

247. "How do you become a Catholic priest?"

Priesthood is a sacred vocation within the Catholic Church, one that is not simply chosen by an individual but a gift given to him from God. The primary purpose of a priest is to share in Jesus' mission of evangelization, bringing the Gospel to all people, just as Jesus chose 12 men to share in His unique mission.

DISCERNMENT OF A DIVINE CALLING. The first step is always discernment. This does not mean the person needs to be 100% certain they are called to the priesthood, but they have a considerable intuition that God may be calling them to it. Discernment includes personal prayer and discussion with a trusted spiritual director.

INQUIRY STAGE. After careful discernment, the next step is to contact a local diocese or religious order. The vocation to the priesthood is nearly always specific, being called to serve in a particular diocese or religious order. There will be a vetting period during which the vocation is tested to see if it is from God or simply a human desire.

PSYCHOLOGICAL EXAMINATIONS. All Catholic organizations have an in-depth process of psychological examinations and criminal background checks. Some areas can be improved with proper counseling and growth, while others are impediments to the priesthood.

ACCEPTANCE & SEMINARY FORMATION. After these stages are completed, the individual is accepted as a candidate for the priesthood. He is given the task of seminary formation, being sent to *college* seminary where he receives a college education or a *major* seminary where the education is adjusted to his situation.

ORDINATION TO THE DIACONATE. Before being ordained a priest, a man must first be ordained a transitional deacon. This is the last and final stage of discernment.

ORDINATION TO THE PRIESTHOOD. The last and final step is the actually ordination given at the hands of a bishop. The sacramental character of Holy Orders, like that of Baptism, is indelible.

Reading II: Philippians 2: 1-11, or 2: 1-5

The scholars tell us this beautiful passage Paul quotes is actually from an early Church hymn. The first part sings of the Lord's abasement; the second of His earned exaltation.

The Gospel: Matthew 21: 28-32

This parable continues earlier stories in Matthew about the people who actually are part of God's kingdom. Jesus tells the religious leaders in his audience that "tax collectors and prostitutes are going into the kingdom of God ahead of you." The folks who look the least religious will enter God's kingdom ahead of religious leaders because in the end they do God's will.


Niches Available: Holy Mount Cemetery Terrace Gardens and Columbarium



The soup kitchen in New Rochelle

Our parish is assigned to the soup kitchen on the second Wednesday and the third Tuesday of each month. Volunteers prepare food for their choice of one or both dates: to feed about 10-15 people.

- Bottle of Italian Dressing

Turkey Chili:

- 1 lb. lean ground turkey, crumbled
- 1 tbsp. all-purpose flour
- 1 tbsp. olive oil
- 1 14.5-oz. can diced tomatoes
- 1 14.5-oz. can black beans ¼ cup tomato paste
- 1 package McCormick chili mix at desired spice level

Heat oil in a wide skillet or pot over medium heat. Add turkey, sprinkle flour over turkey and work into turkey with a spoon. Cook turkey until browned, about 5 minutes. Add tomatoes and their liquid, beans, tomato paste, and chili mix. Stir to combine and simmer over medium-low heat until chili is slightly thick, about 8 min.

247. "¿Cómo hacerse sacerdote Católico?"

El sacerdocio es una vocación sagrada de la Iglesia Católica, vocación que no es simplemente escogida por un individuo, sino que es un regalo de Dios. El propósito primario de un sacerdote es compartir en Jesús la "misión de la evangelización," traer el Evangelio a toda la gente, tal como Jesús lo hizo con 12 hombres para asi, compartir Su misión única.

EXAMEN PSICOLÓGICO: Todas las organizaciones Católicas tiene un proceso profundo de exámenes Psicológicos y de revision de carpetas policiales. Algunas de estas áreas pueden ser mejoradas con orientación adecuada, mientras que otras son simplemente impedimentos para el sacerdocio.

ACEPTACIÓN Y FORMACION EN EL SEMINARIO: Después que estos escalones han sido logrados y aceptado, el individuo es ingresa como candidato para el sacerdocio. Se les da la tarea de la formación en el seminario, pueden ser enviados a una universidad/seminario donde recibirán una educación universitaria ajustada a las necesidades de la situación.

ORDENACIÓN PARA EL DIACONADO: Antes de ser ordenado sacerdote, el candidato debe ser ordenado diácono de manera transitoria. Este es la etapa final discernimiento.

ORDENACIÓN PARA EL SACERDOCIO: El último escalón es el de la ordenación Sacerdotal dada por la mano del obispo mismo Este sacramento de Ordenación Sacerdotal, es como el bautismo, indeleble.
