PROM THE BISHOP'S DESK

I have been asked by the editorial staff of the <u>Seminarian</u> to write some reflections upon my recently completed Seminar to Germany. I protested that what they were asking me to do in a short article was impossible, but after much insistance (actually threats on their part I agreed to write the article.

I suppose the first question I'm asked most often about my trip is "what are the German people like." That question is as hard to answer _ as "what are Americans like." Just as there was a diversity in the people who composed the Seminar Abroad so is there a diversity in the German people. I think I may safely comment on the individual people I came in contact with. By German Hosts in Neuenstadt and in Thuppertal were both very warm and open with me; concerned with raising their children; searching for meaning in their church life; and were in many ways remarkably similar to many American families. Church officials were concerned with the state of the church and were in the process of looking for answers to problems that seemed to belong to the American Church as well. While I am on the subject of people I might point out that Germany has a large "quest labor" force composed of Turks, Italians, and Greeks which confronts the Church and the German Government with the task of acclimating these. _various groups into German society. The only other comment I feel I can safely make from first hand knowledge is that the tradespeople, restaurant

and hotel employees, and other people in service professions were for the most part polite and courteous and willing to go out of their way to help you understand something in a language that was difficult for many of us.

The next question I'm most likely asked is "what does Germany look like?" Germany is a land of gently rolling farms, thick green forests, lakes and streams, large cities and small villages, cathedrals, fountains, castles, blooming gardens and window boxes, and crisp white lace curtains. short, Germany is a smorgasboard of natural and man-made sights, sounds, and smells that one finds oneself either nibbling at slowly or wolfing down in big, satisfying gulps. Either way you approach Germany you find that your appetite to see and do more seems insatiable and when you leave you still feel more then slightly hungry.

that fascinated me. The rich blending of the old and the new was everywhere. The chitechturally, musically, aesthetically one was constantly reminded of the past but at the same time made aware of the present and the future.

But what of the church in Germany? I won't pretend to cover that subject in this article. I will share some of the general observations I made. German Church faces many problems that are remarkably similar to our own. How to use religious education effectively; how to use new forms of worship; how to minister to the aged, the young, the alienated, the foreign member in our midst. But I was also struck by the fact that each church has problems uniquely their own; each has strengths and yet each has a unity. in the other through our Lord, Jesus Christ.

I could write on and I could say much more about the German Church and about German society, but I would rather you asked me or another member of the Seminar.
