




## From Fr. Q's Desk

Having recently met with each of our parish councils, I realized that parish councils are somewhat new to our parishes, having been set up by Fr. Gill a few years ago. So I thought I'd try to answer some questions about the function of the parish council.

#### What is the parish council?

The parish council is a group of parishioners who offer advice to the pastor on important issues facing the parish. They also can serve as intermediaries between the pastor and the wider body of parishioners, facilitating communication in both directions. While they provide advice, final decisions are still made by the pastor.

### Who sits on the parish council?

These rosters are found on the parish website, and also published occasionally in the bulletin.

### When does the parish council meet?

I meet quarterly with our parish councils. (To preserve the integrity of our discussions, meetings are restricted to council members only.)

#### How are council members selected?

I appoint council members to three-year terms, with one or two members rotating off each fall. When looking for new council members, I generally look for parishioners who have a living relationship with the Lord and who actively participate in the life of the parish. They may head up a ministry, attend a faith formation program, regularly be present at Adoration or

daily Mass, or supply any of the much-needed help that makes our parishes run. In addition, I do my best to have the parish council broadly representative as a corporate body of the various demographic groups in the parish.

#### Can I suggest someone for the parish council?

Absolutely. If you see someone who fits the criteria just described, please bring him/her to

my attention.

# How do you employ the parish council in your decisions?

I suppose every pastor has his own leadership style, but here is mine when confronting any of the umpteen decisions I make for our parishes each year. Issues can be small, medium or large depending on their scope, urgency or permanence.

<u>Small issue</u>: I make a decision myself, after consultation when needed with some of the concerned parties in the parish. *Examples*: trash company contract; new kitchen equipment.


Medium issue: I do some research and formulate a proposal or list of options. I then take this to the parish council for feedback and advice before making a decision. *Examples:* campus signage; organizing a community event.

<u>Large issue:</u> I again formulate a proposal and bring it to the parish council. After taking their feedback into account, I then invite the feedback of the broader parish. *Examples:* church renovations; permanent change in Mass times.

# Can I speak to a parish council member about a question or concern regarding the parish?

Yes, definitely. While you are always welcome to raise an issue with me directly, you may also contact a council member to answer your question or to address your concern at the next meeting.

## Catechism of the Catholic Church

# Article 2 The Paschal Mystery in the Church's Sacraments

#### II. The Sacraments of the Church

1117 As she has done for the canon of Sacred Scripture and for the doctrine of the faith, the Church, by the power of the Spirit who guides her "into all truth," has gradually recognized this treasure received from Christ has determined its "dispensation." Thus the Church has discerned over the centuries that among liturgical celebrations there are seven that are, in the strict sense of the term, sacraments instituted by the Lord.

1118 The sacraments are "of the Church" in the double sense that they are "by her" and "for her." They are "by the Church," for she is the sacrament of Christ's action at work in her through the mission of the Holy Spirit. They are "for the Church" in the sense that "the sacraments make the Church," since they manifest and communicate to men, above all in the Eucharist, the mystery of communion with the God who is love, One in three persons.

1119 Forming "as it were, one mystical person" with Christ the head, the Church acts in the sacraments as "an organically structured priestly community." Through Baptism and Confirmation the priestly people are enabled to celebrate the liturgy, while those of the faithful "who have received Holy Orders, are appointed to nourish the Church with the word and grace of God in the name of Christ."

1120 The ordained ministry is at the service of the baptismal priesthood. The ordained priesthood guarantees that it really is Christ who acts in the sacraments through the Holy Spirit for the Church., they receive the Spirit of Jesus to act in his name and in his person. They are the sacramental bond that ties the liturgical action to what the apostles said and did and, through them, to the words and actions of Christ, the source and foundation of the sacraments.

#### **Christ Is Anything but Ordinary**

We're about to dive headlong into week two of Ordinary Time, and we need to admit, after the hustle and bustle of the holidays, things are indeed looking more ... ordinary, at least in our spiritual lives.

The transcendent highs of the Christmas season are flatlining a bit and the vivid imagery of the Nativity scene has faded. The solemn anticipation of the Advent season is by now a distant memory.

Are you bored yet?

Here's a secret: I think that Ordinary Time can actually be quite extraordinary, if we're really living out our baptismal call.

In today's Gospel, Jesus point-blank asks Andrew, who is following him after hearing John the Baptist's testimony: "What are you looking for?" He's asking us the same question.

What are you looking for? Why are you following me? Is it for the Christmas cookies and the Advent carols? Is it for the King's Cake on the Epiphany? Is it for the feeling we get on Christmas when we just know God has done a wondrous thing?

None of those things are bad, but they are not what Andrew was looking for, and they were not what Christ promised him when he said, "Come, and you will see." Andrew was looking for the Messiah — the One who makes even Ordinary Time extraordinary. The One who can sanctify the longest and dullest of to-do lists, on the longest and dullest of days. The One whose peace can reign in our homes on January 25, not just December 25.

Remember what you are looking for. Come, and you will see.

The Catholic Church is the longest-enduring institution in the world. Beginning with the first Christians and continuing in our present day, the Church has been planted in every nation on earth.

The Catholic Church claims Jesus Christ himself as her founder, and in spite of heresy from within and hostility from without, she remains in the twenty-first century the steadfast guardian of belief in his Life, Death, and Resurrection. The teachings and redemptive works of Jesus as told in the Gospels are expressed by the Church in a coherent and consistent body of doctrine, the likes of which cannot be found in any other Christian body.

The history of the Catholic Church is long, complicated, and fascinating, and in this book it is expertly and ably told by historian James Hitchcock. As in the parable of Christ about the weeds that were sown in a field of wheat, evil and good have grown together in the Church from the start, as Hitchcock honestly records. He brings before us the many characters—some noble, some notorious—who have left an indelible mark on the Church, while never losing sight of the saints, who have given living testimony to the salvific power of Christ in every age.

Fabian came to Rome after Pope Anteros died in 236. A layperson, he may have come for the same reason many still come to Rome today during a papal election: concern for the future of the faith, curiosity



about the new pope, a desire to grieve for the pope who had passed. Which one would be the new pope? Someone known for power? Someone known for eloquence? Someone known for courage? Suddenly during the discussion, a dove descended from the ceiling. But it didn't settle on "someone known" for anything at all. The dove, according to Eusebius, "settled on [Fabian's] head as clear imitation of the descent of the Holy Spirit in the form of a dove upon the Savior." There must have been something of the Holy Spirit working because everyone suddenly proclaimed Fabian as "worthy" to be pope and this stranger was elected.

## SAINT AGNES



**Agnes of Rome** (c. 291 – c. 304) is a virgin martyr, venerated as a saint in the Roman Catholic Church. St. Agnes is one of several virgin martyrs commemorated by name in the Canon of the

Mass. Agnes is depicted in art with a lamb, evoking her name which resembles the Latin word for "lamb", *agnus* (the given name is Greek, from *hagnē* ἀγνή "chaste, pure").
