THE PRAYING FAMILY Creating a space to intentionally pray together

The Christian family is the first place of education in prayer. Based on the sacrament of marriage, the family is the "domestic church" where God's children learn to pray "as the Church" and to persevere in prayer. For young children, in particular, daily family prayer is the first witness of the Church's living memory as awakened patiently by the Holy Spirit.

-The Catechism of the Catholic Church (2685)

The "little oratory," according to the Catechism of the Catholic Church (2691) is a place where the Christian family can go to foster "prayer in common." This prayer space or "prayer corner" is considered a favorable place for prayer. This space might include a Bible, icons, rosaries, candles, or any other religious objects that help point us heavenward in our thoughts in gaze.

A Catholic home is a place where prayer and faith are fostered. Having a space where family members can go alone or as an entire family can be an incredibly fruitful and useful tool in teaching the foundations of our faith, how to pray, and creating a life-long relationship with God.

This bag was created to help families create this intentional space. We've included the basic items that we think will help foster faith and prayer in your family home, specifically during Easter and the month of May, which is the Month of Mary.

Once you get your prayer space setup and find a rhythm of prayer there with your family, we've included a few more resources to help you continue growing in faith and prayer together.

O ANTIPHONS CARD

The Roman Catholic Church has been singing the O Antiphons (most commonly heard in "O Come, O Come Emmanuel") since the 18th Century. The theology of the O Antiphons uses ancient Biblical imagery from the messianic hopes of the Old Testament to proclaim the coming of Christ. Their repeated use of the word "Come" embodies the longing of all for the Divine Messiah. (from usccb.org/prayers/o-antiphons-advent)

CREATE-YOUR-OWN CRECHE

The word "Creche" is French for a Nativity Scene and oftentimes refers mostly to baby Jesus in the manger. Based on the O Antiphons, color, cut, and design your family's creche to be hung on the wall in your prayer space.

O COME, O COME EMMANUEL CARD

Many are overly familiar with the hymn, "O Come, O Come Emmanuel," but few know how it originated. Our hope is singing this hymn as a family helps bring a new awareness to the longing for Jesus Christ at Christmas.

ADVENT SPOTIFY PLAYLIST

Enjoy listening to our our Advent Spotify Playlist as a family during the Advent season as opposed to more popular Christmas music. Advent is a special liturgical season that prepares us for the coming of Jesus Christ in a new way each Christmas. Our hope is this playlist will help refocus your hearts on the true meaning of Advent and Christmas.

NEW YEAR'S RESOLUTION SHEET

Use the New Year's Resolution sheet to help your family brainstorm and decide on some ways you would like to grow as a family this coming year. Entrust these intentions and desires to the Bl. Virgin Mary during prayer on Jan. 1, which is the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God.

HOLY WATER AND BAPTISMAL PROMISES

At Mass that Sunday, bring the holy water bottle provided and fill it with your parish's holy water. Use this holy water during your family prayer during the renewal of your family's Baptismal promises.



PLANNING YOUR PRAYER TIME

So, what now? We recommend you pick a day and time that work best for your family to pray at least once a week together. Once you have established a day and time, try your best to guard this time, keeping it sacred and set aside for family prayer. If you have a conflict one week with your prayer day, plan a different day and time to pray as a family for that week, and keep it protected from other plans steering your prayer time off course.

HOW LONG SHOULD WE PRAY?

Each family will require different needs, and certain prayers take more time than others. Commit as a family to a length of your prayer time and try your best to keep it consistent each week. The "sweet spot" is about 10-20 minutes of prayer together. If you have small children, 10 minutes may be the maximum time to hold their attention. You know your family best! Below is a suggested format for organizing family prayer that you may adapt to best fit your family's needs.

PROPOSED PRAYER SCHEDULE: ADVENT

Begin with the sign of the cross, asking your family members to remember they are in the Holy Presence of God.

Begin by singing and/or playing as a family "O Come, O Come Emmanuel" using the card provided and/or Spotify playlist.

Color and cut the first O Antiphon item of your creche while reading the prayer for the appropriate O Antiphon. Tape your creche item to the wall in your prayer space. The creche will continue to build throughout your prayer sessions.

Advent is also a time to perform an act of penance. Discuss one way your family can offer something up as a gift to Jesus in the coming week. At next week's prayer time, draw a picture of your gift to Jesus and place it in your creche display.

To close your prayer time, ask your family if they have intentions they would like the whole family to prayer for. Invite them to share those out loud, and close with a Glory Be.

*If you have older children, invite them to take turns leading your prayer time.





PROPOSED PRAYER SCHEDULE: NEW YEAR'S DAY

Begin with the sign of the cross, asking your family members to remember they are in the Holy Presence of God.

Begin by singing and/or playing as a family a Christmas Hymn of your choosing.

Remind your family that today is not only New Year's Day, but the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God. Ask your family what it means to them that Mary is their heavenly mother, and invite them to share out loud.

Since New Year's Day is typically a time to make new year's resolutions, you can use the provided sheet to brainstorm ways your family would like to grow in the upcoming year. Post the sheet in your prayer space as a reminder of your resolutions.

To close your prayer time, entrust your family resolutions to Mary by praying a Marian prayer, such as the Hail Mary, Hail, Holy Queen, or a decade of the Rosary.

*If you have older children, invite them to take turns leading your prayer time.

PROPOSED PRAYER SCHEDULE: JAN. 8

Begin with the sign of the cross, asking your family members to remember they are in the Holy Presence of God.

Begin by singing and/or playing as a family a Christmas Hymn of your choosing.

Let your family know that the end of the Christmas season is on The Baptism of the Lord, which is today. We are called to remember our own Baptism as our birth into the Catholic Church.

Get out your family calendar. Locate and log every family member's Baptism date (this may take a bit of work in advance to find the dates ahead of time). Throughout the year, you can celebrate each member's Baptism day.

For your children, tell them what made their Baptism day so special in your eyes. Using the holy water (which should have been filled at Mass that morning), sign each child on the forehead. Together as a family, renew your Baptismal promises using the provided sheet.

*If you have older children, invite them to take turns leading your prayer time.
