

PASTOR'S MESSAGE

Understanding God's Justice

What do we make of this seemingly unfair and unjust parable in the Gospel today? Or, is it really unjust or unfair? Whose standard are we using in determining what is just or unjust? Let's clarify some things first. The landowner gave what he promised to the workers who arrived first, who worked 8 hours that day. He gave them what they agreed upon from the very beginning. When we speak of justice, it is giving what is due to the person, respecting what has been agreed upon. So, we can say that the landowner was just to them even if they felt slighted. (continued)

PASTOR'S MESSAGE (CONTINUED)

But, what do we make of the decision of the landowner to give exactly the same wage to those who worked less? This action of the landowner is not just that of justice, but of charity and of love. To give more than what is due to a person is not just justice, but is love, charity. But, doesn't this encourage people to get lazy and just arrive late --- anyway, they would be getting the same thing? Why exert and work for more hours if I would be getting the same pay for less hours?

The purpose of Jesus giving us this parable is for us to understand and adapt this to the ways and workings of the Kingdom of God. Let me share with you a story. It is about a lady who told me that her husband had a very sweet deal before he died. She said that all throughout their married life, her husband had been very skeptical and even disrespectful of her Catholic faith. He was always challenging the teachings of the Church, though he was always with her at Mass for the past 55 years. But, a few days before he died, he asked for a priest and told the priest that he wanted to be baptized. So, the priest asked him if he believed in the faith the Catholic Church professes. And, he said, yes. He was baptized and, after two days, he died. The wife complained that how fair is it that he could enter heaven just like that because, as we all know, all of our sins are removed upon baptism. She said, "Father, I have been a Catholic all my life and have to work really hard to merit the Kingdom of God, and I'm not even sure that I will make it in the end." In this story, we can say that the wife has been working diligently far more hours in God's vineyard, decades and decades of laboring in the field of discipleship, while her husband only worked less hours (we may say he worked officially for two days in the field, not even exerting much effort in those two days). But, the same eternal life or spiritual wage that was promised to his wife was also given to him. Can we say that God is not being fair and just here because that same promise of eternal life given to the wife during her baptism decades ago was also given to the husband who was only baptized two days before he died? Of course not! More than justice, this shows us God's love, God's desire that he doesn't want to lose anyone from his embrace. By virtue of our baptism, God was very clear as to what our wage would be; it's uncomfortable to speak in the language of wage because eternal life is more than just a spiritual wage -- we don't even have a right to it because it is a pure gift. And, this is what Jesus wants to emphasize: "Don't be jealous if I am also offering to

others the same eternal life that I have promised to you. Yes, you might have been laboring already for many years, and this brother of yours right here just started working but, you see, I want him to get the same reward as what you will get because I love you all, and I don't want to lose him in as much as I don't want to lose you". But, if that's the case Father, I will then just commit to working in the field or in the vineyard of God during my last few years --- anyway, God will be offering me the same reward. Well, we don't know when our time will be. Good for the husband in the story that he was given time to make it right with God but, as for us, we don't know if we will be given another opportunity if we wait and wait for us to collaborate with God in his vineyard. Plus, it's not so much about the reward or the wage in the end. It's about the joy of being in the vineyard. There's nothing more joyful and satisfying than being right with God, receiving his grace.

I remember one time I anointed a person who left the Church for many years (probably for 50 years), and then, when he was 70, he decided to return to the church. When he was 78 in his deathbed, he told me, "Father, I regret those years that I abandoned God in my life. I know deep within my heart that God has forgiven me already, and I feel incredible peace of being reconciled with him 8 years ago, but I can only imagine my life would have been more joyful and satisfying if I didn't abandon him in those fifty years". This guy received his spiritual wage when he died, but he regretted those years that he decided not to be part of God's vineyard. So, yes, we would be missing a lot if we are only after the reward in the end. It's not about the wage that we would be receiving at the end, but the day to day experience of being in the vineyard of God. Yes, those who might have worked less might receive the same wage as those who worked more hours, but those who worked less also missed the opportunity, the joy and the blessing of what it is to be part of God's vineyard from the beginning. As they say, "the joy is not in the destination, but in the journey". It's not in the reward or in the wage, but the opportunity to be with the Master, with God. As collaborators of God in his vineyard, are we more focused on the wage at the end of the day, or do we relish more the experience and the incredible joy of being in the vineyard? - Fr. Cary

PARISH GUIDELINES ON THE REOPENING OF MASSES

Mass attendance will be limited to 50 people in accord with government directives. This includes the celebrant, essential ministers, cantors, musicians and anyone present.

WEEKDAY MASSES (8AM MONDAY TO SATURDAY AND 6PM WEDNESDAY): There is no need to sign up. But, people have to sign in. Attendance is on a "first come first served" basis. 50 people maximum. The doors of the church would be closed 10 mins before Mass.

WEEKEND MASSES (SATURDAY VIGIL AND SUNDAY MASSES): Due to the large number of people who wish to attend the Vigil and Sunday Masses, sign up is required. Attendees will be chosen through lottery. Parishioners can sign up for Vigil and Sunday Masses by sending us an email at massreg@stceciliachurch.org with the following information: name/s of the attendees, phone number and preferred Mass time. Though email is ideal, you can also sign up by calling the parish main line:

503-644-2619. There is no guarantee that you will get your preferred Mass time as this depends on the availability of the slots. People will be chosen through lottery and will be notified by Friday.

A general dispensation from the Sunday Mass obligation will remain in place for those who cannot attend Mass. Anyone attending Mass does so at his or her own risk. Vulnerable, at-risk and otherwise concerned persons should remain home. Anyone who has even the slightest symptoms or feelings of sickness must remain home.

Face coverings are legally required at indoor gatherings, including in churches, per statewide and archdiocesan directives. Exceptions are made for people with disabilities or diagnosed medical conditions that preclude them from wearing masks. Those attending without face coverings due to the exemptions mentioned above are asked to use the cry room.

Weekly prayer table gatherings will be held online on **Saturday mornings at 9am.**



MEET OUR EXTENDED FAMILY: ST. ANDREW KIM TAEGON (FEAST DAY SEPTEMBER 20)

Andrew Kim Taegon was the son of Christian converts. Following his baptism at the age of 15, Andrew traveled 1,300 miles to a seminary in Macao, China. After six years, he managed to return to his country and that same year, crossed the Yellow Sea to Shanghai to be ordained a priest. St. Andrew Kim was the first Korean-born priest; he is the patron saint of Korea. The Christians of Korea were heavily persecuted in his lifetime, and many were forced to practice their faith underground. St. Andrew Kim and over 100 other Christian witnesses were martyred for their faith.

Besides St. Andrew Kim, Pope John Paul II canonized 99 Koreans and three French missionaries, who had been martyred between 1839 and 1867, when he visited Korea in 1984. Among them were bishops and priests, but, for the most part, they were lay persons: 47 women and 45 men.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK: KOREAN BULGOGI

2 pounds of boneless rib eye steak (or sirloin)

½ pear or apple, peeled and grated

½ cup soy sauce

3 tablespoons sesame seed oil

4 cloves of garlic, finely minced

2 tablespoons of sugar (white, brown, or honey)

1 tablespoon of grated ginger (or 2 teaspoons of dried ginger)

1-2 tablespoons of gochujang (Korean red pepper paste)

2-3 green onions, thinly sliced; 1-2 teaspoons of sesame seeds

Wrap the steak in plastic wrap or a freezer bag, and place in the freezer for about 30 minutes. Be careful not to freeze it! In a large bowl, combine fruit, soy sauce, 1 tablespoon of sesame oil, garlic, sugar, ginger, gochujang, and one of the sliced green onions. Whisk it all together until well combined. NOTE: You can use more or less gochujang to adjust the level of spice. Slice the steak into small, thin strips. Be sure to slice across the grain and keep the pieces about ¼ inch thick. Combine the steak and marinade in a freezer bag or a large bowl, cover, and marinate for at least 2 hours, although overnight is preferred.

Heat a grill pan, wok, or a large skillet over medium-high heat with a tablespoon of sesame oil. Add the steak in small batches. Cook 2 to 3 minutes on each side until charred and cooked through and remove from pan. Repeat with another tablespoon of sesame oil until all the meat is cooked. Garnish with remaining green onion and sesame seeds. Enjoy with steamed rice. You may also want to make lettuce wraps with rice, bulgogi, and a little extra gochujang.
