

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

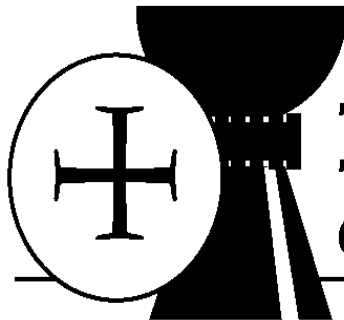
With the close of the Christmas season and the feast of the Baptism of the Lord last Sunday, we now transition into the liturgical season known as Ordinary Time. Despite the name “ordinary,” this is not a “less important” time, but rather a period for counting the weeks (the *ordinal* numbers) of Christ’s life and ministry, a season of growth and maturation. The liturgical green symbolizes this life and growth, as we seek to deepen our understanding of Jesus’ teachings (his *parables*) and apply them to our everyday lives.

Most of you are aware, Fr. Raphael wrote his farewell letter to us last Sunday. And at the 11:00 AM livestream Mass at our Church of the Transfiguration, we said goodbye to him. On January 13, 2026, Fr. Raphael flew back to Connecticut and entered the nursing facility of the Felician Sisters. I am truly grateful for his willingness to come out from his eastern province to help our cluster community even in a short period of time. I always enjoyed living and working with Fr. Raphael. His joyful heart and faithful service to the cluster will be remembered. In many ways he has given us an example of servant leadership so beautifully, and I look forward to continuing to build upon the vibrant community that he fostered. While we say goodbye with heavy hearts, we also look forward with hope, confident that God has great things in store for Our Lady of Grace – Transfiguration Parish Cluster here in Castro Valley. Let us continue to pray for Fr. Raphael as he makes a transition to his next chapter. We pray God’s richest blessings upon him and his caregivers so that he may have full recovery and strength.

Now I direct your attention to the announcement this weekend “Vietnam/Philippines Typhoon Disaster Relief.” Our Vietnamese and Filipino brother priests of our diocese have written to our Bishop Barber out of deep concern for the suffering in their home dioceses in Vietnam and the Philippines. Both have suffered much damage to life and property. Given the pain and suffering to our brothers and sisters, and with the unanimous consent of the Presbyteral Council, Bishop Barber has authorized pastors to take up a voluntary second collection between now and February 1st to aid typhoon disaster relief in Vietnam and the Philippines. Please consider helping our brothers and sisters. This is not just about disaster relief; it’s about living out our faith in a real, tangible way, reflecting God’s commandment to love our neighbors as ourselves. Thank you for your generosity.

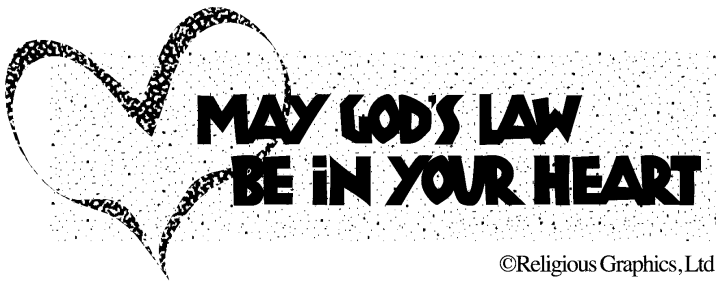

The Third Sunday in Ordinary Time (January 25th)

Matthew 4:12-23

When Jesus heard that John had been arrested, he withdrew to Galilee. He left Nazareth and went to live in Capernaum by the sea, in the region of Zebulun and Naphtali, that what had been said through Isaiah the prophet might be fulfilled: *Land of Zebulun and land of Naphtali, the way to the sea, beyond the Jordan, Galilee of the Gentiles, the people who sit in darkness have seen a great light, on those dwelling in a land overshadowed by death light has arisen.* From that time on, Jesus began to preach and say, “Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand. As he was walking by the Sea of Galilee, he saw two brothers, Simon who is called Peter, and his brother Andrew, casting a net into the sea; they were fishermen. He said to them, “Come after me, and I will make you fishers of men.” At once they left their nets and followed him. He walked along from there and saw two other brothers, James, the son of Zebedee, and his brother John. They were in a boat, with their father Zebedee, mending their nets. He called them, and immediately they left their boat and their father and followed him. He went around all of Galilee, teaching in their synagogues, proclaiming the gospel of the kingdom, and curing every disease and illness among the people.

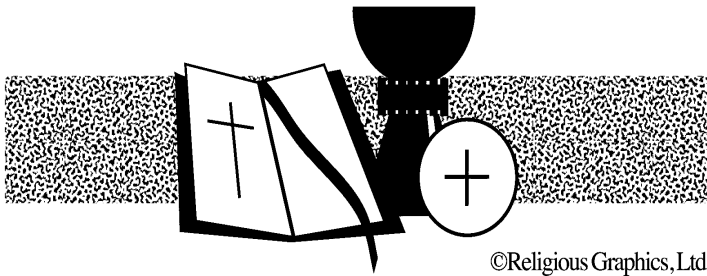
COFFEE AND DONUTS January 25th

'THANK YOU' FROM MARK VAZ

To The Congregations of Our Lady Of Grace and Transfiguration:

My deepest thanks and gratitude to all who prayed for me, visited me in the hospital, sent Get Well cards, and named me in Mass offerings during my nearly four months of hospital care in late 2025.

The unexpected and shocking suddenness of it all---like finding one's self buried alive in a diabolical nightmare---was exceeded only by its severity---massive cardiac arrest, collapsed lungs, and other breakdowns of bodily functions (the exact cause of which, to this day, remains unknown).

I would have died on the spot, had I not already been at the Tri-Valley Stanford hospital, having undergone a procedure to prevent the occurrence of the heart condition known as "A-fib." Ironically, the procedure was a complete success---it was, in its aftermath, that some strange factor caused my body to go haywire. But medical personnel sprang into action, and I got further life saving treatment on the helicopter that that airlifted me to Stanford's world-class facility in Palo Alto.

A friend of mine called my survival a "Miracle," and I credit the grace of healing prayers and the support of family and friends in making my miracle possible. Happily, I kept my good humor throughout. And as the days, weeks, and months dragged on, the love and prayers of my faith community sustained me, kept me going.

Although I've fully recovered and was discharged from the hospital system in mid-November, my rehabilitation continues (months lying on a hospital bed has an enervating effect on one's muscular system). Rehab is a process, not a quick fix, and I've taken to heart the inspirational messages many of you shared with me, such as this scriptural quotation from 1 Peter 5:10:

"And the God of all grace, who called you to his eternal glory in Christ, after you have suffered little while, will himself restore you and make you strong, firm and steadfast."

That's a Promise--and our Destiny.

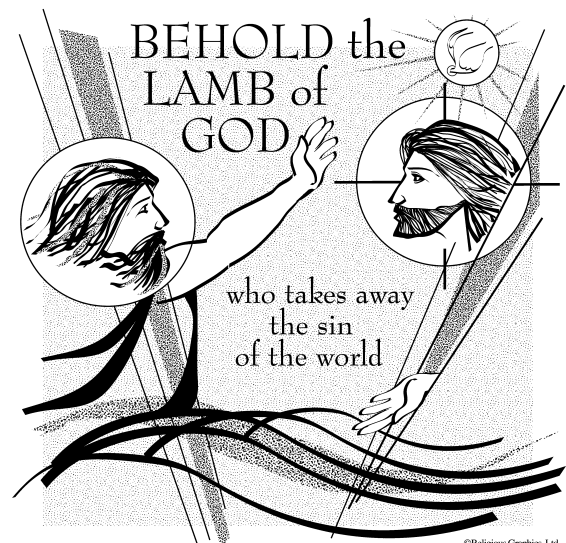
