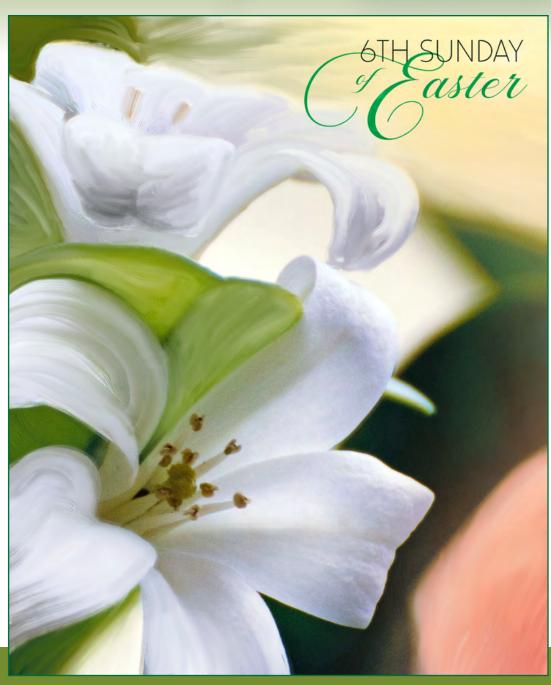

A few Things....

Many of us have experienced a great movie, a Broadway production, an amazing concert. Usually we leave that experience with a positive feeling, appreciating the talent of all involved. What we sometimes don't think about are the hours of work behind the scenes.

When we come to St. James to participate in the liturgy and other events, we experience the event without thinking of the dedicated service of so many that make things happen. With the greatest sincerity and appreciation, I want to thank the many parishioners, benefactors, and staff that have contributed time, talent, and treasure for the benefit of our parish.

The following is an update of current projects within the parish:

Thank you, thank you, thank you, to all of those that contributed to the Ukraine. Our parish contributed approximately \$8900 for the cause.

Another "muchas gracias" to all those that supported our youth mural project. With the combined generosity of the youth and your willingness to assist, we were able to cover the complete cost of this worthwhile project in the amount of \$9600.

Our Remembrance Garden project is progressing well through the hard work of the dedicated committee. As of this date, approximately \$30,000 of the anticipated expense of \$58,200 has been raised. The \$30,000 includes the purchase of benches and bricks as well as financial, materials and labor donations. Please consider the purchase of a brick or bench for the remembrance garden. The church seating committee has been hard at work. We have agreed to move forward with transitioning

from all the current seating to pews with kneelers and some chairs in certain areas. We have selected the company to do the work. Plans are still evolving.

I am happy to share with you that because of the generous support that was given to the Catholic Services Appeal (CSA) 2021, we already have approximately \$150,000 set aside for this project. The parish has received permission to have the focus of our Catholic Service Appeal (CSA) 2022 as the main funding source for this project. After we meet our target of \$174,128, the overage has been dedicated to the new seating project. I am happy to report that we have received to date pledges and donations in the amount of 113,000 or 65% of our target for CSA 2022. If you have not already pledged or donated to the CSA, please give serious consideration to make the sacrifice.

A friendly reminder to those that prefer to wait until the end of the year to make a significant contributios to the parish, please designate the funds be used for CSA 2022. For those that did so last year, it was beneficial to the parish by lowering our 2022 CSA target as well as giving us a significant amount of funds to designate for our new seating.

In the words of Blessed Solanus Casey, our local saint: "Let us thank God ahead of time." Thank you to all who are willing to give back in thanksgiving for the blessings you have received. We have built upon the sacrifices of those who built our parish, we are grateful to those who now support our parish, and now we move forward asking generous hearts to build for

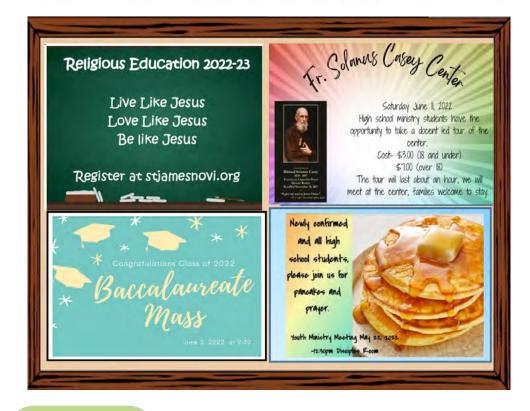

John 14:23-29

Where do you sit in church? We laugh at how we sit in the same location every time we attend Mass. It may be out of habit or because we are comfortable there. It may be so friends can find us or so our children can see what is happening.

When my family joined St. James 16 years ago, our children were very young. We wanted them to pay attention so we sat near the front, second row of the right section. A group of senior citizens were seated right behind us each week and seemed to have a close bond. My children were antsy and

constantly chatting, being silly or otherwise entertaining themselves. I felt bad because I was sure they were distracting our neighbors. Then one Sunday after Mass, Ms. Marianne leaned forward and said, "When I see your family, I see love." That was when I realized we were not just a part of St. James, we were part of a family within the parish. Starting that day, we looked forward to seeing the rest of our pew crew. We caught up each week and the friendship eventually extended beyond the church walls. Our church friends came to the girls' plays and graduations and we helped them when needed. What was a new and sometimes awkward environment now felt like home because of the love we shared.

In today's Gospel Jesus tells His friends "Whoever loves me will keep my word and my Father will love him, and we will come to make a dwelling place in him." (Jn 14:23) Just as we like to have our own seat in church or at home, Jesus wants to have a place, not just in the church, but in our hearts. How do we welcome Him? When we welcome those around us, when we forgive our neighbors for small irritations and accept each other's differences. When we celebrate together and wish each other peace He is at home in our hearts.

Our pew crew has changed over time. Some are celebrating Mass with us from heaven and our children have gone to college. But we still sit with those present and welcome other parishioners to our church family.

So, go ahead and sit in the same place each week, but open the doors of friendship to people God has put around you. Offer God a seat in your row and your heart.

May God bless and strengthen your family!

Fast Facts About Arthritis

Asthma is a disease that affects Arthritis is a general term for conditions that affect the joints, tissues around the joint, and other connective tissues. Here are more fast facts about arthritis:

General Arthritis Facts

- There are more than 100 types of arthritis.
- Specific symptoms vary depending on the type of arthritis, but usually include joint pain and stiffness.
- Osteoarthritis is the most common form of arthritis. It occurs most frequently in the hands, hips, and knees.
- Experts don't know the causes of many forms of arthritis.
- Certain risk factors make it more likely that you will develop arthritis.

Arthritis Statistics

- An estimated 58.5 million US adults have arthritis. Experts believe that number will grow as our nation's population gets older.
- Arthritis is a leading cause of work disability among US adults.
- An estimated 25.7 million adults are limited in their usual activities because of arthritis.
 That number is expected to grow to 35 million by 2040.
- Arthritis is common among people with other chronic conditions including obesity, diabetes, and heart disease.

Treating and Managing Arthritis

- There is no cure for arthritis, but it can be treated and managed.
- Treatments include medication, non-drug therapies such as physical therapy or patient education, and sometimes surgery.

- Managing arthritis symptoms is important to reduce pain, prevent or delay disability, and improve overall quality of life.
- CDC's Arthritis Program recognizes 5 ways to manage arthritis and its symptoms: learn new self-management skills, be active, talk to your doctor, manage your weight, and protect your joints.
- Physical activity programs and self-management education programs teach adults with arthritis how to manage their arthritis symptoms and other related challenges.

Why is physical activity important for people with arthritis?

If you have arthritis, participating in joint-friendly physical activity can improve your arthritis pain, function, mood, and quality of life. Joint-friendly physical activities are low-impact, which means they put less stress on the body, reducing the risk of injury. Examples of joint-friendly activities include walking, biking and swimming. Being physically active can also delay the onset of arthritis-related disability and help people with arthritis manage other chronic conditions such as diabetes, heart disease, and obesity.

How do I exercise safely with arthritis?

Learn how you can safely exercise and enjoy the benefits of increased physical activity with these S.M.A.R.T. tips.

- Start low, go slow.
- Modify activity when arthritis symptoms increase, try to stay active.
- Activities should be "joint friendly."
- Recognize safe places and ways to be active.
- Talk to a health professional or certified exercise specialist.

Start low, and go slow

When starting or increasing physical activity, start slow and pay attention to how your body tolerates it. People with

arthritis may take more time for their body to adjust to a new level of activity. If you are not active, start with a small amount of activity, for example, 3 to 5 minutes 2 times a day. Add activity a little at a time (such as 10 minutes at a time) and allow enough time for your body to adjust to the new level before adding more activity.

Modify activity when arthritis symptoms increase, try to stay active.

Your arthritis symptoms, such as pain, stiffness, and fatigue, may come and go and you may have good days and bad days. Try to modify your activity to stay as active as possible without making your symptoms worse.

Activities should be "joint friendly."

Choose activities that are easy on the joints like walking, bicycling, water aerobics, or dancing. These activities have a low risk of injury and do not twist or "pound" the joints too much.

Recognize safe places and ways to be active.

Safety is important for starting and maintaining an activity plan. If you are currently inactive or you are not sure how to start your own physical activity program, an exercise class may be a good option. If you plan and direct your own activity, find safe places to be active. For example, walk in an area where the sidewalks or pathways are level and free of obstructions, are well-lighted, and are separated from heavy traffic.

Talk to a health professional or certified exercise specialist.

Your doctor is a good source of information about physical activity. Health care professionals and certified exercise professionals can answer your questions about how much and what types of activity match your abilities and health goals.

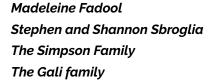

Catholic Relief Services

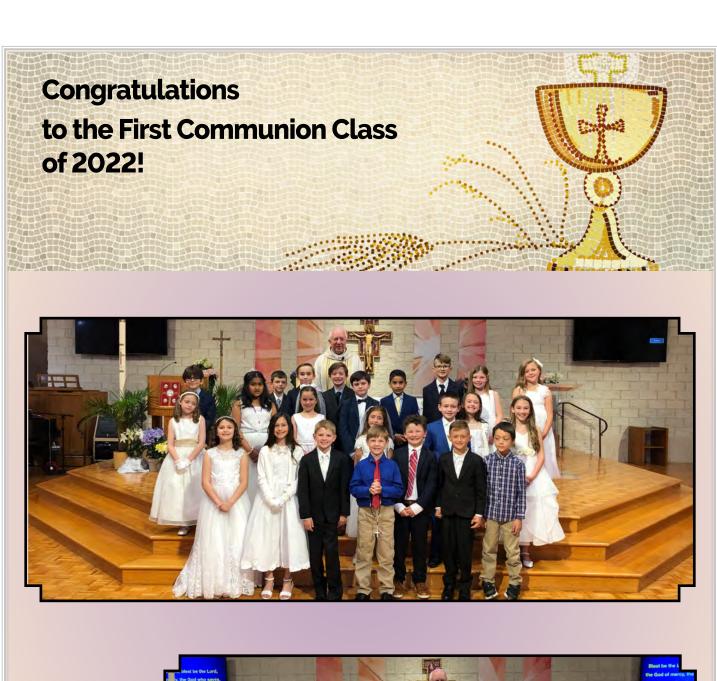
Catholic Relief Services Supporting Relief Efforts in Ukraine and Neighboring Countries

The "Triumph" statue is the focal point. The statue is an image of Christ resurrected, and its base have already been generously funded by donors.

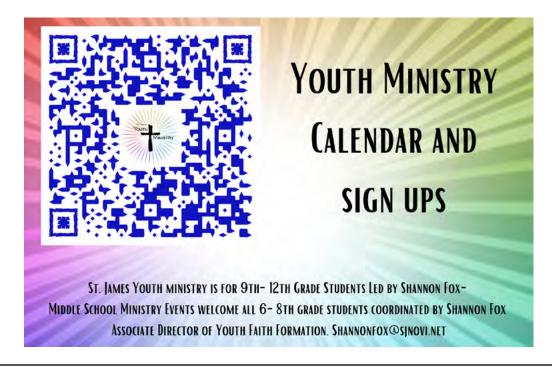
The remainder of the garden project will be funded through donations of engraved paver bricks to celebrate a special occasion or remember a loved one along the garden pathway.

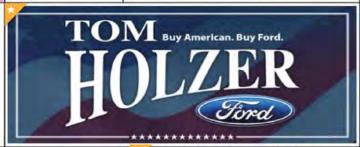
