The public is invited to attend one or both free events. By hosting these fun and interactive events, the community hopes single seniors will be able to come together to find friendship or romantic love.

Proving that love is ageless, two residents at Waltonwood of University found trust, love and companionship with one another at the senior living community. 94-year-old Ernie Elliott and 87year-old Dolores Mouranie were widowed after decades of marriage, and they met six years ago after Mouranie moved to the community. One of their first interactions came when the community's theater group, of which they were both members, put on a skit, for which Mouranie had created the costumes. Elliott was married at the time, but he remembers noticing her. Soon after that, she and Elliott began to develop a friendship. Shortly after Elliott and his wife celebrated their 68th wedding anniversary, she passed away, and Elliott relied upon the trust he had built with Mouranie to cope with his wife's death.

"It meant everything to have Dolores with me and help me through the bad parts of saying goodbye to someone I had loved and spent 75 years of my life with," said Elliott. "She had been through this with her husband, and she related to what I was experiencing. She helped me cope with and process

what was happening. I had never thought about having that type of relationship with another person again, but it's a nice feeling to have found someone to have fun with and share my life."

To Elliott and Mouranie, their relationship is a special and devoted bond. They don't like to use the words "boyfriend" or "girlfriend" at their age but rather label themselves as committed to each other. The couple doesn't intend to marry but is happy with their current arrangement. They choose to spend much of their time together, watching movies or participating in the community's many activities, like Karaoke. Elliott and Mouranie encourage their fellow seniors to find ways to meet and make connections with others their age because their own companionship has added so much joy to their lives.

"Ernie and Delores' relationship is one of the many ways we've seen residents at our community bond with one another after the loss of a spouse," said life enrichment director Richelle Williams. "We're so excited to provide area seniors a way to meet and let them know that it is okay to find happiness or even love again. The humorous documentary breaks down many stereotypes and fears seniors may have about getting back into the dating game. We encourage those interested in finding companionship to come to these free events to learn more."
