*ancaster Labyrinth - Walking Wisdom

/hat is a Labyrinth? It is a beautiful, complex pattern created by a single meandering path. To use a labyrinth, this pathway is "walked" with the eye, with the finger, or with the feet. Although it resembles a maze, because it is unicursal (having just one path into the center), there are no puzzles, no obstacles, and no way to get lost. It is not a test, but a tool for relaxation and spiritual insight. In Lancaster, two different labyrinths may be found through Unitarian Universalist Church, 538 West Chestnut Street, Lancaster. A permanent 7-circuit labyrinth has been inlaid in Founders' Hall floor and is open monthly, the first Sunday of the month, Noon - 3:00 p.m. A second labyrinth is a large portable one painted on canvas available for rent for use at special occasions.
