


# From Fr. Q's Desk

Dear parish family,

After last week's celebration of the Baptism of the Lord, the Christmas decorations came down (thank you to all who helped un-decorate our churches!) and we have returned to a period that the Church terms "Ordinary Time". This period of Ordinary Time lasts until Ash Wednesday — March 3 this year. Lent and Easter interrupt Ordinary Time. It then picks up again after Pentecost (June 5) and continues until the feast of Christ the King (November 20).

Here is how our bishops describe Ordinary Time:

The Sundays and weeks of Ordinary Time take us through the life of Christ. This is the time of conversion. Ordinary Time is a time for growth and maturation, a time in which the mystery of Christ is called to penetrate ever more deeply into history until all things are finally caught up in Christ.

To make Ordinary Time a time "for growth and maturation", as the bishops propose, may I offer some suggestions?

or owth in Christian virtues. Virtues are nothing but ingrained good habits. (Vices are ingrained bad habits.) These are the habits we exercise—or don't—in the course of our everyday normal living. They are things like: patience, humility, generosity, thoughtfulness, piety, courage—the list could go on and on. What virtue do you think God wants you to grow in? What is one small way you could practice that virtue—daily or weekly—during this Ordinary Time?

• Recognition of graced moments. God speaks to us in a hundred ways each day, imparting his grace and favor. But grace surrounds us so much that often we are blind to its actions! Perhaps God has touched you through the voice of a loved one, or the kindness of a stranger, or the beauty of your backyard, or a moment's peace after dinner. We can grow in our appreciation of these graced experiences by examining our day before we got to be and say "Thanks" for three times that we saw God at work.

• Stepping back from the media whirlpool. Our world likes us to be anxious about many things. The media often sucks us in to its grasp. But God wants to convey his peace

and assurance to us—not to be wrapped up in every adverse event that afflicts our world. What if I aimed for a 10:1 ratio—that for every ten minutes you spend with TV/radio/internet,, you will devote one minute to sacred reading or prayer? Your ordinary time would be transformed.

May this Ordinary Time be a sacred time of

growth and maturation for you!

## Catechism of the Catholic Church

### THE SEVEN SACRAMENTS OF THE CHURCH **SECTION TWO**

#### **Article 2 The Sacrament of Confirmation**

### I. Confirmation in the Economy of Salvation

1291 A custom of the Roman Church facilitated the development of the Western practice: a double anointing with sacred chrism after Baptism. The first anointing of the neophyte on coming out of the baptismal bath was performed by the priest; it was completed by a second anointing on the forehead of the newly baptized by the bishop. The first anointing with sacred chrism, by the priest, has remained attached to the baptismal rite; it signifies the participation of the one baptized in the prophetic, priestly, and kingly offices of Christ. If Baptism is conferred on an adult, there is only one post-baptismal anointing, that of Confirmation.

1292 The practice of the Eastern Churches gives greater emphasis to the unity of Christian initiation. That of the Latin Church more clearly expresses the communion of the new Christian with the bishop as guarantor and servant of the unity, catholicity and apostolicity of his Church, and hence the connection the instruction, "Do whatever he tells you," her with the apostolic origins of Christ's Church.

## II. The Signs and the Rite of Confirmation

1293 In treating the rite of Confirmation, it is fitting to consider the sign of anointing and what it signifies imprints: spiritual and Anointing, in Biblical and other ancient symbolism, is rich in meaning: oil is a sign of abundance and joy; it cleanses (anointing before and after a bath) and limbers (the anointing of athletes and wrestlers); oil Let us examine our gifts and listen in the silence is a sign of healing, since it is soothing to bruises and wounds; and it makes radiant with beauty, health, and only then, let us do whatever He tells us. and strength.

Recognize God in your Everyday Moments

#### It Takes All Kinds

"If every flower wanted to be a rose," wrote St. Therese of Lisieux, "spring would lose its loveliness."

Who is God asking you to be today? There is an obvious answer that springs to mind right out of the gate. God wants me to be a good person (a good father, a good husband) today; today, God wants me to be a saint.

But this answer fails to get to the heart of the question. We are all striving today to serve the same Spirit, but we are given different gifts to do so. Think about the wedding at Cana and the players in the scene: the servers, the guests, the bride and groom. They all have a unique role to play, and though it is to the servers that Mary gives words apply to all.

Today, are we called to be the servers — do we wait on God's instruction and carry it out, no matter how foolish or impossible it may seem to our human ears? Are we asked to be the disciples, to bear witness to a miracle and to give our testimony? Are we called to imitate the Blessed Mother herself and give encouragement to follow God's word?

**READ:** The Walls are Talking: Former Abortion Clinic Workers Tell Their Stories

This book narrates the harrowing and life-changing experiences of former abortion clinic workers, including those of the author, who once directed abortion services at a large Planned Parenthood clinic in Texas. These individuals, whose names have been changed to protect their identities, left their jobs in the abortion industry after experiencing a change of heart. They have come forward with their stories, not for fame or notoriety, but to shed light on the reality of abortion. They want their stories to change the lives of others for the better.

These stories are difficult to read, because abortion is an act of violence, harming not only the obvious victim—the unborn child—but also the mother, the father, the doctor, and everyone else involved. But these stories also offer hope, for they show that anyone, no matter what part the person has played in an abortion, can start anew and make amends. They demonstrate that the first step on that journey is telling the truth, as these courageous individuals do in these pages.

"Those of us that have worked in the abortion industry all live with a constant burden. We can't let our burden slide off of our shoulders; it is what keeps us on fire. It reminds us of why we fight so hard. We have seen death and evil in a way that most haven't—and we participated. But we are forgiven. He who has been forgiven much, loves much. And we love a lot. I am eagerly awaiting the day when we can call all abortionists and clinic workers former and repentant abortion providers." — Abby Johnson, author

#### SAINT ANTHONY

Anthony the Great was a Christian monk from Egypt, revered since his death as a saint. He is distinguished from other saints named Anthony such as Anthony of Padua, by various epithets of his own: Saint Anthony, Anthony of Egypt, Anthony the Abbot, Anthony of the De-




sert, Anthony the Anchorite, Anthony the Hermit, and Anthony of Thebes. For his importance among the Desert Fathers and to all later Christian monasticism, he is also known as the Father of All Monks. His feast day is celebrated on 17 January among the Orthodox and Catholic churches and on Tobi 22 in the Coptic calendar.

#### SAINT AGNES



Agnes of Rome is a virgin martyr, venerated as a saint in the Roman Catholic Church, and Eastern Orthodox Church. St. Agnes is one of several virgin martyrs commemorated by name in the Canon of the Mass.

She is, among other patrocinies, a patron saint of virgins, girls<sup>[1]</sup> and chastity. Saint Agnes' feast day is 21 January.
