Last Chance to Enroll in Hall Workshop

Noted author Douglas John Hall will present the annual Harwick Lecture on Thursday, March 14, and a workshop on Friday, March 15, at the Seminary. The public lecture, to be presented at 7:30 p.m. in Santee Chapel, is titled, "Stewardship as Gospel." The workshop, titled "On Being Stewards in a Threatened World," is scheduled from 9:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. in Hafer Center.

Cost for the workshop will be waived for Lancaster Seminary students, who must sign up for the event with Mary Lin Siever in the President's Office in order to attend. A fee of \$5 will be collected in advance for those who wish to buy the lunch served in conjunction with the workshop.

Professor emeritus at McGill University in Montreal, Dr. Hall retired in 1995 as professor of Christian

Theology. Department of Religious Studies. Author of 17 books and numerous articles, he counts as his main project a trilogy in which he examines the doctrinal areas of Christian belief in the light of North American cultural and historical experience. The first and second volumes, Thinking the Faith and Professing the Faith, have appeared, while a third book, Confessing the Faith, is expected soon.

Kate Bortner Addresses Senior Citizens on Crime

representative of the York City Police Department's community service division and an MDiv student at Lancaster, recently surprised a group at the Yorktowne Senior Center with some crime statistics during a crime prevention series tailored to senior citizens.

"How many homicides occurred in the city of York last year?" asked Kate. Answers ranged from 15 to 600 - far from the actual six in 1995. When she posed another question, however, "How many property crimes were committed in 1995?" - the answers, from 300 to 600 - fell far short of the 4,500 incidents of burglary, vandalism and criminal mischief.

According to Kate, the series is intended to dispel misconceptions and educate seniors about the realities of crime in their neighborhood. "When we know the facts, what we're actually vulnerable to, we can learn what we can do to protect ourselves," she explains.


