A.D. has given an account of the action taken by the 9th General Synod (of the United Church of Christ) regarding theological education (see August A.D. page 36.)...

What did not come through is the conviction of many of us within the United Church of Christ that sound theological education and creative, imaginative work in the seminaries are vital to the life of the whole body. As the Committee on Theological Education has said in its report to the General Synod: "The churches need leaders who are committed to the gospel and are able to proclaim it. They are seeking pastors and teachers who can help persons relate the faith of the church to individual and social concerns. The churches seek clergy who understand the pain which is present both in the church and in the world and can face it with hope.

What the church does not need is to set the seminaries adrift in a sea of neglect or have them battle one another for survival. One of the key recommendations of the Committee on Theological Education is that the conferences, instrumentalities, seminaries, and churches talk to one another. It is our sincere hope that through some honest, hard work there will emerge in the United Church of Christ a vision for theological education which boldly looks into the future and takes seriously the sem-

(Part II) Christianity, as an institution, is not efficient under any kind of economic or political system, be it capitalistic or socialistic or whatever. Are we to seek a system conducive to the spread of Christianity? I pray that we are far from a "Christian system" for antichrist would be among us. In spite of the persecution against and the hard times of the early church, the Christian faith grew greatly. Why? The economic and political systems were not conducive to it. Maybe it was because the early Fathers trusted God to work through them, not for their own humanitarian reasons, but for His glory alone, Maybe the church seems impotent today because it is, humanitarian-centered rather than God-centered and rather than giving Him the glory and trust of her work. The church is not necessarily impotent or seemingly influential because our capitalistic atmosphere of this country is not conducive to her functions. The Christian faith is found in America, Europe, Africa, India, Soviet Russia, Japan---all over the world. No system of any kind can get rid of the true faith in Christ. Paul tells us in Romans 8:38-39, "For I am sure that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.". We are assigned to spread the Gospel through the world, no matter where we are or what system we are under, for if we have Christ, His love will be ever with us.
