It is ironic that Jesus leads with “the blind regain their sight” (Matthew 11:5), for John himself has lost his eyes of faith. With eyes of faith, John was able to see the kingdom of heaven at hand, trees bearing good fruit, and chaff thrown into unquenchable fire (as we heard last week), much as Isaiah could see flowers blooming in the desert, disabilities eradicated, and joy banishing sorrow. But in prison he can’t see as he used to and can’t see what Jesus’ disciples are seeing. Can we see past the surface ourselves? Sometimes we feel stuck with our maladies, our problems, and our inadequacies and don’t see the possibilities in the light of Christ. Sometimes reimagining our lives from God’s perspective can make the difference in how we feel about our situation in life. — *Pastoral Patterns*

Resulta irónico que Jesús dé el ejemplo de que “los ciegos ven” (Mateo 11, 5), pues el mismo Juan ha perdido sus ojos de la fe. Con los ojos de la fe, Juan pudo ver la cercanía del Reino de los cielos, cuando se separará el trigo de la cizaña y la paja arrojada a un fuego que no se extingue (como escuchamos la semana pasada), igual que Isaías pudo ver flores en el desierto, discapacidades erradicadas y la angustia desvanecida por la alegría. Pero desde la prisión Juan no puede ver como antes y no puede ver lo que están viendo los discípulos de Jesús. ¿Podemos nosotros ver más allá de lo superficial? Algunas veces nos sentimos atascados en nuestros achaques, nuestros problemas y nuestras deficiencias, y no vemos las posibilidades a la luz de Cristo. Algunas veces el re-imaginarnos nuestra vida desde la perspectiva de Dios puede ofrecernos otro ángulo en cuanto a cómo nos sentimos sobre nuestra situación en la vida. — *Palabras Pastorales*

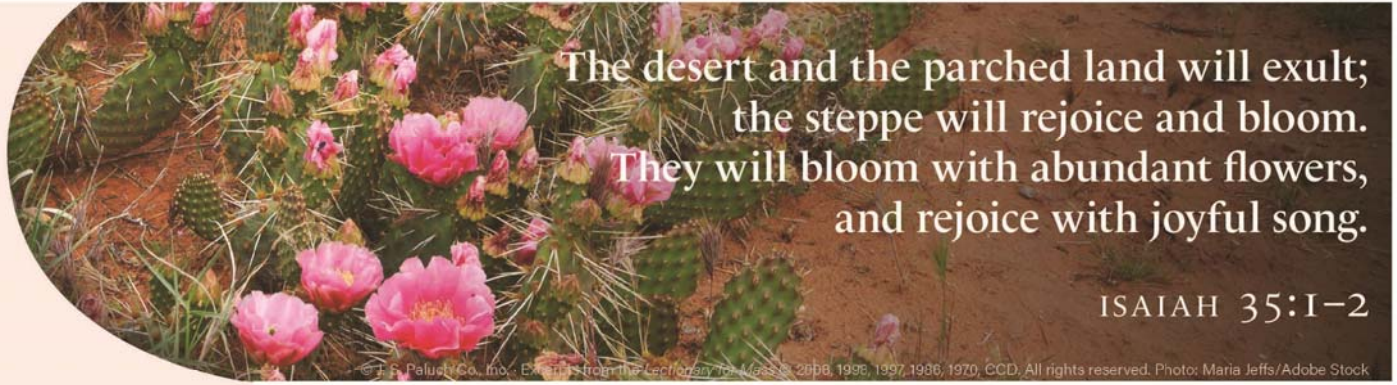

GOOD NEWS

Good news is good news is . . . Today's messages from Isaiah (prophetic ancestor of John the Baptist and Jesus of Nazareth) and James (spiritual offspring of John and Jesus) both have messages that resonate across the five centuries that separate them: hope in the coming power and presence of God. Isaiah was attempting to comfort and encourage the people of Israel in geographic and spiritual exile. Their exile will end, Isaiah says, with God's presence shown forth through spectacular occurrences in nature. James likewise has a community in need of encouragement and hope, since they despair over the delayed parousia, the final coming of God in glory. In the meantime, James urges patient endurance. Until Jesus returns, they ought to persist without complaint, with the lives of the prophets as their guide. Then will come the time of sight, and healing, and life and . . . Good News for the poor!

PATIENCE . . . NOW!

A friend walked me through his newly planted garden to help me see how it would look in spring. He finally stopped and said, "You can't picture any of this, can you?" I couldn't until I saw it in full bloom the following springtime. Then I could understand why he planted the seeds where he had. Then I saw the beauty and bounty that his planting represented. "Tell John what you hear and see," Jesus says to John's disciples. The signs of the Messiah proclaimed by the prophets are beginning to bloom. Look and see! Hear the singing of those once mute and the rejoicing of the crowds who witness these works. The beauty and the bounty of our generous God are all around.

JUST IMAGINE

James wrote to a community experiencing hardship, like the exiled Israelites in today's first reading. Isaiah and James exhort people to trust that they will see God's presence in their midst once again, so be patient. That's easier said than done, isn't it? Saint Francis de Sales says to be patient with everyone, and most of all with ourselves. Patience means accepting suffering and delay without becoming angry or upset. Easier said than done. Praying for this virtue each day, sometimes often throughout the day, does help. Breathe in the Spirit of God and say, "Give me patience, Lord." Then exhale anger, upset, and impatience. Staring at a garden won't make a shoot spring up any faster; however, giving thanks for the seed, the water, the soil, and the Giver of all life can deepen our trust that the garden will grow. So be patient. Rejoice always. See and be the signs of God's beauty and bounty in our world today.

MÁS QUE DISCÍPULOS

Cada uno de los cuatro roles en las Escrituras de hoy —discípulo, profeta, apóstol, testigo— forma una faceta de la vida en Cristo que vivimos día a día. Isaías nos dice que el profeta es ungido, tal como fuimos ungidos en el Bautismo con agua y con el Espíritu, para traer la Buena Nueva y promover el Reino de Dios, un reino de salvación, justicia y paz. El apóstol, como Pablo, es un “enviado”. Cada uno de nosotros, a su manera, es enviado por Cristo a ser una voz de alegría, a animar las voces proféticas en el mundo y asegurar que prospere la obra del Espíritu. Juan Bautista nos muestra la labor del testigo, enderezando el camino del Señor, anunciando la venida de la Luz del Mundo.

Hoy escuchamos también a María, discípulo modelo. Su canto, el “Magnificat”, nos muestra el mundo en que debemos creer y por el cual laborar: uno en donde Dios sea alabado, donde el favor de Dios se derrama sobre los humildes, donde los hambrientos quedan repletos y los ricos se despiden vacíos, un mundo que continúa conociendo y celebrando la misericordia de Dios que perdura por todos los siglos. TRADICIONES DE NUESTRA FE

Jesús proclama que Juan el Bautista es más que un profeta (Lucas 7:26) y lo compara con Elías, el profeta más importante de los judíos (Mateo 17:11-13). Pero, ¿qué es un profeta? El judaísmo, cristianismo e islamismo reconocen a ciertas personas como profetas. La palabra hebrea *nabi* significa portavoz, o profeta. Los *nebiim* eran encargados por Dios para una tarea especial. Así por ejemplo, Moisés fue encargado para liberar al pueblo de la esclavitud egipcia, Elías para recordarle la palabra de Dios cuando se apartaba de la alianza, y Jeremías para denunciar las corrupciones y anunciarle el castigo. Cuando tradujeron al griego el Antiguo Testamento, la palabra *nabi* fue traducida como *prophetes* (profeta). Esto indica un intérprete de la voluntad de Dios. Los profetas griegos eran oráculos que adivinaban el futuro, por lo cual mucha gente confunde al profeta con un adivino. El profeta según el cristianismo es un testigo (Juan 1:6-8,19-28) del poder de Cristo y la palabra de Dios. —Fray Gilberto Cavazos-Glz, OFM, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

EL REINO DE DIOS

Parece incongruente que Jesús diga, “Dichoso aquel que no se sienta defraudado por mí” (Mateo 11, 6), después de mencionar todas las cosas milagrosas que ha hecho. Sin embargo sabemos que muchos se sintieron ofendidos. Los adinerados probablemente hayan sentido resentimiento contra los pobres enaltecidos. Muchos consideraban a los leprosos por debajo de ellos y que hayan sido curados repentinamente no afectó la manera en que se sentían en cuanto a los leprosos como personas. Había sido más fácil ignorar a los discapacitados, a los que no tenían un techo y a los marginados. Jesús, al final de su ministerio, ya no es el niño inofensivo en el pesebre, sino el hombre condenado en la cruz. Rehacer radicalmente el mundo para que refleje el Reino de Dios es amenazador para el statu quo y ofende a muchos.

Advent – from the Latin *ad venio*, “to come” – is the liturgical season anticipating the *Adventus Domini*, the “coming of the Lord.” While the days grow shorter and colder, we prepare for the “Sun of Justice” who comes to kindle our hearts with his light and his love.

The Eternal Word, who is outside of time, became Incarnate in time, thereby making all time sacred. In the season of Advent, we await the coming of Christ on all the levels which we experience time: in the past – as a babe in the stable of Bethlehem; in the present – as grace in our souls; and in the future – as the Judge at the end of time.

The Advent season is filled with preparation and expectation. Everyone is getting ready for Christmas – shopping and decorating, baking and cleaning. Too often, however, we are so busy with the material preparations that we lose sight of the real reason for our activity: the Word made flesh coming to dwell among us. Christians are urged to preserve the spiritual focus of Christmas amidst the prevailingly secular and consumer-driven society.

In the midst of the hustle and bustle of the season, let us strive to keep Advent a season of waiting and longing, of conversion and hope, meditating often on the incredible love and humility of our God in taking on flesh of the Virgin Mary. In our shopping and baking, let us remember to purchase and prepare something for the poor. When we clean our homes, let us distribute some of our possessions to those who lack many necessities. While we are decking the halls of our homes, let us not forget to prepare a peaceful place in our hearts wherein our Savior may come to dwell.

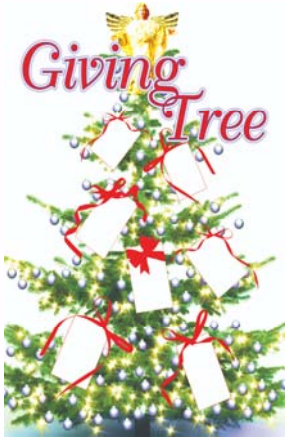

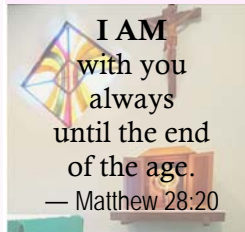
