Sunday Gospel Reflection

"But he kept calling out all the more."

Mark 10:46-52

The gospels recount several instances of Jesus granting sight to the blind. When we consider the number of people today who require eyeglasses, contact lenses, optic medicine and surgery, varying degrees of blindness was a common condition in Jesus' day. Though individual circumstances differ, every healing miracle reveals God's desire for our profound transformation.

Oh, that through the mercy of God and by our faith we might see, hear, stand, and walk, think clearly, and become safe to touch! Jesus heals us and then what? Here's where you tell your story of following Him along with others on the divine journey. In this case, other people informed Bartimaeus that Jesus was near, and they told Jesus about Bartimaeus. And many rebuked the blind man to stay in his lowly and lonely place. Yet, he refused "calling out all the more." Jesus then asked them to bring the blind man to himself.

Like many persons in need, Bartimaeus sat where beggars sit each day bothering passersby on their way to important places to see important people and do important things. Yet, when he heard that Jesus was calling for him, he threw off his cloak which held his meager offering of coins. But, in anticipation and with the help of others Bartimaeus came forward to receive his blessing that very day. One might think his reply would be obvious, "Master, I want to see." But what his request exceeded ordinary expectations. Instead, with great courage and faith he revealed his deepest desire to the One who could grant the impossible in power and from abundant compassion. This intimate encounter occurred in public. It involved the assistance of other people. Today we are the others who can become involved in God's intimate encounters with persons in need. Notwithstanding our own needs, are there people for whom we can point to Jesus for their help in time of need? Isn't Jesus asking us to bring them to Him through prayer and action? Yet, what is our reaction to homeless and unemployed persons who beg for our mercy at familiar street corners on our regular routes to work, the store, even church?

Lately, I've been bothered by stagnation in Congress over providing government support for human and physical infrastructure that will help families and communities with childcare, pre-school and college education, eldercare, repair roads and bridges, clean the environment, expand public transportation, create good jobs in emerging green industries and much more. In this phenomenally wealthy country, many thousands of private industry workers strike for decent wages and safe working conditions. Meanwhile, in the blink of an eye the U.S. military budget was increased by \$780 Billion and law enforcement agencies continue to receive large boosts. And I help God do miracles.

Reflection: Where am I in this gospel story? Am I rebuking the blind man to cease pleading for mercy or am I helping Jesus achieve more transformative encounters?

Sunday Homily Refection

Jeremiah 31:7-9 * Psalm 126: The Lord has done great things for us; we are filled with joy! * Hebrews 5:1-6 * Mark 10:46-52

This is Synod Sunday, and the gospel is in Mark 10:46-52. Obedient to the Holy Father, our Cardinal Archbishop, Wilton Gregory set the stage for our Church's Synod. Don't think of this as some grand theological undertaking. It is, in fact, what we have been doing at STA for quite some time.

What is our charge in the communal gatherings that will comprise the Synod? We hear the charge in the words of Jeremiah 31:7-9: "I will bring them back...I will gather them from the ends of the world...I will lead them... so that none shall stumble." We are called to communal conversation, as has always been the case. Jesus was doing his thing in the Synod. He was always taking the disciples off to a quiet place and inviting them to go deeper, through Him, with Him, and in Him, before going into the neighborhood, nation, and world to proclaim that Christ is new. Pope Francis has made the vision plain for all of us in "Evangelii Gaudium," "Laudato Si' and Fratelli Tutti." In each of these writings, our Holy Father invites us to transform the world and continue God's miracle of creation by first, recognizing God's image in one another, then engage in communal conversation to go deeper and to emerge from the conversation as one Church. Finally, we are all called to respond to the crowd's exhortation from Jesus to Bartimaeus: "Take courage; get up, Jesus is calling you."

The Synod is our call to share with each other and the larger Church what we have seen and heard when Jesus helps us to look through any situation based on our faith. We have heard the charge of the Synod before; Habakkuk (2:1-3) told us in these words: "Write down the vision; Make it plain upon tablets, so that the one who reads it may run. For the vision is a witness for the appointed time, a testimony to the end; it will not disappoint. If it delays, wait for it, it will surely come, it will not be late. The Synod is upon us; it is our time for vision."

Look at the neighbor on your right and say, "I AM BARTIMAEUS." Look at the neighbor on your left and say, "YOU ARE BARTIMAEUS." This is Synod Sunday for us. It is Sister Thea's mantra that is to be shared with our Bishops; we are ontologically black, and just in case you missed it, Jesus told us to tell you what we have seen and heard that you might experience more of His love when you go into the neighborhood.

The Holy Father has invited us to be the risen and living body of Christ, to tell each other what we have seen and heard, and to make our words become flesh. Are you still on fire with the Spirit as Father Boxie, preacher and teacher broke it down for us at the Revival? During it all, let's go back to the Sacraments and back to the Bible. As Father Daly asked last Sunday, what is our charge in the communal gatherings that will comprise the Synod? We hear the charge in the words of Jeremiah 31:7-9: "I will bring them back...I will gather them from the ends of the world...I will lead them...so that none shall stumble."

Father Boxie was looking for his replacement in the neighborhood and invited us to join him in the search. And, if there are no young people in the pews, and there are not many, we need to engage them with the Bible where they will find truth. Father Boxie not only invited us to go into the neighborhood with the Sacraments and the Scripture; he invited us to take them to the kitchen table and serve them up at mealtime. The Synod also invites us to go a bit further and take the Gospel to the Bishops.

Through the boat ride from Mother Africa – through slavery and Jim Crow – through all the deaths in our neighborhoods after the murder of George Floyd - through more than four centuries of racism in the nation and the Church, we are still here, still faithful, and still building our Church. So many in our neighborhood are like Bartimaeus – blind and calling for help. And we are the crowd of Christians calling out to brothers and sisters in the neighborhood, "Take courage; get up, Jesus is calling you." If you are ready for the call – if you have responded to the call – say "thanks" to the one who called you.

Today, I do not want to know if you are with me. Are you with Jesus? Then "Get up, Jesus is calling you." I know two Black Catholic families that responded to the call – the Healy family of ten children is the first family – 5 religious vocations – the first bishop, the president of Georgetown University, a 1st Vatican Council Theologian, and two women religious. They also paid to send their little brother to school in Canada – a brother who commanded the most famous ship in the history of the Coast Guard – all before Augustus Tolton started his priesthood. And, that other favorite Catholic family – it's you – we have produced vocations, religious and other. As we go into the Synod from now until the end of 2023, let's go like Bartimaeus. As the family did before us, "Take courage; get up, Jesus is calling you." This is our faith; this is our Church.
