FOURTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Feast of the Presentation of the Lord Thursday, February 2 | 5:00 p.m.

The Feast of the Presentation of the Lord marks the fortieth day after Christmas, and commemorates Christ's dedication in the Jerusalem temple (Luke 2:22–38). In England, the Presentation came to be known as "Candlemas," since it is the Church's custom to bless candles that will be used throughout the year (the paschal candle, candles for the Advent wreath, etc.). Parishioners are invited to bring with them candles to be blessed that will be used in their home throughout 2023.

February 2 is also the World Day of Prayer for Consecrated Life. Bishop Knestout will celebrate this Mass to honor those who serve the Church by living out the evangelical counsels—poverty, chastity, and obedience—in a permanent state of life (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, no. 915). There will be no 12 noon daily Mass that day.

Blessing of Throats February 3 | 12:00 N



The annual blessing of throats will take place at daily Mass on the feast of Saint Blaise. According to tradition, Saint Blaise, a bishop and martyr of the early Church (d. ca. 316 AD), miraculously dislodged a fish bone that was choking a child. Since then, the Church has invoked his intercession against all diseases of the throat.

Christmas Echo

The Alma Redemptoris Mater (Loving Mother of the Redeemer) is one of five antiphons in honor of the Blessed Virgin Mary sung according to the various liturgical seasons. This first antiphon is sung from the First Sunday of Advent until the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord (February 2). This feast marks the fortieth day after Christmas and commemorates the dedication of the Christ child in the Jerusalem Temple (Luke 2:22-38). Although Christmastime ends on the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord (this year, January 9), the joy of the season resounds in the Church until the Feast of the Presentation.

Catechist Corner: The Tabernacle

In the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd program, the catechist (teacher) points out to the children that Jesus is present in the tabernacle. In the atrium (classroom) they work with a small model of a tabernacle. The children understand that the tabernacle holds the most blessed sacrament and is a cabinet made of precious materials, and it is always kept locked. Our youngest children will visit the tabernacle in the Cathedral during their atrium time, and have an opportunity to pray in front of the most blessed sacrament.

Collecting Palms

Palms that were blessed last year on Palm Sunday are now being collected in preparation for the beginning of Lent. After the palms are burnt, the ashes imposed on the forehead on Ash Wednesday (February 22). Please deposit the palms in the baskets that have been placed at the entrance to the church.

The connection between Palm Sunday and Ash Wednesday highlights an important truth: We undertake penance knowing that Christ has already conquered sin by his passion, death, and resurrection. The Lord's victory is meant to be ours as well. The palm is a symbol of Christ's victory: "After this I had a vision of a great multitude, which no one could count, from every nation, race, people, and tongue. They stood before the throne and before the Lamb, wearing white robes and holding palm branches in their hands. They cried out in a loud voice: 'Salvation comes from our God, who is seated on the throne, and from the Lamb" (Revelation 7:9–10).

National Eucharistic Revival

The National Eucharistic Revival is a movement to restore understanding and devotion to this great mystery here in the United States by helping us renew our worship of Jesus Christ in the Eucharist. Why Does Our Parish Need Your Gift?
