





He is also preceded in death by three brothers, Rufus Lee Adams, Willie Lee Adams, and John Wesley Adams.

Chester was educated in the Butts County School System. At an early age he gave his life to Christ and joined the Rock Creek Missionary Baptist Church. There he served faithfully and was ordained as a Deacon over 50 years ago under the pastoral leadership of Reverend Jacob Parker. Later in life he joined Lizzie Berry Baptist Church where he also served on the Deacon Board.

Chester loved to sing and was previously a members of the W.C. James Male Chorus and the Men of Harmony Gospel Group. Chester was united in holy matrimony to Dorothy Price on August 18, 2002.

Chester was known as a person who was a Jack of all Trades. Being a business minded person, he was the owner of several businesses. During his younger years, his father taught him how to Pulpwood. He started his own business in Pulp Wooding and logging. He didn't stop there; this was the beginning of his business endeavors. He had a passion for the Funeral Industry. In 1985, he opened the first Adams Funeral Home in Barnesville, Georgia, and a second location years later in Woodland, Georgia. In 2015, he established his dream funeral home in his hometown of Jackson, Georgia, Adams Funeral Home. Chester was also the owner of Adams Seamless Gutters, Metal Roofing and Home Repair in Jackson, Georgia. He was the recipient of the 2018 NAACP Business of the Year award. Chester also served as a Board Member of the Henderson School Alumni Association Trust Committee and was instrumental in the purchase of the old Henderson High School.




## Memories of Dad.....
