Sunday of Divine Mercy Domingo de la Divina Misericordia

It is significant that Jesus returned with his wounds intact. Not only hadn't they healed, they were just as visible and palpable as on the day he was taken from the cross. Even after he had been raised from the dead, brought to heaven, and returned to appear to the disciples in his resurrected body, he retained the wounds inflicted upon him on the day he was crucified. The Body of Christ, which we receive in the Eucharist, which is made manifest in the Church, is also physically wounded, remains physically wounded. These very real wounds continue to be present today in our sinfulness, in our suffering, and in those in need. How necessary is the gift of divine mercy we receive from one who remains wounded himself!

Where and when do I recognize Christ's wounds in the body of Christ? What can I do to heal those wounds?

Resulta significativo que Jesús regresara con sus llagas intactas. No sólo no habían cicatrizado, sino que estaban tan visibles y palpables que el día que lo bajaron de la cruz. Aún después de haber resucitado de entre los muertos, subido al cielo y regresar para aparecerse a los discípulos en su cuerpo glorioso, las llagas que le infligieron el día que fue crucificado todavía permanecían. El cuerpo de Cristo que recibimos en la Eucaristía y que se manifiesta en la Iglesia, también está físicamente herido y permanece físicamente herido. Esas llagas tan reales siguen presentes hoy en nuestros pecados, en nuestros sufrimientos y en todos los necesitados. ¡Cuán necesario es el don de la divina providencia que recibimos de aquel que aún permanece herido!

¿Dónde y cuándo reconozco las llagas de Cristo en el cuerpo de Cristo? ¿Qué puedo hacer para sanar esas heridas?

SECOND SUNDAY OF *Easter* (OR SUNDAY OF DIVINE MERCY)



SENT

In Jesus' first appearance to his disciples, as described in today's Gospel, Jesus sends the disciples, and all who follow him: "As the Father has sent me, so I send you." Jesus speaks to us here: we the Church are a "sent people," sent to participate in God's mission, that is, God's purposes and activity for all of humanity. Like Jesus was sent to Israel, we are sent to witness to our world of the boundless love of God, and to offer an alternative way of living based on that love. The wounds that Jesus displayed to his disciples remind us that this new way of life often involves both dying to the familiar and comfortable, and rising to the new and unknown. When we join in efforts to challenge injustice, heal broken relationships, or care for those on the margins of society, we share in the death and resurrection of Jesus.

THE WEEK BETWEEN

In today's Gospel, we notice there was a week between Jesus' first appearance (without Thomas), and the following appearance (with Thomas). During this week, Thomas chose to stay with the community. But why? Perhaps he trusted his friends in some way. Perhaps he reflected on their life with Jesus and on the possibility their account was true. In the week between, Thomas stayed and lived with the questions, and with his doubts. Importantly, the disciples did not cast him out as an unbeliever. It seems they accepted and loved him, just as he was.

Perhaps many of us live in this "week between." We have questions and doubts. We can choose to leave or to stay. We can either engage or ignore our deepest questions. If we embrace our questions with courage, we can live into them. Perhaps we will encounter, through God's initiative, and with the help of our companions in faith, some of the answers—and new questions along the way.

PRIMARY DIMENSIONS

We are currently in Year C of the three-year Lectionary cycle. For the Second Sunday of Easter, in all three years, the first reading is from the Acts of the Apostles. Year A (from Acts 2) tells of the new Christian community's dedication to prayer. Year B (from Acts 4) tells of their sharing of goods and deep bonds of trust in each other. Today we hear in Acts 5 of the early Church's ministry of healing to the community, performed by Peter and the apostles.

These represent three of the primary dimensions of those first Christian communities: prayer in relationship to God; sharing in relationship to each other; and service in relationship to the world around them. We are reminded that all three are fundamental to our identity as Church. We fail to live fully as Church when we neglect any of these relationships. We are called to encourage their full flowering in our own parish's life.

ENVIADO

En la primera aparición de Jesús a sus discípulos, descrita en el Evangelio de hoy, Jesús envía a los discípulos y a todos los que le siguen: "Como el Padre me ha enviado, así los envío yo". Jesús nos habla aquí: nosotros, la Iglesia, somos un "pueblo enviado", enviado a participar en la misión de Dios, es decir, en los propósitos y la actividad de Dios para toda la humanidad. Al igual que Jesús fue enviado a Israel, nosotros somos enviados a dar testimonio a nuestro mundo del amor ilimitado de Dios, y a ofrecer una forma alternativa de vivir basada en ese amor. Las heridas que Jesús mostró a sus discípulos nos recuerdan que esta nueva forma de vida a menudo implica tanto morir a lo familiar y cómodo, como levantarse a lo nuevo y desconocido. Cuando nos unimos a los esfuerzos para desafiar la injusticia, sanar las relaciones rotas, o cuidar de los que están en los márgenes de la sociedad, compartimos la muerte y la resurrección de Jesús.

LA SEMANA INTERMEDIA

En el Evangelio de hoy, observamos que hubo una semana entre la primera aparición de Jesús (sin Tomás) y la siguiente (con Tomás). Durante esta semana, Tomás decidió quedarse con la comunidad. Pero ¿por qué? Tal vez confiaba en sus amigos de alguna manera. Tal vez reflexionó sobre su vida con Jesús y sobre la posibilidad de que su relato fuera cierto. En la semana intermedia, Tomás se quedó y vivió con las preguntas y con sus dudas. Lo más importante es que los discípulos no lo expulsaron como incrédulo. Parece que lo aceptaron y lo amaron, tal como era.

Quizás muchos de nosotros vivimos en esta "semana intermedia". Tenemos preguntas y dudas. Podemos elegir entre irnos o quedarnos. Podemos comprometernos o ignorar nuestras preguntas más profundas. Si abrazamos nuestras preguntas con valor, podemos vivir en ellas. Tal vez encontremos, por iniciativa de Dios y con la ayuda de nuestros compañeros de fe, algunas de las respuestas y nuevas preguntas en el camino.

DIMENSIONES PRIMARIAS

Nos encontramos en el año C del ciclo trienal del Leccionario. Para el segundo domingo de Pascua, en los tres años, la primera lectura es de los Hechos de los Apóstoles. El año A (de Hechos 2) narra la dedicación de la nueva comunidad cristiana a la oración. El año B (de Hechos 4) nos habla del reparto de bienes y de los profundos lazos de confianza entre ellos. Hoy escuchamos en Hechos 5 el ministerio de sanación de la Iglesia primitiva a la comunidad, realizado por Pedro y los apóstoles.

Esto representa tres de las dimensiones principales de aquellas primeras comunidades cristianas: la oración en relación con Dios; el compartir en relación con los demás; y el servicio en relación con el mundo que les rodea. Se nos recuerda que las tres son fundamentales para nuestra identidad como Iglesia. No vivimos plenamente como Iglesia cuando descuidamos cualquiera de estas relaciones. Estamos llamados a fomentar su pleno florecimiento en la vida de nuestra parroquia.

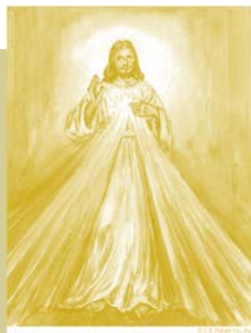

DIVINE MERCY SUNDAY (APRIL 27, 2025)

Jesus asked the Church, through St. Faustina, to institute the Feast of Mercy, emerging from the very depths of His tenderness, for the consolation of the whole world:



“My daughter, tell the whole world about My inconceivable mercy. I desire that the Feast of Mercy be a refuge and shelter for all souls, and especially for poor sinners...I pour out a whole ocean of graces upon those souls who approach the fount of My mercy. The soul that will go to **Confession** and **receive Holy Communion** shall obtain complete forgiveness of sins and punishment. On that day all the divine floodgates through which grace flow are opened. Let no soul fear to draw near to Me, even though its sins be as scarlet...It is My desire that it be solemnly celebrated on the First Sunday after Easter. Mankind will not have peace until it turns to the Fount of My Mercy.” (*Jesus to St. Faustina, Diary #699*).

“[This comes] from the lips of the risen Christ, who bears the great message of Divine Mercy and entrusts its ministry to the Apostles in the Upper Room: ‘Peace be with you. As the Father has sent Me, even so I send you. ... Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained’” (John 20:21-23). (*Pope John Paul II, institution of the Feast of Divine Mercy, April 30, 2000*)

On this Divine Mercy Sunday, we are called to gaze upon Christ’s merciful love, which is greater than our sins and miseries, and to proclaim His mercies as we live out the ABCs of the Divine Mercy...

Ask for God’s Mercy - we are to be purified by the “Tribunal of Mercy” through the sacrament of Reconciliation.

Be merciful - perform merciful works, in union with the saving acts of God.

CORPORAL WORKS OF MERCY: Feed the Hungry, Give Drink to the Thirsty, Clothe the Naked, Shelter the Homeless, Visit the Sick, Visit the Imprisoned, Bury the Dead

SPIRITUAL WORKS OF MERCY: Admonish the Sinner, Instruct the Ignorant, Counsel the Doubtful, Bear Wrongs Patiently, Forgive Offenses Willingly, Comfort the Afflicted, Pray for the Living and the Dead

Completely trust in Jesus - we are to venerate His sacred image, and seal and ratify the covenant of mercy by receiving Jesus in Holy Communion.

Through this great Feast of Divine Mercy, we are revived and transformed by no other greater love than the love of Christ Jesus who died for us, redeeming us by His blood to set us free from sin and death. Jesus, now risen and alive, made the ultimate sacrifice, so that we might have life eternal. In Jesus, we see the Father’s loving mercies made visible.

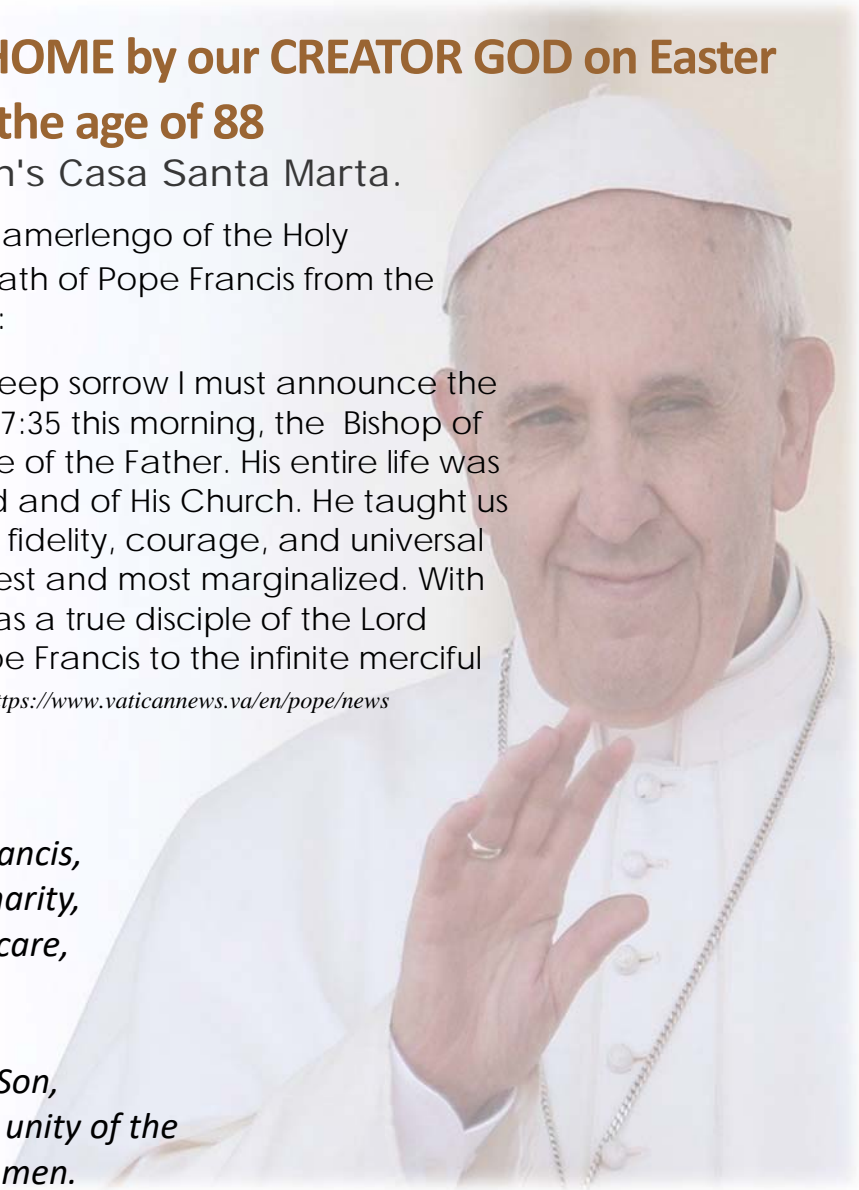
POPE FRANCIS was called HOME by our CREATOR GOD on Easter Monday, April 21, 2025, at the age of 88

at his residence in the Vatican's Casa Santa Marta.

At 9:45 AM, Cardinal Kevin Farrell, Camerlengo of the Holy Roman Church, announced the death of Pope Francis from the Casa Santa Marta with these words:

"Dearest brothers and sisters, with deep sorrow I must announce the death of our Holy Father Francis. At 7:35 this morning, the Bishop of Rome, Francis, returned to the house of the Father. His entire life was dedicated to the service of the Lord and of His Church. He taught us to live the values of the Gospel with fidelity, courage, and universal love, especially in favor of the poorest and most marginalized. With immense gratitude for his example as a true disciple of the Lord Jesus, we commend the soul of Pope Francis to the infinite merciful love of the One and Triune God." <https://www.vaticannews.va/en/pope/news>

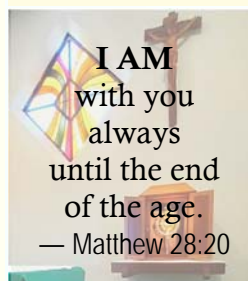

Wednesday, September 24, 2025

Departure

Depart San Francisco on LH455 at 2:40 PM.

Thursday, September 25, 2025

Sarajevo Arrival – Medjugorje

Arrive in Frankfurt at 10:25 AM. Depart Frankfurt on LH1546 at 8:40 PM and arrive in Sarajevo at 10:25 PM. Upon arrival, meet your tour escort and board the coach for the drive to Medjugorje. Check-in at the hotel for dinner and overnight.

Friday, September 26, 2025

Medjugorje

Embark on a walking orientation tour where you will learn about the history of the apparitions and events that have unfolded over the past 37 years. Celebrate Mass at a local church. Hike the Apparition Hill, following the path where the six young visionaries first encountered Our Lady. Pray at the statue commemorating the spot where Our Lady first appeared. At the base of Apparition Hill is the Blue Cross, the site of current-day apparitions and where the visionaries met to avoid Communist police. In the evening, join local villagers and pilgrims for St. James' prayer program, which includes the Rosary, Mass, and a special Blessing of the Sick. Return to the hotel for dinner and overnight.

Saturday, September 27, 2025

Medjugorje – Zagreb

Check-out and board the coach for the drive to Zagreb. Celebrate Mass at a local church upon arrival. Check-in at the hotel

for dinner and overnight.

Sunday, September 28, 2025

Zagreb – Marija Bistrica – Budapest

Check-out from the hotel and board the coach for the drive to Marija Bistrica. Visit the Marian Shrine of the Black Madonna, where the votive statue of the Mother of God dates back to the late 15th century. Celebrate Mass at Marija Bistrica. Continue to Budapest and check-in at the hotel for dinner and overnight.

Monday, September 29, 2025

Budapest

Celebrate Mass at Matthias Church. Begin your exploration of Budapest with a guided tour of Buda Castle Hill, Matthias Church, and the Fisherman's Bastion. Admire the panoramic views of the Danube and Pest. Cross the bridge to St. Stephen's Basilica and pass by Hungary's ornate Parliament building. Take a stroll through the Central Market Hall. The afternoon is at leisure. Dinner and overnight at the hotel in Budapest.

Tuesday, September 30, 2025

Budapest – Vienna

Check-out from the hotel and board the coach for the drive to Vienna. Enjoy a guided tour of Vienna, walking through charming squares and medieval streets, while learning about the city's rich history and culture. Sites include Otto Wagner's Stadtbahn pavilions, the Vienna Opera House, Heroes' Square, St. Augustine's Church, St. Stephen's Cathedral, and Mozart's House. Pass by the Belvedere Palace and its beautiful gardens. Celebrate

Mass at a local church. Check-in at the hotel for dinner and overnight.

Wednesday, October 1, 2025

Vienna – Prague

Check-out from the hotel and celebrate Mass at a local church. Board the coach and drive to Prague, with a stop en route. Continue to Prague and check-in at the hotel for dinner and overnight.

Thursday, October 2, 2025

Prague

Enjoy a full day of sightseeing in Prague. Visit Hradcany Castle, St. Vitus Cathedral, the Royal Castle, St. George's Basilica, and the Church of Our Lady Victorious, home to the Statue of the Infant Jesus of Prague. Celebrate Mass at the Church of Our Lady of Victory. Cross the Charles Bridge to explore the Old Town, one of Europe's most well-preserved historical centers. Visit the Old Town Square and the famous Astronomical Clock at the Town Hall. The afternoon is at leisure. Dinner and overnight at the hotel.

Friday, October 3, 2025

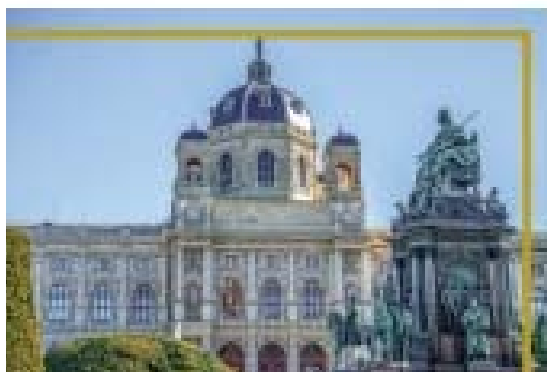
Prague – Krakow

Check-out from the hotel and celebrate Mass at a local church. Board the coach for the drive to Krakow, with a stop en route. Check-in at the hotel in Krakow for dinner and overnight.

Saturday, October 4, 2025

Krakow – Łagiewniki – Have No Fear – Krakow

Enjoy a morning tour of Krakow, starting with Wawel Hill and Wawel Cathedral, one of Central Europe's most beautiful Renaissance residences. Continue to Market Square, Europe's largest, via Kanonicza Street, and pass by the Papal



Window of the Bishop's Palace, from which Pope St. John Paul II addressed his followers. Visit the Collegium Maius patio, where the Pope studied. See St. Mary's Church, famous for its wooden altar by Włd Stwosz. Proceed to Łagiewniki, the center of Divine Mercy, where you will celebrate Mass at one of the chapels of the Divine Mercy Shrine. Visit the shrine and then transfer to the "Have No Fear" John Paul II Center to pray in the Sanctuary of St. John Paul II, a chapel containing relics of the former pope, including a vial of his blood. Return to the hotel for dinner and overnight.

Sunday, October 5, 2025

Krakow – Wieliczka – Wadowice – Krakow

Board the coach for a visit to Wieliczka, home to Europe's oldest salt mine, a UNESCO World Heritage Site. Explore the Blessed Kings' chambers and St. Anthony of the Holy Cross chapel. Continue to Wadowice, the birthplace of Pope St. John Paul II. Celebrate Mass at the Basilica of the Blessed Virgin Mary, where the Pope was baptized. Visit his childhood home, now a museum. Return to Krakow for dinner and overnight at the hotel.

Monday, October 6, 2025

Krakow Departure

Check-out from the hotel and transfer to the airport for your return flight. Depart Krakow on LX1371 at 9:25 AM, arriving in Zurich at 11:10 AM. Depart Zurich on LX38 at 1:15 PM and arrive in San Francisco at 4:10 PM.
