

### The Blessed Easter Basket

In many cultures, it is a tradition, to have food blessed to share at the Easter meal. Provided for you is a list of suggested foods. Please adapt the list to your particular culture or tradition. This blessed meal breaks the Lenten Fast and brings the joy of Easter into the home. Yes, we will even bless the Easter Baskets full of great sweets and candy.

Bread: Traditionally a round loaf marked with a cross symbolic of Jesus "the Bread of life come down from heaven" (Jn 6:35), the breaking of which extends eucharistic fellowship into the home.

Paschal Lamb: Lambs made of cake, butter, or sugar with a red & white banner proclaim Christ as the final victor over death and evil. (Ry 12:11).

Smoked Meats: All meats, sausages, and, ham symbolize the Paschal sacrifice of the new covenant. Jesus frees from sin and eternal death bringing Exodus liberation to final completion.

Easter Eggs: The colored egg shell represents Christ's tomb. It is often died in onion skins for a rich earth tone. The yoke is reminiscent of the radiant sun. Written eggs or pisanki proclaim the glory of the Resurrection. Horseradish & Vinegar: The bitter herbs of Passover were fulfilled In Christ's sorrowful passion and drinking sour wine while hanging on the cross. Traditionally, sweets are eaten only after tasting some horseradish as a reminder that Christ's suffering opened the door to never-ending jubilation.

Wine: The Psalms extol the proper use of wine which gladdens the heart (Ps 104:16). For the baptized, wine points to the fullness joy at Eucharistic fellowship.

**Salt:** "You are the salt of the earth" (Mt 5:13). The faith, hope and love of Jesus' followers

give zest and meaning to dally life, preserving all that Is good.

#### Babka, Placki, & Sweets:

Children make Lenten promises often by giving up candy. All Easter candy points to the sweetness of the heavenly kingdom. Yeast-raised cakes iced with sugar allow the family to "taste and see the goodness of the Lord" (Ps 34:9).

The Pussy Willow: The pussy willow is the Polish "palm" whose catkins first announce the increasing light & warmth of the sun's gentle spring rays. A Polish Easter hymn states that at His resurrection Christ "blossomed forth as a wondrous flower."

**Spring Greens:** Sprigs of parsley, boxwood, myrtle, periwinkle, or even store-bought grass symbolize the new life of the eternal Spring won through Christ's resurrection.

# From Your Parish Nurse

How to answer the question: "Where does my money go?"

Checking your bank account balance can be a sobering experience, as those digits can leave you wondering why the number isn't as large as expected. The answer can be found by creating a simple list of income and expenses. Call it a budget, spending plan, or



financial blueprint, knowing what's happening to your hard-earned cash is crucial to your financial health.

#### Creating a budget:

- Shows you where your money needs to go,
- Lets you see where you could cut back,
- Allows you to systematically reduce debt and reach savings goals,
- Makes your finances easier to manage.

There are some things you must spend money on each month, such as housing, food, and transportation. Once you know where your money must go, you can decide how much to spend on things you have more control over, such as

Internet streaming services, meals out, manicures, or date nights. A budget can also help you more easily manage payments and monthly expenses, as it gives you the opportunity to plan for them. In addition. your budget can include savings that go directly into an emergency fund for items like car and home repairs, making those unpleasant surprises more manageable. Savings can also be put toward more pleasant goals, such as vacation, house down payment, or a new car. Whatever your goal, a budget helps you get there.

#### **Palm Sunday**

I've always loved Palm Sunday. I loved the procession, the longer the better, with palms waving. I imagine myself at the time of Jesus, squeezing between people to catch a glimpse of the miracle worker. Everyone around me is shouting, "Hosanna!" It feels like a festival and excitement is buzzing in the air and in my heart!

This year we find ourselves in the extraordinary circumstance of celebrating Palm Sunday at home. We are challenged to examine the meaning of this day and what it means to us personally. To help you, imagine learning that Jesus was coming, not just to your town, but to your house! Imagine Him walking up your driveway. How would you welcome Him? I don't have palm branches to wave but I would make sure the house was clean and a hearty meal ready. I would show Him to a comfortable chair and give

We invite Him when we "attend" mass virtually and reach out to friends and neighbors to make sure they're okay. So, make this day a day of celebration! Use the nice plates and make a dessert. Talk about the ways Jesus is revealing Himself through the people in our lives and the blessings we have received even in times of trouble.





# Holy Week Suggestions

So that you may enter fully into the celebration of the Holy Week Services, I offer you the following suggestions:

#### **Palm Sunday**

For the blessing of Palms, find a branch that is beginning to sprout, cut it, bring it into your home. Even a potted lily or other spring flower will work.

#### **Holy Thursday**

Although you cannot receive Holy Communion, take extra time to reflect on what a wonderful gift we had in receiving the real presence of Jesus every time we came to His altar. Perhaps there have been times that we have taken the gift of the Eucharist for granted. Pray for our brothers and sisters

that still do not have the opportunity to take part in receiving Jesus in Communion or hearing his word because they live under oppression.

#### **Good Friday**

Reflect on the greatest love story told, written, and lived for us.

#### **Easter Saturday (Vigil)**

We will have Blessing of the Easter Food Baskets at 1 p.m. by way of the web site. Although this primarily may be an eastern European tradition, I encourage those of you that are of a different culture, to adapt the foods to your tradition. It doesn't have to be your entire Easter meal, but something that you can share with your family at the Easter meal.

#### **Easter Sunday**

Renew your Baptismal promises with your family. Share happy, hopeful stories of family and friends. Share the blessed food, it brings the joy of Easter into the home. Make it a day to recognize the ordinary blessings, especially the blessings of family. Make it a positive day, a day full of hope and joy. Jesus is risen. He is present to us. Alleluia! Alleluia!

Being good citizens means we are all striving to follow Governor Whitmer's "Stay Home, Stay Safe" executive order through Easter Monday (April 13, 2020). As Archbishop Vigneron mentioned in his letter earlier this week, this challenge presents unprecedented difficulties. But there is no time without grace and opportunity for spiritual growth.

There are numerous ways in which all of us in the Archdiocese of Detroit—our parishes, schools, clergy, religious and laity—are supporting each other in building up the Body of Christ during this time. I would like to direct you to a particular resource that you may find helpful for your faith life during these challenging days. *Formed* is a collection of Catholic resources for you and your family to enjoy. During this time of social distancing, they are offering a free 40-day subscription. While many have access to *Formed* through their parish, now everyone has access for free for the next few weeks.

I encourage you to sign up for this resource and make use of the Bible studies, faith formation opportunities, and Catholic movies available. Signing up only takes a few easy steps:

- 1. Visit www.formed.org and click "Sign Up."
- 2. Click "I belong to a Parish or Organization."
- Type "Faith at Home Detroit" in the box under Create New Account. (You'll see it populate from the drop-down menu.) Click "Next."
- 4. Enter your first and last name as well as your email.
- Now you're registered! You can also download the app on your Smartphone. If you need further assistance, contact *Formed* at www.help.formed.org or toll-free at 844-367-6331.

In addition to this resource, I encourage you to stay connected to our website <u>spiritualcloseness.org</u> where daily faith resources are available for you and your family. Please share both of these resources with your neighbors, friends and families in your phone calls, emails, group chats, and video conferences as a way for each of us to "unleash the Gospel!"

Finally, we have even more resources planned, especially during Holy Week and into the Easter Season. Keep the faith!
