They made it an udderly (hehe) fantastic day for our St. James students by bringing Bella, a newborn friend, and an adult Holstein named Alaska to school! Kindergarteners in Ms. Cole's class learned their first high frequency word "I" this week and worked on writing a sentence using the word I. They worked on using the skills of blending to write the words for their sentence about what they like to do with their families.




First graders did not feel leaaved (hahaha) out on Tuesday as they were able to enjoy the sunshine and outdoors in the morning.

Students in Ms. Miller's class went on a leaf and plant hunt to answer their focus question on how many different types of plants live in their school yard. They gathered leaves and plants for a sorting activity in science where

they compared and contrasted. They used adjectives to describe what the leaves look, feel, and sound like when they were done leafing through them.



Third graders worked really hard to create a presentation about their classroom learning on Crayfish to their work in Mrs. Brinning's technology class. Students worked collaboratively to put a Google Slide presentation together and used the Swivl to video themselves presenting their final result. We are using the Swivl on the school side a little bit to see how we can incorporate that technology into the classroom. We are grateful that the parish side allows us to share!



I enjoyed my time in fourth grade earlier this week. I was doing a walkthrough that provided an opportunity to assist Ms. Johnson! Students were working in Google Classroom to complete their vocabulary assignment. I was intrigued by their work because 1) Ms. Johnson was incorporating technology into reading (cross-curricular instruction and learning) and 2) there was mention of 4-Square. I thought that this meant students were going to play one of their favorite recess games. I was wrong! Ms. Johnson used a John Hattie instructional strategy of worked examples by providing a template on Google Classroom for students to access. On each slide students entered one of their vocabulary words in the middle. In one square they wrote the definition, in another the part of speech (i.e. noun, verb, adjective), in the other two squares they included an example and a non-example. Students were working on vocabulary, typing, using technology, following directions, remembering, understanding, and applying skills. I was able to help students follow directions and navigate Google Slides. It was nice to work with the fourth graders in the classroom. I'm glad that Ms. Johnson and her class welcomed me in!"They [students] have

grown so much in what they can do independently on Google Suite in the past two weeks!" - Ms. Johnson.

The three year olds had fun learning about apples this week. The instructional goal was to name parts of an apple and

to investigate what apples look like inside. The students determined that: apples can be red, green and yellow. Sometimes two colors are on the same apple. Apples feel smooth, they grow on trees, and hang on a branch by a stem. When students observed a cut and opened apple, they learned that the inside of the apple is white. That's the part we like to eat! It's called flesh. Students discovered seeds inside and a hidden shape, a star! Mrs. C. is one smart apple to incorporate hands on learning, science, and art together. It was easy as apple pie for students to make art with their apples by stamping using paint, an apple, and paper. How about them apples?



# Calendar Change



Due to our mitigation strategies in keeping St. James and Washington Community Schools healthy and safe for students, families, and staff, we have incurred some negative effects. ### New Instructional Materials

I'm really excited that we just received some of our 95% Group materials! The objective of utilizing these resources is to get 95 percent of students reading at grade level with our primary focus being kindergarten through second grade. The 95% Group program includes using research-based methodologies through a comprehensive approach to support students through interventions. The screeners will help classroom teachers to identify gaps, set goals, and plan steps to raise reading achievement. Teachers will be able to: identify and effectively address the needs of struggling readers by providing implementation plans that include a strategic mix of: systematic and cumulative skill continuum, meaningful diagnostic assessment tools, evidence-based and explicit instructional materials.

### New Addition

One of our parents has joined our St. James family as our Speech Language Pathologist through the Grantwood Area Education Agency (GWAEA). Jacalya is the mother of Ledger (kindergarten) and Renner (3 year old preschool). She has been working with students and staff in a variety of ways and we

are learning so much from her. Mrs. Milledge even makes us do quizzes on what we have been learning! It is AAC Awareness month. Do you know what AAC means? It stands for augmentative and alternative communication. Speaking is not the only mode of communication. Some of our students use other ways to communicate such as through gestures, sign language, text, writing, and typing. Will you accept this challenge? In the next few days, think about how often you communicate without words. How often do you use facial expressions, text, gestures etc. to interact with others? One of our questions was if you could only pick five words to use for the day, what would they be? Mine included Mt. Dew. It was interesting to see the results where some were very specific like me and others were broad as in please or more. We are all learning how to be more aware of how we communicate with others and what others need in order to be able to communicate with us.
