From our Pastor's Desk

Father Alfred Tumwesigye

Praised be Jesus Christ! This weekend of November 22, 2020, as we celebrate the Solemnity of **Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe,** at St. Elizabeth Parish we begin the **Liturgy of the Hours and Exposition of the Holy Eucharist**. Every Sunday evening (7:00-8:00 p.m.) we will be gathering together for one hour adoration with evening prayers (Vespers) with and of the whole Church.

I remember when in 1997, at an orientation course to join the seminary life, was given a book <u>Christian Prayer: The Liturgy of the Hours</u>, a one volume version of the Liturgy of the Hours. It was a beautiful well bound book and there were all these ribbons in the book. Along the years as I prayerfully and skillfully moved between different parts of the book without missing a line, I found it enriching to my spiritual life, along with those with whom I prayed with.

I'm therefore happy to announce that over the next years, we will be coming together every Sunday evening for the celebration of the Liturgy of the Hours and Exposition of the Holy Eucharist. Drawing from my own personal experience, I am certain that this will transform our lives and our parish community, and will help us, little by little, to see the world, our neighbors, and even ourselves as God sees us.

Christ told us about the necessity "to pray always without becoming weary." (Luke 18:1). Our Lord Jesus teaches us the need of persistent prayer so that we not fall victims to temptation. Prayer and praise is a fundamental duty of every Christian toward God. As Saint Ignatius of Loyola put it: "Man was created to praise, venerate and serve the Lord his God, and in this way to save his soul."

All of us are invited to pray the Liturgy of the Hours with each other, whether that happens to be alone in our rooms or in our families, with a small group before a daily Mass, or with a larger community.

Those of us clergy and religious are morally bound, to the celebration or the entire and daily recitation of the Liturgy of the Hours, and you the laity too are encouraged to participate as often as possible.

This prayer of the universal Church is done seven times a day: i.e. <u>Office of Readings · Morning Prayer</u> (Lauds) · <u>Mid-Morning Prayer</u> (Terce) · <u>Midday Prayer</u> (Sext) · <u>Afternoon Prayer</u> (None) · <u>Evening Prayer</u> (Vespers) · <u>Night Prayer</u> (Compline).

As a community, we will be doing together **the Evening Prayer (Vespers)** giving thanks for the day just past and making an evening sacrifice of praise to God (see Psalm 141:1), and our Lord Jesus in the Eucharistic Exposition and Adoration with Benediction.

Please come join in prayer every Sunday evening at 7:00 p.m. I hope and pray that you will find spiritual nourishment, strength and consolation in praying together Liturgy of the Hours as we all go through these difficult, uncertain times.

People who pray together stay together in God's service to this work, according to the image of Christ's own prayer to the Father, "for where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them" (Matthew 18:20).

"Who wants to be a saint?" is how I started our class at the start of November on "How Do Saints Become Saints – and Can I Become One Too?" It's been quite a month reflecting upon all saints, on our own holiness, and praying for the souls of the faithful departed who have gone before us. In a way, it was also striking to kick off our celebration of 150 years as a parish in the context of remembering especially the holy souls who have gone before, who set an example for us of "Strong in Faith!"

This weekend we celebrate my favorite day in the Church year – the Solemnity of Jesus Christ, King of the Universe. Yes, the Easter Triduum is THE biggest and most important liturgy in our Church year (a continually unfolding 3-day liturgy commemorating Christ's passion, death, and resurrection.) But Christ the King is still my favorite. I love how we end our year with a final reminder that in the end, all of creation will be taken up into Christ our head, and become one in God through Christ Jesus. It reminds us of the proper order of things, and the finality in Christ and in God. It reminds us that regardless of the craziness around us in the world, God is eternally in control, and we are part of that grace and peace inasmuch as we turn our lives over to Christ and become one in Him.

Next week we kick off Advent and a new Church year, so this weekend is like "New Year's Eve" of the Church year, and next Sunday is like "New Year's Day" of the Church year. At my day job, our fiscal year also ends at the end of November, so I have come to make my New Year's Resolutions each year aligned to the Church year (and my work year) instead of with the secular new year in January.

Give this some thought this week... if you make a "Church New Year's Resolution" as we kick off Advent and the new Church year next week, what would it be? Some ideas:

- Resolve to read the Gospel during the week, before coming to Mass, and pray about what it means for you in your life.
 During the year, learn about and start to practice *Lectio Divina* prayer.
- Resolve to attend 1 or 2 Faith Formation sessions/classes during the upcoming Church year.
- Resolve to pray the Rosary each day, or if you already do, to make a stronger effort to reflect upon the Mysteries of Christ's life and ministry that they present.
- To commit to an additional act of charity or service each week... Perhaps to ask the parish if there's something you could do in an hour a week of volunteering.
- To join a Bible study group.
- To make an hour of Adoration each week... or, for starters, once a month (sign up at adorationpro.org/elizabethil)
- To join us for Sunday evening Vespers and Holy Hour.
- To meet someone new at church.

Our parish family provides so many wonderful ways to grow in prayer, in faith, and in discipleship. Give some prayerful discernment to what you can do differently in this "new year."

IMPORTANT CORONAVIRUS GUIDELINES UPDATE

To comply with the current IDPH and CDC guidelines, and to adhere to our Diocesan guidance on the practice of our faith, we will now be operating within these high-level guidelines:

- Church capacity remains at 25% as it has these many months, with seating areas marked to allow for safe distancing.
- Meetings of parish organizations and councils, faith formation gatherings, and the like should comply with a maximum of 10 participants or 25% of the capacity of the meeting space, whichever is lesser. When possible, we should make use of digital meeting technology (Zoom, etc.) to allow participation without in-person gathering. If your organization needs support with digital meeting tech, contact tech@stelizabethgc.org.
- Our school will continue operating under its ongoing guidance from the deanery, Diocesan Office of Catholic Education, and the county and state health departments.
- When possible, please call or email the Parish Office for parish business, reducing the number of visitors to the Parish Office as much as is possible.


MARCH FOR LIFE
