- 7. Ensure the room is set up properly (i.e., tables and chairs are arranged to maximize interaction, projectors do not block participants' lines of sight, flip charts are convenient to you and visible to participants, etc.).
- 8. Test the equipment.

During the Training Event

- 1. Arrive early. Give yourself plenty of time to get organized.
- 2. Circulate the Attendance Sign-in Sheet and be sure all participants sign-in.
- 3. Start on time and stay on track. Keep exercises within their time limits. End discussions when they cease to be productive. Lead participants away from digressions and tangents and back to the lesson.
- 4. If there are activities in the training, mentor participants during the activities. Walk among groups in class as they work on their activities, and answer questions and offer guidance as appropriate. Ensure participants are on track as they work. Give constructive feedback during the presentations and discussions.
- 5. Review Questions: Review the content of each lesson throughout the course to reinforce the learning outcomes for that lesson and to connect to upcoming material. As a general rule, review or discussion questions should be asked every 6–8 slides. Avoid YES or NO questions; use open-ended questions to draw participants into the material. Make sure all questions directly relate to and support the learning outcomes.
- 6. Cover the ground rules quickly with the class prior to starting the presentation.
 - a. Participate fully
 - b. Share responsibility for learning
 - c. Listen when others talk
 - d. Respect the opinions and attitudes of others
 - e. Turn off cell phones
- 7. Lesson Outcomes: At the beginning of each lesson, review that lesson's outcomes. Make sure participants are fully aware of the topics to be addressed in the lesson. At the end of each lesson, review the outcomes once again using review questions or an activity/exercise to ensure the outcomes were met.

Chris Heller says:

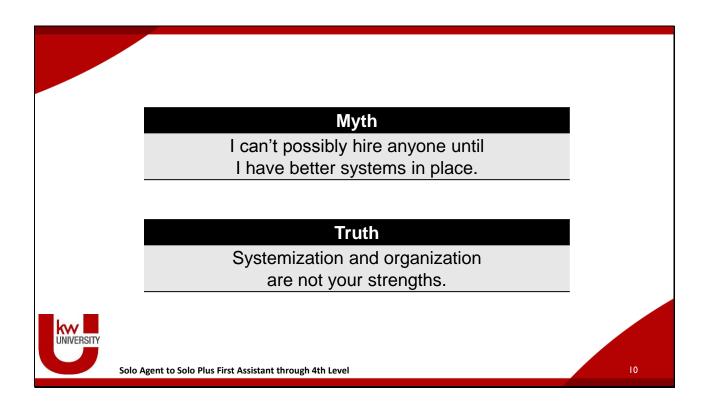
Consider a Doctor working solo.

Then the Doctor got an office and was able to do more business and help more people.

Then the Doctor hired a nurse and was able to do more business and help many people.

Then the Doctor hired a receptionist, then a lab tech, etc., and was able to do much more business and help many more people.

"If the Doctor was doing all of those tasks by herself, how effective would the Doctor be?" – Chris Heller, KW Worldwide



It has been noted, that generally, Salespeople are not particularly talented at creating and implementing systems.

Why not hire someone that has this strength?

Even the most successful salespeople have their weaknesses.

You do need to be aware of, and open about, your weaknesses. When you know where you'll need support, you can build your team accordingly. Don't hire people who are just like you. Instead, bring in people who complement your skills by excelling where you struggle. If you fail to do this, you'll end up spending a lot of your time working in your weak areas, experiencing a ton of stress in day-to-day operations as a result.

I. Economic Model Keys: - Know what numbers you must hit. - Focus on appointments. - Focus on conversions. Solo Agent to Solo Plus First Assistant through 4th Level

- Do you know what numbers you must hit and are you hitting them?
- Are you getting enough prequalified seller appointments?
- Are you improving your key conversion rates of lead-to-appointment and appointment-to-contract?

Z. Lead-Generation Model Keys: Prospect and market. Set up a database and systematically market to it. Focus on seller listings taken. Solo Agent to Solo Plus First Assistant through 4th Level

- Are you committed to prospecting and marketing, and are you generating enough leads? What is "enough" leads?
- Do you feed and touch your database regularly? Is your database being optimized?
- Are you focused on seller listings? What are you doing with your buyer leads?

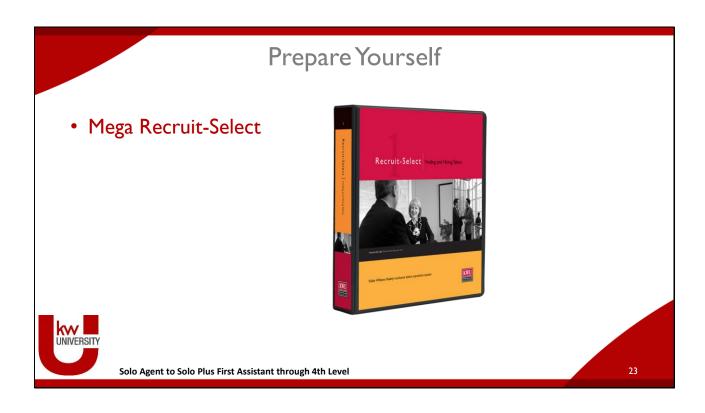

Discuss: Why Admin? Why not a Buyer Assistant first? Or, since listings are so important, why not another listing agent first?

- Salespeople aren't typically talented at creating and implementing systems, or identifying and employing the proper tools for your business.
- Hiring an administrator allows the agent to focus on more dollar-productive sales activities such as lead generation and listing appointments.



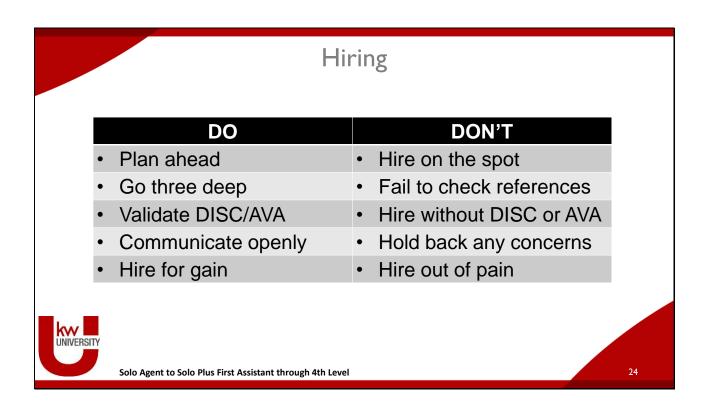
RSTLM is a must-have course in order to build a team in the best possible manner.

• Compensation Solo Agent to Solo Plus First Assistant through 4th Level

- ADMIN: Salary (S/C profile wants stability)
- Accordion-Style with bonuses if possible
- BUYER SPECIALIST:
- Commission of 25-50%.
- Most talented Buyer's Specialists appreciate the leadership, structure and support they get from the team.
- In general you will want to have some combination of base salary, performance bonuses, and/or per transaction fees. For an Admin, for instance, a \$20,000 base salary with production bonuses. Or for a Buyer Specialist perhaps a straight commission of 25-50%. Many rainmakers are training talented Buyer's Specialists that are happy to make a lower commission because of the good leads and systems they get from the team.

- Keeping <u>overhead</u> low.
- Creating a good pay situation for <u>talent</u>.

You cannot afford to be doing \$15/hour work!

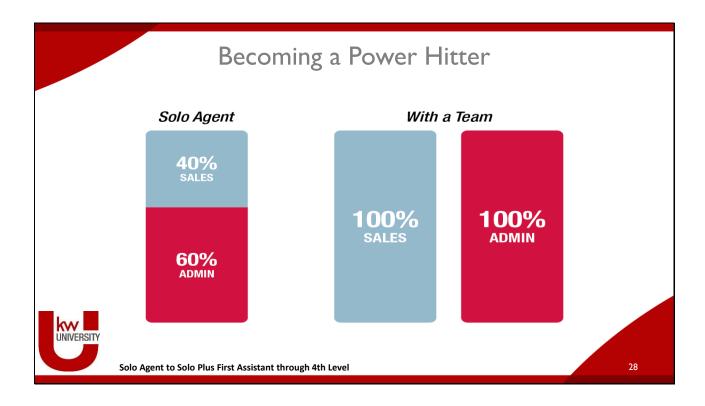

- The first diagram shows a typical solo agent's time.
- Research has shown an agent will spend:
- 40% of their time on INCOME PRODUCING ACTIVITY and 60% of their time on administrative duties.
- In a 40-hr week -- only 16 hrs/week on sales and marketing! Only 2 days of productivity.
- With a trained assistant you'll gain 24 more hours to devote to sales, marketing, and building business... that's 3 more days!
- What is your level of customer service when you are doing everything at capacity.. Doing everything yourself?

The results are improved customer service AND a 150% increase in sales time.

With three more days of sales per week, how much more would you sell?

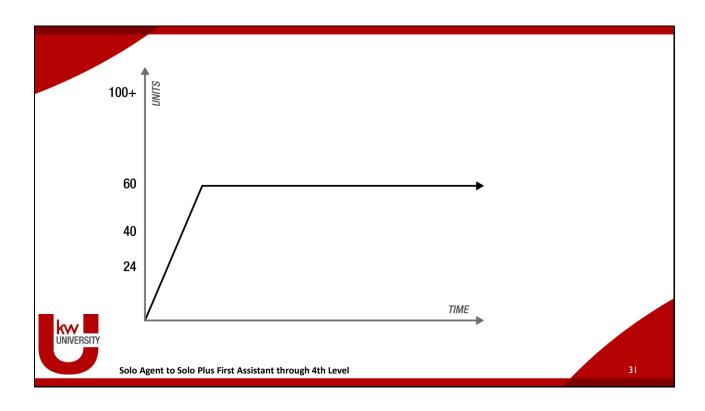

The left axis is number of closed units. The bottom axis is time.

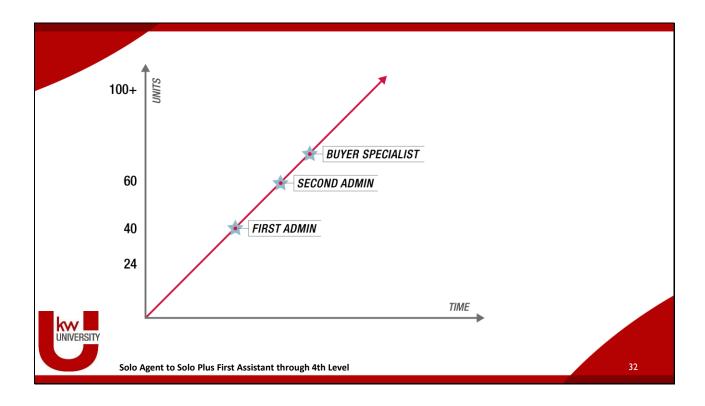
On the left axis you can see the range for triggering your first hire, 24-32 units.

The range is because some markets have more complicated contracts, multiple lenders, etc, so the agent's capacity varies. In those markets, 24 contracts would be as much work time as many more contracts in a simpler market.

In a market with simple contracts, 32-40 units would be more appropriate for triggering a first hire. 40 is the unit number MAPS Coaching recommends as the trigger for it's clients.

The black line represents a gung-ho agent that shot straight up to their personal capacity limits of production.

- They shot right past their trigger point for launching their team.
- They are too occupied to work on their business.
- They are at risk of burn-out.
- Their customer service is declining.



The Red line agent prepared to build a business as they grew and launched their team on target. They don't have the ceiling of achievement that the black line agent has. They have no ceiling of achievement at all if they continue to build their business according to their business plan. As they add their second admin and a Buyer Specialist or Showing Assistant the team can produce more than 100 units per year.

- They make much more money.
- They have a much better, specialized job.
- They are on a team of specialists.
- They have business profit not only pay.
- They have the stability of a business not just self-employment.
- Perhaps most importantly, their customer service is much stronger than the pressured black line agent.
- Their business grew when it was ready to grow.
- Remember this phrase: 'Don't hire out of pain. Hire for gain.'

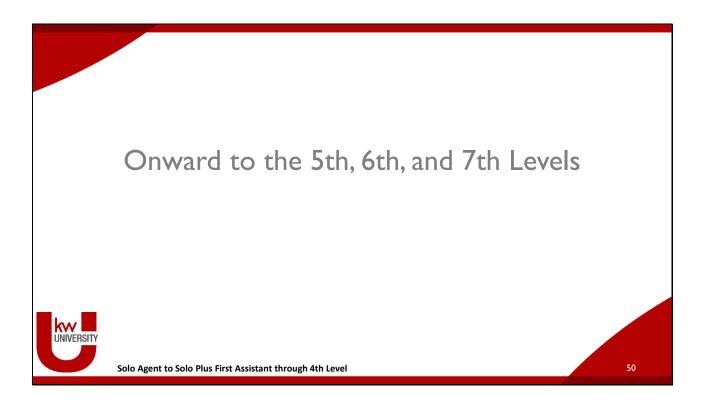

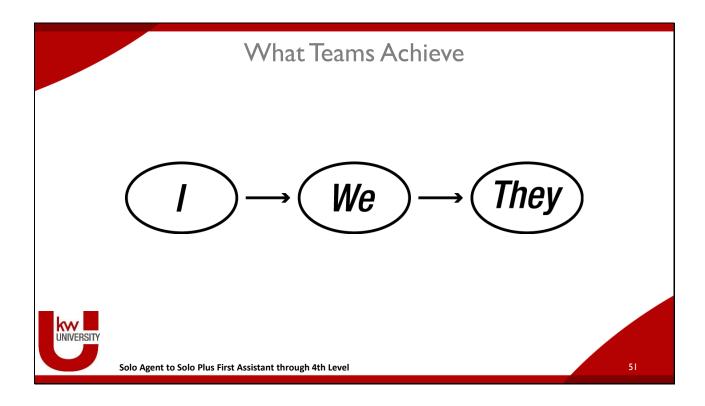

Once you have built a great 4rth Level team you will have gained a great many skills in talent acquisition, training, delegation, and business operations. Like we said earlier, 4rth Level can be quite a sweet spot, and it is reproducible. Your path onward to the 7th Level will use the same processes you leveraged to build your 4rth Level team.

- Earn the right each step of the way.
- Build and follow your plan.
- Get coached, or at least mentored and with an accountability partner.
- Build incrementally, holding your business accountable for ROI and staying within the foundational models.
- Lead your team to great synergy, production, and culture.

You will build your production as much as you can so that you lead with revenue to hire your first administrative assistant.

You started out doing everything yourself.

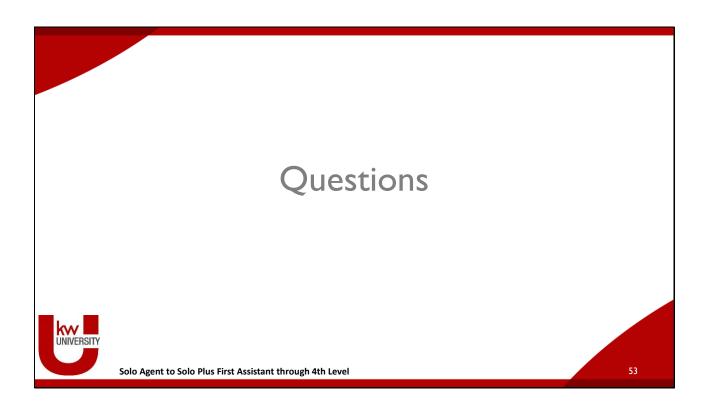
Then you will build your team with strategic, specialized positions that will create further opportunities for team synergy. You'll become "we."

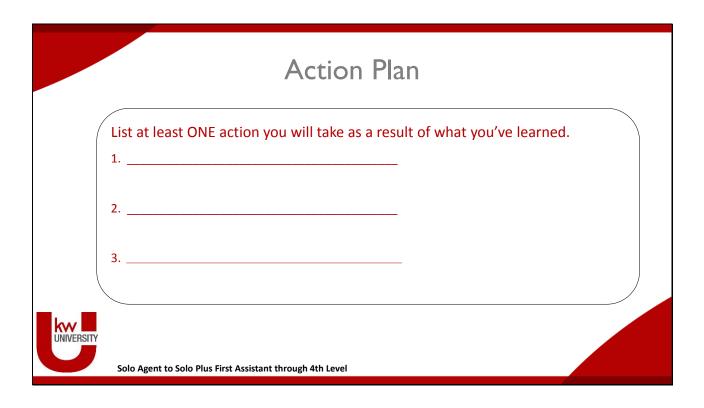
Eventually your team mates are doing great things without you being involved. Now "they" are achieving great things on your behalf. They will create even more production and customer service. You will gain more control over your time.
