

Dear Friends,

A bishop in a rural diocese was explaining to the confirmation class how he was the shepherd of the flock. Given that many of the children came from large sheep farms he decided to draw on today's Gospel as an analogy for his pastoral leadership. "I care for all of you like the Good Shepherd," he said. The students seemed consoled. Warming up, the bishop continued, "For instance, what would your fathers do if he lost one of his sheep?" The class was silent. The bishop asked again. The students were confused. The bishop got personal, "Michael what would your Dad do?" "Seeing we've 42,000 of them, bishop, he'd let the stupid animal go!

"We have all lost something. Big or small, serious or trivial, these losses are all part of what it means to be human. I have lost family members, friends, and car keys. In a few cases I have gotten them back. In today's Gospel, Jesus recounts parables in which a sheep, a coin, and a son are lost. At first glance, the responses of those who have suffered the loss are acting a bit excessive. Leaving a flock, unquarded to search for one sheep. staying up all night to find one coin, and throwing a party for a son who has squandered his inheritance are not really about the finding of something lost. When I lose something, like a set of keys, my distress is often over the nature of the loss, the sense of incompleteness I experience rather than the actual value of the keys. The pain of separation when a loved one dies is also an experience of incompleteness. The place in my life that was filled by that person is empty. I have a sense of being incomplete, a feeling of emptiness.

For me, the rejoicing described in the parables is an expression of being made whole again not the finding of the lost object itself. God rejoices over our turning to God because it creates wholeness. Jesus is telling us that the finding of the lost and reuniting with God is an accomplishment of what is meant to be, the syncing of earth and heaven. When this reuniting occurs, the community and the heaven rejoice.
