In the next two paragraphs of his Apostolic Exhortation, bishop Olmsted points out the importance of the ark in overcoming the dangers and challenges of crossing the Jordan river into the promised land and links it to the crisis of faith in the eucharist that we face today. He writes:"

- 6. When the People of Israel were preparing to cross the Jordan river and enter the Promised Land, Joshua stressed the importance of following the Ark: "When you see the ark of the covenant of the Lord being carried, you are to set out from your positions and follow it... so that you can see the way to go, since we have never been this way before" (Josh. 3:2-4). This instruction was addressed to a people who would face the dangers of the crossing and the challenges and threats that awaited them in an unknown land.
- 7. Like the People of Israel, we too are heading into difficult waters. Today we find ourselves in a crisis; many anxieties, uncertainties and doubts assail us from every side. As I said in my

pastoral letter "O Sacred Feast," the Church at large is experiencing a grave crisis of faith in the Eucharist. This crisis has inflicted additional significant implications for authentic Christian discipleship; namely, abysmal Mass attendance, declining vocations to marriage, priesthood, and religious life, waning Catholic influence in society. As a nation we are experiencing a torrent of assaults upon the truth. The Gospel message has been watered down or replaced with ambiguous worldly values. Many Christians have abandoned Christ and His Gospel and turned to a secular culture for meaning that it cannot provide and to satiate a hunger that it can never satisfy.
