United in Christ's Body



The Assembly of Believers

The worshipers at Sally's church have come from different places to assemble as one community of faith. When the opening hymn begins and all raise their voices in song and prayer, they become something more than just a group of assorted individuals. They become a liturgical assembly, doing the most important thing that Catholics can do—celebrating the Eucharist.

When a parish community comes together to celebrate the Eucharist, you can see that all kinds of people make up the Body of Christ. Rich and poor, old and young, hearty and frail, people come together from all nations and cultures to share in the Mass, the celebration of their salvation through Christ. Together they become an assembly of the People of God. Christ is truly present in the people assembled.



The Real Presence


The Eucharist is central to Catholic life because it unites Christ's followers more closely to him and to one another. In the liturgy, Catholics celebrate the special presence of Christ. During the Eucharist, Christ is present in the assembly, in the priest, in the word of God, and in the Eucharist. Most important, Christ is present in the sacred Bread and Wine, which truly become his Body and Blood. This unique, true presence of Christ in the Eucharist under the appearance of bread and wine is called the Real Presence.

In the liturgy the people remember with thanksgiving the Paschal mystery of the Lord through prayer, song, sacrament, listening, active participation, and reception of Holy Communion. All gathered are united to the sacrifice of Christ through which new life comes.



The **liturgical assembly** is the community of believers who come together for public worship, especially in the Eucharist.

The **Real Presence** is the true presence of Christ in the Eucharist under the appearance of bread and wine.

Why do Christians celebrate the Lord's day?

When Sally joins the parish community for Mass on Sunday, she may not be aware that she is stepping into a living tradition many centuries old. In the time of the early Christians, Sunday was the Lord's day, the day on which the community celebrated the Resurrection of Jesus. The Church continues this practice today.

The Eucharist is the high point of a life of faith shared by a community. The Christian community must be built day by day, as Saint Paul advised an early Church community.

Sunday Observance

According to Jewish custom, the Sabbath began on Friday evening. The early Jewish Christians adopted this custom.

Similarly, the Church begins its observance of Sunday on Saturday evening. Because of this, Saturday evening Mass is considered part of the Sunday observance.

Participation in the Sunday Eucharist is a privilege and a duty. It offers the opportunity to meet God in a dialogue through Christ and the Holy Spirit. To deliberately stay away from Mass on Sunday regularly without a very good reason is a serious matter.


How does your parish observe Sunday?



Liturgical Ministries

Within the community, certain members of the Church are called to special service as ordained ministers—bishops, priests, and deacons. By the power of the Holy Spirit, bishops and priests preside, or act as leaders of the Eucharistic assembly. Deacons assist them.

Other members called by the community also have distinct roles in the liturgy. They are greeters, choir members, cantors, musicians, readers, altar servers, and extraordinary ministers of Holy Communion. All of these people help the assembly worship as one community.




Forms of Service

Leader: Let us share with one another a sign of


Christ's peace.


Live Your Faith

Saint Catherine of Siena 1347-1380

People of Faith

Catherine's father owned a small clothdyeing business in the Italian republic of Siena, but her family was not influential. From her earliest years, Catherine was drawn to a life of prayer and self-denial. Through her relationship with God, she acquired such force of personality that she became an important spiritual counselor to many people. Before reaching the age of thirty, she was a valued adviser to two popes. Saint Catherine's feast day is April 29. She was declared a Doctor of the Church in 1977
