Dear Friends,

Our reading from St. Paul this weekend reminds us of our own deaths. Paul pronounces that we are not at home in our bodies but rather in the Lord. I often think of my own mortality in terms of two stories I find especially profound.

A man determined that the average lifespan of a male in the U.S. was 75 years. That meant he had, probably, 3,900 Saturdays in is life. When he turned 55, he had 1100 Saturdays left. He bought a large container and filled it with 1100 marbles. Every Saturday he removed one marble and threw it away. He wrote that by watching the marbles in the container diminish, he focused on the more important things in life and how he spent his time. He wrote, "There is nothing like watching your time on earth run out to help get your priorities straight." He continued, "Today, I took the very last marble out of the container. I figure if I make to next Saturday, I have been given a little extra time. And the one thing we can all use is a little extra time."

In 2005, Joe Queenan, who describes himself as a sneering churl, turned 62. He wrote, in the NY Times, that in his lifetime thus far, he had read at least 6,128 books. He estimated that at his present reading rate of speed that he had 2,138 books left to read in his lifetime. As a writer and book reviewer he is sent hundreds of review copies by publishers every month, each hoping he will review their books. Queenan evaluates whether or not he will read a book by asking the question, "Is this one of the last 2,138 books I have left to read in my life?" The result for him has been the avoidance of books on topics like the genetics of tulips and the best 1000 recipes for Spam.

These anecdotes together with Paul's passage in Second Corinthians should give us pause to examine our live and how we are living it. When we are young, we think we have all the time in the world, as we grow older, we begin to sense just how quickly this life passes. As we continue our life journeys this week, maybe we should ask ourselves, "How many Saturdays do I have left on earth? How many books do I have left to read?"

How do my actions reflect the important things in my life, loved ones, faith, and community?

There will still be particular exemptions from this obligation for those in certain circumstances such as: frailty, sickness, or injury, those who must care for the infirmed, or those who experience truly high levels of fear from being in public places at this time, they are not obligated to worship in person at Holy Mass on Sunday and Holy Days of obligation.
