Pet Licensing Fees are Funding Opportunity

Low compliance means municipalities missing out on significant revenue

- Annual dog license fees represent "annuity" funding source
 - Most jurisdictions are hundreds of thousands to millions per year
 - Additional revenue from late fees and penalties
- License fees can directly fund S/N
 - Some municipalities give a portion directly to S/N
 - Subsidized S/N programs are key to reducing shelter intake, euthanasia rates, and animal care costs
- Existing low compliance rates leaving substantial money on the table
 - 2008 City Controller audit cited department for at least \$2M in uncollected fees in city of Los Angeles alone



Existing Programs Often Inefficient and Outdated

Paper-based manual process difficult for owners and expensive to process

Generic Dog Licensing Process



Decide to License

- Aware of requirement
- Able to find information
- Willing to make effort



Visit Vet

- Get rabies vaccination
- Get S/N performed
- Get S/N & rabies certificate



Complete App

- Get app online or at the shelter
- Fill out app
- · Make copies of rabies and S/N certificate





Turn In / Make Payment Receive Tags

- Mail materials or ao to shelter (no first time online option)
- · Pay by cash, check, or card in person (mail checks only)



- processes application
- Tags given in person or by mail
- Owner adds tags to collar



Renew Annually

- Annual renewal required (notice sent by mail)
- No auto-renew
- Updated rabies certificate must be mailed upon expiration



Three Key Steps to Improve Licensing Compliance and Capture Additional Revenue

Clarify Licensing Objectives

Refine Licensing Structure and Process

Outreach to Pet Owners

- What is the purpose of licensing program?
- What does agency hope to achieve?
- Align structure and process with program objectives
- Make the process easier for both the city AND pet owners
- Educate pet owners about licensing benefits and requirements
- Provide incentives to encourage compliance



Must Clarify Goals of Licensing Program

Program design should be aligned with goals

Enforcement

Impact

Enforcement of Rabies Requirement

Enforcement of Spay/Neuter Generate Revenue

Subsidize Low Income Spay/Neuter

Increase Return to Owner Rates

> Decrease Euthanasia





Program Goals Should Dictate Structure and Process Decisions

Characteristics of Enforcement Based Programs – the "Stick"

- Rely upon the threat of fines or penalties to drive compliance
- Tell pet owners to licenses because "it's the law"
- Set up an adversarial relationship between department and pet owners
- Require rigorous verification based processes for pet owners
- Require paper documentation of rabies and spay/neuter status of pets
- Require large investments in enforcement staff to be effective
- Struggle to reach 50% compliance rates even with enforcement staff

Characteristics of Impact Based Programs – the "Carrot"

- Rely upon voluntary compliance driven by incentives
- Tell pet owners about the value and benefits of licensing for them and their pet
- Set up a constructive relationship between department and pet owners
- Make the process as fast and easy as possible for pet owners
- Allow self certification of rabies and S/N status (with random checks and fraud penalties)
- Require investments in outreach and promotion to be effective
- Only approach ever demonstrated to hit 90%+ compliance

Structure/Process Can be Refined

Improvements will benefit pet owners and agencies

Review and refine policies to match program objectives

- Review fee structure and make adjustments as needed
- Consider cat licensing requirement
- Provide for temporary or provisional registration

Implement online licensing program for first time licenses

- Allow pet owners to apply and pay for licenses online using self certification of vaccination and sterilization status
- Offer auto-renew, e-mail notifications, and other convenience features that make the process easier, faster, and lower cost for owners and agencies

Consider other outlets for license sales

 Veterinarians, Pet supply stores, Volunteers, Community Groups, etc. could sell licenses in exchange for a share of the fee
