

The Dead Sea Scrolls



Focus Why are the Dead Sea Scrolls important?

Faith Fact

Bedouin comes from the Arabic word bedu, which means "inhabitant of the desert."

Family records, photographs, and books help you learn from the past about your family. Similarly, ancient documents help modern scholars understand biblical times. In 1947 some ancient documents called the Dead Sea Scrolls were found in caves near the Dead Sea. Here is the story of their discovery.


BIOGRAPHY

VOICES FROM THE PAST

One day in 1947, three shepherds of the Ta'amireh tribe of bedouin people were herding their goats on a rocky cliff along the northwest shore of the Dead Sea in Palestine. One shepherd, Jum'a Muhammed, saw the goats climbing too high, and he climbed the cliff to bring them back.

The shepherd noticed a cave—but the opening was too small for him to enter. Could there be a treasure inside? He called his cousins, Khalil Musa and Muhammed Ahmed el-Hamed. They climbed up to see, but it was getting dark.

Two days later, Muhammed Ahmed el-Hamed got up at dawn. He left his two cousins asleep and climbed the cliff. The slender



Muhammed Finds a Treasure

Muhammed reached into one jar after another. Eight of them were empty. The ninth was filled with dirt. Exploring further, he finally felt three bundles, two wrapped in cloth and one in leather. Muhammed pulled them out and rushed back to his cousins, eager to show them what he had found.

The others were disappointed. What kind of treasure was this? A pile of old scrolls! The shepherds had no idea that they held in their hands the greatest archaeological discovery of the century. The Dead Sea Scrolls, as they

became known, contain the earliest complete text of the Book of Isaiah, as well as other fragments of Scripture. The scrolls, which have been carefully preserved, probably date from the first century

before Christ.

Focus Why is the Liturgy of the Word important?

Every time you open the Bible, you discover a treasure—the word of God. Even though the Bible was written long ago, it still reveals a message from God to you today.

God's word in Scripture is not something you can interpret on your own. The Church's understanding of the message of Jesus comes to you from the Apostles and from the life of the Church and its teachers. That understanding, handed on to and further understood by each new generation of Christians, is called Tradition. Scripture and Tradition have one common source: the Word of God conveyed through God's revelation.

SCRIPTURE

"Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly, as in all wisdom you teach and admonish one another, singing psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs with gratitude in your hearts to God."

Honoring God's Word

Ritual actions let the assembly know the importance of the word of God. The readings are proclaimed from the ambo, the podium-like structure situated to the side of the altar. A lighted candle is usually placed near the ambo. After the first and second readings, the reader pauses and then says, "The word of the Lord," and you reply, "Thanks be to God."

Sometimes, incense is used to reverence the Book of the Gospels. After the priest or deacon reads the Gospel, he raises the book and then kisses it to show honor and love of God's word.

Proclaimed and Preached

The Liturgy of the Word is the first of the two main parts of the Mass. In readings from the Old and New Testaments, God speaks to the heart of each person. Jesus is truly present in the word as it is proclaimed and preached in the liturgy, just as he is truly present in the consecrated Bread and Wine.

The Liturgy of the Word

First Reading	The first reading is from the Old Testament or from the Acts of the Apostles.
Responsorial Psalm	The assembly usually sings a response taken from the psalm, and the choir sings the verses.
Second Reading	The second reading is from one of the New Testament Letters or from the Book of Revelation.
Gospel Acclamation	An alleluia is sung, except during Lent, to express the assembly's anticipation of the Gospel.
Gospel Dialogue/ Gospel Reading	Each person traces a cross on forehead, lips, and heart before the Gospel is proclaimed.
Homily	The priest or deacon explains God's word.
Creed	Usually, the Nicene Creed is professed.
Prayer of the Faithful	The assembly prays for the needs of Church leaders, the faithful, and the world.

Words of Faith

Scripture is the holy writings of the Old and New Testaments, the written word of God.

Tradition is the living process of handing on the message of Jesus through the Church, especially through its teachers.

Breaking Open the Word




Focus How do you live God's word?

The word of God nourishes the Christian community in the liturgy. By reflecting on the Sunday readings either before or after Mass, you allow God's word to become a real part of your life. When that happens, you live God's word.

Reflect on the Word

- Begin with a prayer asking the Holy Spirit to open your heart to hear God's word.
- Read the Gospel or one of the other readings aloud.





Saint Jerome c. 341-420

People of Faith

Jerome was a Christian, but he loved the Latin literature written before the Romans accepted the Christian faith. One night in a dream, God accused Jerome of preferring this literature to the Bible. Jerome awoke from his dream a changed person. He spent the rest of his life studying the Bible. Jerome's knowledge of Hebrew and Greek enabled him to produce a Latin translation of the Bible. called the Vulgate, which the Church used for the next 1,500 years. Saint Jerome's feast day is September 30. He is the patron saint of biblical scholars.
