



# Why is this work important? (in their words)



- "We all need to work. Lord says 'Don't work, don't eat."
















## **Lessons Learned Today**

- · Introductions Matter (focus on strengths, not deficits)
- A disability label is not an indicator of how important a spiritual life is to a person
- · People with disabilities want to contribute and be meaningfully included in faith communities
- Congregations have opportunities to minister with people with disabilities and families both inside and outside the congregation
- · Congregations are natural partners in making employment connections
