Sixth Sunday of Easter Sexto Domingo de Pascua

In the Gospel, Jesus tells his disciples that the Holy Spirit would remind them of all that he told them. But Jesus had not addressed every matter that would arise. Twenty years later, in the scene at the center of the first reading, the apostles need to decide what to do about uncircumcised Gentiles who want to be baptized as Christians. Some said, “Unless you are circumcised according to the Mosaic practice, you cannot be saved” (Acts 15:1). But Paul and Barnabas dissented. So they returned to Jerusalem to meet with the apostles and elders. There, guided by the Holy Spirit about this question Jesus never addressed, they decided a minimal number of Mosaic practices were necessary to follow and that circumcision was not one of them. Twenty centuries later, we hope to allow the Holy Spirit to guide church leaders as they debate contentious issues for which the best answer is uncertain.

En el Evangelio Jesús les dice a sus discípulos que el Espíritu Santo les recordará todo lo que él les ha dicho. Pero Jesús no ha abordado todas las situaciones que surgirían. Veinte años más tarde, en la escena que ocupa el centro de la primera lectura, los apóstoles necesitan decidir qué hacer en cuanto a los paganos no circuncidados, que desean ser bautizados como cristianos. Algunos dicen que “si no se circuncidaban conforme a la ley de Moisés, no podrían salvarse” (Hechos 15, 1). Pero Pablo y Bernabé discrepaban con esas personas. Por eso regresaron a Jerusalén a fin de reunirse con los apóstoles y los presbíteros. Allí, guiados por el Espíritu Santo acerca de una situación que Jesús nunca abordó, decidieron que sólo un número mínimo de las prácticas mosaicas eran necesarias cumplir y que la circuncisión no era una de ellas. Veinte siglos más tarde, nosotros esperamos que los líderes de la Iglesia se dejen guiar por el Espíritu Santo para debatir las cuestiones polémicas, cuya mejor respuesta es incierta.

SIXTH SUNDAY OF *Easter*



PEACE

The sixth Sunday of Easter moves us toward the feast of Pentecost and the coming of the Holy Spirit to the early Church. Today's Gospel describes Jesus at the Last Supper, foretelling the coming of the Spirit to the community of Jesus. Jesus combines the promise of the Spirit with his gift of peace to his disciples. He foresees that the community must be grounded in his love, which provides peace, to face the tumult of the Crucifixion, and later, the trials of the early Church. Grounded in Jesus, the community can then be open to the Spirit who will continually guide, remind, and renew them in their life together. The gift of peace from Jesus is not a worldly peace through which the powerful crush opposition. It is not a complacent or private peace. The peace of Jesus instead seeks and works toward peace throughout the world, guided by the Spirit.

RESPONSIBLE LEADERSHIP

Today's passage from Acts captures the beginning and the conclusion of what became known as the Jerusalem Council. It is well worth studying all of Acts 15, meant to provide an example of responsible leadership for the wider Church. There was substantial conflict within the community over what is necessary for unity in the diverse community of Jews and Gentiles. We can notice some key characteristics of the actions of the leadership.

The leaders acknowledged the reality of a significant conflict without minimizing it. They received and fully honored the diverse experiences of persons of different backgrounds. They worked with an accepted authority structure and a process to move toward resolution. They were committed to discern the action and will of the Spirit, with a deep respect for testimony about how the Spirit was working. They avoided placing unneeded burdens on anyone. And afterward, they continued to observe the ongoing action of the Spirit as the decision was implemented.

WHAT IS ESSENTIAL?

The issues weighed by the Jerusalem Council in our passage from Acts were related to circumcision as a requirement, and to table fellowship. A strong theological tradition held that traditional practices were essential, and the community genuinely sought to maintain continuity with the roots of their faith. Peter's observation about how the Spirit was actively working in their midst pointed the leaders in a new direction. Then James reminded them that the scriptural tradition also pointed to fully welcoming the Gentiles into God's community.

It is a profound challenge for leaders in our own parishes when encountering issues that can fracture a community. What is essential and what is not? What are we called to embrace, or called to lay down? Acknowledging conflict and working toward resolution is an essential function for our parishes, because Christ calls us to live in unity. We are called to open our hearts, mine our tradition, and observe the activity of the Spirit.

SEXTO DOMINGO DE *Pascua*



LA PAZ

El sexto domingo de Pascua nos acerca a la fiesta de Pentecostés y a la venida del Espíritu Santo en la Iglesia primitiva. El Evangelio de hoy describe a Jesús en la Última Cena, anunciando la llegada del Espíritu a la comunidad de Jesús. Jesús combina la promesa del Espíritu con el don de la paz a sus discípulos. Prevé que la comunidad debe estar cimentada en su amor, que proporciona la paz, para afrontar el tumulto de la Crucifixión y, posteriormente, las pruebas de la Iglesia primitiva. Enraizada en Jesús, la comunidad puede abrirse al Espíritu, que la guiará, recordará y renovará continuamente en su vida en común. El don de la paz de Jesús no es una paz mundana con la que los poderosos aplastan la oposición. No es una paz complaciente o privada. La paz de Jesús, en cambio, busca y trabaja por la paz en todo el mundo, guiada por el Espíritu.

UN LIDERAZGO RESPONSABLE

El pasaje de hoy de los Hechos recoge el inicio y la conclusión de lo que se conoció como el Concilio de Jerusalén. Merece la pena estudiar todo Hechos 15, cuyo objetivo es ofrecer un ejemplo de liderazgo responsable para la Iglesia en general. Hubo un conflicto sustancial dentro de la comunidad sobre lo que es necesario para la unidad en la diversa comunidad de judíos y gentiles. Podemos observar algunas características clave de las acciones de los líderes.

Los líderes reconocieron la realidad de un conflicto importante sin minimizarlo. Recibieron y honraron plenamente las diversas experiencias de personas de diferentes orígenes. Trabajaron con una estructura de autoridad aceptada y un proceso para avanzar hacia la resolución. Se comprometieron a discernir la acción y la voluntad del Espíritu, con un profundo respeto por el testimonio sobre cómo estaba actuando el Espíritu. Evitaron imponer cargas innecesarias a nadie. Y después, siguieron observando la acción continua del Espíritu a medida que se aplicaba la decisión.

¿QUÉ ES LO ESENCIAL?

Las cuestiones que sopesó el Concilio de Jerusalén en nuestro pasaje de los Hechos estaban relacionadas con la circuncisión como requisito, y con la comunión en la mesa. Una fuerte tradición teológica sostenía que las prácticas tradicionales eran esenciales, y la comunidad buscaba genuinamente mantener la continuidad con las raíces de su fe. La observación de Pedro sobre cómo el Espíritu estaba actuando activamente en medio de ellos señaló a los líderes una nueva dirección. A continuación, Santiago les recordó que la tradición bíblica también apuntaba a acoger plenamente a los gentiles en la comunidad de Dios.

Es un profundo reto para los líderes de nuestras propias parroquias cuando se enfrentan a cuestiones que pueden fracturar una comunidad. ¿Qué es esencial y qué no lo es? ¿Qué estamos llamados a abrazar o a dejar de lado? Reconocer el conflicto y trabajar para resolverlo es una función esencial para nuestras parroquias, porque Cristo nos llama a vivir en unidad. Estamos llamados a abrir nuestros corazones, extraer nuestra tradición y observar la actividad del Espíritu.

BLAZON

The left field is blue with a silver fleur-de-lis; the right is white, with a flaming heart pieced by an arrow, entirely red, and resting on an uncovered book.

Above the shield there is a silver mitre, adorned with three gold bands joined by a gold vertical post, with fluttering red infulae, fringed with gold and adorned with gold crosses; in front of the infulae there are the crossed Petrine keys, gold (bend) and silver (bend sinister), linked by a red cord.

MOTTO - IN ILLO UNO UNUM

EXPLANATION The coat of arms of the Holy Father Leo XIV

On the left field of the coat of arms of the Holy Father Leo XIV, the blue background recalls the heights of the heavens and is characterized by its Marian significance, a classic symbol referring to the Blessed Virgin Mary, the lily or fleur-de-lis (*flos florum*).

In the other field, white in colour, there is the emblem of the Augustinian Order, a flaming heart pieced by an arrow. This image symbolically represents the words of Saint Augustine in the book of Confessions: “*Sagittaveras tu cor meum charitate tua*” (“You have wounded my heart with your love”). It is an element that has always been present in the emblem of the Augustinians from the sixteenth century onwards, albeit with several variations, such as the presence of the book symbolizing the Word of God capable of transforming the heart of every man, as it was for Augustine. The book also recalls the enlightened works that the Doctor of Grace gave to the Church and humanity. White (in an ivory shade in the papal coat of arms) is a recurrent colour in other coats of arms of religious orders, and can be read as a symbol of holiness and purity.

The motto, “*In Illo uno unum*” (“In the one Christ we are one”), recalls the words of Saint Augustine in a sermon, the *Exposition on Psalm 128*, explaining that “in the one Christ we are one”, “one in the One Christ”.

Thursday, September 25, 2025

Sarajevo Arrival – Medjugorje

Friday, October 3, 2025

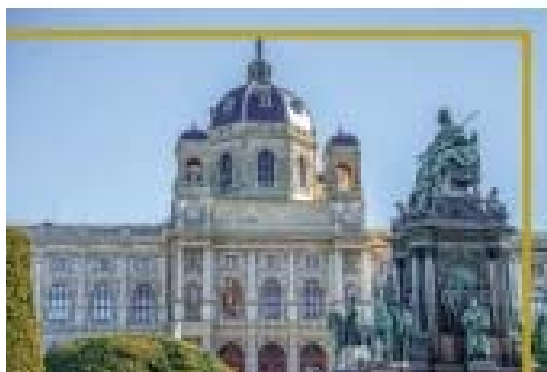
Prague – Krakow
