Chosen and Set Apart

A significant event takes place in the Garden of Eden just after the fall. God, speaking to Eve and the serpent, reveals the first prophecy of our redemption. When God asks Eve why she took the fruit from the forbidden tree, she confesses that the serpent tricked her into eating it. Then God addresses the serpent: I will put enmity between you and the woman, and between your offspring and hers; he will strike your head, and you will strike his heel. (Genesis 3:15, NRSV-CE).

This Scripture, known as the *Protoevangelium*, "the first gospel," shows that as quickly as sin entered the world, God was ready to redeem it. And so it is in the garden that we first glimpse Mary. She is the "woman" of this prophecy, not Eve, because it will be Mary's offspring who will crush the head of the enemy. This is the first seed of hope that God planned, planted, and prophesied: we will receive redemption and rise above the fall through the "New Eve," Mary, and by her son Jesus, the "New Adam" (see 1 Corinthian s 15:21-22).

God chose to create Mary sinless. *The Catechism of the Catholic Church* states:

Through the centuries the Church has become even more aware that Mary, "full of grace" through God [Luke 1:28], was redeemed from the moment of her conception. This is what the dogma of the Immaculate Conception confesses, as Pope Pius IX proclaimed in 1854: "The most Blessed Virgin Mary was, from the first moment of her conception, by a singular grace and privilege of almighty God and by virtue of the merit of Jesus Christ, Savior of the human race, preserved immune from all stain of original sin."

I was a bit embarrassed because I didn't know precisely what the Church teaches about Mary. I

couldn't have given these four truths from memory or with clarity, and I had been Catholic all my life. At the same time, I was perplexed. Instead of this recital of facts, I was expecting to hear of a personal epiphany regarding Mary or how he came to know her.

This question posed to my friend marked a moment of truth for me. I felt challenged to study and understand the dogmas of the Church regarding Mary. I felt an urgency to defend my own personal devotion and dependence on her. I wanted to build a case, so to speak, for my lived experience through the authority of the Church. The Church proclaims Mary as an essential part of the salvific plan of God. The truth is important for all Catholics, because part of our identity lies in the person of Mary.

As revealed to us in God's plan of salvation, Mary is mysterious, pure, and holy, but that doesn't mean we are unable to relate to her. She is more than a dogma of the Church. Mary is human: she experienced joys and sorrows, and she felt human feelings and emotions. Mary experienced the reality of daily life. She was let down by others. She went to public events. She practiced her faith. She had friends and relatives. She praised God. She had compassion. She had a personality. She wanted others to know her Son.

God planned and knew Mary, as he planned and knew us, before she was in her mother's womb. He knew her culture, her family dynamic, and all of the trials and triumphs of her life. She too was knit in her mother's womb and given the *ruah*, the breath of God, the breath of life.
