Think about that quote of writer Erich Segal. It certainly is not a very flattering description of writers or their egos is it. Yet, I fear that if one were to remove the words writer and replace it with the "minister", the full truth of the quote would remain.

Why is it that we find it so very difficult to praise the efforts of our Christian brothers and sisters. Why must we spend so much time comparing our efforts and results to thos of others. Why do we so often seek to raise ourselves by lowering others.

These are not pleasant questions to think about. I know they bother me because I see myself in them. I know how I tend to evaluate bermons or services in light of "how I would have done them." I know how I sometimes feel that -- but for an unfortunate lack of title -- my vast experience as a student pastor for a few years should qualify me to be a bishop, or at the very least, a full professor. The only areas I feel completely free not to compare, and always are quick to praise, are music and art in which I have absolutely no gifts.

As I thought about these things, some verses from Paul's writings came to my mind. At times they seem like they were written just for me: "I have used Appolis and myself as examples to illustrate what I have been saying, thatyyou must not have favorites. You must not be proud of one of God's teachers more than another. What are you spoud paiffed up about. What do you have that God hasn't given you. And, if all you have is from God, why act as though you are so great, and as though you have accomplished something on your own.

OUTREACH OPPORTUNITY

ITS and the Spanish Assembly of God Church on S. Duke St. are in the preliminary phase of developing a program to mutually benefit both the seminary and the members of this local congregation. Spanish Assembly of God Church in Lancaster is a dynamic Christian fellowship, beginning 15 years ago with just 7 members. Ten years ago, they built and moved into their present building with a membership of just over 100 and a Church School enrollment of 100. The ten-year old sanctuary seats 1,200 worshippers. In 1984, there are 800 members and 900 enrolled in the Church School program. Their pastor, the Rev. Pablo Figueroa, is planning on continuing his education at LTS in the near future.

The church supports the local community by providing an extensive array of educational, social and mission programs. Included are a girls program on Thursday evenings, a boys program on Saturday morning and youth meetings on

Friday evenings.

If you are interested in working with us in building meaningful ties between our seminary and the local Spanish community, there are several options available to You may volunteer to work you. with one or more of the youth groups listed above, or you may choose to establish a "big brother /sister" relationship with a 13-15 year old church member. Either chance affords the opportunities to develop a greater understanding of this increasingly vital segment of our communities.

A LETTER TO ALL:

The situation in Nicaragua is extremely critical at this time. The Nicaraguan economy which depends heavily on only a few agricultural exports has been under increasing attack from CIA-backed counterrevolutionaries. Several hundred million dollars worth of damage has already resulted from attacks such as the one against the vital oil storage facilities at the port of Corinto last October.

Nicaragua needs a successful coffee harvest to be able to purchase basic foodstuffs, medicines, spare parts for industry and transportation, and oil. Because of the urgent political and military situation, many Nicaraguans have been mobilized in the defense of their country and cannot participate in the December-February cof-

fee harvest this year.

That is why I have chosen to respond to Nicaragua's call for international work brigades to ensure a successful coffee harvest.

In the United States, the National Network in Solidarity with the Nicaraguan People (NNSNP) is working to coordinate volunteer participation. U.S. citizens have a particular role to play in this harvest, because if it were not for our own government's attempts to overthrow the government of Nicaragua, the Nicaraguan people would be free to develop their own political life and their own economy in peace.

By participating in the volunteer coffee harvest, I hope to show that as an American citizen, I stand with the people of Nicaragua in their moment of need and that I oppose the policies of the Reagan administration. 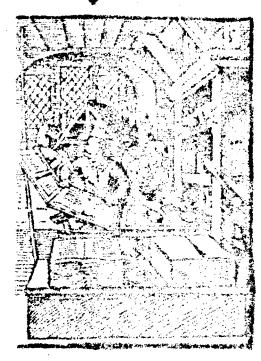

RESPONSE

At a time when issues involving homosexuals confront us at every turn—in the newspapers, on television, at public meetings, at the seminaries, and in the church—I believe that there is a need for Christians to look at the issues raised and at the people involved as Jesus would view them.

In the Gospel of John, the eighth chapter, the story is recorded of the confrontation between Jesus and a self-righteous crowd about to stone a woman for her sin of adultery. Jesus humiliated the crowd with the words, "Let him who is without sin among you be the first to throw a stone at her." (RSV)

Much less attention, however, is given to the Lord's following words to the woman, "Neither do I condemn you; go, and do not sin again." (RSV)

Christ's attitude toward all sinners is exemplified by this story: tenderness toward the sinner, a rebuke to the self-right-eous sinners who judge and condemn, a command to repent which points toward liberation.

From my statements so far you might guess that I consider the act of homosexuality to be a sin, and I do. I have reached this conclusion more from a gut reaction, an undefinable feeling perhaps fostered by the creation narratives and the "natural" order of things. Yes, I have looked at the texts usually held up as a defense against homosexuality. These include Leviticus 18:22; 20:13; Romans 1:26-27; and I Corinthians I must agree with Dale 6:9**-**10. that these scriptures have sometimes heen misused, prooftexting at its best (worst?).

While acknowledging my belief in the sinfulness of homosexuality

I must also state the realization that we "all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God." Romans 3:23 (RSV) In acknowledging my and our sinful natures, I feel that it is also necessary to acknowledge the sinfulness of those within the Christian fellowship who are guilty of the sin of "homophobia"—a fear and hatred of homosexuals. If we take seriously the command in John 15:12 "that you love one another as I have loved you," then such a serious failure to love as is "homophobia" is also a sin in God's eyes. If we are part of the stone-throwing crowd we too must heed Christ's call to "go. and do not sin again."

I applaud Dale's vision of the preaching of the Gospel. It does need to be preached, but even more so, it needs to be lived I sensed a great deal of daily: anger, frustration, and fear in Dale's responses. I was quite frankly appalled at his connection of violence and Dietrich Bonhoeffer. This man, hung by the Nazis in April 1945, is described by others on a tablet in the church at Flossenburg with this epitaph, "Dietrich Bonhoeffer, a witness of Jesus Christ among his brethren."

I would urge each of us to prayerfully seek the will of God in dealing with these issues. Name and acknowledge the unreasonable fears and hatreds that exist on both sides and resolve that you will be guided by love and through the example of Jesus Christ. As Dale stated, "We are called to be an ever active witness and also an ever quiet presence."
