

From Fr. Q's Desk

With the month of November comes the changing of weather and especially the fall leaves. Having grown up in Arizona, where there are no leaves, the change in colors always comes as a welcome surprise to me. But it also reminds me of the "cycle of life" - that we, too, are like those leaves, vigorous for a time but ultimately destined for death and decay.

November is a roller-coaster of a month liturgically speaking. We begin with the great triumphant feast of All Saints on November 1, and then go immediately into the somber celebration of All Souls on November 2. Over the course of the month we are to consider especially the "Four Last Things": Judgment, Death, Heaven and Hell. The readings in the liturgy tend increasingly towards the Apocalypse and the end of time. The month then ends with the great

feast of Christ the King on the final Sunday of the liturgical year, before the new liturgical year begins with the first Sunday of Advent.

It seems, then, that the liturgical year mimics, in a way, the passing of the seasons: The end of the liturgical year echoes the falling leaves, which in turn portend

the end of our own human lives. No wonder that Judgment, Death, Heaven and Hell should be on our minds.

If you've never done it, you might consider it a fruitful exercise in your daily prayer this month to contemplate your own death. Who is there by your side at your deathbed? What is going through your mind, your heart and your soul? What will you feel as you leave this world and

Catechism of the Catholic Church

THE SEVEN SACRAMENTS OF THE CHURCH

SECTION TWO

II. Baptism in the Economy of Salvation

1243 The white garment symbolizes that the person baptized has "put on Christ," has risen with Christ. the candle, lit from the Easter candle, signifies that Christ has enlightened the neophyte. In him the baptized are "the light of the world." The newly baptized is now, in the only Son, a child of God entitled to say the prayer of the children of God: "Our Father."

1244 First Holy Communion. Having become a child of God clothed with the wedding garment, the neophyte is admitted "to the marriage supper of the Lamb" and receives the food of the new life, the body and blood of Christ. the Eastern Churches maintain a lively awareness of the unity of Christian initiation by giving Holy Communion to all the newly baptized and confirmed, even little children, recalling the Lord's words: "Let the children come to me, do not hinder them."⁴⁵ The Latin Church, which reserves admission to Holy Communion to those who have attained the age of reason, expresses the orientation of Baptism to the Eucharist by having the newly baptized child brought to the altar for the praving of the Our Father .

1245 The solemn blessing concludes the celebration of Baptism. At the Baptism of newborns the blessing of the mother occupies a special place.

1246 "Every person not yet baptized and only such a person is able to be baptized."

SAINT LEO THE GREAT

Saint Leo the Great, also known as Pope Saint Leo I, was one of the greatest popes of Chris-


tian history. He was the first pope to be given the title "the Great." Pope Sixtus III passed away while Leo was visiting Gaul. His task was to bring peace between one of Gaul's chief military commanders and the chief magistrate. Leo was then unanimously elected as the next pope to succeed Pope Sixtus III in 440. His swift election reflected the respect he had garnered among the people from his service to the Lord.

SAINT MARTIN OF TOURS

Just before Martin was born, Christianity was legalized in the Roman Empire and the bloody persecution of Christians soon came to an end.




At the age of fifteen, Martin was required to follow his father into the cavalry corps of the Roman military. As a young soldier, Martin encountered a beggar in Amiens. The beggar was unclothed and it was very cold. Martin removed his cloak, sliced it in two with his sword, and gave a half to the beggar and dressed himself in the remnant. That night, Martin had a vision in which Christ appeared to him. The vision spoke to him, "Martin, a mere catechumen has clothed me." In the early centuries of Christianity, that was a long process of instruction - and Martin was deeply dedicated to it. He was eventually baptized as a soldier of Christ




