Dear Friends.

What's in a name? A lot, if it is God who confers the name. What is the name which God the Creator gives to human beings, to humanity, i.e. to you and me? It is "Adam".

In the beautiful imagery of the Jewish scriptures, in the book of Genesis, God breathes into the nostrils of a figure made of clay, and names the first human being, "Adam", a name which means "earth creature".

So, there is something of the Divine breathed into each one of us, but the name "Adam" is a reminder to stay grounded in our earthiness.

We are stardust, earth creatures, loved into existence as human beings filled with the Breath of God. We are loved into existence, for what or for whom?

Each one of us has a unique and irreplaceable role in the unfolding history of the universe. And there is a name which sounds that role, which the Creator desires each one of us to fulfill.

Jesus of Nazareth knew the power of naming in relation to vocation and destiny.

So, when Andrew brought his brother to Jesus, Jesus exercised the divine prerogative. We read: "[Jesus] looked at him and said: 'You are Simon, son of John. You are to be called Cephas." "Cephas" is the Hebrew word for rock which in Greek is "Petros", which in English is "Peter".

At one level, Jesus may be having fun at Simon's expense. Here is a man of such violent mood changes, that he is like shifting sand. So, Jesus thinks of the polar opposite, rock solid, and nicknames him, "Rocky"! Jesus would play on that nickname: "You are Peter and on this rock I will build my church." (Matt 16:18)

This disciple is to be the solid, secure, rock-like foundation on which the Christian community will be constructed by the Holy Spirit.

Jesus knew the deep-down name of this man, "Peter", and pronounced that name which in fact identified his future role. This tradition continues with the successor of Peter. So, Cardinal Jorge Bergoglio took the name "Francis" which indicates that he believes that God chose him to be Pope to follow in the footsteps of St Francis of Assisi.

We have another name. We read in the Book of Revelation: "The Spirit is saying to the churches: 'to those who prove victorious [after persecution] I will give the hidden manna and a white stone—a stone with a new name written on it known only to the man who receives it." (Rev 2:17)

This is the secret name by which God has known and loved me since the moment of my conception. It is the name which will reveal my true identity as desired by God just as Simon's true identity was revealed by Jesus calling him "Peter".

All will then be revealed at the moment of death, but perhaps it is permitted to anticipate. I hope my heavenly name isn't Knuckles or worse yet, Stinky!

Dear friends.

One of my favorite photos is one I took of a drug store in The Netherlands in the town of Deventer. Engraved in the stone front of the building, just over the door are the words "Trust in God, but take your medicine." It is difficult to trust in God. We like to consider ourselves as the masters of our universe. It is difficult to open ourselves to God's call to us when we are unable to trust that we are God's. I am no paragon of this trait. I worry about parish finances, plowing parking lots, my ability and inability to minister among us as well as the insecurity of wondering if I am doing what I should be. I am envious of those who possess certainty.

Throughout history, the greatest have been those who have that special sense of being "called." "Paul, called by God's will to be an apostle of Christ Jesus..." (1 Corinthians 1:1). Abraham, Moses, Samuel, all ordinary people, heard the divine call to be more and do more. Francis of Assisi, Dorothy Day, Martin Luther King, and Mother Teresa were all just like us until the divine spark within them ignited their unique destiny. The prophet Isaiah tells of his own special moment "the Lord said to me: you are my servant, to whom I show my glory" (Isaiah 40 9:3). We also learn today of the call of Andrew and Simon Peter. We are called to be different than the rest of the world... "the Lord called me from birth, from my mother's womb he gave me my name... You are my servant, Israel" (Isaiah 49:1-3). God knows us and reaches out for us, "I have plans for you - plans for your welfare, not for your woe; plans to give you a future full of hope" (Jeremiah 29:11).

Our call begins with our baptism and unlike some it is likely to be a felt as a gentle tugging or inclination toward a life of faith or service within our faith. Few of us are granted the surety of a sudden experience of a blinding light or a voice from heaven like Paul. Our call is not likely to be one of great sacrifice or even extraordinary accomplishment but like the greatest biblical figure or modern saint it is up to us to respond. As with all things subtle, we will experience doubt, then it's time to trust. In Christ, Jeff Peck
