

TO LIGHT AM ADVENT CANDLE

To light an Advent candle is a meaningful action. All the Advent candles together may scarcely pierce the density of the room's blackness. So it surely is not



for practical reasons we follow our beautiful Advent custom. Our modern electric bulb would serve the utilitarian purpose we seek better than many small candles. Yet in the Advent observance we continue to light our candles. This little action is a symbol of God's infinitely greater action through the Advent message.

God always moves in the brightness of light. He is not a God of darkness, for darkness is the place and the symbol of all that is not God. It is the working place of evil and its forces. God speaks to keep the bright light of day. There is nothing hidden in his person or action. He has no secrets to keep from the uninitiated or favors to withhold from the unfavored. A lighted candle is our reminder that it is daytime in the activity of God.

THE ADVENT SEASON

Advent, a season of four fundays, opens the church year. The season begins on the Sunday closest to St. Andrew's Day, Mov. 30. The observance of Advent originated in France during the fourth century. The duration of the season varied from four to seven weeks until the Bishop of Rome in the sixth century set the season at four weeks. In ancient times Advent was strictly observed. Every Christian was required to attend church services and fast daily.

The word "Advent' consists of two Latin words, ad venire, meaning to come to." Advent's message is that God in Christ is coming to the world. This coming may be--

A past experience. God did come in Christ at Christmas. The prophet's promise was fulfilled in the Babe.

A present experience. God may come to you this Christmas in terms of rebirth either for the first time, or a renewed birth in deeper dimensions of reality.

A future experience. Christ will return unpredictably at the end of the world. "He shall come again with glory to judge the guick and the dead."

Since Advent promises the sure coming of the Lord, its message is "prepare." The Lord is coming whether the world is ready or not. For those unprepared, his coming means judgment. For those ready for his coming, it means salvation.

AMERICAN PRISONS OF TOMORROW-SPORTING NEW FACES

"Iam the Lord, I have called you in righteousness, I have taken you by the hand and kept ypu; I have given you as a covenant to the people, a light to the nations, to open the eyes that are blind, to bring out the prisoners from the dungeon, from the prison those who sit in darkness." Isaiah 42: 6-7

It is always interesting to note what legislative actions and executive decisions American people are willing to accept outright. Except in certain instances of personal interest and concern, most Americans are more than willing to remain unconcerned ill-informed, and outright apathetic to most events which do not directly affect k them, their families, or in some instances their closer friends and acquaintances.

It appears that when the big oak doors of governmental offices and agencies are closed for decision-making, the American public often loses sight of the issues through governmental release of information (which is either too difficult to understand or interpret for the average person) or through deliberate misinformation or half lies. In the years that have followed after an American awakening to "Politics as Usual" (Watergate) it seems that any recognition of the problem of keeping our representatives canny of our lives. Love is self-giving honest and responsible may have been laid to the side as we continue to be sucked into reciprocal unlnerability. the "American Dream."

Pastor and People

How do you view your minister? Do you set him on the pedistal of perfection If you do, then your estimate of him is doomed to disappointment. He cannot live honestly or comfortably on such a hidh place. Actually he lives on the same plane as you do, wherever that is, with the same frailty, same hurts, same hopes, same temptations, same needs and same humanity. Perhaps one difference is that he feels a call to listen intently to the beat of the Master Drummer and seeks to interpret what that may mean for our lives.

Each Sunday it is the minister's blessed task to set a meal before his people, and too often he knows that all he as chef has accomplished is to warm a few leftovers or prepare a light meal at best. To place a solid meal before the congregation takes hours of labor in the garden of study and quiet times in the kitchen of meditation. And if that kind of time is found it has to be carved away from the embrace of other needs. That's perhaps the main reason so many of us are not better preachers. Too many times we have climbed into the pulpit praying at God's short order window to help us make a respectable meal out of the light bread of our study or a tasty milkshake out of the skim-milk of our preparation.

Have you ever had company with little of nothing to put on the table? It's a rare joy when the minister sets his Sunday morning table with the confidence, that he has a real banquet to werve his people. It's by the grace and mercy of God when nourishment is found from what he offers. And if there is anything worth hearing, he finds that he too has been a listener.

He knows that if light comes from his lifted lantern the flame is other than his own. He is aware that if anything is harvested from the tree of his life the fruit is there by God's grace. He sees himself as a vessel for the carrying of God's truth, but ironically others find it to be fullest when he sees it most empty, and others see lttle there when he thinks it is fullest.

of Prisons in this bizarre attempt to use the Federal bureau of Prisons' budget to build this facility. A true question of moral bankruptcy.

That the young athletes will come and go and the facility will remain as a prison is certainly a questionable proposition which a nombar of concerned groups are raising. From organizations as diversified as the American Freidns Service Committee, The National Urban League, Sojourners, The Fortune Society, The National Coalition of American Nuns, and the UCC, Committion on Racial Justice, an allience has been formed to stop the Olympic Prison.

Consider also the facts that surround the growing contriversy; Ray Brook, the location of the proposed facitlity is isolated, hundreds of miles from the nearest city, bereft of the important role fo social service systems, lacking in job training and job oppertunities.

Respective prisoners will come mainly from cities through out the northeast and almost none will be able to concider the location close to home. The majority of prisoners have been estimated to be that the facilities do not even follow their own outlines, i.e. small in size and close to the areas of origin of the intended population.

When we review the facts surrounding this altercation we must recognize its implications and err responsibilitys as citizens, individuals, and Christians. To remain apathetic or unconcerned is not only irresponsible, but has history has demonstrated, its also down right dangerous.

Winter Break Training Course in D.C.

The promise of laws that protect the legal rights of the handicapped and men-legal rig

Advocacy for the legal right s of the mentally and physically disabled is the topic of the next training event of the National Public Law Training Center, and affiliate of the National Paralegal Institute in Mashington D.C. The four days of advocacy training will be offered at the National 4-H Center, Jan. 3-6, 1979. Housing and meals are available at the sight.

The goal of this training is to provide non-lawyers-students, educators, paralegals, practitioners kaskax (paid or volunteer) in various human service occupations--with basic understanding of some of the laws that effect and protect such clients. Issues such as due process and commitment, patient rights mainstreaming, and independent living, and descrimination in education or employment will be covered. Legal advocacy skills such as fact gathering, mediation and case presentation, which are needed for effective client advocacy will be practiced.

Tuition for the course is \$200, with a non-refundable application fee of \$25 (applied to tuition) due on Dec. 8,1978. A double room plus three meals is (\$26) a day.
