The members of the Lancaster Seminary family, students and faculty alike, join in extending a hearty welcome to the representatives of twenty-eight other seminaries who will be our guests for the Middle Atlantic Regional Interseminary Conference. The I.S.M. is one "ism" to which all of us heartily subscribe since in it we find opportunity as theological students and professors to discover our unity in Christ and the mission to which he calls us.

Though we speak of ourselves as "Lancaster Seminary," our offical name is "Theological Seminary of the Evangelical and Reformed Church-Lancaster, Pa." This does not mean that we are the only seminary of the Evangelical and Reformed Church, though we are the oldest and the easternmost. Our sister seminaries are Eden in Webster Groves, Missouri, and Mission House near Plymouth, Wisconsin.

We hope that while you are here you will take opportunity to become acquainted with our campus and our tradition. Since its beginnings in 1825, the Seminary has participated in all of the major ventures in Protestant co-operation and unity. Some of the names which are associated with our institution and significant in these efforts are Philip Schaff, George W. Richards, and Nevin C. Harner. It was while the Seminary was located at Mercersburg, Pennsylvania, in the middle years of the last century, that members of its faculty developed what came to be known as the Mercersburg theology, We recall these things in the hope that they may be familiar to you and that you will feel more at home.

As we heard plans for this year discussed at the Regional Meeting at Crozer Seminary last spring, we were impressed with the relevance and centrality of the themes that were proposed. And now that we have seen the program in its final form, we feel more than ever that the I.S.M. is beginning to fulfil that part of its purpose which speaks of dedication to the ecumenical reformation, "that fundamental reawakening among individuals, congregations, and confessions, which leads to the pursuit of the full mission of the Church of Jesus Christ in the entire world, and which seeks greater unity among Christians and Chruches in this world mission." During these days together we shall be given opportunity to consider the Message with which we have been entrusted, "aggravatedly modern man" to whom we are sent, and our evangelizing mission.

We at Lancaster Seminary look forward to sharing with you in this meeting and we pray that the Holy Spirit may guide us into a fuller apprehension of Christ's call to unity and mission.



N A reminder to all who have an account receivable standing at the Book-BOOK STORE store. In order to receive a dividend on the amount due this term you will have

W to pay no later than 2:15 p.m. Thursday, March 8, 1956. According to the consti-

S tution all of this terms bills must be paid no later than one month after the beginning of the Spring term. Any member having an overdue account after that time will forfeit all membership rights including the right to receive a dividend, until such time when he pays his debts and is automatically reinstated. Again I want to reiterate the fact that dividends are paid only on cash received, not on the basis of total sales (cash and credit sales) made to you. I am earnestly hoping for another good dividend this term.

At the end of the last term I heard some questions as to why we did not declare dividends and distribute them before the beginning of the vacation. The reasons we did not last term and cannot this term are two:

- 1. The Bookstore is a business and as such must be managed orderly. We declare dividends three times a year; immediately after the close of the fall and winter terms and about one week before the close of the spring term. No statements or dividends can be determined until after the term deadline which is usually published in advance as above. No computation this term can even begen until after 2:15 p.m., which will then begin a long two day job with few coffee breaks.
- 2. The second reason you will all understand. The end of the term is always loaded because of last minute work. The Manager's and Bookstore Executive Committee's first responsibility is to their studies. This rules out the practicality of setting the final deadline a few days earlier even if the members would be willing to pay their obligations before the last minute. I would very much like to distribute the dividends before the vacation but it is virtually impossible.

Textbooks for next term have been ordered but due to several delays not all of them will be available before the vacation. Most of them will arrive by the latter part of next week before you return home. You may purchase them at your convenience if you so desire.

Pass on your prudent way within the crowd.


What if they mark you of his band, and cry:
