### **Ethical Issues in a Correctional Setting**

Hiromi Itoh, MM, MT-BC, Ryan LeBlanc, MT-BC

An access to mental health care for the inmate population is constantly demanding in the State of California. More music therapy education and training on this area is necessary to meet this demand. This presentation aims to fill the gap between the academic and the internship experience through addressing ethical questions music therapy interns may encounter in their internship at a correctional setting. We will review clinical and custodial issues that should be considered in approaching to those questions, and examine theoretical frames on ethical decision-making process. We will propose an application of this learning experience into the music therapy internship education.

## A Framework for Understanding the Potential for Harm within Music Therapy

Although music therapists focus on music's clinical benefits, clinicians have an ethical and professional obligation to discern the potential for music to negatively impact clients. Additionally, a theoretical model for understanding how harm may arise within the relationships between therapist, client, and musical stimulus will be presented and discussed. ### Community Programming for Adults with Disabilities

Current trends in best practices have continually developed in order to meet federal/state legislation. This has brought greater opportunities for inclusion in community-based services that include the creative arts to the forefront. Experienced and established music therapists will discuss the process of creating and developing platforms for adults with disabilities to integrate with the large metropolitan community through live performances and online media outlets.

### Music as a Mnemonic Device for Verbal Recall in Healthy Older Adults

As the population grows older as a whole, the demand for music-based cognitive rehabilitation protocols will continue to increase. This talk will present results of a study examining how musical elements (i.e., rhythm, melody, harmony) operate as mnemonic structures for verbal recall in healthy older adults. Experimental findings reveal how music facilitates both immediate and delayed recall. Feedback from participants on the study also provide clinical insights into challenges older adults perceive when using music for verbal memory recall. Guidelines for composing and teaching original music mnemonics will be discussed.

## **Qualitative Musical Examinations of Individuals in Chemical Dependency Outpatient Treatment**

## Writing Rock Solid Clinical Goals, Objectives, and Benchmarks: Keep it Simple...

Writing comprehensive and easy-to-track goals is a foundational skill for music therapists. As caseloads increase, however, data collection becomes more and more complicated. This workshop will provide several ways to write and measure client performance goals in ways that can simplify data tracking for busy music therapists.

### How are we doing? A Survey of Cultural Competence of Music Therapists Annette Whitehead-Pleaux, MA, MT-BC, Leah Oswanski, MA, LPC, MT-BC Room 200 B (Ontario Convention Center)

The researchers surveyed US music therapists' cultural competence in clinical practice. The survey included questions about the subjects' demographic, multicultural counseling skills, relationship, cultural knowledge, cultural sensitivity, cultural awareness, and non-ethnic skills. The researchers will present and discuss the levels of cultural competence of music therapist respondents. In addition, the investigators will explore how demographics affect the level of cultural competence. Finally, the researchers will provide recommendations for music therapy continuing education to enhance the cultural competence of current music therapists as well as recommendations for enhancing music therapy curriculum to increase the cultural competence of future music therapists.

### **Music Therapy for Children, Youth, Teens Exposed to Grief, Loss & Trauma** Arvis Jones, MT-BC

It has long been an accepted fact that music affects the brain, both cognitively and emotionally. With the potential to alter an individual's conscious state, music therapy can shift an individual's perception of time and stimulates emotions and feelings. When experiencing the effects of grief, loss and trauma when words fail, music interventions can "break-through" the inability to talk about feelings and emotions. Music boosts endorphin release that lifts spirits and triggers positive emotional responses and senses of euphoria. This workshop will explore the use of these MT techniques as tools to healing in the aftermath of grief, trauma and violence.

## Original Lullaby Writing with Parents of Hospitalized Infants: A Research Study

Our qualitative findings revealed the model's major strengths and ways in which it could be improved by attending to: (a) structural limitations of the music therapy discipline, including demographic composition and lack of critical perspectives in training and (b) intersectional considerations of ageism and ableism within LGBTQ+ populations.
