Whenever I get burned out, I go to visit and watch the greatest copywriter in the world at work, under the portales in the Plaza de Santo Domingo in Mexico City. Oliverio, with his Olympia typewriter made in Brazil, is clearly a king among evangelists, the scribes who sit at card tables behind the old platen presses where you can have your wedding invitations printed while you wait.

Good, plain people who can't write letters for themselves come to Oliverio, and he is much closer to life than I'll ever get. He writes most eloquently about love waiting at home for sons and daughters to return and claim it.

Oliverio always writes from the heart, and his business letters ring with the same truth as his love letters, so people travel from miles around with their problems for Oliverio to solve with his clever typewriter.

Under his fingernails I see a permanent black edge from changing his ribbons. Back home, when I confront my antiseptic computer, I look first at my fingernails and if they are all clean I know my letter would be antiseptic, too.

I wish I could take Oliverio's place at his card table for just one hour, but that would turn into a bitter circus—his clients would believe I was mocking them, and I think they would be right about that. Mocking them or him is something I would never want to do, so I melt into the background and watch and listen while my friend works.

For my own work, the best thing I can do is try to keep Oliverio's human touch in mind every time I write. Lord knows I try.

About this New Edition

Let me say at the outset, since *Million Dollar Mailings* was published in 1993, I have lost none of my enthusiasm for direct mail. I simply love it!

Why?

The great practitioner, Stan Rapp, called it “intimate advertising.”

No other medium enables a marketer to become so immediately close to a prospect as the direct mail letter—that emotion-laden, me-to-you correspondence that allows you to fire your message of any length at point-blank range in the privacy of a quiet living room or office. What’s more, it is not blasted out of a television set at a slightly higher decibel level than the program that has been so rudely interrupted. Nor is it that irritating phone call at dinner time. (Which is more annoying? A heavily-accented telemarketer reading from a script or the silence of a telephone when the predictive dialer on the other end did not connect with a sales rep?) Nor is it a space ad that forces you to jump around a magazine and hunt for the continuation of a story you were enjoying.

Above all, direct mail allows you, the marketer, to know precisely whether your offer and creative effort makes money, loses money, or breaks even. No other form of advertising affords you the luxury of a report card sans personal judgment and prejudices.

Following this section is Axel Andersson’s Foreword to the first edition in which he describes the fault with trying to judge whether direct mail is good or bad. The Direct Marketing Association’s Echo Awards and the Caples Awards have degenerated into a bunch of big agencies giving each other prizes for essentially mediocre work in order to impress prospective clients with cups, mugs, plaques, and Lucite spikes in the waiting room. The fact is, in terms of awards, Hatch’s rule applies:

You can’t judge good direct mail; it judges you.

In other words, the marketplace will tell you whether you have a winner or a loser. The math is everything. Cost per thousand, allowable cost per order (or lead), lifetime value of a customer—all must be factored into the equation before a clear determination can be made as to whether an effort is a winner or loser.

Circulation consultant Gordon Grossman illustrates the need for a precise understanding of the arithmetic in direct mail in his eye-opening analysis of the long-term value of the full-dress direct mail package (outer envelope, letter, circular, order card, etc.) vs. its cheaper cousin, the double postcard. At the end of year one of a mailing of 100,000 pieces, the double postcard brought in 955 paid subscribers and a profit of \$2,418 vs. 900 subs for the control package and a loss of \$4,436 for a swing of \$6,854. However, at the end of year five—after carefully tracking payments and renewals—the

full-dress package was responsible for a net of 2,024 paid subs and a lifetime value of \$53,803 vs. 1,517 postcard subs who paid \$33,160.

In other words, in direct mail (and direct marketing in general) lifetime value is everything in terms of the health and growth of a business.

Since *Million Dollar Mailings* was first published, the fundamentals of direct mail are the same. However, a number of changes have

occurred in the field and will be addressed in this new edition. Among them:

1. The Internet

Direct mail is still the workhorse of direct marketing and will be for a long time to come. The numbers from the Direct Marketing Association tell the story.

Two important points about the chart above:

First off, it would appear that more money is spent in telephone marketing (\$71.1 billion) than direct mail (\$44.6 billion). The numbers are deceptive because half of telemarketing expenditures are for outbound calls, the other half for inbound. Outbound telemarketing is the equivalent of direct mail—a solicitation effort to an individual. Inbound calling, on the other hand, is almost always a response to an offer made by direct mail, an off-the-page advertisement, or a television commercial. So roughly one half of the entire telemarketing expenditures are directly analogous to direct mail. The other half equals business reply mail or faxed orders. In that light, direct mail is the dominant medium in direct marketing.

Secondly, all projections point to the continued growth of direct mail. Building a business entirely on the Internet—on a piece of glass sitting in an office or study at home—is very difficult. My friend, Barry Rose, one of the world’s leading choral directors, has an entirely Web-based business that offers restored antique fountain pens to collectors (www.writetime.co.uk). It is, however, a sideline. To become a major player, Barry would have to use traditional advertising media to accomplish two jobs: 1) find non-pen collectors and persuade them that collecting pens is fun and the place to start was his Web site and 2) find pen collectors and drive them to his Web site; on top of that, Barry would then spend all his time combing the world for fountain pens to restore. That would leave no time to practice his core competency, choral directing and producing CDs. That percent will probably drop.

In May 2000, at an American List Counsel lunch in New York, a major list broker told me that fully 10 percent of her business comes from dot-com companies; that was new business that magically appeared in the past two years.

In Chapter 30, we will be examining Internet marketing—how to drive people to a Web site and what must happen when the prospect gets there.

2. The Magalog or Bookalog

This curiosity is a cross between a magazine and a catalog and is used extensively in the publishing field. Chapter 28 brings you the history of the magalog from its modest beginnings as a bound eight-page letter to its present glitzy form that screams “Open me! Open me! And buy!” as well as the new philosophy that drives it.

3. The Catalog

Under the original parameters for *Million Dollar Mailings*—only mailings that had been received for three or more consecutive years—catalogs did not qualify. The covers are virtually always changed;

new merchandise is added; other items are deleted. Format, type-style, and design could be the same. And many pages could be repeated season after season. But each catalog was different—with one exception: Glen Wolfe's Cinegraph Slides, which was mailed for years. Cinegraph slides supplied words on slides for speakers and presenters. Glen sold the company in just the nick of time; it was soon put out of business by the laptop computer which every presenter now uses—either by directly hooking it up to a projector or using it to create slides. I am leaving Cinegraph Slides in this updated edition of *Million Dollar Mailings* because it is a textbook example of how to take a complex product and make it easy to understand and order.

In addition, the new section on magalogs (see #2 above) goes into great detail on the need to continually refresh and refurbish current mailings; what is said about the magalog could also be said about the catalog.

4. Sophisticated Personalization

Generally speaking, when a direct mail creative team conceives and executes a package, every aspect is thought through—from the outer envelope to the all-important order mechanism. Each element serves a purpose (see Chapter 4, "The Direct Mail Package" by Malcolm Decker). To take a long-term control and redesign it as a highly personalized mailing with all sorts of computerized bells and whistles generally will not result in a major breakthrough. The exception: the Easter Seals control which was given a complete facelift by Moore Response with the resultant effort beating control by a whopping 60 percent. In Chapter 29, you'll see the old, non-personalized control and the new version that displaced it.

5. The Retirement of Jayme-Ratalahti

The seminal direct mail creative team of this century, Bill Jayme and Heikki Ratalahti, hung up their spikes on Jayme's 70th birthday. Their work—especially in the business of launching magazines—is unparalleled. Ratalahti's elegant design set the stage for Jayme's extraordinary copy that sucked readers in and did not turn them loose until they ordered the product. In Chapter 31, you'll look back at their career and savor the copy and design that changed the face of direct mail.

6. The Implosion of the Sweepstakes Industry

In the first edition of *Million Dollar Mailings*, I did not cover any of the sweepstakes mailings of American Family Publishers, Publishers Clearing House, nor Reader's Digest. I thought they were cheap, tacky, and dishonest. Magazine publishers loved them because they represented a quick fix for lazy circulation directors who needed to bring in paid subscribers so that the advertising and sales departments could maintain their guaranteed rate base.

My take on sweepstakes seven years ago was correct. Their effect on direct marketing in general and magazine publishing in particular, has been ruinous.

In Chapter 27, you'll read about the entire debacle and its curious aftermath.

7. *The Grand Controls*

The premise of *Million Dollar Mailings* was to look at direct mail packages (or mail shots as they are called in the UK) that have proven themselves winners by being mailed for three or more consecutive years. Since this book was first published, guru Axel Andersson and the staff of InsideDirectMail (née WHO'S MAILING WHAT!) have identified nearly 500 mailings that fit the criteria—pure direct marketing gold—in nearly 200 categories. 8. *Financial Services Efforts: Features vs. Benefits*

I had nothing nice to say about financial services mailings (credit card offers, loans and insurance efforts) in the previous edition. I have nothing nice to say about them now. They look alike and read alike. They are cranked out by big agencies and internal creatives who do not know the difference between features and benefits, which I would like to address here.

MBA magazine came up with a fascinating rule: "People don't want quarter-inch drills; they want quarter-inch holes."

Quarter-inch drills have features—battery run, titanium bits, whatever. The benefit of the quarter-inch drill is the quarter-inch hole you can make with it.

Generally speaking, the direct mail letter is the element that makes an emotional connection with the reader. If you are selling quarter-inch drills, you talk quarter-inch holes in the letter and show and describe the quarter-inch drill in the circular.

The marketing and creative people in financial services do not understand the difference between features and benefits. "Your insurance policy has the following benefits: a) \$1 million for loss of life; b) \$500,000 for loss of one eye and one limb, etc."

In actuality, these are the features of the policy. The benefit: "You can sleep soundly knowing that if anything were to happen to you, your beloved family would be taken care of."

In an eye-opening column in *The New York Times*, Michael Rosenbaum wrote:

"Every January, inch-thick credit card statements clog the mailbox, the unwelcome aftermath of year-end celebrations. But it could be worse—\$5.7 million worse.

That's how much debt my family would have if we had taken advantage of all the credit cards and home-equity loans offered to us in 1998. Even at low, low introductory rates of 3.9 percent, the interest on \$5.7 million comes to a mind-boggling \$222,000 per year..."

How did the Rosenbaum family come to receive \$5.7 million in credit card offers? That year, 1998, credit card purveyors sent out 3.4 billion mailings—or roughly one per month for every man, woman, and child in the United States. What's more, their marketing efforts targeted those Americans who are the worst credit risks

and who jump from card to card in order to take advantage of low introductory APRs. The result: "Credit card companies alone charge off \$22 billion a year in unpaid bills—\$60 million a day," wrote Charles Fishman in *American Demographics*.

In short, financial services direct mail is a narrow, nasty little subset of direct marketing perpetrated by oh, maybe, 300 practitioners in a feeding frenzy that turns the waters they swim in red with the blood of wounded consumers and each other.

In the second quarter of 2000, credit card purveyors sent out 955 million—nearly one billion—solicitations and had to settle for 0.4% returns. That's roughly one order for every 250 pieces of mail sent out. In terms of learning anything, these mailings—with their vast paragraphs of mousetype footnotes, exclusions, and legalese—are not worth reporting on because nothing can be learned from them. This is not direct marketing; it is mass marketing to individuals—throwing eggs against a wall and hoping something will stick.

Further, *The Wall Street Journal* of December 1, 2000 reported that individual bankruptcies are soaring in this country—some projected 1.26 million in the previous year. The financial services marketers are not doing the average consumer a favor.

9. *Looking at Past Mailings*

One aspect of direct mail that many practitioners forget: If a mailing worked once, it may work again. In other words, if you are a mailer, it may well be worth your while (and a lot cheaper) to go back into those black binders containing samples, find a big winner from years gone by, update it, and send it out. After all, if it worked then, it may well work now. As Henny Youngman once said (or was it Milton Berle?): "There are no old jokes; just old audiences." That's why the updated edition of *Million Dollar Mailings* is just as valuable today as it was when it first came out.

10. *The Demise of Time-Life Books*

As this new and updated edition of *Million Dollar Mailings* goes to press, I just heard the news that AOL-Time Warner has shut down Time-Life Books. Started in the 1960's under the guidance of Jerome Hardy and, on when Hardy moved on, by the brilliant Joan Manley, who started as Hardy's secretary, Time-Life Books in its heyday was the world's largest publisher, moving 30 million books a year, as well as the single most profitable division of Time Incorporated. When the division was started, book continuity series (books series shipped at the rate of one book a month) were sold as much for "furniture." Further, focus groups told Time-Life they loved the books but did not want to commit to buy book-after-book ad infinitum. As one Time-Lifer said to me, "If a subscriber won't take—and pay for—at least 5 books, you lose money."

Time-Life Music started doing well and that's where they put their R&D money. No new titles meant no new business. Time-Life Books simply couldn't hack it in the digital age. They did wonderful mailings and created wonderful product. The 400 immensely talented people who were thrown out of work should have no trouble finding jobs. My message to Time-Life books: RIP. You done good things all those years.

Foreword

In this book you will find seventy-one of the top mailings in the United States in 1990, 1991, and 1992.

Seventy-one mailings that were controls.

Seventy-one mailings that have not been beaten for three to eighteen years.

Nowhere else will you find so many winners in the marketplace—real winners, controls for so many years.

In this book you can study the most successful direct mail package of all time, Martin Conroy's legendary "Two Young Men . . ." mailing for the *Wall Street Journal*.

To date it has generated sales of \$1 billion. I have counted the words in that famous sales letter, 810 words altogether. That means sales of \$1¼ million per word.

Think of that—\$1¼ million per word. No work of literature, no bestseller has reached one-thousandth of that.

Conroy's letter is probably responsible for more revenue per word than anything else ever printed—except the Bible.

There is one flaw with the *Wall Street Journal* letter—just one flaw. It never received any award, not a single one.

Why? It was never entered in any award competition.

My impression is that the majority of successful mailers don't want to participate in award competitions. For others, the entry cost is too high.

When did *Reader's Digest*, Publishers Clearing House, American Family Publishers, Easton Press, or Boardroom Reports ever enter a competition?

If many of the mailers spending \$10 million a year or more do not enter their controls in award competitions, isn't that like the Olympics without the real star athletes? The real stars are not even allowed to compete?

All other awards are given only to those who want to participate. The Axel Andersson Awards for longevity in the mail—devised by Denny Hatch of *Who's Mailing What!*—many thousands more than were entered in all the award competitions together. That gives everybody, every copywriter, every designer, the right to win, to get the recognition he or she deserves.

Many direct marketing awards have mainly been *pre-tests*—awards given to mailings *before all the results were in*.

The Axel Andersson Award is the only real 100 percent post-test award, a real post-test award because the award is given only after three years' results are in.

We don't know how much more profitable the long-term controls presented in this book are than their predecessors. But we know they

have not been beaten—at least not for three or more years. In many cases we also know the mailings that preceded them. The *Who's Mailing What!* archives make it possible to prove conclusively and objectively the success of a particular control and for how many years it has been a control—at least three years up to eighteen years.

To pick the winners we didn't have to rely on claims of success by mailers or agencies, nor on the opinions of judges.

A qualified jury may be able to eliminate the real duds but no panel of judges probably has the ability to pick the real winners—not even in their specific narrow field.

I have spent at least \$100 million promoting home-study courses in Germany. For almost fifty years before every single test/split-run I always asked myself which one would be a winner.

I must confess that my batting average in picking winners is not better than 60 percent; and remember, I have done thousands of tests in just one field (home study) in one market (Germany). Still my batting average is no better than 60 percent. What would it be in a field outside the home study? My answer: It would probably be so bad I wouldn't even consider trying to judge insurance promotions, fundraising mailings, or offers of collectibles, for instance, not to mention sweepstakes mailings.

That makes it imperative to judge the judges first. Can you judge a mailing without knowing most of the influencing factors? My answer is no.

For example, for every product and service there are different checklists for different types of mailings. For one-shot mailings, for lead-generating mailings, for mailings introducing a new product, etc.

All the control mailings presented here are cost-effective. That is the only reason they have been controls for more than three years.

In tests some of these controls have probably been beaten on the response rate basis alone—but the bottom line showed the cost of that particular mailing increased more than the response rate. A mailing that costs 40 percent more in the mail but lifts the response rate only 25 percent will probably not remain a control for long.

Cost-effectiveness also involves quality of the order, lead, etc. A more creative and innovative package may reduce the quality of the order as well as the lifetime value of a customer.

Too many mailings, space ads produce bad-quality customers.

My impression is that the award judges don't consider the cost of producing a particular package. A comparison of Axel Andersson Award winners with other award winners may reveal that other award winners cost at least one-third more to produce and to mail. For example, six of the Axel Andersson Award winners (9 percent) are double postcards that cost \$250–\$300 in the mail. Has a double postcard ever been entered in an awards contest or ever won anything? It's doubtful.

Every mailer knows that when testing new mailings the initial response from a new package will often look good, maybe even beat the present control. But we all know that may be a statistical fluke. In a rollout the old control will stand. So please remember all the award winners in this book have stood the test of time. They have been mailed over at least a period of three years, a proof that statistically valid results are available.

A few of the winners have already been beaten, replaced by new controls. That's also how it should be. The important thing is to study the differences between the old control and the new control and learn from the differences. In some cases the differences are obvious. For instance, the new *Yankee* double postcard has a sticker; the old one does not. That seems to confirm that stickers as a rule lift response—cost-effectively.

In other cases to beat the control you have to change the whole marketing approach; for instance, introduce a sweepstakes.

Will we ever be able to pretest mailings—and *rely on the findings*? Three experts seem to confirm what successful mailers know. From Jim Kobs's *Profitable Direct Marketing* (2d ed.; Lincolnwood, IL: NTC Business Books, 1991):

Even direct marketing professionals with years of experience have difficulty predicting exactly what will strike the consumer's fancy. This point was really driven home to me early in my agency career when I put together a panel session on testing for a Direct Marketing Association conference. My fellow panelists and I presented eight testing case histories, using slides to show the mailings packages or ads that were split-tested. Each member of the audience had a score sheet so he or she could pick his or her favorite before the results were revealed.

When we finished, not a single one of the 400 direct marketing pros in the audience had picked more than six of the eight test winners. But somebody had correctly picked all eight winners, namely, the consumers who had voted by sending in their respective reply cards and coupons.

Even focus groups have failed badly. In their modern classic, *Maxi-Marketing* (New York: McGraw-Hill, 1987), Stan Rapp and Tom Collins write:

In 1981, we had a rare opportunity to compare the accuracy of predictive consumer-interview research and actual direct-response results. A total of 104 respondents were shown eight different ads for RCA Record Club, all featuring essentially the same offer to new members. The respondents were all people who had bought records or tapes within the previous six months, had bought something by mail in the previous three years, and were not totally "turned off" to record clubs.

They were asked to rank eight ad campaigns according to "uniqueness," "interest in reading further," "believability," and "interest in responding." The results of this research predicted that the winners would be ads nicknamed "Guarantee" and "No Fine Print." According to the research, "Headphones" ran a poor fifth and "Cartoon" a miserable last.

However, when we actually ran the ads in an equal eight-way split run, "Headphones" was the clear winner. And "Cartoon," a corny but very effective cartoon ad that had consistently beaten other approaches for years, decisively outpulled the ads which the research respondents had chosen as most likely to interest and persuade them.

If RCA had relied on predictive research, the profitability of their advertising would have been sharply reduced.

I wish I could contradict these three experts sometime in the future, because reliable inexpensive pretesting would be a real breakthrough. It

would probably mean the biggest dream-come-true for every direct marketing entrepreneur.

But for now—and for a long time to come—post-test and rollout analysis is the only direct route to profitable direct mail.

For this reason, I believe *Million-Dollar Mailing\$* represents a real breakthrough in our understanding of moneymaking direct mail and how to create it.

In the Beginning

Once a month in the late 1960s a group of direct mail copywriters would get together for lunch at the Blue Ribbon, a German-American rathskeller on West Forty-fourth Street off Times Square in New York City. Drinks were cheap and a very good lunch was served for very little money. Originally called the National Association of Direct Mail Writers, the organization was dreamed up in 1966 by Ed McLean, who was then at Ogilvy & Mather. It was his secretary, Liz Morris, who spent countless hours getting it going, recruiting members, and persuading them to come to the luncheons.

When the Blue Ribbon folded, the venue became the upstairs room at Rosoff's, one block south. Andi Emerson became president and the name was changed to the Direct Mail Writer's Guild. At Rosoff's—where drinks were a buck and there was a great hors d'oeuvres table as well as a superb lunch served on pewter plates—you could meet everyone from young writers just starting out to one of the nicest gentlemen ever to walk planet Earth, the legendary John Caples, whose genius put the direct marketing show on the road. The meetings were terribly important to us, because at that time direct mail was the ugly little stepsibling of general advertising, and we who wrote it were fringe players, sneered at, and dismissed out of hand by those on the Madison Avenue fast track.

At one Writer's Guild luncheon the speaker was Dorothy Kerr, then circulation director of *U.S. News & World Report*. A single sentence of her talk rocketed into my brain and remained etched for all time. It changed my life. Kerr said

To be successful in this business you have to see who's mailing what, really study the mail, look for those mailings that keep coming over and over again which means they are successful, and then steal smart.

Today, Rosoff's is gone. Direct marketing is now the aristocrat of advertising. And direct mail—although still sneered at by the hotshots on Madison Avenue—is the fastest-growing advertising medium and is the linchpin of direct marketing.

And as a result of that meeting where Dorothy Kerr was the speaker, I

am proprietor of the largest private library of direct mail samples in the world.

I started slowly, sorting and cataloging my own mail and that of a few friends. Gradually the collection grew from one file drawer to two and then four. Periodically I would hire high school students to come in and help me sort and catalog.

There was no clear thought in my head as to how to turn this collection into a business. But I kept collecting. My wife, Peggy, thought I was cuckoo, but has always supported me in whatever I did.

I did know that the collection was enormously useful to *me* in my freelance copywriting work. For example, one September I received a call from consultant Jerry Gaylord. Victor Kiam of Remington not only wanted to get into the catalog business, but also expected to have a catalog out in time for Christmas. As I said, this was September. Could I write and design a sixteen-page catalog in a week? I said yes.

Gaylord and I met with the Remington people in Bridgeport, Connecticut, and as I was leaving the meeting with two huge shopping bags of merchandise, Gaylord turned to me and said: "Oh, by the way, we'll need an order form, too."

I winced. The order form is perhaps the most important element of a catalog. Screw up the order form so that people have a tough time ordering, and the catalog will bomb. The order form is also a horrendously complex document with many parts. Not only are there lines to write in item numbers, descriptions, sizes, and prices, but also ship-to/bill-to instructions, credit card information, gift shipments with handwritten holiday messages in each one, initials to be engraved on certain items, plus the guarantee and the schedule of shipping charges. The order form must be easy to use and should make the customer feel good about doing business with you.

Mercifully I had a file of catalog order forms. I spread fifteen or twenty on my big desk, chose six that looked relatively simple, and *stole smart*, picking up different elements from each one. In two hours—rather than two days—I had an order form. It was no world beater in creativity. But it was usable; all bases were touched; nothing was left out. It adhered to one of the universal rules of direct mail: Make it as easy as possible for the customer to order.

Only because of my giant swipe file was I able to meet Victor Kiam's impossible deadline. That order form lasted for several years and worked fine; Gaylord built for Kiam a growing and profitable catalog business that lasted for eight years.

Enter Harry Walsh

In the 70s and early 80s there were a few superstar direct mail writers: John Francis Tighe, Robert Haydon Jones, Linda Wells, Frank Johnson, the late Chris Stagg, the late Hank Burnett, Bill Jayme, and Harry Walsh.

Walsh, a gruff, red-haired, six-foot-tall alumnus of Ogilvy & Mather, lived and worked in Westport, Connecticut, just up the Merritt Parkway from my house in Stamford. Every now and again he would call me up

to say he had got a new assignment and ask if he could look through my files to see what others had done. After finding what he wanted, and making photocopies, he would invariably offer payment, which I refused. "Okay," he said, "the next time I come down and use the files, I'll buy you lunch."

A month later Walsh and I were settling in for the first of several white ones at La Bretagne in Stamford when he said: "You know, I'd pay to be a member of your archive service so I could come down and use your library."

"If you were a paying member," I replied, "I'd have to send you regular information so you would know what was in there. And that sounds like a newsletter."

I came home and told Peggy I wanted to start a newsletter. She said that cash flow for a newsletter couldn't be any worse than that for a freelancer and immediately agreed.

I wrote a direct mail package for a nonexistent publication called *Who's Mailing What!* and sent out 10,000 pieces. We got 150 subscribers at \$99 which brought in enough cash to do a 35,000 mailing and we were in business.

Today I have twenty to thirty correspondents across the country collecting direct mail and forwarding it to me via Federal Express. To create the newsletter, I personally read 4,000 to 5,000 pieces of direct mail a month in some 200 categories: consumer, business, fundraising, and catalogs. The library probably contains 10,000 individual samples. However, we don't save everything. When a duplicate mailing arrives, we note the prior dates received on the new envelope and toss out the old. Thus some envelopes with fifteen or more dates listed on them represent fifteen or more mailing packages. So while there are 10,000 actual pieces in the library, they may represent 40,000 mailings that have been received over ten or more years.

If the average cost of a package in the mail is \$500 per thousand and if the average quantity of each mailing is 100,000 pieces, my library of samples representing 40,000 samples, the entire thing is worth some \$2 billion in marketing information—money spent in testing and rolling out.

For a small fee, subscribers to *Who's Mailing What!* are automatically members of the library and can phone, fax, or write for copies of mailings so that they, too, can steal smart.

Enter Axel Andersson

Several years ago I met Axel Andersson, who has forgotten more about direct mail technique than I will ever know. Andersson, a Swede, moved to Germany after World War II and built the largest home-study business—writing courses and foreign languages—in Europe. After thirty years he sold out and moved to Florida, where he spends two hours a day walking the beach and the rest of the time studying direct mail and consulting for a roster of international clients.

Axel Andersson is one of the most totally focused men I have met.

Very little gets in the way of his thinking about business in general and direct mail in particular. For years his wife was always stopping him on the way out the door to tell him that his necktie did not go with his shirt and to go put on a different tie. It began to irk him so he came up with a unique solution: whenever he had a shirt made to order, he had a necktie made to match. As a result, Axel is easy to spot at a conference: medium height with a shock of wavy gray hair, a round, cherubic face, with a Terry-Thomas gap between his two front teeth, and his signature outfit of a shirt with necktie of matching material. "Just one problem," Axel says. "Every time I spill on a necktie, I've ruined my shirt!"

Happiness to Axel Andersson is to spend a weekend at the Stamford Marriott where, waiting for him, will be five giant cartons of direct mail purged from my files—the hundreds of dupes and purges that I would have ordinarily thrown away. The routine is invariable. He comes to Stamford on Friday night and we have dinner. Saturday he rises before dawn and spends the entire day in his room reading mail. By Sunday morning he has winnowed the five cartons down to two of material he wants sent to him in Florida for further study. On Sunday morning I load the two cartons and Axel into the car, and he spends the entire day—including lunch and dinner—either going through my library of samples or talking direct mail, or both.

Early in our relationship we struck a deal whereby he would pay me a yearly stipend plus shipping charges for all my discarded mail. So every week we bundle up two or three cartons of mail and ship it via UPS to Axel in Florida.

Whereas my library has mailings cataloged by category and then alphabetically by mailer within each category, Axel files everything by direct mail applications: offers, formats, involvement techniques, sweepstakes, etc. Axel's library is probably larger than mine by now, and he is currently negotiating to buy the house next door to house his massive collection.

The Million-Dollar Mailings

Early in 1991 Axel called. "Why don't you give awards for mailings that are true controls . . . mailings that I keep seeing over and over again?"

It was a brilliant idea.

After all, what is the only true measure of success for a direct mail package?

Efficiency and longevity.

If the same mailing continues to garner responses at the most efficient cost-per-order (CPO), cost-per-paid-order (CPPO), or cost-per-inquiry (CPI) year after year—beating back test after test against it—it is, ipso facto, a masterpiece of this advertising genre.

I started unearthing mailing efforts from my files that had been received over a period of three or more consecutive calendar years—some going back to the early 1970s.

As I started to analyze what they had in common, I began to realize

that Axel Andersson had started me on the road to groundbreaking research in the field of direct mail advertising.

These are the supreme examples of direct mail at its level of Million-Dollar Mailings—the Grand Controls—hugely successful efforts that have brought in hundreds of thousands of responses and tens of millions of dollars for the mailers over a period of *years*.

Methodology of Choosing the Winners

Catalogs

Catalogs represent approximately a quarter of my direct marketing library. But catalogs are constantly adding and deleting products and changing covers and formats. At first I assumed that no cataloger would be foolish enough to mail the same catalog three years running, so obviously there could be no catalog awards. It turned out that there was a catalog I had been receiving, and ordering from, for three consecutive years, Cinegraph Slides of Garden Grove, California. It is a masterpiece of inventiveness in that it takes an impossibly complex offer and makes it easy to understand and order.

Financial Services and Fundraisers

Two major categories are not included: financial services and fundraisers (charities, and political action committees, or PACs).

Financial services and fundraisers are direct marketing anomalies. When banks or American Express get an order, they send out a piece of plastic that turns into a cash cow; insurance companies send out a certificate saying that if you land in the hospital you will receive \$30 a day, or if you die you will receive \$10,000. Either way they fulfill nothing. I once asked Scott Schneider, managing director of First Direct in San Francisco, if a bank could afford \$100 cost-per-order for a credit card customer. His one-word answer: "More."

Fundraisers send even less than banks and insurance companies; give to a charity or a PAC and all you get is a promise that most of your money will go for good works, immediately followed by an avalanche of requests for more money—all mailed at nonprofit rates. Because financial services, charities, and PACs operate under different arithmetic, they are not included.

Sweepstakes

With two exceptions, sweepstakes are not included. Virtually all sweeps efforts urge people to enter the sweeps—even if they don't buy the product. Arithmetic has shown that the more nos you get, the more yeses (orders) you'll receive. For this reason, the incredible value of the prizes is hammered home along with the warning that you can't win if you don't enter . . . so, ENTER NOW! Many consumers believe that by ordering, they'll have a better chance at winning a prize, even though this isn't true for legitimate sweepstakes.

Since sweeps are always changing and tend to look alike, I don't analyze them very closely. However, Axel Andersson discovered a *Reader's Digest* sweepstakes package that had come into our various collections some thirty-five times over the course of three years. The outside envelope, entry-order form, and prize information were essentially the same in all of these packages; however, the product was different. The sweeps umbrella was used to sell different books. So under those guidelines, the mailings were different and did not qualify.

The Axel Andersson Awards

This left publishing, merchandise, plus some miscellaneous categories such as correspondence courses, business services and products, and associations.

That first year (1991) I found sixty-seven mailings that had been continuously mailed for three or more calendar years. Since the awards were Axel Andersson's idea, I decided to name them after him.

In the publishing area, the majority were books and magazines (as opposed to newsletters, which tend to be timely and crank out new or updated mailings in response to changing conditions in the world or the markets).

One qualifier did not win an award: a personal computer magazine was marketed via a tawdry sweepstakes for the entire life of the publication before going out of business in 1990. I spoke to the creator of this sweeps and he refused to cooperate because the magazine's demise was an embarrassment.

With the exception of this one judgment call, awards were given based strictly on longevity. Unlike all other awards—the Echos, the Caples, the Clios, the Maxis, the Oscars, the Emmys, the Obies, the Tonys—the only panel of judges or experts was the marketplace.

Since the first group of Axels was awarded for mailings that were received for the three consecutive years of 1988, 1989, and 1990, I have since gone through the library and found a number of additional mailings that qualify. Moreover, new mailings turned up that were first mailed from 1989 through 1992.

I tracked down the creators of these packages, and many of them have agreed to contribute their insights on their own works in particular and on direct mail in general.

The result is a collection of seventy-one Grand Controls that will be fascinating to seasoned professionals and newcomers alike.

A Final Caveat

If you were to take the seventy-one Grand Controls in this book and pin them up on a big wall . . . then do likewise with all the mailings that have won awards for "creativity" and "marketing" (for example, John Caples Awards, Echo Awards, Folio/MPA Awards) . . . and then com-

pare what was on the two walls . . . you would quickly believe you were not only in two different industries, but in two different countries.

As I said earlier, the only judge in the Axel Andersson Award mailings is the marketplace. Many of these mailings are not pretty. If entered in an awards contest, one or two of them might send the judges running from the room clutching their throats and gagging. But they have *proved themselves successful over years*. They are responsible for millions of customers and tens of millions of dollars in revenues.

The way to benefit from this collection is to put aside preconceived ideas about what successful direct mail ought to look like. Instead, study them closely. Ask yourself: What do these Grand Controls have that has made them so successful over a period of years? Why have they beaten back test after test against them? What can I adapt from them to make my own mailings cost less and pull more?

Paul Bell, subscription marketing manager for Dow Jones & Company, said, "These are the workhorses. These are the mailings that are being cranked out at the lowest cost per thousand and bringing in customers at the lowest cost per order."

Or, in the immortal words of Ed McCabe, former president of BMG Direct Marketing, "Every time we get 'creative,' we lose money."

One final point. American direct mail is the very best in the world. No other country or continent can begin to compare with the United States in techniques and technology. This is not self-puffery. There is an overriding and obvious reason: with a population of 250 million, this country has a huge universe of names, all of whom speak the same language. This means American direct mailers are able to test, test, and test. In Europe or the Pacific Rim countries, big lists do not exist. There are privacy strictures. What would be a primitive test here is a full-blown, sophisticated mailing there.

So in the United States, when a mailing arrives month after month, year after year, it has obviously been tested and refined and is bringing in orders at the lowest possible cost.

The seventy-one Grand Controls in this book are the very best of American direct mail because they have proved themselves in the marketplace; they are the very best of the very best.

What's more, people are the same everywhere; we respond to fear, greed, sex, premiums, and low prices whether in Sioux City or Salzburg or Sorrento or Singapore or Sydney. The techniques and copy approaches in this book—when translated and massaged slightly—should work anywhere in the world people can be reached through the mail.

Why Direct Mail?

Direct mail . . . advertising mail . . . admail . . . promotional mail . . . is huge business.

Direct mail is the second largest advertising medium. More money is spent on direct mail (Approximately \$25.6 billion) than on television . . . or magazine space . . . or radio. Only local newspapers received a larger share of the advertising pie (Approximately \$27.9 billion). Last year, 63.7 billion pieces of Third Class mail found their way into mailboxes and corporate in-boxes, more than double the 26.3 billion pieces eleven years earlier. Nearly 92 million Americans, or 51.4% of the country's adult population bought goods or services by mail or phone last year, up from 64.4 million Americans five years before.

According to Arnold Fishman, president of Marketing Logistics of Lincolnshire, Illinois: In 1991, Americans spent \$211.1 billion in mail order sales—up from the \$200.7 billion the prior year. The breakdown is as follows: Consumer mail, \$108 billion; Business Mail, \$54.1 billion; Fund raising, \$49 billion.

Many Americans depend on catalog shopping for many of their personal needs and gifts. Mail order shopping is especially vital to two-income families where both partners work and simply don't have time to shop.

There are several reasons why direct mail advertising is in the ascendancy and other media—with the exception of local newspapers—are on the decline.

Television

Twenty years ago a television advertiser had four choices: ABC, CBS, NBC, and a buy of independent stations. Today cable has dramatically disbursed the audience. Instead of four or five channels on the home screen, most Americans have a choice of forty or fifty. With forty channels to choose from, how can an advertiser reasonably expect to target a likely prospect?

Second, technology has hurt television advertising. With remote con-

trol and a "zapper," or mute button, viewers can silence commercials or flip around the dials when a commercial comes on. The screen within a screen enables viewers to keep an eye on the channel they are watching while they rove the dial during commercials; just as soon as the commercial is over on the screen within a screen, they can switch back.

Writing in *Direct*, Stan Rapp quotes University of Houston media studies professor Jib Fowles:

People scan the television in the way aborigines scan the horizon. They flip channels and never really watch anything. The advertisers know this and they are backing away. They want more targeted media.

Stan Rapp adds:

The waste involved in using mass media to reach ever-smaller markets is reaching truly extraordinary proportions. The cost of advertising paid for and never seen, or that is squandered on an audience that includes fewer than one out of ten real prospects is a recurring nightmare for ad managers.

Finally, the advent of the VCR enables viewers to tape programs and watch them at their convenience; commercials are skipped by running them fast-forward.

For these reasons, leading-edge, award-winning TV commercials seem more like extensions of the programs than the old hard-hitting (and very effective) pitches for laxatives, headache cures, and false teeth stickum. There's just one problem: they're so genteel and clever, they don't sell.

This is substantiated by a 1991 study by Video Storyboard Tests Inc. The study found that 64 percent of people polled in 1986 could cite a favorite television campaign without prompting; by 1991 that figure had dropped to 48 percent. Print advertising was far less effective; only 26 to 31 percent could remember a print campaign.

Telemarketing

The most demanding sound in the world is a ringing telephone. It must be answered or it will keep on ringing. To stop what you are doing—diapering the baby, boiling an egg, watching the news—to answer the phone, only to be hustled for magazine subscriptions, brokerage services, or tickets to the fireman's ball, is a severe irritant. Telemarketing makes enemies. Already Congress has passed laws forbidding the use of robot dialing machines and limiting 900 numbers. More legislation is coming.

Telemarketing scams are rampant. Sweet-talking con men and women set up shops in boiler rooms around the country and prey on gullible consumers who end up revealing their Visa and Mastercard numbers. No merchandise is delivered and the cards are charged several times—often up to and beyond their limit. By the time the scam is discovered, the boiler room has long since closed, and reopened under another name across town.

Magazines

Magazines are struggling. There are just too many of them. All are chasing the same readers and the same advertising dollars, and all are plagued with the same desperate fragmentation that the television industry is experiencing.

The Benefits of Direct Mail

Unlike television and space advertising and radio—which are shotgun media—direct mailers tote a rifle. They can go directly to suburban white families who have 3.7 children, have incomes of \$50,000 or more, and drive Lexus cars . . . or any of hundreds of demographic, psychographic, geographic, or financial parameters.

What's more, it is a medium that is coldly logical and measurable within tenths and hundredths of a percent.

Department store mogul John Wanamaker once lamented that half of his advertising was wasted; the problem was, he did not know which half.

Because direct mail requires action—an order, an inquiry, or a donation to be returned by mail, phone, or fax—direct marketers know precisely which of their advertising dollars are effective and which are wasted.

At Its Best, Direct Mail Is Very, Very Good

People complain about the glut of catalogs. Yet the catalog enables any person, rural or urban, to have a complete shopping mall on the bookshelf.

Clothes, jewelry, electronics, furniture, shoes, books, magazines, credit cards, loans and second mortgages, records, gifts, fine art, kitchenware, gourmet food, garden items, camping equipment—the entire range of goods and services is as close to the person at home as the nearest telephone.

The use of an 800 number makes ordering not only convenient, but free. The use of a credit card means automatic charge privileges.

If a purchase is needed in a hurry, Federal Express can deliver it the next day. With reputable mail order merchants, returning merchandise is far easier than being hassled at a department store.

Think of it! You suddenly remember it's your mother's birthday tomorrow. From the "catalog mall on your shelf" you order the perfect gift by phone and know that it will be beautifully wrapped, and delivered by Federal Express amid panache and excitement on the Big Day. Order flowers from Calyx & Corolla and they'll not only get to mom the next day, but also last seven to ten days longer than flowers from the local florist because they come directly from the grower. Instead of being the forgetful and ungrateful child, you are, once again, the apple of her eye. All thanks to direct mail.

Catalog copy is far more informative than the average store clerk (referred to by Poss Pregoff, formerly of Charles Schwab & Co., as a "B-DOT" or "brain-dead order taker").

How dumb are store clerks? Shortly after the death of pianist Vladimir Horowitz, I went into the Sam Goody record store in the Stamford, Connecticut, mall looking for an audiocassette of Horowitz's highly touted final recording. I spoke with a tall, blond, effete-looking young clerk who remarked that I was the third or fourth person who had asked for it that day. "Tell me," he said, "is Horowitz his first or his last name?"

In a 1989 survey of 2,500 adults, Yankelovich Clancy Shulman, market researchers in Westport, Connecticut, found that 66 percent of people who like to shop for clothes found the experience both frustrating and time consuming.

On the other hand, stay home and order by mail and you save time, gasoline, and parking expense. No gook from the exhaust pipe of your car is sullyng the ozone. It's good for the environment; it's good for the psyche; it's good for family togetherness.

This is just as true in the business environment as it is for the average consumer.

People LIKE Direct Mail

Many people grouse about "junk mail." Yet they basically like it. People are lonely. Nobody likes to come home to an empty mailbox. If the mailbox is bare, you get a lurking sense in the pit of your stomach that something is very wrong: your mail carrier had a heart attack . . . the Postal Service has collapsed . . . your government has run out of money and can't pay the post office salaries . . . a bomb went off in the main post office. Direct mail is your only daily contact with the federal government; it is the consumer's private check that the system is still working.

Direct Mail Is Secret

Unlike broadcast or space advertising, which becomes public knowledge once the ad goes on the air or the publication hits the newsstands, direct mail is *unseen* by anyone except the sender and the reader. There is no way an outsider can know how many people will receive each mailing . . . or which list it went to.

Send out a wee 10,000 test into the Great Smoky Mountains or Scottsdale, Arizona, and two people will know the quantities: you and a postal clerk. As far as your competitor can tell, you are doing nothing (unless he has relatives around the country collecting and forwarding mail; even so, it's highly unlikely he'd hear about a 10,000 test).

Direct Mail Makes Things Happen

Because direct mail is secret, many organizations use it to influence public opinion with great success. For example, a number of fundraisers

have built huge constituencies and communicate with them directly on a one-on-one basis. Recent examples: abortion rights and the Medicare catastrophe bill. Public opinion and Congress have done a flip-flop. Why? Because wheelbarrows full of petitions landed in congressmen's offices and had to be stacked in the hallways. These petitions were the result of fundraising mailings by such groups as National Abortion Rights Action League, Planned Parenthood, National Organization for Women, People for the American Way, National Committee to Preserve Social Security and Medicare, various armed forces and conservative retirees organizations. When he took office, Rep. Christopher Shays (R-Conn.) found *22,000 petitions from senior citizens in his own district* waiting for him on the subject of social security and Medicare.

Traditional media never see these mailings. They make for dull copy. No angry marchers . . . no confrontations at abortion clinics . . . no fiery speeches to an enraged mob. Instead, silently into mailboxes go messages that are read in the quiet of one's home. The readers of these messages take action. Public opinion is changed. Laws are changed. And the press and TV are baffled by unexplainable, fast-moving events.

At Its Worst, Direct Mail Is Very, Very Bad

We are seeing more and more scams: fake charities . . . old pyramid schemes from the 40s and 50s . . . multi-level-marketing schemes . . . instant credit . . . loans you never have to pay back . . . postcards urging you to call 900 numbers because you have won a free vacation and some other prize (which is not free at all because \$6.95 a minute will be billed to your phone for the 900 call).

In a recessionary economy, these scam artists prey on those out of work and on fixed incomes, the old and infirm.

In the course of reading up to 5,000 mailings a month, I regularly come across thirty to fifty such fraudulent or near-fraudulent efforts. These are immediately dispatched to the postal inspectors who are doing their level best to combat crime in the mail. I have found the postal inspectors to be dedicated, hard working, and in many cases successful; however, their job is like kicking manure uphill with pointed boots.

The only way to stop scams in the mail is for list brokers to stop renting lists to scam artists, and for consumers to wise up and realize that if an offer sounds too good to be true, it is. Unfortunately, in both cases, greed is a more powerful incentive than common sense.

Why Use Direct Mail?

For a product or service to sell by mail, it must have one or more of these three elements: price . . . service . . . exclusivity.

If the price is lower than in retail stores, a person will buy by mail.
If the mailer offers terrific service, strong guarantees, easy returns policy, a customer will buy by mail.

If the product or service is not available from any other source, those who want it will buy by mail.

This is Universal Rule 1 of direct mail, and is inviolate.

Several years ago a man called asking for information about my newsletter. He said he was going to start a mail order business. We got to talking and he told me his plans. It seems he wanted to sell self-help and instructional videos by mail.

"Are they only available through you?" I asked.

"No, we're going to choose the best of the best and offer them in a catalog."

"At a discount?"

"No, these are really good videos, and people will pay full price for them."

"So then you'll inventory them and ship them out overnight."

"No, actually we plan to have the producers drop-ship the orders."

I told him that he had neither price nor service nor exclusivity going for him, and, in my opinion, he didn't have a mail order business.

He hung up.

I hope I saved him a lot of money.

What Guarantees a Successful Direct Mail Effort?

The late Ed Mayer used to teach that the success of direct mail was dependent upon the following: 40 percent lists, 40 percent offer, 20 percent creativity and presentation. In other words, under Mayer's formula, lists and offer were twice as important as the creative work.

Mayer thought of product and offer as the same. But they are different. The product (or service) is what is ultimately delivered. There can be any number of offers to sell it: different prices, premium with order and/or premium with payment, sweepstakes umbrella, cash with order, credit card option, installment billing, etc.

My own formula is more stringent than Mayer's. For a mailing to be successful, three elements must be in place: product . . . offer . . . and lists.

Everything else (copy, design, format, paper stock), while important, is secondary to product, offer, and lists.

If any one of these three elements—product, offer, lists—is askew, the mailing will fail.

A farm equipment catalog mailed into the barrios of Los Angeles would bomb. An offer for Omaha Steaks or Godiva chocolates sent to Weight Watchers or subscribers of the newsletter *Cardiac Alert* would almost certainly not work.

This is Universal Rule 2 of direct mail and is inviolate.

Direct Mail and the Environment

Recently I did a call-in radio interview with a truly uppity talk-show host in Chicago. The woman kept up the pressure about junk mail and the environment and the destruction of trees. I did my best to talk about damage to the environment from cars polluting the atmosphere when people go to stores and about the fact that direct mailers advertise only to prospects who have shown relative interest in the same kinds of offers. I assured her that each piece of direct mail can cost from twenty-five cents to a dollar or more, and that unless mailers are very careful about going to the right lists with the right offer, they will be out of business in no time.

Finally, exasperated, she said, "I think people are sick of the waste—of getting a mailbox full of junk and having to throw it out!"

Equally exasperated, I asked: "Do you get the Sunday *Chicago Tribune*?"

She said she did.

I snarled: "Next Sunday, you go through the entire *Chicago Tribune*, page by page. Every time you come across an advertisement that is of no interest to you whatsoever, tear it out, crumple it into a ball, and throw it on the floor. Do this for every ad that you couldn't possibly be interested in—big and small: classifieds, fur coats, trucks, baby carriages, personals, books and records, appliances, real estate. Tear out everything that is of no use to you, ball it and throw it into the middle of the room. Then, while that three-foot-high pile of crumpled newspaper is still sitting there in the middle of your room, call me, and let's have a meaningful discussion about wasted advertising and the destruction of trees!"

The term *junk mail* was coined by the newspaper industry as a result of losing advertising revenue to direct mail. Over the years, to compete with direct mail, newspapers have been forced to slash rates for ROP advertising and for freestanding inserts by as much as 50 percent.

According to a story in *USA Today*, of 227 newspaper publishers, general managers, and advertising executives surveyed by media analyst Ken Berents of Alex Brown & Sons, 60 percent said the biggest competitive threat was advertising mail. Berents said that "advertisers are looking at ways to really target market, and newspapers are realizing it." Survey results indicated that cable television was a distant second, with 13 percent of the executives calling it a major threat.

As a result, many newspapers routinely run vicious editorials and columns about the evils of junk mail and what it does to landfills. Every time there are hearings about a new postal rate increase, the Newspaper Publishers' Association attends in force, urging that postal rates be raised sky high.

What are the facts? Direct mail is responsible for about 2 percent of all landfill waste. Newsprint, on the other hand, takes up 20 percent of landfills. If half the contents of newspapers is advertising, then 10 percent of all landfill rubbish is untargeted, wasted newspaper advertising. Versus 2 percent direct mail.

The battle between direct mailers and newspapers is an ugly one, and will be around for a long time to come.

Along with newspapers, many magazines and television programs decry junk mail, because it does to them what it does to newspapers: cuts into their advertising revenues. In 1990 Mike Riley of the *Time* magazine Washington bureau called to say he had just been assigned to do a big story on junk mail.

"Is it going to be a positive or a negative story on junk mail?" I asked.

"I don't know. I just started, and you are one of the first people I called."

"Well, it better be positive," I said. "Because Time Warner—with its magazines, books and videos—is one of the biggest junk mailers in the world and if you do a negative story, you're all going to look like a bunch of horses' asses."

When the November 26, 1990, cover story ran, in its letter from the editor, *Time* admitted to being one of the biggest direct mailers in the world, and the story itself did not have a negative spin.

Direct Mail: The Ultimate *Trompe l'Oeil*

One difference between a work of art and a work of advertising is that the artist hopes to sell the painting, whereas the advertiser hopes to sell the subject.

A direct mail package is the only truly participatory art form. You find the envelope in your mailbox and immediately have the option of participating or throwing it away. If you elect to read it, *you* make it happen. You open the envelope, and generally you will find several pieces inside: usually a typewritten letter, a printed illustrated circular or brochure, an order device, and a method for getting the order back to the sender—either a reply envelope or reply information printed on the back of the order card. You can savor each piece at your own pace.

Artistically, direct mail is (as it should be) extremely interruptive. It jerks the eye all over the place . . . highlighting benefits . . . showing the product in a number of different focuses. There is a rhythm to direct mail, a kind of beat you might find in Mondrian's *Broadway Boogie-Woogie* at New York's Museum of Modern Art; when you look at that painting, your eyes climb multicolored ladders, then skitter across to a splotch of red, slide down a bright column of squares, and land with a thump that leads you off in another direction.

The reason for this seeming clutter was best summed up by Lewis M. Smith, former creative director of Wunderman Worldwide and marketing director of Book-of-the-Month. Smith's simple three-word dictum: "Neatness rejects involvement."

Think about that. If you walk into your office in the morning and your desk is absolutely clean, you'll sit back and have another cup of coffee and ponder the events of the coming day. If your desk is a wreck—piled high with unanswered letters and pink telephone slips—you can't help but start reading . . . foraging around . . . realizing that you have much to do. You are immediately involved. Clutter *invites* involvement.

The direct mail artist—the person who conceives, writes, and designs the work of direct mail—knows direct mail is an impulse sale. Once the

envelope is in the prospect's hands, there are perhaps four seconds to grab attention.

Psychologists have discovered that all of us, when not otherwise engaged, walk around holding long conversations with ourselves. There are interruptions: a baby crying, a dog barking, the telephone ringing, the doorbell chiming, the kitchen timer dinging, a pile of direct mail.

Your mailing has to be startling enough to interrupt the day's normal routine and the person's self-conversation. What's more, it has to keep on interrupting until the order device is acted upon then and there. If the mailing is laid aside, chances are it won't be picked up and reconsidered, and the sale will be lost. Thus, if it is too neat—too noninterruptive—it will be rejected.

Not only is direct mail the only participatory art form in which the viewer savors, touches, considers, or rejects each piece at his or her own pace, it is the only one in which the artist can use a lot of words and pictures to tell the story. Unlike the novelist who must decide at the outset whether to use the first or third person and then stick to it, the direct mail artist has the luxury of using all three persons.

Walter Weintz, former circulation director of the *Reader's Digest*, used to say that there is "you" copy, "me" copy, and "it" copy. "You" copy talks about all the benefits to you: why you should buy or subscribe to this product because it will make you rich or beautiful or smart or live longer or whatever. "You" copy naturally falls into the format of the letter, a personal discussion between you (the prospect) and me (the writer). In the letter, you sell the *experience* of owning the product more than you sell the product itself; you talk benefits, not features.

Until recently, there was a basic rule that the letter in direct mail should always be in typewriter type. That's because letters between people are either handwritten or typed (never typeset, which is reserved for mass, not personal, communications) and because handwriting is difficult to read. However, the software company Parsons Technology uses a Times Roman font for the letters that are signed by company president Bob Parsons. When asked why he used Times Roman rather than the traditional typewriter type on letters, the then marketing director Stephen Sorb said categorically that font doesn't matter. "These are all computer people with five fonts on their printers. What's more, we did some research, and the people really believe the letters are written by Bob Parsons."

According to the great Canadian designer Ted Kikoler, a letter should look like a letter; printed formats might be the norm in ten years, but not now. (See Chapter 5 for Kikoler's graphic techniques that he guarantees will kick up a response to your mailings.)

"It" copy describes and shows "it," the product or service, and tends to be what goes into the circular. Here are the illustrations with copy and captions so thoroughly intertwined they are as one. This is akin to cubism, introduced in the early years of the century by Picasso, Gris, Léger, and Braque. It drove the art world somewhat crazy. But cubism wasn't a very complex idea. The artist simply depicted a nude or a still life or a violin from several angles in the same painting. The only way you could see that object in real life from all those angles would be for you to walk around it, which takes time. As a result, cubist paintings had

a unique four dimensionality—the three basic dimensions plus time.

A direct mail circular is designed to do the same thing—to show the object from all possible angles, using “it” copy and art.

Some mailings have been tested with and without the circular. Sometimes those without the circular have proved more effective in both numbers of responses and bottom-line cost-per-order, which fact reaffirms the power of the word *you* and the effectiveness of “you” copy and the letter format. However, when mailings are tested with and without a letter, those with no letter almost always lose. Direct mail is a personal medium; letters are personal.

“Me” copy tells the prospect what this product or service has done for “me” . . . the endorsement . . . the testimonial . . . the publisher’s letter . . . the words of praise from the user.

The direct mail artist, then, has at his command all the communication techniques that can be reproduced on the printed page—words in all parts of speech, plus illustrations (photographs, drawings, paintings, charts, tables, graphs—anything).

The result: a multifaceted package that assaults the prospect visually, that first and foremost interrupts and then at once charms, amuses, informs, excites, delights, intrigues, creates need, stimulates, and emotionally turns on the reader/viewer. Freelancer George Duncan has the best description for direct mail: “Theater in print!”

Every part of the package is designed to tell a piece of the story. No one thing should tell the whole story. Many practitioners believe that copy on one piece should never be repeated verbatim elsewhere; otherwise the prospect will say, “I’ve seen this before,” and lay the thing down.

The entire effect of these various pieces should be to bring the focus of the prospect down to the most important single part of the package—the order device—which can use all three persons at once (“Reserve IT now” . . . “YOUR personal guarantee: if YOU decide at any time YOU are dissatisfied” . . . “Yes, please rush ME the item and bill ME at the low, low price of . . .”).

The direct mail artist has made the product or service so real that the prospect not only believes it exists, but simply *must have it*. The more you study and sift through the various parts of the mailing, the more real the object for sale becomes. Ultimately all the verbiage, wild artistic jumble, and parts of speech melt into the background as this object or service shines forth like a hologram in the prospect’s brain—three dimensional, touchable, perhaps even smellable. *You must have it!* (Or at least try it under the risk-free, money-back guarantee.) And so you go through the trouble of ordering it.

In direct mail, the artistry is all the more consummate if the product does not yet exist, such as a new magazine which is not yet published and which, in fact, won’t ever be published unless enough people subscribe as a result of this mailing—known as a dry test—that has been executed for one purpose only: to convince the investors to put up the necessary dough.

This is why the direct mail package is the “ultimate *trompe l’oeil*”—that “fool-the-eye” style of painting that makes an object or a scene so real that you cannot tell it’s a painting at all. And this is why the direct mail creative professional is a true artist. This is not airy-fairy artistic

creativity. It was either David Ogilvy or designer David Wilkison who said: "If it doesn't sell, it's not creative."

The success or failure of this art form is precisely measured by response and cost-per-order. No writer-designer in any other field is as much under the gun to produce actual results. This isn't the business of creating warm, fuzzy feelings about a product that is shotgunned out to the millions in the vague hope that a few hundred thousand will remember it when they get to a store. There is no help from a supersalesman at the dealership or some strong in-store or point-of-purchase backup. No sweet-talking rep is going into an outlet to persuade the manager to put the product on the counter for an extra discount.

The direct mail package goes out with no help from anybody (except, one hopes, a canny list broker), and if the replies don't come back, the sender is out of business, and the artist is out on the street with him.

No other graphic art form in the world is as easily accessible . . . as literate . . . as powerful . . . as totally interruptive . . . as demanding of the viewer's time . . . as effective with its message . . . as direct mail—the ultimate *trompe l'oeil!*

The Direct Mail Package

by Malcolm Decker

The direct mail package—especially a full-dress package—is a sales team. First the envelope knocks on the door to see if anyone’s home.

Then the major *letter*—the salesman—takes over. Once the envelope is opened, the letter is the most important member of the team. It sells soft or it sells hard. It spins yarns or it spouts facts. It’s long (but never long-winded) or it’s pithy. However it comes on, it’s loaded with customer benefits . . . Customer Benefits . . . CUSTOMER BENEFITS.

Then the demonstrator—the *folder* or *brochure*—goes to work. Like the letter, it can stand on its own. But it’s most effective when it demonstrates in graphics what the letter can only say in words. It should convince the reader in images that everything the letter said is true.

The *publisher’s letter* (or *lift letter*) is yet another voice backing up the key salesman, the long letter; its job is to convince the waverer and salvage the skeptics. The *order card* restates the offer in the pithiest, most unambiguous language possible. And the *business reply envelope* brings the order home.

When each member of this sales team is performing at his or her best, it’s a formidable force. Let’s look at the individual elements.

The Envelope

An envelope with a white background is hard to beat. But that doesn’t mean you shouldn’t try to beat it, because if your envelope doesn’t get opened, your package doesn’t get read . . . or responded to . . . and we all know what *that* means.

We had great success in a gold stamp offer with a pair of metallic gold wings stretched across the face of the envelope below the caption: “. . . the most brilliant art ever created in gold.” I thought we could do better, so we tested it against a jet black version, same gold wings, same caption in knockout white. It was absolutely stunning!

P.S. White won handily.

Envelope copy can help, but it's got to be a bull's-eye. It shouldn't promise or suggest more than the contents can deliver. The outer envelope sets the stage, or strikes the mood for what is to follow, and the copy and design must be "on target." Otherwise, there is a confusion element which could turn off your prospect.

Remember, your envelope stands between you and orders. More prospects see your envelopes than will *ever* see what's inside them. So make sure your envelope not only carries the message, but also does everything possible to set up the sale.

The Main Letter

The letter itself is the pen-and-ink embodiment of a salesperson who is speaking personally and directly to the prospect on a one-to-one basis. It is the most powerful and persuasive selling force in direct marketing once the product, price, and offer are set. The writer creates the salesman, usually from whole cloth, and you must be certain that this sales representative is truly representative of your product or service as well as of your company. He is likely to be the only "person" your market will ever meet—at least on the front end of the sale—so don't make him highbrow if your market is lowbrow and vice versa. Make sure he speaks your prospect's language. If he's a Tiffany salesman, he writes in one style; if he's a grapefruit or pecan farmer or a beef grower, he writes differently. ('Cause he talks diffrent.) I develop as clear a profile of my prospect as the available research offers and then try to match it up with someone I know and "put him in a chair" across from me. Then I write to him more or less conversationally.

The salesperson in the letter is doing the job he obviously loves and is good at. He knows the product inside and out and is totally confident in and at ease with it and its values and benefits—even its inconsequential shortcomings—and wants to get his prospect in on a good thing. Here is someone with a sense of rhythm, timing, dramatic effect, and possibly even humor—gaining attention . . . piquing curiosity . . . holding interest . . . engaging rationality . . . anticipating and assuaging doubts . . . and ultimately winning the confidence (and the signature on the order) of the prospect.

This personal technique is seen most clearly in long letters. How long should a letter be? The best-known answer to that age-old question is: "As long as it has to be." That doesn't tell you much, but perhaps it suggests two important criteria: economy and—above all—efficiency.

As a sometime angler, I get a better sense of length by remembering a fishing trip to Maine when we used dry flies with barbless hooks. Unless you kept up the tension all the way to the net, you lost the trout. Try it. You should feel the same sort of tension when you write and when you read a letter. If not . . . reel in the slack.

Since the direct mail letter is the most highly personal, intimate form of commercial writing:

- It is *not* a monolithic corporation addressing a computer-generated market profile; it is *not* impersonal in tone, form, or content.
- It is *not* one or more pieces of 8½" × 11" paper with a letterhead on top and a signature on the bottom and the most cherished sales pitch of the VP Marketing sandwiched in between.
- It is *not* set in standard type, is *not* illustrated with photographs, is *not* printed in four-color process, does *not* have a bang-tail or envelope-pocket or other device attached.

A long letter—four pages and especially upward—needs a bit of help, even if you're an expert angler:

- It *can* have an "eyebrow" or "Johnson Box" above the salutation to tease, tantalize, or help the reader preview what's coming in the letter—especially if it's four or more pages.
- It *can* have handwritten notations in the margins, a scrawled P.S. or underlining for emphasis in a second color of the same hue and hand as the signature.
- It *can* be printed on two sides (as long as the stock is opaque). The color, weight, quality, and texture of your letter stock communicate too. Choose them very carefully. They're your salesman's clothes.
- Be sure the right person signs the letter. Recently two investors' newsletters—*Advance Planning Letter* and *Investors World Intelligence Report*—sent out long (12- and 16-page) highly technical promotional letters filled with forecasts and recommendations. The former was signed by Bobbie Bunch, Assistant to the Publisher; the latter was signed by Joan Pendergraft, Executive Assistant to Sid Pulitzer. *Obviously* neither wrote the letter, so believability is out the window.
- Don't overlook the color, size, and vitality of your signature. They're your salesman's handshake. Even people who aren't graphologists pick up a lot from the way a name is signed. It's interesting to compare the signature of Carolyn Davis [*Reader's Digest*] or Carol Wright with that of Salvador Dali or Gloria Vanderbilt. Then ask yourself why the former are so lackluster and the latter are so distinctive.
- The other signature that can work for you is your company name and logotype. Use them to tell your prospect what kind of a company you are: traditional, avant-garde, industrial, financial. Whatever your marketing stance, a good designer can help you express it, and that helps your reader identify you. The objective is individuation—to stand out in the increasingly competitive marketplace of the mailbox—so that when it comes time to toss the me-too mail, yours won't be part of it.
- The letter must be quickly scannable; that is, a reader should get the gist of the proposition simply by reading the (1) eyebrow, (2) lead paragraph, (3) crossheads, (4) wrap-up, (5) P.S. If not, send it back for surgery, because without a strongly integrated skeleton, the body of the argument will slump.
- The letter is easy on the eyes, open, inviting, and varying in its

“texture”—with normal margins . . . individual paragraphs with line space between . . . at least one crosshead or subhead per page (two per page for long letters) . . . occasional variation in paragraph width . . . a quotation, underlined sentence or phrase . . . numbers or bullets to list benefits . . . and/or other bits of “color” to maintain reader interest by promoting visual variety. The longer the letter, the more important these techniques.

The Lift Letter

If your prospect is sitting on the fence, a quick little shove could get him on your side. But be careful—because those already on your side will read it, too. It should be *another* voice, for example, not the person who signed the main letter, but David Ogilvy or Gloria Steinem or Norman Mailer or Madonna speaking very plainly to point up a benefit, reassure a fence-sitter, or disarm a naysayer. It should never introduce anything new; that’s the top salesman’s job.

The Brochure or Circular

The folder or brochure is “show-and-tell time.” It should illustrate what the letter describes. Because it is impersonal, the voice should differ in tone and color from the letter: it is the company—not an individual—talking to the prospect. It shows and demonstrates—it *proves* that everything the very enthusiastic salesman said in the letter is true. Its job is to add visual dimension, and amplify certain points touched on lightly in the letter, thereby gaining further credibility for the offer.

The circular is frequently—but not necessarily—four-color. The pace is much different from that of the driving letter or the greased order card. The reader should be given as much time with this piece as needed or wanted. Although it must be carefully designed to unfold in the way you want to bring your prospect into the offer, he should be able to read every panel or page or spread independent of the others. Think of it as a smorgasbord rather than a seven-course sit-down dinner.

Every panel and spread and broadside of this major illustrated piece has its own particular function. You can’t expect the deadfold to do the same job as the cover. Vitality important as the designer is, the organization of the piece—and the decisions of what panel or spread does what job—is still the primary responsibility of the writer.

I read books and articles and any kind of authoritative materials about my subject I can find until I feel comfortable—or, as Frost said, “easy in my harness.” Then I take some 8½” × 11” bond (web presses all print multiples of this dimension) and make up as many dummies as I need until I finally “see” all the things I want to say in the right space and in the right relationships. I make notes of all the “pictures” and then I start my *letter*. When I’m through, I go back and write the brochure. I haven’t thought about colors or white space or decorative borders or any of the

innumerable things that make a brochure sing, but I do have a sturdy piece of architecture in the form of a thumbnail layout to give the designer—with copy that almost fits. The rest of it comes out of working together with the designer all the way down to the signed press sheet.

The Order Device

We give the order card more time and effort per square inch than any other piece in the package. And it's time well spent. It's the net that secures the trout, so it can't have any holes in it. Write it in conjunction with the people who do your order processing, telephone sales, white mail response, and customer service. Give them the final vote. It must be simple, clear, direct, and—if you can possibly imagine it—foolproof. Use the combined talents of your most clever people to write it, but make sure even a fool can understand it.

The order card should also *sell*. But basically it has a particular job to do: it should reprise the essence of the letter *in the reader's voice*. That is, the writer (salesperson) has had his say, and now the prospect (customer) responds.

The order card should contain absolutely nothing new; it should stand on its own feet and crystallize everything that's gone before it. Its purpose is to speed the action. If you're looking for maximum response, it's better to check off or call toll-free than fill in; better to tear off (no pencil required) than check off.

However, you must decide (by testing) whether the fastest order card in the West gives you the quality customer you require.

If you are offering payment by credit card, never use a business reply *card*. No one wants this highly personal and valuable information to go naked through the mails for strangers to see (and steal). Instead, enclose a reply envelope. An envelope also encourages cash.

Finally, it's important to remember that in direct mail, the *word* is king. Copy is the architect of the sale. Design and art are strongly supportive interior designers that often set up the sale.

Because lookers are shoppers while readers are buyers, if you can firmly engage your prospect—and *keep* him engaged—*through reading*, you're on your way to a sale.

Twenty-six Design Tips to Lift Response

1. *The desktop publishing trap.* If you have a “Mac” (or any other desktop publishing system) don’t fall into the trap of making your letters “prettier.” If you are using a typesetting font (such as Times, or worse, Helvetica)—instead of real typewriter (Courier or Prestige)—you are giving your letters the kiss of death. I can’t stress this point enough. A typewriter-written letter will almost always beat one that’s typeset. It’s true that more people in business are now using prettier typefaces than typewriter, but it’s not the accepted norm. At least not yet. Wait about five to ten years. Until then, give your letters a true typewriter look.

2. *The danger of shouting.* You tend to back away from people who shout at you. Advertising can easily make the mistake that it has to shout in order to be heard. Don’t fall into that trap. Large lettering and lots of color in your direct mail package are perceived as shouting. Some of the best mail comes across like a one-on-one conversation—instead of shouting like a town crier. Try toning your graphics down to a whisper and you’ll find it will bring the listener closer.

3. *Everyone misses this.* Examine ten direct mail packages and you’ll see it in nine of them. It’s the “feeling” that it’s coming from a machine instead of a live human being. There’s a total lack of human involvement. Sure, there’s a letter from a person but the signature is printed. The reader’s name is either a label or computer personalized. It appears as if the only human that ever touched it was the postman. The envelope is full of “printed” things—not things touched by real people. Everything looks too neat . . . too perfect. But if somehow you can give the readers the feeling that the letter was written by a real human, the order

form was filled out by someone in the office, the components were folded and inserted by hand, you stand a greater chance of getting them to pay attention to your mailing, and thus lifting response.

4. *How to bring a dying control package back to life.* It doesn't matter how good our control is, it will eventually suffer fatigue and die. As soon as the recipient sees the envelope a second or third time he will recognize it and tune out. Instead of going for brand new copy and design, the first thing you should do is change the outer envelope. Keep the same teaser copy, but give it a new look. When that starts to wear out, take your entire package and give it a whole new look. You'd be surprised how long a control can be kept alive with simple cosmetic changes. That's because we have a harder time remembering what we have read than what we have seen.

5. *A simple personalization trick.* People cannot resist looking at their name. But be careful. Unless you're running a sweepstakes, don't overdo it. The best two places are the letter and the order form. But it can be costly. If you have to make a choice, personalize the order form. A simple trick that helps lift response is to repeat the person's name—or a part of the address—a second time somewhere on the order form. I guarantee this helps.

6. *A simple overlooked response builder: perceived quantity.* If you get an envelope in the mail with two-inch-high letters saying, "YOU ARE OUR \$1,000,000,000 WINNER," you know there are millions of these in the mail. That makes yours worthless. On the other hand, if you get an envelope in the mail from your best friend, you know there's just one. That makes it valuable and so you read every word of it. Create the illusion of lower quantity of your mailing and your response will go up.

7. *Benefits of jolting the reader.* Sameness puts people to sleep, whereas a jolt keeps them alert. Jolt them by having as many components as economically feasible in your envelope. It's better to break messages into two or three smaller pieces of paper rather than saving money by crowding it all on one. Give each piece a separate theme such as: guarantee, free bonus, early bird bonus, testimonials, etc. In addition, it's important that every component in your envelope looks different—different size, shape, color, typeface, fold, etc. Yes, it can look like a three-ring circus, but it jolts the reader and that increases your response.

8. *An easy way to get the person to read the letter.* As your prospects open the envelope, they want to know what it's all about in as little time as possible. They make a beeline for the order form or brochure. But these two items spill the beans too fast. Instead, when you direct them to your sales letter first, you have a much better chance of getting the response you want. If you have a strong tease on the envelope—in both words and graphics—duplicate it in the identical manner at the top of your letter. Then, make sure that your letter is folded with the message facing out, and inserted so that the message faces toward

the back of the envelope. It should be the first thing they see when they open the envelope. If your envelope teaser copy did what it was supposed to do, your prospect will eagerly want to know more. As they open the envelope and see the same message, they will start there.

9. *Which works best; being homely or cute?* Being cute, clever, or showing off can kill response. A homely, even ugly, appearance will many times beat a flashy look. It appears more sincere. Regardless how good your response is from a flashy mailing, it will have a short life in the mail. The longest controls look very plain. With small changes, you can keep them alive for many years.

10. *When graphics pay for themselves.* Copy is the undisputed king at the creative end of direct mail. The longer you can keep a person *reading*, the higher your response will be. Graphics tend to distract the reader from the words on the page with a “*Hey, look at me*” effect. We all know that a picture is worth a thousand words. But that doesn’t work in direct mail. You get higher response when you use graphics that force people to read rather than distract them. Try toning down the color and visuals—especially around large blocks of text.

11. *The power of the keyhole view.* A lot of people slice open an envelope and view it as looking through a keyhole. They peek inside without removing the contents. Take a look at your mailing this way and you may be surprised what you’ll discover. You may find things that give the sales pitch away too soon, or you may see that some of your powerful items—such as a stamp or burst that says FREE—are hidden from view because of the fold. Simply reposition these things to improve the “keyhole view” and draw more people in.

12. *Purposely hide part of the headline.* It’s important to direct and involve the reader, otherwise you lose him. A simple but powerful involvement and direction technique is to purposely hide part of a headline on a fold line, thus forcing the reader to unfold the piece of paper to see the whole message. Designers hate doing it because it looks off balance, but only by throwing your reader off balance do you get him to move. Believe me, it works.

13. *Get the product into the reader’s hands.* This does not mean giving away an actual sample, but visually getting the product closer to the person. The closer the product seems, the more desirable it becomes. Do this by:

- Making photos and illustrations as large as possible.
- Cropping photos to show the essence. Cut away all the unnecessary material. Leave the part of the photo that still tells the whole story. The reader will automatically fill in the missing part of the product in his mind. This technique saves valuable space and can make unexciting photos appear more dynamic.
- Involving the reader in the picture. Have life-sized hands (that could be his) coming in from the sides of the page.
- Showing the product in actual use, if possible.

14. *Make the reader's eyes go where you want them to go.* His mind will follow. Here are some things that work:

- The eye normally goes from:
 - dark areas to light areas
 - large objects to small
 - bright areas to drab areas
- The eye zeroes in on things that are out of place (color, size, shape and position).
- Have photos and illustrations face the copy or be in the direction you want the reader to go. Every photo has direction.
- The further along in the sales pitch, the smaller the typesize can be. The more interested the reader gets, the easier it is to keep him with you. Therefore, the smaller the type can get. Have your largest type at the beginning for the headlines and lead-in paragraphs.
- Captions and call-outs get high readership.
- If everything looks alike, the reader can make the mistake that he's already seen one of your messages. Make each side of a two-sided piece look different.

15. *Handwritten messages get noticed.* It's an effective way of highlighting special thoughts or teasing a reader into a long letter. But don't overuse them.

16. *Make things move. Don't let anything be static.* This can be dangerous though. At the same time, too much movement on the page—or movement that takes the eye in the wrong direction—can hurt readability.

17. *Break up large areas into smaller visual ones.* These smaller chunks are easier to digest and add noticeability. Large, massive blocks of copy look like a lot of work to the reader. Make it easy for your prospect.

18. *Make different sections look different.* The reader gets bored easily. If he sees something with the same style throughout, it will look like a lot of reading to do—which means work.

19. *Talk the reader's language.* Use colors, typefaces, layouts, and overall appearances the reader can relate to.

20. *Talk the product's language.* Masculine products have to look masculine; female products must look feminine, etc.

21. *Use serif typefaces for body copy.* They're easier to read.

22. *Avoid reverse copy—light letters on a darker background.* It's much harder to read. But there are exceptions. Reverse headings are fine. Use them for body copy only if they are being knocked out of a photo to attain a larger image area and more dramatic effect.

23. *Warm colors get a warm response; cold colors get a cold response.* Use bright warm colors on order cards—red, for example.

24. *Keep things simple.* Make the eye move easily from information to information. Line up as many things as possible. This reduces eye strain and distraction.

25. *Avoid a flat look.* Try to create dimension. It will look less boring. Varying the weights of typefaces helps—light, medium, bold, and extra bold. Use screen tints for panels to hold copy blocks together and add dimension.

26. *Make order cards stand out.* If they are part of a larger sheet and must be torn off, either screen the entire area with a tint and leave the card white, or tint the card and leave the rest of the page white. Always add a heavy broken rule along the part where the tint and blank areas meet.

The Key to Successful Advertising: Interrupt and Keep on Interrupting

Most people do not think of supermarkets in the context of direct marketing. Supermarkets generally promote themselves via newspaper ads and freestanding inserts; the package goods crowd relies on couponing and in-store promotions to move its wares.

However, at your local supermarket may well be a “take-one” literature rack that goes to the heart of all advertising—mail, print, and broadcast.

These racks—supplied and stocked by Supermarket Communications Systems of Norwalk, Connecticut—are placed in more than 7,500 stores in thirty-five states and carry the wonderfully warm, fuzzy title, “Good Neighbor Information Center.”

Good Neighbor Centers are always near the supermarket exit, taking up space that is outside the cash register area, and therefore not usable for merchandise. Along with flyers for magazines and home-study courses are public service pieces from the federal government, recipes from package food manufacturers, and a host of personal announcements offering everything from firewood and house-sitting services to used cars and cameras. It is a true community bulletin board.

The principle of the take-one is simple: most advertising is wasted. A direct mailer might be delirious with a 4 percent response—which means that a staggering 96 percent of the mailings were thrown away.

The supermarket literature rack prequalifies a prospect. Only people who are genuinely interested in that offer will stop with a cart full of groceries and pause to take a flyer from the rack. Instead of mailing out a hundred pieces in the hopes that four will be looked at, only those interested will take the piece, leaving the rest for the next interested person. The system is efficient and ecologically sound. Rodale Press, publisher of *Prevention* and *Organic Gardening* magazines, has been a long-time user of these supermarket take-one racks. According to Rodale’s Larry Hill, the pay-up is not quite as good as direct mail and such subscribers renew at about the same rate as those who came in via package inserts.

Front of the Brain; Back of the Brain

As Sheldon Hearst, president of Supermarket Communications Systems, sees it, people going into a supermarket are thinking, for example, butter, eggs, milk, hamburger, and paper towels. This is what is going on in the front of the brain.

In the back of the brain may be a serious problem at home—a child who is a chronic bedwetter. The child is seven years old and has been given a clean bill of health by batteries of medical specialists and psychiatrists. Yet once or twice a week the child's pajamas and bed are wet in the morning. It is a nagging problem that causes the parents continual distress.

The shopper goes into the supermarket thinking butter, eggs, milk, hamburger, and paper towels . . . plucks the various items off the shelves . . . and goes through the checkout line.

On the way out of the store, the shopper glances up at the Good Neighbor Center and is stopped cold by this take-one flyer.

The headline—so big, so simple, and so directly targeted to her needs—can be seen from across a room. Its power intrudes itself instantly through the front of the brain (butter, eggs, milk, hamburger, and paper towels) and into the back of the brain (seven-year-old bedwetter). The shopper stops in her tracks, then takes one of the brochures, and goes home.

Here is the secret of successful advertising: interrupting what's going on in the front of a prospect's brain with headline and graphics that seize

upon a lurking fear or desire, and exploiting it. It interrupts and keeps on interrupting until action is taken.

Here, the advertiser is the Pacific International Center for Enuresis Control, one of Hearst's longest-term clients.

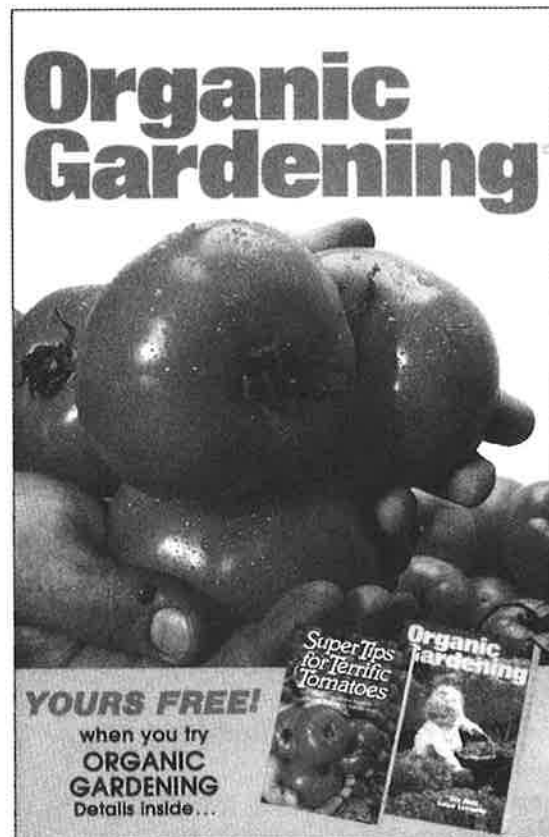
Many first-time advertisers in Hearst's Good Neighbor Centers believe they can get away with using an existing brochure. Not so. A direct mail piece must capture the prospect's attention within three or four seconds, whereas the supermarket take-one has maybe a millisecond to do its job, often at a great distance.

In the case of this piece, the headline—two words, each made up of just three letters of the alphabet, followed by a question mark—dominates everything around it. A sampling of other successful supermarket headlines:

Learn Electronics—Microwave Recipes—Train to Be a Computer Technician—Make Money Preparing Tax Forms!—Home Career Opportunity: Full Time, Part Time—Gain Financial Security—Write Children's Books

Nothing clever here. Nothing cute. No humor. Nothing that you have to stop and think through and figure out. Just bold headlines and promises socked to the prospect in a very few words.

In some cases, a picture will accomplish the same thing. This take-one for *Organic Gardening* magazine shows the hands of a dirt-under-the-fingernails gardener holding three absolutely luscious, red, ripe, organically grown tomatoes shown full size. The photograph is a masterpiece.



Notice the ladybug on the farmer's right thumb. I asked Rodale's Mike Sincavage how they got the ladybug to pose so nicely. "We put him in a deep freeze for a few minutes," Sincavage replied laconically. "That slowed him up a bit."

The piece is printed on coated stock, and the reproduction is spectacular. Along about January, when we've all had it with mealy, pale winter tomatoes, this photograph will jump right out and grab a serious gardener—or gourmet—by the collar.

Again, the message is direct, unclever, and powerful. Interruptive. Knifing through the front of the brain and getting to the back of the brain, where the things people really care about lurk.

Two Nearly Identical Headlines

One a Success, One a bomb

The best example of a winner versus a loser I have ever seen in any medium is the comparison of these two take-ones with nearly identical headlines.

The Rodale offer shows an attractive woman on a scale. The piece is printed in four colors on coated stock and has six powerful promises:

1. LOSE WEIGHT
2. and keep it off!
3. Discover the *fastest* way!
4. FREE BOOK: Reveals the "Secret" of Thinness
5. The No Diet, No Willpower Way to Weight Loss
6. YOURS FREE!

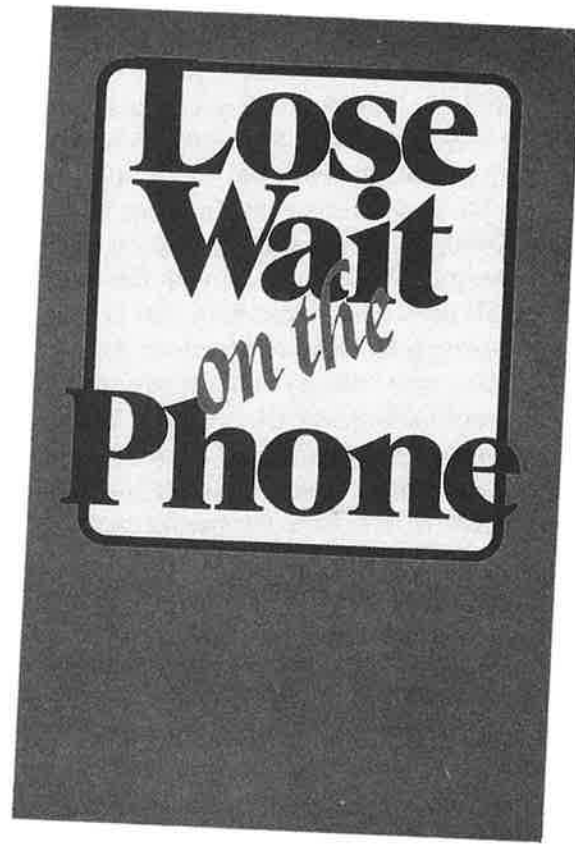
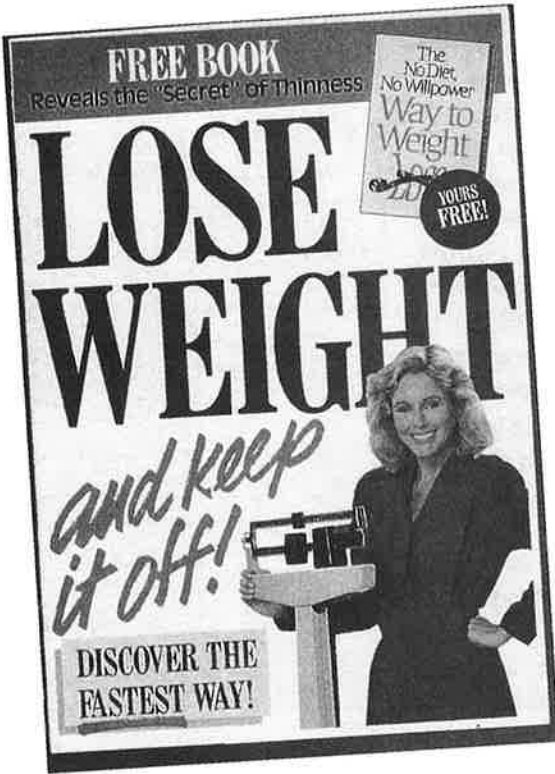
The main promise, "LOSE WEIGHT," is huge, totally out of proportion to the piece itself, and for good reason: it can be seen from ten feet away. Any person whose clothes are too tight or who winced at the most recent reading of the bathroom scale will respond to these promises. This piece was successful for years.

Conversely, this take-one piece from New England Telephone was printed in blue and lavender. The headline makes no sense. In the millisecond a person glances up at the Good Neighbor Center, the benefits of Call Waiting, Call Forwarding, and Speed Dialing are not immediately obvious. This is smarty pants stuff, the work of a copywriter trying to be clever. It was the worst bomb in the history of Sheldon Hearst's company.

"Lose wait on the phone" ranks with the 1991 membership drive for the St. Louis Zoo. The directors were sitting around a conference table trying to come up with a catchy slogan to attract members. "Join the Ark in the Park," one suggested. "Don't say Noah," another added.

"Don't say Noah! Join the Ark in the Park" became the theme for the year. It showed up everywhere from solicitation mailings to T-shirts. It was utter gibberish, and membership took a dive.

People's personal and business lives are hectic. They simply don't have the time to figure out what an imprecise copywriter is driving at.



The Prime Interrupter: The Envelope

Direct mail and the supermarket take-one are very much alike. To be successful, both must be so interruptive that they get read and acted upon.

It's amazing to me the number of direct mail professionals who are interested only in seeing what their immediate competition is up to. The fact is, everything in the mailbox—or in the executive's in-box—competes for attention with everything else. The day's mail is a bunch of noisy salesmen shouting for attention. Personal letters, dividend checks, bills, direct mail pieces, catalogs, favorite magazines, lined interoffice envelopes—all are screaming, "Open me! Open me first!"

Sending out a mailing is a crapshoot. There is no way of knowing in advance what kind of company your package will arrive in. If everything else in the box is dishwasher dull, you might get opened first; if it is surrounded by powerhouses, you have a problem.

Two Theories

Florida freelancer Gary Halbert maintains that all of us, at home or at the office, have two piles of mail: the "A" pile and the "B" pile.

The "A" pile is the important stuff: letters from the kid in college, notes from the IRS, social security check, insurance premium notices,

bills. This is the mail to be dealt with first. Everything else goes in the "B" pile and that can wait.

According to Halbert, if mailers can get their messages into the "A" pile, they will be read. To achieve that, Halbert insists, you must never use a window envelope. Instead, the name and address should be personally typed (or handwritten) on the front of a plain, closed-face (nonwindow) envelope. Always use a stamp (as opposed to a printed indicia). And never put promotional copy on the front of the envelope, because that signals junk mail, something that can be dealt with later.

In the opposite camp is the dean of American copywriters, West Coast freelancer Bill Jayme, who believes that it is wrong to trick a person into putting a promotional mailing into the "A" pile. Yes, it will get read first. But just as soon as the person realizes it is a pitch for a product or service, he or she will become quickly disgusted at the trickery and not only not order, but never want to hear from the mailer again.

"Never disguise the fact that it is advertising mail," Jayme has said. And then, with something less than his usual elegance, he added:

Your outer envelope is where your prospect decides whether to stop, look and listen. It's the come-on—the headline on the ad, the dust jacket on the book, the display window outside the store, the hot pants on the hooker.

According to Jayme, this holds true for the business arena as well. "Any competent secretary can recognize bulk mail. The secret to overcoming the 'secretary barrier' is to create an envelope that looks interesting."

Who's right: Halbert or Jayme?

Of more than 100 mailing packages analyzed for this book—mailings that have proved themselves successful over a period of years—*not one fits the Halbert model.*

Who's right: Halbert or Jayme?

The answer is found in the words of guru Dick Benson, words so often quoted by Malcolm Decker:

There are two rules—and two rules only—in direct marketing. Rule 1: Test everything. Rule 2: See Rule 1.

Double Postcards

One day a man walked into a London agency and asked to see the boss. He had bought a country house and was about to open it as a hotel. Could the agency help him to get customers? He had \$500 to spend. Not surprisingly, the head of the agency turned him over to the office boy, who happened to be the author of this book. I invested his money in penny postcards and mailed them to well-heeled people living in the neighborhood. Six weeks later the hotel opened to a full house. *I had tasted blood.*

The simplest mail format is the postcard. Most people who travel for business or for pleasure pick up local postcards and jot a short greeting to family and colleagues left behind. Other uses of the postcard: announcements or cancellations of meetings, follow-up reminders, recall notices from manufacturers.

Definition

According to the U.S. Postal Service's *Domestic Mail Manual*, a postcard may not be smaller than $3\frac{1}{2}'' \times 5''$ or larger than $4\frac{1}{2}'' \times 6''$.

To qualify for the special low first-class postage rate, one half the double postcard must be a reply device—either with a business reply face (where postage is paid by the person receiving it) or with a return address and the notation in the upper right corner "PLACE STAMP HERE." In the words of the *Domestic Mail Manual*:

The reply half on a double card must be used for reply purposes only. It must be used to convey a message to the original addressee of the double card or to send statements of account.

The reason the USPS gives the double postcard a break in the first-class postage rates is that it wants the reply half to be mailed back. In that way, the Postal Service collects postage twice on the same card.

Triple, quadruple, and larger postcards are mailable, but at the higher third-class rates or at full first-class postage.

Of the seventy-one original Axel Award-winning packages, six (roughly 9 percent) were postcard-size self-mailers. Four were 3½" × 5" double postcards; the fifth was a triple postcard from *Business Week*; the sixth was a 5½" × 8½" double postcard from *Lotus Business Week* (a triple postcard) and *Lotus* (oversized) did not qualify to mail at the first-class double-postcard rate, and so were mailed third class or bulk rate.

Advantages

There are a number of reasons why double postcards are used by savvy direct marketers:

1. *Quick and cheap to produce.*

2. *Benefit of first-class mail.*

Until the recent postage rate increase, the base cost of mailing a double postcard *first class* was 15.0 cents. It was a steal, actually cheaper than basic third-class postage (16.7 cents).

The first-class double postcard gives all the benefits of first-class delivery (speed and address correction at no additional cost, plus perceived importance). The current basic rate of 19.0 cents is still cheaper than the third-class base rate of 19.8 cents; presort discounts can lower the cost of a double postcard to 15.2 cents.

3. *Easy to inventory.*

Since only one piece is involved, you don't have to inventory different elements (letters, circulars, outside envelopes, reply envelopes, order cards, etc.). They are entirely self-contained. When you inventory many different elements, even though you order uniform quantities from the printer, you are invariably left with varying amounts of stock. If a double postcard has proved itself a winner, you can save money by printing large quantities and draw down stocks as needed.

4. *Easy to mail.*

Because only one element is involved, the inserting process is eliminated; they are simply pulled from inventory, laser- or impact-addressed, bagged, and put into the mail stream. Because the format is so simple, you can get the cards into the mail far more quickly—and cheaply—than if you had different pieces printed in different plants, delivered separately to a lettershop, and then put through the complex inserting process.

5. *Easily personalized.*

It's possible to use handwriting fonts to make them seem personalized. In addition, they can be metered or stamped to give an even greater sense of personalization. For example, here are two personalized cards from Club Med to a prospective vacationer—part of a three-effort series. Two direct mail professionals—Shelly and Joan (Throckmorton) Satin—were totally fooled and spent much time trying to figure out who Kim and Richard were!

Dear Sheldon,

Richard's talking marriage! Not sure if it was the Caribbean night on this wonderful ship.

This morning we went snorkeling and windsurfing off the special sports platform on the back of the ship.

Tonight is our last night on board and the Captain's party. Can't wait to show you our pictures. See you soon.

P.S. I've asked them to send you a brochure.

I use the term *personalized* to mean that the person's name and/or address and/or other intimate information appears more than once in the mailing. On double postcards, personalization is necessary; the name and address are printed on the addressing half (so it will reach its destination) and the reply half (so the mailer will know from whom the order came). On typical third-class mail, the name and address are printed on the order card, which shows through a window; the order card—or "turnaround document"—is then sent back in the reply envelope.

6. Takes color well.

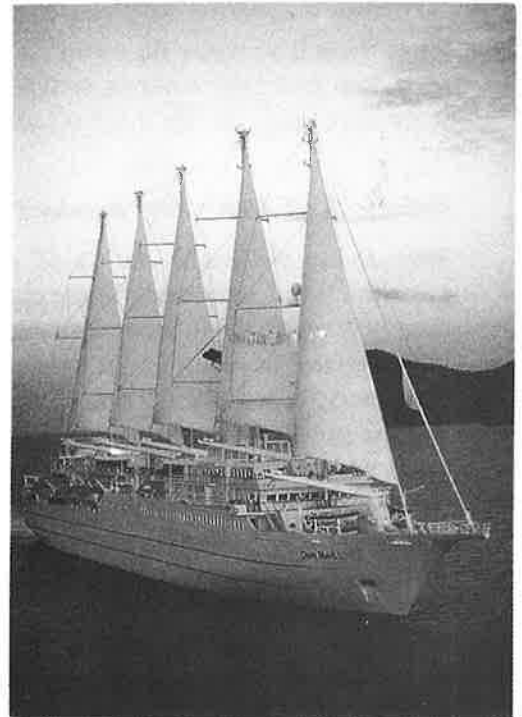
All of these six postcard efforts used four-color process printing on one side. Two (*Architectural Digest* and *Islands*) used coated stock.

Disadvantage

Traditionally, the double postcard brings in a high up-front response and an abysmal conversion (pay-up). It's easy to order the free issue, and many do. But then they fail to pay. Carla Johnson, the capable and outspoken circulation director of *Architectural Digest*, is beginning to find the comp copy offer to be a disaster.

CARLA JOHNSON:

When the comp copy first came into being—and *Architectural Digest* was one of the first to use it—conversions were somewhere around 50 percent. Today that's down to 30 to 40 percent, and declining. The public has gotten spoiled. Now a lot of people respond to offers just to get the comp copy and then cancel. In fact, two database companies have created lists of chronic comp copy cancels. I will be able to run this file against rented lists and use it as a suppress file which means my percent response will probably go down, but pay-up should improve dramatically.



Because it invites tire kickers, the double postcard can be a dicey medium. You can never pronounce a postcard effort a success until you see the net pay-up, which can take six months or more. But the big numbers up front can enable a mailer to net out better than, or equal to, a full-dress package on a cost-per-paid-order basis.

Dealing with Poor Payments

To counter the poor payment syndrome, postcard mailers have to work harder at collecting—get the product and welcoming material into the customers' hands right away . . . put *sell* in each of the billing efforts that rekindle the original excitement.

Four Inviolable Rules

Since there is virtually no room for any in-depth, benefit-oriented sell copy, four inviolable rules must be followed if a double-postcard effort is to be successful. All six Axel winners slavishly adhere to these rules.

Rule 1: A Well-Known Product

Better Homes & Gardens, *TV Guide*, or *Time* could be sold via a double postcard. Why? Everybody in the country has seen one of these publications at least once—in a dentist's waiting room, at the home of a friend, in the library, or wherever. A long sales pitch might help . . . but it isn't really necessary, since the products are household words.

If the product is not well known, at least the subject should be. For example, as I recall, *Vermont* magazine was launched using a double postcard. How much explanatory copy was needed for *Vermont* magazine, especially when its primary market was Vermonters? The only description needed was: "It's all about Vermont; it has pictures; it has color. Try an issue Free!"

The same would be true for *Yachting*, *Boating*, *Wooden Boat*, *Yacht*, but only if they were offered to the *right lists*. This would also be true of *LAN Technology*, *Journal of Accountancy*, *Coin Prices*.

Rule 2: An Irresistible Offer

Three elements must be in place for a direct mail offer to work: (a) product, (b) offer, (c) lists.

If any of these three elements is askew, the mailing will fail, no matter how great the copy, how brilliant the design.

As is instantly apparent, all these double-postcard mailings are for products that are household names. The products are fixed.

The circulation directors know what lists have worked in the past and what new lists are worth testing.

This leaves the offer.

This is a montage of the reply devices of the six postcards. Notice that every one screams "free."

All six double postcards offer at least one free issue; some offer several. In addition, *Architectural Digest*, *Lotus*, and *Yankee* offer free premiums (books) with order.

Inc. offers a book with order . . . *plus* a tote bag and an executive pen and pencil set when payment is received.

Business Week's deal: a solar calculator on payment.

Only *Islands* fails to offer a premium.

Rule 3: Easy to Order

A basic rule of direct marketing: Make it as easy as possible to order.

And double postcards do just that. All that's required is to tear the card in half and drop the reply portion in the mail.

However, careful study of the six postcard efforts shows that the creators have *not made it TOO EASY to order*.

For example, at the bottom of the montage is the reply half of Judy Weiss's double postcard for *Architectural Digest*.

Notice the line of copy at bottom left of this panel:

"To validate order, initial here _____."

It is important to note that all three postcards designed by Judy Weiss (*Architectural Digest*, *Inc.*, and *Business Week*) require the order to be validated, either by initialing where indicated, or, in the case of *Business Week* and *Inc.*, by checking the "yes" box.

There are two reasons:

1. Asking someone to check a box or initial a line (as opposed to simply tearing off the card and dropping it into the mail) may depress response slightly, but those who do order may be better qualified; if so, chances for conversion (payment) are better.

2. Since these postcards have been successful for so many continuous years, these offers have been *tested*.

Asking for Additional Information

The more information you can learn about your customer or subscriber, the better you can serve that person. As more and more information about purchases or renewals begins to accumulate in the so-called database, a profile of that customer emerges. Not only can you send out more targeted—and therefore more potentially profitable—offers, but you can also charge more for your list rental.

For example, on the reply card of the *Business Week* triple postcard, there is space to write in the name of the subscriber's company as well as a brief description of the product or service; the magazine also wants to know if the magazine is to be sent to a business or residence. With this information, McGraw-Hill (parent of *Business Week*) can offer various "selects" to marketers who want to rent its lists (for example, executives at home or executives in manufacturing companies at home). McGraw-Hill charges and additional \$10 per thousand for such selects—tidy business for a quick additional stroke on a computer keyboard.

A Possible Glitch

In the December 1988 *Who's Mailing What!* we reported that a number of our subscribers suddenly began receiving unordered issues of *Magazine Week* and being billed for them.

According to publisher Don Nicholas, the double-postcard printer had scored the perforations too deeply and the reply cards separated in the mail. The addressing half went to the prospects while the Business Reply Cards came back to the publisher.

Even though there were five questions on the order card, subscriptions were entered in the names of all the cards that came back, whether or not the answer boxes were blank or checked.

The reason, according to publisher Nicholas: "We didn't want to delay sending the magazine to those people who really wanted it; so we filled all the orders that came back to us and figured it would all shake out in the end."

What shook out was a lot of ill will.

So there is a good reason to ask for some kind of validation, and if the reply half of a double postcard comes back blank, it could well pay to call and confirm the order.

Rule 4: Bill-Me Payment Option

All six double postcards offer a "bill-me" option. None gives a cash or credit card option.

The reason: Asking for a credit card number on a reply *card* means that the number is hanging out naked for all to see; not only does this invite credit card theft and fraud; it can depress response. When asking for cash or credit card payment, *always* ensure privacy by using a format that forces the respondent to use a reply envelope, either one that you supply or his own.

Fancy Labels

If you look at the label areas where the name and address appear, you will notice that four of the six cards (67 percent) have precisely delineated lines and spaces where the name and address should go. They even say: "Name . . . Address . . . City . . . State . . . Zip."

These are called "fancy labels." This fancy label technique has been shown to increase response, and should probably be tested.

The fancy label can be ordered two ways: imprinted on Cheshire computer forms (which are then addressed, cut apart on labeling machines, and affixed to the outside envelope) or printed on the card or envelope, whereupon the name and address are lasered directly on the face.

Variation of the Traditional Package

When all the old direct marketing rules dictate that long letters work better than short letters, that mailings without letters don't work, and that self-mailers don't work, how is it possible that the double-postcard format can be successful?

Direct mail has always relied heavily on the well-crafted letter, the personal communication that makes this medium what Stan Rapp has dubbed "intimate advertising."

In actuality, the double postcard should be looked upon as a miniaturized version of the standard direct mail package, traditionally made up of an outside envelope, letter, circular, order card, and reply envelope.

All of these elements are found in the double postcard, only combined or sharply truncated.

Here is the *Architectural Digest* double postcard opened full and shown front and back. Notice that the bottom panel of the front does double duty.

With the address and indicia, the bottom panel serves as the envelope or carrier through the mail.

It also contains an ever so brief personalized letter.

Although unsigned, it is a little note with a personalized salutation stating the offer in a conversational way.

The top panel is the order device, to be initialed, torn off, and dropped into the nearest mailbox.

Thus, these two panels contain three of the five elements of a standard package: carrier, mini-letter, and reply device.

On the reverse are the two other standard elements of a direct mail effort.

The bottom panel—which backs up to the addressing piece/letter—is the mini-circular. In Chapter 4, "The Direct Mail Package," Malcolm Decker calls the brochure or circular "the demonstrator," that member of the sales team who holds up the product and points out that everything the main salesperson (the letter) says is really true. This mini-circular shows and describes the product and premium in full color.

The top panel, backing on the order device, is the requisite business reply card.

So, contained in this simple four-panel format are the five basic elements of a traditional direct mail package.

Possible Price Point

In these six efforts, the highest price is \$24.95. This indicates that in circulation mailings, \$25.00 might represent a tested price point in the double-postcard format.

Inc., Architectural Digest, and Business Week

Of the original sixty-six Axel Award long-term control mailings, freelancer Judy Weiss was responsible for four of them, more than any other writer. With one of the most inventive and marketing-savvy minds in the business, Weiss is in her ninth year as a freelancer. Previously she was creative supervisor at Grey Direct and spent four years on the staff at Time Inc. Her clients include Condé Nast, Time Warner, Hearst Magazines, *Business Week*, *Forbes*, Fairchild Publications, Consumers Union, and Hachette. She works only for magazines—new-subscriber efforts as well as renewal series, and consulting.

JUDY WEISS:

I don't have any standardized approach to creating a double postcard. I create a double postcard as meticulously as I do a letter. I choose every word precisely, and I am very harsh on myself. I don't care whether it's a double postcard or a letter or anything else, I work until I get it right. What I think pushes my double postcards over the edge is my absolute insistence on getting the strategy, the tone, the rhythm, and every single word right. The less copy there is on the piece, the more important each word is. This holds true for double postcards and for order forms.

Of the six postcard efforts, only one fails to show a picture of the product. Instead of a cover of *Islands* magazine, Houston freelancer Ken Schneider opted for a beauty shot of a deserted beach on an idyllic tropical island.

One small point: whereas Judy Weiss forces the respondent to check the yes box, Ken Schneider uses a preprinted checkmark.

Ken Schneider started freelancing in 1981. He began his career writing newspaper ads for the men's and boys' departments of Foleys in Houston and went on to work for McCann-Erickson, Houston; Weekly & Penny, Houston; Ogilvy & Mather, Houston; and The Richards Group, Dallas. His freelance clients have included *American Heritage*, *Art & Auction*, *Bon Appétit*, *Consumer Reports*, *European Travel & Life*, *Travel & Leisure*, *Lotus*, *PC World*, *Sail*, *Ski*, *Newsweek*, *Time*, *U.S. News & World Report*, *Southern Banker*, *Elle*, *Mirabella*, *Esquire*, Time-Life Books, and the *San Francisco Examiner*.

KEN SCHNEIDER:

I think my background . . . as a copywriter in a variety of ad agencies—working on a variety of clients—gave me an extremely strong foundation for working in direct mail as a freelancer. Here's why.

To me, each direct mail package is like a mini ad campaign, combining the disciplines of print, TV, even radio, and a bit of outdoors. The print part is obvious; it's the letter and the brochure copy. The TV aspect is the visual power of the outer envelope and brochure. The radio comes into play in the rhythm of the letter copy, and the images it conjures up in the reader's mind. And many times, the outer acts almost like an outdoor board in quickly grabbing attention in a clever way—with few words.

All put together, it becomes a very calculated piece of marketing that draws on everything I've learned about what motivates people to act.

*The double postcard is, though, a bit of a different animal. And frankly, I don't much like using them. Long-time winners like *Islands* are more the exception than the rule, I'd wager, even though many of the Axel winners were double postcards. Go figure. We tested two versions: only the four-color back panel changed.*

*One version had lots of copy and showed two covers. The other, the winner, featured a color photo of a remote island beach, with very little copy. It was the double-postcard concept doing what postcards normally do so well—evoke a sense of place and escape, perfect for a magazine like *Islands*.*

Of the six postcards, one was written by committee. Sometime in 1985 the folks at *Yankee* became aware of other publications using the (then) new double-postcard format. According to circulation director Mariann Moery (now at *Inc.*), a test panel was scheduled but there was no package to fill it. The circulation department decided that a double postcard really ought to be tested. So the staff analyzed several double postcards from other publications that were state-of-the-art at the time and "stole smart." The staff threw it together, and turned it over to designer Bob Johnson. Collectively they produced an effort that was unbeatable until 1990.

Consumer vs. Business-to-Business Efforts

With the exception of John Klingel's *Lotus* double postcard, notice how closely these efforts resemble one another. All scream FREE (either free issue or free premium or both); all have the mini-letter on the front and the mini-circular on the back; all are printed in four-color and, with the exception of *Islands*, show one or more covers of the magazines.

Direct marketers tend mentally to split the business into two halves: mailings to consumers and mailings to businesses.

But two of these double postcards (*Islands* and *Yankee*) are strictly consumer efforts; two are targeted to businesses (*Business Week* and *Inc.*); and two are aimed at both consumers and businesses (*Architectural Digest* goes to interior decorators, and *Lotus* is a magazine for people who use the Lotus spreadsheet program on either their home or their office PC).

The fact that these postcard efforts and have been working successfully for years indicates something very important:

People in the workplace are really consumers sitting behind desks in an environment different from their homes. They are *people*, and people respond to the same blandishments whether they are at home or at work.

Many direct marketers seem to think that because mail is going to a business, they have not only the right, but the duty, to be dull. This is absolute nonsense. In the workplace direct mail has to be all the more inventive, because it has to get past the mail room, the secretary in the outer office (who probably screens the mail), and the intended prospect (who may well be extremely busy and therefore will respond only to powerhouse efforts).

What is interesting to a consumer at home can be just as interesting to a person at the office.

Recent Events

Several of these winning double postcards have been displaced as controls. For example, the staff-written *Yankee* winner has been unhorsed by a newer version, this one with a token sticker as the action device. For a long time the sticker or token had been outlawed on double postcards, but is now legal.

A snapform is a kind of self-mailer that contains a series of elements that are preassembled and enclosed in a sealed carrier. Some snapforms are designed to be addressed with a high-impact printer that bangs the front of the piece hard; inside are carbon or NCR papers which cause the outside form and other pieces. This *Business Week* snapform, printed by UARCO, has computer-generated addresses on the outside and within and includes a 4-color flyer illustrating the magazine and the premiums plus a business reply envelope.

According to circulation director Kathleen Gallagher, this new effort is "incredibly cheap . . . and is responsible for a big leap in cash with order." Remember, there can be no cash with order option on a postcard effort because (1) there is no business reply envelope, (2) asking for a credit card account number on the back of a business reply *card* is dangerous, inviting fraud and depressing response.

Super-Elaborate Personalization

In Chapter 20 you will find details on the use of personalized cartoons in direct mail by the premier practitioner of this technique, Stu Heinecke, head of a West Coast agency that bears his name, in a joint venture with WX Wordtronics.

Two mailers using personalized cartoons on traditional envelope efforts are *Advertising Age* and *Sales & Marketing Management* magazine.

The *Ad Age* package, which has been in the mail for three consecutive years, is described in Chapter 20.

Sales & Marketing Management recently tested a triple postcard with a personalized cartoon. The premium: a "gallery print" suitable for framing with payment. As an incentive to order quickly, the first 200 subscribers would receive their personalized gallery print signed by the cartoonist.

This is the first time we have seen quite such elaborate computer work on a postcard format.

Notice, too, that the cost of *Sales & Marketing Management* is \$38 for 15 issues (including 3 additional bonus issues "worth \$195"). This price is considerably higher than the highest-priced Million-Dollar Mailing on a double postcard described above (*Business Week*, 32 for \$24.95 including a premium).

It may well be that, after testing, the mailers of these six long-term controls discovered that \$25 was a price point for this format; if so, *Sales & Marketing Management* might well be wise to test a short-term offer (say, 9 for \$24.95) and track both pay-up and lifetime value of the subscriber.

This triple postcard is printed in 2-color; all of the others described in this Special Report have at least one side printed in 4-color.

The cartoon on the right raised response by 5 percent. The order device of this double postcard—as with the new *Yankee* control—has a "YES" token that is peeled off from the right and affixed to the box at left.

For some time, *COMPUTERWORLD* magazine has been using a double postcard with a personalized cartoon. Unlike *Ad Age* and *Sales & Marketing Management*, which use Stu Heinecke or his stable of well-known cartoon artists (some are published in the *New Yorker*), *COMPUTERWORLD* uses Rich Tennant, the magazine's regular cartoonist. According to circulation director Carol Spach, different cartoons are always being tested.

The double postcards from *Sales & Marketing Management* and *COMPUTERWORLD* both adhered to the rules: household word . . . irresistible offer (free issues plus premiums) . . . easy to order . . . and bill-me option. *Sales & Marketing Management* offered a cash option (as did *Ad Age* in its envelope mailing) so that an eager subscriber could receive the personalized gallery print right away. However, with a postcard effort, this requires the prospect to (1) write a check, (2) find and address an envelope, and (3) supply postage.



Use of Sweepstakes on Double Postcards

Because of the limited size of a double postcard, sweepstakes are difficult to incorporate. Every sweepstakes effort has a space-eating set of rules, plus there must be a description of the sweeps prizes. All this leaves virtually no room to talk about the product. American Express Publishing used sweeps cards briefly but then got out of the double-postcard business altogether.

The Next Step: The Mini-Package

Conventional wisdom and years of testing dictate that the letter is the key selling piece in a direct mail package. Malcolm Decker calls it the main salesman.

In her book *Winning Direct Response Advertising: How to Recognize It, Evaluate It, Inspire It, Create It*, Joan Throckmorton describes the letter as being the “center or heart of the direct mail package.”

In *The Greatest Direct Mail Sales Letters of All Time*, Dick Hodgson states categorically: “Of all the formats used in direct mail, none has more power to generate action than the letter.”

It was the legendary John Caples who said, “Long copy pulls better than short copy.” And this is echoed by Walter Weintz in *The Solid Gold Mail Box*:

... a 4-page letter will generally pull twice as many orders as a one-page letter, provided the copywriter has something to say, and says it with some skill. This isn't just an opinion: it has been proved over and over, by tests—where a skeptical client has prepared a one-page letter, in finest prose, and tested it against a long-winded 4-pager.

Bob Stone, in *Successful Direct Marketing Methods*, also urges direct mailers not to be afraid of long letters: “. . . the longer you hold a prospect's interest, the more sales points you can get across and the more likely you are to win an order.”

Flying in the face of all this accumulated wisdom and testing are the mini-packages—small, punchy little efforts that are no more than double postcards in envelopes.

Like the double postcard, there is not much room for selling copy or design, so three of the four inviolable rules apply: (1) household name; (2) fabulous offer; (3) easy to order.

Rule 4, no bill-me or credit card option, can be skipped.

The great advantage these mini-packages have over a double postcard is the inclusion of a business reply envelope; it allows for cash with order

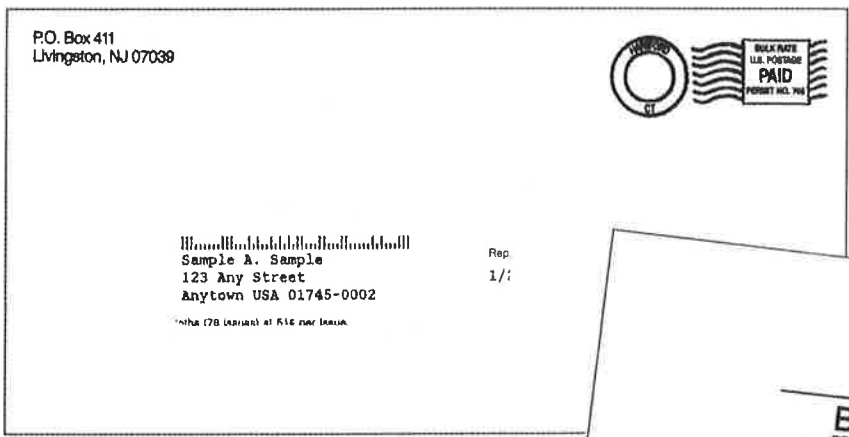
and gives the privacy needed for the credit card option. Remember, the double postcard cannot ask for a credit card order because such highly confidential information on the back of a postcard could be seen and stolen anywhere along the mail stream. Requesting a credit card order on a double postcard invites fraud, and very probably would depress response.

Newsweek

One mini-package that has beaten back controls for years is *Newsweek's* "FREE GIFT/SAVINGS VOUCHER" that was first mailed in 1988 and, as of this writing, is still going strong.

Created in-house and designed by Pierre Volmene, the package has just four elements: plain white 4" x 8" window envelope with red printed indicia and blue return address; the personalized voucher with four-color photographs of the three premiums on the detachable lower portion; four-color premium brochure; and business reply envelope. Unlike the double postcards, this effort does not have a mini-letter.

It screams "FREE GIFT" and emphasizes big, big savings. Everybody in America knows the product; what new can be said about the wonders of *Newsweek*? In this case, the offer is everything.

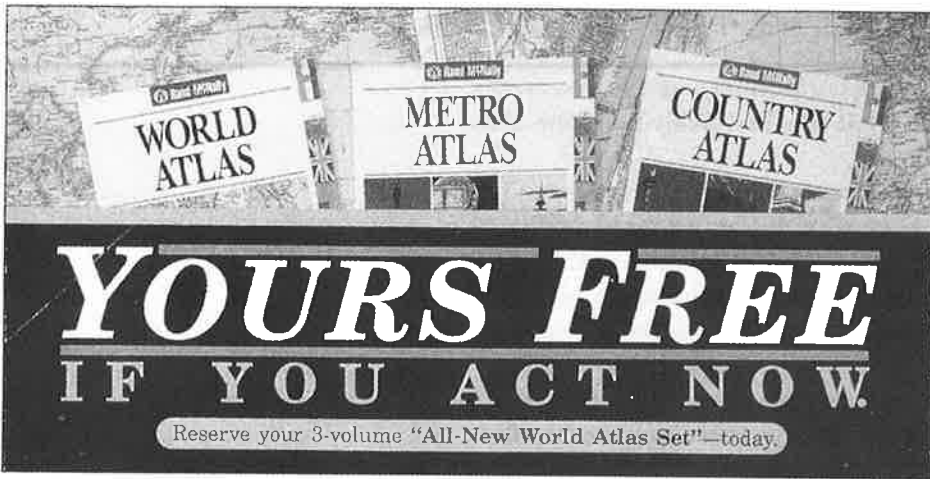

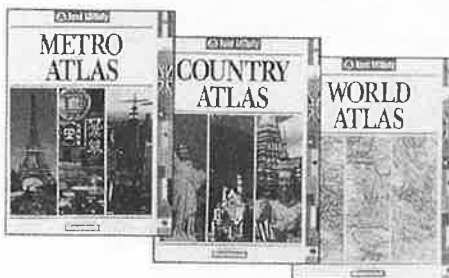

This bright, powerful mini-circular from *Newsweek* is the first example of first-class design of a brochure. It shouts "YOURS FREE if you act now." Notice how the fold of the panel interruptively cuts right across the covers of the three premium books. You are impelled to fold down the flap so you can see the complete covers. It is untidy. Neatness rejects involvement. This mini-circular is involving.

Later on, in full-dress mailings, you will see marvelous circular design where the piece starts small and then unfolds . . . and unfolds . . . and unfolds . . . until you are hit with an explosion of color and copy and promises, an explosion that dominates everything around it.

Newsweek's circulation director, Jane Keiffer:

We have tested it against many new packages and formats, along with a variety of design, copy, and offer variations on the package itself.

It is almost impossible to throw the package away unopened because it looks from the outside as if it contains a check. (The outer envelope is blind and the order form, which shows through the outer envelope, has a checklike background.)

Once inside the package, the offer presentation is simple and clear. It promotes the savings off the cover price and the free gift (a low-cost set of booklets on an editorially related subject). There is no editorial sell or mention of product benefits. The package does not include a sales letter. In addition to the order form, there is a BRE and a small premium brochure.

You remarked that our package is a "cut above a double postcard," or double postcard with BRE. We tried for several seasons to get a double postcard to work. In the one instance where a double postcard lifted response, the absence of a BRE appeared to have a tremendous negative impact on overall pay-up.

Outside

Another mini-package that was first mailed in 1985 and is still successfully bringing in orders seven years later is the control for *Outside* magazine.

Like *Newsweek*, there are just four elements:

1. Small, 4" x 7 1/2" white window envelope with printed indicia. Unlike that of *Newsweek*, the cornercard announces the name of the magazine, and there is discreet promotional copy at lower left ("R.S.V.P. Free gift from OUTSIDE . . . details inside!")
2. Personalized "Discount Order Form." To order, you punch out one of two red dots that indicate payment preference.
3. Four-color premium slip. On one side is a picture of the free pocketknife that will be sent on receipt of payment; the reverse shows three issues of the magazine with some selling copy.
4. Business reply envelope.

As with the *Newsweek* effort, and the *Business Week* snapform that knocked off Judy Weiss's triple postcard, the inclusion of a business reply envelope encourages cash with order.

Notice, though, that *Newsweek* offers premium with order; the only way you can get the free knife from *Outside* is when you have sent payment.

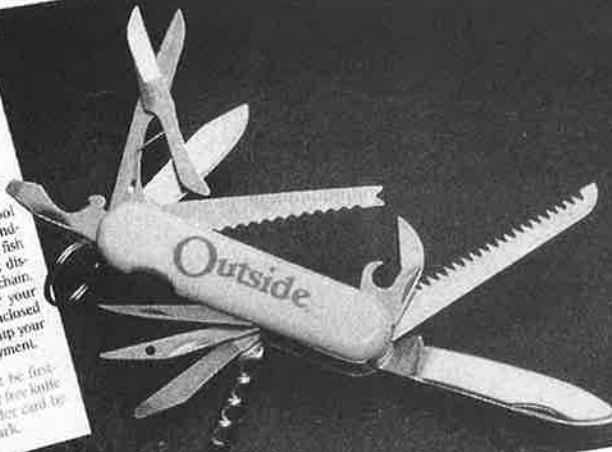

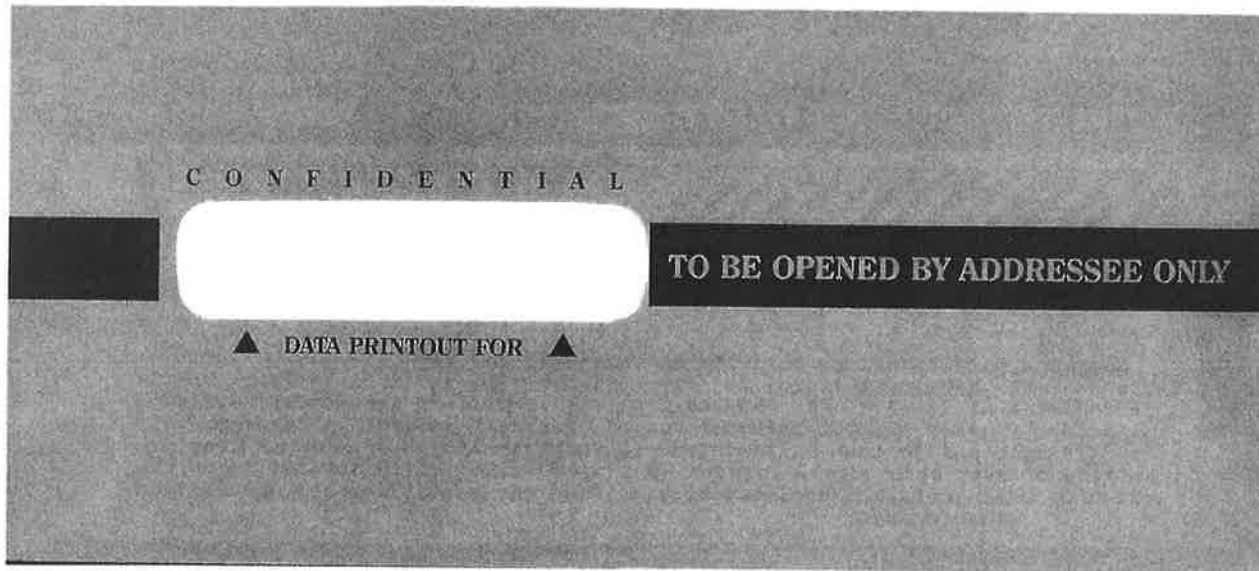

Can these mini-packages be mailed with success into the work environment? Of course. We saw the *Business Week* and *Inc.* double postcards, from which the mini-mailing is one step up.

For a number of years my library received this long-term control for *Advertising Age*. It was rested for a year and then mailed extensively beginning in February 1992.



A mini-package mailed to the executive at the office, it consists of just three elements: a #10 kraft envelope, a business reply envelope, and a two-piece, official-looking "Qualification Notice" with a half-piece of carbon paper inside that allows for the prospect's name and address to be printed on the order form inside.

Then in 1989 my library started receiving a virtually identical effort on behalf of *Fortune*.

Both were created by Bill Christensen of Financial Direct, Inc., now in his ninth year on his own as a full-service direct mail agency. Among his other clients: Electronic Media Magazine, Security National Bank, Signet Bank, Banner Life, Continental American Life, National Home, and Blue Cross & Blue Shield of Massachusetts and of Maryland.

BILL CHRISTENSEN:

Let's start with the Ad Age version.

Ad Age, by its nature, is attractive to a very limited and select readership. I got to thinking that most of the people Ad Age mails to throughout the year are very familiar with the publication in a hands-on way. They already know the style, editorial content, benefits of readership . . . they just aren't subscribers!

This led me to think that I didn't need to sell the magazine to these folks—what I needed to do was make an offer for them to buy the magazine. You'll notice that the package does not discuss the product. Instead, it delivers a kind of psychological hook—an ego-stroking reason for tendering this very private offer . . . and it just keeps reinforcing the validity of that style of offer as related to pricing, privacy, selectivity of recipient, etc.

Again, details, comprehensive oversight, and follow-through are very important to this package. The selling style that starts on the OSE carries through each ply of the form and even includes the "safety screen" on the back of the second ply. But it doesn't stop there—it continues to the BRE with the bar-coded "PRIVATE OFFER APPROVAL CODE" in the upper left.

In fact, you'll see that even the person who signs the letter has a name and title that reinforce the validity of the offer and offer style. The letter begins: "The editor-in-chief has requested an offering of Advertising Age to a select group of industry professionals." And then it's signed by "Thomas St. Charles, Director, Special Markets." Remember what I kept saying in my first letter to you: DETAILS, DETAILS, DETAILS!

One more thing: the offer is really only one paragraph long and is finished by the time the reader gets to the end of ply one. That ply ends very intentionally with the capitalized words "SEND NO MONEY."

To ensure the execution of those details I purchase and manage the production of the package myself . . . too often little things that mean a lot can slip through the cracks during production. I don't like that . . . so I oversee and buy a lot of production for my clients (I do the production on the Mug package as well).

Anyway, the approach worked very well . . . when this simple package first mailed it even outperformed the numbers on the highly successful "Award Mug" package.

Bill Christensen on the *Fortune* package:

I was sitting in my office flipping through a copy of Fortune when it struck me that the same approach would work for Fortune. Again, people who are regularly solicited for subscriptions are very familiar with the magazine and the benefits of readership.

I met with Ken Godshall and Hala Makowska at Fortune (Hala has since been hired away by the folks at Forbes as circulation director for American Heritage)—and they both agreed with the validity of the approach. By the way, I spoke with Hala while writing this—and she said that they saw the

package as providing a potential threefold opportunity to (1) take advantage of their highly targeted list selections; (2) reduce package costs; and (3) get away from expensive premium offers.

It worked. The package moved into the control slot . . . package costs were reduced by 50 percent . . . and for the first time in a long, long time Fortune had a control that successfully eliminated the costly premiums.

One further note on the similarities of the *Ad Age* and *Fortune* packages by Bill Christensen. They are virtually identical. Christensen saw the success of *Ad Age* and, with *Ad Age*'s Dave Kelley, who saw no conflict of interests, sold the concept to *Fortune*. Christensen "stole smart"—from himself—to the great benefit of *Fortune* and no detriment to *Ad Age*.

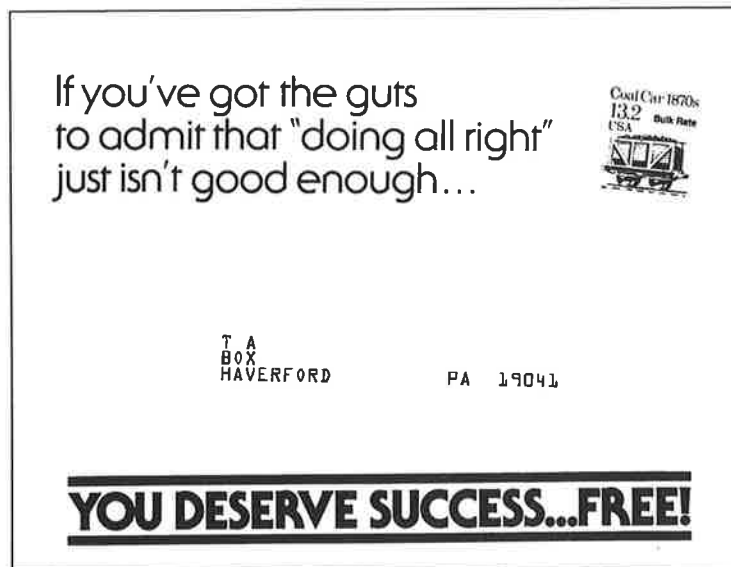

Success

Ken Scheck's 1983 mailing for *Success*, which he did for the Clark Direct Marketing agency, started off as a conventional 6" × 9" package. Clark and *Success* decided that it was too expensive to mail and should be cut down to very small size. The original version was a Kurt H. Volk personalized LetterLope with a closed-face (windowless) envelope and a personal salutation on the letter. At some point the mailing was tested with no personalization—just a Cheshire label slapped on the order form and showing through a window in the envelope—and it worked. There was just no good reason to spend the extra money on a closed-face envelope and a personalized salutation.

Success is a magazine that can be mailed to the workplace or to business people at home. Logic dictates that mailings going to offices should be number 10 or larger simply because a tiny mailing on a messy desk can get lost. But there are cases where logic loses: with the *Inc.* and *Business Week* double postcards . . . a tiny mailing from *Official Meeting Facilities Guide* (containing a tiny red pencil so you don't have to reach for a pen to fill out the order form) . . . the American Management Association personalized invitation (see Chapter 17, "Lead Generators") . . . and this demure 4½" × 6" mini-mailing from *Success*. And you can't argue with *Success*; nine-year controls don't happen often!

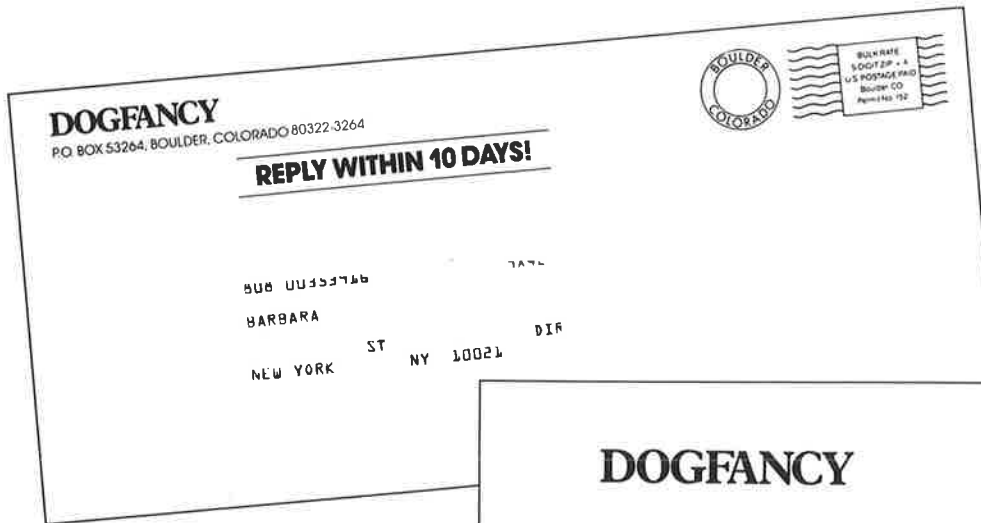

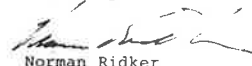

It's a relatively hard offer: no free issue, no premium, no trial, and a minimum term of twenty-four months. The only two concessions to making the customer feel wanted: a bill-me option and 60 percent off the newsstand rate.

How can *Dog Fancy* get away with so hard an offer in an environment of free magazines being given away so profligately? Quite simply, going to the right lists and being the only game in town.

Penny Stewart wrote the package and is circulation director of *Dog Fancy*:

We found the success of this package relied on several factors. First, we had relatively few competitors in the field; second, we enjoyed a reputation for quality and service with the publication; and third, this most basic of direct mail packages was still able to tell our story to dog lovers and give them the best introductory rate besides.

We publish many other special-interest magazines, eight of which are also in the pet field. The formula used for Dog Fancy direct mail has also been used for years for these other publications. (As a matter of fact, our Cat Fancy mailing is older than Dog Fancy's.)

We are not resting on our laurels, however. We have some tests in the works to see if we can further improve our response. But more important than revising our package is tracking down more targeted lists for these mailings. I believe this is true for all special-interest markets and it is a constant challenge.

Harper's

Of the seventy-one Grand Controls, the *Harper's* effort is one of just two that use a closed-face personalized envelope with a personalized letter and personalized order form.

This inventive effort for *Harper's* was written and designed by Nancy Grady, whose husband is Pete Gelb, creator of the *Audubon* Grand Control, in Chapter 11.

NANCY GRADY:

No one needs to be sold on this 142-year-old magazine's distinguished literary tradition. The challenge for this package was to convince prospects that now Harper's is also provocative, unconventional, and surprisingly fun to read.

The intriguing editorial teasers right on the outer envelope whet the reader's appetite for more inside. The tone of the package is reinforced by the straightforward, low-key design and the upscale look of the closed-face format.

When I originally presented the idea of a closed-face format, the circulation director was all for it. But the publisher suspected direct mail gimmickry. Why a personalized format? It was tough getting him to accept "It just feels like the right way to go." He seemed to want a formula such as "x dollars spent on computerization will increase your response rate by y percent." If formulas like that existed, publishers could write their own controls. A lot of what we get paid for is our gut reactions that tell us when something is right and when it isn't.

Here's an interesting footnote. Even with terrific results, the publisher was still convinced that gimmickry had won out. He insisted on back-testing his beloved old control in a personalized format. The personalized format actually depressed response on the old control.

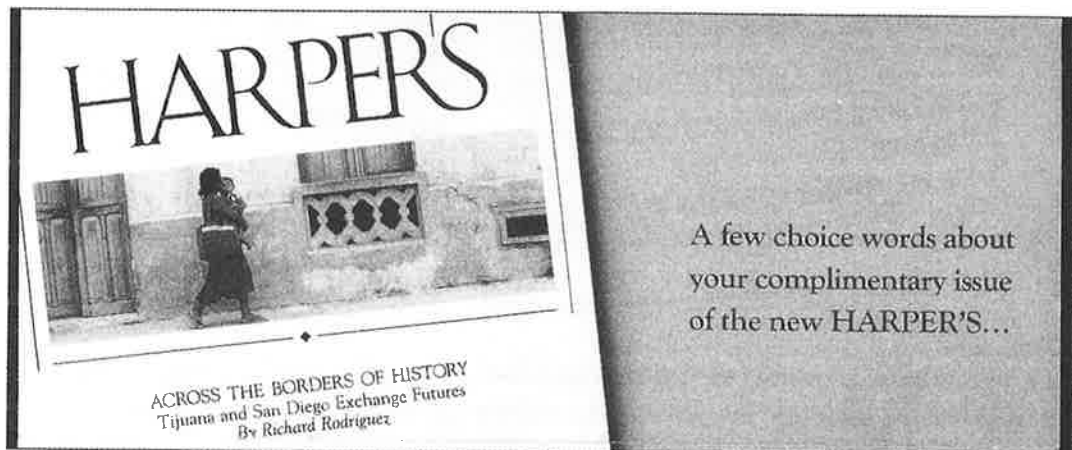

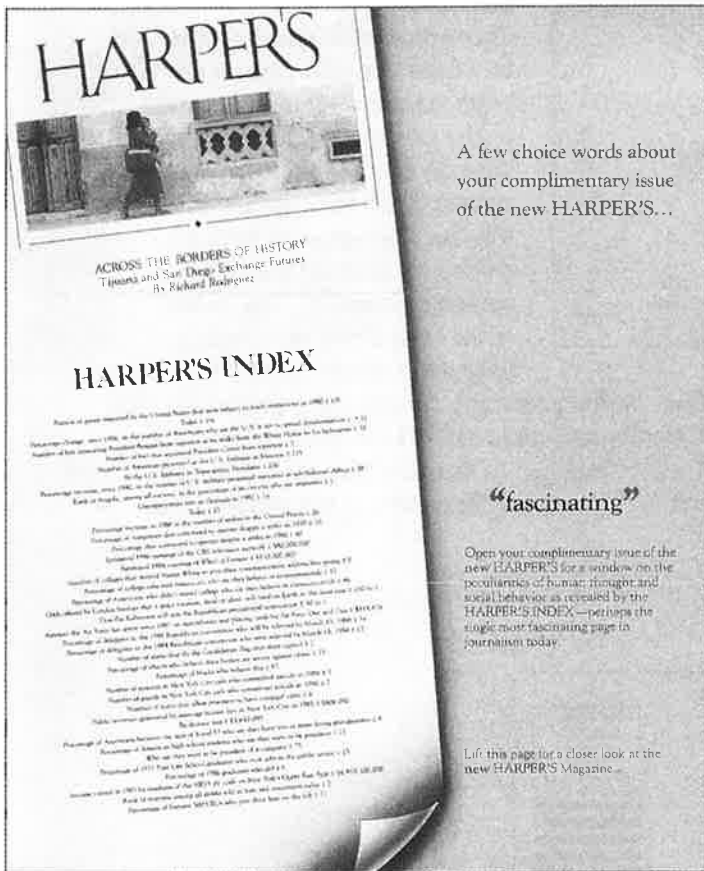

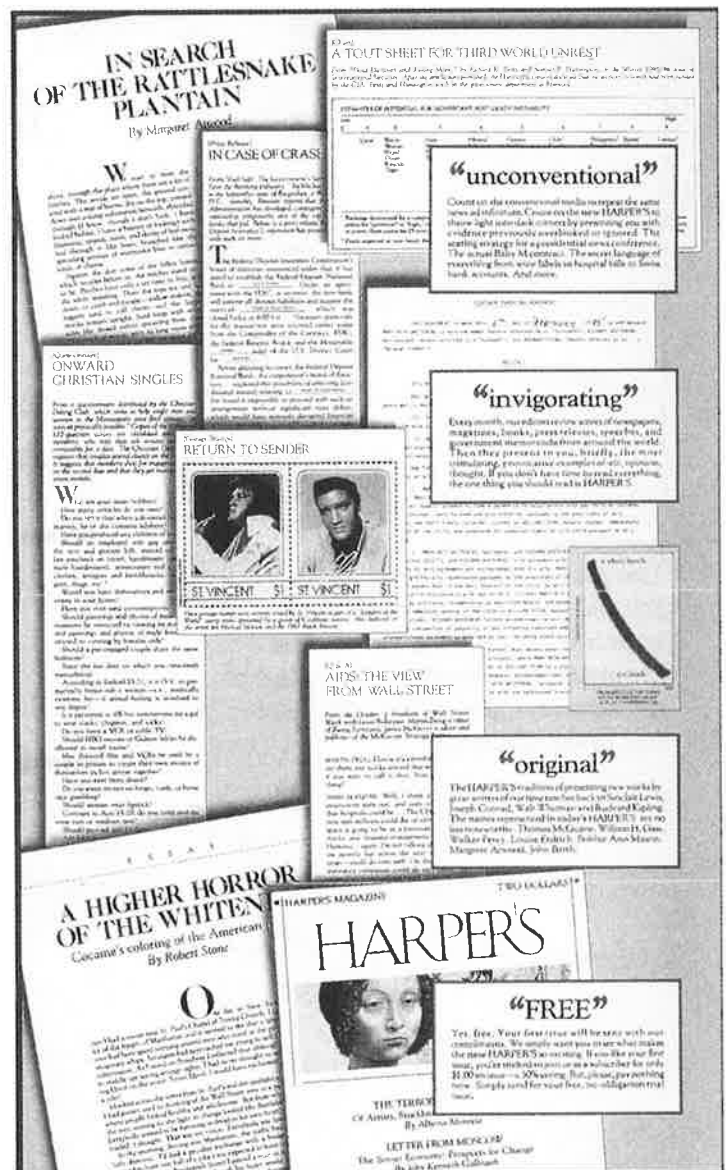

The entire back panel of the brochure is given over to an order coupon—this in addition to the personalized order form. Why an extra coupon? If the personalized form is missing, or if it has been sent in with an order, the mailing would be useless. However, this extra order form gives the mailing passalong value; even if the

main order device is missing, a person can order the product. Some years ago *Nation* did a promotion that gave 115 reasons to subscribe (in honor of the 115 years it had been published). The brochure gatefolded vertically until, fully opened, it was probably 4 feet long. On the final fold at the very bottom was an extra order form; *Nation* received a surprising number of orders on that extra coupon. This extra order coupon costs nothing and makes it easy to order.

The M offering represents an old approach adapted to new conditions.

In 1960 Ed McLean wrote his first direct mail letter, and in doing so created one of the most successful Grand Controls in history. The client was *Newsweek*, which in the course of fifteen years mailed some 170 million of McLean's letter. It began:

Dear Reader:

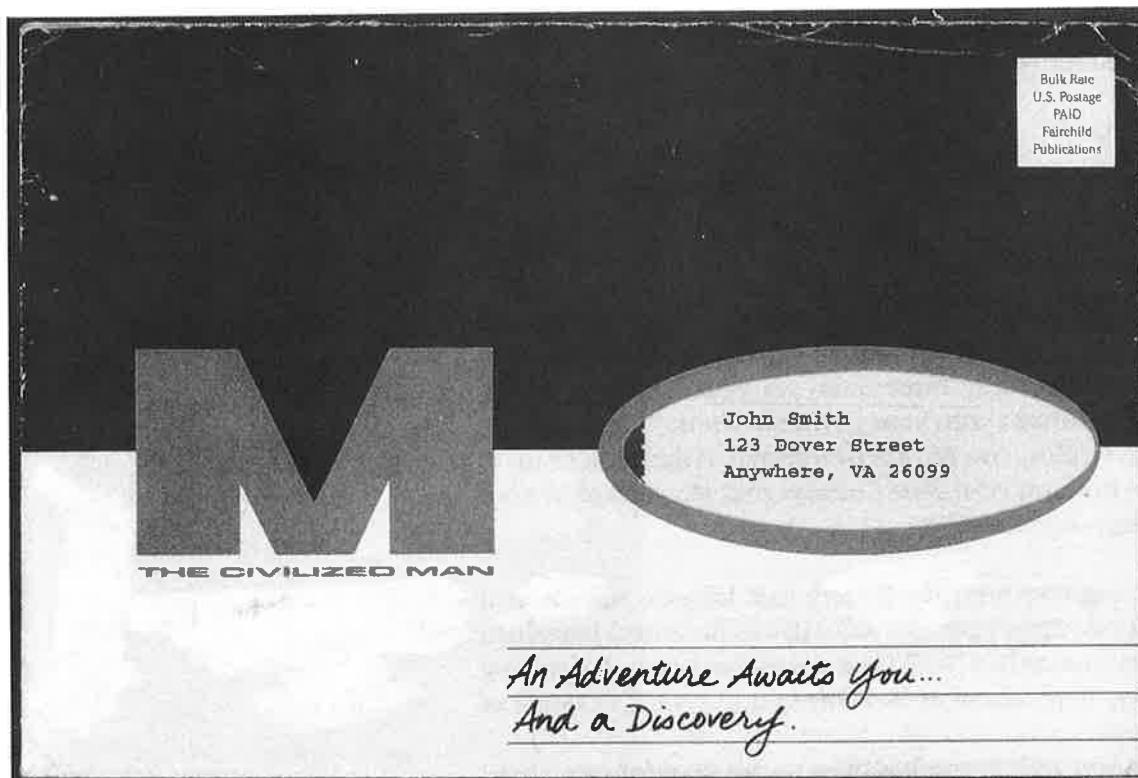
If the list upon which I found your name is any indication, this is not the first—nor will it be the last—subscription letter you receive. Quite frankly, your education and income set you apart from the general population and make you a highly-rated prospect for everything from magazines to mutual funds.

At the time he wrote it, McLean was new to the business and became fascinated with the whole concept of list selection while sitting in on meetings with Pat Gardner (later circulation director of the now-defunct Family Media) and the late Red Dembner, then *Newsweek's* circulation director.

With the current brouhaha over privacy—and *perceived* invasion of privacy—McLean's letter could never be mailed today. Consumers are nervous about the free flow of lists, purchases, and the exchange of personal credit information all over the direct marketing industry. Savvy direct marketers do not want to pour gasoline on the fire by rubbing consumers' noses in how much they know about their private lives. As Ed McLean says, "You can use the information, but you have to dumb down what you know."

But I can tell you some of the things M will set out to do for you.

"You'll see the wives and lady friends of the bidders egging them on. 'Show you're a man! Come on! Top his bid!' The poor dope! But he raises his hand in the hope of gaining the favor of the harridan next to him. It's like a public hanging, really, betting when the noose will fall on someone's neck."

And High Plain lawyer Gerry Spense told us what he thinks is wrong with law schools today:

"They turn out pansy butts. They duplicate academics like themselves who know the law as a textbook but have no understanding of human nature."

In the opening of his letter for *M* magazine, Milt Pierce says the same thing as McLean did for *Newsweek*, but with far less brashness:

You're educated, successful, well-off, well-traveled, respected, smart.

And that's not guesswork. It's research.

"It's research" is a brilliant euphemism for:

I rented a bunch of lists which I merged/purged and then ran against your personal credit files at TRW so that I know you make a lot of money, have been late only three times on your \$3,700-a-month mortgage, and are current with your payments on the Mercedes and your wife's Jaguar; plus, you are not overdrawn at the bank or up to your eyeballs in hock on your First Chicago gold Mastercard or your American Airlines-Citibank Visa.

"It's research," together with the flattery that follows, sounds as if Chairman of the Board John Fairchild (who signed the letter) happened across the prospect's name in a *Wall Street Journal* article and is writing him a good-ole-boy letter about *M*. It is the quintessential example of dumbing down copy.

New York freelancer Milt Pierce has been on his own for more than

Milt Pierce's letter for Fairchild's *M* magazine. The 4-page letter is printed in 2 colors on an 11" x 17" sheet and folded twice for inserting into the 6" x 9" envelope. *M* ceased publication in 1992.

(On the dangers of wearing a hat: "Wearing one makes you conspicuous. Bare-headed, you can stand at the magazine rack and flip through, say, Mud Wrestling, but a hat makes you a man of distinction. Stick to Foreign Affairs.")

We don't take everything that seriously. Because along with everything else...

M is meant to amuse and entertain you. It's a magazine for your leisure hours, after all. (Among the categories submitted by contestants: "routes to anywhere in mainland Britain from Letchworth by road...iron graveslabs of England, and cremation practice and law.")

What does it all add up to?

Style. Original. Independent. Unforced. Self-assured.

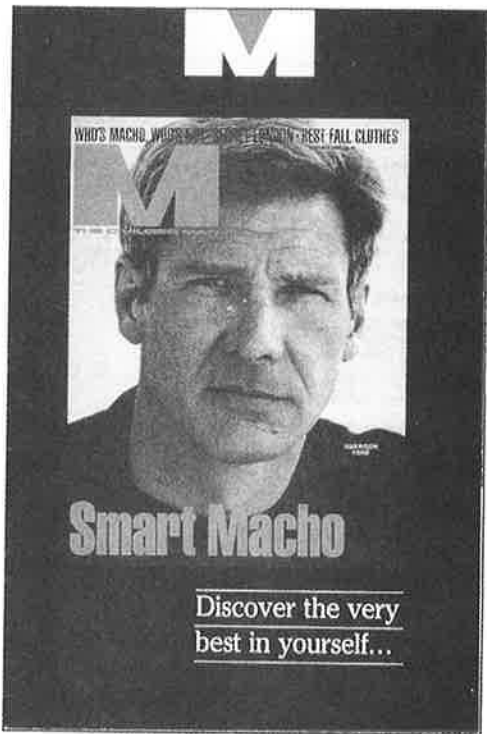
Here's the story behind my M package. Several years ago I was talking with Leo Yochim, and he told me that he had made an amazing discovery: if you put a bold border around someone's name and address, the response will go up—by a considerable amount.

"It makes sense," Leo said. "After all, people are in love with their own names."

So I put this little bit of information into my memory bank and used it on the M package—with slight modification. Instead of putting a border around the name and address, I used an oval window . . . with a bold border. (After all, we were still calling attention to the person's name.) It worked. The envelope got opened and the package did very nicely.

In subsequent mailings, I used this technique for Archive magazine—and beat the control by over 60 percent. I also used the concept a few other times—with nice results.

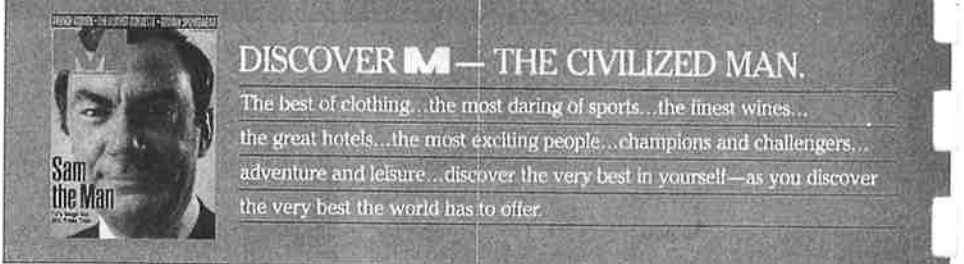

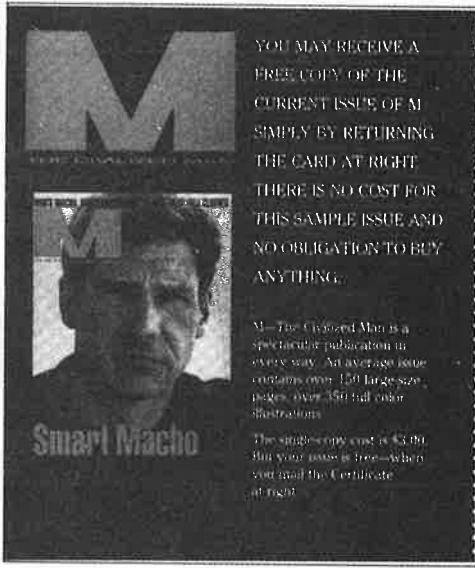

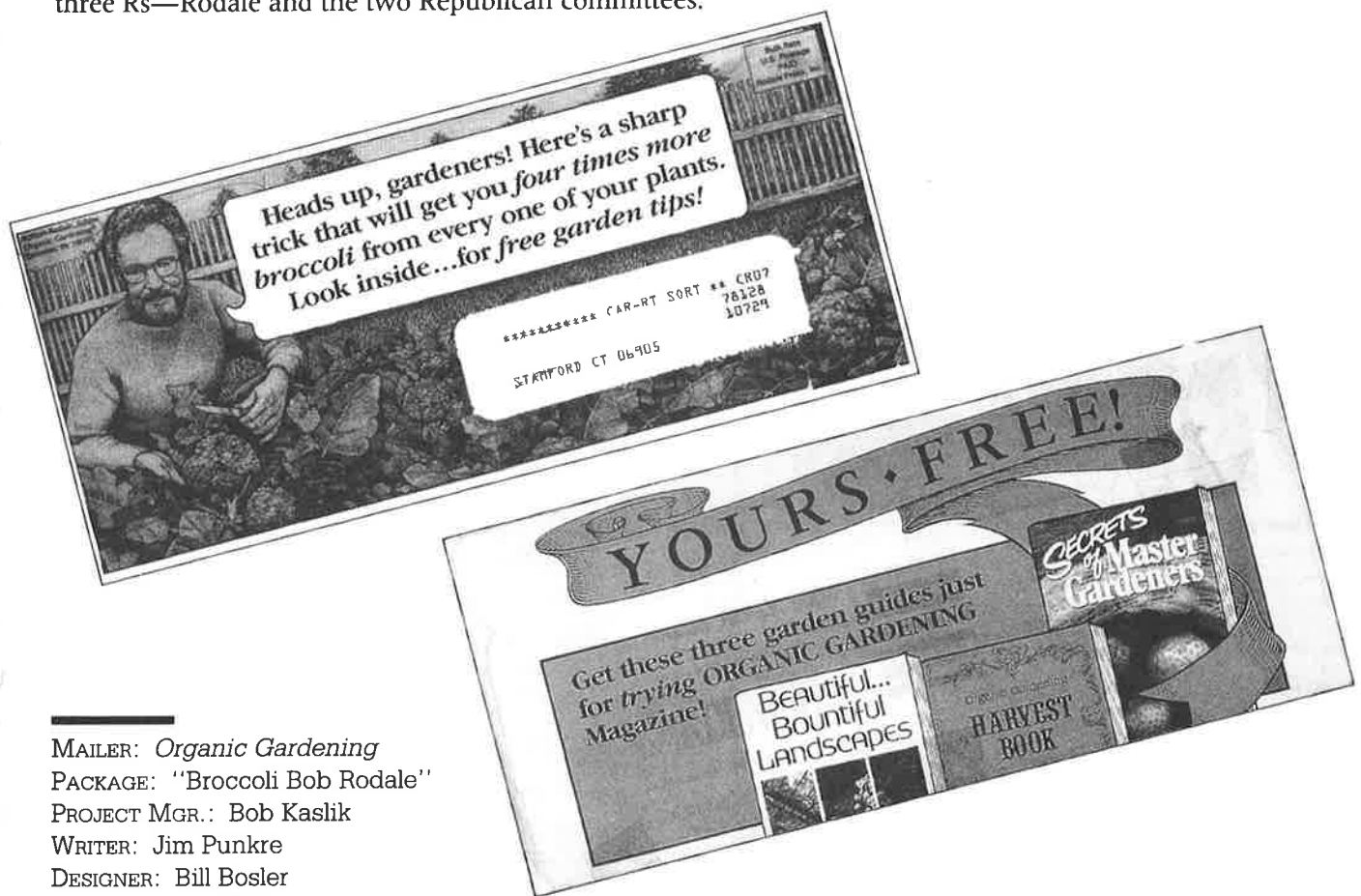

A case in point is Jim Punkre's 1983 mailing for Rodale's *Organic Gardening* magazine with a brown and black #10 window envelope featuring a comic-book-like drawing of Rodale's president, Robert Rodale, in the middle of a broccoli patch and luring us to look inside the envelope.

The Rodale offering is akin to the Boardroom Reports mailings in Chapter 21, where you will see two envelopes that have formidable teaser copy:

**WHAT NEVER TO EAT ON AN AIRPLANE
WHAT CREDIT CARD COMPANIES DON'T TELL YOU**


You tear into these Boardroom envelopes only to discover that the answers will be found in the publication once you buy it.

Whereas the Boardroom writer leaves you titillated and unfulfilled, Punkre delivers in the letter what he promises on the envelope. At the top of the letter he repeats the envelope promise and then shows exactly how to prune broccoli so that four big heads will grow instead of just one.

Many direct mail writers feel that if the mailing gives hard information along with the sales pitch, the reader will feel good about spending time with the piece . . . will feel good about the product and offer . . . will feel good about the mailer . . . and will order.

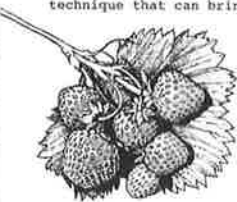

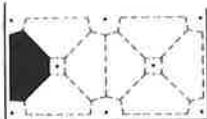

The design and efficient use of paper in Jim Punkre's package are extraordinary. The 11" x 17" letter is printed in four-color; the top area is printed in bright yellow with the headline "HEADS UP, GARDENERS!" printed in red. The letter itself is printed in black typewriter type against a light brown background. Only the photograph of the premium makes use of four-color process printing.

The brochure is an 8½" x 11" single sheet, printed front and back and packed with copy. The four-color illustration on the front shows a farm basket filled with beautiful vegetables and surrounded by others. The copy is made up of thirty-one specific promises of the kind of information to be found in every issue of *Organic Gardening*; they are printed against a bright yellow background.

The back—printed in three colors on the same bright yellow background—is made up of testimonials from happy readers.

One thing is for sure: no reader will doze off looking at these yellows and reds.

The 4 3/4" x 11" premium slip is also printed in four colors.

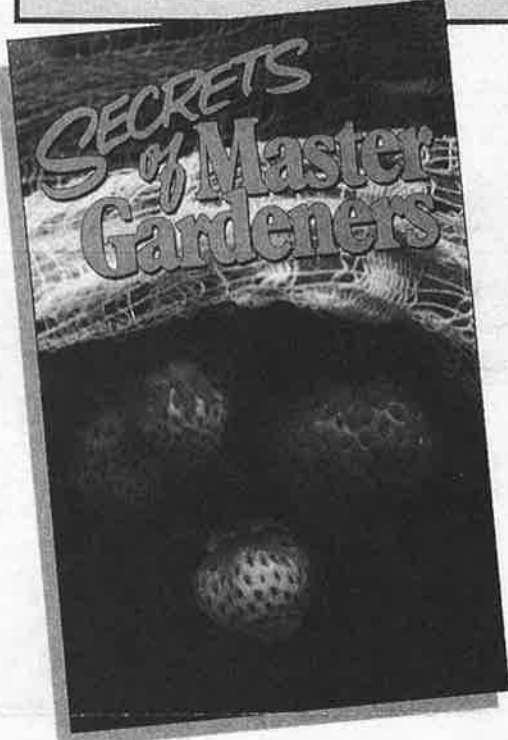
What makes this entire effort so efficient is that all three pieces were printed together on one sheet of paper, slit, folded, and inserted.

The great Canadian designer Ted Kikoler insists that designers and copywriters should know the basics of printing and the kinds of presses used. More than once Kikoler has found that in the course of printing a particular piece, the entire sheet of paper going through the press would not be used; rather an excess piece of it would be sheared off and sent to a landfill.

The printing of it is free, since it is going through the press anyway. The shape might be a little odd, but so what? An extra little surprise in the package will usually raise results. And the cost per thousand is unchanged.

According to Jim Punkre, this *Organic Gardening* effort fit the Kikoler model: the letter, circular, and lift piece were all printed at once on the same sheet of paper, which certainly fits Rodale's guiding philosophy of ecological responsibility.

Notice on the order card that the price is 10 issues for \$12.97 (plus \$1.97 delivery). *Reader's Digest* first came up with the idea of burying a

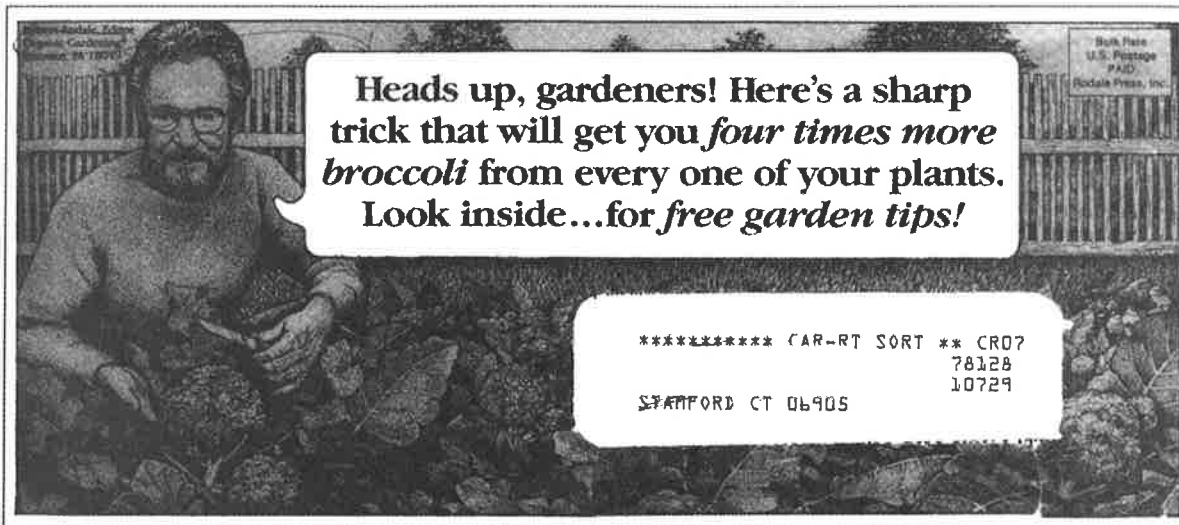

price increase by charging for postage. This is rare, but presumably works for Rodale as well as the *Digest*.

Another feature of this mailing is the use of two business reply elements. The back of the order card has a business reply face, which means that you can simply tear off the stub and drop the card into the mail. In addition, a business reply envelope is enclosed in case you are inclined to send some cash or if you prefer the privacy that an envelope ensures.

This effort—known at Rodale as the “Broccoli Bob Rodale package”—would most probably be control today. It was forced into retirement by the tragic death of Bob Rodale in a bus accident at the Moscow airport in the late fall of 1990.

Ever resourceful, the designers at Rodale deleted Bob Rodale’s picture

throughout the package and it resumed its control status. It has apparently since been beaten.

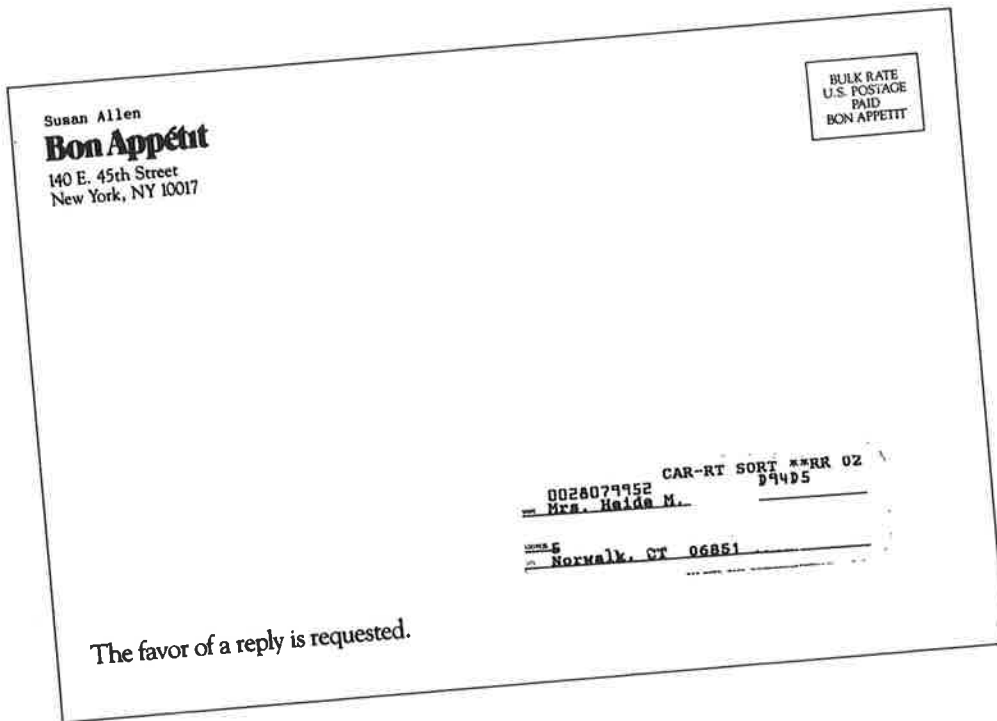

Bon Appétit

In his commentary on his Omaha Steaks mailing in Chapter 18, Herschell Gordon Lewis compares creating a direct mail package to method acting. A good direct response writer not only gets inside the head of the person who will receive the mailing, but *becomes* that person, as Marlon Brando became Don Corleone in *The Godfather* and Meryl Streep became Karen Blixen in *Out of Africa*. On becoming that person, the writer then has to imagine all possible objections that could be raised to the product and offer, and then overcome those objections in the course of the copy and design. It's a head game, pure and simple. Fats Waller's "I'm Gonna Sit Right Down and Write Myself a Letter" is truly the direct mail writer's theme song.

The *Bon Appétit* outside envelope.

What distinguishes a great actor is the same thing that distinguishes a great direct mail writer. Just as Dustin Hoffman can become Willie Loman, Ratso, an idiot savant in *Rain Man*, and even a bumptious, buxom woman in *Tootsie*, so a direct mail writer must be able to change roles. In Chapter 20, the late Hank Burnett alludes to the discomfort he felt in knowing so much about thirteen- and fourteen-year-old girls when he was writing the *Sassy* magazine package.

Linda Wells can be equally chameleonlike, jumping inside the skin of a food lover (*Bon Appétit*), a middle-aged woman (*Lear's*), a nurse (*American Journal of Nursing*), a collector (*Art & Auction*), a child (Children's Television Workshop), or an investor (*Financial World*).

The offer arrives in a simple, white 6" × 9" window envelope. In the upper left corner—the so-called cornercard—are the magazine logo and address. It's a real address on East Forty-fifth Street in New York. Even though the business reply envelope is addressed to a post office box in Red Oak, Iowa, the letter comes from a real address.

It comes from a real person, too. Circulation director Susan Allyn's name is over the magazine's name in typewriter type, as though it were hand-typed. This personalizes the mailing; even though the addressee's name is on a Cheshire label, the mailing *appears* to come from a real person as well as a real street address. This is subtle stuff; but maybe it makes a difference of a tenth of a percentage point.

There is a single line of copy on the envelope: "The favor of a reply is requested."

At first glance, this seems to be an innocuous, weak teaser. However, Linda Wells uses the same line on the envelope of her launch package for *Lear's* (Chapter 13), so she knows what she is doing. More to the point, this line of copy is used very frequently. Audrey Ridley of R. L. Polk reported that the original Jayme-Ratalahti long-term control for the *Harvard Medical School Health Letter* had a belt and belt buckle going across the face of the envelope with this copy:

*Yes or No.
Food is more fattening
when you eat it
late at night.*

There was other copy as well. This was tested against "The favor of a reply is requested," and the latter won handily.

Another Linda Wells signature is to start a letter with "Congratulations!" You'll find it in the *Lear's* Grand Control in Chapter 13. Right off the bat, she makes readers feel good about themselves.

The cover panel of the circular depicts a delectable dish of peach ice cream; it is so beautifully printed on coated paper that you can almost take a spoon to it. The desserts shown on the first inside panel are equally inviting. They follow Meredith's rule of never showing small pictures of food.

The inside of the brochure explodes open with a beautiful dessert table and cover of the magazine and the word "FREE" all over the place. The back panel shows covers and spreads from the magazine and screams "FREE!"

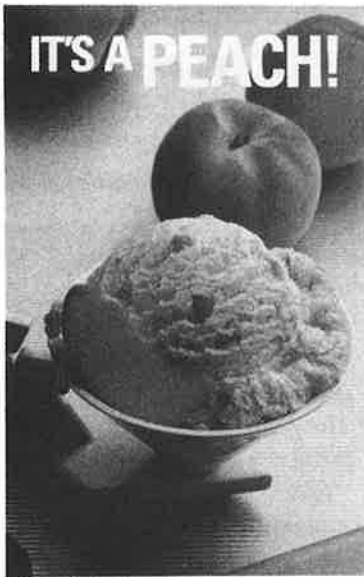

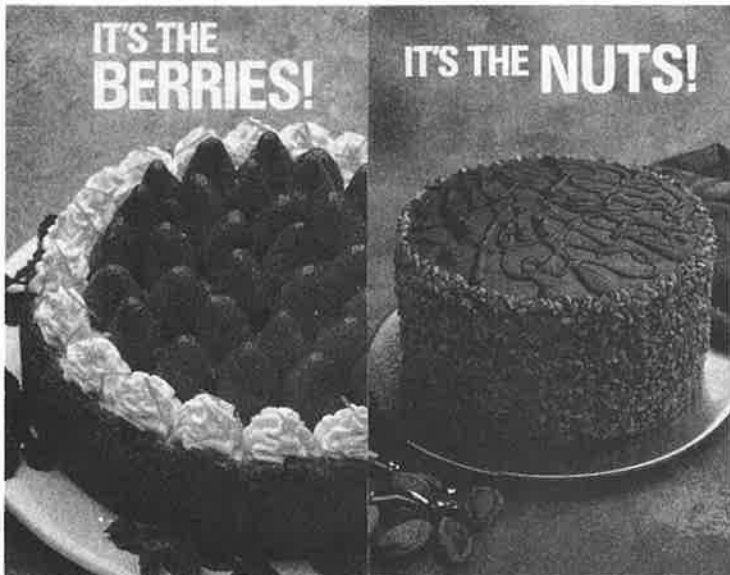

On the business reply envelope, the *Bon Appétit* logo is printed in bright red, as is the "Special Money-Saving Offer" in the circle. There's no reason why a BRE can't have some *sell* on it; it's the last thing the new customer sees before it goes into the mail, and some reassurance—such as "Special Money-Saving Offer"—can make a person feel good about ordering.

House & Garden

The *House & Garden* "White Sale" mailing by Jerry Ricigliano of Rapp Collins Marcoa is elegant, demure, and literate. The outside envelope and simple two-page letter are printed on coated white stock and printed with black and gold. The only illustration in the mailing is a small four-color cover on the order form. The lift piece—a screaming exhortation in blue type on a white background to "ACT NOW"—breaks the otherwise subdued mood and reminds you that the point of the mailing is to send in an order.

JERRY RICIGLIANO:

For me, having to beat your own control package stirs up overwhelming feelings of mixed emotion. (I think of that old joke that equates mixed emotion with "seeing your mother-in-law drive off a cliff in your new Mercedes.")

On the one hand, the opportunity to push your creative prowess to new

heights and achieve another creative triumph is exhilarating. On the other hand . . . fear and dread. (You'd rather be in the plummeting Mercedes with your mother-in-law than take on the Herculean challenge of creating another winning package.)

That's what associate creative director Jerry Genova and I were feeling when we had to come up with a new package for Condé Nast's House & Garden (HG) magazine. A package everyone was counting on to knock the control out of the box.

Briefly, here's what we were up against. We had tested our way into a strong "savings" position. The current HG control was a simple turnaround approach that offered the opportunity to "activate a valuable \$36 HG Savings Certificate" enclosed in the package. (That was the amount the prospect would save off the newsstand price by accepting our \$12 subscription offer.)

Jerry and I started our creative problem-solving session in a rather unusual way—by not allowing each other to put a pen to paper or a marker to pad. We were set on establishing a creative strategy (without writing a headline or making a pretty picture!) . . . and analyzing the control position led us quickly to it. If savings continued to push the prospects' hot buttons in test after test . . . we would take that position, but do it better.

We started free-forming ideas to come up with ways of communicating "savings." (Tough task, because, face it, guys, it's all been done before.) In our initial brainstorming, a "sale" concept emerged. Not totally original, yet it was a classic way to get someone's attention and to dramatize saving money.

We agreed to explore it, but established parameters: this sale could not sound forced, overly promotional, or expected. (Fire Sale, Sample Sale, and Sale-a-Thon were obviously out!) Our sale had to appeal to HG's upscale audience and fit with its "art book" quality. In other words, we needed a sale with image.

We agonized. Then it hit us. There was one kind of sale that hoity-toity stores like Bloomingdale's and Saks felt comfortable running. That didn't detract from their image. That didn't say "bargain basement."

The White Sale.

It was a perfect solution, especially for a magazine like HG. After all, a White Sale was an attention-getting event that ran only for a limited time. It was related to the home. It definitely communicated savings. It had image. (And maybe it was even a bit intriguing in its ambiguity—how could a magazine have a White Sale anyway?)

This all worked to our advantage. So we started putting pen to paper and marker to pad. We created an outer envelope that announced that "HG was having its very own special White Sale." We tailored a letter opening that made the case simply . . . and convincingly. The hook with HG was a natural: "Just as your favorite department stores have white sales to help you fill your home with beautiful possessions at greatly reduced prices—so will House & Garden. Bringing you the best style in interiors, the finest furniture, the rarest art and antiques—all provocatively displayed on bigger pages with more full-color photographs—for you to 'take home' every month. And it's all yours . . . for only \$1 an issue."

Jerry Genova purposefully came up with a clean, understated design for the package. Every piece was pure white, with black type and accented with gold hot stamping. It had a rich, upscale, elegant feel to it that was in sync with the magazine.

Although the package looked great, had just the right image, and presented a strong, focused case in the copy—we believe that the White Sale idea was king


here. Jerry and I labored long to hit on that idea. And once we did, the execution seemed to come easily.

The HG White Sale package did beat control (as if you couldn't guess). It held up for a few years, in fact. During that time, Jerry and I never teamed up to beat it. Other writers and art directors in the agency took their shots without success. However, the time did come when we were asked to beat our own control again . . . but that is another story!

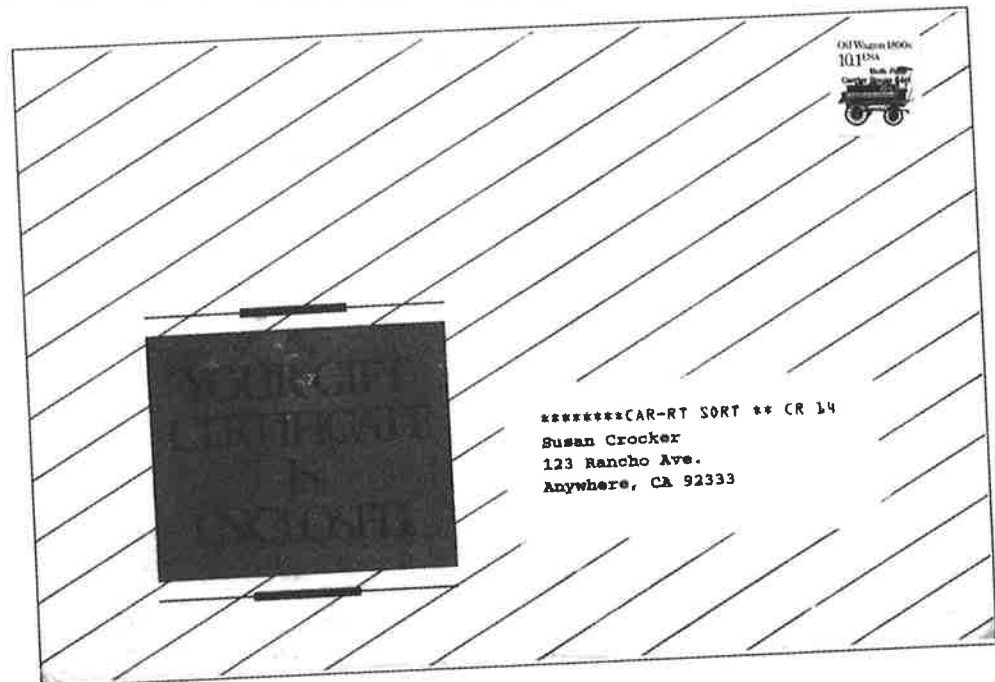
If there is a direct mail superstar these days, it is Judy Weiss. Of the original seventy-one Axel Andersson Awards, Weiss was the winner of four. Whereas most project managers and circulation directors like to pigeonhole writers (for example, consumer vs. business), Weiss has demonstrated the ability to create successful mailings to both markets. For example, her winning mailings were: *Business Week* and *Inc.* (business), *Architectural Digest* (consumer/business), and *W* (consumer). Weiss is also one of those rare talents who can move comfortably between direct mail and broadcast; she does TV and radio direct response.

From an extended interview with Judy Weiss on how she goes about creating a direct mail package:

When I get an assignment there is usually a long lead time. When the time comes for me to start work (let's say for a monthly magazine) I want one and a half to two years of issues plus samples of other mailing packages—those that have worked and those that have not. I also want a basic look at who is reading the magazine: male, female, age, income, and what lists my mailing will be going out to. I need to get a handle on who subscribes and who renews. And I want to know what the distinction is between regular readers of the magazine and those I am trying to interest in it.

I spend three weeks on every package: one week looking at the magazine, one week roughing out the copy, and one week polishing it.

The first week I look at every issue and take notes. I am always thinking about the people I will be writing to. I make notes by hand on yellow legal pads.

I never know where the notes will lead or if or where I'll use the copy. In the course of taking notes, something may hit me as possible copy for an element. I stick a Post-It note on it with a thought as to where it may go. I am getting into the magazine this first week, and I find it very relaxing and really wonderful.

On Monday of the second week I start working on the piece. This is the scary part. I have all these notes, many of them covered with Post-Its. Much of it is stream of consciousness—just thoughts or bites of copy that came to me as I read the magazine.

I think of a magazine as a theater piece. There is an entirely different language that propels every magazine, whether it's Vogue or Allure or Business Week or New Yorker. My job is to get inside the skin of the magazine and live in it for three weeks to understand that language and evoke it. In writing the piece, my tone must sound exactly right for the magazine.

At the same time I have the sense that I am writing to a real person—a reader of Allure or Entertainment Weekly or Business Week. Focusing on that real person gives a tone to my copy too.

For every magazine constituency there is a hot button. For instance, the hot button for Sassy and YM (Young & Modern) is boyfriends. The publishers of YM have positioned it as a fashion magazine. But I think that's secondary to features on guys. And in my copy I will go out on a limb on this. Because of my past work, most magazines go along with me, and I think I'm usually right.

The process of writing copy is really shaping all these notes. I often put down ten to twenty outer envelope ideas and come up with eight or ten possible heads to the lift memo.

By the end of the second week, it is all in rough form. There is always way too much stuff and I have to start carving away the excess.

Judy Weiss's 4-page letter for *W*, printed on an 11" × 17" sheet and folded twice, fit into the 6" × 9" envelope. Note the staccato, breathless prose.

P.S. As mentioned before, your Gift Certificate bears your name and may not be used by anyone else. A mailing like this -- for a publication like M -- must remain quite selective.

It's at the end of the second week also that I take a look at the samples of the other packages. Until that point I don't want to be influenced by what others have done. But it's imperative to see if I missed any copy points that others might have thought of. I owe it to the client to know about these and include them if I think they will help sales.

In the third week I really polish. I knock the hell out of the copy. Really attack it. Nine out of ten headlines might get thrown out. If I've come up with a list of sixteen editorial references, I will pick the best six or seven. Twenty or thirty adjectives will become ten or twelve.

I tell people that I write by the "rhythm" method. This may sound cute, but it's true. I wrote broadcast before I wrote print, so I get very intense about timing and rhythm. Every sentence and every word has to sound right. I use alliteration and rhyme on occasion. Even puns. Two headlines in my W package are examples: "Behind the Seams" and "Fashion with Passion."

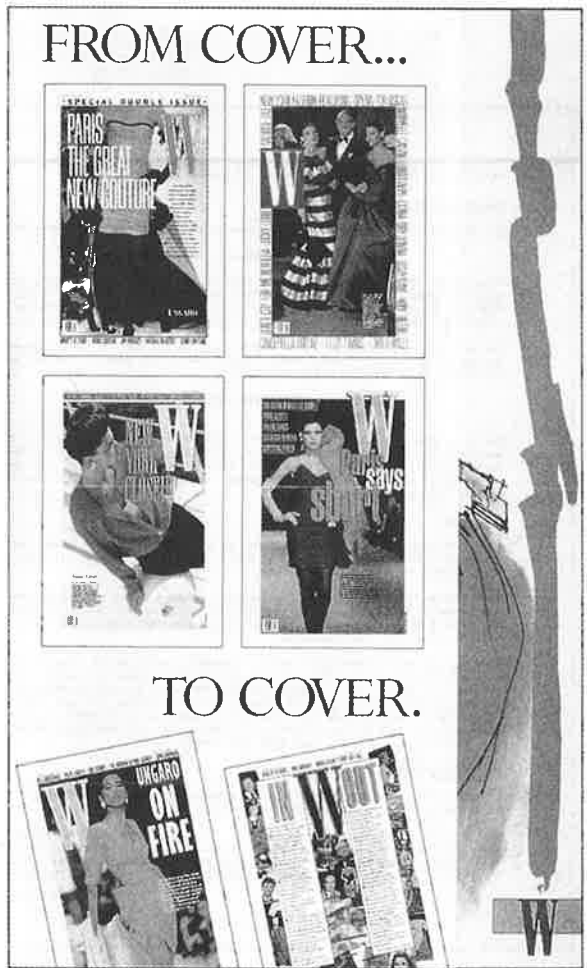
I'm told that direct mail should not be "clever."

But the magazines themselves are clever. If they weren't clever, readers would fall asleep and would not renew. I want my work to be as clever and well written as the magazine itself. I respect the titles I work for. If I didn't respect them, I wouldn't work for them. I try to make my copy clever, entertaining, enjoyable, and appropriate to the magazine.

I am very untutored in this. What I do is based on instinct. For example, I don't study direct mail. I don't receive much direct mail to speak of. Most of my magazines comp me, so I'm not on promotable lists. If I am derivative, it is only of myself.

The copy for a particular piece of direct mail reads at a certain speed, just as a magazine reads at a certain speed. The New Yorker doesn't read that quickly.

Martin Davidson's stylish brochure starts off 6½" × 5½" and ends up 16¾" × 11". The three dots that follow the copy line on the cover panel ("It's good news . . .") point the way to opening the brochure. Thereafter, each of the next two short folds cuts across artwork, forcing you to open it and open in again. These short folds are untidy. Neatness rejects involvement. The back panel restates the guarantee, and calls it a "Gift Guarantee." By slipping in the word "gift," Judy Weiss has added some *sell* to what is normally a perfunctory piece of copy.

You can sample your first issue of *W* with no obligation. Just use your Pre-authorized Gift Certificate (mail it — postage free — today). There's no need to send any money. Then, if you are not delighted with it, return "Canceled" on the invoice and simply mail it back to us. You won't owe a cent. With so much to gain — and with absolutely nothing to lose — shouldn't you at least take a look?



So my current control for the New Yorker goes at a slower pace. Copy for other magazines—such as Elle or Entertainment Weekly—should have more syncopation, a quicker rhythm like bop or jive. To me these things are not accidental. My copy has the pace appropriate to each magazine. It's all part of my process. I want to speak as the magazine would speak. It's blend of sales and benefits, but in the language of that magazine. And if cleverness speaks to those people, I want my copy to be clever. If cleverness keeps people reading, or if rhythm keeps people reading, I'll pull out all the stops. I have to keep people reading to get them to act on the order form.

In addition, copy that sounds great—and sounds like the magazine—is a good introduction to the product.

The direct mail package is like a symphonic thing, with each element adding a new theme.

The order form has to be clean. I don't use tokens or gimmicks. Like the double postcard, the less copy I am able to write, the greater the importance I attach to every word.

I spend a lot of time on lift memos. I think the lift memo is extremely significant in bringing in higher responses.

I prefer to do a brochure only if the client agrees to test the package with and without it. If you write great copy, you may not need a brochure. If great copy paints a picture in the reader's mind, a brochure with pictures may well be superfluous. If that is the case, it will not pay for itself and simply isn't necessary. I never create a huge brochure, even when I'm launching something. I don't think that much paper is required.

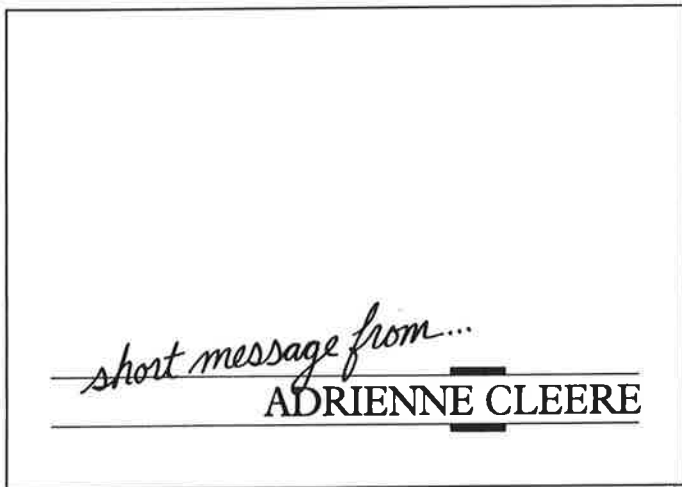
For design I work almost exclusively with Marty Davidson. Sometimes I give him thumbnail sketches. But more likely we talk about the package. I give him my ideas on typography and look and feel. We know each other really well. Even when I suggest something, Marty may well ignore me and do it his way. In no sense do I try to be Marty's boss. Marty and I both work for the client, and I am not his boss.

Vince Lombardi once said that if you're not fired with enthusiasm, you will be fired with enthusiasm. I love what I do. And I love magazines. I have a passion for this. This is why I give each piece so much time. This is what allows me to find the right tone, the right words, and the right strategy.

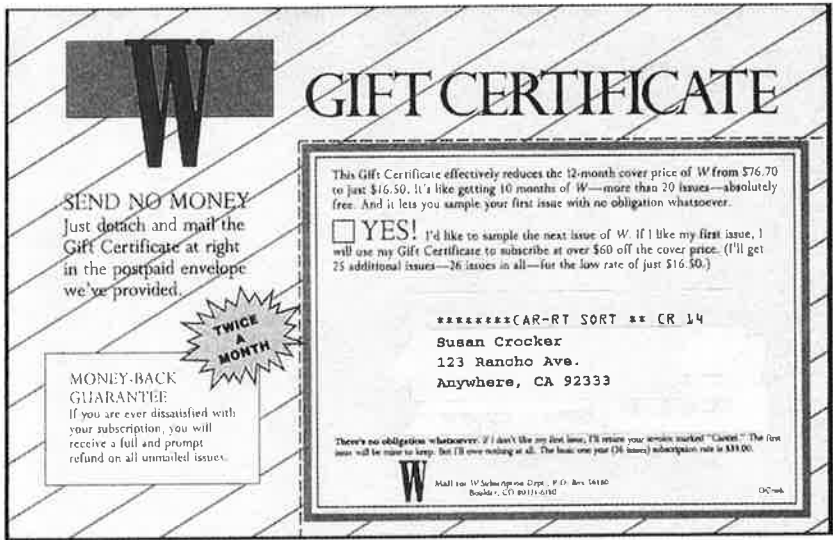
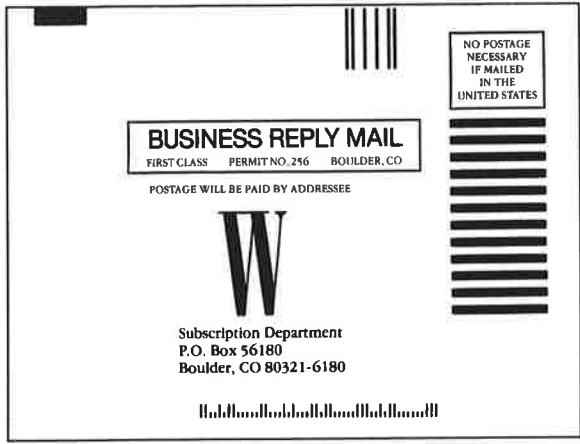
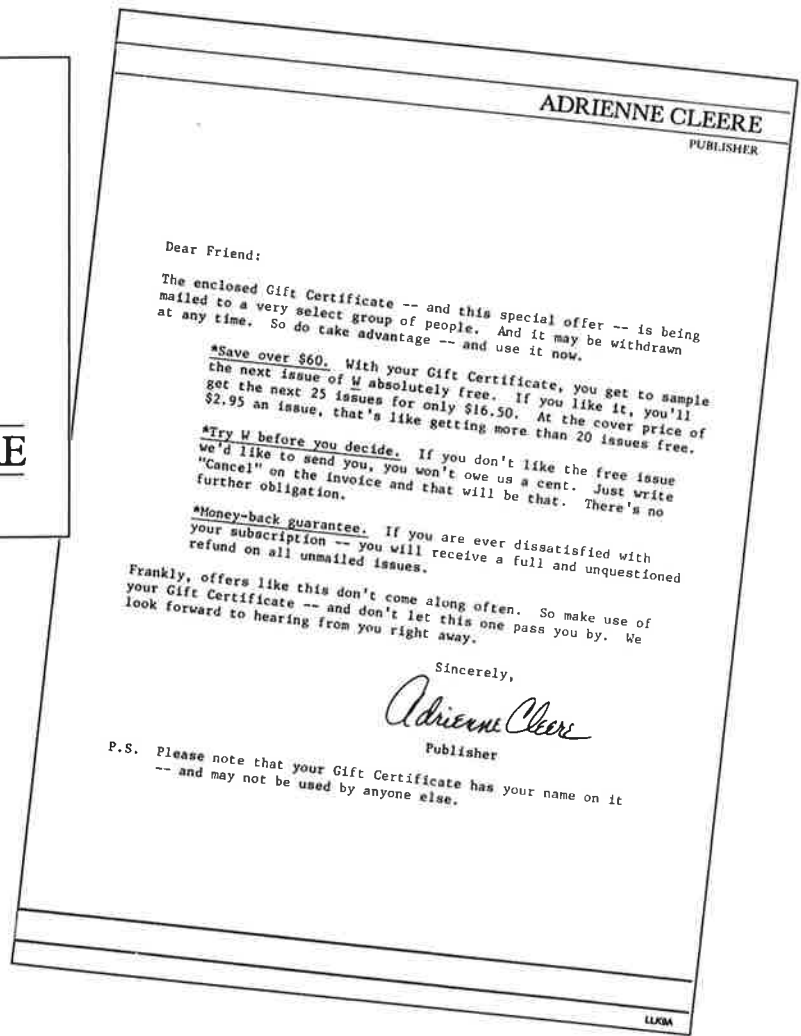
Designer Martin Davidson began working in direct mail in 1965 and formed Davidson & Maltz in 1972, specializing in circulation direct mail for the publishing industry. Major clients include Hearst Publications, Condé Nast Publications, Time Warner magazines, Consumers Union, New York Times magazines; K-III magazines, Book-of-the-Month Club, Walt Disney publications, and Columbia House. Davidson teams up with such leading freelancers as Len Berkowe, Steve Finkel, Grace Garguilo, Tom Gillett, Ken Scheck, Ken Schneider, and Judy Weiss. He works quickly, turning out a record eighty-three packages in 1990, and claims to have had forty controls in the mail simultaneously.

MARTIN DAVIDSON:

We like our package to have the feel and look of the magazine. Our motto is, "It doesn't have to be ugly to sell." Our packages have a real clean look to them; we try to evoke excitement; we use typefaces that are easily read; I work with the best writers . . . best designers . . . best mechanical people. When you put a team together where everyone is the best, more often than not you can create a winner. It's worked for me now for twenty years.



The "short message from . . . Adrienne Cleere" unfolds to reveal a 1-page lift letter.



Order card and business reply envelope. This order card doesn't simply ask for the order; it *sells*. Look at these selling elements: "Send No Money" . . . "Twice a Month" . . . "Money-Back Guarantee" . . . "Gift Certificate" . . . "effectively reduces the 12-month cover price of *W* from \$76.70 to just \$16.50. It's like getting 10 months of *W*—more than 20 issues—absolutely free. . . . no obligation whatsoever."

Consumer Magazines III: Science and Nature

Some of the most effective direct mail is to be found in the arena of magazines that appeal to consumers' love of nature and science. With the exception of *Science News*, what makes these Grand Controls different from traditional magazine offers is that the magazine is the by-product of a nonprofit organization. All mail at nonprofit rates and that fact gives them a tremendous edge over their competition; they can afford to mail more and/or charge less and/or settle for poorer results than magazines mailing at full third-class rates.

The mailings are powerful in two ways: they either make an irresistible offer or call to something deep within all of us to know more about our world and somehow make it a better place for our having responded to the offer.

Audubon

The first two things you see in the 1985 subscription effort is a red and black peel-off sticker offering a free backpack and a handsome, personalized membership card in the National Audubon Society. Inside, Pete Gelb's letter is filled with a series of images that both tug at your heartstrings and raise your ire. By the end of the letter, you feel that the least you can do for the planet is to send for your free backpack and trial membership. The backpack, by the way, is free with the order, as opposed to other offers where the premium is "free" only when payment has been made.

This *Audubon* effort has two involvement devices. The peel-off sticker on the outside envelope is supposed to be placed in the circle at the bottom of the order form; that bottom part is then detached and mailed. The second involvement element is the personalized temporary membership card which you are urged to detach and keep.

For years, Pete Gelb and Carl Bloom operated the highly successful direct response agency Bloom & Gelb. In 1986 they parted, and Gelb set up shop as Grady & Gelb in the bucolic setting of eastern Long Island. The other half of the partnership is Nancy Grady, who created the *Harper's* package (discussed in Chapter 9), and who is also known as Mrs. Pete Gelb.

The 4-page letter, printed on an 11" × 17" sheet in 2 colors, folded twice to fit in a 6" × 9" envelope. At the bottom of the letter is the notice: "Printed on Recycled Paper." This copy line also appears on the order form, business reply envelope, and the lift letter. At first blush it may seem like a positive statement that will make the reader feel good about *Audubon*. However, this is an extraneous thought—a non sequitur that can interrupt the flow of the letter. It interrupts the interruption. A number of mailers have reported that announcing recycled paper in a mailing actually depresses results. It should be tested.

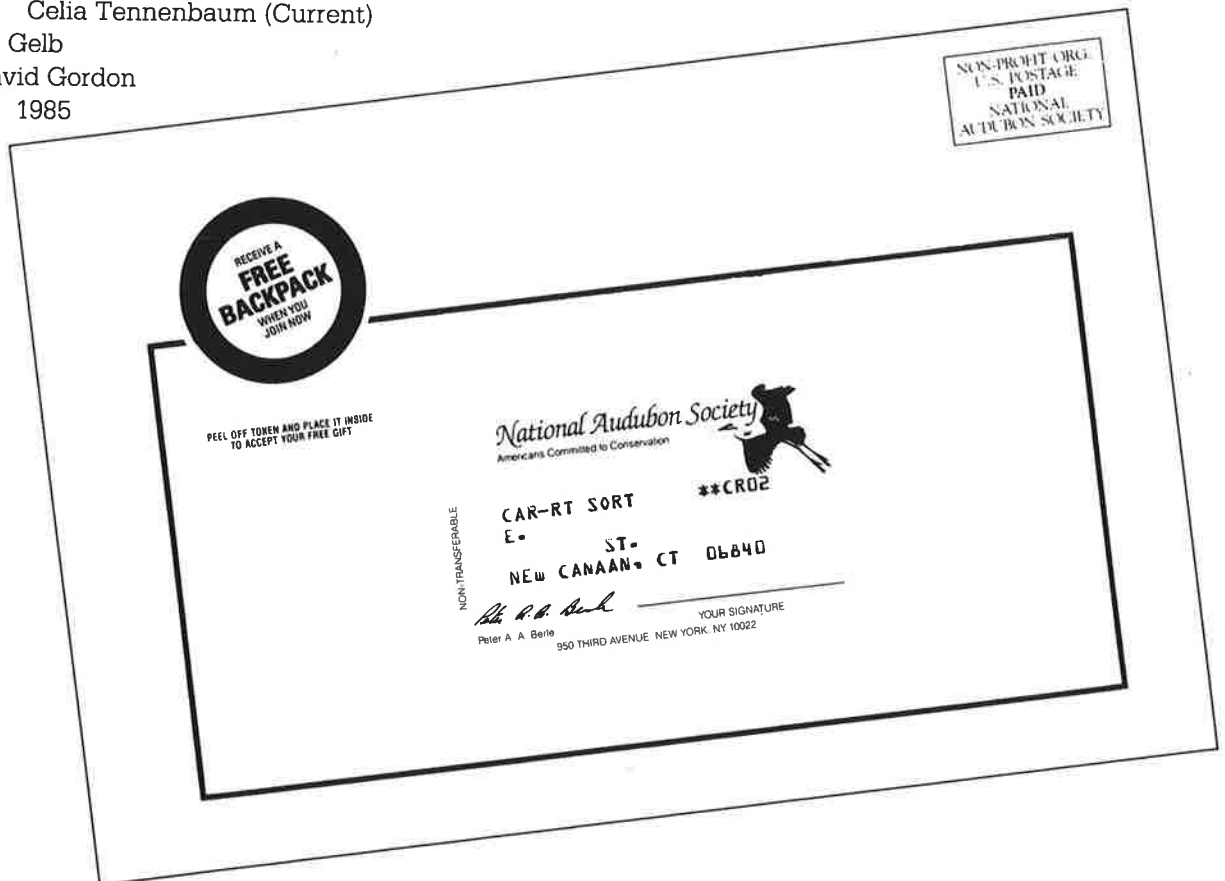

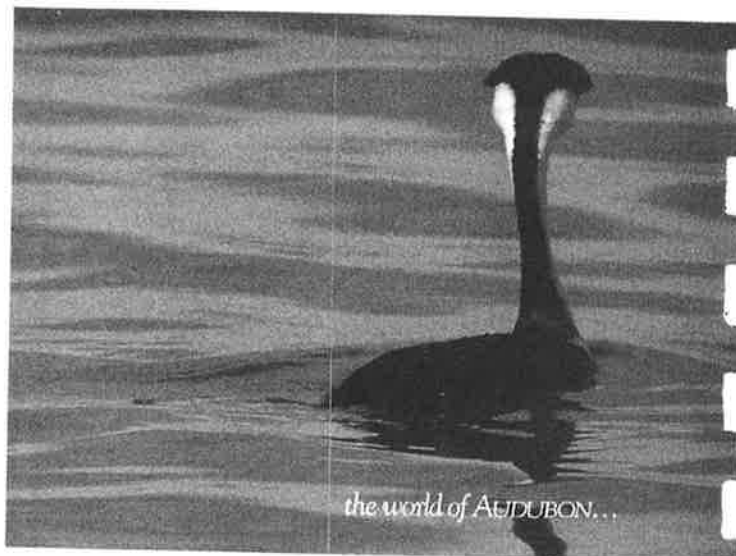
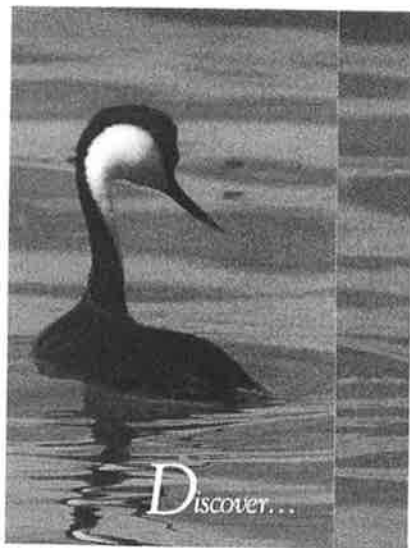

PETE GELB:

Working methods: nothing very different about them. I try to collect lots of information about the product and the market, including what has worked and what hasn't worked in the past.

I try a little harder than most writers to fit the copy to the situation, instead of creating the same formula package for everybody, as direct mail writers commonly do.

The Audubon package is a good example. It looks and sounds right to its middle-aged, upscale prospects. Test packages with inappropriate copy or design have repeatedly failed to equal it. Don't hire Crazy Eddie to sell a Rolls-Royce.

If you can look at a package and tell who wrote or designed it, you're looking at a formula package. It will work for some people some of the time, but that's all it will ever do.

The Audubon package was designed by David Gordon, a direct marketing graphic designer for over thirty years. Among his clients: AARP, AT & T, Avon, *Esquire*, Franklin Mint, GAF, Jackson & Perkins, Meredith, Metropolitan Opera, PBS, Rodale Press, Sotheby's, Time-Life Books, and *Women's Wear Daily*.

The 2 lift elements. The lift letter also states that it is printed on recycled paper. The salutation ("Dear Member-elect") may seem stiff, but not nearly as cumbersome as the salutation in the main letter in the long time control of the National Trust for Historic Preservation: "Dear Initiate Elect." The 4-color flyer depicting the backpack premium is printed on one side only.

DAVID GORDON:

My "secret" is not just unstoppable energy and enthusiasm, but the ability to work from a marketing basis, keeping creativity centered on "marketing realities" throughout the development process. Indeed, understanding these "marketing realities" is the foundation for any good direct mail campaign, for it is then, and only then, that one is able to fully meet the needs of both client and audience.

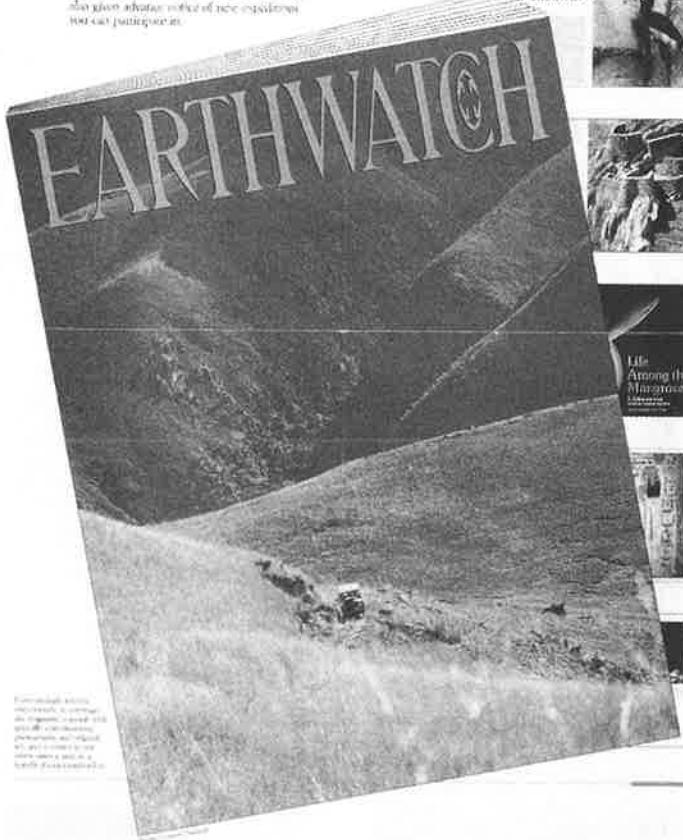

This technique is sometimes called the "Direct Mail Strip Tease." In a test and rollout situation, you want to give the mailing every chance of working, so you go full tilt. Once it has proved itself, the object is to begin to lower the cost-per-thousand by cutting down—or eliminating altogether—various elements with as little sacrifice of results as possible. Will a #10 envelope work just as well as the 6" x 9"? Can the size of the circular be cut down? Can the circular be eliminated completely? The idea of having a control mailing that continues to generate responses at an acceptable cost-per-order, but at a lower cost-per-thousand, is tantalizing, and should always be tested if the test seems logical.

BILL JAYME:

A nonprofit organization, Earthwatch serves as a kind of Peace Corps for history, science, the environment, civilization itself.

Through its membership program and magazine, it matches researchers who need temporary help on field projects with volunteers looking for ways to "get involved." Naturalists in rain forest, jungle, veldt who need observers to track vanishing species. Archaeologist requiring willing hands in excavating clues to our cultural DNA.

The concept is at once revolutionary, serendipitous, and complicated. It raises myriad questions in the prospect's mind that must be answered all at once.

Where might I work? When? For how long? How would I get there? What would I be doing? What qualifications must I have? What are the living conditions? Who pays for what?

Of all practical advertising media, only direct mail offers a sufficiently large canvas for telling such a complex story. The assignment was a writer's and designer's dream—a product that packages the nobility of all creation, addressed to prospects who are still hopeful about the human condition.

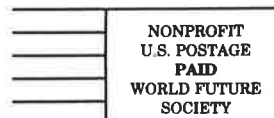
On the outer envelope of the *Futurist*, Tony Cornish promises to reveal "Social & Technological Forecasts for the Next 25 Years" and repeats the promise on the first page of his eight-page letter. Rather than pique your interest and leave you hanging, he delivers what is promised—plastic cars, the collapse of Japan, a NASA-designed aerospace vehicle that will carry passengers halfway around the world in two hours.

A feature of the letter worth noting is the list of directors going down the left margin of page 1. These are important people; many of their names and works will be known to the reader. The mere listing of their names is a powerful endorsement—the equivalent of a testimonial—for the product.

The World Future Society is a family affair. Edward Cornish is president; Jeff Cornish is business manager; Tony Cornish is in charge of circulation.

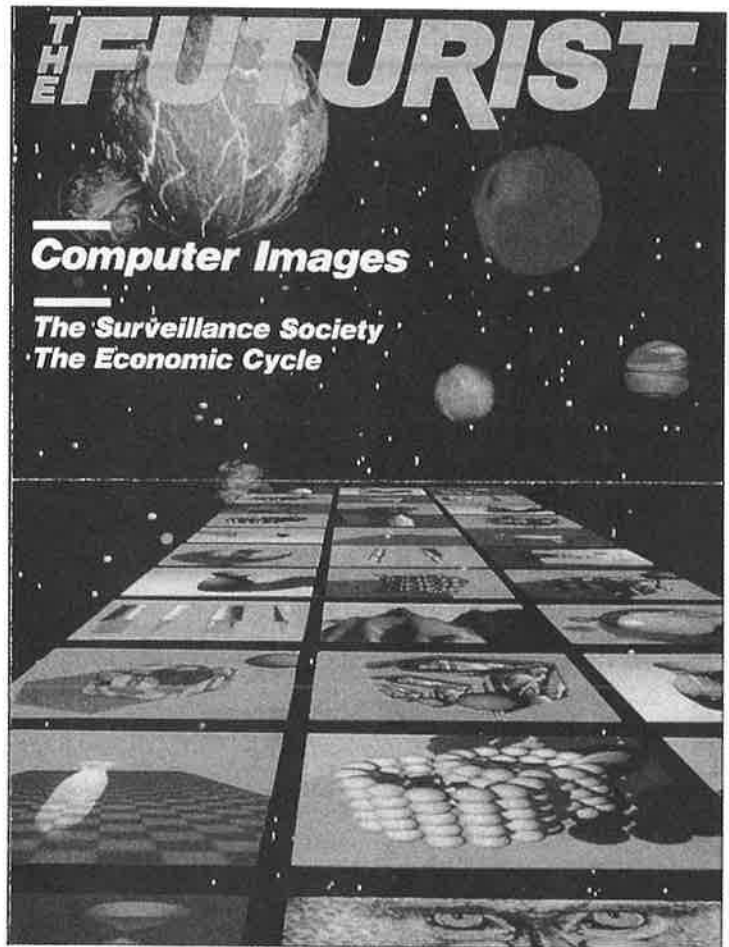

JEFF CORNISH:

My first note about our package is that we consider it a membership in the World Future Society rather than a subscription to the Futurist, and that change was important to the success of the package over our previous efforts.

The package was first mailed December 31, 1985. Our early efforts tested a discount price and the value of the color brochure. The discount lost—not even winning on percent response on most lists. The color brochure won. We later tested and added the lift note.

Though the carrier is a 6" × 9", we fold the letter to number 10. This began in the original test mailing when I received a call at home to tell me that the letters had accidentally been folded to number 10—could they go ahead and use them or would they have to reprint. I told them to go ahead and use them. We continued to have them folded number 10 for several years before finally testing it against 5 1/8" × 8 1/2". When we finally did, the number 10 fold provided an 8 percent lift—not necessarily significant, but we're still folding them number 10.

Our biggest blunder with the package was when we decided to update the forecasts and articles mentioned in the letter. We felt the changes were small and would not affect response, so on we went with a mailing scheduled for October 21, 1987. When the stock market crashed October 19th, we wondered if we should delay the mailing. With all the money spent already, we decided to go on with the scheduled drop date. A few weeks later I was looking at response

figures that were way off earlier mailings. Was it the Crash? Or was it the change in forecasts? It took several months to get a small test mailing together to test the new package against the old one. The revised forecasts were the primary culprit! Although the crash may also have depressed response. By the time we had another—our most responsive—mailing out, six months had passed. Lesson learned: Even if it seems like a minor change, test it!

I'm optimistic about the near-term future of the direct marketing industry. In any business, a period of success brings many marginal players in. The years 1987 and 1988 were great for response, so we all mailed more pieces to less responsive lists. It's no wonder response rates and profitability fell. (Postal rate increases certainly didn't help, either.) In the past two years, most of us have cut back on the number of pieces mailed and the weakest firms have folded. This should make room for solid increases in response rates and profits. Our 1991 response rates are up from 1990.

There will always be up and down markets, but, if we can deal with the public's concerns about privacy and the environment—which are more perception than reality—direct mail will last many more years.

TONY CORNISH:

considered to be the most significant forecasts for the next twenty-five years. Forecasts had worked well for many financial mailers and seemed a natural for this project.

Long letter. The letter copy was eight pages. The offer was cash-with-order only so we didn't want to leave any questions unanswered. (A bill-me option will probably be tested soon, per the results of your analysis.)

Pile on the benefits. I tried to bring out every feature and corresponding benefit that went along with membership from each department of the magazine to saving on book sales to the importance of helping to create a better future.

Enhance the offer. We created a new report to accompany this offer and added another report. These, along with the free book and other enhanced benefits, were combined into a "New Member Kit."

Add inexpensive premiums. World Future Society had used books as premiums for years. These anthologies of popular articles from the magazine were simple to produce, enhanced the offer, and provided a valuable introduction for new members.

Strong guarantee. Here our guarantee allowed new members to cancel if unsatisfied and keep everything we sent them; the magazines, free book, and reports. We used the lift memo basically to play up this guarantee as well as restate the basic proposition.

National Wildlife

The *National Wildlife* mailing is made up of four small main elements that all say pretty much the same thing. Whereas the *Earthwatch* copy platform is on the benefits of working in the field for the betterment of humanity—or of reading about it—Don O'Brien's offer focuses almost exclusively on the offer: six issues of a full-color magazine free when you pay for six issues of another. The offer is restated in the letter, the brochure, the lift piece, and on the order form, which is itself a kind of mini-brochure or lift piece.

Two interesting elements of the mailing are to be found on the back page of the brochure.

1. Brief mention is made of "Summit Vacations—in the Rockies, along the Pacific Coast, and in the Green Mountains of Vermont." This throwaway benefit here is what Jayme pinned the *Earthwatch* mailing to.
2. There is an order coupon on the circular *in addition to* the order form. Nancy Grady used this technique in her package for *Harper's* (Chapter 9). This follows the basic rule of direct marketing: "Make it as easy as possible to order."

If the regular order form is missing—or if it has been used to place an order—the extra order form on the back of the circular means the mailing package is still viable.

Incidentally, this effort is textbook correct in that it includes the address of the magazine on every single element; thus if a person happens to see just one single element and becomes interested, there is an address to write for further information.

The order form is an oddity in that it is personalized (the person's name and city appear in more than one place) for no apparent reason. The personalizing does not match the printed type, so it was obviously done by a computer—and a rather inept one at that. This is one of just four of the seventy-one Grand Controls that used personalization for the sake of personalizing.

The *National Wildlife* Grand Control was written by Donald D. O'Brien, a graduate of Emerson College, Boston, where he triple-majored in broadcasting, English, and speech. He worked on-air during the last two and a half years in college and then continued as a disk jockey for a few years after that. By learning how to "talk" as a radio person, O'Brien believes he was helped in his subsequent career. "Writing radio advertising is a great start for a direct mail professional—listen to some of the ads you like most and analyze them. You'll find they're similar in construction to the best direct marketing copy. (A secret has been revealed!)" O'Brien has also taught public speaking and writing for the business person; but his love is direct response writing.

The "We've doubled the value . . ." package has been one of a number of control packages I've written at the National Wildlife Federation over the past few years. As copy director there I wrote the various components, but cannot take total responsibility for the success it has enjoyed—as with any significant project in this business, it's the result of a team effort. Designers, list managers, and creative input from a variety of people made this package work initially, and keep it working today.

Let me start at the start.

The Federation's director of membership at the time this mailing was devised was Susan R. Hord, now retired. She and I, along with others in her department, wanted to increase the number of new-start members for the Federation (surprise). This would broaden the Federation's ability to show the values of nature to those who may not realize its worth (through our magazines and other educational materials), and develop renewal and contribution support later on. 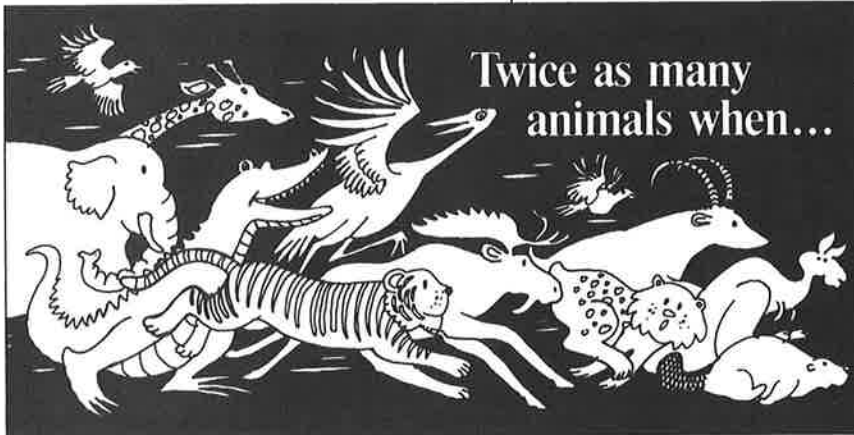

at NWF. Many of our mailings also gave the option to take the companion magazine, *International Wildlife* (IW), for an additional fee—but the combination was always offered at less than if a person bought both separately. (Thus, you could buy both at a saving, but the primary offer was for NW.)

As time and experience moved along, we'd occasionally test a premium for accepting a one-year membership. (We call them Bonus Gifts.) One of the best we ever used was the Rand McNally Road Atlas. This book was imprinted with our name, and the words "Members Edition." It was a natural—the Atlas had an extensive National Park Guide within it, along with information about natural areas and scenic spots along the way to almost any destination. New Members liked it . . . and we still use it from time to time.

But the best premium we ever devised surfaced at one of our copy meetings: money. And who can argue that? So, as this "value . . ." package clearly shows, you can get both NW and IW for the price of one.

But I didn't position this money saver in any of the time-tested, traditional ways: neither "Get 2 for the Price of 1" nor "Buy 1, Get 1 Free" seemed to tell the story from my point of view. Moreover, anyone can use lines like that. We wanted to be unique. We've doubled the value, and left the price alone said it best. No one had said it that way before. Plus, it tied up the money-saving opportunity directly to the worthwhile nature of the offer: membership.

The mailing beat our existing control (by a handsome margin), unfortunately unavailable for publication in your book! It continues to do so today. And while I keep trying to beat it (it doesn't look so great if you can't beat your own best effort after three or four years, does it?), so far no luck.

You asked for some personal comments on direct mail in general and "how you work."

I work best with the door closed, my Macintosh humming along, and research notes at hand. (By the way, research for me is a low-priority item. I need to know the offer and the product, of course, and have a profile of the person to whom the mailing is directed . . . but I rely on instinct, an understanding of human nature, and a monomaniacal love of unisyllabic words.)

I write very fast—but will often put off starting a project until the last day or so. During the interval from receipt of request for copy until I put finger to keyboard the project rolls around inside me. Sometimes I'll make a penciled note or two and stick it in the folder, but usually not. When the deadline is at

hand I put every other late job aside and plow ahead, finishing an entire mailing in a day or so. Then I'll let the thing sit unattended for twenty-four to forty-eight hours, then open it and read as if I'd never seen it before.

That's when the truth comes out. Is it clear? What is the offer? Am I interested at all? Did the "writer" follow the usual rules of clear, motivating, and persuasive copy? Do the various components hang together?

My reason for speed is twofold . . .

. . . first, I believe that if you know the product and offer well enough you ought to be able to tell someone quickly. If you had to say the mailing out loud, as if it was a radio commercial, could you do it in sixty seconds? If not, why? This is not to say that you should be able to read an entire package in a minute, but that you must be able to reduce the offer and major benefits into a tight bundle which most folk could follow and understand in a brief span of time.


. . . second, I can't write slowly! (Good reason, huh?) I save slow for editing, and I am a merciless editor of my own work. I rewrite somewhat, surely, but my major editing task is to physically arrange copy on a page (especially letters), and tighten the flow of words into a clean and swiftly understandable flow. I try to think as a designer does, being convinced that mechanical organization—both through the formatting of typography and the sequencing of words, sentences, paragraphs, and sidebars on a page or in a brochure—is an essential of persuasive direct marketing. It is a concept frequently bypassed by writers.

The old saying that "you've got only five seconds to capture a reader's attention" is true. So, putting a variety of attractive and interesting elements on a page increases the span from three seconds to ten to sixty . . . and to an order. So no matter where the eye falls, the arrangement and variety sitting there spark interest—which the words amplify at once.

The Nature Conservancy

One of the greatest direct mail writers is Frank H. Johnson, who is widely credited—falsely, he swears—with “inventing” the “Johnson Box,” the typewritten headline on the direct mail letter that is frequently surrounded by a rectangle made up of asterisks. But he admits he has often used lead-ins above a letter’s salutation that were sometimes boxed with lines or asterisks. “No one invents such doodles,” he says; “they just occur to most writers as we try to focus on the glazing eye of a reader in two seconds before we lose him.”

Johnson learned direct mail in twenty years at Time Inc., mostly doing promotion for *Fortune*, then joined American Heritage Publishing Co. as its founding promotion VP. He retired after another twenty years,

then freelanced for ten more, almost exclusively for so-called cultural products: the Metropolitan, Modern, and Guggenheim Museums; the Nature Conservancy, *Audubon*; plus Boardroom Reports.

FRANK JOHNSON:

For all fifty of those years, writing copy was snail-slow, grubby, worrisome, hard work. The brief fun came when the proofs had been read, color corrected, the presses were rolling. So for five minutes I'd look at it, realize I was a Successful Poet, feel great . . . then look again, and see two dozen idiotic errors.

Frank Johnson knows it's hopeless to deny birthing the box, but still would rather be remembered for the improbably successful package format he worked out in the early days of *American Heritage*, along with the then circulation director, famed Dick Benson, and art director Irwin Glusker (now art director of *Gourmet*), which they used to sell many tons of illustrated history books: a 6" × 9" color envelope, four-page letter, and 17" × 22" bedsheet full-color folder with two-color order form and business reply envelope. For some years it couldn't fail, despite its expense, and was imitated by everyone from Stuttman to Time-Life Books.

If Frank Johnson's copy has the same superb urbanity as Bill Jayme's, it's because Jayme is a Johnson protégé; both are among the most elegant and literate writers ever to work in direct mail, as well as two of the best conversationalists.

Johnson acquired the Nature Conservancy as a client after his long-time friend Thomas Beers retired as VP and circulation director of *National Geographic*. Beers began advising the Nature Conservancy on direct mail, and brought Johnson in as a writer. The "Crane Package" (figs. 11.29–11.32) became the control for four years, 1982–86. For a couple of years it was displaced by a Webcraft effort. In 1991 it was retested and promptly became the control again, which it continues to be as of this writing.

Besides pulling well, the Crane letter has had a rare ability to inspire fan mail. Thousands of notes, from scrawled order forms to engraved stationery, have expressed amazement and joy that this "junk mail" letter was thoroughly read *and* enjoyed.

Johnson admits he loves fan mail, but regrets that no one has yet noted, in writing, what he considers the only truly original line in the letter, its last, which he added to comply with a legally required notice about where to send for a financial report. It turns a dull legality into a promotional plus by saying, "If you like to read financial statements, this one is a beauty. We're rather vain about it. Do ask."

The 4-page letter, printed on an 11" × 17" sheet of paper. Only the leaf in the Nature Conservancy letterhead is printed in a second color—green. We saw this very restrained use of a second color in Heikki Ratalahti's letter for *Earthwatch*.

Dear Investor:

The bug-eyed bird on our envelope who's ogling you with such dis-temper has a point. He's a native American sandhill crane and you may be sitting on top of one of his nesting sites.

As he sees it, every time our human species has drained a marsh, and plowed it or built a city on it, since 1492 or so -- there went the neighborhood. It's enough to make you both a bit edgy.

So give us \$10 for his nest egg and we'll see that a nice, soggy spot -- just the kind he and his mate used to fashion a nest and put an egg in it -- is reserved for the two of them, undisturbed, for keeps. Only \$10. (Watch those cranes come in to land, just once, and you're paid back. Catches at your throat.) Then the cranes can relax, and so can you. A bit.

How will we reserve that incubator with your \$10? Not by campaigning or picketing or suing.

We'll just BUY the nesting ground.

That's the unique and expensive and effective way The Nature Conservancy goes about its non-profit business. We're as dead serious about hanging on to nature's precarious balance as the more visible and vocal conservation groups. But our thing is to let money do our talking.

And we buy a whopping lot of land: starting with 60 acres of New York's Mianus River Gorge in 1951 (now 395 acres), we have protected over 2,200,000 acres -- about the area of Rhode Island and Delaware combined. The plots are spotted coast to coast and from Canada deep into the Caribbean, 3,469 of them sized from a quarter of an acre to hundreds of square miles.

All of it is prime real estate, if you're a crane or a bass or a sweet pepperbush or a redwood. Or a toad or a turtle. And a lot of

states, cities, universities, other conservation groups -- any responsible organization which wants and loves the land so much that it doesn't mind our clever lawyers making it very difficult for anyone to "improve" any part of it, ever. Unless the someone can build nests or eat acorns.

That cash flow replenishes our revolving fund, every dime of which is plowed into the unpaid and as yet unplowed. All this activity generates a lot of fascinating true stories, and lovely photos. These we put into a small (32 pages) but elegant, sprightly and adless magazine, our report to our 245,000 members every other month: The Nature Conservancy News.

Here you may find that the land you and the rest of us have just bought is harboring a four-lined skink, or a spicebush, or boreal chickadee, or kame and kettle topography. You've a lot to learn and see that's most intriguing, as you'll discover.

The Nature Conservancy News also describes well-led tours of our various properties, tells you what we're doing in your state, and shows you how you can help and have some healthy fun at the same time.

You see, the millions of acres we own are mostly watched over by volunteer stewards -- wonderful men and women who are proud to show off their lovely charges. These likely include bats, salamanders, toadstools and such. Or cranes. You'll be invited to Nature Conservancy chapter meetings nearest you.

And if you paste the complimentary white-oak-leaf sticker we've enclosed with this letter on your busstop, backpack, boat, hang glider, pool, bicycle, wheelchair ... wherever, you'll attract grateful grins from your fellow cognoscenti.

Now, you may think it's disproportionate to brag about how we're raising millions for our projects and then ask you for only \$10. Who needs you?

We need YOU, very much! Those hard-headed foundations and corporations and ranch owners and such who give us money or property must be convinced that our ranks include a lot of intelligent, concerned, articulate citizens: people who know we ought to let nature alone to tend to much of this finite earth and all its creatures ... if we're to be among the creatures.

Yes, we need you and your ear and your voice -- and your \$10 (\$10 times 245,000 members buys a lot of acres.) Please join us today, like so: Get a pen. Check and initial the "membership application" form that

it's nice for people, too -- lovely deserts, mountains, prairies, islands. (Islands! We own huge Santa Cruz off the California shore, and tiny Dove Island in Lake George, and most of the Virginia Barrier Islands, and dozens more.)

So besides being after your \$10, we invite you to see a sample of our lands. We have 38 chapters in 32 states. Check your phone book. If we're not there yet, call me at (703) 841-5388. We'll guide you and yours to a nearby preserve where you're most welcome to walk along one of our paths, sit on one of our log benches, look about, and say to the youngster we hope will be with you, "This will be here, as is, for your grandchildren." Nice feeling.

We do ask that you don't bother the natives. E.g., there's a sign in one preserve that says "Battlessnakes, Scorpions, Black Bear, Poison Oak/ARE PROTECTED/DO NOT HARM OR DISTURB." For \$10, you're privileged not to disturb a bear or stroke a poison oak. Bargain.

Bargains in diverse real estate are what we look for and find. Not just any real estate. We've been working for years to make and keep a huge ongoing inventory of the "natural elements" in each of the United States (so far, 35 are done). These "State Natural Heritage Programs" identify what's unique, what's threatened, what's rare or a rare natural sight to see in each state: animals, birds, plants, bugs, lakes, river systems, swamps, waterfalls, woods ... and cranes' nests.

Then we try to acquire those places that desperately need protection and preservation. We think big. The Richard King Mellon Foundation has given us the largest single grant ever for private conservation: \$25,000,000 -- if we can match that sum in other gifts by 1988. We will, believe us.

The revolving fund this will give us can protect outstanding examples of threatened aquatic and wetland systems, from Augusta to Actu. We're well along already, copying some of our recent successes.

For example, Elder Creek in northern California is safe, sleep well tonight; so is the winter habitat of the gentle, pudgy manatee in Crystal River, Florida; and we (and you, soon, for \$10) own the whole Canale Hills cienega in Arizona. (We're impressed if you already know a cienega is a desert spring marsh.)

But we don't just shovel cash at these projects. We buy some lands, trade for others, get leases and easements, ask to be mentioned in wills. Then we give or, preferably, sell up to 40 percent of what we buy to

If putting a landing pad under a crane's egg, as Mr. Coda's letter urges, seems too dank an investment for your \$15, there are plenty more flora and fauna that can use all the acreage we can buy for them. Because right now, they're losing ground.

Please help, by joining us today. There's reason to hurry. At least one of the world's five to ten million species is dying out every day, and soon it will be one an hour, and then when will it be our turn? We simply don't know.

Nor do we know, any of us (yet), just how our lives and survival may rely on the survival of hackberry trees and piping plovers, Indiana bats, wild orchids, golden-cheeked warblers, needle-and-thread grass, an insignificant little fish called the Panaca Big Spring spinedace (*Lepidomeda mollispinis pratensis*), or most of the thousands of other rare living things now thriving on the lands the Conservancy cares for.

But you and I both know we must treasure that diversity of nature -- and we're losing time. If enough of us get together, fast, maybe we can gain it back. The Nature Conservancy -- as you'll learn when you read our magazine and talk to any of our people -- is doing an intelligent, large-scale job of identifying and locating threatened species, as well as protecting the lands and waters they occupy.

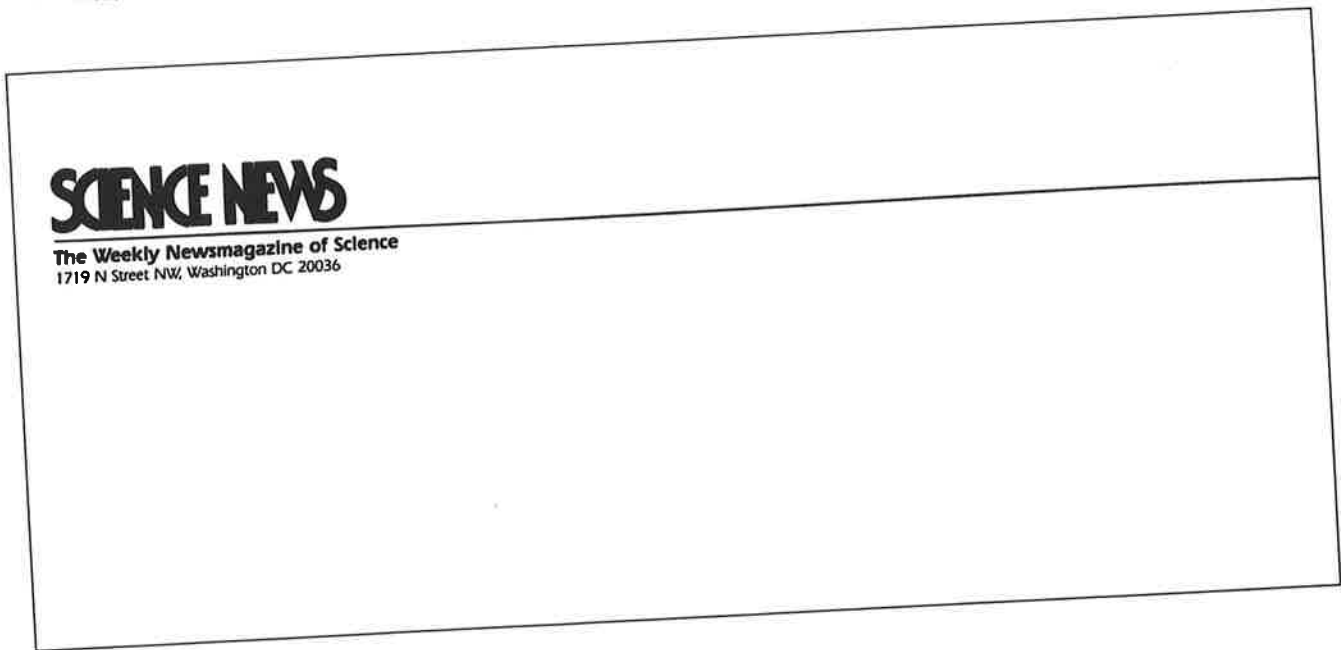

The stub of the order card is an "Interim Membership" card that—unlike those of *Audubon* and the BMG compact disk clubs in Chapter 15—is not personalized. The order card is only half as tall as the envelope. With a small order card in a big envelope, there would appear to be danger that the card might float around inside to the point where the name and address won't show through the window, making the entire piece undeliverable. This does not happen. Once inserted, the card stays in place. However, for the half-size card to be inserted, a *bottom flap envelope* is preferable, which this one is.

Science News

Freelancer Tom McCormick's Grand Control for *Science News* breaks so many rules of direct mail that it's a wonder the rules exist at all. In an era of the comp copy or free issue offer, *Science News* asks for \$1. As Tom McCormick said, "The offer was my idea; I wanted to get rid of the tire kickers." The offer is highlighted in the Johnson Box area of the letter and on the order form.

Testimonials should be an integral part of every direct mail effort; however, it is extremely rare to see them take up most of the front page of a letter. Malcolm Decker calls the letter "the main salesman," and salesmen talk directly to *you*. Testimonials, traditionally, are more the province of the "demonstrator"—a piece of the brochure or a separate lift piece that reinforces everything the main salesman has said in the letter.

The second color on the outer envelope, letter, and order card is purple-lavender. Traditional direct mail practice suggests that if the second color on a letter is blue, then the signature at the end can be blue to simulate blue ink. If the second color is red or green, the signature should be in black, because nobody signs letters in red or green (unless it's a Christmas mailing); putting an oddly colored signature depersonalizes a letter, because it is jarringly obvious that the signer was a printing press. In the case of this *Science News* letter, the signature is in lavender.

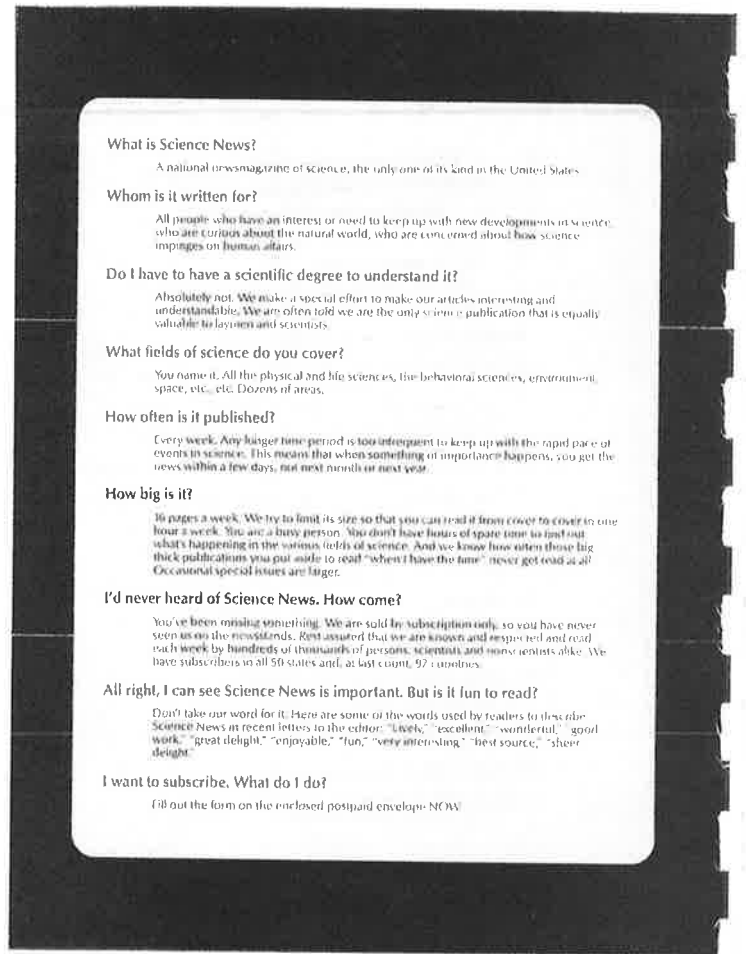
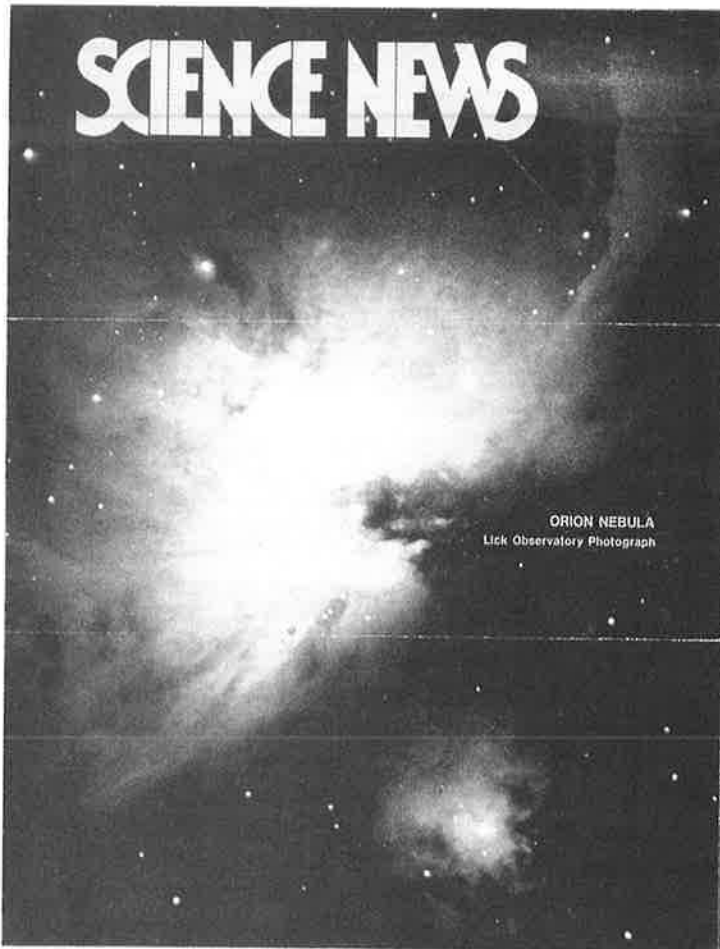

The 4-page letter, printed on an 11" x 17" sheet, folded 3 times.




The brochure, printed 4 colors over 1 color on a single 8½" × 11" coated sheet.

The brochure is a simple, undated cover of the publication—a handsome four-color photograph of an exploding heavenly body deep in black space. The back of the brochure is printed in one color (black) with a funeral border that resembles a giant mass card. Direct mail tradition says to stay away from black.

The order form breaks three rules:

1. Most direct mail designers will use sans serif type in headlines, but avoid it in body copy; it is the most difficult type of all to read.
2. Responders are encouraged to put a \$1 bill into the business reply envelope. Everyone—from the Postal Service to the overwhelming majority of direct marketers—urges mailers *not to ask for cash*; it can be pilfered.
3. There are no clear instructions to detach the stub and no clear perf marks. More to the point, traditional direct mail designers will never allow a perforation to cut through an object because people instinctively don't like to destroy things. In this case, to detach the stub, you have to tear through the picture of the envelope and the \$1 bill. According to all the old rules of direct mail, this will inhibit ordering.

Notwithstanding, this effort has been control for seven years. Just as contrarian investing can pay off big, so can contrarian direct mail copy and design.

Tom McCormick has been a freelancer for twelve years with clients that include *Smithsonian* magazine, *Kiplinger's Personal Finance*, the Nature Conservancy, *Harrowsmith Country Life*, American Diabetes Association, *Nation's Business*, and National Arbor Day Foundation.

TOM MCCORMICK:

When I was assigned to do a package by this client, they had tried comp offers and gotten poor results. Seems that up-front pull was okay, but the conversion to first-year paid was pretty dismal.

As I recall, the mailings they'd been using weren't too specific about what Science News actually was. And I think that many recipients imagined it to be more along the lines of, say, Popular Science. Given the foregoing, and the actual nature of the publication, the client inevitably wound up with lots of uninterested comp-offer takers—and not enough qualified respondents.

My answer to the problem was copy focusing on the true benefits of Science News (a weekly digest of news and noteworthy events in the sciences that's an honestly fast, intriguing "read"—IF you have more than a passing interest in the subject area), topped off by the \$1 offer and followed by heavyweight testimonials.

Rationale? It was my expectation that the \$1-for-4-issue offer (now 12 issues) would accomplish two things. First, it would cut down on the idle curious free-takers. Second, it would help convey a well-deserved perception of value to a weekly "magazine" that consisted of just sixteen pages.

The purpose of putting those testimonials on page 1 of the letter was to reinforce that intended perception, real fast!

After that, everything depended on the support and continued judicious list selection of Science News's business/circulation manager, Don Harless. With rare understanding, this very able professional recognized immediately what I was doing, and delivered beautifully on his end—standing firmly behind what is, admittedly, a highly unorthodox mailing.

But as history and subsequent testing continue to show, it sometimes takes an unconventional approach to sell an unconventional product.

There are, of course, other areas where my Science News mailing strays, perhaps unnecessarily, from traditional direct mail formulae. On the order form, for example, the hand-dollar-envelope illustration protrudes out of the stub and into the actual form. After almost nixing the original design, I decided that since we already had a thoroughly maverick package going, that eye-grabbing illustration at the "decision point" could only help to support my primary objectives. So caution was thrown to the wind.

On other matters such as colors and typefaces, the package has been reproduced with minor alterations so often that I can no longer recall what the original looked like. I suspect, however, that it hasn't changed much.

Like Jim Punkre's letter for *Organic Gardening*, this subscription package by Laurence Jaeger also uses an illustrated letter that acts as a combination letter-circular.

Laurence Jaeger has worked in mail promotion for nearly forty years, twenty-five of which were spent as a freelancer. He has specialized in the concoction of space advertising and mail package for, mainly, books, book clubs, periodicals, and various kinds of subscriptions.

LAURENCE JAEGER:

What I like most, and do best, are high-type offerings: things that flatter the intellect, appeal to our inflated notions of our own taste, cultivation, or aesthetic sense, or serve the needs of tony professional people.

How I work: I start every job by asking myself (as though I were my prospect), "Why on earth should I want this anyway? What will it do for me?" Then every word I write is an answer to those questions.

By the way, if you're going to reproduce any of that package for the American Spectator, do know that I am probably the only one who has the original, authentic, unaltered version from which all subsequent mailings have, inevitably, had to depart because of topicality.

Ron Burr, publisher of the *American Spectator*, has a B.A. in government and economics and an M.B.A. in finance, both from Indiana University. He has been with the *American Spectator* since its founding as an off-campus student publication in 1967. He is also a director of Lemley, Yarling Investment Company in Chicago.

RON BURR:

First, in advertising one should not be timid about describing the product, even if it means lengthy copy. Potential buyers want to know as much as possible about a product and they will read copy.

Accurate description, without exaggeration, is also important. At the Spectator, we are interested in repeat business and we want readers to make the right decision when making their initial purchase. We seek new subscribers who will enjoy the magazine enough to renew. As you know, because advertising expenses are usually quite high, it is difficult to make money in direct mail on initial orders. But once customers are found, advertising costs are much lower and repeat orders are profitable.

Our business relies heavily on repeat business, and our new-subscriber prospect campaign is based on the amount of money we can invest to obtain a new subscriber, taking repeat orders into account. Because we are purchasing future cash flow, the cost of obtaining a new subscriber can exceed the amount of revenue initially received. To determine how much money we can spend to obtain a new subscriber we calculate how much money an average subscriber generates from renewals over a five-year period, discount the cash flow for time and risk, and arrive with an amount we can spend to obtain a new subscriber.

It is the same calculation corporate treasurers use when deciding if a capital investment in a machine is warranted, only instead of purchasing a machine to produce cash flow, we are purchasing customers who produce cash flow.

"To relieve the sorrow of the October 17 quake chore was the arrival of CBS's Mr. Can Rather, who again demonstrated in his inimitable way that insanity can be vastly entertaining. Initially, he covered the story from a nervous perspective; his demeanor arrested to the point of near-syncope, his coupes evry, his raiment suggestive of the haberdashery sold in the menagerie section of a large drugstore—an obvious clip-on tie attached to his wash-and-wear shirt. Then he donned military attire and stood in the open air, betraying ludicrous Schadenfreude while murmuring dire prognostications. It is possible that Mr. Rather wore clip-on ties in response to doctors' orders to keep his hands away from his throat. Mr. Rather returned to New York without further incident."

Hence primitivity is an interpretation imposed upon cultures, and by means of which we immediately place ourselves in a special relationship with their members, wholly different from that in which we stand to other cultures or so characterized...we encounter ourselves, as we must have been had it not been for the benefits or discounts of civilization."

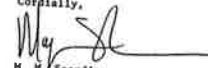

Beth Maher, vice president of circulation and marketing for the *Economist*, is a thoroughgoing professional who knows how to buy copy and how to get the best out of a copywriter. Before signing on with the *Economist*, she worked for *New York*, *Esquire*, and *Prime Time*.

From an interview with Beth Maher:

When we hired Ken Scheck to create this package, it was obvious at the outset that he had an immediate and absolute understanding of the Economist and what our ideas were on how to market it. We were trying to find American subscribers for a then relatively unknown British publication—a newsweekly international in scope with an audience difficult to target.

When the package was written, we changed maybe one or two words at most. His copy perfectly described the product and reached out to and for the audience. Our instincts were right; Ken's package has been the Economist's control for eleven years.

The original package had a 6" × 9" outer envelope that was positively revolutionary at the time—so revolutionary that other magazines instantly started copying it. As a result, Ken's original envelope got tired very quickly.

So we decided to go with the plain #10 window envelope. Over the years we've tested other envelopes, but this version keeps coming up a winner.

People often ask about finding and hiring copywriters. There's no mystery about it. I hear of someone . . . or see a package that impresses me and find out through the grapevine who did it . . . and I call the person up. I ask for samples of prior packages. If I like what I see, then we talk, either in person or by phone. If the writer seems to understand what we have in mind and wants to tackle the assignment, I give out the assignment.

Generally I like to know the overall approach the writer has in mind, so that we are in sync about the objectives. Then I give the writer free rein.

Some writers submit finished copy and artist's comprehensives that are so beautiful that they look like the finished package. I don't need that. I'm happy with copy and thumbnails. I can visualize what the package will look like. The important thing is the words. Do they flow? Does the letter sell?

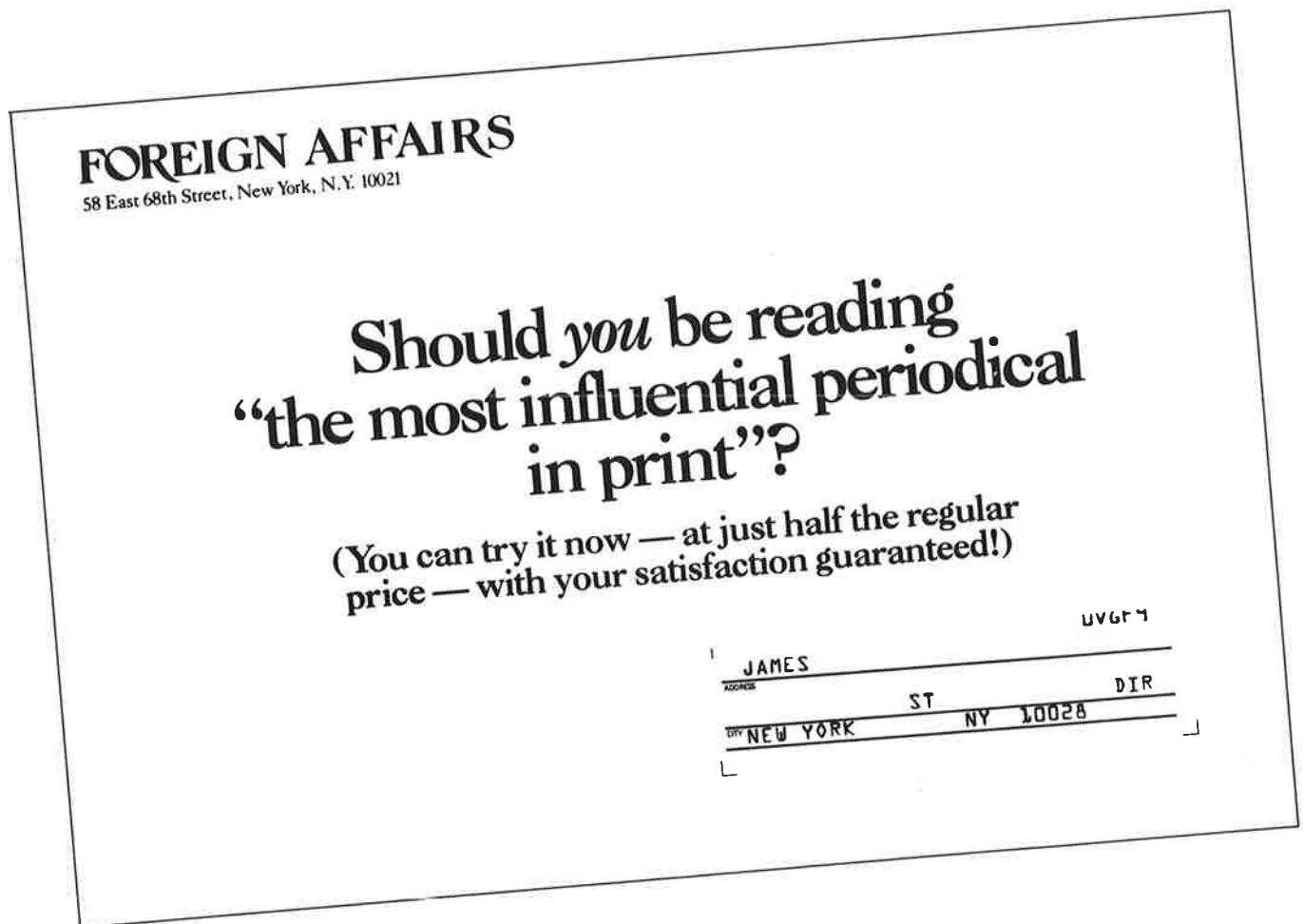
I don't like to make copy changes. Editors and publishers love to change copy, but I believe that's the worst thing that can happen to direct mail copy; it's downhill from there. You'll never stop publishers and editors from taking the punch out of copy, but I think you're always much better off going with what the writer has done. After all, direct mail writers have real marketing sense; editorial people do not.

In getting a writer to make changes, I don't say: "Change this; this is the way I want it." I find it's better if there's a disagreement to say, "I'm looking at this and this from a certain perspective and this is what I get out of it, and I don't think this is what either of us has in mind, is it? Could you take another crack at it?"

One other thing I've learned: if the writer comes back a second time and it's still not quite right, the writer will never get it. It's not worth spending any more time on.

Foreign Affairs

Whereas Ken Scheck's *Economist* effort appeals to the snob in all of us, Len Berkowe is the ultimate name dropper, banging home the unrivaled credentials of *Foreign Affairs*. On the outer envelope he calls it "the most influential periodical in print" and backs up his claim in the Johnson Box of the letter.

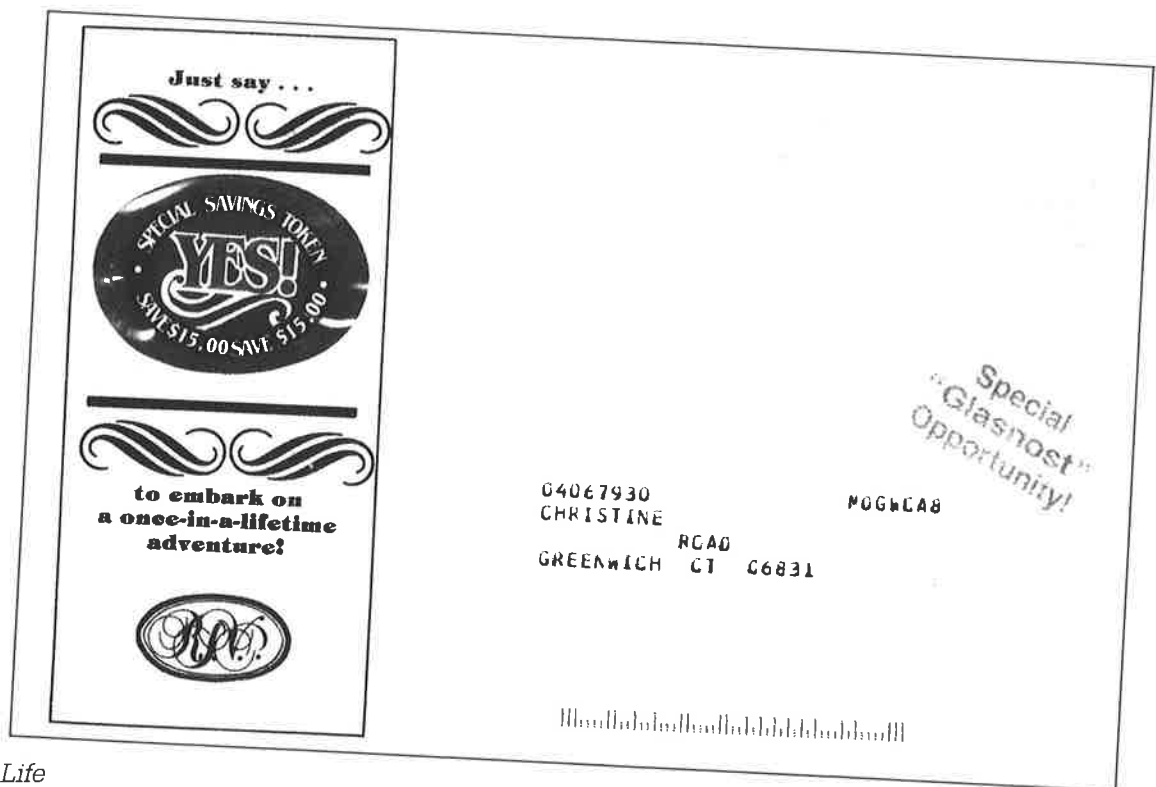
A number of the mailings described so far have tokens or action devices. Among them: *Audubon* and *Bon Appétit*.

The token in direct mail was first conceived by Walter Weintz, the dynamic postwar circulation director of *Reader's Digest*. He describes his first use of it, in his book *The Solid Gold Mailbox*:

By 1955 my circulation department had expanded considerably, and I was becoming more of an administrator and less of a copywriter. I had even acquired a copywriter, Marie Hill, who helped with both Digest and condensed book promotions, and helped me puzzle over new ways to get attention.

One morning Marie came into my office with a fundraising mailing someone had sent her for some worthy charitable cause. The mailing had a shiny new penny in it—"for luck," as the accompanying letter said. And Marie suggested that we should try out a penny in our Digest mailings.

Sticking a penny in a mailing just to get attention seemed a weak crutch to me. But it suddenly occurred to me that in my search for new attention-getting

gimmicks, like savings stamps and plastic coins, I had gradually gotten away from the basic thing I was trying to sell: the rewards a reader would enjoy from a subscription to Reader's Digest. I had gotten away from the basic story of what a wonderful magazine the Reader's Digest was—the story told in the old Persian Poet letter.

That letter carried Reader's Digest circulation up from next to nothing to a circulation of more than five million. And the letter started out:

If thou hast two pennies...

The trouble with the old Persian Poet mailing was that it did not dramatize the offer with a physical object. The offer was there but you had to read the copy, and the communication of ideas through the written word is always difficult. The obvious wedding of Persian Poet and pennies came in an instant flash. I fished out the old Persian Poet letter and modified it slightly. I put together a mailing with two bright, shiny pennies showing through a second window in an envelope. And the copy on the envelope said: "If thou hast two pennies . . ."

On the letter inside, I went on: "Keep one penny for bread," I said. "Or for luck. Send back the other penny as a down payment on a subscription to the Reader's Digest—a penny to seal the bargain! You'll get 8 months (a \$2 value) for \$1.01. You'll save 99 cents. So the penny is worth 99 cents to you, if you use it now. We'll bill you for the balance of \$1.00."

We tested this mailing in 1955. The test was extremely successful. It increased returns from about 6 to over 9 percent.

Probably the greatest practitioner of the use of the token in direct mail today is Tony Arau. He is to the token what Charles Goren was to contract bridge. Arau was copy and creative director of the *Reader's Digest Book & Record Division* for five years before going on his own in 1962. He is president of Arau Associates in Valley Forge, Pennsylvania. In 1985 I asked Arau to jot down some thoughts on the concept of the order token in direct mail for *Who's Mailing What!*

TONY ARAU:

In the beginning was the penny. And Walter Weintz saw that the penny was good and said, hey, let's put a penny or two on all Reader's Digest mailings. And so it came to pass, and all over America people received lucky pennies ("Here's your change—in advance!") from the kindly folks in Pleasantville.

And then came the "advanced" token, and knocked the penny on its ear. And Walter Weintz saw that that was pretty good, too, and he said, by jingo, we may be on to something here! And so it, too, came to pass. And for the next several years a few million fortunate Americans received more plastic savings tokens—"Yes" tokens, "Yes" and "No" tokens, cardboard book tokens of all sizes, shapes, colors, and materials—than even Walter Weintz would care to shake a stick at. And Walter shook a stick at more than a few.

And then came the Reader's Digest Sweepstakes and knocked the token on its ear—at least in Pleasantville.

But the token showed incredible stamina, and outside the ivy-covered walls at Pleasantville, the "age of the token" really hit its stride. And proved its viability as a marketing tool in situations far removed from the Digest.

Sometimes marketers "disguised" tokens—as a "Credit Card" for TV Guide and an "RSVP Card" for Better Homes & Gardens in the early sixties. But they were still action devices. Still tokens. Some personalized, some numbered, some not.

We devised computer-personalized punch-out "Yes" and "No" tokens for McCall's and Redbook in the early sixties. And a computer-numbered Sweepstakes "Key" token for the Saturday Evening Post after that. And even a quietly elegant "seahorse" token for the Atlantic Monthly . . . and a tongue-in-cheek punch-out "Armed Robbery" token for True . . . and a "Passport" token for Time-Life Books.

And many, many more.

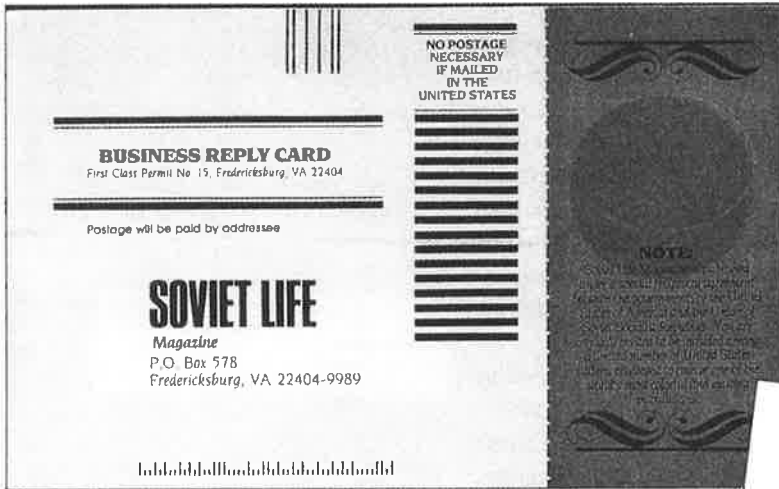

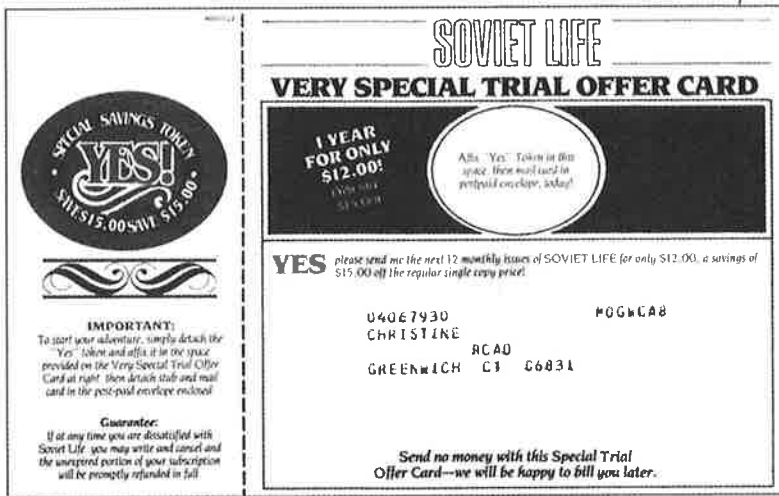

There were Savings Tokens, of course, and Discount Tokens, Free Book Tokens, Special Privilege Tokens, Guarantee Tokens, First Edition Tokens, Validation Tokens, Extra Bonus Tokens, Bonus Gift Tokens, and even "Maybe" Tokens. At least twenty-eight different flavors in all.

Initially, we tested a tip-on gold-foil "Mickey Mouse" token for Mondadori—and got the highest response they've ever had on a book promotion. In France, we developed computer-personalized "Oui" and "Non" tokens for L'Express, the French news magazine—and achieved startling results. The potential of the token, the most versatile of direct action devices, seemed limited only by copywriters' and creative directors' fertile imaginations.

In the mid-seventies, the popularity and use of the token began to decline—a decline that has continued until the present time. Yet the decline seems due more to creative exhaustion or indifference than to any falling off of response or appeal. We discovered early on that a well-conceived and executed action device—plain and simple token or thinly disguised token—can usually outpull nearly identical mailing pieces without them. The token is, in fact, quite alive, very well, and flourishing in places where they take direct mail seriously—and measure response carefully.

When we helped to launch Smithsonian books, we were at first hesitant to use tokens or action devices of any kind, not because we thought they wouldn't work, but because of our concern that both readers of Smithsonian magazine, and members of Congress—who act as watchdogs over the activities of the

quasi-public Smithsonian Institution—might object to their use as “too commercial.” We couldn’t have been more wrong. On our third Smithsonian book promotion, offering a book on the National Zoo, we tried a rather charming pen-and-ink “Panda” token—and results were spectacular. Because the token was executed tastefully, and because it was appropriate to the marketing situation, it worked and worked well. Later, we even developed a four-color “Johann Sebastian Bach” token for Smithsonian’s nine-record album of Bach’s music (the rest of the mailing piece was executed in two colors only)—and achieved another lively success. Since then, tokens of one kind or another have been the mainstay of most Smithsonian book promotions.

As the Ubiquitous Sweepstakes, the plastic insurance card, and ever more sophisticated computer formats have come to dominate the direct mail scene in the late seventies and early eighties, the humble token seems to be more and more relegated to the back seat. Worse still, when tokens are used nowadays, concept, design, and execution are usually painfully uninspired—there are probably more totally boring, tacky, and tedious tokens in the mail than ever before. And that’s a pity, because it needn’t be that way.

In recent years we’ve developed highly successful ink-jet personalized tokens for L’Express and both Free Gift “Scuba Diver” tokens and ink-jet personalized “Membership Card” tokens for the International Oceanographic Foundation.

Take a look at Walter Weintz’s winning Sweepstakes mailing piece for Great American magazines. The action device is a thin, plastic, numbered, and personalized “Verification Card”—that you keep. A variation on the insurance card. But, essentially, it’s still a special kind of action device. A kind of token, if you will.

Our current control piece for Soviet Life, the U.S./U.S.S.R. cultural exchange magazine, is a brisk and colorful “Yes” token—it outpulled the previous control by better than 100 percent. And our first two renewal efforts for Soviet Life utilized a “Da!” token!

Of course, tokens and action devices don’t always work, aren’t always appropriate, sometimes shouldn’t be used—and used inappropriately they can even decrease response. For example, in the late 1960s we did a mailing for Holiday magazine. Figuring that if a penny worked well, an actual Austrian 5-groschen coin would work better. Ah but alas, it seems people kept the coin as a souvenir and threw the order card away; twenty years later we’re still waiting for our first response.

The truth is, the token is not only NOT dead, it’s not even slightly wounded. Action devices still work. And can be made to work better than ever—by utilizing them to work in harmony with all the exciting new technical developments available to us today. All that’s required, after all, is imagination, creativity, and sound marketing know-how. And a sense of taste and appropriateness sometimes helps, too. That’s all. It doesn’t seem too much to ask.

Starting from Scratch: The Launch of a Magazine

One of the tidiest assignments a writer-designer team can have is to be hired to create a new subscriber package for a magazine. Here is the background material a seasoned professional will ask for:

1. *A full year of issues*

2. *A media kit*

This is the material sent out by the sales reps to potential advertisers. The media kit tells you how the people at the magazine describe it to outsiders—in effect, how they see themselves.

Every now and then a copywriter will read through back issues and form an opinion of what the magazine is all about, only to discover that the people who created the media kit see it as something completely different. When this happens, the writing assignment can turn out to be difficult—if not impossible. You may want to consider turning down the assignment; otherwise, you could find yourself in snarling fights and with horrendous revision problems.

An example. I used to be a subscriber to the *Economist*. It was (and is) a British weekly magazine that does what *Time*, *Newsweek*, and *U.S. News & World Report* do, but without any of the flash and dynamic graphics. International coverage is far more detailed and there are no gossip or people features. Where the writing in its American counterparts has been purposely dumbed down over the years until it is currently at about the fifth- or sixth-grade level so as to appeal to the widest possible audience, the *Economist's* prose is dense, almost scholarly.

Curiously, the folks at the *Economist* see themselves as direct competitors of *Forbes*, *Fortune*, and *Business Week*. When I first started publishing *Who's Mailing What!* Beth Maher, the *Economist's* circulation director, refused to subscribe until I would agree to list her publication with business and financial magazines rather than with the newsweeklies. (I refused and she subscribed anyway.)

3. *The four bestselling newsstand covers*

Magazines sell at newsstands because of the power of the cover. If a direct mail package contains a brochure that shows covers of the magazine, it makes sense to use those covers that have proved their effectiveness by evoking the most response on the newsstand.

4. *A sample of the current control mailings*

5. *Samples of past mailings that have worked*

6. *Samples of past mailings that have bombed*

7. *A list of lists*

(the people to whom you will be writing)

With these elements in hand, a copywriter has just about everything needed to create a direct mail subscription package. The job of the writer is to get to know everything about the magazine—and its many features—and then *turn those features into benefits* to the person opening the mailing.

For example, a feature of *Gourmet* might be bread recipes from the greatest bakeries in the world. The *benefits* of such a feature: “Forget all your cares and woes as you have the satisfaction of kneading this wonderful dough, watching it rise like magic, and then getting out all your aggressions by punching it down again. . . .” “Imagine the heavenly smells coming out of your kitchen as you create magnificent bread for a fraction of what Parisians gladly pay. . . .” “Your friends and family will be dazzled—not only by the buttery, melt-in-your-mouth taste, but with your culinary wizardry. . . .”

When the Magazine Does Not Yet Exist

What is a copywriter to do when there are *no* issues in print and when, in fact, the magazine exists only inside the heads of a publisher and an editor? There might be an editorial policy statement, a list of possible articles and features, perhaps a dummy cover, and maybe a dummy spread or two. But not much more.

The challenge: turn that amorphous nothing into a living, breathing magazine. Create a mailing that makes the magazine seem so real, so important, and so full of benefits that anyone who opens the envelope not only believes it really exists, but *has to have it* (or at least send for a free issue under the no-risk trial offer).

The copywriter's job in a start-up situation is infinitely more complex than creating a package for an existing magazine. First, the copywriter must get inside the heads of the people who will be receiving the mailing and *become those people*; the next step is to figure out exactly what they want and then come up with a string of benefits based not on an existing magazine, but—on the vague hopes and dreams of the publisher and editor. And all the while the writer has to be inside the heads of the publisher and editor so as not to stray too far from what they have in mind.

Bill Jayme, probably the best-known freelancer in the world, has created a slew of winning packages over the years for nonexistent magazines. Because of his reputation, Jayme's clients do what he tells them to do. The features, the article titles, the benefits, and the look and feel of the magazine—all are as much Jayme's (and that of his enormously gifted partner, designer Heikki Ratalahti) as the editor's and publisher's.

Frequently, the launch process can be a mine field. Remember, the copy and artist's comprehensives may be the first time the publisher and editor have actually "seen" their magazine in the flesh. A typical reaction: "This isn't my magazine."

"Why isn't it?" the writer will ask.

"I don't know. This just isn't the magazine."

"Could you be specific?"

The publisher glances through the copy. "For example, I never said this."

"Actually you did. Here are my notes from the interview."

"Well, that's not what I meant."

"What did you mean?"

"I don't know. All I know is that this isn't my magazine."

For writer and publisher alike, the encounter can be a nightmare.

I remember once the founding publisher of *Working Woman*, Beatrice Buckler, had an idea for a magazine for older women. Buckler and her consultant, Paul Goldberg, hired renowned freelancer Linda Wells to write the launch package. Wells submitted copy and design and Buckler was totally dissatisfied. The mailing package did not reflect what she had in mind. Suddenly two very strong-willed people had different ideas as to what this magazine was to be.

Wells met with Buckler, who gave her a line-by-line critique. Wells then went away, incorporated all of Buckler's changes, and resubmitted the copy. It was rejected as being more wrong than the original version.

Consultant Paul Goldberg asked me to read the copy and critique it; in my opinion, it was weak. I asked to see Wells's original version, and it bowled me over. It was powerful, energetic, filled with marvelous imagery and benefits. It was as brilliant a direct mail effort as I had ever read. But it was Buckler's magazine, not Wells's.

I knew immediately what had happened. Wells had attacked this challenge with gusto, enthusiasm, and love, putting the very core of her being into it. When Buckler started nitpicking it to death, it was like a kick in the stomach to Wells, who probably lost enthusiasm, simply typed in Buckler's changes, and went on to other work.

Neither of Wells's versions was ever mailed; the magazine never got off the ground.

In 1987 three different mailing packages were mailed to launch a magazine for older women. All three packages had a lift letter from Frances Lear that started:

Dear Friend:

Five years ago, on a brilliantly sunny day in October, I left Los Angeles and a 28-year marriage to the television producer, Norman Lear.

I landed in New York, my hometown as a young woman, with two suitcases of the only clothes I really wore and a few sheets of paper on which I had scribbled an idea for a magazine. 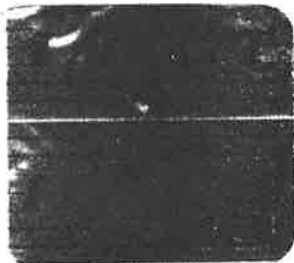

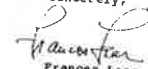

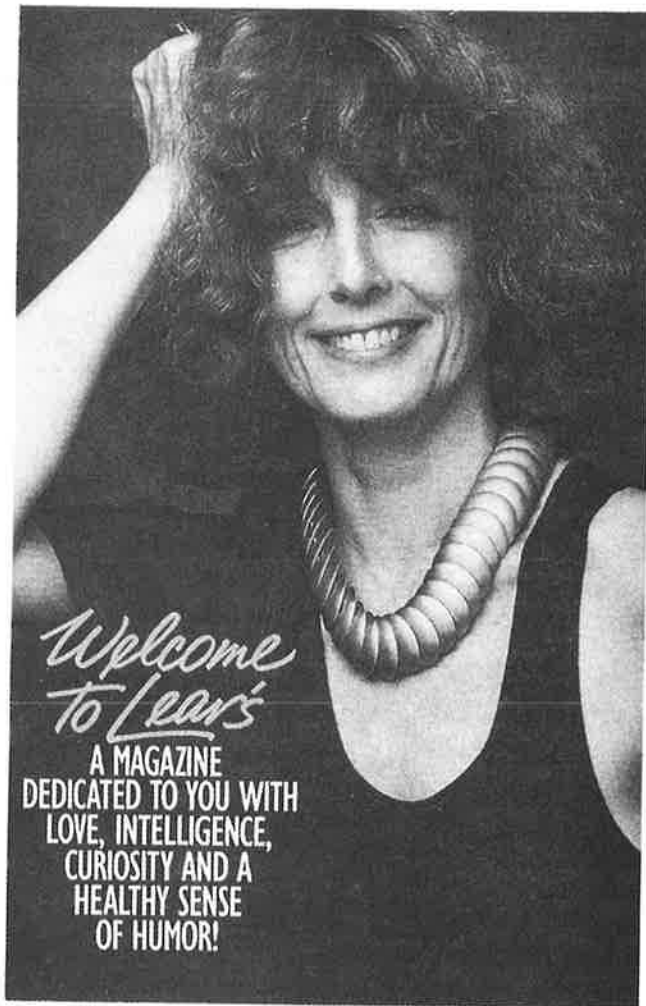
were so heavily edited and rewritten by Buckler and her consultant, Robert Shnayerson, that no one is sure who did what.

The result of all this client diddling was predictable; the packages were so much alike there was no clear winner. Results all fell within 10 percent of one another.

This was during the start-up of the magazine, so Wells, once again, did not have a year's worth of issues to work from. Maybe Wells was lucky enough to have seen a prototype plus an issue or two.

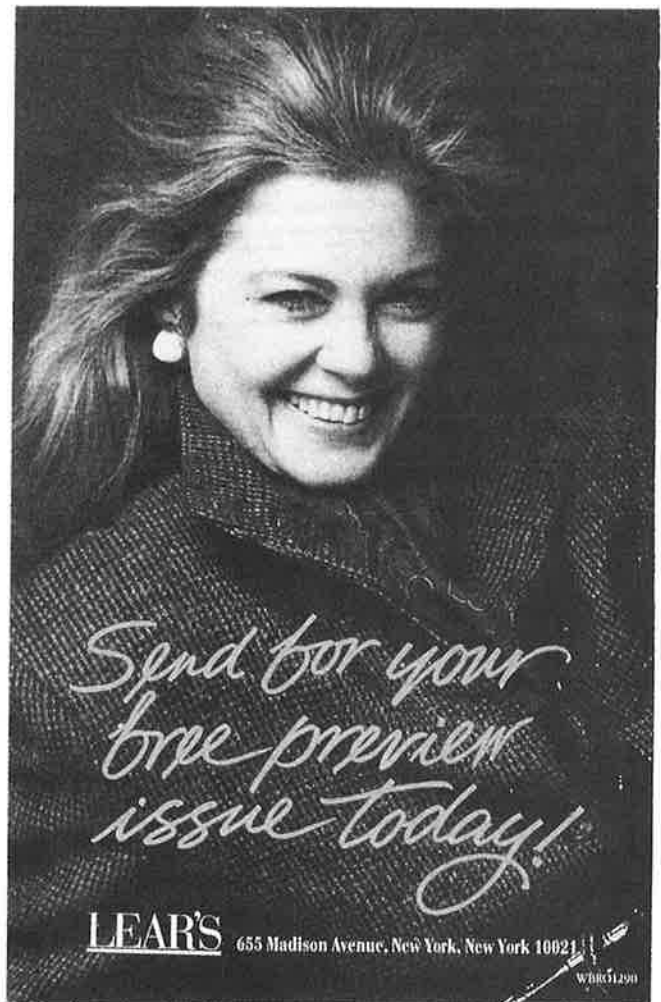

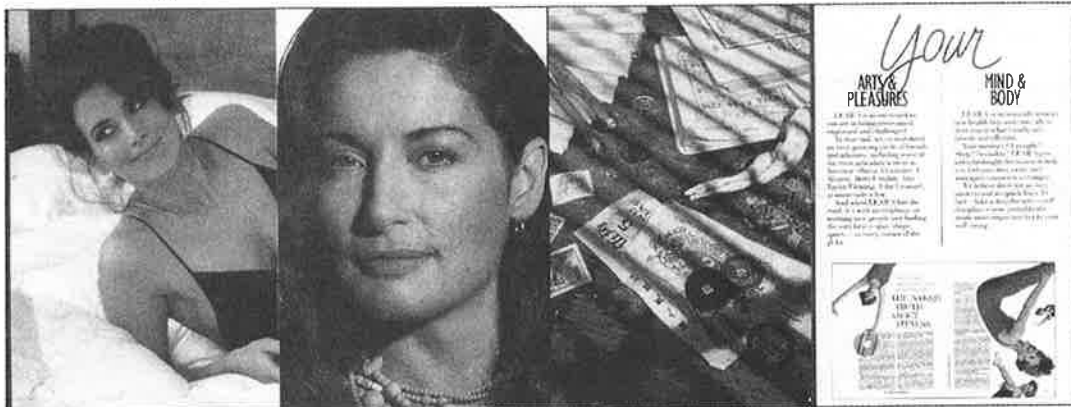

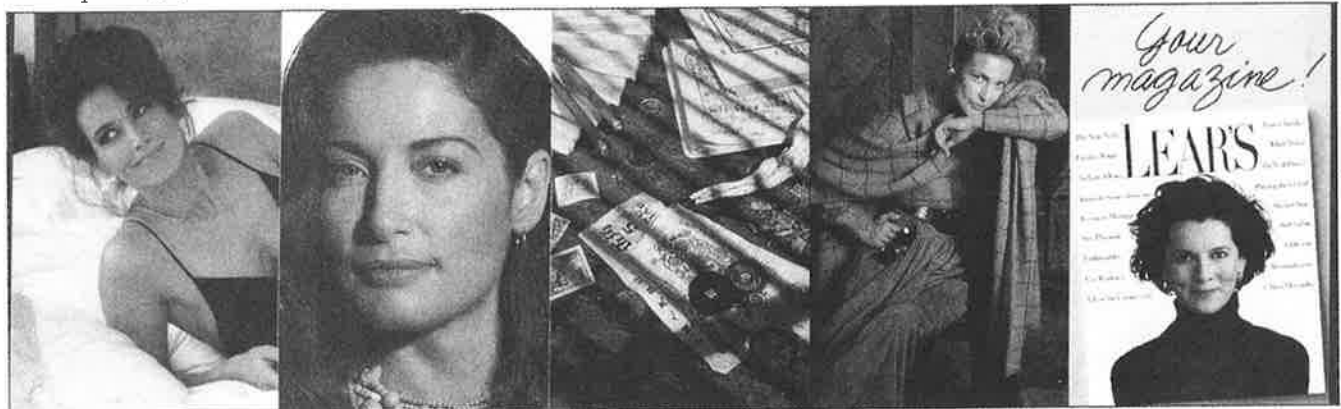

The women's magazines were urging me to travel, but every resort showed pictures of slim young women in bikinis sipping tropical drinks with slim young men in bikinis. There was no room on those beach chairs for me -- even if I had been married.

It is my conviction that if a direct mail package (or print ad, or television commercial . . .) can convince a reader that he is known and understood and valued it is nine-tenths of the way to selling its wares.

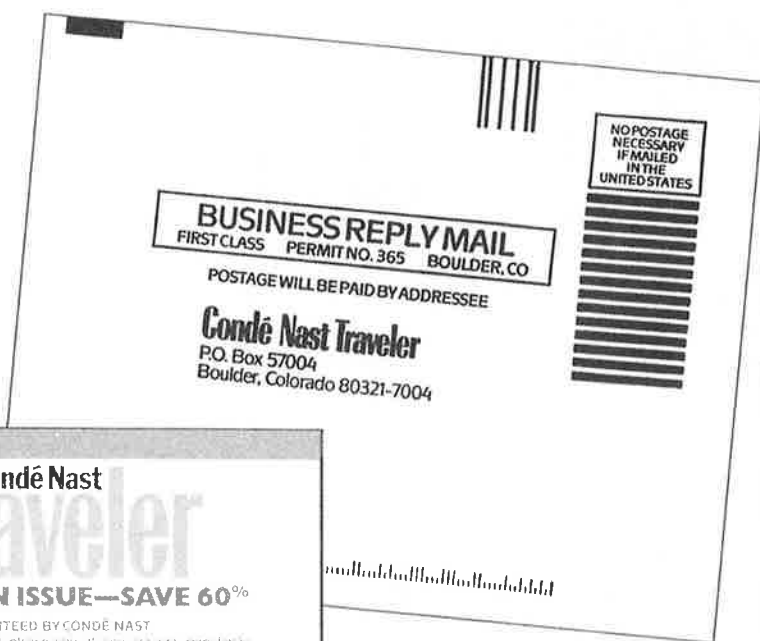
To me, the strength of this mailing turns on the envelope line. I have a personal method for coming up with envelope lines. It's really dumb. But it's mine.

After inundating myself with whatever material is available about the project, exhaustive discussions with the art director and a lot of nonsense doodling on a yellow pad (words . . . phrases . . . the beginnings of headlines . . . big pictures of eyes . . . small pictures of fish . . . ugly little stick figures stamping their feet . . .) I draw twelve 1/2" x 2 1/4" rectangles on a concept pad page. In each square I write a unique envelope line. I reflect as many different concepts, positionings, offers as I can think of, suspending, for the moment, good judgment, good taste, intelligence, experience, and sanity. I fill two or three pages if I can. Then I throw out all but three and hone those into the sharpest, most provocative, involving, and irresistible statements I can craft.

The envelope line on this package was created thusly and it has proved itself over time. We have learned not to mess with it. Whenever we encumber it with a photo . . . or fool with the wording . . . we depress response.

Moreover, whenever the package starts to fatigue, we have managed to revive it simply by changing the color of the envelope. It started out red. Since then we have run it on green, blue, and yellow.

Stan Rapp calls direct mail “intimate advertising.” When a direct mail effort arrives in the mailbox, it is in the company of the most highly personal correspondence: wedding invitations, letters from the kid stationed in Germany, refunds from the IRS, social security checks, bills from the plastic surgeon. In the workplace environment, a direct mail effort is right there among memos from the field, job performance ratings, your new stripped-down health insurance benefits, the notice of a raise, and a “suggestion” from the boss that you spend the first week in February at that convention in Chicago.

To wander through the exhibit hall of any direct marketing conference is to go by booth after booth representing printers and fulfillment houses whose names start with *Auto- . . . Data- . . . Scan- . . . Info- . . . Compu- . . . Response-*. Pause for a split second and earnest young reps will engage you in deep conversation about how their system alone will enable you to create mailings so exquisitely personalized that they seem more real than the handwritten note from your snotty seven-year-old nephew who was pistol-whipped into scrawling a thank-you for the birthday present you sent him six months ago.

These days it seems the direct marketing industry is besotted with technology. Never mind the product or the offer. If the effort seems personal enough, prospects will be so appreciative of the seemingly special attention that they will order. The medium is the message. And more and more, the message is trickery.

As Bill Jayme has said:

Personalize indiscriminately at your peril. Do you really want as a customer some boob who gets turned on by seeing his own name repeated nine times in a single page?

The secret of successful direct mail is (1) reaching the right person, (2) dramatizing an offer that is important and believable, and (3) making each customer feel good about doing business with you.

Believability is the key. Consumers and business people are becoming more wily, seeing through the hype and fakery that are disguised in elaborate personalization.

Another kind of personalization is not accomplished by technology, but found within the copy. An example is in the personalized thank-you letter from Bill Bonner of Agora Marketing to new subscribers of his newsletter, *International Living*. In the course of the letter Bonner writes:

. . . And please do not hesitate to call on our TOLL FREE customer service line (800) 433-1528, if there is any problem. If the product you've purchased, or anyone in my organization fails to meet with your complete approval, I would like to know about it.

Our company specializes in two areas—investment and travel. To a large extent, these areas reflect my personal interests. Perhaps you share these interests. If so, please allow me to take a moment more of your time to tell you about an organization I am involved with called The Passport Club. It's a very useful group that appeals to both my desire to travel and my interest in financial topics . . .

. . . In short, I've found membership in the club to be a source of a lot of fun as well as a lot of profit.

What Bonner has done is inject himself personally into the correspondence with the new subscriber. It's obvious that Bonner (1) is a real person, (2) cares about excellence and customer satisfaction, (3) loves travel, (4) loves what he does, (5) is delighted to communicate that enthusiasm and share the benefits.

I call this "Reflexive Personalization" whereby the writer's personality comes through. The result: tremendous believability. You are made to feel that a real person has communicated with you; Bonner has created a mental image of himself as, perhaps, a boulevardier sipping an apéritif in a Parisian café or an amateur archaeologist in Indiana Jones hat and hiking boots prowling the ruins of Petra.

When a letter comes from a real person—and you can see that person in your mind—it closes the loop. Use Reflexive Personalization, and there may not be any need to spend a lot of money on elaborate computer work; the intimacy is there thanks to the copy, not the technology.

Reflexive Personalization, then, is giving your product or service personality by using a real person or situation. An analogy can be found in the 1991 U.S. Open Tennis Championships. In a sport dominated by sullen, scowling, serve-and-volley machines, many of them foreign, Jimmy Connors was the quintessential wild and crazy American kid (Kid? The man was thirty-nine years old!) who exploded onto the court

like a smart bomb from the Iraqi war. Late in the fifth hour of his quarterfinal match with Aaron Krickstein, with the crowd screaming at every point, Connors looked directly into a courtside television camera and shouted: "This is what they come for! This is what they want!" At that moment he had the television audience eating out of his hand along with the stadium crowd. Connors had put his unique stamp on the proceedings; he *personalized* them. Did the TV audience respond? The match garnered a 7.7 in the Nielsen overnights for 25 markets, giving CBS a 6.9 rating, up 22 percent from the comparable night the prior year.

Washington-based freelancer Richard Armstrong echoed these sentiments in a letter responding to a *Who's Mailing What!* article on Reflexive Personalization:

Your last newsletter, which focused on the issue of personalization, substantiated a long-standing theory of mine: Namely, that the most important word in direct mail copy (aside from "free" of course) is not "you"—as many of the textbooks would have it—but "I."

What makes a letter seem "personal" is not seeing your own name printed dozens of times across the page, or even being battered to death with a never-ending attack of "you's." It is, rather, the sense that one gets of being in the presence of the writer . . . that a real person sat down and wrote you a real letter. A heavily computerized letter, by contrast, seems less personal than it does robotic.

The direct-mail recipient, after all, doesn't need to be reminded that he is a real human being and that he has a real name. To the contrary, he needs to be assured that the letter he is reading comes from a human being—not a computer. And not a committee either.

Ironically, it is sometimes harder for professional copywriters to write this kind of copy than it is for our clients! (Although Frank Johnson, Tom Collins, and Ed McLean were and are masters of it.) Often it is the entrepreneurs and activists themselves—people like Joe Sugarman [JS & A], Gary Halbert [copywriter], Father Bruce Ritter [former head of Covenant House], Howard Ruff [publisher of Ruff Times], and many others—who have the gift for putting their persuasive personalities on the printed page.

A delicious example of Reflexive Personalization is to be found in the lift letter that Bill Jayme wrote for Eric Utne's signature. You can see in your mind's eye the motley assortment of eccentrics who create the magazine. *You're there* in that Minneapolis loft!

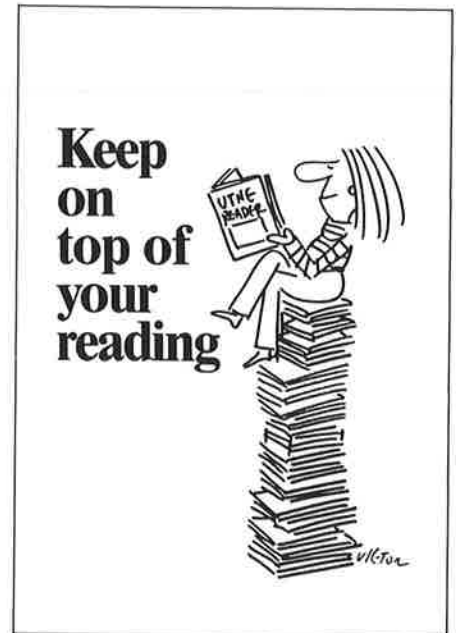

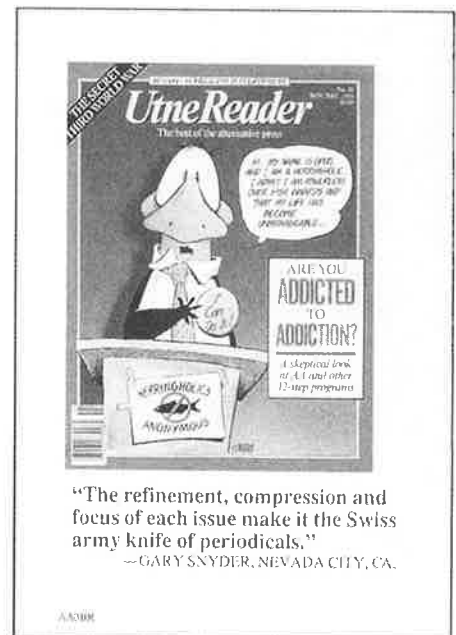

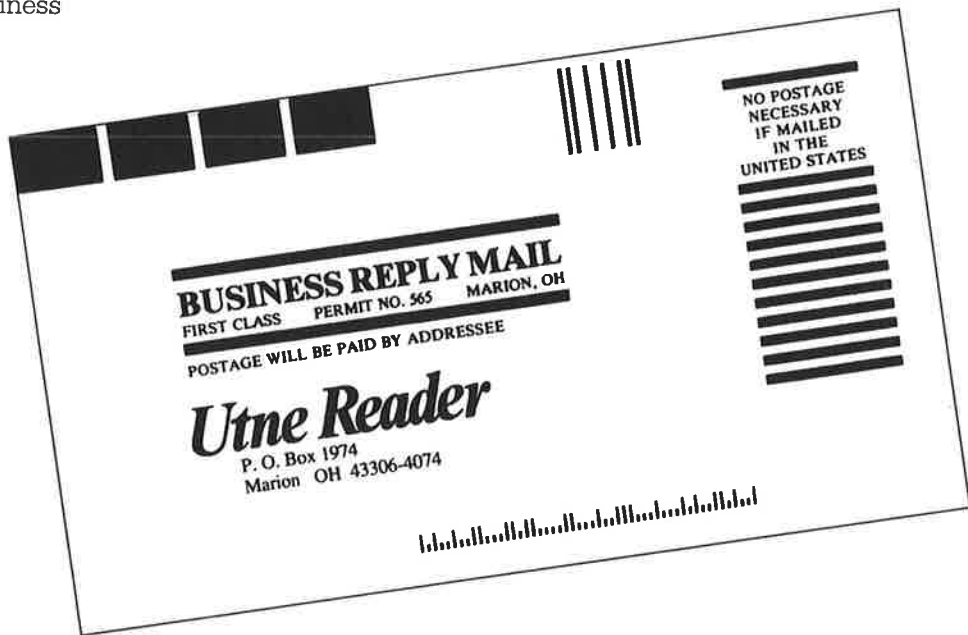

happily than from faceless corporations, and that (2) in the marketplace as in the theater, there is indeed a factor at work called "the willing suspension of disbelief."

Who stands behind our pancakes? Aunt Jemima. Our angel food cake? Betty Crocker. Our coffee? Juan Valdez. Anyone over the age of three knows that it's all a myth. But like Santa Claus, the tooth fairy, and Jesus, the myths are comforting.

This package was an attempt to establish a persona for an uncommonly cheerful and readable alternative magazine that would differentiate it from such impenetrable competitors as the Nation and from such relentlessly carping ones as Mother Jones.

An Intriguing Similarity

One common design feature these three launch packages share is an unfolding four-color brochure that opens . . . and opens . . . and opens . . . and opens . . . with each succeeding gatefold containing a surprise of some sort.

The direct mail creative teams had to disguise the fact that, at the time, these magazines existed only inside the heads of their editors and publishers. The three designers came up with the concept of making the publications seem real by the technique of literally making them unfold before the reader's eyes.

Consumer Publishing I: Continuity Series

There are three ways of engineering automatic multiple sales in direct marketing: continuity efforts, “til-forbid” offers, and negative option clubs.

Typically, a continuity series is a set of books or records to be sent automatically at the rate of one or two a month until the set is complete.

Til-forbid offers are the same as continuity series except there is no set number of volumes in the series. Sign up with Fleetwood for stamps and first-day covers, and you’ll keep receiving products *ad infinitum* until you *forbid* the company to send any more—til forbid.

In both cases, customers receive no mechanism in advance that warns of an impending shipment and gives the opportunity to reject it.

Negative option book and record clubs will be discussed in the next chapter.

Initial Offer

Before the Federal Trade Commission took an active interest in the practices of mail order merchants, the typical continuity series offer and fulfillment went as follows:

Take Volume I Free. In about four weeks you will receive Volume II. If dissatisfied, return the second volume with your bill marked “Cancel” and you owe nothing and are under no further obligation. Otherwise, you will receive a new volume approximately every four to six weeks—always on approval—always at the same low price. You may return any book; you never pay for a book you do not wish to keep; you may cancel anytime.

What Really Happened

Volume I would be shipped free with a welcome letter. Volume II would be shipped four weeks later with a bill. When the bill was paid, Volume III would be shipped. When that bill was paid, a giant box containing

Volumes IV through XXIV were sent with a letter that said: "Guess what, you lucky person. Because the books are all ready, we assumed that you want them now, rather than having to wait for them on a month-by-month basis. It's a great deal; you have full use of the books, and you pay for them at the affordable rate of just one book a month. What's more, since we shipped them all at once, you save on postage. Here's your monthly payment book and reply envelopes."

Shipping all of the remaining volumes at once is called the "load-up." In the situation illustrated above, where the books came as an unordered surprise, it was known as the "dirty load-up." Although there were objections, most people found it was more trouble to ship the books back than to keep them and pay the low monthly rate. Profit or loss on a continuity program is measured by the average number of paid items (books, records, first-day stamp covers) per starter. If you can get someone to accept an entire box of books and pay for it, the number of paid books for that starter is far higher than the average of five or six or seven, which is where most people cancel when receiving shipments at the rate of one book a month. The load-up was sent only to those people who paid for the second and third volumes; their payment qualified them as likely candidates for the dirty load-up.

So many complaints resulted from the dirty load-up that the Federal Trade Commission stepped in and took action against this practice. Publishers got around that by writing a letter saying: "Guess what, you lucky person. All of the books are ready and we are going to send them to you all at once *unless you tell us you want them on a one-a-month basis.*"

This was the negative option load-up. Unless the person said no, the books were shipped. The FTC caught on to this and said that consumers did not have pay for unordered merchandise and were under no obligation to return it; books sent under the negative option were emphatically unordered.

Publishers started sending letters following the payment for Volumes II and III that said: "Guess what, you lucky person. All of the books are ready, and you can have them all at once just by initialing the enclosed form and returning it to us."

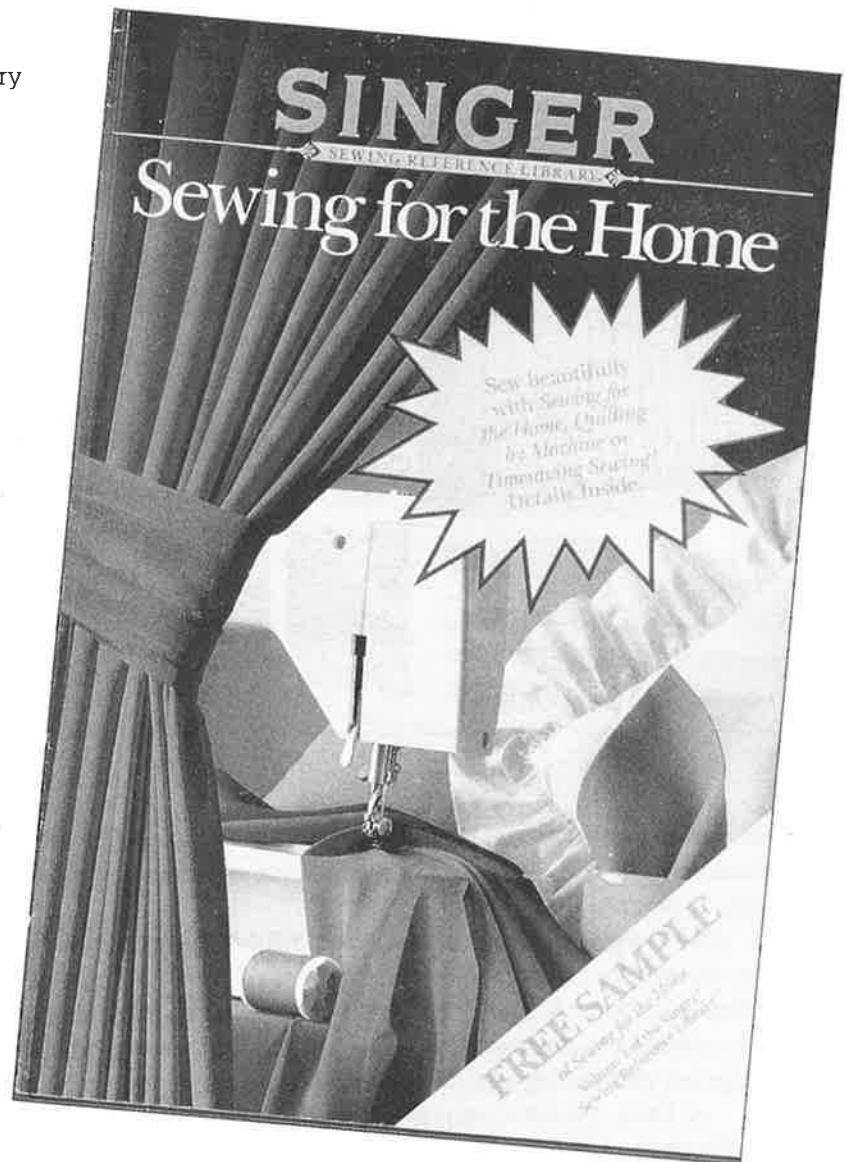
This was the positive option; the load-up was actually ordered. Some people ordered them; others canceled. The net result is that most continuity series today are shipped at the rate promised on the original order form.

Singer Sewing Reference Library

Direct marketing guru Dick Benson states categorically that self-mailers do not work and are not worth testing. Dick Hodgson, author of *The Greatest Direct Mail Sales Letters of All Time*, says that self-mailers should be used in two areas, both in the workplace: for promoting seminars and for selling goods and services to people with stand-up jobs (barbers, shop stewards, etc.).

With the exception of postcard efforts, only one self-mailer has been continually received for three or more years—an eight-page effort written by Greg Beaupre of Minneapolis. In relation to all the other mailings, it is a true maverick—letter as part of the brochure, two side-by-side reply cards (the second one for a friend), more space devoted to sewing lessons than to selling the product and its benefits. Two possible reasons for its success: Singer is the premier name in home sewing, and in eight

How to Make a Roller Shade

- 1) Mark center of upper and lower edges of fabric and fabric backing. Place the wrong side of the fabric to the rear side of the backing, matching edges and create markings.
- 2) Press according to manufacturer's directions for iron and temperature, working from center to outside and from top to bottom. Allow shade to cool before moving on to next step.
- 3) Sew a pocket for mark cutting lines on sides of shade; distance between cutting lines should be equal to finished width of shade. Use a compass to square or cutting board for right angles.
- 4) Cut carefully along cutting lines with smooth, even strokes. To keep edges from fraying, put a small amount of white glue on your finger and draw a thin edge along each edge. Let it dry completely.
- 5) Fold under 1/2" (1.3 cm) along lower edge for a straight firm and clean pocket. The corners square to check right angles as corners.
- 6) Roll under 1/2" (1.3 cm) from folded edge, using long stitches to form a pocket for the roller. Press pocket, insert the roller. Attach shade with a hook or tape shade to roller.

Roller Shade

Mount roller shade inside the window opening with 1/2" (1.3 cm) or less clearance around the edges to maximize the energy efficiency of a window. Roller shades can also be hung on brackets on the inside or wall outside the window. For easier measuring, measure from outside edge of brackets. If you do not want the roller to show, use recessed brackets and cut the roller to fit.

Notes: Use a heavy-duty fabric that holds well. Use a heavy-duty roller and tension fabric that is treated with ultraviolet ray block.

years of looking at some quarter of a million mailings, I can't recall a single competitor. And there is a huge universe of home sewers that is reachable by renting lists.

Since 1989 Greg Beaupre has been with BBDO Minneapolis, where he currently works on accounts ranging from US West Cellular and Group Health to Surdyk's and Hormel Meat Products. Prior to joining BBDO, he worked as creative director at Lee & Riley writing and supervising targeted advertising and direct marketing campaigns for Network Systems, Lee Data, Xerox Computer Corporation, and First Banks. He has also worked at Fallon McElligott, and Fallon subsidiary McCool & Co.

GREG BEAUPRE:

My thoughts on the Singer mailing: In a nutshell, if I were to do it all over again, I'd do it differently, despite the mailing's success. As conceived, the control mailing to me represents "good enough." Incremental success. A solid, traditionally written self-mailer with a predominantly buckeye-minded layout, all of which gives the basic poop in rather pedestrian fashion, presumably hitting a healthy percentage of the "right" people with a good offer on a well-perceived product. So the classic direct-mail triumvirate of list, offer, and creative must be working to the right mix for this mailing to continue to be effective. (I also saw a recent piece in the Minneapolis Star Tribune that suggests the growing popularity of home sewing might have something substantial to do with it, too. Of course, that would be a constant across all mailings, control and tests alike, but would certainly help put the overall effort in the "Win" column.)

At any rate, if it ain't broke, why fix it, right? Well, the answer's a long one that I'll try to make short. First, my contention regarding direct mail (and other areas of advertising as well) is that this kind of workmanlike, unsurprising, no-bullshit approach tested with other unremarkable, essentially similar packages gives you only a narrow view of success. That is (and this is based on my own conjecture since I have no idea what the real numbers on this mailing and its tests have netted), control and test mailings all hovering in the 1.59–3.27 percent response range type of thing, with the control winning out. As opposed to something designated to thrust the whole effort upward into the richly successful ranges—3.5–6 percent and beyond. I participated in a "Kings of Copy" conference in New York a few years back and a fellow presenter said it better than I can in this letter, to the effect that fewer and fewer companies can afford the kind of incremental, leave-well-enough-alone success this kind of control mailing achieves. Production costs go up, consumers' wallets continue to shrink, competition inevitably creeps up on you and overtakes you if you're not willing to take a few more chances than you have in the past. What worked well enough in the past will be your death sentence in the marketplace tomorrow.

Now that I've stopped to reread and proofread this, I realize I'm doing a pretty good job of making a long subject longer, not shorter. So I'll wind this down.

This whole subject seems always to devolve into a discussion—or heated argument, as was the case in New York—of creativity vs. effectiveness, as if the two were somehow mutually exclusive. I've got a whole portfolio of direct mail advertising that has won awards for effectiveness and creativity, suggesting the cause-and-effect relationship between the two that I believe is there. And the nut of it is, I don't believe the Singer piece is "creative" at all. I don't believe it takes the greatest possible advantage of the creative variable in the mix. And I do believe, given the chance, I could beat the control applying the greatest possible creative leverage to the task. More refreshing, surprising, compelling headlines. A more conceptually thought-out approach on the cover. More appealing graphics. Get in the free, but do it more tastefully. Project a less predictable, more progressive image for the company itself. Etc., etc., etc.

Time-Life Books

Probably the most successful mail order book publishing operation in history is Time-Life Books, founded in 1961 by an authentic publishing genius, Jerome Hardy, formerly of Doubleday. At the time, Hardy had two choices: use the fabulous Time-Life photographic archives to put together a cut-and-paste series, or create real books from scratch, tapping into the parent company's material only where the fit was absolutely correct. Hardy wisely opted for the latter course and built what was to become the largest book publisher in the United States. Foreign operations were added in 1971 and today Time-Life books are printed in many languages and marketed throughout the world.

Time-Life Books is a prodigious force in mail order. To get new customers it uses space ads, insert programs, and a slew of direct response television commercials. According to one source, over 100 new direct mail packages are tested in the course of a year. With this kind of constant tinkering and testing, long-term direct mail controls are rare; somebody is always beating the last winning package. However, two Time-Life efforts qualify as Grand Controls.

Writers who work on Time-Life projects have an enormous advantage over those of other publishers in that Time-Life spends a fortune on market research and focus groups before committing to a new series. As a result, writers can know in advance what consumers' "hot buttons" are in relation to the product being sold and can highlight those throughout the effort.

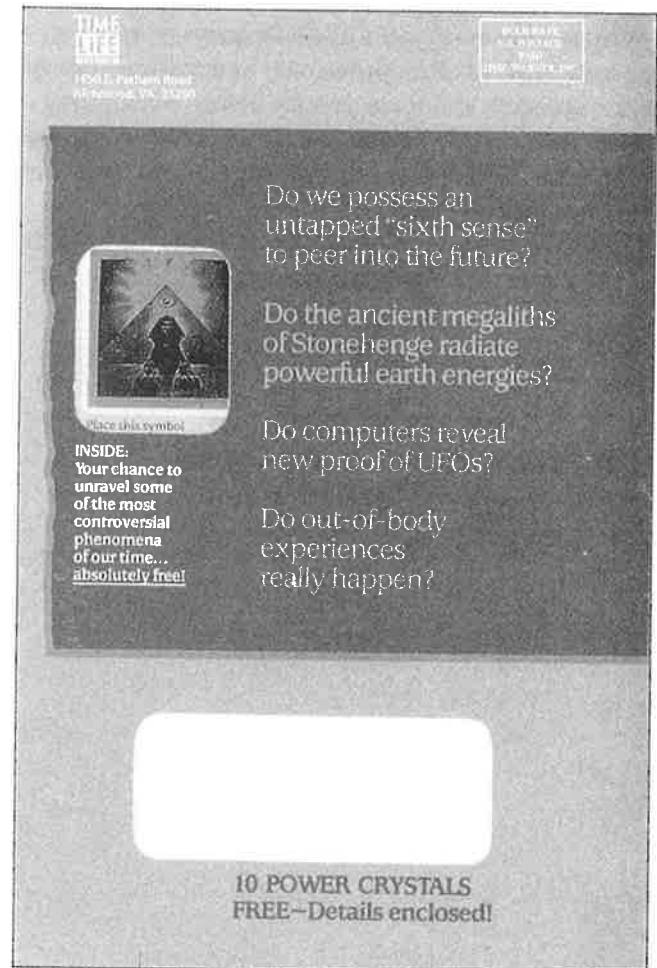

LEN BERKOWE:

Mysteries of the Unknown was launched at a time when "New Age" culture had enormously heightened public interest in the occult. The market was crowded, indeed overcrowded, with materials. So we had to forge a unique selling claim that would immediately set this book series apart.

Our solution: Provocative new answers to questions about the supernatural—based on the latest scientific investigations!

The tone of the package was important. We had to avoid any suggestion that the supernatural was merely titillating entertainment. Occult fans take it seriously, and so did we.

But given the inherent sensationalism of the subject, I was tempted to go with big, "blockbuster" teaser copy on the outer envelope. There was, however, a problem. Market research revealed that occult fans usually zero in on a specific area of interest like psychic powers or UFOs. If we didn't hit the right button, we could lose a lot of readers. Hence, the list of questions on the outer envelope to cover all four of the most popular subject areas.

We also felt that the free-trial offer, the premium, and some examples of the kind of information Mysteries of the Unknown offered were powerful selling points. Too powerful to bury inside the package. The result was a lot of copy on the outer envelope. The trick, of course, was to avoid that cluttered look that could easily land the envelope in the nearest wastepaper basket.

The letter, too, aims to reach the broadest possible audience. That's why we started off with the psychic phenomenon most people are familiar with—the

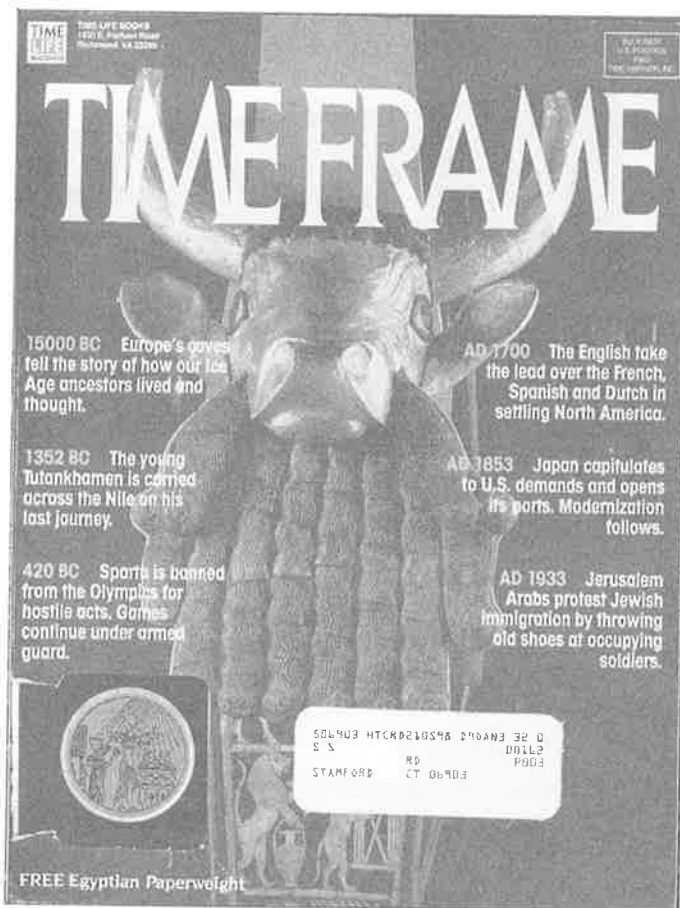
Time Frame

My archives have been receiving Martin Tarratt's *Time Frame* effort in two formats: 9" x 12" and 6" x 9". With the 1991 increase in postage rates, "flats" (mailing pieces and catalogs larger than 6 1/8" x 11 1/2") are whacked with a \$50-per-thousand penalty. As a result many mailers are downsizing both catalogs and letter mail to avoid the extra postage. In some cases results do not suffer; in others, the additional penalty is worth the increased results. In the case of *Time Frame*, the most recent versions are the 9" x 12" size.

British born and Cambridge educated, Martin Tarratt began as a junior copywriter in London with no love for direct mail. But after working on such accounts as Cunard and Honda, "the challenge of learning a highly specialized writing technique and of having each performance measured by response became as addictive as a roulette wheel."

In 1973, after a brief stint with BBDO in Amsterdam, Tarratt joined the Amsterdam office of Time-Life Books. Since 1976 he has been with Time-Life in New York and Alexandria (Virginia) as a copywriter and creative director.

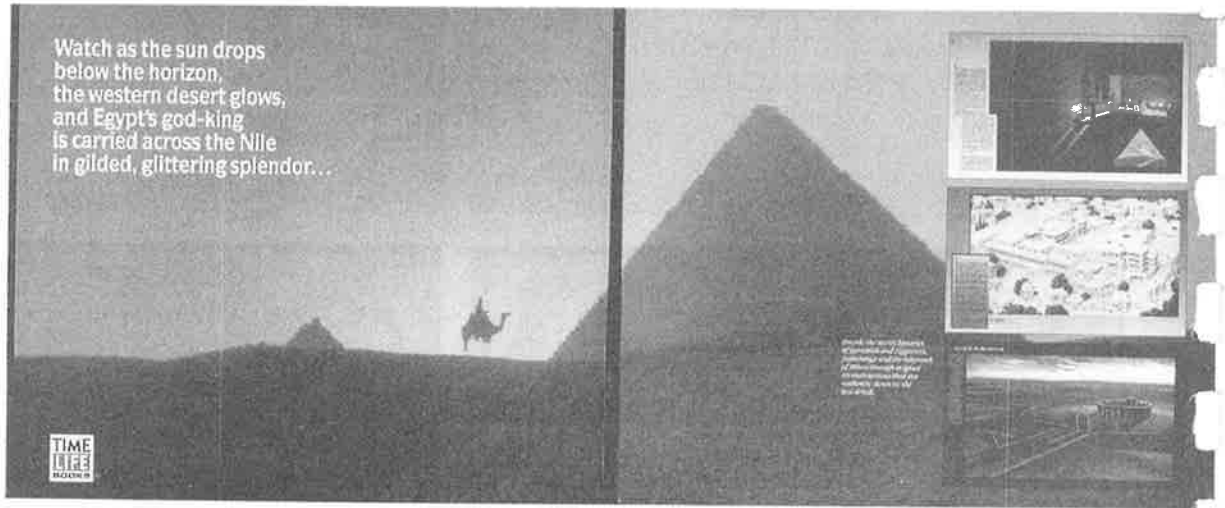

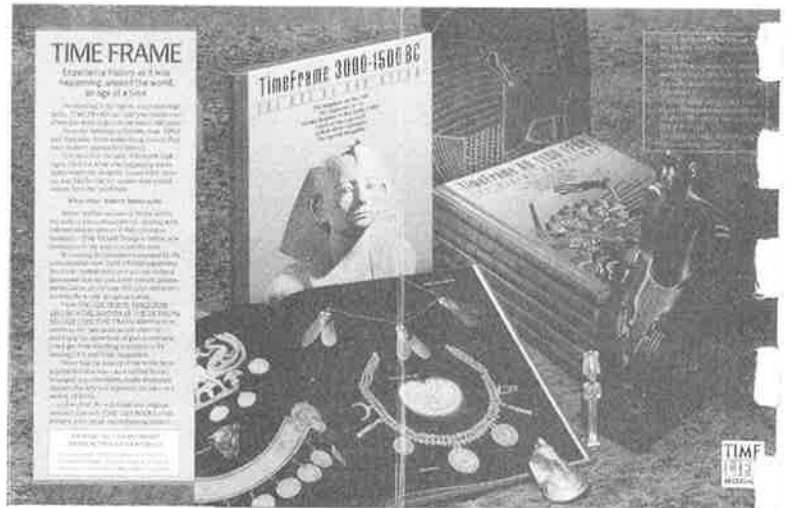

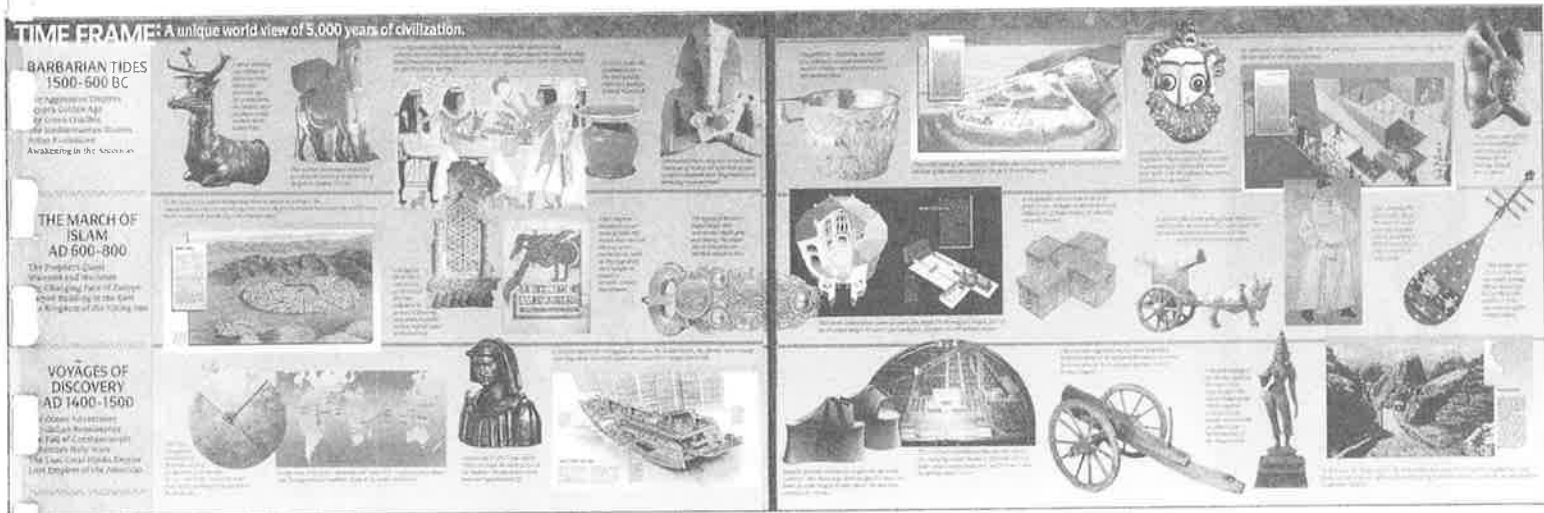

MARTIN TARRATT:

This Time Frame package, first mailed in 1988, offered a special challenge. The series was already several mailing seasons old, but still tied to a control package created long before the first book came off press.

The books represented a unique editorial concept—history as it was happening around the world an age at a time. But few marketing people then at Time-Life believed world history could be sold to an American audience.

By 1988, and with few books in the series published, Time Frame was being dismissed as unprofitable, a loser, a dog that would never hunt.

It was time for a fresh approach—a new envelope test. What emerged is the concept on the front of the envelope—a hybrid of Time and People as such a magazine might have looked had it been in circulation since, say, about 3000 B.C.

We took this and other envelope ideas into focus groups—with mixed results. The groups did not tell us what we wanted to hear.

This left us with intuition based upon fifteen years of living inside other people's mailboxes. The magazine concept seemed the way to make 5,000 years of world history accessible, palatable—even enjoyable.

Taking the envelope from concept to words was the easy part. Finding the Sumerian ram's head to anchor the copy was a stroke of luck—or genius. Credit for this goes to art directors Ron Wilcox and Lynda Chilton.

In addition, the die-cut and premium sticker were involvement devices we'd never tried at Time-Life Books. (With only one test cell at our disposal, we were never to learn what part of the new thinking was driving the response.)

The new envelope and BRC (the brochure and letter remained the same as control) generated an 89 percent lift. A brief epidemic of astonishment ensued.

Time Frame lived. The edit staff was able to continue producing books—up to the Nuclear Age. And, with an average take of eight to nine books, the series would become one of the most lucrative in Time-Life's portfolio. But that is not quite the end of the story . . .

The creative breakthrough liberated funds for subscriber research. The conclusions drawn from that study overwhelmingly confirmed the creative instincts that had gone into the envelope test.

As we'd suspected, our subscribers were mature, affluent, and well educated. They saw history as a way of escaping the grim realities of their own century. And when asked where they'd most like to spend ten free days, Tutankhamen's Egypt was the clear favorite.

The way was open to create a new brochure and letter—and Egypt the direction. Just one catch . . .

The introductory volume, The Age of God-Kings, had a resonant title but stopped at 1500 B.C., long before the better-known god-kings—Akhenaten, Tutankhamen, Ramses II—made Egypt what we now think of as Egypt.

But we built an Egypt package anyway, creating a journey through time with pyramids, dancing dwarfs, reconstructions, time lines, and all the gold we could find.

We chose a booklet format for the brochure, making it harder for the prospect to throw away (and with an eye toward our back end).

And we built the letter around a real pharaoh, Khafre, whose face is on the Great Sphinx. We replaced our traditional four-page sea of words with a quicker, lighter, larger read. (Mature pairs of eyes were a consideration here!) Its tone and detail were designed to dispel any lingering historyophobia.

The new components gave us a further 20 percent lift up-front and maintained the unusually high average book take.

Consumer Publishing II: Negative Option Clubs

A negative option club offers an irresistible premium up front and then a commitment to buy a minimum number of additional books at discount on a “negative option” basis. Well before a book is shipped, the member receives a notice describing the book and a “rejection slip”—an instruction form that tells the club whether or not the main selection is wanted. If no action is taken by a specified date, the main selection is shipped. If the book is not wanted, or if the member wants an alternate title, the rejection slip is returned with the instructions.

The first negative option club was Book-of-the-Month, dreamed up by Harry Scherman, Maxwell Sackheim, and Robert K. Haas. Its first selection was shipped in April 1926; Literary Guild came hot on its heels in March, 1927.

Originally Book-of-the-Month was just that: an offering twelve times a year. Now most book clubs have expanded that to fifteen cycles a year, with occasional extras such as special holiday offerings.

In fulfillment and scheduling, the negative option club is the most demanding of all direct marketing operations. At any time there can be three different items in the mail *to* the member (monthly announcement with rejection slip, book shipment with bill, and statement of account); at the same time, there can be as many as four different items being sent simultaneously *from* the member: rejection slip or order for alternate selection, order for a bonus book, payment of statement, and return of a book. The fulfillment director of a negative option club and the data processing manager are necessarily master jugglers.

All the successful negative option Grand Controls have one common element: a powerful offer. The usual come-on is a menu of books or records with a very high retail value that can be yours for a token payment or even free. In turn, the new member must agree to buy a certain number of books through the club at discount prices off retail. For every book purchased after the commitment, the club will issue “a dividend” or “bonus certificate”—a credit toward purchasing bonus books at very low prices.

In the book club business the ideal situation is to have several different clubs under one roof, such as Doubleday. The Literary Guild can sign a contract with a publisher for a main selection in one club; that same book can become an alternate in another club. When the title has run its course, leftover books can be used in the low-price Doubleday Book Club. Finally, titles can end up as book dividends for all clubs.

In the early days of book clubs, a dividend certificate was sent with each selection. When the members had two or three certificates, they could order a book dividend. The paper certificates were cumbersome; people who returned books often kept the certificates and then illegally cashed them in for bonus books. At the same time, members often lost the certificates, and so the club did not have to fulfill so many claims.

At some point the data processing people came up with the idea of tallying the book dividend credits on the monthly rejection slip; the members could be kept up to date on their bonus status every month, just as frequent flyers are continually reminded of their accrued mileage. It appeared to be an ideal solution: no more bits of paper (ecologically sound); no more cashing in of unearned certificates.

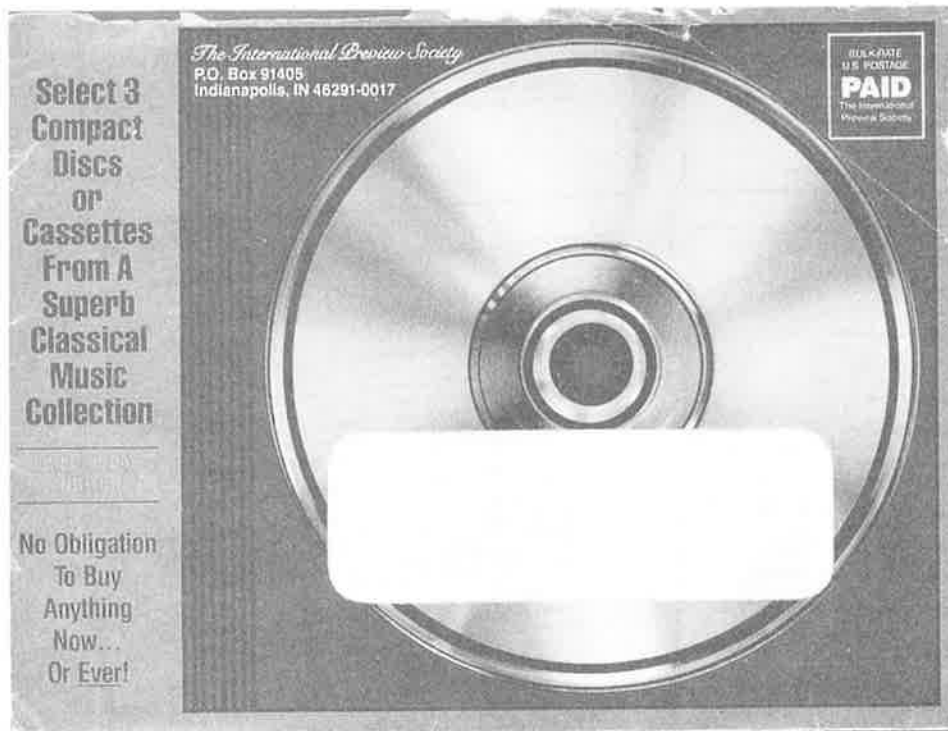
There was just one problem: the marketing departments of the book clubs never thought through the consequences. A case in point is my own membership in the Literary Guild where I have built up 21 dividend credits. The bonus books offered are seldom of interest to me; yet every time a monthly mailing comes and I think about buying the main selection or an alternate, I am whacked in the nose by the fact that I have twenty-one book dividend credits. Instead of ordering a book, I send in the rejection slip, vowing not to buy anything until I work off some of those dividends. I'm told there are members with hundreds of such dividends.

Savvy consumers will join a negative option club for the free offer, buy the minimum number of books or records required, and then resign and join again later.

BMG Music Service

Here are two Grand Controls, both written by BMG's director of creative services, Strat Simon. The first is a classical club, International Preview Society, with an offer of 3 for \$1. The second is a derivative effort for the popular Compact Disc club—presumably going to a less upscale universe—with a far stronger offer of 8 CDs, cassettes or records for the price of half; this effort dramatizes the value by including a "Music Voucher" that looks like a check and is worth up to \$63.92.

Strat Simon worked for over twenty-five years as copywriter, copy chief, marketing director, and creative director. Most recently he was director of creative services for Bertelsmann Music Group's direct marketing subsidiary where he directed the transition of the creative group to electronic publishing. He has also held copywriting and copy chief positions at Doubleday Book Clubs, Grey Advertising, and *Highlights for Children* where he developed the first insert to wrap around the *outside* of a magazine.

What makes a copywriter? In my case many things came together. I was introverted, learned English as a second language so I was better at expressing myself on paper rather than verbally. I was a prolific letter writer while away at college, and I liked the freedom of working on an assignment basis rather than in a structured nine-to-five office.

More important, you have to love writing copy that motivates a reader as an end to itself. I was so serious about it that after a year in my first job at Prentice-Hall, I left for a job in the midwest because all my fellow New York associates were talking to themselves. The back of the order card is a Member-Get-a-Member (MGM) effort, which is unusual for a cold solicitation. One of the most profitable sources of membership in book and record clubs is referrals. Virtually every monthly mailing contains an MGM and offers a premium to both the prospective member and the member if the referral becomes an active member. But it could be argued that asking for the referral on the cold solicitation could interrupt the ordering process and cost sales. This should be tested. On the back of the BRE is a recap of the ordering instructions.



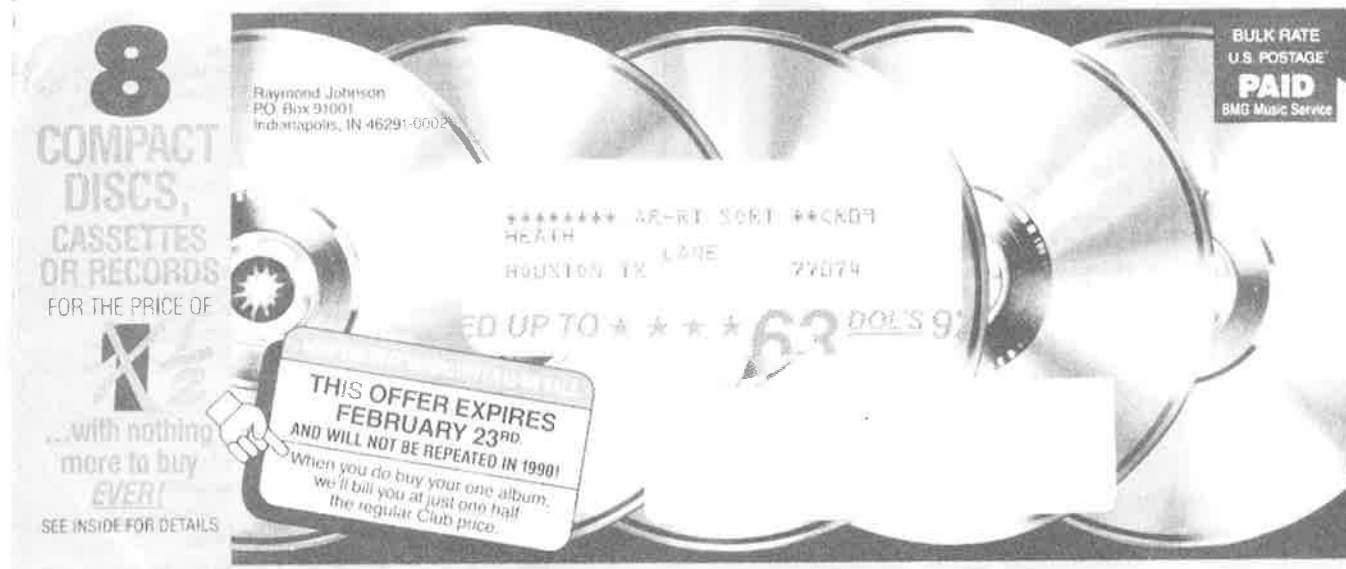
City spread over three-fourths of the United States and the rest of the country on the other side of the Hudson River, New York was not America, and to "reach" my audience, I felt I needed to live among the people I was writing to.

The two direct mail packages in this book are conceptually related. As with most creative ideas, they occur through interaction, and in this case, the club president, Raju Puthukari, was looking for a method of giving the recipients the sense of receiving a compact disc in their hands.

Since the CD case was almost the shape of an envelope, it was only a matter of a few words and thoughts between Raju, myself, and Joe Kreiser, our list and mailing expert who was present at the time. We pushed, pulled, and stretched the idea into the International Preview Society piece. The mail piece was just slightly smaller than an actual CD case. The concept was further enhanced by embossing the four-color envelope with ridges representative of those on a CD case and adding a silver metallic ink. The copy itself, although adapted from earlier offers, "romanced" the advantages of the Compact Disc—so new at the time, the major CD purchasers were classical music buffs.

The #10 piece for BMG Music Service was based on the same strong visual portrayal of the CD, extended one step further by our art director, Joe Pontevolpe, who created a series of overlapping discs to fill out the new dimensions.

The copy was totally offer driven. As with all mass market book and record club offers, it appealed to the timeless, basic (and base) instinct of getting something for nothing . . . or as close as we could profitably make it. A realistic voucher, representative of the value of the up-front offer, was included and from prior uses, was known to be strong; there was no need—indeed it was detrimental—to include a brochure of the many stars and recording labels available through the club. This piece ran for several years until we developed equally productive but less expensive packages.

Guru Axel Andersson has said that if you want to increase response dramatically, change the offer. In the case of Book-of-the-Month, the offer has gotten very soft—four books (worth up to \$100 retail) for \$1 each and *no commitment* to purchase any more books. Obviously this offer raised up-front response; and while it enabled people to rip off the club by purchasing no additional books, more responders up front means more buyers later on. Since the mailing was control for six years, the arithmetic must have worked.

One curious aspect of the mailing is the personalized letter. A window envelope with promotional copy on the front states loud and clear that it is a piece of advertising mail. Showing through this window are the name and address from the top of the personalized letter (not the order card); over the person's name is the following:

*BLK RT CAR-RT SORT ** CR17*


It's obvious on three counts (window envelope, promotional copy on outer envelope, and carrier-route sort postal discount over the person's name) that this is *in no way* a personal letter.

Why bother with a personalized letter?

Presumably because it worked for Book-of-the-Month in terms of the lifetime value of a member.

P.S. This offer isn't available to everyone. It isn't transferable. But, if you do decide to join and become a member of the Club, we can understand why you might want to share the news of your "no-strings" membership with a special friend or two. In that event, ask them to write me and mention your name.

The creative director at Book-of-the-Month is Michael Moroney, who began his direct marketing career as a copywriter in the great apprentice factory, Prentice-Hall. In 1979 he moved to Book-of-the-Month as a direct mail copywriter and since then has held a variety of positions, most recently that of vice president, promotion. He is a recipient of two Echo Leader Awards and a first place John Caples Award.

MICHAEL MORONEY:

This is a deceptively simple and quiet package: just a letter/application form and a brochure. The brochure is mostly books with little copy. The letter is a short two-pager. Except for a self-mailer, nothing could be simpler.

But that's part of its strength. We're asking people to choose four books—a fairly complicated process compared to other direct response offers—so a brochure that doesn't get in the way of selecting the books makes sense.

Also, we're offering a no-commitment membership. The whole psychology of no commit is that you don't have to fear entanglements or commitments after you join. So the copy doesn't say much about what happens after you join, but focuses almost entirely on the up-front, no-commit offer. The shortness of the copy reinforces the message, as if to say, "Look, there's really nothing to be afraid of."

The letter is a masterful and friendly piece of writing by Bill Keisler. The hook, of course, is "Please don't tell your friends," and the copy throughout hits the exclusive nature of the offer. The hook is nicely "closed" in the P.S. of the letter.

In my years as a creative director, I've seen countless examples of weak, muddled copy. So my creative philosophy is a simple one. I believe in good writing. And I believe in clarity, content, and credibility.

I also agree with Lew Smith who says that the role of a creative director is simply to determine if an ad is "quickly coherent" and "ultimately persuasive."

Enough said.

The Book-of-the-Month Grand Control was written by Bill Keisler, now retired from Wunderman.

BILL KEISLER:

Admittedly, a direct mail package is a complicated project, an ad of many parts. That can be intimidating.

One piece of advice I received early on was first to write and put into place all the mandatories: the outer envelope, offer, guarantee, nuts-and-bolts, order form. Then, I was told, fill in the leftover space with "copy."

Fortunately, I ignored this well-intentioned advice. I began with the view that direct mail—even more than other media—can be, simply, one human being talking to another human being. With Book-of-the-Month, it is also one avid reader talking to another avid reader. Keeping that in mind, everything (including the nuts-and-bolts) represents in tone and content pretty much what I'd say in person to a suitable prospect. Reading it aloud helps me determine how well I've achieved this.

If I've done my job, the package will communicate well with the right prospects. I also believe that readers who join as a result will become better performing members, and further, that the mailing piece itself will enjoy a longer, more prosperous life.



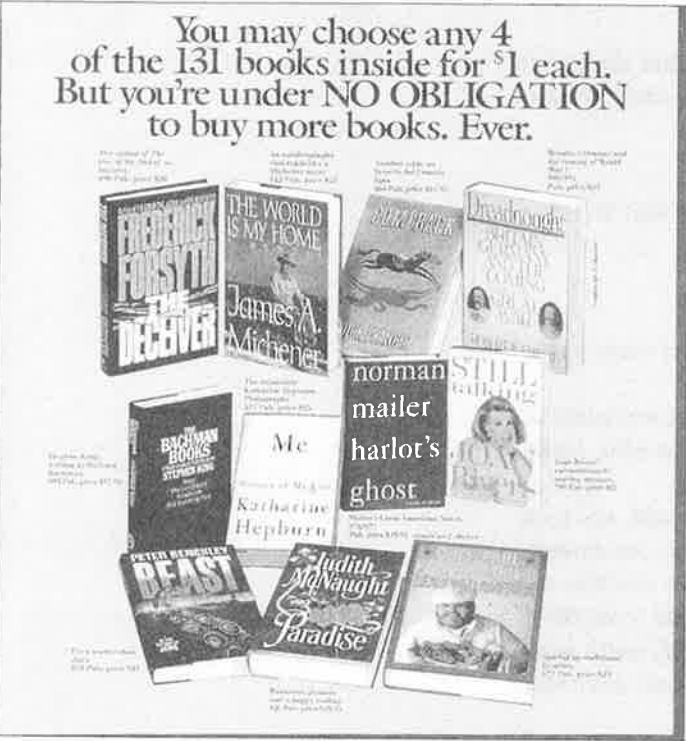

One of the most startling envelopes to come down the pike was the replica of an interoffice envelope created by Greg Dziuba for the Fortune Book Club, a division of Book-of-the-Month. The interoffice envelope is almost always opened immediately because the contents can directly impact the recipient's future: approval or disapproval of a marketing plan . . . notice of an important meeting . . . announcement of a new boss coming in. The holes punched in the body of the envelope let you see whether there are any contents—a kind of tantalizing peek at what may be inside. Late in their careers, these envelopes are wonderful-looking things—with dozens of handwritten names scratched out all over the front and back. The mailing package beat control by 50 percent.

After he left Book-of-the-Month, Greg Dziuba freelanced for a while before joining International Masters as creative director in 1991.

GREG DZIUBA:

“So what exactly do you intend to do, Son, now that you’ve been to journalism school?”

“Well, Dad, I thought newspapers would be a great place to start. Then maybe magazines. Eventually novels or screenplays.”

Five years later.

“So how’s the writing career going, Son?”

“Dad, let me explain what it means to beat a control.”

Actually, I did work in newspapers and magazines before being seduced by advertising. In fact, a hard-bitten veteran of the Daily News finally wrote “Good lead” on a story I rewrote half a dozen times. I still consider that one of the highest compliments of my writing.

I can’t imagine anyone starting out to be a direct mail writer. But I remember that it actually happened to me after reading a magazine circulation renewal package for Cycle magazine. After briefly skimming and tossing lots of junk mail, here was something that stopped me cold. I remember thinking, “Whoever wrote this really understands my passion for motorcycles. And by the way, the person can really write! I wonder how much this kind of writing pays? What a neat way to make a living!”

After ten or fifteen years in this field I’ve had a number of winning packages and several long-term controls. And every one of them has been built on my very best understanding of the person I’m talking to through the package. Marketing managers call that “Psychographics.”

When I submitted the concept for my “Interoffice Mail” package it wasn’t very well received by my boss. He thought it was “too gimmicky and got in the way of the offer.” So I did what I always do when I don’t get my own way: I threatened to quit.

Fortunately, he had just hired me and was tired of interviewing. So first, I convinced him that was the right gimmick. And besides, no one to my knowledge had ever received an interoffice envelope at home. There should be some power in that.

Well it turned out that it was a very powerful and long-lived package. But I really believe that the power comes as much from the writing as from the novelty of the gimmick. I’m still proud of the letter lead:

You’ve got enough people trying to waste your time with things you don’t really want or need.

I’m not one of those people.

I worked very hard on talking to middle managers in a way that demonstrated an understanding of their motivations and concerns. There’s really no substitute for making a fundamental connection with your reader. And for me, that takes some genuine and substantial understanding of the person you’re talking to.

All that sounds pretty trite until you actually do make a fundamental connection with your reader. You know when it happens, because that’s the beauty of direct response. And that’s the territory where I invest most of my time, because great gimmicks don’t score as consistently in my experience as making that one-to-one connection.

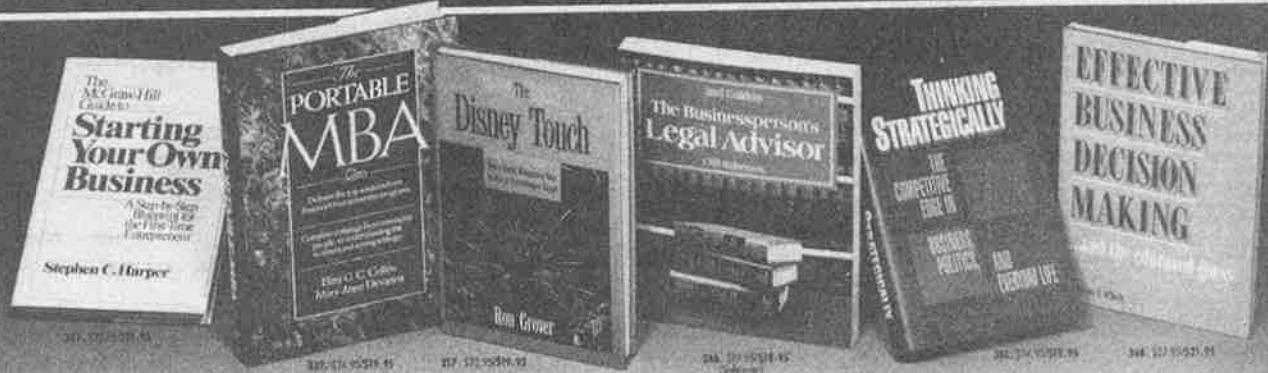

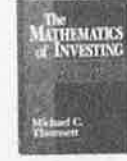

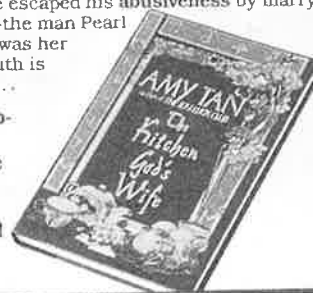

fat and her hips trim by doing this simple exercise every day.

1. I lecture frequently on college campuses, and was one day in up-state New York. The dean of studies, who was very overweight, looked much older than her years, and was in poor physical health generally. I suggested the exercise, demonstrating it for her. In just a few weeks she had lost five inches in her waist, hips, and thigh areas, and her color had come back to "normal." She became a younger, more vibrant woman, and is today head of one of the most important academic institutions in the nation.

2. John a bank president, was overweight, sluggish, constipated. And, at age 55, he was almost ready to give up. His secretary, urged him to try the simple stomach rubbing exercise. 6. Morgan was one of my most difficult cases. He'd come to me just after he'd lost his influential job as head of a major airline, partly because he was under so much stress, he had become a compulsive eater, and was getting no exercise—drinking large quantities of beer at the local bar, too. One day he heard that he'd just out on a major executive position with a Fortune 500 company—and it was only because of his slumpy appearance. Then he determined to stay faithfully with the exercise, did in fact slim down and firm up, and shortly thereafter was hired as president of a major food concern. I see him often, and he looks younger today than he did ten years ago.

7. Several years ago I spoke to a group of overweight wives of physicians. After my talk, one young woman turned to me and said, "Dr. Chang, I don't think my marriage is going to last. I love my husband, and he loves me, but I'm more than pleasantly plump. What can I do?" Well, she was about 5'9", and weighed about 210 pounds. But I noticed that her weight was mostly in her mid-sections, front and back. I suggested the exercise. Several weeks later the young wife called me to say that her figure was "straightening out." I saw the couple quite recently, and she is nicely proportioned. Her husband now paid her close attention (as did all other men in her presence), and they were obviously quite happy.

Schwartz's energy, intensity, and ability to pile benefits on top of benefits on top of benefits. In a guest column for *Who's Mailing What!* Malcolm Decker reported on two of Schwartz's packages—for Dick Benson's *Wellness Encyclopedia* and Rodale's *Secrets of Executive Success*—and counted an astonishing 299 separate and distinct benefits to the buyer in the former and 237 in the latter.

With this package, you have the unique opportunity to see what Gene Schwartz writes *for himself*, for he is not only the copywriter but also the publisher of *Dr. Chang's Book of Internal Exercises*.

Nothing whispers in a Gene Schwartz package; it screams for attention, as can be seen in this effort. It is jarring; it is offensive; it is hokey. Yet this package has been in the mail continuously since 1979. Think of it! *Thirteen years old and still going strong!* All you can do is study a package like this and ask over and over again, "What has this got that mine ain't got?"

Incidentally, when the postal rates put a \$50-per-thousand penalty on "flats"—mailings larger than 6½" × 11½"—Schwartz tested this package in a 6" × 9" and a number 10 size; the *net* results on the number 10 were equal to the original 9" × 12" (fewer orders, but also less cost per thousand). The 6" × 9" did not work as well.

It should be added here that many of the promises, benefits, and claims found in Schwartz's copy may seem suspect; in fact, you sometimes wonder how they got by the FTC or the FDA. Pat Corpora once told me that Rodale's philosophy is that if a claim is made in the product itself, it can be used in the direct mail piece.

Eugene Schwartz and his wife, Barbara, are proprietors of a small publishing company, Instant Improvement, Inc. Schwartz is also one of the greatest—yet least known—copywriters in America. Of the first sixty-six Axel Andersson Awards, Schwartz was the winner of three, one for his own title, *Dr. Chang's Book of Internal Exercises*, and two for Rodale Press. Two of the eight books he has authored—*Breakthrough Advertising* and *Mail Order*—are must-read classics for all direct marketers. His mailing piece for *The Encyclopedia of Natural Healing* reportedly sold nearly two million books at \$25 per book (an eye-popping \$50 million gross). For the August 1987 issue of *Direct Marketing*, Gene Schwartz sat for an interview with Milt Pierce (creator of the *M* magazine package, discussed in Chapter 9), and it is reprinted here with permission of Milt Pierce.

PIERCE: What do you consider the most important characteristics of a copywriter?

SCHWARTZ: There are four: indefatigability, clarity, craziness, and humility. Let me explain: When I talk about indefatigability, I mean that copywriting is research. You can always determine the ad that has had the best research; it has something I call "claim density." It's packed with facts, with information, with ideas. You can't get that without doing a lot of research.

PIERCE: What about clarity?

SCHWARTZ: It's quite simple. Clear writing is strong writing.

PIERCE: Craziness?

SCHWARTZ: The copywriter is the person who looks at things that other people don't see. As a result, the copywriter writes in a way that's strangely fascinating . . . offbeat . . . and somewhat crazy.

PIERCE: Humility?

SCHWARTZ: Yes, humility. The copywriter puts himself last. The customer comes first. The product comes second. The writing is what comes last. But above all, the copywriter has got to have integrity. He—or she—must never write an ad just to please the client . . . or to make money . . . or to meet a deadline . . . and never, never write an ad for a bad product.

PIERCE: What made you decide to go into this business?

SCHWARTZ: Hunger. I came to New York after getting out of the University of Washington. I wanted to write the Great American Novel. Got a job as a messenger boy for Huber Hoge Advertising. That was 1949. I went from messenger to copy cub to copywriter to copy chief. Worked at Huber Hoge from 1949 to 1954. Then I started out on my own. In 1959 I started Information Incorporated.

PIERCE: Would you say that Cecil Hoge was your mentor?

SCHWARTZ: Yes. Without a doubt.

PIERCE: Do you have any special techniques that you use to get ideas?

SCHWARTZ: Yes, research. When I write copy for a book, I generally know more about that book than the editor.

PIERCE: What do you like most about being a copywriter?

SCHWARTZ: I like the aloneness of this business. I like the fact that I can sit at a desk and make money. I like the intelligent gambling that's so much a part of direct marketing. I like the mathematics of direct marketing. Most of all, I like the feeling I have of helping people by selling good products.

PIERCE: What do you like least?

SCHWARTZ: Clients who change copy without telling me. Or who don't let me see layouts. And I *hate* people who steal my ads and my ideas.

PIERCE: Is there a relationship between your best work and the sales that resulted from it?

SCHWARTZ: Yes, one-to-one. I'm a copywriter. My best work is the copy that sold best.

PIERCE: Is there any ad you feel particularly happy about?

SCHWARTZ: I wrote a direct mail package for Marty Edelston. In effect, this was the package that started Boardroom Reports and put Marty into business.

PIERCE: What was so special about that package?

SCHWARTZ: The headline for that was "How to Get the Guts out of 300 Business Magazines in 30 Minutes." I think that's one of the best I have ever written.

PIERCE: How long does it take you to write a direct mail package?

SCHWARTZ: Usually about six hours. But I like to work on a project for two hours a day . . . three days in a row.

PIERCE: Do you do much rewriting?

SCHWARTZ: With a word processor, that's a thing of the past, because you can write and rewrite at the same time. I'm now involved in creating and selling software for computers. In my opinion, that's the future of our business.

PIERCE: Do you enjoy listening to music?

SCHWARTZ: Yes. I think there's a connection between music and writing. It's a certain rhythm that exists in good writing as well as in good music.

PIERCE: What are your favorite ads?

SCHWARTZ: I love that Ogilvy ad for Rolls-Royce—"At 60 Miles an Hour the Loudest Noise Is the Clock Ticking." And Gary Halbert's ad, "The Amazing Diet Secret of a Desperate Housewife." And Ed McLean's letter for Mercedes, the one that begins, "Forget it Heinz. . . ." And that classic by Maxwell Sackheim, "Do You Make These Mistakes in English?"

PIERCE: Which books have influenced you the most.

SCHWARTZ: Hopkins's *My Life in Advertising*. And *How I Raised Myself from a Failure to Success in Selling*. And the new book by Rapp and Collins, *MaxiMarketing*. Of course, those classics by Caples and Ogilvy and Robert Collier and Victor Schwab. That almost goes without saying.

PIERCE: Would you rather write a direct mail piece or an ad?

SCHWARTZ: I prefer direct mail; it's where I get the best results.

SCHWARTZ: I get a success rate of 80 percent in my direct mail. In space ads, it's about one out of three.

PIERCE: Do you have samples of your favorite ads to share with our readers?

SCHWARTZ: No. I don't save my ads. That would be living in the past. I'm interested in tomorrow . . . not yesterday.

PIERCE: Do you have any words of advice to our readers?

SCHWARTZ: Yes. We're undergoing a profound revolution. The mail order firm is now able to serve its customers more completely than the retail store. Consequently, the copywriter now concentrates as much on delivery as he does on claims. He no longer makes a sale, but invites his prospect to a lifetime of borrowing products before having to buy them.

Rodale—The Quintessential Direct Marketer

No publisher is more in tune with its market than Rodale Press. The company was founded in 1930 by J. I. Rodale, a devout believer in organic farming and gardening as well as in consuming only natural foods and vitamins and living in harmony with the earth.

Rodale was a true Renaissance man: publisher, inventor, gardener, playwright, and author of a number of books, including *The Synonym Finder*, an infinitely more valuable and easy-to-use guide to the English language than *Roget's Thesaurus*.

Although many considered Rodale a "health nut," he never varied from his philosophy of natural living and achieved a devoted following through his magazines *Organic Gardening* and *Prevention*.

With the publication of Rachel Carson's *Silent Spring* and the collective consciousness raising of the environmental movement, it turned out that J. I. Rodale was right on the money—a man ahead of his time, totally in tune with the 1970s and 1980s. But he never lived to see the sprawling media empire that bears his name. In a well-publicized demise during a guest appearance on the Dick Cavett television show in 1971, Rodale fell asleep during a commercial break and never woke up.

A great deal of credit for Rodale's success goes to the extraordinary group of executives that were nurtured by the Rodale family. Among them: Bob Teufel, who started in circulation and is now president and CEO, and Pat Corpora, president of the book division.

Pat Corpora has been with Rodale Press since 1980 where he has risen from product accountant in the Finance Department to president of the Book Division. A native of the Lehigh Valley, he earned a B.A. degree from Moravian College. Corpora is the ideal Rodale representative: He is both a bicyclist and an avid runner who has competed in thirteen consecutive Boston Marathons; at his home in Upper Saucon Township, Center Valley, Pennsylvania, he maintains a large organic garden with his wife, Sandy.

PAT CORPORA:

There are four elements in our business that have allowed us to grow and succeed. The first is an extremely powerful editorial product that meets our customers' needs. We encourage our editorial group to be as creative as possible in developing ideas and concepts for new book titles. We give them no boundaries as long as the concept fits our division mission: "To publish books that empower people's lives."

We then take these new editorial concepts and put them through a very rigorous quantitative and qualitative testing process. The combination of creative editorial thinking and solid research methodology has consistently ensured that we bring new, exciting, and salable books to market.

The second element in our direct mail process is powerful creativity. We work with the best copywriters and designers, often encouraging them to break the rules in search of new creative breakthroughs. One of the best examples I can provide was the creative idea of enclosing the merchandise label in our mailing package to reassure the customers that if they were unhappy for any reason, they could simply return our book at no charge.

We have also developed a multistep creative process that brings the marketing and creative people together to brainstorm concepts and approaches and review the mail package before it goes into production.

The third aspect of success is the attention we pay to our lists. We view our lists in two areas. The first is the acquisition of new customers; the second, the enhancement and manipulation of our house file. We are willing to lose money on the acquisition of a new Rodale book customer—whether that customer comes from direct mail, television, or space advertising. Adding new customers to our house file is viewed as an essential element for our future growth. We then enhance our customer file and use the most sophisticated selection methodologies to put the right offer into the right mailbox.

The fourth element of success, and one that is often overlooked, is the efficient and responsive fulfillment, customer service, and distribution functions. The best products and promotions can be rendered useless if this “unglamorous” aspect of our business is overlooked.

Those are the four items that I think all direct marketers should be paying attention to and constantly trying to improve upon.

One aspect that distinguishes Rodale’s direct marketing efforts is the use of freelancers: just about anybody who wants a shot at a package—from cubs just starting out to top writers and designers who command huge fees—will get one. In addition, it does extensive testing on both product and direct mail packages. Of the original sixty-six Axel Andersson winners, Rodale had five of them, more than any other company.

What follow are the two Axel winners by Gene Schwartz for Rodale Press. They are incredibly copy heavy, filled with bits and pieces of paper—lift notes, premium slips, first-person narratives, benefits, benefits, benefits. Every element is more interruptive than the next, more filled with reasons to buy—and buy *now*.

This is mail order copy at its most intense and most masterful. In the words of Malcolm Decker:

The rite of passage for everyone entering this industry should be to memorize one of [Gene Schwartz’s] packages after understanding the marketing, creative, and copy strategy underlying it.

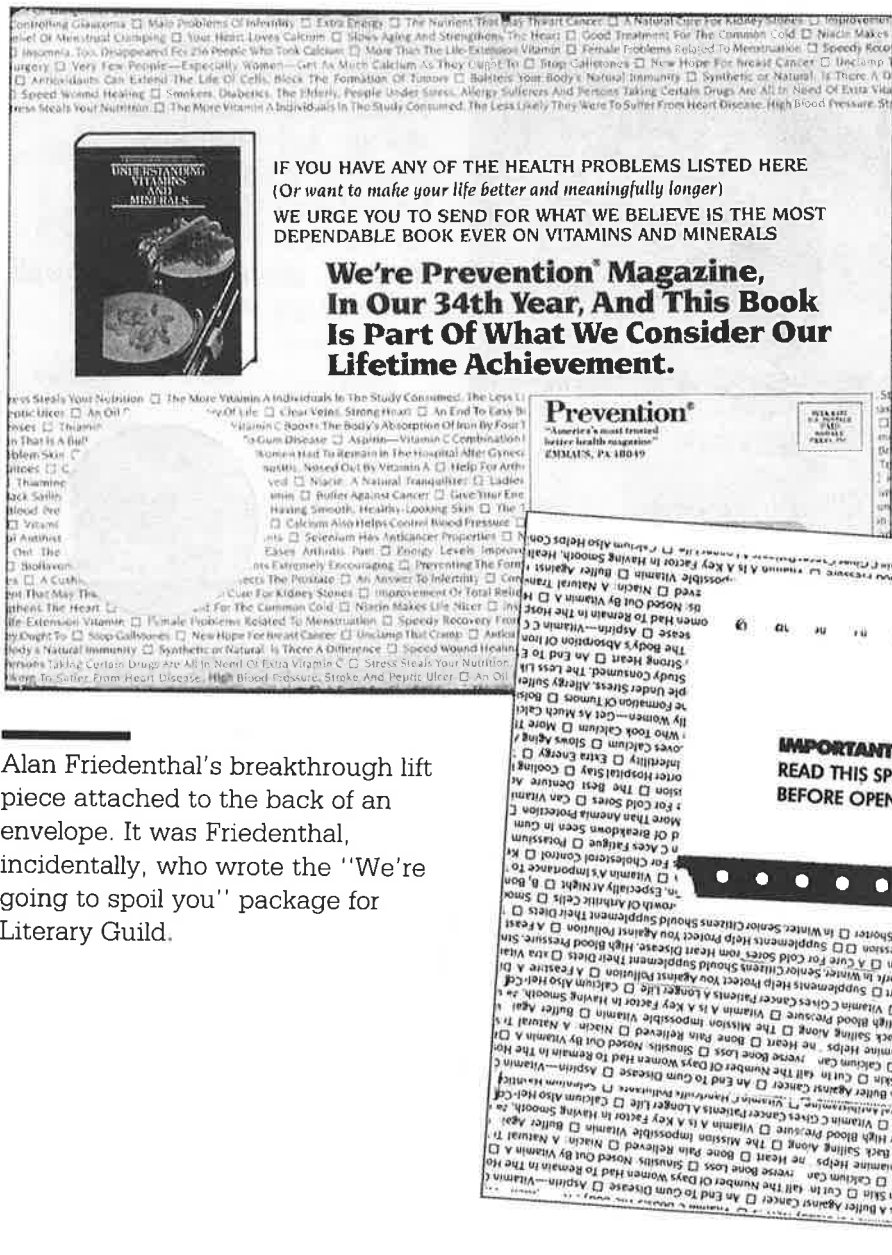


For example, in January 1985 we reported on a 9" x 12" envelope full of bold promises and a six-page letter jam-packed with "tease" copy by Gene Schwartz offering the raging bestseller (1.75 million copies sold up to that time), *Encyclopedia of Natural Healing*.

Manheimer and Wise refined this down to two big promises on the outside envelope: "Trigger your body's own natural immunities" and "Free."

In March 1986 Alan Friedenthal came up with an extraordinary "lift" device—a business reply merchandise return label and letter affixed to the back of a 9" x 12" outer envelope. The message: "Read this first. If you don't like the book use this label to return it at our expense." It raised response 30 percent.

In the September 1987 issue of *Who's Mailing What!* we reported on a 9" x 12" Rodale mailing by Jim Punkre, with confirmation from Brian

Lead Generators

When do you sell a product or service using a lead generator and then a series of follow-ups? Direct mail guru Axel Andersson, who built a huge home-study business in Germany, believes that anything costing over \$350 should be a two-step sale. Certainly anything more than \$450 requires this technique, with the exception of continuity series; you can hide the full price of a twenty-four-volume set by offering it at the rate of one or two volumes a month.

But a big ticket item usually requires a lot of explanation, either in print or in person. Examples: investing in a mutual fund, membership in a trade association, a timeshare condo or vacation home, an office copier, an automobile, a home-study course.

Some lead generators ask you to send for more information; others are after appointments for their sales reps; still others, such as real estate developers or automobile manufacturers, try to lure you to their venue to talk to a representative.

The object here is to reach potentially interested prospects and get them simply to raise their hands by writing, phoning, or faxing for more information or an appointment.

Robert Hacker of the Hacker Group in Seattle heads an agency that specializes in lead generation. Hacker's philosophy of getting leads is opposite that of traditional direct marketing. "The more you tell, the more you sell," is the rationale for the traditional direct mail package of long letter, brochure, lift piece, order form, etc.

According to Hacker, in the business of generating leads, "The more you tell, the less you sell. Avoid giving your prospect reasons NOT to buy."

Hacker's philosophy of lead generation: give them enough information to rouse and excite them—an irresistible promise—but not enough to make a decision.

The next step is the follow-up—either the phone call for an appointment in the home or office . . . or the sales rep's treatment of the hand raiser down at the automobile showroom or the timeshare condo . . . or the material sent in the mail in response to the inquiry.

For the follow-up efforts, Axel Andersson came up with rules of thumb based on years of testing in Germany. Axel's axioms transcend

language or country of origin; they deal with cold logic and common sense:

With a high-ticket item (such as a correspondence course) never put the prospect's name on the order form. Otherwise, the first thing he will see is a bunch of huge prices right next to his name, and this will discourage him. Instead, use a pressure-sensitive label that can be transferred from the addressing document to the order form . . . and bury the order form in the middle of the mailing. Let the prospects get excited about their new career and new life before hitting them with the bad news that they will be in hock for years.

Andersson also believes American direct marketers don't do enough follow-ups. In Germany he would do as many as nine follow-up efforts to a prospect who requested information about his courses. Each follow-up would have a different approach and a different offer. After a lot of testing, he found every effort was profitable. One technique he used for a writing course: send a mailing out on the one-year anniversary of receiving the inquiry and ask the person how life has been over that year . . . and suggest that if he had started the writing course back then, he might be a successful author by now.

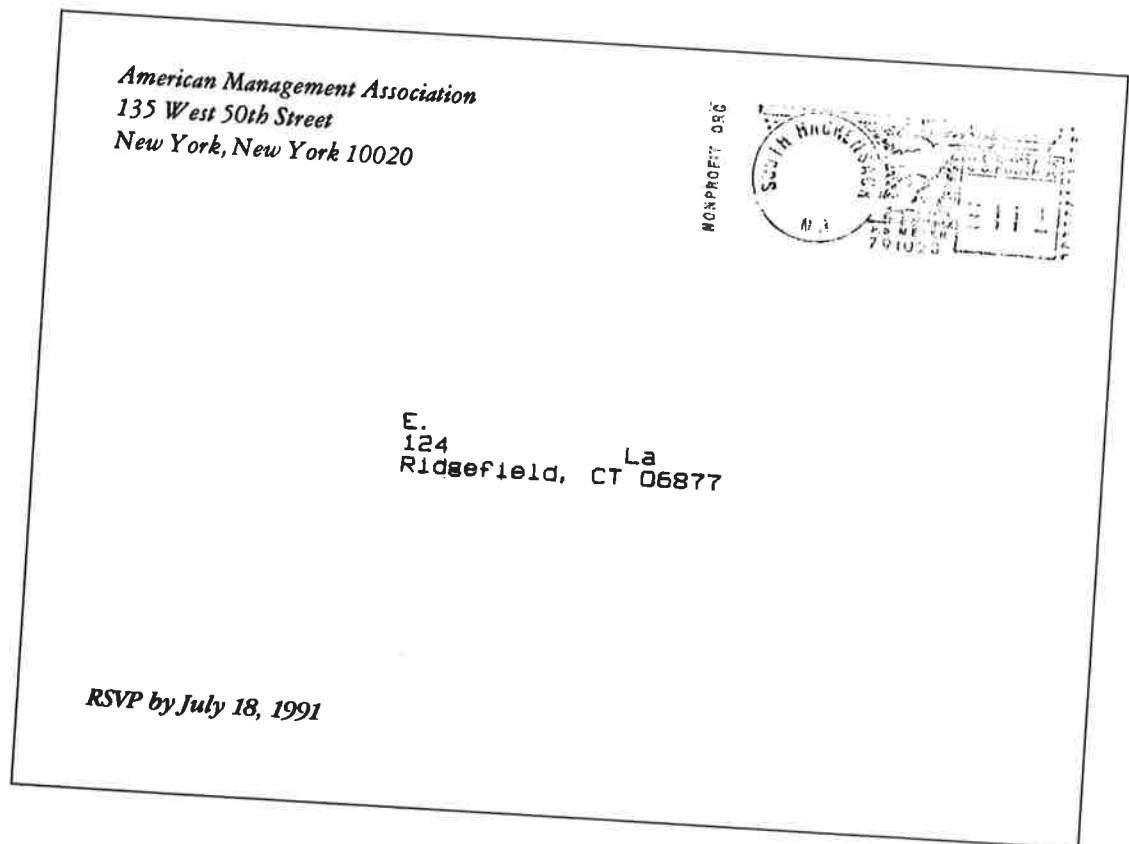
On Axel's inquiry forms were such questions as: "For what purpose are you interested in this course?" There would be boxes to check for vocational information on hobbies, etc. On the basis of those answers, Axel would add a specific paragraph to the follow-up efforts emphasizing that particular part of the course. If you ask for the person's age, you can refer to it in the follow-up letters: "At 29, you are just the right age to learn . . ." "At 49, you have the maturity to . . ."

American Management Association

The American Management Association mailing is one of the classics of direct mail. It was created by the old Schwab & Beatty agency in 1973 and was only recently discontinued because the personalization got too expensive. Every element, including the business reply envelope, is printed on lovely cream-colored vellum paper, so it looks and feels like a real invitation, such as the kind you would receive to a wedding or a bar mitzvah.

Most personalized mailings preprint the reply device so nobody has to go through the trouble of filling in name, address, and other information. This AMA package forced the person to fill in a lot of data. There is a double benefit here: (1) AMA's follow-up material will be sent to the correctly spelled name and precise address; (2) people who take the trouble of filling the form out completely are thereby qualified as being really interested in the AMA.

Notice there is no request for a phone number; it may be that asking for the phone number scares prospects into thinking a telemarketer will call.



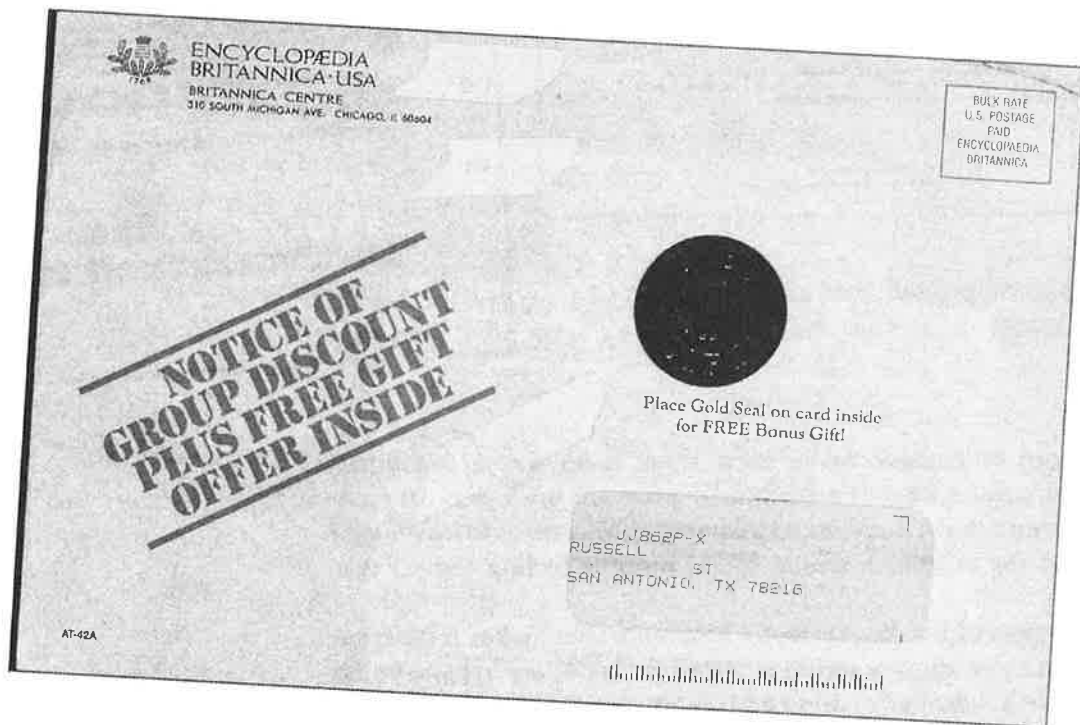

Encyclopaedia Britannica

I cannot remember a month going by in the last fifteen years without seeing a mailing package in some incarnation or other—either from Britannica or from some third-party mailer offering it.

According to Bill Butler, founder of Perkins/Butler Direct Marketing, he wrote the *Encyclopaedia Britannica* package for the Frank Vos Company back in 1975 or 1976 for what was, at that time, known as the "salvage package." It was Britannica's attempt to sell books directly to prospects after they had already seen an EB sales rep but decided not to buy. The original package was 9" × 12". The letter was later adapted to EB's third-party endorsed format.

The entire point of the Britannica effort is to persuade people that they will get a nifty reference set—with no obligation to buy the encyclopedia—if only they will talk to a salesman. A sales rep is the key ingredient here. Unlike, say, a Time-Life series wherein each book is an

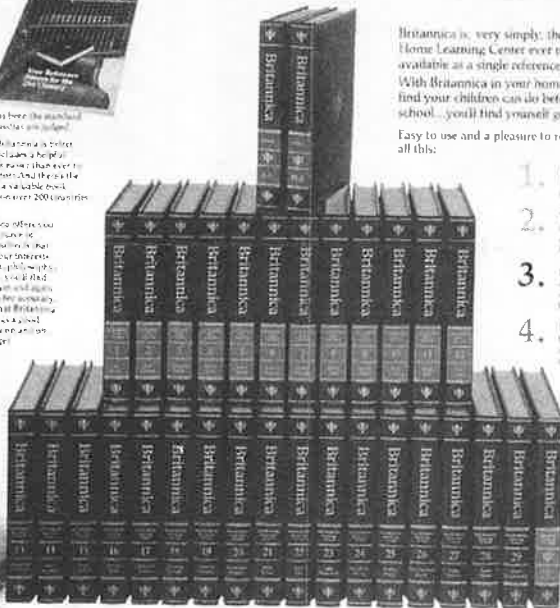

Accounts include American Express, National Car Rental, AT & T, and Nissan Motor.

BILL BUTLER:

I start from the proposition that all good direct mail must answer the question “Why am I writing you?” That is to ask, why you instead of your neighbor? And why mail instead of print or broadcast?

All great direct mail seems to deal with that question, and in doing so, helps explain why mail packages without letters do so poorly. They just don’t answer the “Why am I writing you?” question very well for consumers, at least to this observer.

I value clarity over cleverness.

I like dealing with letters, though increasingly, nontraditional direct marketers insist on wasting money on lavish brochures and outside envelopes to make them “strategically” acceptable. They miss the point that most direct response advertising, particularly direct mail, has its roots in retailing and not mass marketing. Hence, direct response advertising is normally best used as a tactical, targeted retail or sales promotion tool rather than an instrument of grand strategy.

Next to letters, I find order cards most rewarding, I think because they are most overlooked, especially by agencies. Too bad for them. It’s where the results live for me.

I most appreciate the kind of creative development that goes into advertising whose results are carefully measured, then used to plan future advertising. Such is no longer always the case in the industry as direct response advertising is co-opted to meet other agendas, often with embarrassing results. Actuaries beware. Lifetime value calculations now frequently assume Biblical lifespans just to finance questionable “relationships” most consumers don’t know what they want.

Frank Vos, founder and president of the Frank Vos Company, is urbane and literate, with one of the most wide-ranging and eclectic intellects ever to grace the direct marketing stage. Born in New York City in 1917, he graduated magna cum laude from Columbia University with a B.A. in 1942 [sic], earned his M.A. in 1944, and a master’s in philosophy in 1949. Vos’s incipient career with the old Schwab & Beatty Company was interrupted by service as a lieutenant in the U.S. Army in Italy during 1943–46. There he won the Bronze Star and became fluent in everything Italian—language, wine, gastronomy, cinema, art, and history. While at Schwab & Beatty—along with such fledgling legends as Walter Weintz, Tom Collins, and Len Reiss—Vos learned the craft of direct mail copy. In 1948 he became sales promotion manager of the

simply because the offer is too easily and quickly understood by those not seeking the product at the moment. Therefore, I often tried to include in the forefront of each mailing a physical device of seeming value (or usefulness) which was not immediately rejectable. With this technique I was able to compel prospects to read my sales story in order to discover the purpose of the dissonant element in the mailing. I reasoned that if my product had merit, a broader readership would produce greater sales.

Let me give you just a few examples from the precomputer age.

When I was in my twenties I tipped an important-looking blank shipping label to the top of a very brief letter. Until you read the letter, you could not understand what to do with the label. The recipient was instructed to write his name and address on the label in order to receive an attractive "on approval" item which was the basis of this client's recruitment offer. This was a very simple involvement idea, but it pulled so much better than the client's conventional and more elaborate control that it became part of my thinking forever after.

In my thirties I invented, for the Doubleday Book Club, a perforated sheet of some twenty "value stamps." This was during the heyday of "S & H Green Stamps" and no one was about to throw away a lot of value stamps until he knew what they represented. Each of my book stamps pictured a bestseller, and displayed its retail value. The prospect was invited to affix three stamps to the enrollment card, representing the three books he could select as a membership gift. This device was extraordinarily effective, doubling the results of the venerable control which merely asked the prospect to check three product numbers. During the next few decades the stamp concept was copied by so many book and record clubs that it eventually lost its mystery.

In my forties, we were the first to send ultrarealistic, individually embossed plastic "membership cards" to those "eligible" for hospital insurance. Credit cards were just then beginning to gain popular acceptance, and a bit of similar plastic would not be discarded until it was understood. That is how we forced people to read our benefits-and-offer copy. The heavy plastic card added substantially to the mailing's cost, but the tremendously enhanced results paid for the increment many times over.

I guess the most important promotion, dollarwise, which I developed in those days was the broad marketing of insurance policies which were deliberately restricted to military veterans and their families. This concept came out of my own wartime experiences; I realized that millions of veterans had been taught (correctly) that GI insurance was the cheapest and best coverage to be had. It took no more than five minutes for me to convince the late Arthur S. DeMoss, founder of National Liberty, that he could cash in on this belief. Our direct mail results were so phenomenal that Art, at first, kept the offer out of space and TV so that his competitors would not immediately discover how successful it was. They found out eventually, and then everybody got into the act. Nothing I ever created made so much money for so many others.

By this time I had become successful. So had many of our clients, and some of them thereupon replaced entrepreneurship with hydra-headed bureaucracy. As a result, I'm afraid that our mailings became better looking but less inventive, simply because the more unusual they were, the harder it now became to get them okayed. In any case, the agency could make more money collecting commissions on space and TV.

Great Expectations

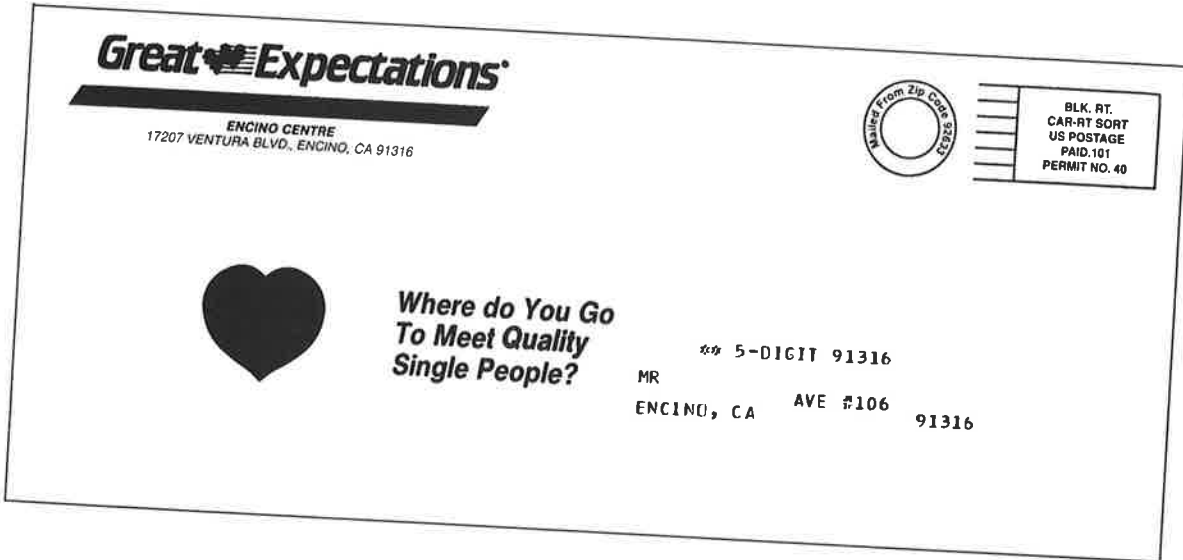

Great Expectations is today's largest video dating service with offices in some thirty cities across the U.S. They mail approximately sixty million lead generation mailers a year, designed to attract single men and women to the various offices for closing by in-house sales people. Because of the heavy volume, keeping the per-piece mailing cost to a minimum is critical.

Their control had been a standard #10 package with an 8½" × 11" two-sided letter/questionnaire and a #9 BRE inside a #10 envelope. Larger packages and self-mailers had been tested against this control with weak results.

I had a hunch that an involvement device would heighten response. The Great Expectations logo is a double heart, one overlapping the other. I designed a #10 window envelope with a peel-off red heart showing through the win-

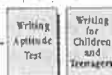

MALCOLM DECKER:

The Institute of Children's Literature was established in 1969 in Westport, Connecticut, in the shadow of the Famous Writer's School, to offer a correspondence course in juvenile writing. FWS did not offer such a course. The Institute wisely distinguished and distanced itself from FWS by using no "famous" writers, and by converting leads by mail rather than by salespeople. The result was a product that was profitable at half the cost to consumers.

In 1976 the Institute asked me to write some direct mail packages for a test, and while one or two were modestly successful, none measured up to our expectations. Nevertheless, the Institute was encouraged and asked me to write some ads to test in Parade. They had made three attempts to beat their control without coming close. I wrote three, and I got Harry Redler to design them.

The best of the three pulled 28.3 percent more inquiries, 45.7 percent more aptitude tests, and 3.8 percent more signed-up students than the "unbeatable" control. My ad was retested in Family Weekly against the old control and it did even better: 31.7 percent more coupons, 32.7 percent more tests, 28.6 percent more sign-ups!

After some additional refinements, the final version outpulled the original control by a cumulative total of 66.1 percent more inquiries, 73.9 percent more aptitude tests, and 59.9 percent more signed-up students.

Their next step was to turn the winning ad into a letter, word for word, and mail it. The headline became the envelope caption, the offer was printed in reverse in a box on the envelope, the ad's subhead was turned into a Johnson Box, and—except for the "Dear Friend" and sign-off—it was 100 percent ad copy. The ad coupon became the order card.

By that time, it had gotten to be 1977. Both the ad and the direct mail package have been control ever since. This copy also runs in package inserts,

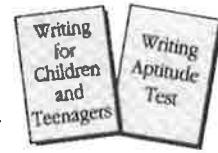

statement stuffers, supermarket take-ones, and elsewhere. Copy cuts and other adjustments are sometimes necessary because of the formats of these media. The testimonials of current students replace older students on a regular basis, a few facts and figures have to be updated periodically, and the type style and illustrations have changed over the years, but the basic copy is unchanged.

Quite a few writers have taken a crack at this copy, but most efforts have fallen far short. I've tried and come close, but not close enough; my original copy is still king—for now.

One final word: every direct marketing pro knows there's no such thing as an unbeatable ad or package or commercial. There are only temporary winners.

Memberships and Merchandise

One good reason to personalize a mailing is the inclusion of a temporary membership card, such as the one found in Pete Gelb's effort for *Audubon* or Robert Haydon Jones's Mobil Auto Club mailing described later in this chapter.

The two mailings that follow—Sol Blumenfeld's effort for Compu-Serve and Robert Haydon Jones's Mobil Auto Club effort—both employ this technique. The reason behind the temporary membership card is somewhat akin to Tony Arau's token philosophy (see Chapter 12), an attention-getting device that appears to be of value. Like Walter Weintz's penny token, the temporary membership card is a hot potato—you have to do something with it. In this case, instead of using it to order the product, you retain it, presumably in a safe place.

CompuServe

CompuServe is an electronic supermarket, offering everything from business, academic, health, and personal information; news; weather; travel and shopping services; *Consumer Reports* product ratings; movie reviews; and games.

The cost of all these services sounds like a pittance: \$25.00; and for that, you receive a series of premiums that would cost far more than that if bought at retail. Throughout the mailing, Sol Blumenfeld hypes the many benefits.

On the last page of the four-page letter he alludes to additional costs:

Your CompuServe membership and everything listed above are yours for \$25.00 (plus postage and handling of the kit). Your initial payment entitles you to lifetime membership and access while your account is in good standing. CompuServe will charge you only for use you make of its facilities plus a minimal monthly \$1.50 membership support fee (after your third month of membership).

To find out the bottom line—how much the so-called use charges are—you are forced to read the entire mailing and go through all four folds of the circular. Finally, on the last fold-out gatefold panel of the circular is the per-hour fee structure. Blumenfeld has illustrated the technique Axel Andersson propounded in the previous chapter: get prospects excited about the offer before hitting them with the bad news about money.

Sol Blumenfeld started in direct marketing as a copywriter with Wunderman, Ricotta & Kline, Inc., in 1961. After thirteen years at Rapp &

The lift piece describing the premiums.

Collins—where he served as senior vice president and creative director—he briefly joined TLK Direct before going on his own in 1977. Other clients include Time-Life Books, MCI Telecommunications Corporation, Boardroom Reports, Columbia House, Merrill Lynch, Citicorp, and Dow Jones.

SOL BLUMENFELD:

This particular CompuServe mailing was created very much in response to the marketing imperatives prevailing at the time.

CompuServe, until recently, was directed at the "technically proficient" market. They now wanted to impact a broader business market, using lists with both business and home addresses. The positioning was to make CompuServe seem more approachable and relevant to recipient careers and lifestyles.

The theme of the mailing was "success."

Photographically we led off with the attractive sweater-clad couple dividing their time between CompuServe and some Chablis.

Copy and graphics were both themed to a panoramic view of CompuServe applications and how they could very specifically contribute to the recipient's health, wealth, and happiness. Long copy, in both the letter and circular, spelled out literally dozens of potential benefits.

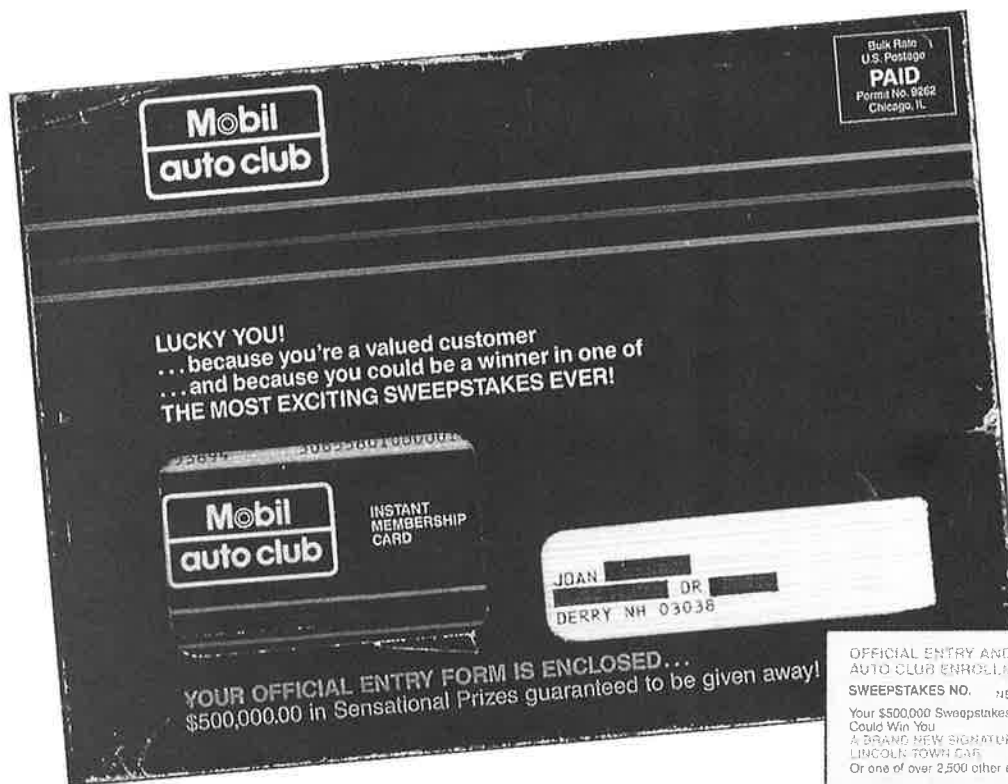
As in many of my mailings, I try to use involvement (membership card, coupon), incentives (\$25.00 free on-line time) and urgency (with a cutoff date).

More abstractly, I wanted this package to be a "hot potato" for individuals tuned into computing . . . creating enough tension to overcome inertia. That it did . . . beating the control handily, with individual list response improvements starting at 30 percent and going up to about 140 percent.

This mailing has run its course and CompuServe presently has a new control again answering some very new marketing imperatives.

Mobil Auto Club

In his article "The Direct Mail Package" (Chapter 4), Malcolm Decker suggests that black is not the ideal color for direct mail. Rules are made to be broken, and Robert Haydon Jones has broken them not only with a black envelope but also with a black "Instant Membership Card" that shows through a second window on the outside envelope.

The business reply envelope shown front and back—one of the very few that does not prepay postage. The reason: this is a sweepstakes mailing, and you never supply a business reply envelope with a sweepstakes, because everyone will enter without buying the product.

This effort just one of two sweepstakes in these seventy-one Million Dollar Mailings. Virtually all sweeps efforts urge people to enter the sweeps, even if they don't buy the product. Arithmetic has shown that the more nos you get, the more yeses (orders) you'll receive. For this reason, the incredible value of the prizes is hammered home along with the warning that you can't win if you don't enter . . . so, ENTER NOW!

Traditional sweepstakes efforts (*Reader's Digest*, Publishers Clearing House) jump up and down and scream and yell WIN! WIN! WIN! . . . PRIZES! PRIZES! PRIZES! . . . so loudly that it is difficult to find out what the offer really is. Many consumers believe that by ordering, they'll have a better chance at winning a prize, even though that isn't true in legitimate sweepstakes.

This effort for Auto Club is emphatically *not* a traditional sweeps. For example, the embossed plastic membership card is the same size and weight of a Visa or Mastercard, and as such, dominates the entry-enrollment form; since this form is the top half of page one of the letter, it also dominates the letter. Throughout the mailing, the benefits of membership in the club are emphasized; the prizes are almost an afterthought.

The rest of the letter is made up of four additional nested pages (individual pages, printed on one side only, folded and arranged in proper sequence). Notice the handwritten notes in the margin; Ted Kikoler talks about this technique as one of his twenty-six design tips in Chapter 5.

Robert Haydon Jones began his career in general advertising with David Ogilvy, serving as group head for Bristol Myers, General Foods, Zippo Lighters, British Travel, Rolls-Royce, and Cunard. As the youngest creative director in J. Walter Thompson's history, Jones directed creative and broadcast production for Pan Am, Ford, and Kodak. After serving as president of Interpublic Direct Response Marketing, he opened in 1974 his own creative shop, Robert Haydon Jones & Associates, where he has launched *Ms.* magazine, American Film Theatre, Xerox Learning Systems, Montgomery Ward Pre-Paid Legal Services Plan, Citytrust Money Market Account, and Frank Lewis Ruby Red Grapefruit.

ROBERT HAYDON JONES:

Thanks for your notice on the Axel Award on our package for the Auto Club and their direct marketing managers at the Signature Group.

I must confess that, at first, this very good news brought me down a peg. You see, what I remember most about this package is that it was nothing but hard slogging.

Frankly, of the hundreds of packages I've done over the years—in my mind's eye—this one was perhaps the least "creative!"

So, when "Jones the Word" here got noticed about this award—not for one of my oh-so-creative efforts—but rather for a project that almost literally required bib overalls and work boots—I had mixed emotions. My Ugly Duckling had become one of the Belles of the Ball!

Wake-up Calls don't often come with such a sugarcoat. And wake-up is the bottom line for me on this. Where do I get off forgetting what this business is all about?

It is not about "Creativity." It is about response and sales and profits. That's precisely why I value the Axel Award over all the others.

To hammer out marketing and develop packages that make profits for my client. That's what my job description is. Ugly, long, short, "creative," or "dull"—who cares?

The Auto Club package was not so much created as it was carefully assembled—mainly by my son, Evan Owen Jones, who is now a freelancer in his own right in Atlanta, and a number of Signature people, especially Paul Misniak.

We looked over at least a decade of mail for Auto Clubs and determined that successful packages had certain factors in common. Briefly, the keys we saw were positioning, benefit priority, and practicality of usage.

We then set out to assemble an "idea" package along these lines. It was a lot easier said than done! In fact, it took us months longer than usual to come to finish. By the time we dropped our test, I hated the bugger!

Earl Weaver, the feisty baseball manager, has a line that sure seems to fit: It's what you learn—after you know it all—that counts!"

You asked for comments on how I work. Here goes. I approach every assignment as if it were a launch. First I interrogate the assignment. Often it is way off base—in terms of a practical business reality. There's precious little upside for yours truly—or my client—if that's so.

Many Moons ago, I broke in with David Ogilvy [D.O.] and his merry crew on the "straight" side of the biz as a writer-producer. D.O. was (and is) a fanatic about product and market knowledge. "Know at least as much about the product as the client." That's D.O.'s war cry.

I think he is dead right. Deep background is still the key for me. And, frankly, it is still the hardest discipline of my craft to follow faithfully.

But it's the linchpin for all good work. Without careful research, you may do well because you are clever—but even so, as far as I am concerned, you are indulging in the Original Amateur Hour!

One more thing. David Ogilvy keeps the most important key to success on a sign that hangs above his desk. It reads:

"Oh God, please give us smart clients!"

Gevalia Kaffe

The Gevalia Kaffe promotion is a til-forbid continuity series. Because it is a food offer, it was included in this group rather than in Chapter 14, which comprises books.

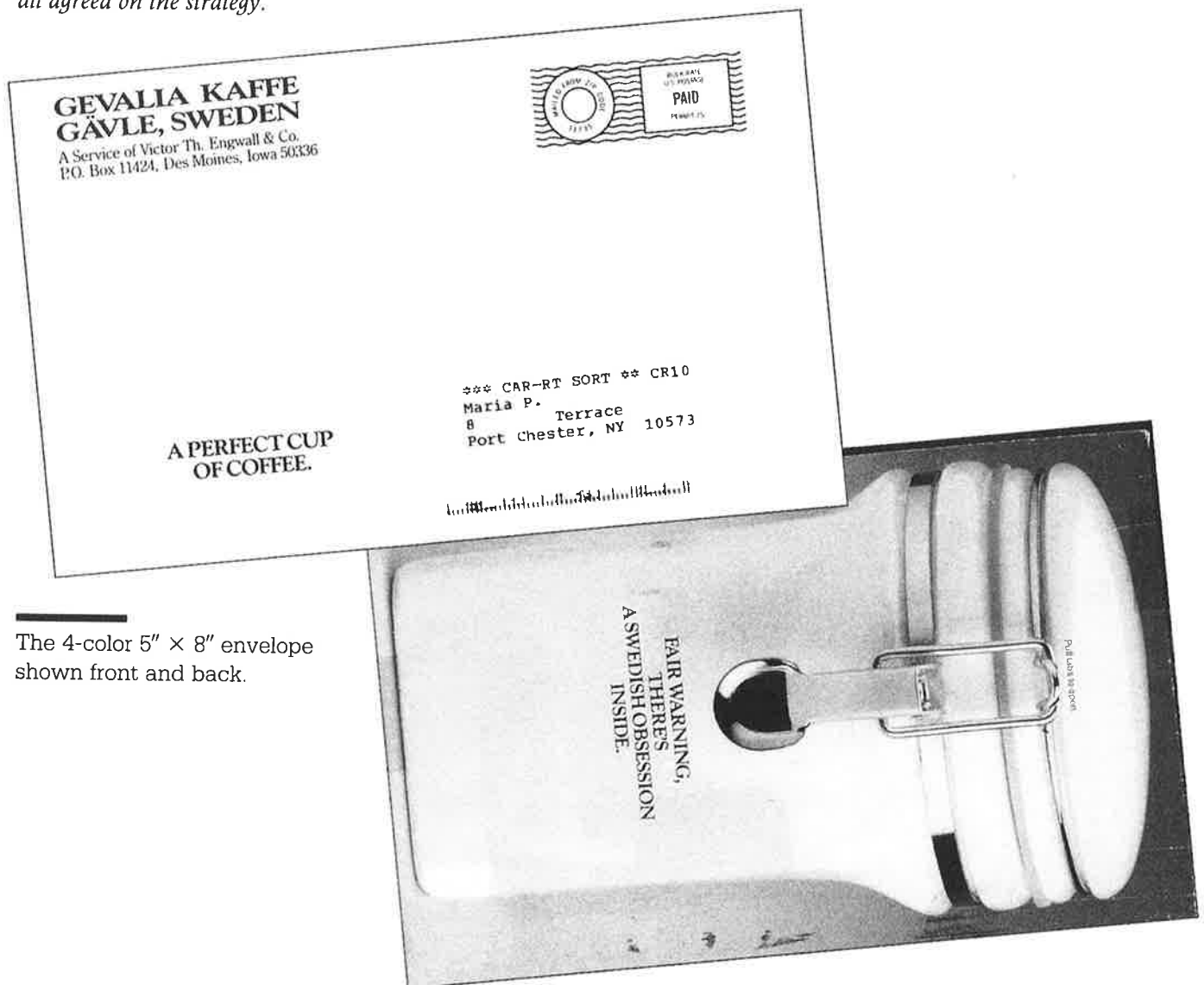
Mary Ann Donovan of Wunderman Worldwide:

First of all, Jane Walsh, the art director, and I, the copywriter, worked as a team from beginning to end—under the watchful eye of our creative director, Jim Infantino.

In 1985 we were asked to do a new Gevalia Kaffe campaign consisting of a print ad and a direct mail piece. (I have to talk about both, because they're inextricably linked since we did them at the same time.)

I was very pleased to get the assignment as I had recently come to Wunderman from a background in general advertising and had a lot of experience working on food accounts, which I've always loved.

I prepared by reading all the available research on coffee and studied the previous advertising. And we met with Account Management to make sure we all agreed on the strategy.

Then armed with a Creative Work Plan (a one-page Wunderman document listing the prospects, the competition, the problem the advertising must solve, the benefit, the reasons why, and the offer), Jane and I sat down in the same office and worked together day after day until we felt we had solved the problem and had headlines and layouts that were on strategy and that we really liked. Although she was the art director and I the writer, there was no rigid demarcation. We both came up with the ideas and sometimes she would think up a headline and I a visual.

This was our thinking as we went along. For the direct mail, we wanted to do a package that wasn't promotiony. We felt the product—a superb Swedish

coffee made in small quantities and only available by mail—deserved an upscale, elegant package that would differentiate it from mass market coffees. We also wanted to attract prospects by making the package intriguing and fun.

For both the ad and the package, we kept the basic image and storyline that had been established in the very successful first magazine ad: "The Magnificent Obsession that produced coffee favored by kings." And took it into a second phase.

Instead of the storybook quality of the original, we decided to bring Gevalia's inventor, Victor Theodor Engwall, to life. We did it in the main photography by giving the reader the feeling of his presence—showing the coffee in "his" study on his desk next to his pipe and pocket watch. Through the window, you see his little town in Sweden. And we made the headline about his real-life struggle to invent a great cup of coffee (and benefit): "Because 132 years ago, one stubborn Swede was obsessed with creating the perfect cup of coffee."

We now had the basic idea, which became the ad as well as the two inside pages of copy in the brochure. We then moved on to the other elements of the package.

The client had asked us to feature the white canister. So we made the whole envelope the canister. And like the real canister, you could pull the coffee out—this time the "coffee" being the package photograph on the cover of the brochure.

Then we realized it would also be neat if you could pull out real coffee and prospects could try it for themselves. So Jane designed it to work two ways: as a box with a four-cup coffee sample and as an envelope without the sample. And it was later produced and mailed both ways.

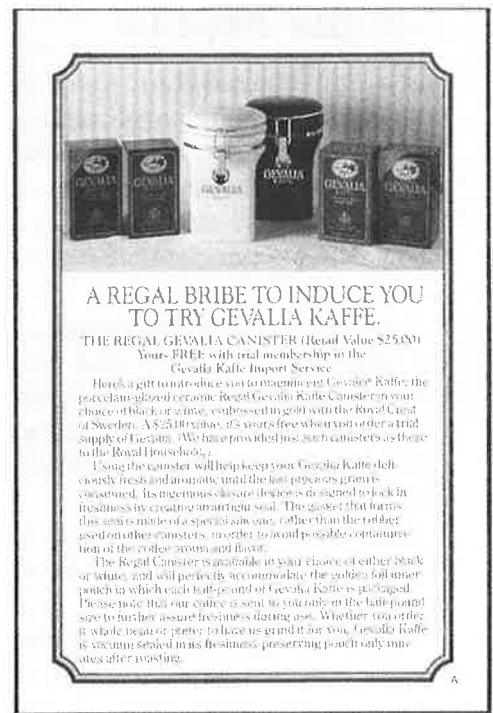
Our next job was to do a provocative teaser line to go on the canister on the envelope. "Fair Warning, there's a Swedish Obsession inside." Then Jane went to her drawing board to do tight layouts and I went to my typewriter to write body copy.

Jane also tackled the order form for the ad, and invented something new and very effective which has been called ever since the "Janevelope."

And I tackled the letter. I wrote it right from the heart, basing it on my own experience when traveling abroad of tasting European coffee for the first time. And then trying and trying to find a brand of coffee that tasted as good when I got back home.

Our clients, Art Trotman and Jerry Maxson, liked the package immediately and approved it. It was produced in 1985, and has been running ever since.

I'd like to tell you that during the process, some magic thing happened, that suddenly one of us leapt up from her chair shrieking, "I've got it!" It would make things more exciting. But actually, it was all very quiet and workmanlike. I think the creative process was a success because we had the right experience for the job, were provided with good information, worked well together, had fun doing it, and took the time we needed to think it all out.

"I understand" (or "Do you understand?") is passive and therefore less emphatic than "I figured it out" (or "Have you figured it out?").


"Figuring out" is more reader-involving, implying more active participation than "understand," which suggests acceptance.

This is subtle stuff, a series of complex rules to commit to memory. But Lewis employs them in his own copy. And because he writes with absolute precision—having thought through all possible shades of meaning—he has had a legion of controls over the years. If using a more powerful word or phrase raises the response rate to a mailing by one-tenth of a percent, and there are a hundred such techniques used, the mailing will pull 10 percent better.

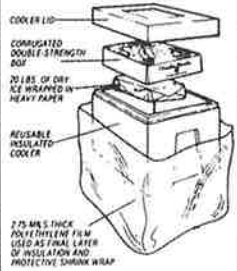

HERSCHELL GORDON LEWIS:

My successful copywriting "secret" isn't a secret at all: It's a combination of the two most logical conclusions any professional communicator should reach.

Conclusion one: Inject yourself inside the brain of your typical target.

Using this simple formula, I've written many a package as a woman . . . as a member of an ethnic or religious or political or philosophical group to which I don't belong or subscribe . . . as a plain ol' country boy. The process parallels "Method Acting."

Conclusion two: Don't show off for your peer group (I hate that term).

One reason so many writers of "conventional" advertising fail as direct marketers is their insistence on showing the reader (or viewer or listener) how clever they are, or how huge a vocabulary they can command. To me, this is a horrendous mistake.

For direct mail copy to work, it must have verisimilitude. Verisimilitude is the appearance of truth. Raw truth has weeds in it; verisimilitude is an unblemished garden.

Truth: "Although the survey shows that readers spend more time with Fortune, and Forbes attracts greater advertising response, this magazine has shown a greater percentage of circulation growth." Verisimilitude: "The marketplace knows what's best! We outstrip both Fortune and Forbes in rate of circulation growth."

Verisimilitude also is a brake on claims. I call this The Ballooning Number Rule:


The farther a number rises beyond the typical reader's personal experiential background, the less emotion the number generates.

So referring to the national debt in trillions of dollars has less impact than "You owe . . ."; computer monitor manufacturers whose copy talks about 16 million colors may be truthful, but they're outside the verisimilitude loop.

One more point about verisimilitude: It thrives on specificity. Example:

Instead of, "We've been in business a long time . . ." a verisimilitude-conscious writer would say, "My father opened his first store at 30th and Main, 32 years ago. . . ."

I have an insurance client whose business began in 1784. In almost every mailing I add to that date, "That's five years before George Washington became president," which in my opinion is considerably stronger than "That's well over 200 years ago."

Now, how I work:

When I start a project, I start writing at once. I'm lucky: I'm able to write as fast as I can type. I don't delve deeply into the technical aspects of what I'm marketing until I've written the key selling piece—usually, the letter. This enables me to stay inside the reader's experiential background.

Too often, we run afoul of the appreciation-differential separating the seller and sellee. The vendor cares about what it is. The buyer cares about what it will do for him or her. I've found this to be especially true in electronics and computer software. Lord knows how many millions of dollars software developers waste, trying to sell programming to a buyer. The typical buyer cares less about how it works than about what its benefits are.

After I have the sales appeal on paper, I'll inject any salesworthy technical details to validate the claims. This technique prevents me from falling into the slough of ignoring what the reader wants to see in favor of what the vendor wants to say.

My opinion—and please categorize this as opinion, not fact: Components of a mailing should have a synergistic effect on one another but not parallel one another. Thus, the letter exhorts; the brochure explains; a validating enclosure authenticates both the exhortation and the explanation.

Newsletters

Newsletters don't lend themselves to long-term promotional efforts. They are by definition *news* and *letters*, private pipelines into the expertise of an editor or a research organization. They generally go to a narrowly defined audience that would quickly get tired of seeing the same envelope over and over and throw succeeding copies of the same effort away. (One technique to revive flagging controls: change your envelope.)

Plus . . . as industries and opportunities change, newsletters change, and those changes must be reflected in the promotional copy to make the publication and its editor seem *au courant*. For example, an investment letter that made people rich on stocks in the mid-80s would have had dramatically to change its story to attract new subscribers (and keep old ones) after the 501-point crash of the Dow on October 17, 1987.

I remember creating a mailing for the Fidelity Investments *Mutual Fund Letter* that landed on the desks of Fidelity investors *the very week of the crash*.

Several weeks later I called circulation manager Bill Baird (now with Ziff-Davis) to ask how the mailing fared in light of the Dow Jones debacle. "You beat control," Baird said.

"I did? Really?"

"Yeah, you got one order."

I quickly rewrote the package, citing the various Fidelity Funds that actually gained in the crash and how, as a member of the Fidelity family, an investor could switch money around without paying commissions or penalties; it was remailed and became control.

That said, five newsletter promotions qualify as Grand Controls. Three are by Donn Smith of Belvoir Publications, Inc.; two of those are identical-looking efforts for two very different products.

One of these efforts—for the Boardroom Reports publication, *Bottom Line/Personal*—is covered in Chapter 21. Boardroom mailings are so distinctive and revolutionary—and so much is to be learned from them—that the two Boardroom Grand Controls have a chapter of their own.

Belvoir Publications

Aviation Consumer and *Aviation Safety* fall into a category somewhere between a magazine and a newsletter. When cataloged by me or my staff, half the time these publications wind up as special-interest magazines and the other half they fetch up in the newsletter files.

When I called Donn Smith to tell him that he had won an Axel Andersson Award for his *Practical Sailor* package, he asked which particular package. When I described it to him, he said, "Ah, my knock-off of the old *Consumer Reports* "Which should you buy?"

Smith "stole smart." The "Which Would You Buy?" Grand Control was a masterpiece that brought in hundreds of thousands of new subscribers for *Consumer Reports* over a period of years.

Aviation Consumer

Donn E. Smith began at Time Inc. in its corporate training program in 1967 and went on to take a position with Time-Life Records, a fledgling offshoot of the book division. Later he was circulation promotion director of the old *Life* magazine and, with its pending demise, moved a few blocks east to become circulation manager at *Newsweek*, and then on to the same job at the *Harvard Business Review* and *New Times*. Since Harvard encourages outside consulting by staff and faculty, Smith developed a relationship with Belvoir Publications, a multititle newsletter publisher in Greenwich, Connecticut, where for the past dozen years he has been executive vice president. Throughout his career, Smith has

COCKPIT COMPUTERS

These new devices have been introduced that not only act as EFB requirements but also serve to help the pilot navigate, acting as a sort of electronic flight log.

The revenues of both the Gulf III and the F4Uc2E II must be manually programmed with the initial and final flight altitudes in support of wind forecasts. This is a very tedious process.

The flight capabilities of what makes the navigation computer useful, and it serves to make the computer fairly safe to use.



THE BOTTOM LINE

We checked the Gulf III and F4Uc2E II. Both were cumbersome, difficult to learn, and inflexible in use. If you own a Gulf III, you may want to consider the Gulf III, but both are in competition to the Flightmaster.

Whether or not it's worth the money is debatable, however. We found it difficult to use for anything intended to replace a good paper EFB and a couple of books.


The bottom line is: If you can afford the Flightmaster, you're going to love it.

SINGLE ENGINE RETRACTABLE ACCIDENT RATES

The Cessna 441B accidents show only that total accident rate in this year in a fleet of nearly 2,000 airplanes.

The top six single engine Cessnas that weren't have an accident rate in excess of 1.0 per 100 hours. The Cessna 441B and 441Q have a 0.8 per 100 hours.

The 33 and 38 model Cessnas have the top four in terms of safety rates. The straight tail versions actually never break up in flight.



THE BOTTOM LINE

The Cessna 441B retractable shows a 0.8 total accident rate - the best of any piston engine airplane, and nearly twice as good as the average Cessna, the Cessna 441. In this analysis conducted in 1984, two airplanes shared the "best" award in the single engine class: The Cessna 441B and the Piper PA-3111 single searage. Both had done a 0.3 later accident rate.


HANDHELD TRANSCIVERS

Although presumably the main reason for a handheld is an emergency backup for ground and air traffic use, there are many other uses for them, from carrying their own battery with the engine off, to listening to ATIS, or talking to the tower.

The King... had by far the best audio power - significantly better than the rest. Offering advantages on the King is the ease of all the factors.

The Hario... is certainly a more use as far as the other handheld transceivers, but it almost invariably simple and logical.

The SPS... magnetic noise rejection was rated relatively poor. Also its audio power was low and had the gain.



THE BOTTOM LINE

The King and the Hario appear to top in our book as the class set among the low VHF based transceivers we tested. If possible, we'd probably lean toward the King because of its slightly simpler operation and more features.

The Hario and the SPS are almost a lock-up in our list of all transceivers in this class, but we'd probably pick the SPS over the Hario.

The Aviation Consumer **SYNTHETIC OILS**

Our tests show a fairly close packing order that performance was the King... bringing up the rear in order of performance, were Amsoil 15W-50, Shell 15-50, and the two Shell single grades.

But an airplane is not a laboratory. There's many a slip 'twixt the test tube and the real world. Problems to consider include their effect on high-temperature oiling systems, lead compound deposits, and the absence of approval from the engine makers.



THE BOTTOM LINE

The synthetics have clear performance advantages. Of us we looked at, we'd rate the King as superior.

But, there were before saying it, if you're flying a plane with a Continental engine and there's a lubrication-related failure, then you've got yourself an engine. These are the words of a Continental spokesman. Lubricating the other hand, has no "the best" of 30 approved oils.

IFR LORANS

These IFR lorans carry the lowest list prices. The IFR600 costs \$1,095.

Though Hario has the best price, Amsoil has the best warranty. Amsoil's warranty is 100% on the digital tape in the small pack. Amsoil's 8-20 and 10W-30 have the smallest caseloads - only 2,000 operations.

The Foster stabilizes, which means in a cartridge, in the event of a spill.



THE BOTTOM LINE

If we have to choose among the IFR lorans, we'd choose Amsoil's 10W-30 and 8-20. The Foster IFR600 primarily because it's the best overall way to buy into the world of IFR instrument navigation.

However, for many instrument pilots the best decision might be to buy an IFR loran with the manufacturer's warranty approved for their airplane's engine.

FIRE EXTINGUISHERS

There's no doubt among knowledgeable firefighters as to the value of using halon - dry and - to light or control the fire. It's available in a variety of sizes and weights - usually 10 lb in the cockpit. CO₂ is similarly available.

We tested the mechanical operation of ASP but haven't yet seen the correct records on safety any better than CO₂ or ASP.

Halon 1201 is about five times more toxic than Halon 1201.



THE BOTTOM LINE

Be sure to always carry a halon fire extinguisher on board. And although the particular formulation is worth considering, the most important factor is to make sure the extinguisher is large enough for the task.

Make sure you've got at least a three-pound charge bottle to give yourself a fighting chance.

In 3-pound charge bottles, Halon 1201 is usually the cheapest, followed by Halon 1201 (217,000 ppm) and topped by Halon 1201. It's a small amount of cost for a lot more confidence using the best brand, CO₂.

According to Donn Smith, he is following in the footsteps of the early *New York* magazine sweeps where the grand prize was dinner with (then) Mayor John Lindsay and second prize was a bench in Central Park with your name on it. "You had to be a dedicated New Yorker to appreciate it," Smith said. "Same thing here."

So far there have been two grand prize winners. A young student pilot won it and really wanted the plane; but Smith spoke to the kid's mother and after running the numbers by her on what it would cost for insurance, they opted for the \$10,000 cash. The other winner really wanted the plane and told Smith that his neighbor down the street was trying to sell precisely that model for \$11,000. So *Aviation Safety* bought the Piper from the neighbor and presented it to the winner.

Is this sweeps still working after six years? Smith just mailed it to the Aircraft Owners and Pilots' Association (AOPA) list and it pulled a mind-blowing 10½ percent gross.

Generally, in direct mail you don't want to repeat the copy or design in one element of a mailing in some other element of the mailing. The logic: a prospect will see it the second time and say, "Whoops, I've seen this before . . ." and lay the entire mailing aside. Once a mailing is laid aside, other pieces of paper are put on top of it and the order is lost.

This effort, written by Don Hauptman and designed by Ted Kikoler, breaks that rule. The copy and design motif on the outer envelope reappear on the first page of the letter. There are two reasons.

First off, a great deal of time and thought goes into the outer envelope. Yet, in the business environment, the outside envelope may not be seen by the person to whom the mailing is addressed. There may be a secretary or assistant in the outer office who opens the mail, discards the outer envelope, prioritizes the mail, and sends it to the boss unfolded and clipped together along with all the other advertising mail. In the 1960s we used to refer to the secretary as "Whitefang," and spent many hours trying to figure out how to get the mailing past Whitefang (who was always female). Today Whitefang can be of any sex; there are many male secretaries and assistants. I am reminded of the two high-powered women executives wanting to arrange a lunch date; one of them said, "Have your boy call my boy."

If Whitefang discards the envelope, all that powerful copy and design are wasted. Hauptman and Kikoler dealt with this possibility by using the headline from the envelope at the top of the first page of the letter and the design—the stopwatch motif—at the bottom.

In addition, Kikoler believes that if the envelope is opened by the addressee, the repetition of the copy and design on the letter subconsciously leads the person to read the letter first, which is the hope of every direct mail writer, since the letter is (in Malcolm Decker's words) the main salesman.

Unlike most direct response writers who learned their craft working for mailers or agencies, Don Hauptman got out of the Navy in 1974 and went directly "from unemployment to self-employment" as an independent copywriter and consultant, specializing in the marketing of information—newsletters, books, conferences, seminars, computer software, and instructional tapes. He may be best known for his Audio-Forum ads with the long-running headline: "Speak Spanish Like a Diplomat!"

Recently Hauptman published *Cruel and Unusual Puns*, a celebration of spoonerisms, shaggy dog stories, and broadcast bloopers. He calls it the perfect stuffing stocker—er, stocking stuffer. Or, as Bill Bailey might have opined: "It's nothin' but a fine couth tome!"

DON HAUPTMAN:

Here are five principles and techniques for writing direct mail:

1. Start with the prospect instead of the product. *Avoid superlatives and brag-and-boast language. Wherever possible, incorporate anecdotes, testimonials, success stories, and other believable elements of human interest.*
2. Do research. *Interview customers, ask questions, listen carefully. My favorite question is: "What are your (the prospect's) greatest problems, needs, and concerns right now?" At least half the time spent on an assignment is pure research—before attacking the blank page or computer screen.*
3. Use specifics to add power and credibility. *Use precise, documented figures and facts in advertising. Cite data or opinions from outside, impartial sources. A lot of copy is anemic and ineffective because it's superficial, vague, and unspecific. Concrete statements and detail supply the ring of truth. But to find this kind of material, you've often got to dig for it.*

WE'VE GOT TO START MEETING LIKE THIS

Soundview Executive Book Summaries is an unusual publication. The editorial consists largely of condensations of business and management books—the object being to save time for busy executives. Yet despite its novel format, Soundview has “newsletter economics” in all respects. The monthly has a paid circulation of 25,000. The subscription price is \$59.50 [currently \$69.50] annually. There is no bill-me option; all subs are paid in advance via check or credit card.

The first package Hauptman wrote had this carrier shown at the beginning: “SLASH your business reading time.”

The control beat it by 23 percent.

“I went back to the proverbial drawing board and realized I had made a mistake,” Hauptman confesses. [The late] Soundview editor Harold Longman had warned me that books have to be emphasized up-front. I ignored his advice. Instead, I tried to be provocative, intentionally disguising the nature of the product in an attempt to entice a larger number of people inside.

“What probably happened is that the executive assumed from the teaser that we’d help him with his routine reading tasks: correspondence, memos, reports, trade publications. When he opened the envelope, we lost him. Meanwhile, many ‘book people’—genuine prospects—never got inside.

“I should have targeted the book-oriented executive from the start,” Hauptman concludes. He called the client and offered to do a revision. He created a new carrier and rewrote the opening of the letter.

The result? This time, Hauptman’s revision outpulled the control by 27 percent. It’s now the publisher’s new control package.

Comments Soundview publisher Cynthia Langley Folino: “When his first effort didn’t work, Don was eager to go back and try again, without charge. We were impressed. Not every copywriter would be willing to do that.”

The moral of the story? There probably isn’t a publisher or copywriter on earth who hasn’t made some giant mistakes. The real question is whether you can acknowledge a blunder, analyze why it happened, learn from the experience, and recycle that knowledge back into your marketing to improve future results.

Howard Hudson is dead on. No copywriter likes to create a loser. Why not go back to the copywriter with the results and ask what might be done to salvage the package and turn it into a winner?

When Hemingway was producing novels, he would create a first draft and then stick it in a drawer for six months while he went hunting in Africa or followed a matador and his cuadrilla around Spain. After the long hiatus, he could look at the manuscript with absolutely fresh eyes and start rewriting.

Copywriters seldom have that luxury. And chances are good that between the time a writer completes the assignment and several months later when the results are in, the writer will immediately see some changes that he or she would have made if only there had not been those impossible deadlines at first.

Freelancer Richard Silverman and I once talked about this, and we both agreed that if a client came back to us for ideas on how to make a losing package a winner—and was willing to give it another shot—we’d gladly make revisions, and for no additional charge.

Business and Financial Magazines

Of all the direct mail I read, the most tedious, boring junk is from mailers trying to sell products and services to people at their place of business. For me, the term *junk mail* is too kind to describe 95 percent of the business-to-business mail I see; because of the boredom factor, there are other four-letter words that more aptly describe it.

There is a reason: *business-to-business* is a misnomer.

At one point I was thinking of writing a book on business-to-business direct mail and was having severe trouble with the title. Business-to-business direct mail sounds as though a business were talking to a business. The image runs through my mind of great megalithic computers grunting out unreadable MBA yuppietalk messages that could only be read by some other great megalithic computer. Much of the mail going to the workplace fits that model.

At Seattle Direct Marketing Day in 1990 I was sitting at lunch with freelancer Herschell Gordon Lewis and Nancy Haug, director of direct marketing for Airborne Express. I said that the term *business-to-business* direct mail was misleading. Businesses don't write letters to other businesses. Mailings go to *people*; people in the workplace happen to be consumers sitting behind a desk or wandering around the factory floor or standing behind a sales counter. I wanted to call the book "Business to People."

"That's not very good," Lewis said. "You don't write letters to people; in direct mail you are talking to each individual *person*."

"Call the book 'Business to Ralph,'" Nancy Haug volunteered.

She was on to something. At least there was acknowledgment that a *person* would be receiving the message. But calling that person Ralph was sexist; the workplace was full of women.

"How about 'Business to Ralph and Nancy,'" I suggested.

That was not very strong either. The implication was still there that a business was creating the mailing, that it was totally impersonal. After some discussion, we came up with a title: "Ralph and Nancy at the Office: The Art & Science of Reaching People in the Workplace and Persuading Them to Act."

The book has yet to be written, but the concept embodied in the title is with me always whenever I write a direct mail package aimed at the business environment as well as whenever I report on one.

I say glibly that a person in the office is a consumer sitting behind a desk and should therefore respond to all the techniques tested in the consumer arena. It's not quite that easy.

Yes, the person behind a desk responds to all the basic human needs and wants: fear, greed, power, lust, self-worth, a bargain, something for nothing. But any mailing to the workplace must also deal with the following circumstances:

1. The mailing must get past the mail room and past "Whitefang"—the secretary or assistant. If the outside envelope looks like Marvel Comics or a *Penthouse* cover, it may offend, not be taken seriously, and be discarded before the right person sees it.
2. The person in the office is different from the same person at home. At home, people can lie around on the sofa in grubby clothes munching potato chips and watching the tube, while taking pointed barbs from the in-laws who are visiting. At the office, this person dresses up and, like Rodney Dangerfield, hopes to get some respect. A wild mailing might intrigue the consumer at home but make the same person feel diminished at the office.
3. In the workplace people are spending the company's money, not their own. Offers mailed into the business arena cannot simply gratify a personal need; they have to demonstrate a value to the business as well.
4. The decision to purchase may not rest with the person receiving the mailing. A group decision or the okay from someone higher up may be involved. This is especially the case of a high-priced item. If so, the mailing will most certainly be passed along. After all, if someone thinks enough of an offer to forward it to someone else in the company, isn't that a tacit testimonial from a stranger in behalf of the product or service?
5. People at work spend their time absorbing information and figuring how to put that information to work for them. They want quick fixes, not long, boring diatribes. If a person in the office can grasp the benefits and their importance in one minute instead of three minutes, response should be higher. There is no place for dull, copy-heavy junk mail anywhere, anytime, but most especially in the workplace. This is borne out by comparing the length of direct mail letters of consumer magazines that of such letters of business and financial magazines. If you study the statistical grids in Appendix 1, you will see that the average letter length of consumer magazines is 3.3 pages while business and financial magazine letters average only 2.1 pages, or 36 percent less. What's more, 64 percent of business magazine mailings have window envelopes; 79 percent of them announce that they are advertising mail by having promotional copy on their envelopes; and 71 percent of these mailings use the word *free* prominently.

In *Who's Mailing What!* I once reported on a small side business of Publishers Clearing House (PCH)—getting magazines into the reception rooms of doctors and small companies. Everybody in the country receives giant PCH mailings with huge window and dazzling personalized

headlines that scream \$10 million in sweepstakes prizes. When the company mails into the business arena, the outside envelope is discreet enough to get through the mail room and into the hands of Whitefang. Once inside the package, however, you find all the traditional PCH bells and whistles from their consumer efforts—albeit a bit muted: stamp sheet, \$10 million sweeps entry-order certificate, prize brochures, a flyer touting those magazines where you save the most, a personalized letter with a personalized Post-It-like piece stuck on, and a fake check for \$50 to illustrate the amount you'll win if you are among the first fifty respondents.

In the words of Robin Smith, the perceptive and articulate president of Publishers Clearing House: "We tried upscale mailings to businesses and they didn't do any better than downscale mailings to businesses."

Personalizing a mailing is more expensive than simply printing a label and slapping it on an order card. As we have pointed out, very few of these seventy-one Grand Controls use personalization for no apparent reason—Book-of-the-Month, *Harper's*, *National Wildlife*, and *Financial World*.

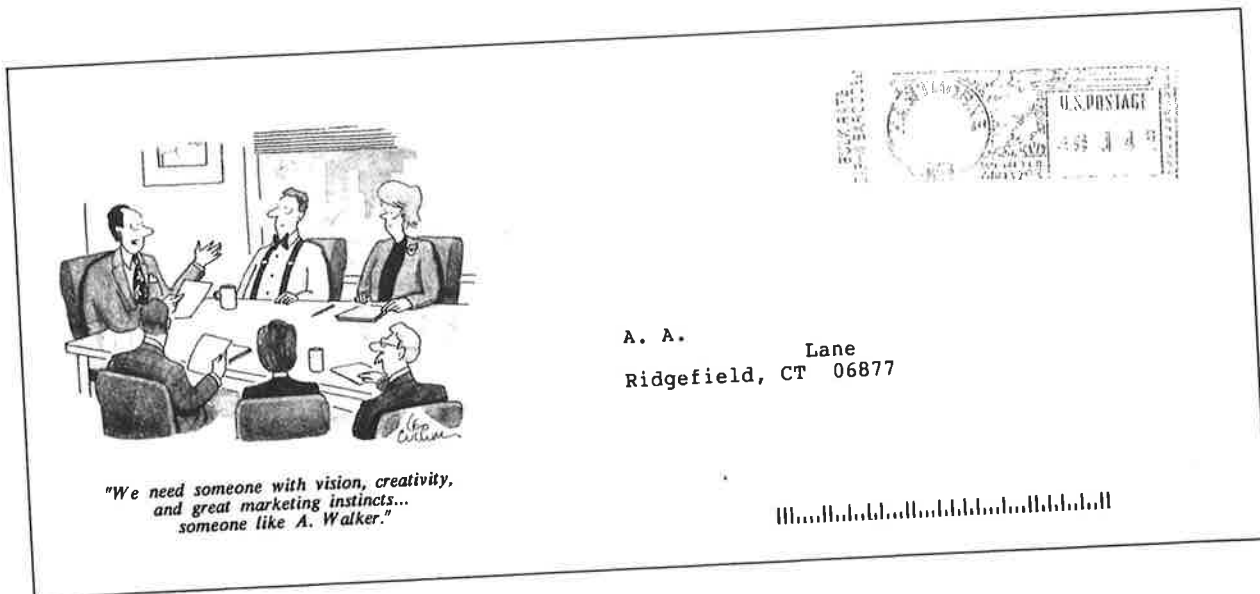
Just about everybody has received mailings with personalized cartoons on the #10 envelopes from *Advertising Age* and *Sales & Marketing Management*. There has been much media coverage lately about the use of these devices in direct mail. Yet, for all that has been written about them, two questions have remained unanswered: Do they hype response? How much do they cost?

The premier practitioner of the personalized cartoon is Stu Heinecke, head of a West Coast agency that bears his name, in a joint venture with WX Wordtronics. Heinecke, bespectacled, with a long, craggy John Carradine face, makes no secret of his love for what he calls his Project X. "My God, I get to work with my heroes—Gahan, Arnie, Eldon, Cul-lum!" he enthuses. He has assembled a stable of world-class cartoonists and a library of their cartoons—along with many of his own—on a variety of themes: general business-to-business, lawyers, doctors, restaurateurs, banking, travel, investments. All can be personalized.

When we asked Heinecke for information, he sent a sheaf of thirty personalized cartoons, each more fun than the next. My favorite: an executive on the phone saying, "Put Donald Trump on hold; I need to talk to Denny Hatch."

Do they increase response?

Dave Kelley of *Ad Age* is delighted with his results. His package has the personalized cartoon on the #10 outer and then repeats it twice inside—at the top of the letter and on the order card. Kelley's offer: a \$40 discount on a subscription and—free with payment—an 8" × 10" limited edition of a personalized cartoon by *New Yorker* cartoonist Leo Cullum, suitable for framing. According to Kelley, this was the most successful test of the year, with great up-front response, okay pay-up, and the highest cash with order in the history of *Ad Age*. Apparently prospects are so excited about seeing their name on the personalized cartoon premium, a disproportionate number write a check on the spot.

Judy Samuels at *Sales & Marketing Management* reported great up-front response, but less-than-terrific pay-up. Her package repeated the envelope cartoon only on the letter but did not offer the premium suitable for framing. She is currently testing the personalized cartoon suitable for

framing plus a "nifty fifty" wrinkle: if your order is among the first fifty to be received, you will receive your personalized cartoon signed by the artist a cartoon postcard has replaced this # 10 effort as control.

As for costs, Stu Heinecke had been charging as much as \$25,000 for conception, copy, design, and an original *exclusive* cartoon, but found that prospective clients were balking at that high front-end risk. So now he offers a menu of choices. There is a minimum-use fee of \$3,000 for mailings of 5,000 or less, with the per-piece rate falling to 7 cents at 100,000, all the way down to a penny on huge rollouts. For an additional \$2,500, an original *nonexclusive* cartoon can be created that will then go into the Image Bank (library) after first use by a client; an exclusive design is \$5,000, plus all royalties. If Heinecke does the creative, there is a \$2,500 fee for full copy and \$2,500 for full design. According to Dave Kelley, the 8" x 10" personalized premium cartoon is in the mail for \$3. Project X mailings are marketed and produced exclusively by WX Wordtronics. According to Howard Strome of Wordtronics, a 100,000 #10 cartoon mailing with personalized cartoon on the OSE, letter and order form, three-page letter, BRE, cartoon royalty, and inserting and mailing would be approximately \$400 per thousand; to this must be added the cost of any additional flyers, postage, and list rental. Not cheap, but it can more than pay for itself.

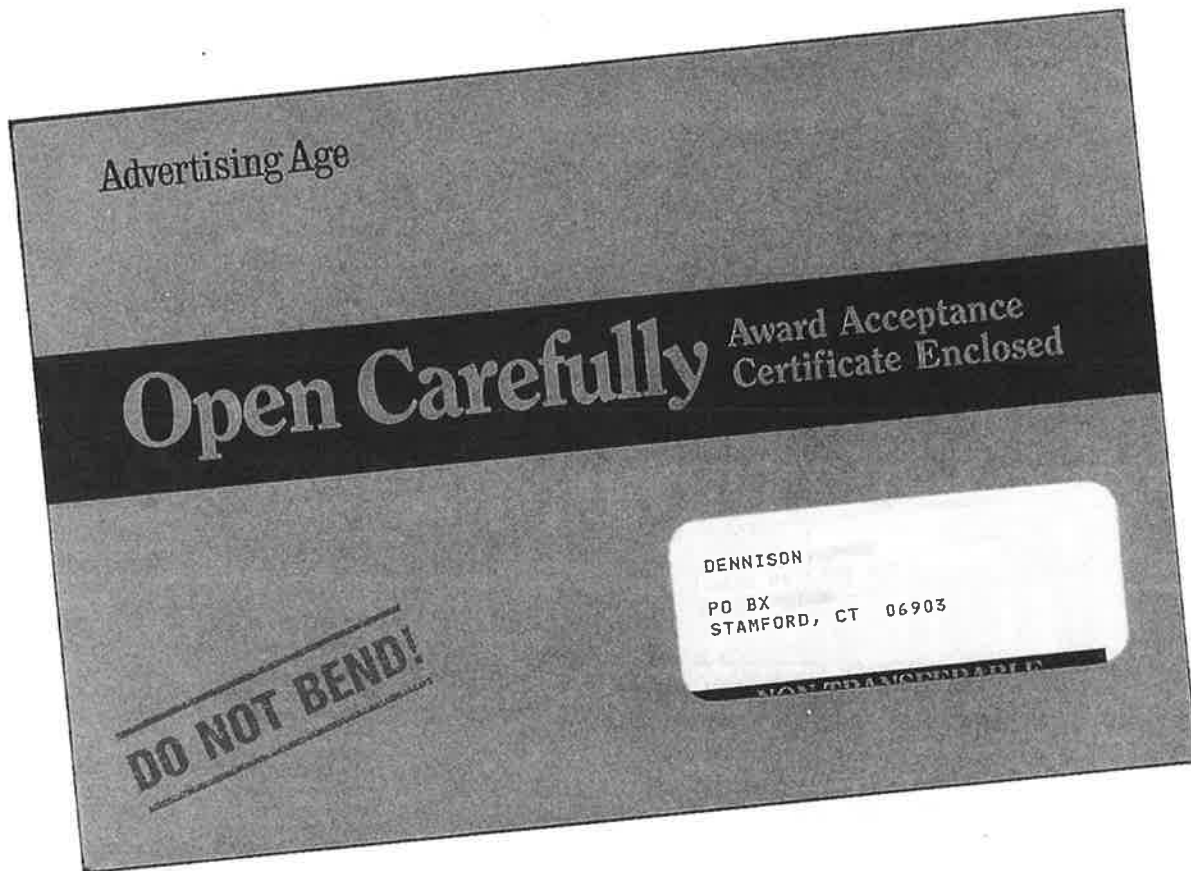

One basic rule that Christensen breaks regularly is designing an order form that is larger than the business reply envelope. Traditionalists say that you should never have to fold the order form to fit the BRE; it requires action that allows for one more slip between cup and lip. On at least two mailings for *Ad Age*, Christensen has disregarded this rule. And given the longevity of this "Marketing Genius Award" effort—strong performance every year since 1985—who's to argue?

BILL CHRISTENSEN:

The creative process is a lot more than a rewrite of copy and a re-do of graphics. I ask the client lots of questions about the offer itself. If I find weak spots in the offer I like to eliminate them. I question the client on terms, pricing, length of contract, guarantees, and much more. A lot of these things are never questioned by other creatives . . . because they are perceived as cast-in-stone standard client operating methods. A good creative person should dig into all of this . . . because this is where you find ways to simplify the offer . . . and boil things down to a quick "yes" decision.

By the way, one way I have dramatically lifted response for a lot of clients (and simultaneously saved tons of operating dollars) is by removing the toll-free phone number as a reply option.

This kind of up-front thinking and research is just the first step in putting

together what should always be a unified presentation of the offer that starts with the outside envelope and carries all the way through to even subtle details on the BRE. Everything in a direct mail package should work together toward the one common goal of "yes." And, at the same time, every element in a package should also stand on its own, possessing its own ability to trigger the reply. This point relates directly to what I see as the biggest single weakness when I review direct mail packages for other people:

Most packages simply don't ask for the order aggressively enough, often enough, and in a sufficient variety of ways.

A package that makes a single request for the order in the last paragraph of the letter is like a salesman with a cold, weak handshake. If he's not confident . . . neither am I.

One more thing I like to do is create substance where there once was none. This is particularly important for lead offers. Instead of asking the prospect to send for more free information from Mid-American Life (no substance, too vague), I'll have him "send for Information Packet No. 17" (the word "packet" automatically denotes tangible substance . . . and adding "No. 17" implies the existence of an established consumer information bureau). In fact,

(check, major credit cards, and "bill me later"), and three reply options (mail, toll-free, and local phone). I asked Dave Kelley at Ad Age if such a vast array of options was dictated by forces beyond his control, and, if not . . .

. . . what was the most popular payment method, subscription length, and reply method. The answer came back, "bill me later," one year, and reply-by-mail. The responding public had spoken . . . and as a result I determined that Dave's new package would incorporate that one simple reply formula only.

Next, I thought about my target audience. "Hmm . . . largely people in advertising and marketing. I'm one of those guys myself. Let's see, if the rest of them are like me, there's a lot of self-importance to play with here . . . and some pretty big ego considerations . . . a desire for recognition . . . and, of course, the sure knowledge that they are the greatest thing since David Ogilvy. Awards! . . . that's it. We all deserve one. The outer envelope will say "Award Acceptance Certificate Enclosed" . . . if that doesn't generate a 99 percent 'openage' rate, nothing will."

And that's how it went. I decided to key in on the Marketing Genius Award mug . . . and incorporate it into a format that would allow me to use personalization in a way that really showed it off. I then made sure that this was all carried through on every piece of paper in the package . . . and incorporated prominently featured classic techniques like a reply deadline (communicated several times with an urgent, credible tone) and a P.S. that uses the central hook to provoke the recipient to read the whole letter, etc., etc. Basics. Basics. Basics.

And, to refer back to an earlier point, I ask for the order, sometimes repeatedly, on every panel of every piece of paper. I ask first in the first paragraph of the letter . . . then I ask again by the third paragraph . . . and it continues on from there, over and over again. (I can't emphasize this enough as a help to folks who want to learn direct mail selling.)

Good direct mail is created by using good common sense. Stick to the basics. And follow through on the details. Every detail counts. Make sure the letter looks and reads like a letter. Use a classic format . . . but use it well by motivating the buyer with every piece of paper in it. Ask for the order a lot. Keep things simple. A well-executed classic format stands out in the mailbox. That's because—to this day—most of what comes in the mail is, in fact, not classic . . . it has not been fully thought through.

One more thing—for most clients the day of the single "cure-all" control-package-that-can-be-rolled-out-to-most-of-America is over. Break your lists down. Segment. And write well-targeted offers for each segment. It takes a lot more elbow grease. But it pays off big.

One of the consummate masters of the direct mail writing craft was the late—and very beloved—Hank Burnett of Santa Barbara, California. A graduate of Harvard, Burnett worked as director of special projects and account supervisor at Dickie-Raymond (later the D-R Group of Boston and New York) and as creative director (New York), and vice president and director of West Coast operations (Los Angeles) for Benson, Stagg & Associates. In 1968 Burnett created one of the greatest direct mail efforts of all time—a seven-page typed letter that began:

As Chairman of the Admiral Richard E. Byrd Polar Center, it is my privilege to invite you to become a member of an expedition which is destined to make both news and history. It will cost you \$10,000 and about 26 days of your time. Frankly, you will endure some discomfort and may even face some danger.

On the other hand, you will have the rare privilege of taking part in a mission of great importance for the United States and the entire world. A mission, incidentally, which has never before been attempted by man.

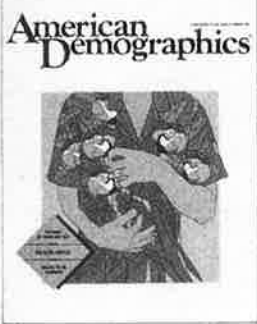
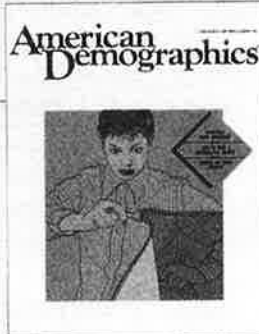
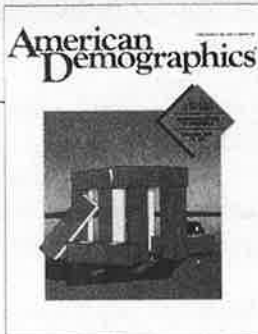

As Dick Hodgson writes in *The Greatest Direct Mail Sales Letters of All Time* (Dartnell):

The Admiral Byrd letter is more than just a great letter. It is a classic example of how a great letter alone can do a selling job. The total marketing budget for this project was \$5,000, which ruled out use of the usual four-color brochure included in almost every travel mailing. So Hank Burnett, and his associates, Dick Benson and Christopher Stagg, had little choice but to let a letter do the job. And, thanks to Hank Burnett's challenging copy, this single seven-page letter completely sold out all 60 seats available and raised \$600,000 for the Admiral Richard E. Byrd Polar Center.

Burnett was a freelancer for twenty years, and his many clients included AARP, Amnesty International, *Atlantic Monthly*, Boardroom Reports, *Consumer Reports*, the Cousteau Society, Hearst Magazines, MADD, *New York Review of Books*, *Psychology Today*, *Sassy*, Sierra Club, *Smithsonian*.

I wrote Mrs. Hank Burnett to ask if she could jot down some memories of how Burnett worked, and back came some fascinating material, including letters from writer to client about his *American Demographics* package.

Burnett's Yes-No-Maybe package for *American Demographics* was first mailed in 1987 and has been controlling ever since. We have seen it in both 9" x 12" and 6" x 9" formats.

GRETCHEN FALL BURNETT:

First, Hank was a voracious reader, always on the lookout for anything that might apply to his life and work. He culled newspapers, magazines, books, etc., marking relevant facts, passages and observations.

Always a stickler for grammatical correctness and the consummate word-smith, Hank's library consisted of any number of dictionaries, books devoted to the English language, synonyms, quotations, etc., which he consulted when necessary or out of curiosity. He also collected famous—and perhaps not so famous—quotations relating to any number of topics to be used when and if appropriate.

His love for and extraordinary mastery of the language, not to mention his proper and emotionally engaging use of it, is summed up well, I think, by Milt Pierce's observation that Hank "didn't blast out his ideas" when other writers expounded ideas with "olympian grandeur," but instead waited for a pause in the shouting and would modestly speak "with a softness that stood out of the din. And we were all suddenly silent, listening to Hank. He had ideas. He had style. And he knew the craft of copywriting better than any of us. In his understated way he said more than any of us."

Second, upon receiving background materials from a client, Hank would review them in depth, thoroughly grounding himself in, for example, previous copies of the magazines (pictures which were often used in his rough layouts for the artist), previous fundraising efforts and/or direct mail subscription efforts. In this sense Hank was a researcher who really did his homework.

Then he would begin the letter. Enter the creative leap! How Hank then came up with a new approach is a mystery. I often wondered how he was able, on so many occasions, to come up against one of his own control packages and beat it! Sometimes again and again. This happened several times with some clients he did work for over the years.

Third, I do know Hank wrote painstakingly, choosing every word very carefully, and did not proceed to paragraph 2 until paragraph 1 was in his mind perfected and so on throughout the letter and the rest of the package. Needless to say, some clients and their products/causes were easier than others with respect to the time it took him to "knock out" a package.

Fourth, Hank's thoughts on direct mail. He obviously had many throughout his long and distinguished career, many of which I learned through sheer exposure/osmosis—too many to share given my time constraints at this point. However, one of his oft-quoted statements comes readily to mind: "Never forget that you are trying to reach and persuade one human being, no matter how many millions of pieces you mail. And if you would better know that human being, take a close look in your mirror."

Personalize and convince the reader that he/she needs the product, that his/her life will be improved and enriched by whatever/whoever is being promoted.

I think Hank was an author who was able to tap into the collective unconscious of his readers. He had an uncanny and intuitive intellect and was able to be in many places simultaneously. For example, I am reminded of how he launched Sassy for adolescent girls and immediately launched Lear's for women over age forty-five.

I once wrote Burnett to ask him for his thoughts on the Sassy launch package and he replied:

out adult women. And besides, I have the lurking impression that it is not only unseemly but faintly illegal for a man of my age to know too much about thirteen- to fourteen-year-old girls.

That launch mailing to 96,000 names pulled 6.02 percent overall, with five lists pulling two digits, including one list that pulled a whopping 80.05 percent.

Hank Burnett to Catherine Elton, circulation director of *American Demographics*, March 27, 1987:

Here's my direct mail subscription package—copy and organizational rough layouts for the outer envelope, four-page letter, lift letter, 11" × 21¼" brochure, and order card (with token).

As I think I mentioned to you on the phone, I've conceived this as a 9" × 12"

package, to help it not get lost in the great pile of direct mail these people get. I'm just a bit ambivalent about this. On the one hand, I want to be sure the package gets every possible chance. On the other, of course, I'm keenly aware of the cost.

So ideally, I guess, I'd like to see it tested also in a 6" × 9" version. I think the only component that might be a bit difficult to transform into that format would be the order card. So let me offer to redo the order card—at no additional cost to you—if you decide you'd like to test a 6" × 9".

I'm afraid I got a bit carried away on my roughs. Sometimes that happens if, as in this case, I develop fairly strong feelings about how the package ought to look as I'm writing it (I have a tendency to think both visually and verbally at the same time). What I intended to convey was sort of the tone and feeling of the package, but in this case I more or less ended up designing it. It really isn't my intention to get in the way of whatever Dave Gordon's ideas may be; he is after all a designer, and I am not. So he may take exception to this. If he does, I won't mind in the least (though I would like to retain the tone and feeling).

I invariably end up feeling a bit awkward about this, but being able to see it really does help me write it.

Incidentally, your editors may want to alter the list of articles and topics in the brochure. I have no problem with that; they may well have strong opinions about which articles have aroused the most interest and controversy.

Anyway, I hope you like it. And please don't hesitate to give me a call if you have questions.

Hank Burnett to Catherine Elton, April 10, 1987:

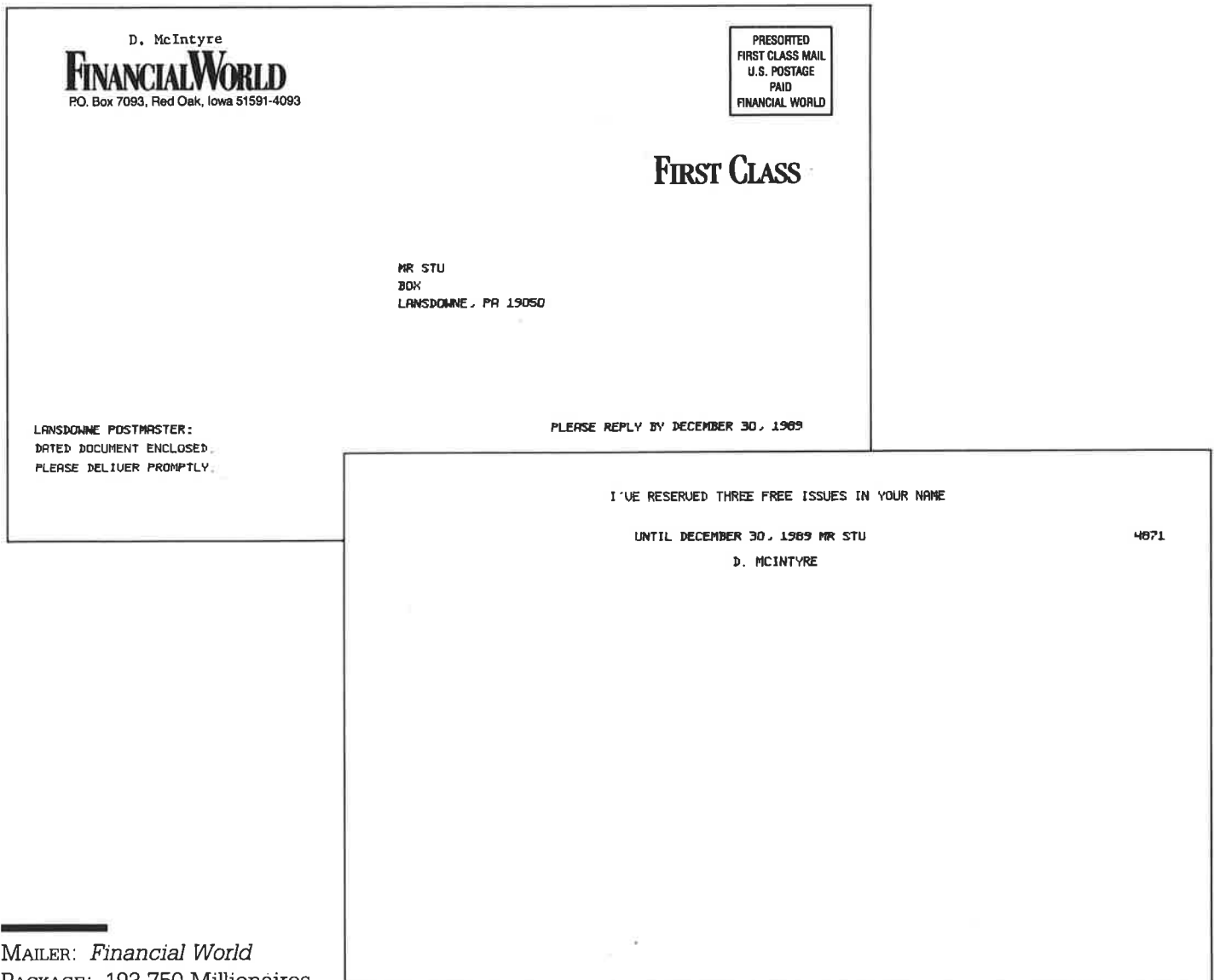
I hope you're recovering nicely from your brush with mortality. My own left me with slightly altered driving habits, a good thing; I'm a bit more cautious, a bit less inclined to take things for granted on the road. And I guess those new habits are pretty durable; it's been about seventeen years.

Anyway, here's material for the 6" × 9" package version. This didn't pose as many problems as I thought it might. What I've done—as you'll see in the enclosed roughs—is to reduce the components (and do a minor bit of shifting around on the order card). The idea is to introduce as few new variables as possible, so that you get as accurate a reading as possible on the effect of the different size. Incidentally, I didn't go as far, in terms of design, as I did on the original layouts, but the colors should remain as close to the 9" × 12" as possible. Almost as if this were a miniature of that format.

Financial World

To create a package for *Financial World*, Linda Wells had to get inside the head of an entrepreneur/investor, which she did with enormous success. The package—written by Wells and designed by John Rettich—was first mailed in 1986 and became control in 1987. Although the package has been tested with and without personalization, the most recent efforts have been personalized; this is one of the very few of the seventy-one Grand Controls that use elaborate data processing for no particular reason beyond the fact that it apparently works better than the plain version.

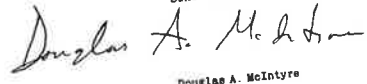

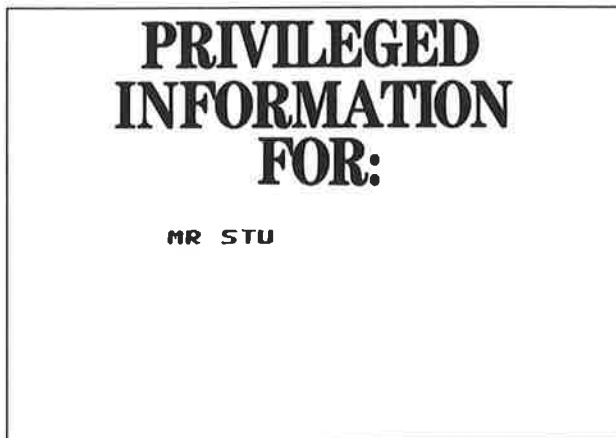

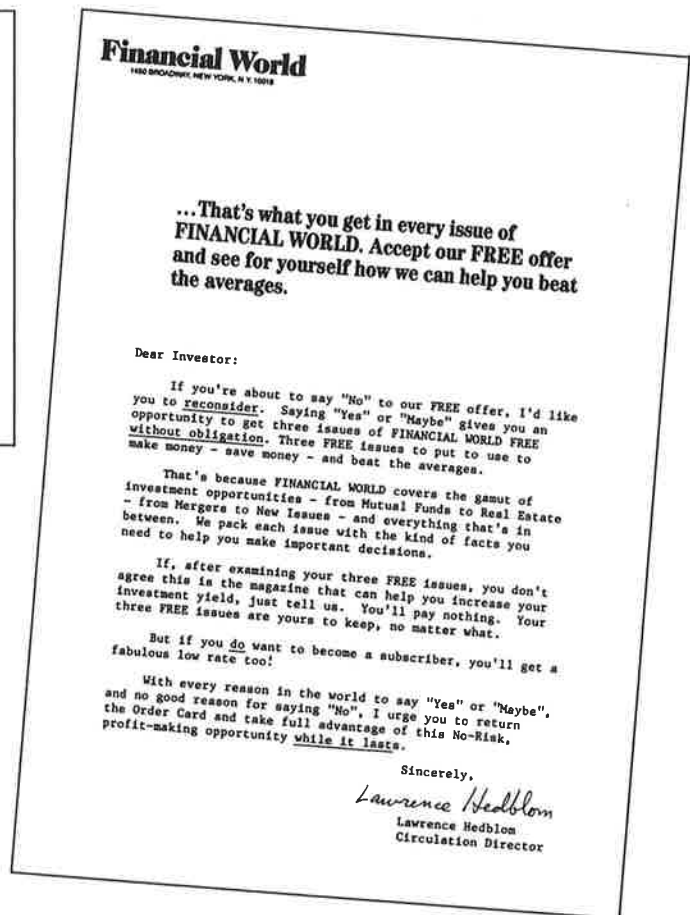
Notice that the order device uses the Yes-No-Maybe token that Hank Burnett employed in *American Demographics*. Years ago Yes-No stickers were tested. It was a daring concept, because if the person said No and sent it back in your business reply envelope, you were paying postage for No order. It wasn't a total loss: the list of people who responded No could be profitably rented to mailers with contrarian products such as burglar alarms and guard dogs. More to the point, it was found that even though giving the Yes-No option did bring in some Nos, it also raised the number of Yeses, and so was profitable.

The Yes-No-Maybe wrinkle was invented by freelancer John Francis Tighe. While a basic rule of direct marketing is not to give the prospect too many choices ("Confuse 'em, you lose 'em"), this technique seems to work in some instances. It's all the more remarkable here, because of the crummy personalization—a dot matrix typeface that doesn't match the rest of the letter. But it works!

Designer John Rettich has over twenty years' experience in direct response marketing, predominantly consumer magazine circulation, but with wide experience in other areas as well. Awards include the 1987 Gold Mailbox (with Karen Weinstein and Milt Pierce), silver Folios, and four Axel Andersson Awards for (*Aviation Consumer*, *Aviation Safety*, *Practical Sailor*, and *Financial World*). He teaches and lectures on direct response design.

JOHN RETTICH:

It's difficult for me to analyze a process I've spent my whole working career internalizing.

Most important, I try not to be a designer; I try to become the consumer of the product that I am going to promote.

I try to find out who uses it, who purchases it, its place in the market, its competition, its perceived benefits to the individual consumer or business, and as much else as possible to make my perceptions realistic.

I then get all the production parameters . . . budget constraints, if successful, rollout quantity, lists (whole audience range), personalization, etc.

Although a picture is worth 10,000 words, I have yet to see a successful direct mail effort that does not depend on copy to make the promotion and the sell! The essence of my design is how I make the copy readable and graphically effective (e.g., how my choice of type makes the message and therefore the product "feel"). That's also why I usually draw a very strong line between typography and typesetting.

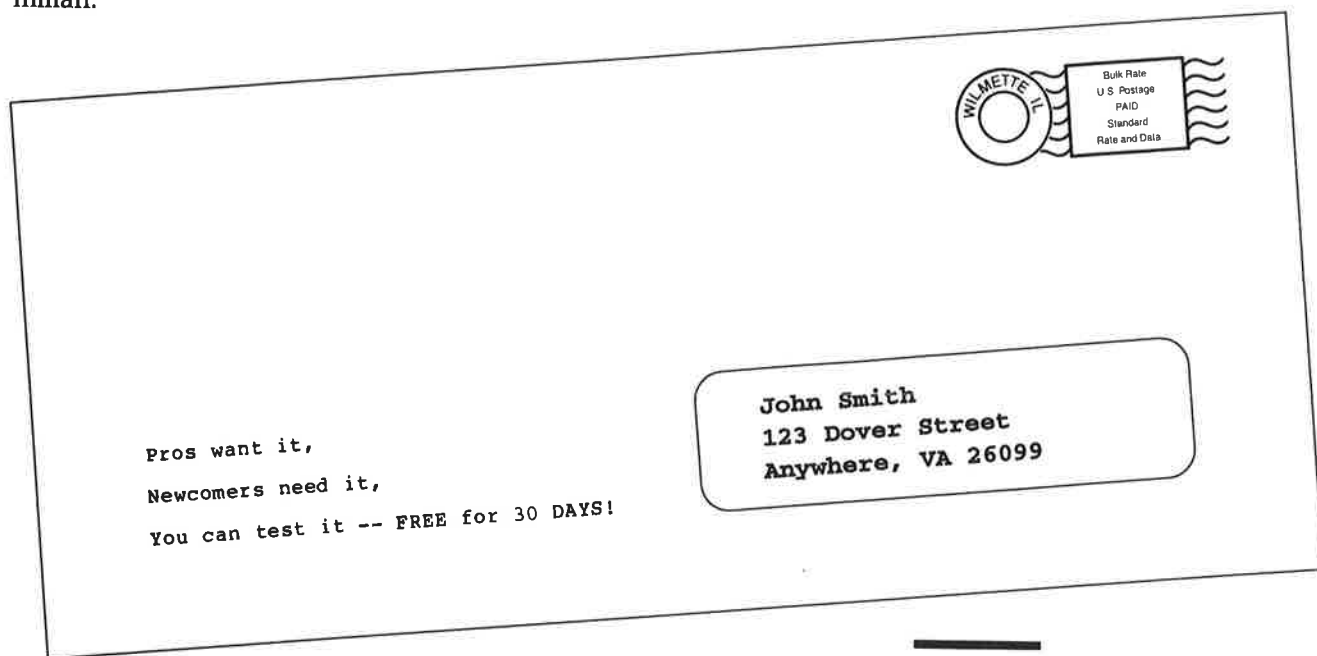
This doesn't mean that I don't believe in excellent design or even opulent visuals when appropriate. And I certainly advocate depicting the product. But I do thoroughly believe that the words are what are really deeply perceived and acted on by this society.

I also believe firmly in the sanctity of the consumer. We are there only at the consumer's indulgence, and I believe the consumer has the absolute right to a clear, thorough presentation that is as easy as possible to understand. This doesn't rule out humor or entertainment, or the wonderful complexities of "bells," "whistles," and personalization in a sweeps—but it does guide my handling of them.

With all this in mind and the information at hand, I simply let my internal tools take over and hope for the best!

And, the return address used the circ director's name only. No company logo is shown. This is a deliberate decision made to enhance the overall mystery of the envelope by refusing to telegraph the package contents.

The preprinted third-class bulk indicia in red is "designed" to look like a postage meter. Very often, mailers find metered envelopes outpull ones with preprinted indicia. So, the envelope makes use of this knowledge without the increased expense of metering the mail in the lettershop. The indicia also maintains the subtle suggestion of a personal solicitation by looking as though it might have run through a company's postage meter.

2. The Sales Letter

Johnson Box copy above the letter salutation states the sub offer immediately and reinforces the free trial offer mentioned on the outer envelope.

The salutation—"Dear Direct Marketer"—targets the prospect very specifically. This technique tells the prospect that SRDS knows something about him/her and is writing to the prospect personally rather than to an amorphous mass of prospects.

The copy begins with a short story about a luncheon the SRDS spokesperson had with two direct marketing colleagues. Taking a story approach for the sales letter works for several reasons: It's not too long; it's interesting and involving; it's completely believable; and it ties back to the copy on the outer envelope. Almost anyone reading the letter can imagine being at such a luncheon meeting.

In addition, this letter answers every conceivable question about the subscription and states product benefits clearly. It tells how to order (by mail or

telephone), asks for the order, and uses a postscript to offer a new benefit.

The letterhead is printed to match the outer envelope. And, the letter itself is graphically appealing and easy to read because of the judicious use of subheads, underlining, and short, unintimidating paragraphs.

3. Testimonials Lift Letter

Everyone, I think, understands the importance of testimonials in terms of building credibility for a product. Testimonials can be used anywhere in a direct mail package. SRDS uses them in the lift letter.

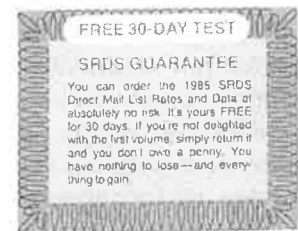
Copy on the outside fold targets prospects who may be undecided about ordering. This copy directs those prospects to the inside of the lift letter, where testimonials from satisfied subscribers are discussed. One testimonial is from a large, well-known firm, the other from a smaller company. This reinforces the sales point that Direct Mail List Rates and Data is for every mailer, regardless of the mailer's size.

The lift letter folds vertically—not horizontally, as most prospects have come to expect. This is an unusual and attention-getting use of a component that may be becoming passé—depending upon which direct marketing guru you subscribe to. I personally like lift letters and think the jury is still out on whether using one improves response. I never hesitate to use a lift letter if a logical reason presents itself.

4. The Order Card

What could be more appropriate as an involvement device for a direct marketer than a third-class bulk indicia? The use of a token that simulates such an indicia makes this simple order card effective. The prospect is instructed to move the token to the return portion of the card to say "Yes" to the free trial offer.

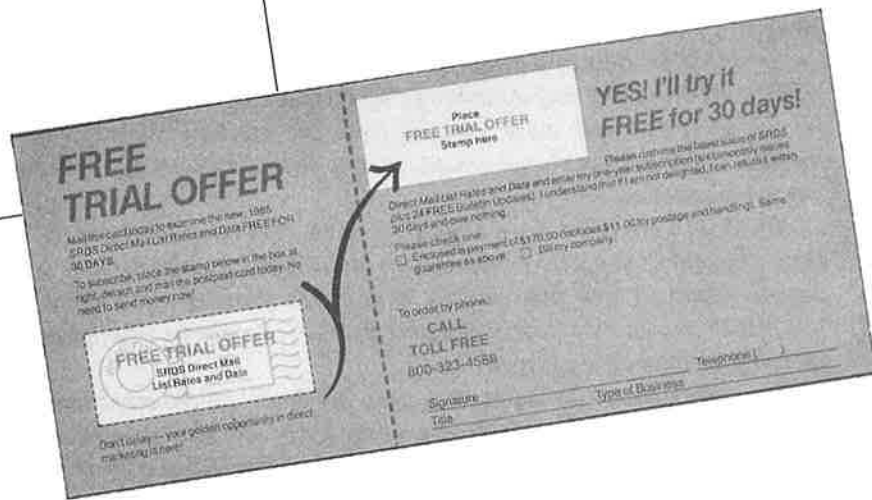
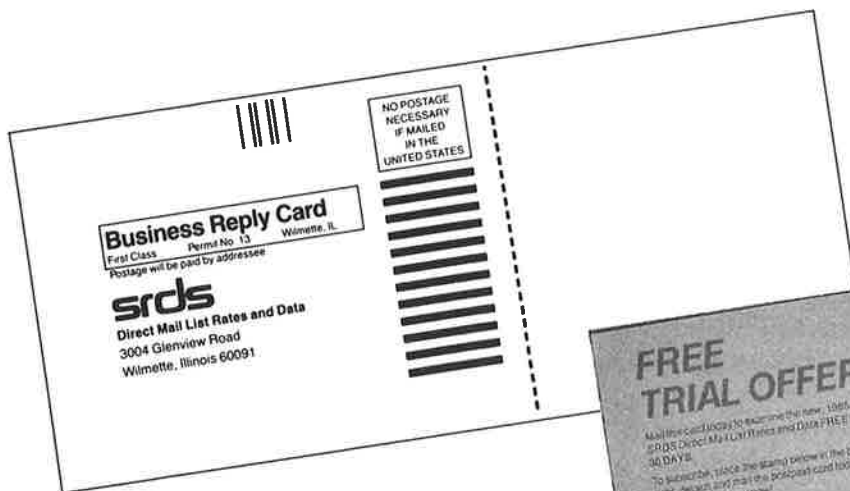
The guarantee is repeated in the offer copy and, as a way to satisfy those prospects with a need for instant gratification, a toll-free number is included.

There is a reply side on the order card and a business reply envelope is also included—even though the offer stresses "no need to send money now." The reason? Some prospects like to pay up front and others like privacy. This order card does ask for a signature and phone number. So, giving prospects a reply envelope eliminates any possible frustration.

The order card is well designed and a snap to use. It fulfills the requirements for making an order card appear important.

5. The Package Brochure

The SRDS control benefits from the inclusion of a brochure even though many direct marketers are somewhat familiar with the product.



The order card shown front and back and the business reply envelope. The mailing uses both a business reply card and, for those who want privacy, a business reply envelope. Notice the reply card asks for a signature, title, and telephone number. This may cut up-front response, but it also may inhibit tire kickers.

As with all good brochures, this one is able to stand alone. It contains only the strongest and most visual product benefits and reinforces those benefits and features already described in the sales letter.

Additionally, the piece injects some gentle humor into the package with copy on the cover that states: "How to get almost 23 feet of mailing lists facts into a 20-inch package!"

When the brochure is opened to the first small spread, it shows the product and explains, "We estimate it would take a stack of thin direct mail list data cards over 23 feet high to give you just a part of the information you get in the new Direct Mail List Rates and Data."

This copy puts into perspective the wealth of information offered relative to the subscription price. If you need the list information available from SRDS, this kind of benefit makes you think. It also graphically illustrates the comprehensiveness of the product, plus the hard versus easy work-saver copy.

The large inside spread has a compelling headline that uses a play on words to convey a benefit: "Your Winning Package Depends on This Winning Package."

Copy goes on to describe editorial features and benefits, and shows a listing from Direct Mail List Rates and Data with call-outs detailing each element of the listing. The brochure's back panel urges the prospect to take immediate

action, and repeats the SRDS guarantee in a certificate border. It also thanks the prospect for ordering—something too many direct marketers overlook.

The exact trim size of the brochure is $8\frac{1}{2}'' \times 14''$ —and this one takes maximum advantage of limited space by using interesting folds. It is folded first to $7'' \times 8\frac{1}{2}''$, then short folded again to $3\frac{5}{8}'' \times 8\frac{1}{2}''$. This results in the illusion of more color on the first panel because of the short fold, and creates a small and large spread for copy and graphics.

This brochure also does something else: It tracks. By that I mean it is designed so the prospect's eyes move logically from the brochure cover, to the small spread, right on to the large spread, then to the back panel and, presumably, on to the order card.

There isn't anything worse than a jumbled, confusing brochure. When you look at one that is poorly executed, you know immediately, because you can't decide where to look first and its folds don't seem to work logically. The confusion created by a poorly designed brochure results in slowing down and possibly turning off a prospect.

The Direct Mail List Rates and Data brochure, on the other hand, leaves room for copy to breathe and makes it easy for prospects to understand exactly what is being offered and specifically what benefits will accrue as a result of subscribing.

Overall, this control package concept is clear. There is continuity throughout by virtue of great attention to detail. Each component reinforces the package concept, and all the components work together to create a sum greater than its parts.

Proven Bells and Whistles

The creative team took advantage of many proven direct mail bells and whistles. But these tried-and-true techniques were used in a fresh, appealing way. None was stifled by the use of two-color, by budget limitations, or the "unsexy" nature of the product. This package proves that a little imagination will go a long way toward overcoming difficult or unexciting subject matter.

Boardroom Reports

In the previous chapter I mentioned that so-called business-to-business mail is the dullest. And the most stupifyingly dull comes from the publishers of business and financial books. If I had the choice of reading a month's worth of this category of mail or spending the day at the local barbershop watching haircuts, there would be no contest.

The two mailings that follow are the exceptions rather than the rule. Maybe that is why they are so long-lived and so effective.

One of the all-time modern success stories in the arena of business books and newsletters is Martin Edelston, who, prior to starting his own company, had been a lifeguard, dishwasher, advertising salesman, book club manager, and circulation director. In 1972 he founded Boardroom Reports, which he built into an empire of newsletters and books with more than one million active customers. Three copywriters helped catapult Edelston into the first rank of publishers: Eugene Schwartz, Pat Garrard, and a secret copywriter whose name Edelston will reveal to no one.

Edelston believes that long-term controls are not winners; they are losers. When I announced the Axel Andersson Awards and sent Edelston certificates for *Bottom Line/Personal* and *The Book of Inside Information*, he sent me a note on his screaming yellow 14" × 17" stationery with the following in big black caps at the top:

Edelston scrawled:

As controls diminish—and they all do—it hurts not to have a replacement. Fortunately we have new winners emerging at last for the two winners (losers) that you sent us awards for. Crazy—crazy times!

In a fax to Edelston, I pointed out that the original 1991 Axel Awards comprised just sixty-six mailings out of the 50,000 a year that I review.

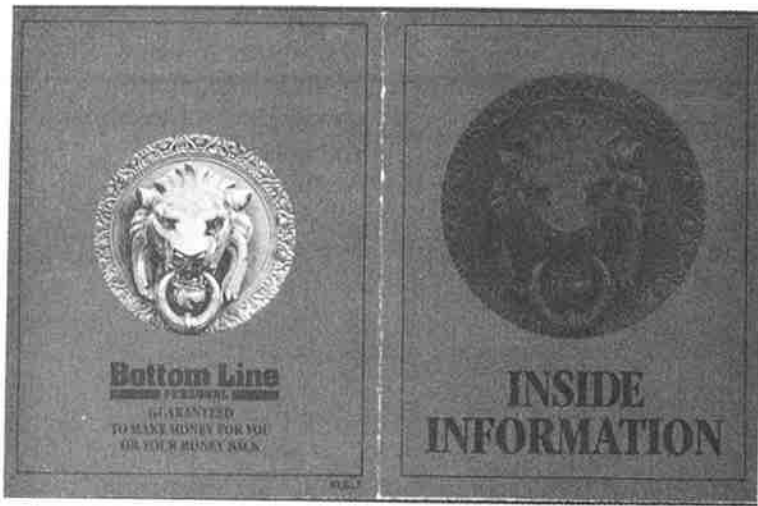
His comment: "49,934 winners and 66 losers—and I have two of those . . . ouch!"

He was gleeful that his long-term controls were finally beaten.

The *Bottom Line/Personal* Grand Control that follows is vintage Boardroom. The envelope screams: "WHAT NEVER TO EAT ON AN AIRPLANE."

You tear into the mailing only to find that this is the kind of information you will get if you send for a free trial of the publication. Reading a Boardroom mailing is like eating peanuts: you can't stop. The entire promotion—letter and circular—is a series of splendid teasers that have you salivating by the end.

Another extraordinary aspect of this effort: there is no price mentioned *anywhere*.

Like the effort for *Bottom Line/Personal*, this Grand Control for *The Book of Inside Information* is vintage Boardroom Reports.

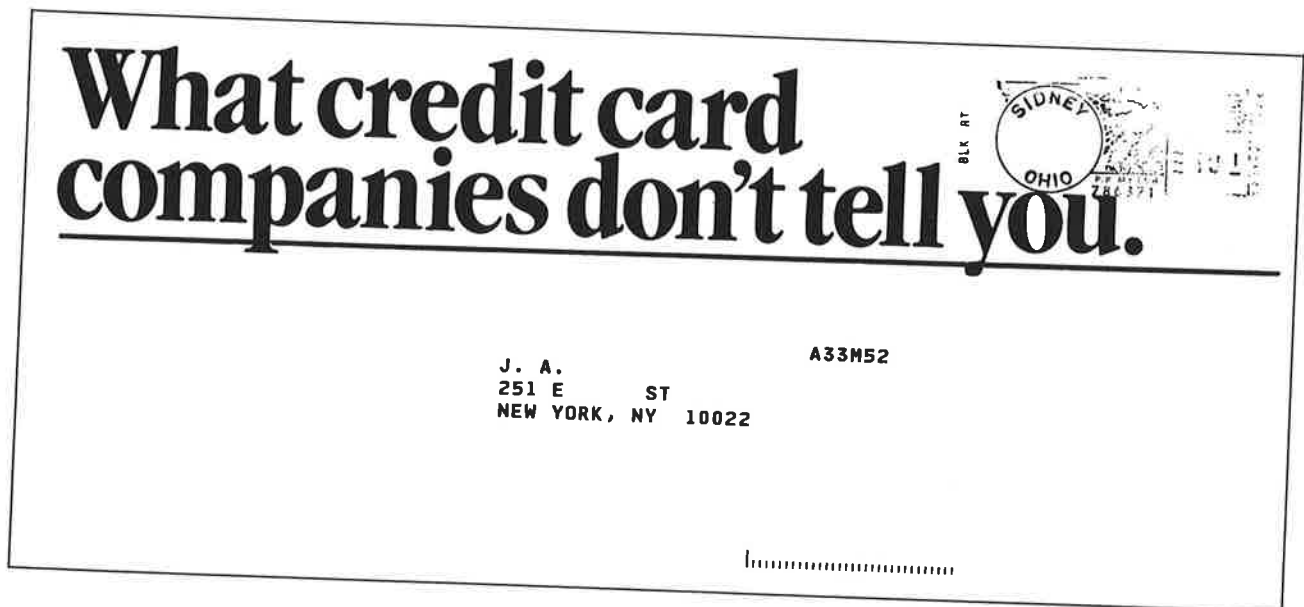
Part of Martin Edelston's genius as a publisher is that he takes existing editorial material from his newsletters and repackages it and sells it to the same audience that wants all these pearls of wisdom in the permanent format of a book.

This effort closely parallels that of *Bottom Line/Personal*: a screamer of an outer envelope promises to reveal "What credit card companies don't tell you." Inside, you discover that the answer to the teaser can only be found on page 10 of the book. The letter then goes on to list dozens of other such teasers and on what pages of *The Book of Inside Information* the answers will be found.

There is even a P.S. that implies the price of the book is tax deductible, but you have to see page 75.

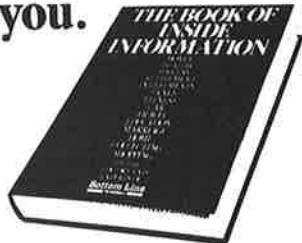
Also notice the lift piece, obviously a real testimonial letter—complete with typo—enlarged to fill the entire page with copy. Brilliant design!

If you skip back to Chapter 16 and reread Gene Schwartz's copy for the two Rodale books and then read these Boardroom efforts, you'll see a lot of similarity. If Schwartz did not write these packages, at least you can see how he set the tone and style for Martin Edelston's entire enterprise.

Home-Study Programs

Hume Publishing

One of the strangest business sagas of the 1980s is the story of Canadian Ronald Hume and his publishing company's spectacular rise and meteoric collapse.

Hume, a high school dropout, worked his way up to become vice president of the trade book division of McGraw-Hill Canada. In 1965 he met a doctor and part-time investor named Morton Shulman who he persuaded to write a book, *Anyone Can Make a Million*; it became an international bestseller and, with the royalties, Shulman reportedly made his first million.

In 1972 Hume created his first proprietary product, the *Successful Investing & Money Management (SIMM)* course which became hugely successful. A *SIMM* premium was *The MoneyLetter*, a newsletter for investors that kept the *SIMM* course current. In 1976 Hume launched *The MoneyLetter* as a separate service with an advisory board that included Shulman and investment adviser Andrew Sarlos; the publication quickly grew to a circulation of 80,000 and was generating revenues of \$7 million a year.

Other Hume cash cows: *Successful Business Management* and *The Super-Investor Files* dreamed up by copywriter Alan Schwartz. It has been estimated that in the past twenty years, Hume Publishing had revenues of \$500 million.

How did Ron Hume snatch defeat from the jaws of victory? He started the Hume Fund and the Hume RSVP Fund, and in just eighteen months he had acquired 40,000 investors and \$230 million under management. The managers were Sarlos and Shulman; by 1986 both funds were at the bottom of the *Financial Times* rankings. After the crash of 1987, the funds were down to \$140 million in assets as a result of sales, redemptions, and bad investments. Hume started three additional courses which bombed: *Success over 50* for retirees, *School Success* for parents, and a course based on Nathan Pritikin's diet. By 1990 the Hume Group had lost \$11.4 million on sales of \$60.3 million. Ron Hume has been eased out by disgruntled stockholders and is off on another venture.

In its heyday, Hume hired the very top American and Canadian creative talent and did brilliantly innovative testing. Three of the original packages are still being mailed full tilt and keeping the U.S. subsidiary profitable with about 100,000 enrollees under the capable direction of Suzanne Eastman and Ben Ordovery.

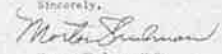

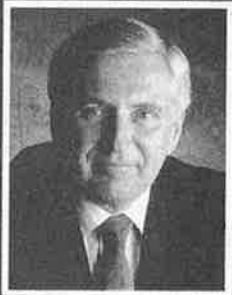

hype. It takes hard work to get miners in who are willing to go on panning for years.

This is basically a letter package. But the outer envelope is the key. It perfectly selects the right prospect and pulls him into the package with question 4. The letter finishes off the job.

Both the letter and the lift letter also play heavily on perceived self-image.

By the way, the letter originally ran twelve pages. I decided to revise it and break out four pages as a separate section in the middle to make it easier to read and a little more dramatic.

The only other relevant thing I can remember is that it took the 20 percent inspiration and 80 percent perspiration.

And, oh, yes—I seldom have a real winning package like this with clients who fiddle around and make a lot of changes. My winners infallibly come from those clients who say, 'It's up to you. We're paying you because you're supposed to know what you're doing.'

Bless their hearts.

Successful Business Management

During the time Harry Walsh was starting out in the advertising business "as a conventional copywriter in a conventional Madison Avenue agency," he launched a little mail order company from his kitchen table. His product was a carbon steel knife which he knew took an edge better than the stainless steel variety found in most American kitchens. He rewrote the copy for the little one-column-by-five-inch ad fifty times and used a tried and true mail order headline: "Who else wants a really sharp knife?"

I picked it up from one of John Caples's early books in which he listed mail order headlines. "Who else wants a whiter wash?" was the daddy of mine, I think.

The ad worked, and Walsh was hooked by direct marketing. "The mail order business fascinates people," he writes. "The prospect of finding dozens of checks from total strangers in your morning mail is irresistible. It certainly attracted me."

Eventually Walsh became creative director of the direct response division of Ogilvy & Mather, and freelanced extensively. Today, as a full-time freelancer and proprietor of the Walsh Company in Weston, Connecticut, the bulk of his time is spent writing for large mailers around the country. He is a generalist whose clients include magazines, newsletters, insurance companies, book publishers, music clubs, fundraisers, investment firms, and many others.

HARRY WALSH:

I consider the letter to be the prime element in nonsweepstakes mailings. And in this element, which is usually four to six pages, the first sentence and the first page take up half of my writing time. Because if I can't get the prospect to finish page one, I've surely struck out.

The brochure is of secondary importance. I've written many winners with a letter and no brochure, but none with a brochure and no letter. Sometimes, as in the Hume mailing that follows, it is a key factor. Other times it contributes nothing. Occasionally it even depresses response!

The lift memo, or second letter, usually strongly restates the no-risk, money-back guarantee. Years ago the creative director of a huge mailer of negative-option book offers told me they had tested this element in all sizes, shapes, and forms, and it always, always produced a lift in response of between 10 and 12 percent. Mailers for other products don't perceive so uniform a benefit, but a lift memo is well worth testing.

There are many ways to approach a new project. Most writers like to start with the letter. Others choose the envelope—first things first, you know. The late Chris Stagg believed in last things first, and started with the order form. He claimed this gave him an absolutely clear concept of the offer which, after all, is what all the other copy must focus on.

Good idea. But before writing anything at all, I usually go through a routine I borrowed from Bertrand Russell, the English philosopher and mathematician.

First I read all the material pertaining to the project. Most of this will come from the client; some I may get from my own outside researchers. I jot down

every thought and idea that comes to me, then put all into a file, mentally command the work to proceed underground, and turn my attention elsewhere.

A week or ten days later I reopen the file and find that new, more practical ideas have sprouted in my mind during the hiatus, and even organized themselves to some extent. The work isn't finished, of course, but the path has been smoothed. (Darn clever, these philosophers!)

the writer needs the second of these elements as much as the first. It was Peter
Drucker, I believe, who said that work without a deadline is work toyed with.
To which I add a heartfelt "amen."

Avoid using costly paper stocks in an effort to give your mailing a "quality"
look. Countless tests show that they almost never pay for themselves. People will
judge your product by what you print on your paper, rather than by what
paper you print on.

The future of direct mail? It seems to me to be uncertain. We who write it
know from experience that length is strength, and that the more you tell the
more you sell. But to understand and respond to this kind of advertising, you
have to be able to read.

Back in the early years of this century, virtually every American could read.
We were the world's most literate country. Today, of the thirteen major
industrialized nations, we are a poor thirteenth in literacy, and are still losing
ground. I'm sure there are Third World countries that surpass us.

Thirty-seven years ago Rudolph Flesch put his finger on this problem and on
its stunningly simple solution in a historic little volume entitled *Why Johnny
Can't Read*. But the educational powers-that-be have resolutely ignored his
insights, and the dumbing-down of America continues apace.

I and the other writers featured in this book will, of course, keep giving our
best efforts to selling with the written word. But our audience will, I fear, keep
dwindling.

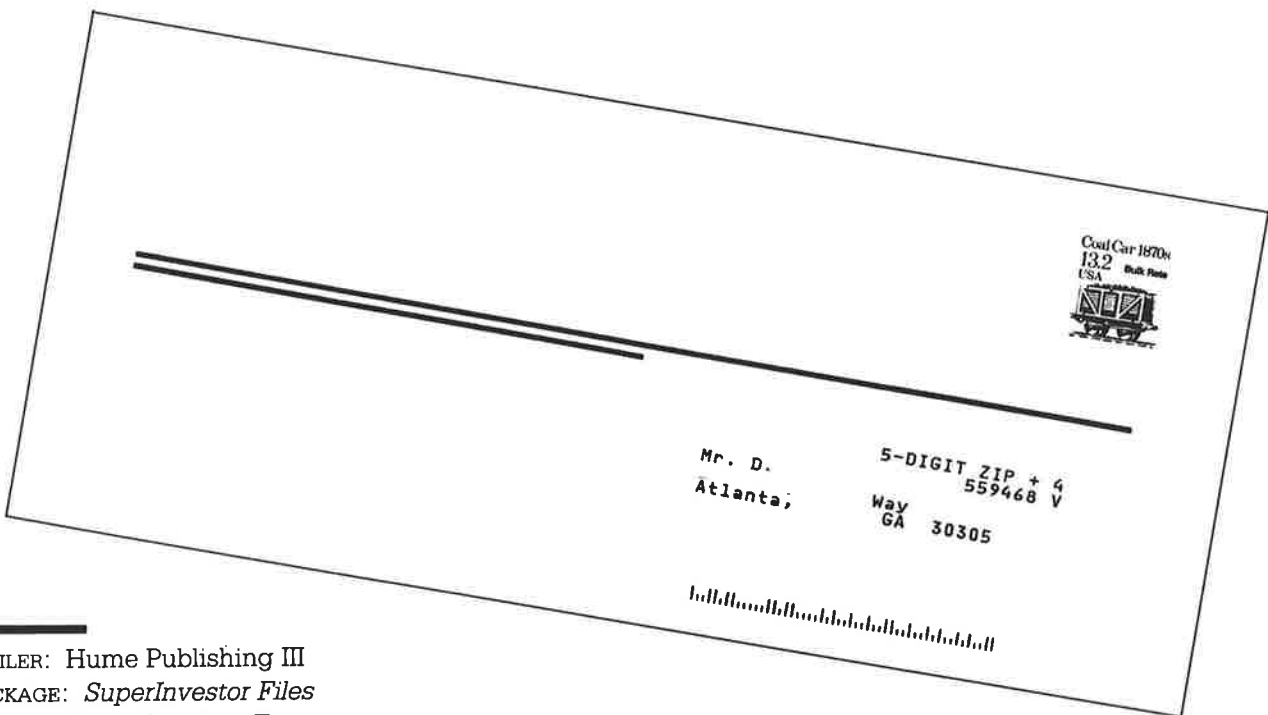

I was able to create an entirely new product with the built-in features and benefits that I was certain Hume's more sophisticated customers wanted. Since I had been writing for Hume for nearly a decade at the time SuperInvestors was born, I was confident of my read of that marketplace.

I began creating the SuperInvestor Files product by developing a space ad with all the features and benefits that I wanted the product to have. Then I wrote a prototype SuperInvestor lesson, the product itself. The ad never ran and the prototype lesson was never part of the program, but I used them to approach Hume.

advanced investment jargon into clear-cut benefits. By the time we finished a half-hour phone call, I was really frustrated. It seems that the existing product was really no good to anyone who had less than \$250,000 to invest, and most of Hume's customers had nowhere near that kind of nest egg.

"But, Eric," I whined, "I've read about investors who make \$10,000 overnight on a single trade. Those are the kind of advanced investment things I want to write about."

"You won't find anything like that in this course," he said.

"But I've read about them." I pleaded.

"Oh, yeah. Sure. It's not easy, but it can be done."

"But you have to have a fortune first? Right?"

"No. Not really."

There was a long silence and then I asked, "How much money would you need to do these super trades?"

"Oh, from fifteen hundred to three thousand to get in."

"And how many of these trades could you come up with?"

"Oh, I don't know. Maybe twenty."

"Eric," I said, "I think we've got a great product."

And that's how the SuperInvestor Files was born. Of course, the hard part was yet to come. I had to sell the idea to Hume and then prove that I or someone could write the lessons in a way that would be comprehensible to people who had no investment background.

Writing the prototype lesson was blood, sweat, and tears. Eric would explain financial concepts that would make my head swim. Then I had to write them so that it all sounded fairly easy. After writing the prototype lesson, writing the promotion was simple—especially since I had already written a space ad with all the major copy points in it—points that Eric and I built into the product.

People with money to invest are always looking for financial gurus, and from the beginning I conceived the SuperInvestor Files as the ultimate guru product. The guy who told you to buy this product had to be someone who had actually done the trades and gotten rich, so the only approach that made sense was to get one of the "super investors" to sign a letter describing his own experience with the trades. I interviewed Dr. Morton Shulman, who was on the Hume Advisory Board, got some of his personal background and the letter practically wrote itself. The letter was the only selling piece, though the package was tested with a small brochure. But what could be stronger than a letter from a multimillionaire investment guru who said, "This is how I made my millions. I'm going to teach you to do it too"?

Most of the great names in the business have tested against the package but have been unable to beat it. When I was asked to beat it, I said I couldn't. The SuperInvestor Files was conceived simultaneously as a product and as a promotion, so everything about the product and the mailing was created in ideal terms. The relationship between the mailing and the product was totally seamless, it was totally consistent from a marketing point of view. If my basic assumptions were right about the kind of product the market wanted, everything about the promotion followed with perfect logic. How can you beat that?

Nightingale-Conant

Another direct mailer who is a giant in testing is Nightingale-Conant; it is not unusual for the archive to receive six or more new and different mailing packages in a month. Like Hume, Nightingale-Conant uses the very best copywriters and designers in the United States and Canada.

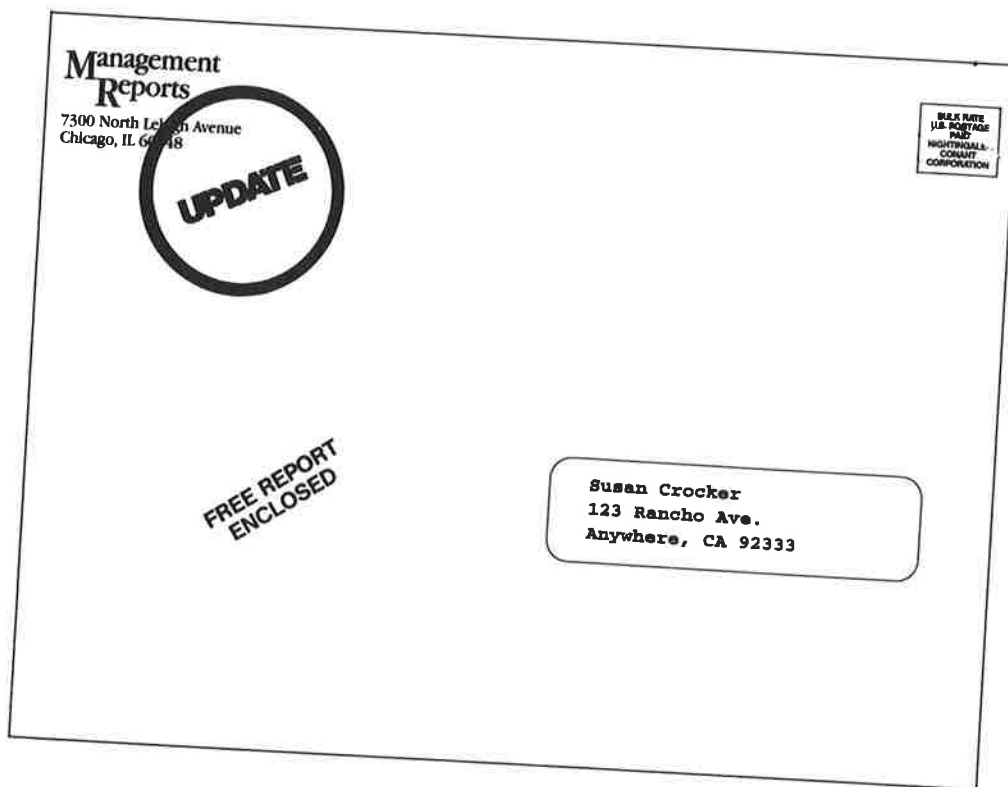
Lead the Field

For years Research Institute of America has used 9" × 12" kraft envelopes with a prospectus-like report printed on coated stock. A peel-off label is affixed to the blank back cover of the booklet and shows through the window. To order, you peel off the label and place it on an enclosed business reply card.

There are two reasons why this format has worked so well:

1. When a #10 mailing goes into the workplace, it is frequently opened by the secretary or executive assistant. The envelope is discarded and the various elements are flattened out, clipped together, and most probably put into the lowest-priority file. When a secretary unfolds all the pieces and clips them together, you—the sender—have no control over how the various pieces are arranged. The order card might be on top . . . or the letter . . . or whatever.

With this 9" × 12" format, the secretary slips the entire mailing

out of the envelope and into the file folder; not unfolding or arranging. *You* are in control of what is seen first, no matter whether the person opens the envelope or receives the material from someone else who has opened it.

2. This format resembles a portfolio or special report. It looks as if it might be an internal document that someone created with a desktop publishing program. As a result, the busy executive will start reading it not necessarily thinking it's a promotional ad, but something to do with the business. As Malcolm Decker concluded in Chapter 4: "If you can firmly engage your prospect—and keep *him* engaged—through reading, you're on your way to a sale."

This Grand Control for Nightingale-Conant was written by Bob Matheo, AdMaker, who has been in advertising for thirty-five years. BOB MATHEO:

I have reached a stage in my professional career where colleagues, looking at my work, often ask questions like: "What made you think that would work?" or "How did you dream up that idea?" I usually shrug modestly and say, "I dunno."

Actually, I do know, but I've been reluctant to admit it. I've been a copywriter for thirty-five years, a direct marketer for thirty, and I'll probably be seventy years old when this appears in print. Before that, I had a fifteen-year career as an actor. And I am now trying to launch a new career as a speaker/seminar-giver.

In other words, the answer is experience . . . lots of it . . . in many areas.

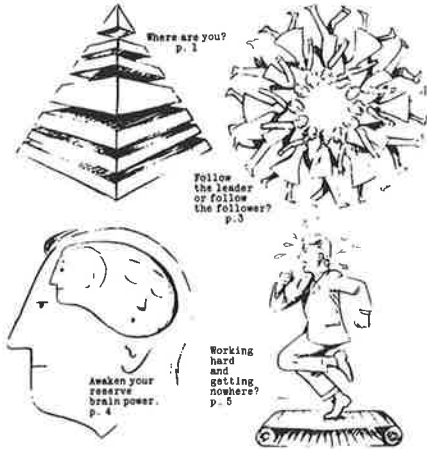
A seasoned tennis pro doesn't ponder whether to rush in and volley a return, stand his ground and hit a half-volley, or pull back, wait for the bounce, and hit an overhead slam. He has played often enough that his brain makes thousands of lightning calculations and judgments, causing him to move in the right direction without thinking. Many athletes call this being "in the zone."

I've been told that, during the 1950s, the New York Yankees brought in an expert whose name has since faded into oblivion to instruct the batters what to think when they're batting. Yogi Berra resisted. "I can't bat and think at the same time," he said.

Well, I can't write and think at the same time. My best creative work is done in the zone. But creating is not thinking—it's a product of all those years of experience.

The format and content of this mailing for Nightingale-Conant's Lead the Field came from two things: (1) the client told me he believed that a plain-Jane report format has a certain "magic" for this product (I seldom doubt the wisdom of my clients—after all, they picked me); and (2) I recalled executive how-to-do-it ads and booklets from Nation's Business back in the 1960s that used cartoons to fortify their message; I admired the style then, and waited twenty-seven years for an opportunity to use it. The rest is a result of good communications between me and my designer, Chuck Dickinson. And getting in the zone.

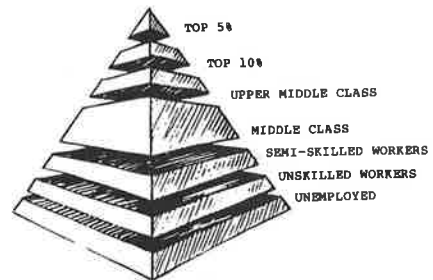

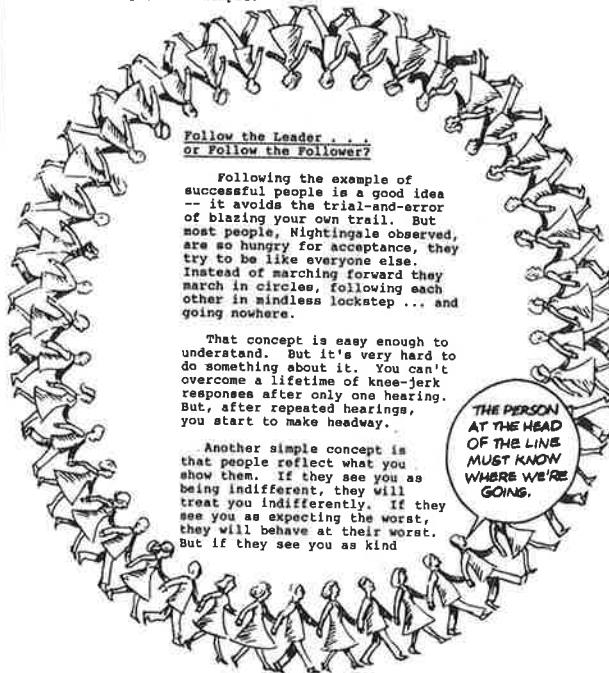

Another simple concept is that people reflect what you show them. If they see you as being indifferent, they will treat you indifferently. If they see you as expecting the worst, they will behave at their worst. But if they see you as kind

and caring, they will treat you with care and kindness.

Could you change the image you present the world after only one hearing? I doubt that anyone could.

Through the miracle of tape recordings, you can hear those messages again and again -- while dressing, while driving, while doing chores -- till they become part of your life. And, in doing so, you can indeed change your life.

Put Your Unused Mental Powers to Work

I can say without hesitation that you are smarter than you think you are. Believe me, most of your capacity for learning, for creating, for memorizing and for profound thinking is fast asleep and almost never used.

There is positive scientific evidence that most people use a mere 5% of their minds. The rest is like a gold mine buried in your own back yard -- a source of unsuspected wealth that already belongs to you ... if only you'd dig it up.

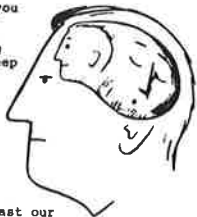

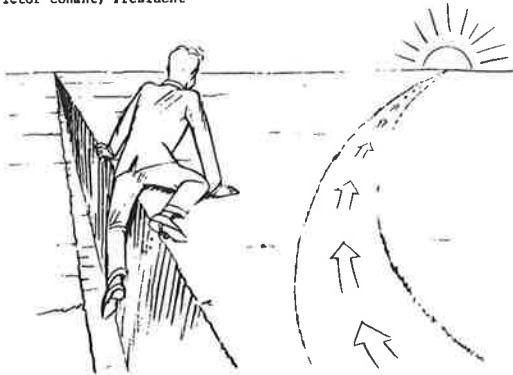

The back panel of the portfolio. The name and address are on a pressure-sensitive label that shows through the window of the kraft outer envelope. To order, you peel off the label and affix it to the order form.

In recent years, Nightingale-Conant has chafed over the excessive size and non-automatability of this mailing. They stepped up efforts to beat it, but haven't succeeded.

They added a tip-on sticker to the envelope which lifted results. But I think the copy on the sticker is wrong.

In my opinion, the mailing owes its longevity to the fact that it's uncolorful and unspectacular. Prospects who don't respond the first time don't remember the second time they see it. So the message has many opportunities to seep into the prospects' minds until they are finally ready to buy.

If a highly successful mailing does have spectacular graphics, however, I urge my client to find new graphics that will work with the same copy. That way, people won't say when they see it for the third or fourth time, "Oh, I've already seen that," and throw it away.

Finally, I would remind all my creative colleagues that getting better is one of the great joys of getting older and urge them not to fight it.

He began in retail advertising and moved to Ward's catalog, where he became copy chief. His principal client is Amoco, and he also does work for *Encyclopaedia Britannica*, the Peruvian Connection, Metromail, and others.

DON KANTER:

I never attempt to start creative work until I've done an advertising strategy for the project. The strategy focuses me on what will really sell the product or service. (The format and detail of the strategy were taught to me by Young & Rubicam after they bought Stone & Adler, where I worked for many years.) The client has to approve the strategy before I start creative. That tends to avoid the painful sessions that start: "Oh, but I wasn't expecting anything like that."

A good designer knows that visual communication is much faster and much stronger than verbal communication, and when he understands what the mailing is supposed to accomplish, he will bring it to life. (Incidentally, Dick Sachs, who designed the Nightingale-Conant mailing, is the best I've ever worked with.)

Ideas on direct mail in general: Maybe it's the recession, and maybe it's advancing age, but I seem to see fewer and fewer "quality" mailings . . . and more and more "formula" or "I know, but it works" type of mailings. 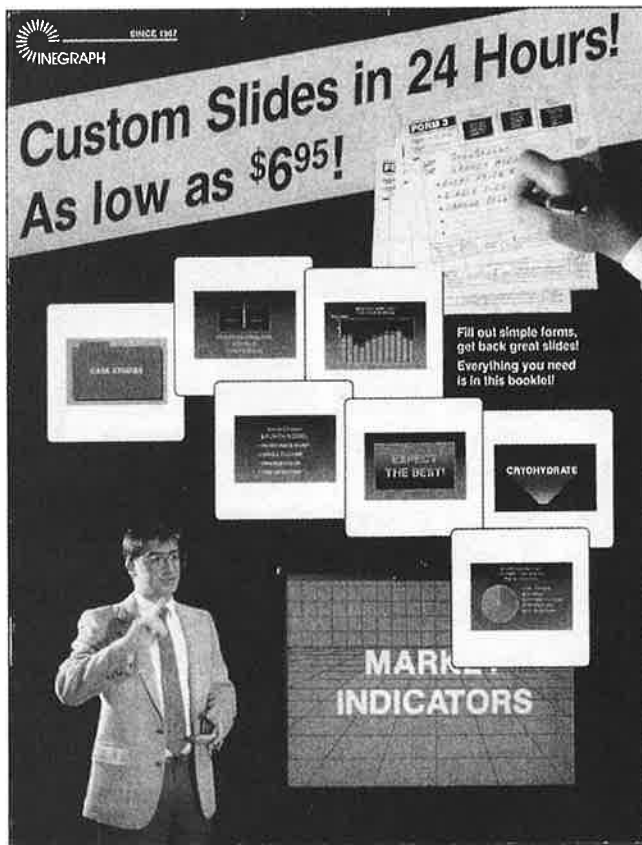

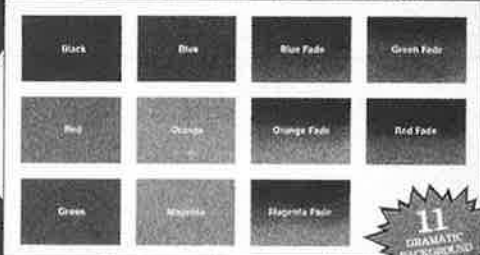

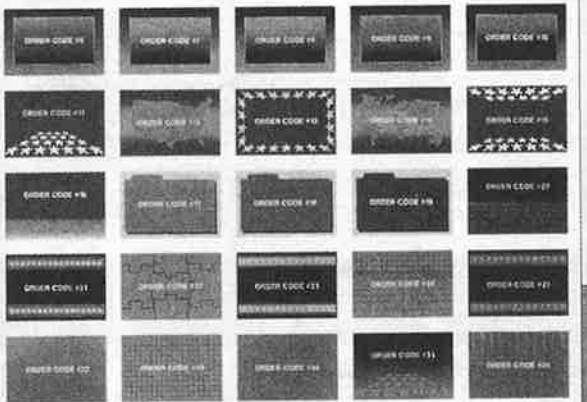

33 Tips for Great Slide Presentations

- 1 Know your audience. Understand their level of knowledge and what they expect to hear from you.
- 2 Know what you want to accomplish. Have a single, clear purpose in mind for your presentation.
- 3 Pace your talk. Use enough slides to provide a change every 15 to 20 seconds. That may seem like a fast pace, but that's because you can't sit in the audience.
- 4 Use a title slide for every major topic or point in your talk. Use special effect slides to dramatize very important points.
- 5 Use one background color throughout your talk if you want a "cohesive image" appearance.
- 6 Use different color backgrounds for your talk if you want a fresher, more industrial approach.
- 7 Shorten your talk by writing all important points on half the cards.
- 8 Arrange & re-arrange the cards to create the best, most logical flow.
- 9 Use the tell, tell, tell approach. Tell the audience what you're going to say, tell it to them, then tell them what you've just told them.
- 10 Anticipate objections and questions. Prepare for them in advance.
- 11 Let your audience know what you expect them to do after your talk. Agree, purchase, understand, etc.
- 12 Don't use technical jargon. It could well be meaningless to some of the group.
- 13 Be consistent with the terminology used on the slides and in your talk.
- 14 Be careful with charts. Just because their point is obvious to you, does not mean it is obvious to the audience. Use chart heads to make your point and the chart body to support it.
- 15 The most important rule for text slides is... KEEP THEM SIMPLE.
- 16 Pace your copy down to the minimum. Use action verbs and telegraphic statements.
- 17 Make only one major point per slide.
- 18 If you must make several points on a slide, use a build-up screen.
- 19 Cinagraph's forms are a handy way to organize your thoughts and create slides with the proper amount of copy.
- 20 The first three rules of good presentations are: Practice. Practice and then Practice some more.
- 21 Whether you speak from cue cards or a written script, no matter your talk, never just read it.
- 22 Don't read from the screen. It can be taken as an insult. Besides, you should not have that much copy up there anyway.
- 23 Don't speak while facing the screen. If you want to point out something on your slide, stop speaking, point to the item, then turn and face the audience before you resume speaking.
- 24 Know the order of your slides and which one will come up next. Don't look at the screen to find out.
- 25 If you need to refer to a previous slide from your talk, have any extra copy of it marked & positioned where needed. Never reverse the projection.
- 26 Be sure everyone in the audience can see.
- 27 Check ahead of time for proper room lighting. Low but not totally dark. Check for window glare.
- 28 If the lights must be turned on and off several times, assign someone to that task.
- 29 If at all possible, arrive early to rehearse and inspect the presentation site.
- 30 If you change slides yourself, use a remote control device.
- 31 Don't nervously play with the remote unit. It will distract people and could accidentally trigger a slide change.
- 32 If someone else is operating the projector, be sure he or she has a copy of your script with the change cues clearly marked.
- 33 Don't panic. We're in an imperfect world and most people understand. If something does go wrong, quickly and calmly stop your talk, remedy the problem, then continue.

How good is the service Cinegraph Slides provides? For a presentation I hosted at the Direct Marketing Conference in San Francisco, I faxed a slide order (regular twenty-four-hour service) from Connecticut to California on Sunday; the slides were in my hands via UPS that Wednesday, which is truly dazzling. If you order the premium nine-to-five service and Federal Express delivery, you can receive slides the next day.

Cinegraph Slides goes further in great service. Late one evening I put together a slide order and faxed it. I was tired and filled out the form incorrectly. I was going to talk about how great direct mail copywriters are like great actors. I wrote on the form:

You are
 Merrill Streep
 or
 Dustin Hoffman

When the order arrived, there was a second slide with Meryl Streep's name spelled right. No charge. That's service!

Wolfe has himself a nifty little business with a house file of 50,000 customers and an average order of \$240. Wolfe's catalog has basically been unchanged more than four years. Separations are done in Hong Kong; for printing, "the catalog waddles around to the press that gives me the best price." Wolfe has done so well that he is on the prowl for another little direct marketing business to buy.

The Dow Jones Story

(Including the single most successful piece of advertising in the history of the world)

The dream of every direct marketer is to have two control efforts for the same product—mailings that can be used interchangeably and bring in low-cost orders at a low cost-per-thousand.

Paul Bell has fulfilled such a dream. Twice! He has two controls each for *Barron's* and the *Wall Street Journal*, both published by Dow Jones & Company, Inc.

The four Dow Jones mailings that follow are classic direct mail efforts. They are not personalized; there is no need for them to be. Nor do they use expensive four-color printing. Nor are there any traditional direct mail bells and whistles: die-cut order form, tokens, scratch-offs, prizes, premiums. Instead, they rely on good offers and beautifully crafted letters. About the only concession to modern direct mail technique is the use of the “fancy” label; instead of plain Cheshire, three of the four efforts are addressed on those printed labels with lines that say “NAME, ADDRESS, CITY, STATE, ZIP” which you almost always find on double postcards.

Paul Bell has been with Dow Jones since 1983 as advertising and promotion manager, mail marketing manager, and subscription national circulation manager for subscription marketing and subscription marketing manager.

PAUL BELL:

It's interesting that we are the only mailer with two controls for each of two different publications. But, then again, perhaps we are among the few mailers who are mailing almost fifty-two weeks a year.

The continuous mailing strategy and the tactic of using different subscription offers (which require different letters) come from the premise that it's best to have a variety of subscription marketing programs in the marketplace at the same time (direct mail, television, educational-rate offers, telephone marketing, nontraditional marketing avenues) and that our circulation numbers

should not be held hostage to peaks and valleys caused by one or two major subscription drives each year.

We generally like to meet with writers and have a long discussion about our publication. Before anything else, we like to know if the writer reads our publication. We believe that is very important and will ultimately make for a better direct mail letter.

During this initial discussion, we share research findings, failed test letters, successful letters, and our current marketing plan. We want the writer to know where we're "coming from" before he/she begins to write.

This initial meeting might last one or two hours, depending on the level of interest the writer has.

We recommend that the writer follow up this meeting by submitting three or four concept statements—short paragraphs indicating possible direct mail letter approaches. Generally, we will choose one of three statements, asking that it be developed into a full-blown direct mail letter. (If none of the concepts is appealing, we ask the writer to try again, but this is usually a sign of trouble ahead; we end up shaking hands and parting company.)

Most times we prefer short copy. It should be sufficient to describe the benefits of our publication. Other publications or products which are less well known (new launches, for example) will likely require more copy.

With the commitment to receive a full draft of a direct mail letter also comes a complete understanding of what the writer's fee will be and, if necessary, what a "kill fee" might be. (Sometimes a kill fee is necessary if the publisher decides he doesn't like or can't revise a letter others have found acceptable.)

We always give the writer the option to select the designer. We never want the writer to feel a good letter has been hamstrung by someone else's design. (Some writers decline this option, deciding it's best to use our "control graphics" in a head-to-head match against the control letter.)

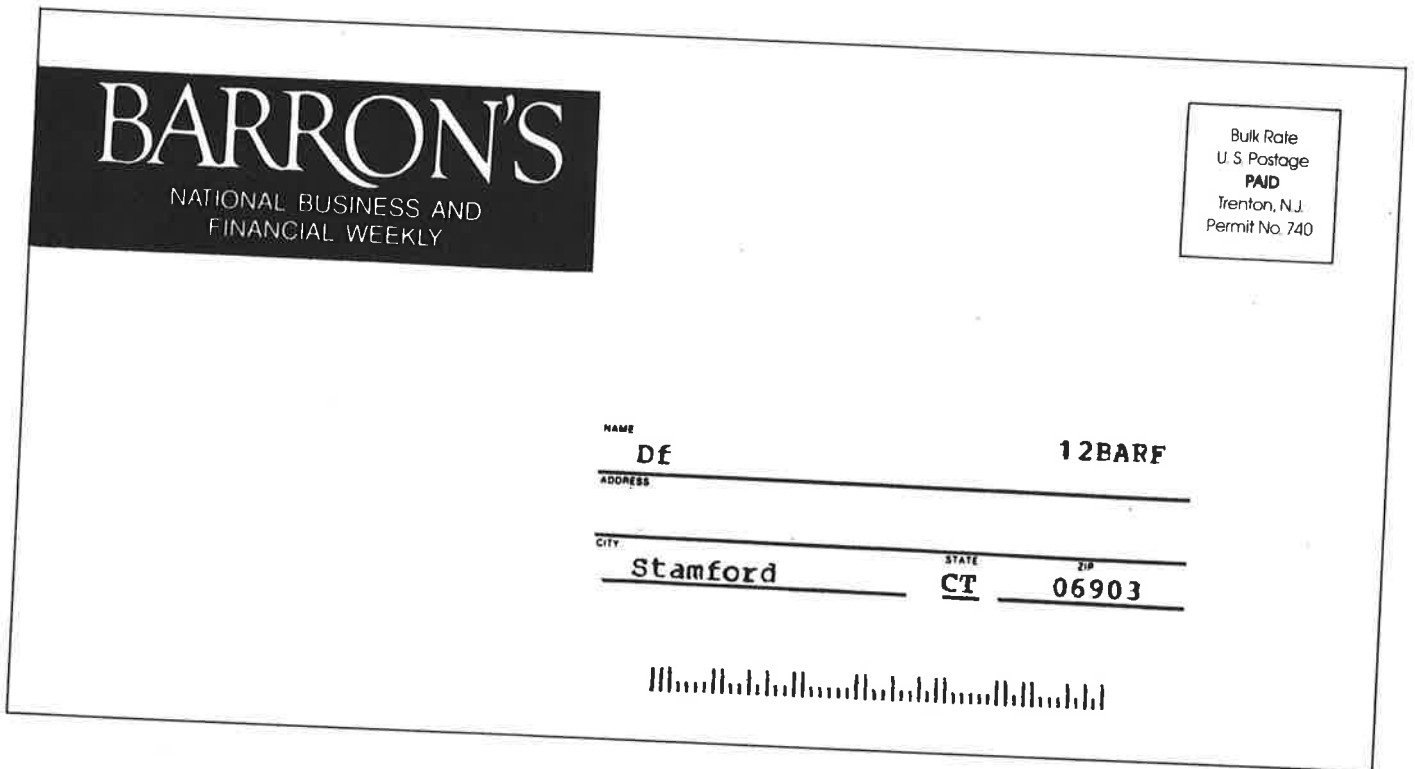
The entire process—from concept to test letter in the mail—should take between three and six months; but never less than three months.

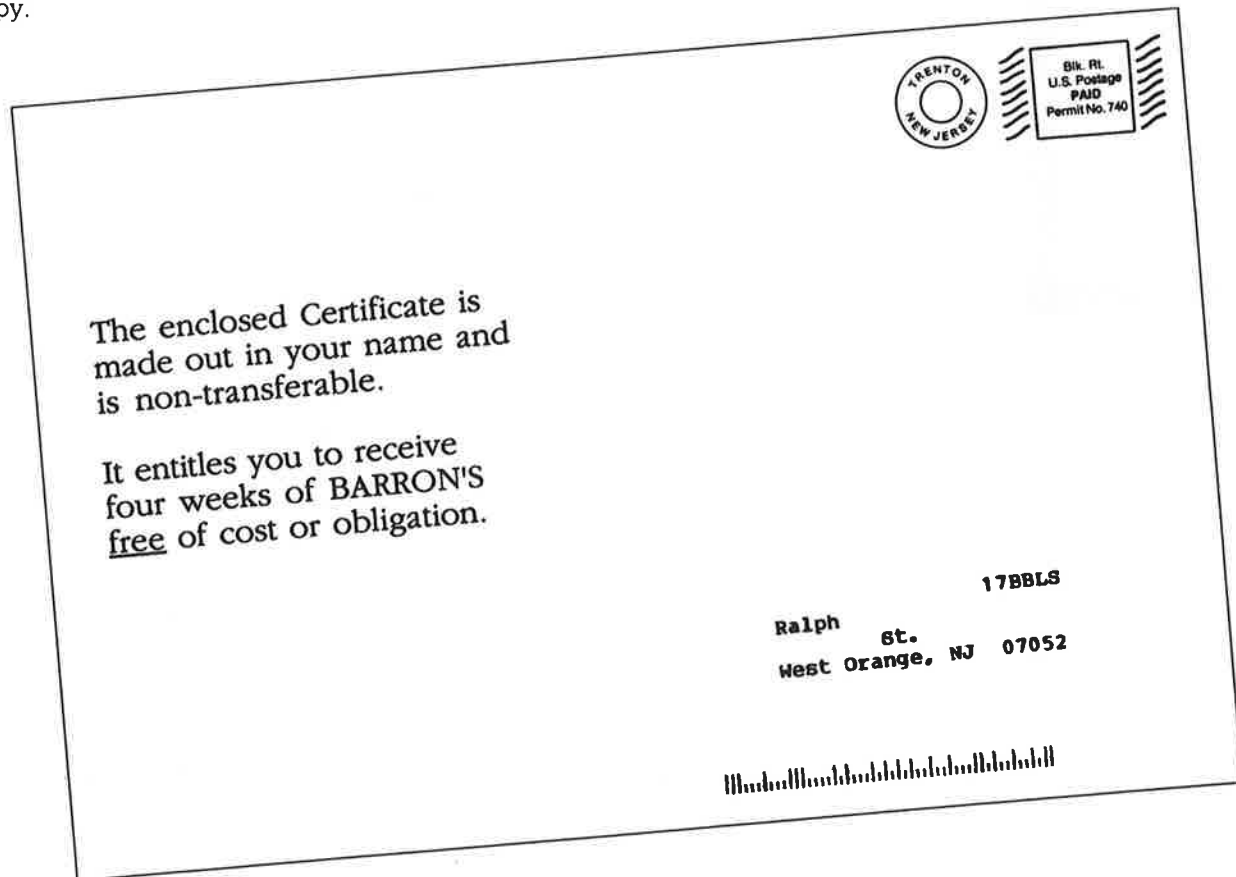

SEYMOUR S. ZOGOTT:

I am an instinctive writer. I do not sit down and plot out where each copy point is going to be placed. I get a year's worth of the publication and acquaint myself with the editorials. Letters to the Editor can be quite revealing. I also read any Readers' Surveys that are available and, if possible, find out the type of lists the mailing is going to.

Then I ask myself two questions: (1) What is most likely to get the readers to open the envelope and (2) how do I hook them once I get them inside. (I think a lot of people give lip service to the importance of the envelope treatment, but it is not proven in the execution.)

From that point on, I try to picture the average subscriber (from what I've read) and try to talk to him/her in their own language. I just let my instincts carry me, supported, of course, by years of direct mail experience. This has enabled me to write successfully for such diverse audiences as the Wall Street Journal and TV Guide.

I came out of circulation management and still do circulation consulting (in partnership with my lovely wife, Mary). Having had the opportunity to analyze response factors and patterns for many years, and having been exposed to subscriber reaction (particularly in the renewals and billing areas), has been invaluable in helping me decide the best way to get readers to respond.

I also have a secret weapon: my wife, who is my editor. With years of experience in buying creative, she is tougher on me than any client I've come up against. But it works to my advantage.

My pet gripes: (1) Most people coming up the ladder in circulation are not taught how to buy copy and art. (2) Editors who tinker with a writer's copy because they think they know best how to sell their magazine to potential subscribers. They often do not recognize that there is a difference in the perception between what a reader likes about a magazine and what makes them buy the magazine in the first place.

- Uses follow-up mailings (monarch envelope, short letter/order form, BRE).

If, as someone once said, good advertising is a believable promise made to the right audience, then this Martin Conroy effort for the Journal is a classic.

PAUL BELL:

"Two Young Men" is mailed in our regular-rate program. The offer involves no discounts, no free issues or premiums of any kind. The offer is sent largely to selected key-response lists that over time have demonstrated good history (response, pay-up, renewal).

We do send follow-up mailing to the "Two Young Men" letter with the name/address that has been identified as a multibuyer in the merge/purge.

Late in 1991 I called Paul Bell and ran some numbers by him. This was, in essence, the conversation.

HATCH: Would you say that the average mail order circulation of the *Journal* over the past eighteen years was about one million?

BELL: [Pause.] Yes, that's about right.

HATCH: Am I right in assuming that the average subscription rate of the *Wall Street Journal* over the past eighteen years has been \$100 a year?

BELL: [Pause.] Yes, that's about right.

HATCH: Is it safe to assume that 55 percent of all your mail order subscribers over the past eighteen years have come in as a result of Martin Conroy's "Two Young Men . . ." letter?

BELL: We have a lot of other sources—telemarketing, subscriptions as a result of newsstand sales, supermarket take-ones, inserts. But, yes, I think 55 percent is a fair estimate.

HATCH: Paul, one million subscribers per year times \$100 equals \$100 million times 18 years equals \$1.8 billion times 55 percent equals \$1 billion. If these numbers are correct, the Martin Conroy letter is directly responsible for bringing in \$1 billion in revenues to the *Wall Street Journal*, and is therefore THE MOST SUCCESSFUL SINGLE PIECE OF ADVERTISING IN THE HISTORY OF THE WORLD!

BELL: [Long silence. Then in a small voice.] Uh, please don't tell Marty Conroy. He'll raise his prices.

Martin Conroy spent over twenty years writing copy for BBDO with creative responsibility (copy, art, TV production) on a wide variety of national accounts. A freelancer for more than a dozen years, Conroy's other accounts include *People*, Charles Schwab & Co., *Working Woman*, *Working Mother*, Transamerica Insurance, National Association of Female Executives, Boardroom Reports, *Tennis*, *American Heritage*, *Weight Watchers* magazine, and *Child*. He splits his time between homes in Madison, Connecticut, and Captiva Island, Florida.

Conroy asks a lot of questions of the client. What kind of person is your best prospect? What does your product do for that kind of person that's new and/or different and/or better and/or unique? Can you give me sample/samples? May I have your control mailing . . . and another mailing that did well . . . and another mailing that bombed?

MARTIN CONROY:

I think that some of the direct mail I get is spoiled by the old-fashioned sin of pride. There's really only a handful of us writers, and, face it, we lead pretty nice lives in pretty up-grade places with pretty smart friends and it's all too easy for us to start to feel superior to the great multitude of readers out there. And sometimes, without really meaning to, we write down to them. I think that this shows through in the finished product and turns readers off. So when I'm working on my stuff, I try to keep in mind two things from the Good Book of Direct Response. One: Write unto others as you would have them write unto you. Two: Pride goeth before a flop.

Part III:

OBSERVATIONS ON THE 90s

Magazines: Sweepstakes and the Subscription Debacle

Throughout this book you have no doubt savored a slew of magazine subscription efforts ranging from simple double postcards to the elegant mailings of Bill Jayme and Heikki Ratalahti (See chapter 31). Some of them require existing knowledge of the magazine; others draw you in and intrigue with you with the features and the benefits of subscribing.

Theoretically, a brave new world for magazines should exist—what with the Internet and its worldwide reach. But it ain't so. The fact is, the world of magazines is in total disarray. The culprits: competition (a dizzying number of new magazines), sweepstakes offers, and incalculably lazy subscription managers. A quarter century ago, readers had a choice of around 1,300 titles as opposed to nearly 5,000 today. (This number does not include trade magazine published for individual industries.)

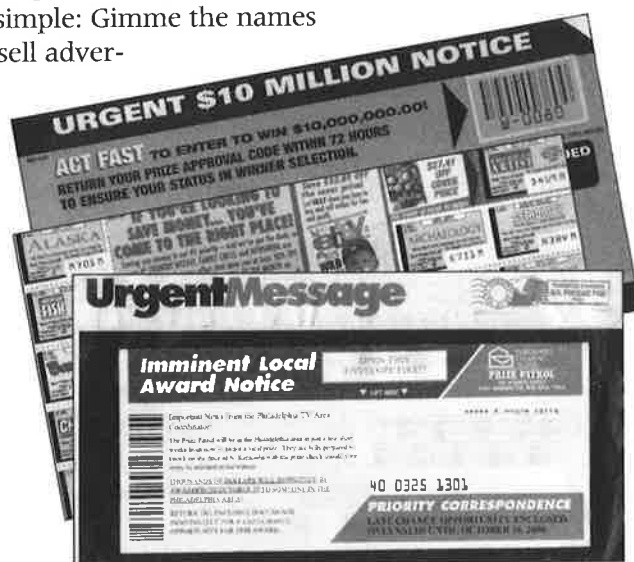
Before spending money with a magazine, an advertiser wants to be absolutely sure that the ad will reach the number of paid readers the publisher promises. This is called the "rate base." The word "paid" is important here; someone who has paid for a subscription presumably has a vested interest in the magazine (and the subject area of the publication) and so is a desirable candidate for an advertiser.

The Audit Bureau of Circulation (ABC) which monitors rate bases, decreed long ago that if a subscriber bought a magazine from a sweepstakes agency (Publishers Clearing House (PCH) or American Family Publishers (AFP) and paid the bill, it can be considered a paid subscription. It makes no never mind that the "subscriber" is really a gambler who has been promised winnings of \$10 million in huge banner headlines which are qualified by mousetype that says if he has "the winning number and returns it" and the odds are 80 million to 1.

Sweepstakes buyers are traditionally dismal renewers. It's axiomatic that if you sell with the sweepstakes, you must bill with a sweepstakes and renew with a sweepstakes. They are a drug.

The deal circulation directors made with PCH and AFP was simple: Gimme the names of paid subscribers so I can show my publisher who can then sell advertising. PCH and AFP kept most or all of the payments.

At right: A disputed Publishers Clearing House sweepstakes effort. This is a toned-down effort that doesn't promise \$10 million—the result of the avalanche of lawsuits from state attorneys general. The former president of Rodale Press, Bob Teuffel, points out that in terms of consumer benefits, these sweeps mailings offer consumers the lowest price for magazine subscriptions. In addition, by ganging up the offers, these are far more environmentally friendly than if each and every magazine sent out millions of individual offers. However in their desperation to save sagging responses, the sweepstakes marketers simply went beyond the pale in terms of making outrageous promises of huge winnings.



The Quick Fix—The Professional Discount Offer

It made no difference that these "paid subscribers" were far more interested in winning \$10 million than reading the magazine and the only reason they purchased a subscription was because they thought it enhanced their chances of winning. (It did not.) Nor did it matter to circulation directors that the mailings got so sleazy in their deceptive promises that gullible senior citizens actually went broke buying airline tickets in order to bring their "winning" entries to Ed McMahon and Dick Clark in Florida. The new breed of circulation directors were venal number crunchers who cared little for the consumer or the image of their magazines.

Finally, the Senate held hearings (I have video tapes and weasel-ing representatives from the sweeps marketers that would make your skin crawl). Further, state attorneys general sued and the sweeps companies paid gigantic fines and were forced to mend their ways. In the wake of all the catastrophic publicity, the public finally wised up and stopped responding to sweepstakes offers. Response to sweeps mailings tanked and magazines did not make their rate bases. Several, including LIFE, went out of business.

According to Dan Capell of Capell's Circulation Report, in their heyday, sweepstakes offers accounted for 15% to 20% of all magazine subscriptions. By the turn of the century, they represented five to 10 percent—and probably more like five."

Magazine publishers were suddenly faced with four choices: (1) rebate money to advertisers; (2) cut their rate base; (3) jump in the mail and get subscribers the old-fashioned way—on their own; (4) do nothing and hope nobody notices.

Number 3 above is the logical choice. Unfortunately, most of these circulation directors had no idea how to work with writers and designers to create benefit-oriented circulation promotions. So many opted for the "quick fix"—the professional discount offer. In Capell's words, "The circulation directors are trying to cut the cost of the package rather than get new names."

Originally this genre was sent to businesses, the idea being that this would be a good way for magazines to be seen in waiting rooms which, hopefully, would result in additional subscriptions from those who were waiting.

Then someone tested this format to straight consumer lists and it worked, as people felt flattered that someone thought they were "professionals" and were willing to offer big discounts.

As you can see on the Newsweek lift piece at right (headline: ATTENTION), the copy at the bottom reads: "THIS OFFER NOT AVAILABLE TO THE GENERAL PUBLIC."

This is a transparent attempt to convey exclusivity. As you can see by the address at the top, the mailing came to me at home; no "professional" name or corporation is used. I am part of the "general public."

As you can see, even *The Wall Street Journal* is using this down-n-dirty technique. Compared to the great Martin Conroy letter which brought in over \$1 billion in

subscription revenues to *The Journal* (see page 438), I can only say to the circulation people, "You've come a short way, baby."

The Importance of Arithmetic in Direct Mail

Opening this book is a long section on using the double postcard to sell magazine subscriptions. Because the double postcard is cheaper in the mail than the full-dress direct mail package—and it brings in a higher gross response—the question is: Why use a full dress package at all?

The same could be said for the Professional Discount format—cheap, quick, easy.

The answer lies in the concept of "lifetime value" which is the key element in the success or failure of a direct marketing business. It's okay to break even or lose money acquiring a customer (or subscriber or, in the case of charities, a donor) if that person spends additional money with you over the coming months and years.

Circulation consultant Gordon Grossman brilliantly described this concept in his *Grossman on Circulation—1994* where he shared the results of a five-year study comparing the lifetime value of subscribers to a consumer magazine who responded to a double postcard vs. those who ordered as the result of a full-dress direct mail package.

Using Chart 1, an inexperienced direct marketer would scan the results of this test and conclude that the double postcard test was the clear winner. The offer, remember, was a bill-me, so gross response is meaningless. It is imperative to wait for the payment history of this offer. And although the difference in net subscriptions is slightly higher for the double postcard (955 vs. 900 for the control), the dollar profit/loss would indicate the double postcard was far more successful—a swing of \$6,854. Theoretically, this is a no-brainer; the double postcard won hands down.

Or did it?

Take a look at Chart 2.

Analyzed over five years—the first year pay-up, the second year conversion (a term used to describe a first year renewal), and three years of renewals—you discover that the full-dress package is the clear winner—both in terms of net subscriptions (507 more subs or +33.4%) and profit (\$20,643 or +62.3%).

Thus, a circulation director who scrapped the control in favor of the double postcard would be a big loser over the long term.

What accounts for the difference? Very likely, the responders to the full-dress control package were *readers* who spent time studying the letter, circular, order form, lift pieces, etc. and were persuaded that this was a publication they would like to have come into their homes.

The double postcard responders, on the other hand, were more likely skimmers and scanners, browsers and lookers.

This model may well apply to the Professional Discount offer as well. Time will tell.

Circumventing the Renewal Problem

The magazine business has the most inferior circulation model of any publishing category—a business that regularly takes its customers out once a year, points a gun at them and says, “if you don’t pay me right now, I’m no longer shipping you any product.” Renewal notices are a coping mechanism for a fatally flawed selling system. No other service in the world forces its customers to reevaluate its usefulness once a year and decide whether or not to continue. Newspapers would be out of business if this were the model.

Jay Walker has been wrong about a lot of things in his life—most notably his tectonic fiasco, Priceline.com. However, in the area of magazine subscriptions, he is right on. Being forced to renew a publication is a nuisance. Ed Lind, my *Philadelphia Inquirer* delivery person doesn’t ring my doorbell once a year and ask me if I want to renew. He simply delivers the paper and, once a month, includes a bill. The same is true for *The Wall Street Journal* and *The New York Times*. If I weren’t forced to think through the worth of magazines to which I had subscribed, I probably would still be receiving such losers as *Talk*, *Brill’s Content*, and *The New York Observer*.

A number of magazines circumvent this problem by calling themselves membership organizations—*The National Geographic*, *Smithsonian*, and *Natural History*, for example. According to the late guru, Dick Benson, if you are a membership organization with the publication being the main benefit of membership, you are allowed under FTC rules to simply bill for dues rather than be forced to beg for a renewal. Benson said this scheme will raise renewal rates. In Benson’s words (from his *Secrets of Successful Direct Mail*): “Memberships renew better than plain subscriptions by 10% or more.”

Automatic Renewals

For as long as I can remember, the subscription model that magazine publishers drooled over was that of *Travel & Leisure* and, later, *Food & Wine*—both published by American Express and automatically renewed once a year with a small line item on the cardmember's bill. Usually the charge was buried deep amidst huge T&E expenses and was so relatively insignificant that it was paid without thinking about it. As a result, both magazines—editorially ordinary by any standard—enjoy phenomenally high renewal rates.

In his fascinating and useful *Grossman on Circulation—1995*, former *Reader's Digest* circulation director and magazine consultant Gordon Grossman wrote:

For at least as long as I've been in this business (which is now 37 years), American publishers have talked about the potential advantages of using automatic renewal offers. They have looked longingly at colleagues in the United Kingdom and Holland, where automatic renewal is the standard method of selling subscriptions.

Many tests have been tried. Most of the tests that I'm aware of have not "failed" in the traditional way—they just got so garbled in fulfillment that they can't be read.

Five years later (2000), Grossman said, "Automatic renewal is the biggest thing in circulation right now. Everybody who's doing it is making money. Time, Inc., Rodale, *Reader's Digest*—are able to move response rates up a bit and cut renewal costs." He added, "But to make it work, it must be done right and done right from the start."

Here is how *Time* magazine phrased the automatic renewal offer on AOL:

HOW YOUR FREE TRIAL/SPECIAL GIFT OFFER WORKS:

Your 4 Trial Issues are truly risk-free. If you don't like TIME, no problem. You can cancel at any time within the trial period by calling the 800 number we'll provide. The 4 issues will be yours to keep, FREE.

If you like what you see, do nothing. TIME will send 23 more issues and charge you (after the trial period) at the low price of just \$24.98 for a total of 27 issues. Plus, with this special offer, you'll get a matching set of His & Hers TIME Elite Watches. After that, TIME will automatically renew your subscription every six months using your current billing method you use to pay for your AOL account. As an added bonus, you'll always get the guaranteed low price then available. Your satisfaction is always guaranteed and you can cancel at any time. You will receive a full refund on any unmailed issues.

By clicking "ORDER," I am asking America Online to give TIME all required information about the billing method I currently use to pay for AOL and to authorize TIME to charge my subscription to that account.

TIME is published weekly, except for occasional combined, extra or expanded issues. Subscribers: If the Post Office alerts us that your magazine is undeliverable, we have no further obligation unless we receive a corrected address within two years.

Yet Another Wrinkle

Enter Jay Walker with a fascinating new concept that is saving at least some of the bacon of those magazines that had relied too heavily on the sweepstakes marketers. With his NewSub services, which Walker co-founded with publishing wizard Michael Loeb (son of *Fortune* editor Marshall Loeb), consumers are offered a list of magazines as stuffers in monthly credit card statements.

Unlike the sweepstakes mailings, where each magazine is represented by a stamp and to subscribe, you paste it on the sweeps entry form, NewSub Services simply offers a list of magazines at great prices. Choose one or more of the titles, and your subscription is automatically charged to the credit card every six months on a til-forbid basis. (You will continue to receive the magazine and your card will continue to be charged every six months UNTIL you FORBID it—in other words, until you cancel.)

In another, equally inventive scheme, Walker has cut a deal with major airlines whereby they furnish NewSub with a list of frequent fliers and the number miles that will be expiring from non-use. Simply check off the magazines you want to subscribe to, and you pay for them with miles. As program director Carolyn Mott writes: "Magazines are available for as few as 300 miles and there's no cash cost."

This is the NewSub Services self-mailer that goes out to frequent fliers whose miles are expiring. Thirty-nine magazines are offered for as little as 300 miles (*Spin*) and as much as 5,500 miles (*Daily Variety*). On both top panels—of the letter and the reply device at right, the available award miles are listed, and the salutation is personalized.

Many frequent fliers do not accrue enough miles on an individual airline to garner any kind of free travel benefits. This is the next best thing.

The frequent flier benefits, because the miles are not wasted; the magazine benefits, because the consumer has paid something (miles, not cash) which satisfies the Audit Bureau of Circulation that this is a paid subscriber; and, of course, NewSub Services wins.

A Variation on the Double Postcard

Since the double postcard leaves no room for a sales pitch, this variation was invented.

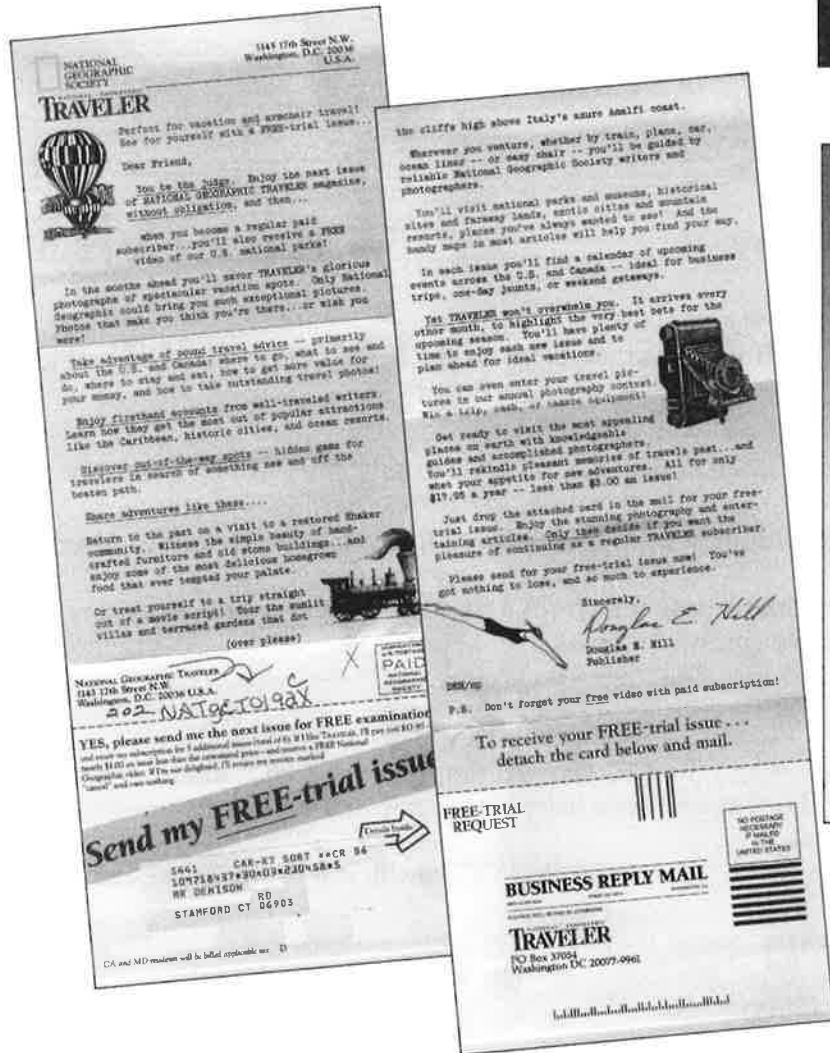
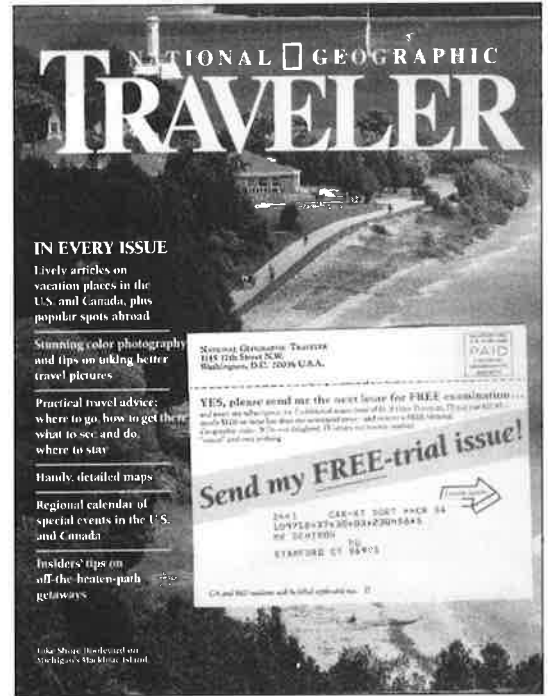
Essentially, the cover of an issue of a magazine is printed on card stock and the double postcard is pasted on the front in a glassine protective cover.

However, since the special double postcard rates do not hold for this format (this mails at Standard or Bulk Rate postage) publishers can increase the size of the double postcard to a triple postcard and include a full sales letter, as you see below.

This system allows for a huge increase in the amount of space allotted to selling. The amount of sales copy approximates an envelope package—a long(ish) letter and a two-sided brochure in full color (the cardboard card).

We have seen this format used by a number of magazines, although not lately.

It might well be worth bringing it back with a test.



Cardboard backing: 9" x 11", four-color both sides. Postcard letter: 5 1/2" x 4 1/2", unfolds to 5 1/2" x 13".

The Legendary "J" Mailings

The "magazine tear sheet" at right with the yellow Post-It™ arrived in a plain white #10 envelope with my name typed on it and a First Class Stamp.

It is truly startling. When I first received it, I thought, "Who the hell is J?"

I first reported on this format way back in January, 1985 when it was dreamed up by little-known West Coast Investment advisor, John Pugsley, who self-published a book, *Common Sense Economics*, that wasn't selling. In that iteration, it arrived as a folded up tabloid newspaper sheet printed in magic marker on newsprint with the message:

Dennis
Great offer!
R.

Since then, this technique has been used by several mailers, notably entrepreneurs Jay Abraham and Ted Nicholas who used it to sell his *Secrets of Self-Publishing* book. Instead of using a magic marker directly on the page, Nicholas used a Post-It™. According to Nicholas, if you have a successful ad targeted to a narrow market, this would work. Needed:

- A white, closed-faced envelope with person's name and address hand typed
- A first class stamp
- A full-page newspaper ad on newsprint with stock market tables on the back (so it seems like a real tear sheet)
- The page must have a ragged edge so it appears to be torn out.
- A hand-written Post-It™; it cannot be preprinted in the person's handwriting and filled in. It must be the real thing.

In the early 90s, Georgetown Publishing president Dani Levinas used it to sell subscriptions to *American Speaker*.

The Georgetown version arrived looking like a page torn from a news or current events magazine and was mailed in the millions—as an unbeatable control for years.

Enter the FTC

Levinas agreed to stop mailing the package when the FTC charged that he misled consumers by sending them what appeared to be an independent book review torn from a magazine and tricked the prospect into thinking it had been sent by a friend named "J".

Levinas made tweaks (e.g., running the word "ADVERTISEMENT" on the top of the page) and other changes.

Who is "J"? Quite simply, "J" is the quickest, easiest script letter to write.

In the 12 years I published *Who's Mailing What!* this format brought in the most reader mail.

You'd think the FTC would have better things to do.

That Curious Bastard, the Magalog

The original premise of *Million Dollar Mailings* was to examine long-term controls—mailings that were received for three or more consecutive years. The logic: If it worked for three years straight, it was a moneymaker.

The fallacy of this blueprint was that certain formats that lent themselves to constant change were ignored. Example: Sweepstakes. If you send out the very same sweepstakes mailing for three straight years, people would assume it was an old sweeps offer and the prize had long ago been won. So sweeps offers necessarily had to be constantly refurbished. If nothing else, the date the prize was to be awarded had to change.

Another format that lends itself to constant change is the so-called magalog—part catalog, part magazine, part direct mail pitch—that has become a staple of the publishing industry, especially books, book clubs, and newsletters, particularly those in the fields of investments and health. The need for constant change is obvious. Just as no magazine editor could imagine putting the same cover on the newsstand month after month, no marketer would continue to send out a magalog with the same cover over and over. The recipient would say, “Oh, I’ve seen this before,” and consign it to the round file.

It All Began with the Long, Long Letter

Back in the 1970s and 80s, the traditional direct mail letter ran three or four pages of typewriter type. However, in the area of newsletters that offered investment advice, the premier copywriter was Long Island freelancer Gary Bencivenga who said, “The more you tell, the more you sell.” The result, letters began to get longer and longer. Interspersed with all the benefits of subscribing to a particular publication, direct mail writers began dropping in little nuggets of information.

One of the prime purveyors of financial newsletters in the early 1980s was Florida entrepreneur Joel Nadel whose publications had a wonderfully authentic European aroma. For example, he founded The Royal Society of Liechtenstein, a secret organization of international investors and entrepreneurs with the main benefit being a monthly newsletter. The Florida BBB shut it down after determining that it was neither royal nor a society nor had anything to do with Liechtenstein, whereupon it was bought by Bill Bonner of Agora (publisher of the hugely successful *International Living* newsletter) and renamed *The Oxford Club*.

A splendid example of the long, long letter and Nadel’s splendid trickery was this #10 effort.

Nadel's blue envelope with red and blue type for his newsletter, *CONFIDENTIAL: ZURICH REPORT*, positively reeks of the old world with its international air mail border, German writing, return address in Germanic font, and the red wax seal on the flap of the envelope; all give it a sense of value and importance and an aura of mystery. However, there are two fascinating points. 1) Axel Andersson found 6 grammatical mistakes in the German on the envelope. 2) The metered indicia states it was mailed from Zip Code 25430, or Kearneysville, WV—a long way from the arms of the Gnomes of Zurich!

The 16-page letter has the following copy in big type at the top:

EMERGENCY BULLETIN! . . . Dangerous economic developments imminent. U.S. Media coverage biased, incomplete, and misleading. Could ruin American investors. Immediate action required to safeguard assets and investments. "Low profile" report offers strategic solutions.

The courier font makes it appear to have been composed on a typewriter. The letter is filled with news stories and fascinating predictions of upcoming financial doom and gloom—plus bright promises of how a subscriber can not only weather the storm but make money while all other investors are losing their shirts.

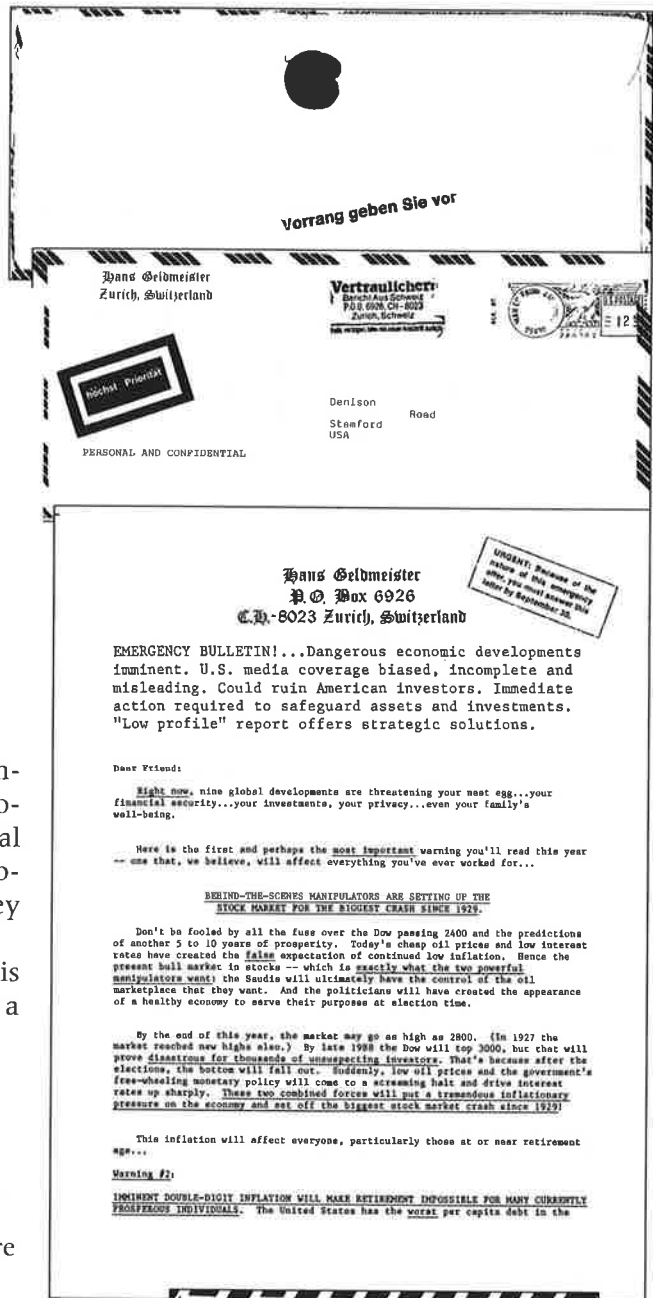
Adding to the caché is the reply envelope which is addressed to a P.O. Box in Zurich (subscriber supplies a 44¢ stamp).

The offer here is terrific:

YES—Please begin my introductory subscription to *CONFIDENTIAL: REPORT FROM ZURICH* and send me the FREE bonus report, *The Swiss Solution*. Also send me your private 24-hour Swiss Insiders' hotline phone number which I may use as often as I wish for the entire term of my subscription.

One Year—12 monthly issues for \$69 (Reg. \$138 plus bonuses worth \$444).

Let me say that I was delighted to have unearthed and read again this wonderfully hokey mailing. I have not seen a format like this—with all its beguilement, sense of conspiracy, and European-ness—for years. Call me a sucker, but I think it's really neat. And I remember receiving a slew of these, so it must have worked. I have got to believe that some entrepreneur could go back to the well and, with an updated message, make this work all over again. What would the updated message be? Given the roller coaster ride that dot-com investors took in 2000, a pitch from Zurich or Liechtenstein or Antwerp offering the security of precious metals or diamonds might just fly.



The 16-Page Letter Evolves into a Self-Mailer

The mechanics of producing a mailing with a 12- and 16-page letter—plus a brochure of some sort, perhaps a lift piece and the order form and reply envelope—made for a complex and expensive folding and inserting job. Someone—probably Gary Bencivenga—came up with the idea of simply taking the long letter, together with an order form, a lift piece, and brochure-like element and turning them all into a self-mailer with a reply envelope bound in it.

At right and below are the cover and pages from a 1989 magalog for *Taipan*, a brainchild of entrepreneur Bill Bonner who built Agora Publishing into an \$80 million international mini-conglomerate with offices in Baltimore, London, and a Chateau in the French countryside.

Instead of an outside carrier envelope with teaser copy, the cover of this self-mailer is its own teaser. Nothing for the reader to open; rather you simply start reading when you come to it in your pile of morning mail.

Note Bonner's titillating subhead:

11 Major Events of the 1990s that will Change Life Forever

After finishing reading the cover, you turn the page and discover that Bonner's 17-page letter begins with "Dear reader" at the bottom of page 2. He moves from a Times or Times-Roman font to a typewriter font, thus giving the letter a more personal feel—as though he composed it on his Remington electric. Here is direct mail letter writing at its best (Bonner is arguably the world's greatest copywriter) with a series of short paragraphs, indented paragraphs, asterisked paragraphs—all designed with the intention of keeping the eye moving. Bonner's promises are powerful:

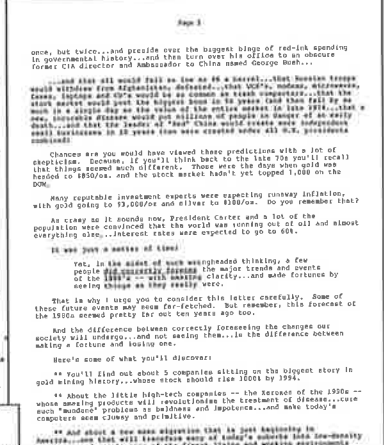
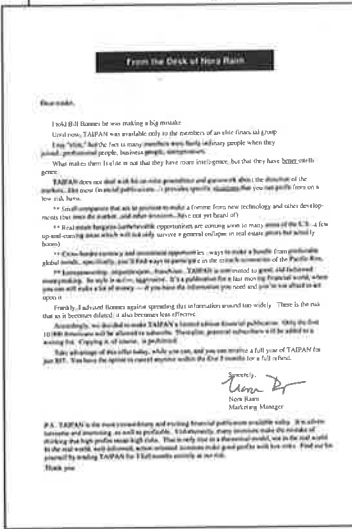
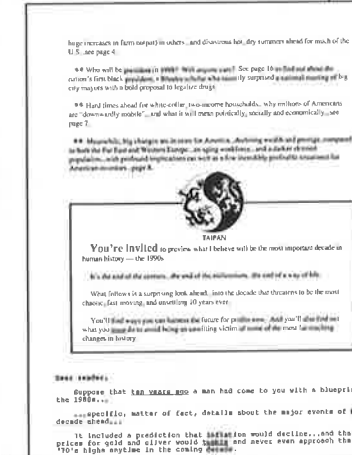
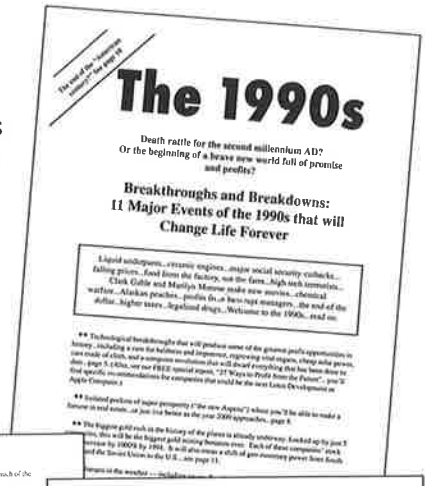
Here's some of what you'll discover:

- You'll find out about 5 companies sitting on the biggest story in gold mining history . . . whose stock should rise 1000% by 1994.
- About the little high-tech companies—the Xeroxes of the 1990s—whose amazing products will revolutionize the treatment of disease . . . cure such "mundane" problems as baldness and impotence . . . and make today's computers seem clumsy and primitive.

And so the letter continues for 15 more pages, filled with little nuggets of information and bold promises of riches beyond the dreams of avarice.

The inside back spread, shown here at left, contains a "lift" piece—that extra little note to "give a quick little shove" to the person sitting on the fence (as Malcolm Decker writes). On the back page is the order form at bottom and the elements of a circular over it—Money-Back Guarantee and a testimonial.

This format is printed and bound like a magazine, which means no folding and inserting.



Evolution into the Special Report

When a mailing is successful, the next step is to try and figure out why. What is it that enabled this mailing to beat a control? Presumably the lists were the same so logic would dictate that its success was based on the offer and, to some extent, the design. The early magalogs worked, so the creators began coming up with more and more sophisticated designs.

As magalogs grew more sophisticated, so too did the marketing philosophy behind them. Pioneer Gary Bencivenga likens magalogs to "infomercials in print. They explain and demonstrate the product; they offer testimonials." He added: "Magalogs remind me of the old General Foods salesman who used to go door-to-door bringing a free scoop of coffee for housewives to try. They'd say 'try this, and I'll be back next week to take your order.' Magalogs serve the same purpose, by giving readers a free scoop of the product."

The top illustration, a 1989 magalog for Agora's *Strategic Investment* offering the advice of gurus James Dale Davidson and Lord William Rees-Mogg, is one of the early versions that used photographs.

Of the prospectus effort, Phillips Publishing's designer Ed Elliott said back in 1993:

"The magalogs we're mailing today fall into two categories—the traditional, consumer-magazine style and the report style. For the financial publications, we have been having some success mailing the report-style magalog—and its variations such as the prospectus style we recently tested for Young's Intelligence Report.

Gary Bencivenga believed in the understated approach to the magalog. He recalled how his former boss, David Ogilvy, used to say that when you're creating space advertising, you want to make the ad look like an article. "The magalog does for direct mail what the editorial-look did for space. That's why it's been such a strong innovation in direct mail."



The 1990 mailing at right for *Agora's Investing* begins to look like magazine, with its cover of light blue background and yellow type. In the upper right corner is the following, which gives it the perceived value of a magazine or special report:

\$5 U.S. **\$6 Canada**

The center spread of this magalog has the look and feel of a magazine with sidebars and illustrations. At the same time, the business reply envelope is bound in, which tells the reader that some action is expected.

The clarion call for the action comes in the inside back spread (shown at left). Here is a description of the premiums on the left and the order coupon at right along with the money-back guarantee. Plenty of order options: cash with order, credit card, or telephone. Note the word "FREE" plastered all over the place, along with two extra premiums for a two-year subscription.

When this magalog format first appeared, it beat envelope mailings hands down. "It was intended to disarm people," Ed Elliott told me recently. "This was no typical junk mail, but rather it appeared to be something valuable." But after a while, that approach seemed to die. As more and more investment marketers mailed them, Elliott suggested, "they became the new definition of junk mail." As a result, the format and copy got more and more sophisticated in the coming years.

The Two Faces of the Modern Magalog

Face 1: The Soft Offer

Magalogs are a different breed (and read) than the old direct mail package that arrived in a carrier envelope. Yet according to designer William Fridrich, the basic elements remain. The magazine-like cover replaces the outside envelope. Inside, you'll generally find a letter; although it is no longer the main salesman, it serves to tell the reader that this product has been created by a real person and not a bunch of faceless editors. The other traditional elements—brochure, lift piece, testimonials, guarantee, order mechanism, reply envelope—are all part of the magalog. But the added dimension is the perceived value of editorial content.

As Phillips Publishing's Ed Elliott says, "I can do more with a self-mailer (magalog) that resembles an editorial product that I cannot do with a traditional letter.

"First of all, I don't need to get somebody to open it, because it's not in an envelope. In effect, it's already open."

This is true. The prospect can start reading right away. However, the covers are so startling and the headlines so powerful (and so memorable) that once a prospect has seen it, it would not be forgotten. As a result, if a marketer keeps mailing the same magalog over and over, it will be discarded; "I've seen this," prospects will say, even though they may never have opened it.

The 16-page Boardroom magalogs—or self-mailers—you see here are all identical on the inside. The top three are enormous, measuring 10" x 13 1/2" and printed on glossy paper in blazing full color. The smaller version at right was mailed for two years during 1997–1998, whereupon it was expanded to tabloid size and given these new covers during 1999 and 2000.

This is a huge departure from the long-term control for *Bottom Line/Personal* and *Book of Inside Information* efforts you see on pages 377–383.

Incidentally, Marty Edelman of Boardroom jealously guarded the identity of his ace copywriter, Mel Martin, so his name was not revealed in the previous edition. When Mel died, Marty asked me to write a tribute to this genius with words who, literally, put Boardroom into the top ranks of newsletter publishers. I wrote it for *Target Marketing*, and it later appeared in my book, *Method Marketing* (also published by Bonus Books, Inc.).

Wild Graphics = Soft Offer

According to Ed Elliott, the wild and crazy graphics and relatively light copy you see here (and on equivalent magalogs for Rodale Press) work well on soft (or bill-me) offers.

Phillips, on the other hand, uses copy-intensive magalogs, coupled with a huge array of free gifts or premiums, but always demands either cash with order or a credit card charge.



On these facing pages, you see two competing direct mail philosophies that very likely appeal to two different audiences. The Boardroom-Rodale readers are people looking for a quick fix while Phillips serves customers hungry for information who are willing to pony up cash on the burlap for it.

Face 2: The Hard Offer (Phillips/Agora)

Designer William Fridrich, an early pioneer of magalog formats and the first to take it to tabloid size, says his aim is "to give enough information so they can't open it over the trash, but rather put this puppy aside for further reading. I've sat on airplanes and watched people take one of my magalogs out of a briefcase and read it cover to cover just like a magazine."

Phillips' Ed Elliott firmly believes that an envelope package is a linear reading experience. Although you have various elements—letter, circular, lift piece, order device—they must be read one at a time. The subheads on a letter, for example, are not as compelling as sidebars, pull quotes, testimonials, and other bells and whistles found in a magalog. When prospects flip through the magalog, they are given "many more points of entry. Every spread gives a brand new opportunity to engage somebody who has not started reading." In effect, every spread equals the teaser of an envelope.

The original magalogs—first tested in the early 1990s—were intended to disarm the prospect. Clearly, these were not junk mail, but rather something valuable. Once out there to the investment market, said Elliott, they did fabulously. But after, they became the new definition of junk mail and started to die. So the designers switched them to look more like a special report and, later, a tabloid.

The Phillips magalog you see here started out with the "Common Mistakes" headline shown at the top. The interior fulfilled the promise on the cover with chapter-like sections devoted to each area of health—cancer, heart, prostate, arthritis, etc.

"But three-year-old messages to a limited universe don't cut it," Elliott said. So the covers were changed while the inside remained the same. The next iteration was headlined, "Do You Take Any of These 16 Popular Vitamins or Supplements" and, later, "The Great Vitamin Hoax." Both worked just as well as the prior headline. Phillips believed it brought in younger consumers who were vitamin buyers.

The collage features several key pieces of direct mail:

- Special Medical Alert:** A large, dark graphic with the headline "Are you and your doctor making these COMMON MISTAKES?" and a list of common medical errors such as Heart Disease, Arthritis, Prostate, Cancer, Cholesterol, Breast Cancer, Hormone Replacement, Diabetes, and Vitamin.
- M.D.'s Digest:** A tabloid-style magazine cover with headlines like "Breakthrough Nutritional Cures from the Whitaker Wellness Center" and "ARTHRITIS Breakthrough: New, 100% safe, all-natural cure made from natural skin cartilage to dissolve your joints."
- M.D.'s Wellness Journal:** A journal cover with the headline "How to beat the 7 biggest threats to your health after you pass age 50." and a list of threats including 1. ACCIDENTS, 2. ALZHEIMER'S and STROKE, 3. PROSTATE, and 4. CANCER.
- Biggest Mistakes Doctors Make in Treating PROSTATE PROBLEMS:** A detailed article with a sub-headline "Major New Breakthrough in Treating Prostate Cancer."
- The 27 Most Overlooked Natural Remedies & Cures:** An article listing various natural health remedies.
- Amazing Answers:** A promotional card for a subscription offer, featuring the text "Five More Free Gifts When You Try a No-Risk, Two-Year Subscription" and "MAIL THIS CARD NOW!"

Tested as a 76-page so-called bookalog (5½" x 8½") under the title, *M.D.'s Digest*, it depressed response by 40%. So it was expanded to look like a newspaper (10½" x 13") and response popped back up to the original pace. At 24 pages, the mailing cost was less.

Elliott's advice: If you can find a good strong control, change format and appearance as well as headlines and lead-ins, and you can keep the thing alive for a long time.

Unlike the graphically explosive model across the page of Boardroom and Rodale, these copy-heavy efforts ask for cash (or credit card) with order. For that reason, they are offer-heavy—with a total of 23 free special reports if you order (and pay for) a two-year subscription.

In the words of the late guru Dick Benson, "Free is a magic word." And on the ordering spread shows at right, FREE appears some 40 times.

Is your offer a bill-me or cash-with-order? The soft offer traditionally brings a higher up-front response. But you have to go through all the hassle of billing series and bad debt.

In direct mail, arithmetic is king (and queen).

You test.

The Fund Raising Arena

I have never really been comfortable with fund raising. The reason is that I have done a great deal of reporting on the practices of fund raisers and have come to the conclusion that a good 25 percent of national organizations that raise money by mail are in business to make money for themselves and the causes they profess to help would be far better off if these charlatans were totally out of the picture.

An example. Peggy and I have taken three photographic safaris to Kenya and Tanzania. We love to watch the animals under the giant sky of the Serengeti and the Mara. During a grim period in the 1980s, Somali ivory poachers would cross the border into Kenya and kill elephants for their tusks (and, occasionally, kill tourists who got in their way). Several wildlife organizations were in the field protecting elephants: African Wildlife, Wildlife Conservation International (funded by the Bronx Zoo), and, of course, the Kenya Wildlife people under the direction of Richard Leakey. They raised money for their work by mail and their revenues went to protecting elephant.

At the same time, a number of phony-baloney, shyster organizations rented lists of known animal lovers and begged for money to save African elephants. They had no operatives in Africa. They had no lobbyists in Washington and around the world working to ban the importation and sale of ivory. In fact, their usual business was raising money to save other animals. But using gory photographs of dead bloody elephants and heart-rending copy that hit the emotional hot buttons of fear (extinction of elephants), guilt (if you don't give, you will be responsible for this great tragedy), anger (at the Somali poachers), flattery (I'm writing you because you care), and salvation (elephants will be saved) they pried tons of money out of gullible, good-hearted Americans.

What were their programs to save elephants? They were "raising the consciousness" of consumers about the problem. How? By making mailings to raise money to make mailings to raise money to make mailings to. . . .

The IRS and other regulatory agencies allow mail order charities to attribute a huge percentage of their mailing costs to "public education." As a result, the average consumer cannot begin to tell if a

charity is legitimate or not. I'm an expert; I can't tell unless I have the charity's annual report, the Form #990 (which is filed with the IRS), and samples of the mailings in my hand. And even then, their charlatanism can be concealed.

What happened with the elephants? People would receive one of these dishonest tearjerker mailings and mail off a check to save the elephants. Whereupon the next day a legitimate appeal to save the elephants would be received. "I gave to elephants yesterday," the beleaguered consumer would say. "I'll give to something else today." So elephants were hurt rather than helped by these mail order thugs.

Peggy and I sent Richard Leakey \$500 and urged that the money go for ammunition to shoot poachers. Leakey wrote back to say that it had.

The dishonest save-the-elephants scenario is repeated across all categories of mail order charities—social action, environment, health and handicapped, international relief, minority, religion, children—you name it, and somebody is getting rich on the backs of the unfortunate they claim to be helping.

To find out if the charity you are giving to is legit or not, the key number is the percentage of their programs earmarked for "public education." If the amount is in double digits, don't give.

The only exception: Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD) who make no secret of the fact that they are trying to change behavior by making mailings. Give to MADD, and they promise to make more mailings and raise public consciousness.

Easter Seals (One of the Good Guys)

The following background material is from the Easter Seals Web site.

Q: What does Easter Seals do?

A: Easter Seals provides services to help children and adults with disabilities gain greater independence so they can achieve their goals.

Q: What kinds of services are provided by Easter Seals?

A: Easter Seals children's services include early intervention and developmental preschool programs designed to assist young children with disabilities adapt and find ways to succeed in school and in their lives. Preschool and child development centers for children of all abilities offer families a safe, educational environment, staffed by child care professionals. After-school care programs offer extended learning opportunities. Easter Seals camping programs give children and adults with and without disabilities the chance to become more independent. And respite services benefit children with disabilities and their families. Easter Seals vocational training and employment services provide young people and adults with disabilities a full spectrum of services. Skills training, school-to-work transitioning, job placement, supported employment, assistive technology/job accommodation, and mentoring programs help people with disabilities find and keep jobs that enhance independence and inclusion in the community. These are services offered at Easter Seals organizations across the country. Easter Seals continues to be one of the nation's largest networks for physical medicine and rehabilitation services, offering physical, occupational, and speech therapy services, as well as many other specialty services such as home health, aquatic therapy, pulmonary rehabilitation, and low vision assistance. In addition, Easter Seals offers several support programs for spinal cord injuries, stroke, post-polio, and disabilities that occur as a part of aging.

Q: Are Easter Seals services limited to certain types of disabilities?

A: No. It doesn't make any difference what kind of disability a person has. Easter Seals provides disability screening, rehabilitation and support services to

persons of all ages with disabilities resulting from any cause—disease, disability at birth, accidental injuries, and the aging process.

Q: How many people receive Easter Seals services each year?

A: During 1996–1997, Easter Seals programs served 1,049,913 people. In addition, more than one million people participated in Easter Seals public health education activities. Through professional education programs, Easter Seals also helped physicians, therapists, and other professionals learn ways to improve services for people with disabilities.

Q: How did Easter Seals get started?

A: The forerunner of today's organization was founded in 1919 by Edgar Allen, an Ohio businessman, after his son was killed in a streetcar accident. The lack of adequate medical services to save his son's life motivated him to organize the building of a hospital in his community. Subsequently, he took a deep interest in a young boy who came to the hospital for orthopedic treatment. This experience made him aware of the needs of other children with disabilities. With the help of Rotary Clubs he formed the Ohio Society for Crippled Children, the first organization created to help children with physical disabilities. The movement gradually spread throughout the United States. In 1944, the words "and adults" were added to the National Society for Crippled Children's name because serving adults had become an increasingly important part of the organization's program. There were three more significant name changes. In 1967, the words "Easter Seal" were incorporated in the organization's name, reflecting the public's awareness and acceptance of the traditional campaign symbol. In 1979, the phrase "for crippled children and adults" was dropped because the term "crippled" had a negative connotation for people with and without disabilities and was no longer acceptable in the rehabilitation field. In 1998, "society" was dropped and an "s" was added to "seal:" Easter Seals.

The Five-Year Easter Seals Control

The 3 7/8" x 7 7/8" outer envelope has purple type and black lines. The name and address showing through the lower window are printed in black over a lavender tint. Showing through the small back window are the signature full-color flower Easter Seals stamps—two sheets of 15 stamps each. These are known as "freemiums"—free goodies included in the mailing (as opposed to premiums which are goodies that will be sent when you order or contribute). These are meant to lay a guilt trip on the prospect. ("Gee, they sent me these pretty stamps; how can I not send some money.") The stamps are then used to decorate outgoing envelopes which means free publicity for the organization.

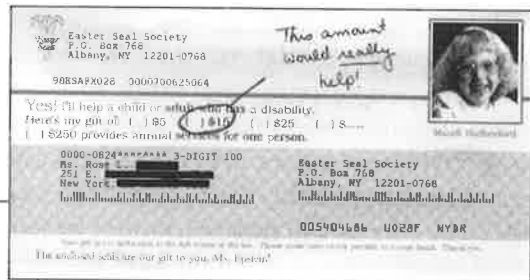
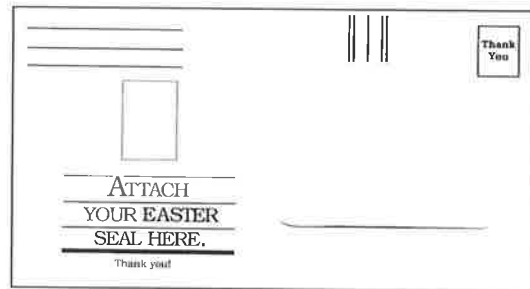
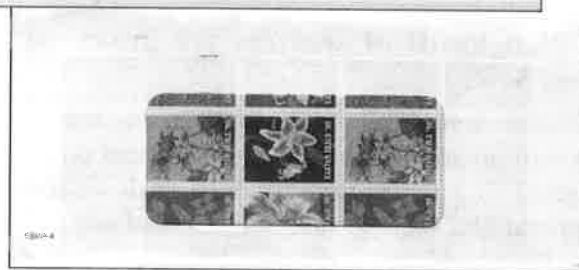
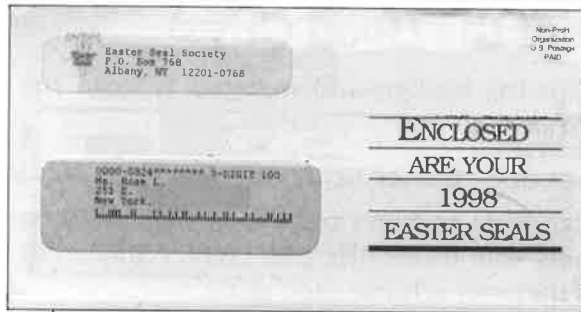
The Courtesy Reply Envelope (sender pays the postage) has a space for the donor to affix one of the stamps.

The order form contains a picture of the little girl and a note indicating how much she would like the person to give.

The back of the order form clearly shows how the money is used and the percentages are excellent: only 5.0% for public education and 76.5% for direct services to people with disabilities. The 9.3 % for fund raising and 9.2% for management and general expenses means Easter Seals is a group anyone can feel good about.

At right is the black-and-white lift piece, shown front and back.

As Malcolm Decker wrote: "If your prospect is sitting on the fence, a quick little shove in the form of a lift letter could get him on your side."



Post Polio Syndrome

Post polio syndrome is a "second" disability affecting a large number of polio survivors. If you had polio and are experiencing unexplained symptoms, you may have the late effects of polio, often referred to as post polio syndrome.

Post polio symptoms can appear in the muscles that were affected the time polio was contracted or in previously unaffected areas. It can appear at any time and is frequently triggered by a trauma such as surgery, death in a family, emotional upheaval, or accident.

Fortunately, there are 1.6 million polio survivors in the United States, many of whom will experience no late effects of polio.

Understand that:


- Post polio syndrome is not a recurrence of the virus
- The rate of decline can be very slow if properly treated
- Unexplained symptoms do not mean that you are reinfecting things
- It can strike 10 to 50 years after the polio attack
- Your participation in the treatment is a must
- Information and support are available
- Support groups are vital links to educational information

Symptoms:

- Unaccustomed fatigue—either rapid muscle tiring or feelings of total body exhaustion
- New weakness in muscles—both those originally affected and those unaffected
- Pain in muscles and/or joints
- Breathing difficulties
- Function decline
- Depression
- Muscle spasms/twitching
- Sleep problems
- Swallowing problems
- Weakness and muscle atrophy
- Anxiety
- Non-recognition/loss of professional symptoms by medical professionals

As a first step, a general medical evaluation should be made to exclude other conditions which may mimic post polio syndrome. Further diagnosis and treatment by a specialist may then be necessary. Some of the specialists dealing with post polio syndrome are neurologists, pulmonologists, physiatrists, and orthopedists. Easter Seals provides therapy services and post polio support groups throughout the United States. For more information contact your area Easter Seals.

In this case, the lift front of the lift piece is designed to be helpful to former polio victims and to show prospects that Easter Seals is serious about what it does. The back page is the so-called "small print" that the lawyers probably insisted upon.

The Easter Seals Five-Year Control Main Letter

Freelance direct mail writer Harry B. Walsh describes what is going on in this letter—a masterpiece that lays fear and guilt on to prospect's shoulders with a trowel.

The tone of a good direct mail letter is as direct and personal as the writer's skill can make it.

Even though it may go to millions of people, it never orates to a crowd but rather murmurs into a single ear. It's a message from one letter writer to one letter reader.

Tell a story if possible. Everybody loves a good story, be it about Peter Rabbit or King Lear. And the direct mail letter with its unique person-to-person format, is the perfect vehicle for a story. Stories get read. The letter I wrote to launch the Cousteau Society 20-some years ago has survived hundreds of tests against it . . . The original of this direct mail Methuselah started out with the lead: "A friend once told me a curious story I would like to share with you . . ."

Most consultants and writers teach that a letter should begin with offer and benefits that should be restated at least three times in the course of the letter along with several calls to action.

However, in the fund-raising arena, all bets are off.

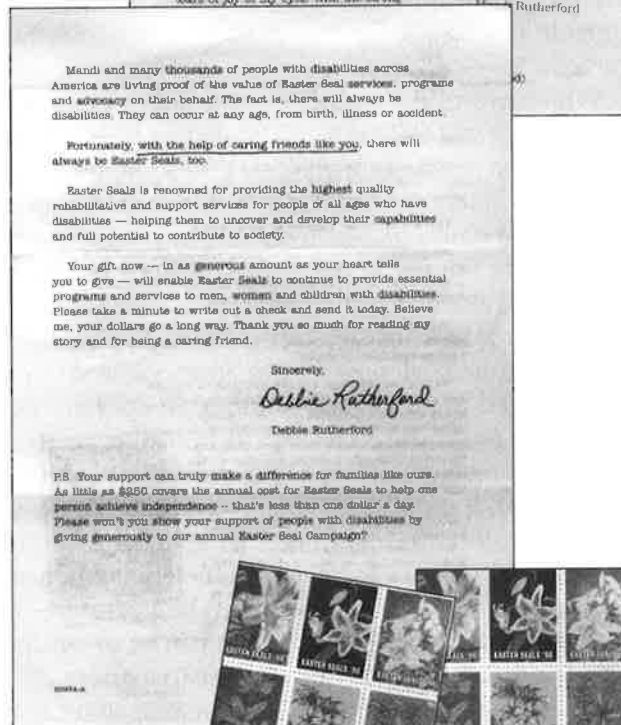
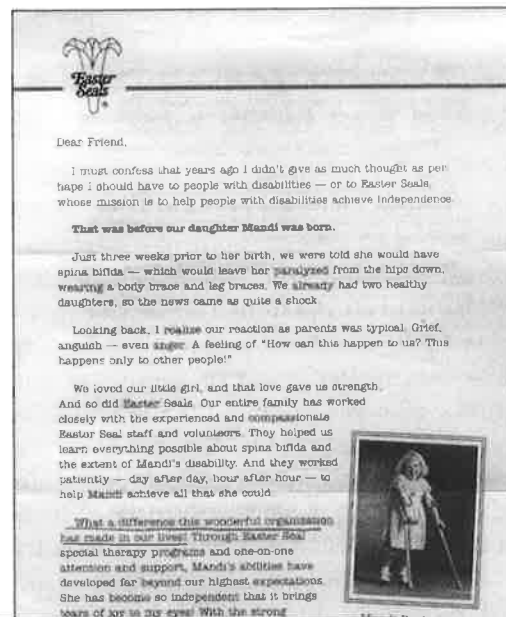
How can you not give to Easter Seals after reading Debbie Rutherford's piteous story? It doesn't matter that the letter is five or seven years old and Mandi is probably a freshman in college. This is a highly personal, emotional message that tugs at the heart strings. "There, but for the Grace of God, goes my little daughter," you say to yourself as you bring out the checkbook.

The main thing to remember in creating fundraising letters: be emotional. Really tug at the heart-strings. In the words of freelancer Jack Maxson: "More than fifty percent of our buying decisions are based on emotion."

And John J. Flieder said, "When reason and emotion come into conflict, emotion wins every time."

About Freemiums

The late guru Dick Benson advocated adding elements to your direct mail package; chances are you will increase response. Freemiums—such as the stamps you see here or the little pressure-sensitive personalized return address labels—have proved effective, especially in the fund raising arena.



The Ultimate Tweak: Moore Response Hits a Grand Slam with the New Easter Seals Control

In the world of direct mail, two techniques exist for beating control: 1) imitative and 2) innovative. The imitative method means tweaking an existing control—improving the offer, adding a lift piece, changing the envelope, writing a new letter, or deleting an element to cheapen the CPM while maintaining the same allowable CPO. Tweaking is traditionally done in-house; why hire a high-priced freelancer or agency to make what are essentially minor changes? Generally, individual tweaks will not result in any breakthrough, but they can raise response a percent or three with no increase in the cost of the mailing. Five such tweaks can give a 10 to 15 percent goose. After cycles of tweaking a control, it usually takes a work of genius to dethrone it.

An innovative attempt to beat control means hiring a creative team to do something completely different, something outside the box. Very few of these are successful, but mailers have to invest in these efforts.

Which brings me to this extraordinary anomaly—the Easter Seals control that was tweaked and mailed by Moore Response with its awesome inline printing capabilities. The advantages of a Moore Response package is that it can be made up of a myriad of personalized elements and mailed economically in the millions. It starts with a big roll of paper that can be printed in different typefaces and then sliced, trimmed, folded, and glued, whereupon you have a complete mailing with myriad elements personalized front and back: personalized outside envelope, personalized order form, personalized reply envelope, and personalized letter as well as other goodies inserted along the way, some also personalized, others in full color. As the late Dick Benson said, “Adding elements to a mailing package, even though obviously adding cost, is more likely to pay out than cheapening the package.”

The possible disadvantages of a Moore Response package are twofold: it achieves maximum efficiency when mailed in the millions which means small tests can be horrendously expensive and sometimes all the personalization can be so overpowering that was obviously computer generated. As freelancer Bill Jayme said,

“... in the marketplace as in theater, there is indeed a factor at work called ‘the willing suspension of disbelief.’”

Bill Cullen and Alan Gross of Moore Response went to Chris Cleghorn of Easter Seals and proposed they create a Moore Response version of its five-year control—same thrust, same letter, same sheet of Easter Seal stamps (which has been a tradition for 60 years), but adding Moore’s bells and whistles. Here’s what arrives in the mailbox:

- An 8 1/2" x 9 1/2" white envelope with the prospect’s name printed three times: on the address line, on the flap and in giant 32-point type along with the promise of Free Gifts Enclosed.
- The five-year control letter telling the story and showing a photo of little Mandi Rutherford on crutches signed by her mother

Debbie Rutherford. The difference between this effort and the old control: Moore Response personalized the salutation on the front and personalized the P.S. on the back.

- The great Canadian designer, Ted Kikoler, has said: "If somehow you can give the readers the feeling that the letter was written by a real human, the order form was filled out by someone in the office, the components were folded and inserted by hand, you stand a great chance of getting them to pay attention to your mailing and thus lifting response."

The stroke of absolute genius in this Moore version is that a Post-It™ Note is affixed smack-dab in the center of the letter. Not just any old printed Post-It™, but a personalized, handwritten Post-It™ that reads:

[First Name Last Name]

If you can only make a gift once this year, please support our Easter Seals Campaign. The need has never been greater!

Kikoler has said if you use a sticker, it should be placed directly over copy, giving the impression that this added message is far more important than the copy beneath it. Clearly this looks like a human hand has touched it.

To pick a small nit, the Debbie Rutherford's handwriting on the Post-It™ does not match her signature on the other side of the letter, but, hey, who's counting?

- A sheet of 42 colorful Easter Seal stamps—the pressure-sensitive kind (no licking).
- A set of 36 pressure-sensitive return address labels which Cullen and Gross said would raise response.
- A personalized order form attached to a courtesy reply envelope (supply your own stamp) with the person's name and address in the upper left hand corner.

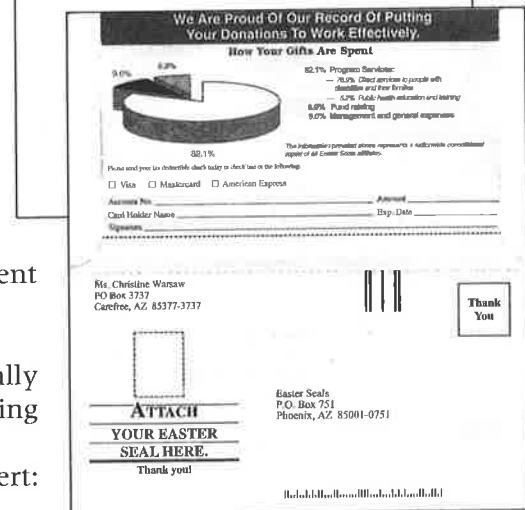
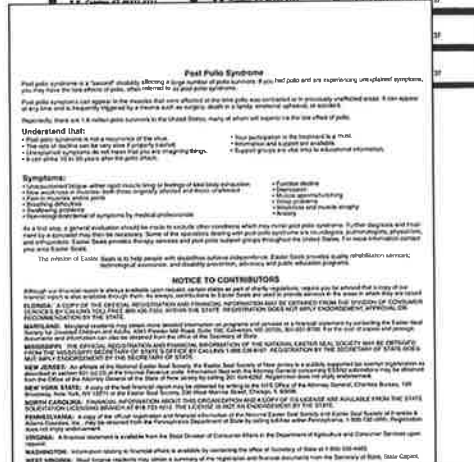
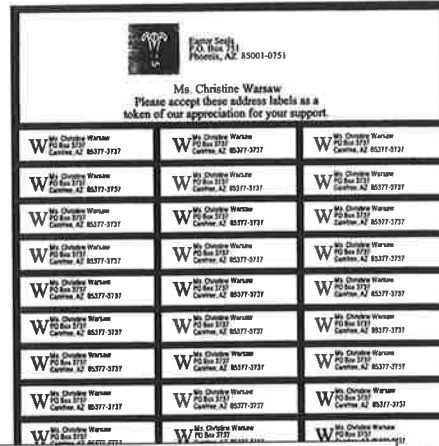
The cost in the mailing of this effort in quantities of 10 million averages \$450 million after factoring in non-profit postage and many list exchanges, considerably more than the old control. However, to paraphrase former New York Mayor Ed Koch, "How's it doin'?"

Just fine, thank you. It is being mailed to both prospects and donors and it beat the old control by a whopping 60 percent. Astonishingly, the average gift rose about four percent as well.

It was Bill Jayme who cautioned:

"Personalize indiscriminately at your peril. Do you really want as a customer some boob who gets turned on by seeing his own name repeated nine times in a single page?"

Easter Seals does! In the words of sportscaster Marv Albert: "Yesssss!"



A Killer Fund Raiser

The Amnesty International mailing you see here is, to say the least, unprepossessing at first glance.

It arrives in a plain white #10 window envelope with the old-fashioned red-white-and-blue "airmail border" and a metered indicia. While the window does indicate that it is a "mass mailing," the metered indicia gives it a First Class look; the average consumer won't notice the postage is the non-profit rate of 9.3¢. On the back flap is simply the address: 322 Eighth Avenue, New York, NY 10021. You have to open the envelope to see who this mailing comes from.

The four-page letter—shown in its entirety on the page opposite—has no letterhead other than the Amnesty logo of a red candle with barbed wire snaking around it.

According to Michael Rooney of the agency, Craver Mathews Smith, this same lead has been working for seven to eight years, while the mailing itself, in various iterations, is about 15 years old. It was originally written, Rooney believes, by either Roger Craver himself or the late Dale Richards, and does a masterful job of hitting the key emotional copy driver of guilt, guilt, and more guilt.

By paragraph three you are made aware of many human emergencies. By paragraph four, you are told you don't have to put your life on the line the way these "prisoners of conscience and others are threatened." Rather, "you can help us, quietly but effectively, right there in your own home."

One very powerful phrase on page 3:

We deeply believe that: "The free must remember the forgotten."

Two extra freemium elements are included:

- An Amnesty International decal of black and white with a gold candle that adds cost to the package and is a wash in terms of raising response. Amnesty goes with it because it is felt this decal on a home or car window gets the message out.

For that reason, we are sending these special name labels to selected people around the country as a means of spreading the all-important message of hope and of seeking your support.

However, you are not being asked to picket a prison in a foreign country, or attend a freedom demonstration, or in any way put yourself in jeopardy. Instead ...

... you can help us, quietly but effectively, right here in your own home.

And you can begin with the simple act of signing your name to the "Message of Hope" card that I'm enclosing with this letter.

Then mail it back to me, and I'll see that it is forwarded to a prisoner who is facing torture, or is being held in isolation for a political reason, or perhaps even faces the very real possibility of being executed.

For example, please listen to just one voice of the more than 45,000 individual prisoners whose cases were resolved with Amnesty International's help.

His name was Constantino, and for years he was held in a tiny cell; his only human contact was with his torturers. He said:

"I did not experience a human face or see a green leaf; and my only company was cockroaches and mice.

"The only daylight that entered my cell was through a small opening at the top of one wall. For eight months I had my hands and feet tied.

"On Christmas Eve the door to my cell opened and the guard tossed in a crumpled piece of paper. I moved as best I could to pick it up.

"It said simply, 'Constantino, do not be discouraged; we know you are alive.' It was signed 'Monica' and had the Amnesty International candle on it.

"These words saved my life and my sanity. Eight months later, I was set free."

does not effect you physically -- it does affect your sense of outrage. And this is where Amnesty International comes in. We can help you express your moral indignation.

But please understand. We seek the release of activists, civilians and others held because of their beliefs or identity. However, we do not take a stand on issues of political ideology. And frankly, that's what makes us so unique and effective ...

... We demand that all prisoners of conscience be set free immediately and unconditionally ...

... We demand that political prisoners receive a fair trial within a reasonable time ...

... We demand that all forms of torture and ill-treatment stop at once and that the death penalty be abolished in all cases ...

... We demand that death squads which carry out extrajudicial executions be disbanded ...

... We demand that "disappearances" a form of state kidnapping, cease.

Yes, naturally, we have our critics. Some say we are too stern and unbending in our demands.

But we look back to the year 1961 when Amnesty International was launched by a British lawyer named Peter Benenson, who published a newspaper appeal entitled: "The Forgotten Prisoners."

This resulted in individuals in many countries offering to support the idea for an international campaign to protect human rights.

And today? We are spreading the word faster and farther than ever. We have fax machines. We have satellite communications. We have e-mail and the World Wide Web.

We have 1.1 million members in 162 countries and territories, including more than 80,000 Urgent Action Network volunteers in over 80 countries who are ready to go into action hundreds of times a year with letters, telegrams and phone calls appealing for justice and mercy.

And as a result, thousands of prisoners have been freed. Torture chambers have been closed, and executions have been stopped.

We deeply believe that: "The free must remember the forgotten."

However, in spite of our growth and our effectiveness, torture and political imprisonment and "disappearances" go on -- seemingly at an accelerated rate.

And our Urgent Action Network and other programs cannot keep up with demands. This is our dilemma.

This is why I am writing you today, in the hope that you will sign your name to the enclosed card so it can be forwarded to a prisoner of conscience or others who need your help. If you prefer not to sign the card, I will understand.

But I trust you will still support our lifesaving mission ...

You see what happened here was the result of Amnesty's extraordinary programs, such as the Urgent Action Network.

In the case of Constantino, we received reliable information, verified by our researchers. The facts were fed into our massive network. And then, volunteers responded by sending urgent appeals, telegrams and telex letters to those responsible for detaining Constantino.

Our Urgent Action Network strips away the mask of secrecy that many governments hide behind.

We force them to ask the burning question: "Is this particular prisoner worth all of this negative publicity?"

Or: "Can we afford to further damage our domestic and international image?"

Sometimes prisoners do not know we are working on their behalf. Yet it can make a difference. Christine Anyanwu, a journalist long-imprisoned in Nigeria for reporting views in opposition to the ruling party, wrote to us upon her release:

"It has indeed been most reassuring to know that someone cares enough to hold one in his thoughts even for a second. I thank those friends who, undeterred by my silence, have continued to send messages of encouragement: 'We know you are there,' 'Hold on!', 'Stay strong.' Kindly convey my profound appreciation to the Amnesty International U.S. branch for its hard work and great effectiveness."

A short message can give prisoners the needed courage to survive during the remaining days of their torture, because they know that they are not alone and that their captors are under pressure to release them.

Regrettably, other prisoners are not as fortunate.

Some die from torture, mistreatment or execution. But when that happens, we do everything possible to get the facts of that story told to the world.

The guilty must not have anywhere to hide!

We've exposed the shocking truth about the gouging out of a child's eyes in front of his or her parents, or mock execution by firing squad, or being buried alive, or spending weeks blindfolded and isolated and then the blindfold being removed and the prisoner forced to watch a family member being raped.

And we expose acts of torture, such as the case of one woman prisoner, who was taunted by the guards, saying, "We are God in here," ... while they applied electrical shocks to her body as she lay handcuffed to the springs of a metal bed.

Thank goodness many of us do not have to fear the kinds of atrocities described above, although serious violations do happen right here in the U.S.

But if you lived in certain other parts of the world ... your life might be far different, especially if you were a person who exercised the voice of your conscience and opposed an immoral and repressive government.

Frankly, I'm sure that you yourself have a strong sense of right and wrong. And even though an injustice thousands of miles away from your home

And, as a member of Amnesty, you will receive our informative quarterly newsletter, Amnesty Action.

Some of the stories you will read in this publication may shock you. Some stories will make you feel outrage. Some will break your heart. And some will give you a feeling of intense satisfaction.

You will realize that you are doing your share to help us stand up and fight back against those ruthless powers that throw people in jail, torture them and execute them for "crimes" such as simply criticizing the government.

Unfortunately, basic human rights are still being violated right now ... this very day. So it is up to you to remember that important changes in the world often hinge on the actions of ordinary people. And Amnesty International is made up of ordinary people from across the political spectrum working with extraordinary levels of courage and commitment. Many display the detail I've enclosed for you.

You can share in this movement. I hope that you will.

- In 1994, a “Hope Card” was added—a little card that contains the following message in five languages:

Do not be discouraged. You are not forgotten.

The point of this card is described in the P.S. of the letter:

P.S. Please let me repeat just two things.

First, if you’ll sign your name to the enclosed “Message of Hope” card, I’ll do my best to see that it gets to a prisoner of conscience who is being tortured, or detained, or possibly facing death.

(And even if the card never actually reaches the prisoner, when the jailers or those responsible are deluged with a flood of these cards, they are going to realize they are no longer operating in secret. The word is out. Their prisoner is in the public eye. This could result in freedom or better conditions for the prisoner.)

The inclusion of the card had an immediate and dramatic effect on response; it serves as what the late Walter Weintz called a “hot potato” (e.g., a token, a penny or a dime, a freemium—any kind of device that the person has to think twice about before throwing away).

According to Rooney, the mailing also contained personalized return labels, but it was found that these donors did not renew as well; after doing the math, they were discontinued. Amnesty International now can mail more pieces for less money and get higher quality donors.

The order card is printed in red and black and has boxes with suggested amounts from \$10 to \$500, with a box at the end for “Other \$_____.” On the mailings we have seen the \$25 amount was circled and beneath it in handwriting that has been highlighted with a yellow marker is the line:

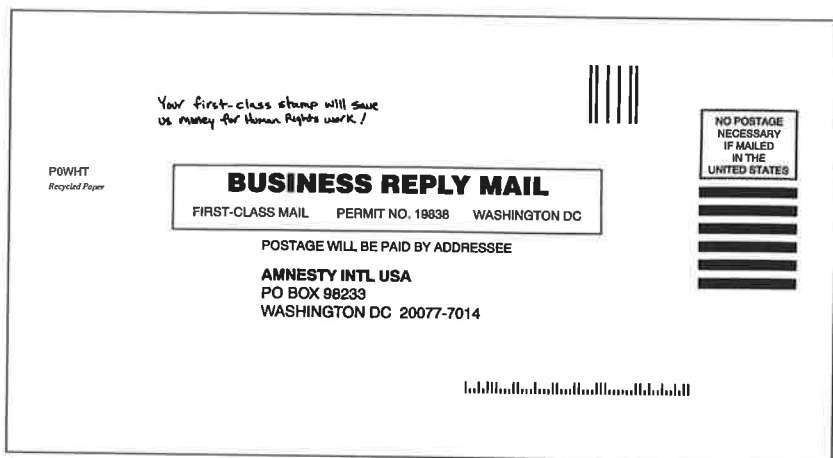
A GIFT IN THIS AMOUNT IS URGENTLY NEEDED!

On the back of the form is the option to charge your gift to a credit card and a ton of moustype describing how to get the latest financial report. Normally, moustype in a mailing is off-putting—as in, for example, the myriad of disclaimers on credit card offers and insurance efforts. Here, on the other hand, Amnesty International is flat out telling the prospective donor that it is registered with the attorneys general in many, many states, thus giving the entire proposition great legitimacy.

This double-barreled assault of guilt and urgency is gloriously effective. After 15 years, the mailing averages a one percent response with an average gift of \$27 to \$28.

Obviously, this is an acquisition mailing; you can’t continue to send existing donors this same package over and over again and have it be believable. Craver Mathews Smith tested seven packages against it last year and all came up short.

Clearly, this is a powerhouse.



The plain black-and-white Business Reply envelope uses a fairly common device in the fund raising arena. It asks that the respondent put a First Class stamp on the envelope so Amnesty International won’t have to pay the return postage.

The tiny print in the middle left reads:

POWHT
Recycled Paper

Before rolling out with this, it should be tested. Calling attention to recycled paper may seem like a good idea, but this is an extraneous thought that might interrupt the flow and get in the way of the ordering (giving) process.

Direct Mail and the Internet

I once worked for a cherubic-faced, hard-drinking publisher named Franklin Watts. "Good morning," Frank," I would say each day. "How are you?"

"Happy as a country without a history."

How long ago was it that the Internet was without a history and considered the new Garden of Eden—a paradise of investor and intellectual euphoria unmatched in the entire spectrum of human endeavor? Less than eight months.

Remember the thinking of those heady times?

***Direct marketers would no longer have to spend \$500/M on mail and catalogs because reaching people on the Internet is basically free.**

If true, please explain what a major list broker told me at the American List Counsel lunch in New York this past May—that fully 10 percent of her business was from dot-com companies using the mail to promote Web site traffic. I just received my first curiously-targeted print catalog from a Web site, PetFoodDirect.com, mailed to subscribers of *The New Yorker* (whose file does not reveal whether or not animals reside in my household).

***What's more, all who surfed the Internet could be individually tracked as to their interests and then hit with precisely-targeted advertisements and offers.**

In the words of Republican pollster Neil Newhouse, among consumers, the fear of privacy invasion "tests off the charts." Writing in *The Wall Street Journal*, Andrea Petersen described DoubleClick—the Net's premier Internet snoop—as "going from dot-com darling with an inside track on e-commerce to an Internet-pariah." But perhaps Thomas L. Friedman, writing on the Op-Ed page of *The New York Times*, said it best: "I believe in the possibilities of the new technologies as much as anyone. But it seems that while we started by surfing the Web, the Web is now surfing us."

***These offers will be so precisely targeted that direct marketing response rates will go through the roof.**

From Amazon.com, this 6" x 9 1/2" fold out self-mailer offering a DVD player and other electronics. The inside side panels have green backgrounds, the center is purple. The headline on the inside about "Plan B" is meaningless—Amazon is talking to itself. The entire presentation is without drama, without excitement. This is an analytical, rational approach—contrary to everything we have tested and learned about powerful direct mail.

According to a study by the Poynter Institute and Stanford University, Web users look at only 45 percent of banner ads—the main source of revenue for as many as 7,000 Web sites. What's more, they spend an average of just one second on each banner ad, with click-through rates somewhere between two- and three-tenths of a percent. (Remember, click-through means eyeballs only, not revenue. In the words of Agora's Bill Bonner, "The only bank that takes eyeballs is the eye bank.")

During the go-go months when the Internet was flying high, the kids who were starting Web-based businesses—collecting obscene amounts of money from venture capitalists—did not want to talk to the old-time direct marketing people. This was a new business model and prospects and customers were marketed and serviced in new ways.

Suddenly, when the entire Internet model imploded and the NASDAQ fell by 50 percent, some of the brighter kids came around to talk to us and discovered that the old marketing rules applied—the stuff we learned over the last half century.

The Internet—Another Marketing Channel

With very few exceptions, no one is going to make money creating a business entirely based on a piece of glass.

One exception: America Online. It has 25 million subscribers who pay \$20 a month—automatically charged to a credit card. That's a base revenue of \$50 million a month or \$600 million a year. And that's before it sells anything and everything to its subscribers. AOL's basic business buys nothing, sells nothing, warehouses nothing, ships nothing, and takes in no returns.

Other Internet models that could possibly make it: eBay™ and other auction sites and stock trading services. For all others, it is imperative to get the consumer to visit the Web site *on a regular basis and send money.*

But if you are selling goods, you need to generate orders, maintain inventory, and have the ability to ship right products to the right person in a timely manner. That's what catalogers have been doing for years. Unfortunately, for the holiday season of 1999, many e-retailers took a lot of orders and left a lot of unhappy customers standing on their front stoops on December 24th looking for orders that never arrived.

The kids created hot Web sites; all that was needed was some adult supervision.

Using Direct Mail to Drive People to a Web Site

Not only did the dot-com kids not understand the business of marketing, they did not understand the use of direct mail.

Quite simply, they break all the rules.

Below, and on the following page is a group of randomly selected dot-com mailings designed to drive prospects to a Web site. Many are self-mailers; a few go with envelopes. They use sans serif type fonts in body copy (universally regarded as the most difficult to read)—often reversed out against colored or busy backgrounds (making them even tougher to read). Other rule breakers: small headlines, garbled messages.

A Sampling of Dot-Comedy Direct Mail

At right are only the cover panels of these self-mailers. Trust me, it doesn't get any better when you open them up.

British advertising is rife with puns, double entendres, and generally clever, clever headlines and copy.

In the words of Nigel Rowe of Lavery Rowe, the largest off-the-page advertising firm in the UK, "Cute and clever doesn't sell."

The Textbook Model for Dot-Com Mail

The secret of successful direct mail is to put yourself inside the head and under the skin of the person you are writing to—think how he thinks, feel what she feels and become the person.

What follows is common sense and, as of this writing, little used.

Here are two scenarios:

Scenario 1: You have a computer; you are connected to the Internet. You receive a mailing urging you to visit a Web site, but you are not presently online. Unlike a traditional mailing, you cannot take action now. You lay the mailing down and soon thereafter it is covered with the sports pages and the entire thing goes into the recycling bin.

Scenario 2: Same as Scenario 1 except the mailing has a bright yellow sticky note attached which says: "If you are not online at the moment, stick me to your computer screen and when you are booted up, visit me at www.BeThere.com. I guarantee you'll be delighted!" This becomes a "hot potato," an action device.

A Guide for Internet Success

In my opinion, marketers can make profits on the Internet. The first step is to recognize four disadvantages.

1. *Unlike traditional marketing where the sales person controls the direction and pace of the sale, the **prospect and customer are in total control**—and a mouse click away from oblivion.*
2. *Your Web site is situated **in the arm pit of the world**, a venue akin to Times Square in the 1950s, with girl shows on one side of you and Hugo's Trained Flea Circus on the other.*
3. *Unlike telemarketing—where a wrong number is a bit of an embarrassment—a **mis-entered URL** can lead even the most well-intentioned prospect or customer off on a journey of discovery and zero business for you.*
4. *Given the terrible publicity about hackers, cyberthieves, privacy invaders and scam artists, your prospects and customers **will not have the same immediate trust or sense of safety** as they do in Home Depot, Circuit City, or a local supermarket. For this reason, Net marketers are losing a lot of business.*
5. *The entire point of your Web site is to **get yourself bookmarked** by prospects and customers; everything else is secondary. No bookmarks, no regular return visits.*
6. *With a Web site, you are always open for business. **People expect instant gratification**. Finalize an order with Amazon.com and you receive an immediate confirmation via e-mail. This is the current model. Order fulfillment must also be quick and flawless. According to a study in the U.K., 77 percent of companies fail to respond to an e-mail inquiry with 24 hours; 33 percent of companies fail to respond at all. If these statistics are even remotely akin to yours, you have no business being on the Web.*

7. The Internet must be treated as **one of many marketing channels**—along with direct mail, space advertising, broadcast, retail, telemarketing. Remember, most dot-coms that hit the skids were trying to do business entirely on a piece of glass in the homes and offices of fickle, easily distracted prospects and customers. That model works for AOL, Yahoo, and maybe eBay™ and E*Trade, but not many others.

8. In order to lure people back often, it is imperative that your Web site be **updated weekly—if not daily**—with interesting, useful material.

9. **You cannot be all things to all people.** Niche Internet marketers will find and service niche clients profitably. Example: My friend Barry Rose in England has a nifty little Web business selling fully restored vintage fountain pens to collectors (www.Writetime.co.us). Jeff Buzzes' Amazon.com keeps adding new categories and continues to burn through more and more money.

10. "Your job is to sell," says freelancer Jack Mason, "**not entertain.**" This was recently echoed by developer Willard Rouse (Baltimore's Inner Harbor and Phenol Hall in Boston). "The concept of building it and they will come is a lot of crap," said Rouse in the New Yorker. "Build it, sell the hell out it, and they will come."

11. Look at the selling on the Web as direct mail on glass and **apply the old tried and true marketing proven rules**, a number of which follow.

12. More than half our buying decisions are **based on emotion.**

—Jack Mason

13. When emotion and reason come into conflict, **emotion wins every time.**

—John J. Flieder

14. Make it as **easy as possible for the customer to order.**"

—Elsworth Howell

15. If you want to dramatically increase your response, dramatically

improve your offer.

—Axel Andersson

16. **You cannot bore people** into buying anything. —David Ogilvy

17. The seven key copy drivers—hot buttons—that change human behavior are: **fear, greed, guilt, anger, exclusivity, salvation, and flattery.**

If your copy isn't positively dripping with one or more of these, tear it up

and start over.

—Bob Hacker

18. The 13 most powerful and evocative words in the English language are:

you - save - money - easy - proven - guarantee - health -

love - new - results - discovery - safety - free

Use them unsparingly.

19. The Internet is the only print medium that allows you to **test in real time** (and far more cheaply than mail, phone, or broadcast), giving you readable results in as little as a few minutes. Take advantage of this.

20. Make sure **what the prospect first sees** on your Web site directly relates to the message and the medium that brought the person there. In other words, don't make a specific promise in direct mail or space and then fulfill with your basic, self-congratulatory home page aimed at everybody; this will result in a mental disconnect.

21. *The prospect doesn't give a damn about you, your product, or your company. All that matters is, "What's in it for me?"* —Bob Hacker

Now, About E-Mail . . .

A few days after returning from the Direct Marketing Association Conference in New Orleans, I received the following e-mail:

DAM participants,

We would like to thank you all again for taking the time to stop by our booth at the DAM show in New Orleans. It was a pleasure meeting each one of you, and we look forward to speaking with you again. We plan on attending the December 3–5 show in Orlando, Florida, and would encourage each of you to stop by to say hello.

Our firm is making a commitment to bring investment capital to the direct marketing industry. [Company Name] has assembled a team made up of industry insiders and Wall Street professionals. The team's combined strength has the expertise to raise equity for both public and private companies, write institutional research reports, advise on mergers and acquisitions, and provide market making for publicly traded companies.

Thank you again for your time, and we look forward to meeting each one of you again.

The letter was signed by the three principals of the organization. Nice to be remembered. Or is it?

What followed this message was a blizzard of mousetype that included the names and e-mail addresses of everyone who stopped by that booth and gave a business card—some 44 people who received this identical message.

Suddenly my nose was rubbed in the fact that this was not a personal message, but rather a mass mailing. To this "team made up of industry insiders and Wall Street professionals," I was just one more blip on their networking database, along with 43 others, some of whom are friends of mine, some of whom are major players in the industry. And all of us—whether we liked it or not—were having our e-mail addresses shoved up one another's computers.

So much for private conversations at a convention booth.

Being a political junkie, I was fascinated to hear the same thing happened to Hillary Rodham Clinton—that some nitwit at her New York Senatorial campaign HQ sent an e-mail to her entire list and included the entire e-mail address list. Did that include Lincoln bedroom sleepovers at Motel 1600? The media had a field day!

Advice from a rule junkie :

When Don Jackson and I assembled the rules and advice from more than 100 direct marketers and created *2,239 Tested Secrets for Direct Marketing Success*, e-mail was too new for any secrets (rules) to exist. Okay, here are four common-sense rules for e-mailers based on my personal experience:

1. *If you want e-mail to "appear" personal, don't include a list of all the others it was sent to. That's the equivalent of putting at the bottom of a direct*

mail control letter, "cc: 2.2 million others just like you." You have just blown the "willing suspension of disbelief."

2. When composing sensitive e-mail, think about using a blank word processing page. When finished—and you are satisfied that it is just right—then, and only then, paste it onto your e-mail and send it. Why? Because with the slip of a mouse, you can send a half-finished e-mail and it's gone in a wink. And you might have spelled "miserable" with two z's and "skunk" with two k's whereupon it's too late to soften to the message.

3. How secure is your e-mail address book? I do not have one. I don't believe a hacker or virus maker can come into my computer and send a naughty note to all my e-mail addresses because they are stored individually in my addressing system and nowhere near my Internet access. When I send e-mail, I paste addresses in one-by-one. I never send out mass e-mailings. It's too easy to screw up and look like a jerk to everyone on the list.

4. Don't bog down the eye with long sentences and long paragraphs. The KISS formula applies: "Keep It Simple, Stupid." Remember, you are a click away from oblivion.

AOL and the Genius of Janice Brandt

Check out the Sol Blumenfeld mailing for CompuServe on pages 308–309. This was a traditional effort, created before floppy disks became so cheap that they could be included in a mailing and be cost effective.

Enclose a floppy, and you have a very effective “hot potato”—an item of value that the prospect thinks twice about before throwing away.

Whereupon two things happened simultaneously:

1. CD-ROMs dropped in price so that mailing them became cost effective.
2. Virtually every new desktop computer sold in the US was equipped with a CD-ROM drive.

Enter the CD-ROM mailing.

The 6" x 7" CompuServe effort at right, with bright yellow background and red type, represented a powerful piece of mail—a strong offer and the inclusion of CD-ROM. Simply insert the CD-ROM into your drive, click on right icons, and you are connected to CompuServe.

Enter Janice Brandt at AOL, one of the most brilliant direct marketers in the world. Why offer a free month? Brandt figured, when you can offer 50 hours free.

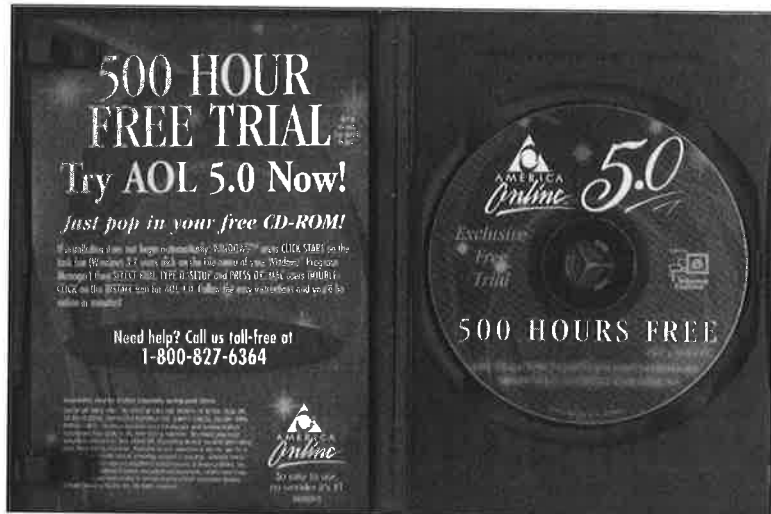
- Or 100 hours?
- Or 500 hours?

The theory: once a person has gone to all the trouble of setting up an AOL account and getting used to the system, a subscription will follow.

Here's an outstanding example of Axel Andersson's dictum: "If you want to dramatically increase your response, dramatically improve your offer."

The little self-mailer at middle right is one version in screaming red, yellow and black, with design rather like an Andy Warhol soap carton. The elegant effort below is a plastic CD-ROM case that gives the impression of real value.

Under Jan Brandt's guidance, AOL acquired 25 million members who pay \$20 a month. Bravo!



Jayne-Ratalahti

Freelance Creative Team of the Century

If any organization put a stamp on modern direct mail, it was not the U.S. Postal Service. Rather it was a two-man creative team that has recently retired—Pittsburgh-born freelance copywriter Bill Jayme and his Finnish partner, designer Heikki Ratalahti. In a four-decade partnership, their stylish direct mail solicitations launched some three dozen magazines including *New York*, *Smithsonian*, *Bon Appetit*, *Food & Wine*, *Cooking Light*, *Air & Space*, *Louis Rukeyser's Wall Street*, *Worth*, *Saver*, *Tufts Nutrition Letter*, *Mother Jones*, and the *Harvard Medical School Health Letter*. In their heyday, Jayme-Ratalahti would have a five-month queue of publishers and circulation managers, hats in hand, ready to pony up \$20,000 to \$40,000 for a single direct mail package—not bad for two weeks work, but well worth it when the launch mailing brings in so many subscribers that investors will eagerly pop for \$5-10 million or more to start the magazine.

The Beginnings

In the late 1940s, Bill Jayme ran out of money during his senior year at Princeton and moved to New York where he became a messenger at Young & Rubicam, a major Madison Avenue advertising agency. On the side, he wrote for television and had a drama produced on the old *Studio One*. When he applied for a job at Time-Life, no editorial positions were available, but the legendary Frank Johnson offered him a job in circulation. More than once over the years, Johnson complained how he hates being famous for the so-called “Johnson Box”—that headline at the top of a direct mail letter, usually surrounded by a rectangle of asterisks; in fact, Johnson doesn't believe he invented it. He would much rather be remembered for the giant 17" x 22" circulars that he created for Time-Life and, later, *American Heritage*—those splendidly gaudy bedsheets that kept on unfolding until they dominated everything in the room.

The “Cool Friday” Letter

Dear Reader:

It was a cool Friday in November.

Plymouth offered their newest model for \$510—in an ad that also reminded you that you could tune in on Major Bowes' Original Amateur Hour any Thursday from 9 to 10.

Loyalists and Rebels were fighting in the outskirts of Madrid—while many U.S. citizens were preparing to celebrate two Thanksgivings. Alfred Lunt and Lynn Fontanne were at the Shubert, ambling through “Idiot's Delight”—and a few doors down the street, a pillow-padded Helen Hayes was appearing as “Victoria Regina.”

The WPA was dropping 3000 “non-essential” workers—and the Post Office began assigning the first social security numbers to 26 million applicants. The football season was almost over, with Pittsburgh, Fordham, and Dartmouth named the leading teams in the East—while a Princeton sophomore reported that he had bid and made

Jayme's first assignment from Johnson was a subscription acquisition effort for *Life* magazine, then celebrating its 15th anniversary. What came off Jayme's typewriter became known as the "Cool Friday" letter that broke all the previously accepted rules of direct mail. First off, Jayme never got around to the offer nor why he was writing until the 16th paragraph at the bottom of page 2 ("And today we are inviting you to join them as a regular LIFE reader at a very special introductory rate . . ."). What's more, the price was not mentioned until nine paragraphs later on page 3—the last page of the letter. It was old-fashioned narrative rather than a sales pitch that flowed from Jayme's Remington manual typewriter, a letter filled with evocative images and nostalgia and written with such elegance and grace that readers were not only hooked immediately, but enough of them stayed through to the end and took the requested action (Take nine months of LIFE for just \$3.99 and send no money now). It was control for years.

Bill Jayme did not need CHAID nor regression analysis nor focus groups to define his universe. Rather he was intuitively able to visualize the person he was writing to and create an intimate, seemingly private letter that was so powerful it magically persuaded a person to respond. Here's how freelancer Harry Walsh described the direct mail letter:

"Even though it may go to millions of people, it never orates to a crowd but rather murmurs into a single ear. It's a message from one letter writer to one letter reader."

Moving On

CBS heard about Jayme's work at Time-Life and offered him more money. At CBS he became copy chief in the advertising promotion department. At the time, CBS had won all the radio ratings and Jayme, on the first day of the job, pitched a no-hitter with an ad that depicted a radio with only a knob for volume. The headline: "The day they threw the knob away," the idea being that CBS was the only network worth listening to.

After three years at CBS, Jayme became an advertising copywriter for McCann-Erickson and hated the company, the products, and the people. So he went to Europe for a year and "returned destitute" in 1950. It was Frank Johnson who suggested he become a freelancer. "What's that?" Jayme asked. After Johnson explained, Jayme moved into the Players, a magnificent 19th-Century townhouse on Gramercy Park that had been the home of the great actor Edwin Booth (brother of the notorious John Wilkes Booth) before being turned into a private club for actors and "men of the theater."

Jayme immediately landed a ton of work from magazine consultant Dick Benson and his partner, Chris Stag, as well as garnering assignments from Frank Johnson for James Parton's *Horizon*, sister publication to his ground breaking *American Heritage*.

a redoubled grand slam with 13 spades.

And some 200,000 Americans (including you, perhaps?) were eagerly opening the first issue of a new magazine—a magazine of pictures, datelined November 23, 1936.

Its publishers had promised to produce a magazine that would help Americans

"to see life . . . to see the world . . . to eyewitness great events . . . to watch the faces of the poor and the gestures of the proud . . . to see strange things—machines, armies, multitudes, shadows in the jungle and on the moon . . ."

• • •

In the fifteen years since then, the world LIFE promised to picture each week has moved ahead, and sometimes back . . .

Hollywood lost Leslie Howard, Douglas Fairbanks Sr., Jean Harlow, W. C. Field, Carole Lombard—but it too has gained: Anne Baxter, Danny Kaye, Montgomery Clift, Jennifer Jones. We pay silent tribute to Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig—and we cheer for Joe DiMaggio and Jackie Robinson.

We have survived such astonishing phenomena as Wallis Warfield Simpson, goldfish swallowing, flying saucers, Orson Welles' inva-

Until 1962, Jayme was forced to hand off his copy to any of a half-dozen designers who specialized in direct mail. "Here," the writer would say, "do something with this."

The result was that designers—who knew art but not human psychology—would turn out packages so pristine and tidy that the prospect would glaze over with boredom or so garish that the term "junk mail" was coined to describe them. Back in the 1950s, direct mail writers and designers seldom talked to one another.

Jayme-Ratalahti

In 1962, Jayme met Heikki Ratalahti whose family owned bookstores in Finland and persuaded their American counterparts at Doubleday to hire their son to learn publishing. Ratalahti's first job was working as a sales clerk at the Doubleday flagship bookstore on Fifth Avenue and 52nd Street where he immediately distinguished himself by catching a shoplifter. At 5:30 in the afternoon he noted the crime and called the NYPD who dispatched two traffic cops to make the arrest. Fifteen minutes later he and the perpetrator were driven way downtown to 100 Center Street where the thief was found guilty by a night court judge and fined on the spot. Justice was deliciously swift, sure, and sweet in those days.

Bill Jayme (pronounced Jamie) teamed up with Heikki (sounds like flaky) Ratalahti and together they transformed the medium, doing for direct mail what Raymond Loewy, Norman Bel Geddes, and Eero Saarinen were doing for American industrial design. One of their earliest assignments was to help launch *New York*, formerly the Sunday magazine section of Jock Whitney's *Herald Tribune* which Clay Felker and celebrated designer Milton Glaser rescued after the *Trib* folded. Jayme's radical idea: a sweepstakes. Felker went ballistic. "You are not launching any magazine of mine with a sweepstakes," the publisher snarled. Glaser immediately echoed Felker's sentiments. "Ah," said Jayme, "this will not be your typical sweepstakes—not a Winnebago stuffed with thousand-dollar bills. Rather, the grand prize will be a private dinner at Gracie Mansion where you can tell Mayor John Lindsay how you would run the city of New York. Other prizes included attending a Broadway opening with theater critic Harold Clurman, a pub crawl with Jimmy Breslin, a fashion show with the reigning doyenne of chic, Eugenia Sheppard, and a Central Park bench named for you in the grand tradition of Bernard Baruch. Oh, yes, and a loser's prize was a one-way ticket to Los Angeles."

The package worked and was mailed—with variations and updates—for years. And working with Felker made Jayme-Ratalahti fall in love with the business of launching magazines. Jayme:

Our typical client was a 28-year-old entrepreneur who didn't know what he wanted to do in life. The magazine business sounded intriguing, so he tried the idea out on his rich father-in-law who gave him \$300,000 for a test. At that point he came to

sion from Mars, C-rations, ankle-length hemlines and waist-length necklines, the Big Apple, bebop, "Gone With the Wind," Pyramid Clubs, the Kinsey Report, Dagmar.

And we have come through real disaster: A World War that sucked up over a million lives, and a dirty game of see-saw in a far-away land called Korea.

Jayne-Ratalahti. "What's the magazine about—what's the subject matter?" I would ask. He would reply, "Um, I think it should be . . . about food. Food magazines seem to do okay." "What's the title?" I would ask. "You guys make it up," was the reply. And why not? This was my constituency. I knew what they wanted. I knew how to make them respond to me.

The result was invariably a magazine Jayme and Ratalahti would like to read themselves. "I was writing to myself," Jayme said. "It was all very inbred." In a feature article on Jayme-Ratalahti, "Junk Mail's Top Dogs," in *The New York Times Magazine*, Randall Rothenberg wrote:

Owen J. Lipstein recalls traveling to see Jayme and Ratalahti in 1982 with \$150,000 and an idea for a health magazine. In about 30 seconds he told them its name, *American Health*, and explained that existing health magazines "worshiped death" while this one would be "life worshipping."

"Of course," said Jayme, agreeing immediately to write a test letter. "People want to live forever. Let's go to lunch."

Lipstein pulled out a sheaf of notes. "Don't you want to hear any of my story ideas?" he asked.

"I'll make them up," said Jayme.

Clay Felker said it took a full year to turn *New York* into the magazine he originally wanted after Jayme-Ratalahti had set the tone and style and decreed what articles readers could look forward to.

The Secret of the Jayme-Ratalahti Technique

Jayne-Ratalahti threw out the old model in which copy was written first and design came later—almost as an afterthought. Rather they conceptualized the package from outer envelope all the way through to the order device—the look, the feel, the sound of each element and how it worked to enhance the whole and sell the product.

Normally they started with two of the basic elements of a direct mail package: The carrier envelope (which is what the prospect first sees) and the order form (which crystallized in their minds exactly what the deal was).

The Outer Envelope

Sometimes they went with a #10 and once in a while a 9" x 12". But their hallmark was the 6" x 9" with a "FREE" token showing through its own round window. The show-through token gave them the added advantage of another color on the outer envelope without having to pay for a bigger, more sophisticated printing press. Whatever the size, a Jayme-Ratalahti envelope was always a grabber—a delicious teaser that got the envelope opened, whereupon the letter picked up on the theme. Examples:

*For McGraw-Hill's *Business Week*, a four-letter word in giant type dominated the envelope:

DAMN!

China Sea? The pomp and pageantry of Princess Margaret's wedding in time-hallowed Westminster Abbey? The famous Eisenhower grin—as Ike accepts the presidential nomination in Chicago?

Will you see the deserts of the west turn into flowering gardens and scientists perfect new ways of rain-making? . . . three-dimensional features that will lure us back to the movies, away from our TV screen? . . . fashions that will give American women the look of Greek goddesses, or Quaker misses, or harem favorites?

What dramatic fires—what heroic rescues at sea—what strange lands, customs, and costumes—what newly unearthed art treasures—what miracles of laboratory and workshop will the coming weeks and months bring to LIFE's pages, and into your life?

• • •

Nobody knows the answers to these questions now—but you can be sure of this: the issues of LIFE ahead will bring you a living record of an era which promises to be as unforgettable as any the world has ever known.

The mailing was a success and on its way to becoming a solid control when a priggish golfer at the local country club yelled over to Harold McGraw on the adjoining tee, "Hey, Harold, how come you are using profanity in your mail?" McGraw wimped out and killed it.

*For *Psychology Today*, the envelope teaser read:

Do you close the bathroom door even
when you're the only one home?

*Jayme and his client, Martin Edelston of *Boardroom Reports*, carried on a spirited and constant stream of private correspondence. Concerned that his letters would not get through the corporate filters to reach Marty, Jayme put on one envelope:

Deeply and Irrevocably Personal

Edelston was so amused he put it up on the corporate bulletin board. Shortly thereafter the line found its way onto a *Bottom Line/Personal* promotional envelope and was control for 15 years. Edelston paid Jayme a handsome bonus.

*For *Earthwatch*, The Jayme-Ratalahti envelope read:

Got some free time?

A week? A month? A summer?
Come volunteer for
a conservation project in the wilds.
an environmental study in the tropics.
an archaeological dig abroad.

Or, if you're busy now,

cheer us on from the sidelines.

INVITATION TO EARTHWATCH

JAYME:

Your outer envelope is where your prospect decides to stop, look and listen. It's the come-on—the headline on the ad, the cover of the catalog, the dust jacket on the book, the display window outside the store . . .

The same holds true for the business arena as well. Any competent secretary can recognize bulk mail. The secret to overcoming the "secretary barrier" is to create an envelope that looks interesting.

the home or office—which makes direct mail unique. As Jayme has said, “Of all practical advertising media, only direct mail offers a sufficiently large canvas for telling a complex story.” And the linchpin of direct mail is the letter.

Today, you are seeing an increasing number of direct mail efforts that do not include a letter—double postcards . . . self-mailers . . . catalogs. . . clever mailers sealed on all four sides printed inline—none of which pack the emotional wallop of an old-fashioned letter, in corny typewriter type, signed by a real person. Oh, yes, sometimes these mavericks contain what could be called a letter—an abbreviated personal message, often printed in a Times-Roman font that conveys all the intimacy, wit, charm, and emotion of a *Harvard Business Review* article. Or, with the advent of sophisticated database marketing and computerization, many letters today attempt to make up for poor writing and lack of intimacy by the use of tricky computerized personalization.

Bill Jayme is a literate, urbane iconoclast with a wicked, raunchy sense of humor and an eclectic mind that can turn conventional wisdom on its ear. At one point, the direct marketing industry was having a minor mental breakdown over the widening use of the term, “junk mail.” Hot letters were being written to the media by hurt members of the profession. On the one hand, back when it had some style and class, the Direct Mail Advertising Association (now the DMA) hired Jayme-Ratalahti to create a spectacular mailing targeted to every member of Congress. The package included a brochure with a full-sized mailbox with the headline:

Anything beats an empty mailbox

When this brochure was opened, out fell a personalized envelope and letter to each legislator touting the benefits of direct mail advertising.

On the other hand, Jayme expressed his real feelings about junk mail in an interview I did with him for *Who’s Mailing What!* many years ago:

I don’t understand why the industry hates the term junk mail. I love it. After all, antique dealers love junk shops. Old car enthusiasts love junkyards. Until a few years ago, Wall Street loved junk bonds. Who among us doesn’t like to head for the beach with a pile of junk fiction? And what’s a Hong Kong fisherman without his junk? Junk is a wonderful word. Of course, in Heikki’s and my case, we spell it junque.

An Operatic Diversion

In the early 1960s, Jayme met composer Douglas Moore in Santa Fe and ran into him again in 1964 at the Century Club in New York. “What are you working on, Doug?” Jayme asked Moore, best known for his *Ballad of Baby Doe*, who went off on a long riff about the huge mistake he had made in accepting a commission from the University of Kansas to write an opera about a native Kansan. He had “gone through the grim, relentless history of Kansas” and

decided John Brown had been done to death. Alf Landon, one-time candidate for the vice presidency of the United States seemed hardly a worthy subject. That left Carry Nation, “a mean, nasty woman” who, against her father’s wishes, married a Civil War surgeon whose only escape from the horrors of war was not letting a cork remain too long in a bottle of whisky lest the content spoil. Forced to choose between the abusive drunk she married and her baby, she chose the latter and went on to become a radical temperance activist. Moore needed a libretto and Jayme volunteered. Keeping the bill collectors at bay with his junk mail, Jayme started attending the Metropolitan and New York City Operas to pick up pointers on the craft of writing for that *recherché* and forbiddingly expensive art form and spent a year on the libretto. When he handed the first act to the composer, Moore’s only comment was, “The word ‘throughout’ is impossible to sing. Remember, the words have to be projected 500 to 1,000 feet.” “I can change that,” Jayme said.

Carry Nation was produced at the University of Kansas in 1964 and, later, in San Francisco and at the New York City Opera where it was recorded. (It is not available on CD.) When Jayme was asked if he made money on the deal, Ratalahti jumped in and said, “Are you kidding? Bill chartered a private plane to take all his friends out to the opening night in Kansas, put them all up in hotels, wined and dined them. Make money on the opera? It cost him small fortune!”

The Move to San Francisco

In 1967, Jayme needed change, so he and Ratalahti opted for San Francisco. Paul Goldberg, then circulation director for *Consumer Reports*, went to his board of directors and was allotted \$1,500 a month to retain Jayme-Ratalahti. “They did everything—acquisition efforts, billing and renewal series, space ads, everything,” Goldberg says. “It was a steal.”

For Jayme-Ratalahti, the *Consumer Reports*’ retainer was a grubstake that kept them going until they built up a client base and a mythic reputation that persists to this day. Always a heavy smoker, Jayme found the hills and stairs of San Francisco unmanageable, so in 1967 he and Ratalahti moved to a spectacular house on five acres overlooking the vineyards of the Sonoma Valley. On a clear day they can see the towers of San Francisco 45 miles away. Visiting their Bart Road hideaway became a personal hadj for everybody who was anybody in direct marketing. In the words of Clay Felker: “Like pilgrims to the guru, we have to go up the mountain to see them.” Jayme-Ratalahti continued to produce packages for a vast network of clients—Jayme on an IBM electric and Ratalahti rendering, cutting, and pasting by hand even while everyone else migrated to the computer.

On his seventieth birthday four years ago, Bill Jayme covered his typewriter and stopped taking phone calls. Partly, he was tired. And partly he was beginning to feel like a commodity. He would ask someone in the business if he knew a copywriter named so-and-so. “Yeah, we used him once,” would invariably be the reply. The

warmth went out of the business. So Bill Jayme and Heikki Ratalahti went cold turkey.

He does not think highly of today's copywriters.

I'll tell you what really irks me. Few copywriters today seem to care. How many times have I heard a colleague say to me, 'I'd love to have another drink with you, but I have to knock out a package tonight.' My God, Heikki and I spent two weeks getting it right. I cared about every single word. Heikki knew every single line and every typeface.

When asked if he had any advice or rules for modern day copywriters, Jayme replied:

The only real rule I know for success in life, business, and even direct marketing is that there are no rules, including this one. If all worked on rules, there never would have been Shakespeare. I have spoken.

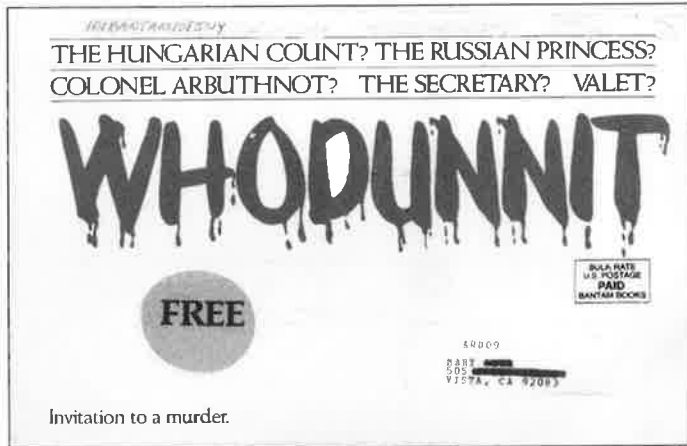

Appendix 1

Positioning

by Dennis S. LeBarron

Editor's Note: When taking on a new project or client, you have to learn everything you can about that business quickly before you can put your direct marketing know-how to work.

In the course of writing subscription promotion packages for dozens of newsletters, freelancer Don Hauptman found himself asking similar questions of new clients. As a result, he put together a questionnaire for the client to fill out in advance of their first meeting. The purpose: to save time . . . to get the client's input in writing . . . to be absolutely sure all bases are touched . . . and to have at hand answers to questions that might come up later when the client can't be reached.

This exercise is invaluable in two situations. The first is when a new product or service is being launched and, for the most part, exists only inside the head of one or two people. It gets clients thinking through "their baby" and putting those ideas into writing. The second is when the publisher or editor of a magazine gives you a very precise idea of what they think they are publishing; but when you read the past twelve issues, you find it to be something quite different. If the copy reflects what you believe the magazine to be about—as opposed to what they perceive it to be—there's a good chance the copy will be rejected. By getting their thoughts in writing in advance, this can all be thrashed out before you set fingers to keyboard.

Whereas Hauptman's pioneering questionnaire is slanted toward newsletters and publications, freelancer Denny LeBarron has adapted it to come up with an all-purpose questionnaire; it works for products, publications, and services . . . consumer or business. It should be extremely useful not only for writers, but also for account executives, consultants, and list brokers. In addition, if you are a mailer who uses outside creative help, take some time to fill this form out, and then give it to each new copywriter or agency you hire. You may photocopy the questionnaire and use it as is.

13. Who is the main PROSPECT? (In business, what's his or her title/responsibility? What are his biggest concerns, fears, attitudes, possible objections? How will he use your product to get ahead or to keep from falling behind? For consumers, what main interest/desire/fear does it appeal to?
Who are your SECONDARY PROSPECTS? Are there enough of them to versionalize the copy so the offer appeals more directly to them?)
14. What LISTS/MEDIA will you use? (What have you used in the past? What worked and what did not? What is the performance BY SOURCE?)
15. Do we have a SAMPLE of the product/service?
16. Do you have SAMPLES OF PREVIOUS PROMOTIONS? (Winners and losers?)
