weatherproofing details around openings.

## Completion

3.43 PROGRESSIVE CLEANING

Clean off mortar splashes and grout spills as they occur.

3.44 FINAL CLEANING

At completion, clean down block work, remove efflorescence and remove waste materials from adjoining surfaces and floors.

3.45 REPLACE

Replace damaged, cracked or marked elements.

3.46 REMOVE

Remove debris, unused materials and elements from the site.

## 5.4 NAILINGS AND FIXINGS

Nailing shall comply with the requirements of NZS 3604:2011. When using fin 35 mm timber for wall framing there is greater care required when fixing linings and structural connectors.  $75 \times 3.15$  nails are used in place of  $100 \times 3.75$ . Nail edge distances are at least  $2 \times 100$  diameter of the nail in from the edge of the framing.

## 5.5 BOLTING TIMBERWORK

Bolts not otherwise specified or referred to on a drawing shall be 12 mm  $\varnothing$  generally at 900 mm maximum centres and fitted with 3 mm. x 50 square washers.

## 5.6 PRIMING

External finishing timbers that are to be painted shall be primed before fixing, including faces and rebates on door frames. All laps, butts and other site cut edges of pre-primed exterior cladding and finishing timbers shall be site primed before fixing.

## 5.7 DAMP PROOF COURSE

Between all faces of timber in contact with concrete, place a full width length and height layer of three ply bituminous felt.

#### 5.8 VERMIN STOPS

All means shall be adopted to prevent rats and mice from getting free access into and about the structure, by inserting plates and stops as necessary.

## 5.9 WORK FOR OTHER TRADES

Wait on all trades. Minimise the cutting of structural members. Do not cut or check into beams and joists within the middle third of their length. In cases where holes are unavoidable, drill max  $25 \, \text{mm} \, \varnothing$  holes through the centreline of the member.

#### 5.10 ROOF FRAMING

Rafters shall be birdsmouthed over and securely spiked to the top plates. All rafters shall be securely connected to top plates with two Z nails or trimlocs.

## 5.11 FLOORING

Secret nail the floor boards, dress to a smooth even surface with machine sanding using 100 grit paper. Hand sand where machine sanding is impossible. All fixings shall be galvanised. Allow to sand, stain, seal and clear finish the floorboards.

#### 5.15 SEALANTS

Sealants shall be Fosroc or similar approved and be applied strictly in accordance with the manufacturers instructions.

For sealing in roofing, gutters and metal cladding.

General sealant for moving joints.

Adjacent to glass.

All joints shall be primed, marked and knifed to ensure a high integrity and visually uniform application.

## 5.16 EXTERIOR FINISHING

Fix facings, beads, fascias and all other miscellaneous finishing timbers fully as detailed on timber schedule and of sizes as shown or required. Prime as specified and mastic seal where necessary to exclude water penetration.

Allow for fitting metal flashings supplied by plumber to exterior joinery. Carefully fit to make weathertight.

## 5.17 INTERNAL WALL AND CEILING LININGS

Prior to fixing linings, ensure that framing is at or below the moisture content specified.

Gibraltar Board

Line walls with 10 mm Braceline as indicated, otherwise standard 10 mm Gib Board and 10mm Aqualine Gib in the family bathroom and the ensuite. Fix with 30 x 2.5 mm Gib clouts and GibFix adhesive. edges of the sheets fully supported or with tongue and groove jointing. Provide 20mm timber fillets at the base of all upstands and chamfer all external edges with a minimum radius of 5mm. Fix with 10 gauge x 50mm stainless steel countersunk head screws, with a 3mm gap between all sheets. Fix at 150mm centres on edges and 200mm in the body of the sheets. Do not use probe meters to test moisture content.

Plywood and the timber substructure to have a maximum moisture content of 20% when the membrane is adhered.

## Application - laying Butynol

3.8 GENERAL

Tape plywood joints using 25mm Ardex approved self-adhesive tape. Run out sheets and allow to relax for 20 minutes before laying. Do not stretch sheets or tapes in laying.

3.9 APPLY ADHESIVE

Apply adhesive to the substrate and the Butynol rubber sheeting by brush, spray, or roller at a spreading rate of not less than 2.5 square metres per litre. Leave to tack dry before bonding the two surfaces together.

3.10 LAY SHEETS

Lay sheets across the roof slope and lap long edges to full width of selvage, 50mm minimum. Smooth down and roll to remove entrapped air. Adhesive bond and seal to the membrane manufacturer's requirements and roll or rub down as the work proceeds.

3.11 BONDING LAPS

Bond all laps to Ardex requirements. Where the roof slope is less than 5 degrees, where coloured membranes are used, where ponding can occur and in all gutters, use special lap bonding incorporating Ardex seam tape and seam primer.

3.12 MINOR MOVEMENT JOINTS

Lay sheets across joint but leave unbonded on both sides.

Unbonded width: 25mm minimum

All joints to be taped using Ardex approved self adhesive tape.

3.13 INSPECT

Inspect and test joints on completion.

3.14 PENETRATIONS

Form and finish upstands, downturns, penetrations, sumps and vents to conform with Ardex details and NZBC E2/AS1.

3.15 PENETRATIONS AND JUNCTIONS

Check that adjoining walls and parapets are prepared ready for the installation of the roofing. Confirm that openings have been prepared ready for the installation of skylights and other penetrations through the roof. Required work includes the following:

- roofing installation neatly finished to all sides of openings and to all wall and parapet
- installation of flashings (those required to be installed prior to installation of penetrating elements and/or wall linings).

#### Finishing

3.17 FOOT TRAFFIC

Foot traffic is to be limited during and after laying.

3.19 ACCEPTANCE

Sign off on completed areas. The main contractor to protect and maintain roofing until completion of the contract works.

3.20 SUBSEQUENT WORK

Make good any damage by later work. Making good to take the form of inserting a new whole or part infill sheet to maintain the appearance of the covering as originally laid.

Remove debris, unused materials and elements from the site.

#### 3. EXECUTION

#### Conditions

#### 3.1 INSPECTION

Inspect the roof framing and supporting structure to ensure that it is complete and fully braced ready for roofing and free from any misalignments or protrusions that could damage the roofing.

#### 3.2 FRAMING TIMBER MOISTURE

When continuous metal cladding etc. Runs along a long continuous timber member and is directly fixed to it, the timbers equilibrium moisture content (EMC) to be 18% or less. For flashings in this situation (sometimes called transverse flashings) the framing EMC to be maximum 16%, and preferably as low as 12%. Transverse flashings can be temporarily tacked in place and final fixing done when moisture content is acceptable.

#### 3.3 STORAGE

Upon delivery visually inspect sheets for damage and accept packs of undamaged roofing. Reject all damaged material. Store on a level firm base clear of the ground, with packs well ventilated and completely protected from weather and damage. Do not allow moisture to build up between sheets. If sheet packs become wet, fillet or cross stack to allow air circulation and drying between sheets.

#### 3.4 HANDLING

Do not drag sheets across each other or other materials. Avoid distortion and contact with damaging substances, including cement. Long lengths of roofing should be lifted onto the roof using an approved load spreading beam. Protect edges and surface finishes from damage, keep under cover and remove as the product is being installed. Use soft, flat sole shoes when fixing and for all other work on the roof. Walk along the purlin line whenever possible.

#### 3.5 SEPARATION

Isolate dissimilar materials (metals and non-metals) in close proximity as necessary by painting the surfaces or fitting separator strips of compatible materials. Place isolators between metals and treated timber and cement based materials. Do not use lead sheet or copper in contact with or allow water run-off onto galvanized or aluminium/zinc coated steel.

#### Application

#### 3.6 FIX INSULATION

Refer to thermal insulation sections.

#### 3.7 SET-OUT

Carefully set out with consideration of the position of side laps to take account of the prevailing wind and line of sight. Ensure all sheets are square and oversailing the gutter true to line. Check during fixing to eliminate creep or spread and string lines along purlin centres to keep fastenings in line.

#### 3.8 END LAPS

End laps are not recommended, except where specifically detailed.

#### 3.9 THERMAL MOVEMENT

Fix for Thermal Movement to Metalcraft requirements for thermal movement.

#### 3.10 FIXING GENERALLY

Install and fix in accordance with the NZMRM CoP recommendations, and to Metalcraft required fixing patterns and details for each area of the building roofing. Use only screws as required by Metalcraft. Paint colour matched fixings and accessories before installation.

#### 3.11 MARKING AND CUTTING

Use ink pen, chalk line or coloured pencil for marking roof sheets prior to cutting. Do not use lead pencil for marking Zincalume<sup>®</sup> and Colorsteel<sup>®</sup>. Cut by shear only, using nibblers or hand snips. Remove all cutting and drilling debris from the roof.

## 3.12 STOP ENDS AND DOWNTURNS

Form stop-ends at the upper end of sheets. Form downturns at the gutter line where the roof pitch is less than 8 degrees. Form using the required tools.

#### 3.13 INSTALL FLASHINGS

Flash roof to parapets, walls and penetrations to detail. Flashings to be installed on timber framing with moisture content of less than 20%. Where no detail is provided flash to NZMRM CoP NZ metal roof and wall cladding Code of Practice recommendations and Metalcraft and NZBC E2/AS1 requirements. Cut accurately and fix using sealant and rivets to detail and to Metalcraft requirements to form a weatherproof cover. For visible flashings, plan joints/junction to take account of the aesthetic requirements.

#### 3.14 USE OF SEALANTS

Select and use sealants only as recommended by Metalcraft. Apply sealant in two narrow beads transversely across flashing intersections, close to the two edges. Avoid exposing sealant on outside surfaces.

#### 3.15 FLASHING PENETRATIONS

Flash all penetrations through the roof. Fit pipe flashings with a proprietary collar flashing, with other penetrations flashed as detailed and to provide a weathertight installation. Ensure that flashings are set to avoid any ponding of water.

#### Completion

#### 3.16 REPLACE

Replace damaged or marked elements. Do not attempt to repair coatings by applying colour match paint to pre-finished surfaces.

#### 3.17 LEAVE

Leave this work complete with all necessary flashings, undercloaks, valleys, ridges and hips all properly installed as the work proceeds so the finished roof is completely weathertight.

#### 3.18 REMOVE

Remove all trade rubbish, swarf and unused materials from the roof and surrounds daily during the work. Sweep down at the end of each day, and clean out spouting, gutters and rainwater pipes on completion of the roof. Remove debris, unused materials and elements from the site.

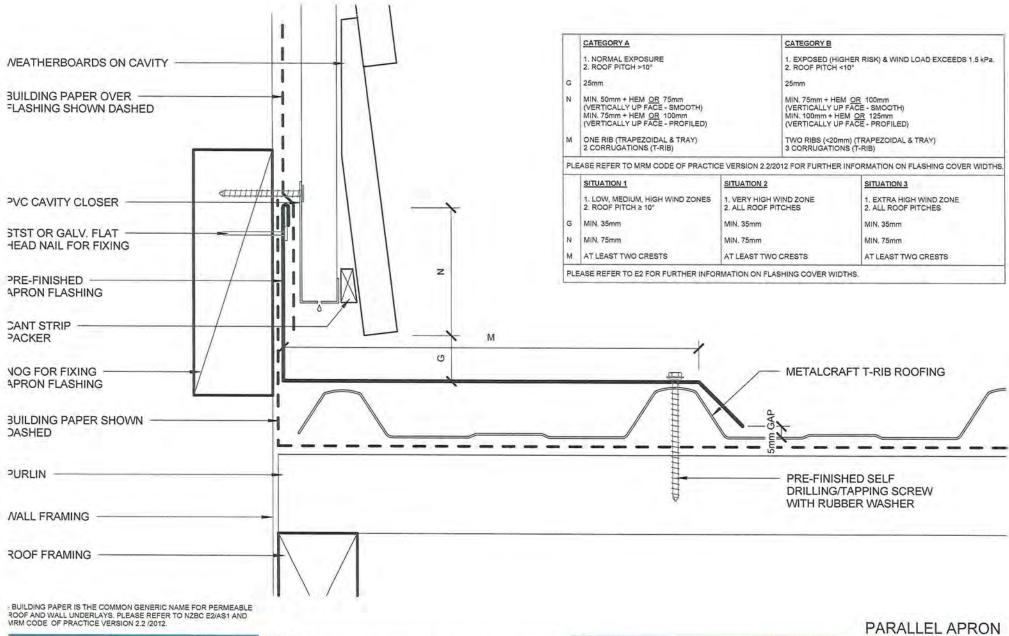

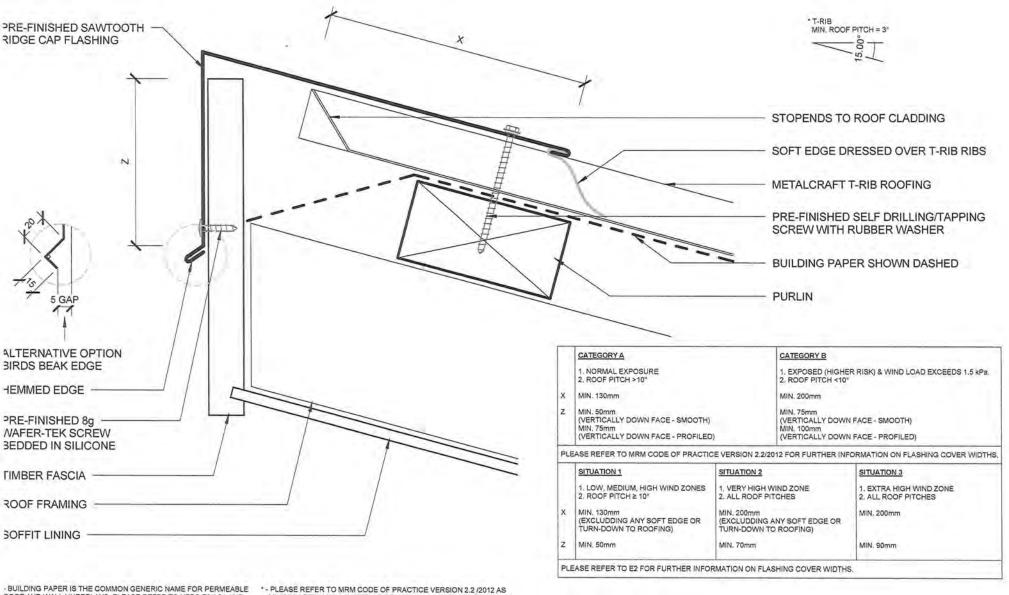

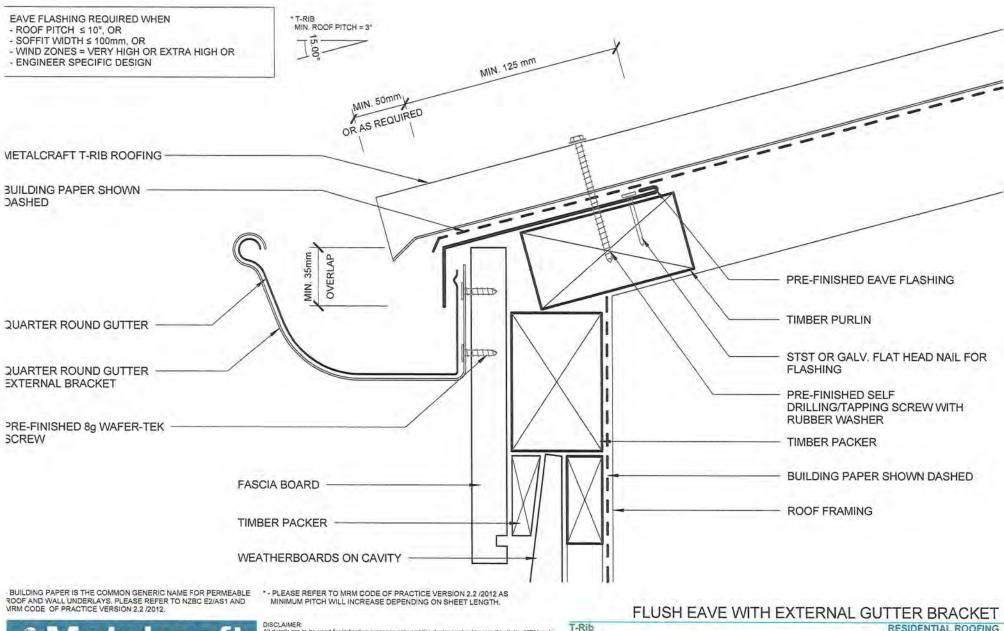

#### 3.1 EXECUTION

#### 3.2 TREATED SURFACES

Where surfaces have been treated with preservatives or fire retardants, check with the treatment manufacturer that coating materials are compatible with the treatment and do not inhibit its performance. If they are not compatible, obtain instructions before proceeding.

#### 3.3 ANCILLARY SURFACES

The descriptions of areas in schedules and elsewhere are of necessity simplified. Coat ancillary exposed surfaces to match similar or adjacent materials or areas, except where a fair-faced natural finish is required or items are completely prefinished. In cases of doubt obtain written instructions before proceeding.

#### 3.4 HARDWARE

Do not paint hinges or hardware that cannot be removed. Before commencing work carefully remove hardware, fixtures and fittings, set aside where they cannot be damaged

or misplaced and replace on completion. Refer to SELECTIONS for hardware, fixtures and fittings for removal.

#### 3.5 PROTECTION

Supply, lay and fix dropsheets, coverings and masking necessary to protect adjoining, fixtures, fittings and spaces from paint drops, spots, spray and damage.

Elastomeric sealants, if used, should not be painted. The paint film will not match the flexibility of the sealant and may severely limit its effectiveness.

#### 3.9 REMEDIAL WORK

If any substrate or surface, that even with the preparation work called for in this section, cannot be brought up to a standard that will allow painting or clear finishing of the required standard then do not proceed until remedial work is carried out.

#### 3.10 GAP FILLING

Make good cracks, holes, indented and damaged surfaces. Use suitable gap fillers to match the surface being prepared. Any special priming requirements of the fillers must be satisfied. Allow to dry or set before sanding back level with the surface. Prime or seal timber before using putty.

Exterior and wet areas: Use only Portland cement base or water-insoluble organic base gap fillers.

#### 3.11 OFF-SITE WORK

Carry out this work under cover in a suitable environment with suitable lighting. Store items, both before and after coating, in a clean, dry area protected from the weather and mechanical damage, properly stacked and spaced to allow air circulation and to prevent sticking.

#### 3.12 PRIMING JOINERY

Pre-treat any cut surfaces of preservative treated timber before priming. Ensure L.O.S.P. treated joinery has dried sufficiently to lose solvent odour. Pre-treat bare timber with **Resene** TimberLock (see Data Sheet D48) to improve the durability of subsequent coats.

Liberally coat end grain, allow to soak in and then recoat.

## 3.13 CONCEALED JOINERY SURFACES

Where off-site coatings are specified they must be applied to surfaces including those concealed when incorporated into the building.

## 3.14 CONCEALED METAL SURFACES

Apply primer to suit the coating system to surfaces which will be concealed when incorporated into the building.

Although generally supplied ready-mixed, thoroughly mix paints. Lift any settled pigment and ensure the paint is homogenous.

3.20 ENVIRONMENT

Defer painting of exterior surfaces until weather conditions are favourable - warm dry days without frost or heavy dews. Avoid painting in direct sunlight any surfaces that absorb heat excessively. As far as possible apply paint in the temperature range 15°C to 25°C. If temperatures fall outside the range of 10°C and 35°C do not paint unless paints with the necessary temperature tolerance have been specified. Do not apply solvent borne paint if moisture is present on the surface.

## 3.21 SEQUENCE OF OPERATIONS

Painting work to generally follow the following sequences:

- Complete surface preparation before commencing painting.

 Apply primers, sealers, stains, undercoats, paints and clear coatings in the sequences laid down by Resene.

Allow the full drying time between coats laid down by Resene.

 Do not expose primers, undercoats and intermediate coats beyond Resene's recommendations before applying the next coat.

- Finish broad areas before painting trim.

- Ensure batch numbers of tins are matched for whole areas.

#### 2.9 BACKFLOW PREVENTION DEVICES

Provide backflow prevention devices to AS/NZS 2845 where it is possible for water or contaminants to backflow into the potable water supply. Refer to NZBC G12 AS/1 3.4 Backflow protection, and table 2, Selection of Backflow Protection.

## 2.17 GAS HOT WATER HEATER, CONTINUOUS FLOW TYPE

Continuous flow unit with an integral gas burner and flue to NZS 4305.

#### Components

## 2.18 INSULATION

Pre-formed pipe sections complete with bends and fittings, with fixing tape to the manufacturer's requirements and to NZBC H1/AS1.

#### 2.19 PROTECTIVE TAPE

Plasticised PVC tape system with primer, mastic fixing and outer coating.

#### 3. EXECUTION

## 3.1 HANDLE AND STORE

Handle and store pipes, fittings and accessories to avoid damage. Store on site, under cover on a clean level area, stacked to eliminate movement and away from work in progress.

Store tapware in a shelved, dry and securely locked area. Retain tapware in the manufacturer's original packaging, complete with all fixings and installation instructions. Label each unit separately with its space/fixture number to match.

## 3.2 EXECUTION GENERALLY

Generally carry out the whole of this work and tests to NZBC G12/VM1 or G12/AS1: Water supplies.

## 3.3 CORE HOLES AND SLEEVES

Avoid electrolytic action by eliminating contact or continuity of water between dissimilar metals.

## 3.9 EXCAVATE

Excavate for the water main to a firm, even trench base in straight runs. Allow to backfill.

#### 3.10 JOINTING COPPER PIPE

Braze pipe, fit alloy compression fittings, crox type joints and seal ring compression joints to NZBC G12/AS1: Water supplies.

## 3.11 JOINTING UPVC PIPE

Solvent welded joints using spigots and sockets, flanged joints and seal ring compression joints to NZBC G12/AS1: Water supplies.

#### 3.12 JOINTING POLYBUTYLENE PIPE

Aluminium clamped, seal ring compression or push fit "O" ring seal jointing to pipe system manufacturer's requirements.

- 3.13 JOINTING POLYETHYLENE PIPE Seal ring compression joints and electrofusion to NZBC G12/AS1: Water supplies.
- JOINTING POLYPROPYLENE PIPE Fusion weld joints to manufacturer's requirements.

3.16 POTABLE WATER SUPPLY PIPEWORK INSTALLATION
From connection point, run pipes complete with all fittings, support and fixing, joins and install to manufacturers specifications. Size the pipes and branches in straight runs to deliver the acceptable flow rate to NZBC G12/VM1 or G12/AS1: Water supplies, table 3, Acceptable flow rates to sanitary fixtures at each outlet. Allow for the expected concurrent use of adjoining fixtures and size the piping layout to eliminate loss of pressure at any point by simultaneous draw-off. Pipework support spacing to be firmly fixed and buffered to eliminate noise and hammer, with preformed tee-connection take-offs and branches, with machine made 3 diameter bends, complete with necessary valves and fittings. Conceal pipework and pressure test before the wall linings are fixed.

  Provide and fit collars and escutcheon plates to match the pipework at all penetrations through constructions.
