Money! How do we earn it? How do we spend it? Save it? or Give it away? How can money provide safety? What are the beliefs we have made around money? How do we ask for what we need?






Relationships: Adding in another person, creates more energy and often is fueled by what has been models for us. Personal or Professional? Friends or something more? What are my boundaries around sex and my sexuality? How do I want to be with another? What are my options?



Food! With so many options these days, how do we choose what's right for our health? How do we use food? For nourishment or for comfort? Maybe we use it to show our love. How do we know when we've had too much? How do we handle the disappointment of not being able to have it all?



And then there is Technology! How do you navigate your relationship to media and the people and ideas and words you read? Think about Facebook relationships! Both personal and professional. How do I stop myself from answering that angry text right away? What about those Games on our phones? When is it time to look up?
