


Lancaster Theological Seminary: 175 years to remember and celebrate

Thursday, September 23, 1999, 11 am Santee Chapel

Traditionally the opening event of the academic year, Convocation 1999 has a special role as the beginning of the 175th Anniversary Celebration.

Dr. Payne will consider some of the highlights of the Seminary's history and its contributions to theological education and the church. Retired in spring 1999 as the Paul and Minnie Diefenderfer Professor of Mercersburg and Ecumenical Theology and Professor of Church History at Lancaster, he is author of numerous books and articles on Erasmus. In 1997 he edited *The Living Theological Heritage of the United Church of Christ, Vol. 2, Reformation Roots,* and is currently working on a biography of John Williamson Nevin.

Gerhart Lecture-Faith in Search of Living Symbols RICHARD R. NIEBUHR

October 14, 1999, 11 am Santee Chapel

Dr. Niebuhr's presentation will explore the adaptation of various theories of symbolization to the purposes of theology. An ordained minister in the United Church of Christ, he has been a member of the faculty of Harvard University Divinity School since 1956. He is the author of several books, including Streams of Grace: Studies of Jonathan Edwards, Samuel Taylor Coleridge and William James, and is currently working on a book-length manuscript on theology symbolic criticism of religious symbols, as well as an essay, "Symbols in Reflection on God and Ourselves."



Missions in Retrospect

Santee Chapel

Reverend Paul Gregory will discuss the history and evolution of mission in the United Church of Christ, with particular attention to Seminary graduates in mission. A graduate of the Seminary's Class of '44, Reverend Gregory was a missionary through the Board of International Missions of the Evangelical and Reformed Church in China and Japan between 1945 and 1957. He joined the staff of the United Church Board for World Ministries in 1957 as East and Southeast Asia secretary and was general secretary of the Mission Division from 1975 until his retirement in 1986. Presented annually, the Gregory Lectureship was established in 1987 by First Congregational United Church of Christ in Montclair, New Jersey, to honor Paul and Catherine Gregory for their mission work.

Dr. L. 

The 175th Anniversary Commencement will feature an address by Dr. Martin E. Marty. Dr. Marty directs the Public Religion Project at the University of Chicago, where he taught for 35 years and where a new Martin E. Marty Center has been founded to promote "public religion" endeavors. He also serves as senior Scholar-in-Residence at the Park Ridge Center for the Study of Health, Faith, and Ethics. Dr. Marty is the editor of the newsletter Context, as well as the author of numerous books, including Modern American Religion and The One and the Many. America's Search for the Common Good. He is the recipient of many awards and honors, including 59 honorary degrees and the National Humanities Medal, the National Book Award, and the Medal of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences.

Directions to the Seminary-

555 West James Street Lancaster, PA 17603

From the East—Take PA Turnpike to Exit 21, Reading-Lancaster. Take Rt. 222 S. to Rt. 30 (about 18 miles). Proceed east to exit marked Rt. 23 West (Walnut Street). Continue on Walnut St. through Lancaster to College Ave. (St. Joseph Hospital is on the southwest corner of Walnut and College.) Turn right onto College Ave. Cross Lemon St. and pass W. James St., turning right into fitst Seminary driveway, then right into parking lot.

From the West-Take the PA Turnpike to Harrisburg. Take



Exit 19 at Harrisburg onto Rt. 283 to Lancaster. From 283, exit at State Rd (PA 722). Turn right at top of ramp. At second traffic light, turn left onto Harrisburg Pike. Continue past Park City shopping mall on the left, past US Post Office on right, Wendy's on left, and Franklin and Marshall College on right, to College Ave. (14 traffic lights in all). Turn right at light onto College Avenue and go two blocks to campus driveway on left side, past Fredetick Street. Enter driveway and park in lot to your right.

From the North—Take Interstate 81 to Rt. 83 at Harrisburg (follow signs to the PA Turnpike) and proceed on Rt. 283 to Lancaster. Follow directions for From the West.

NOTE: From Lebanon, take Rt. 72 South to Dillerville Rd. in Lancaster (next major intersection after Park City Mall). Turn right onto Dillerville Rd to next traffic light (Harrisburg Pike). Turn left onto Harrisburg Pike to College Ave., which is third traffic light. Turn right at light onto College Avenue and go two blocks to campus driveway on left side, past Frederick Street. Enter driveway and park in lot to your right.

From the South—Take 95 North from Washington, DC, to 695 West (toward Towson, MD). Take Exit 24, 83 North. Get off 83 at Exit 9, which becomes Rt. 30 East. Exit at Harrisburg Pike. Turn right onto Harrisburg Pike and proceed east until reaching College Avenue (about 1½ miles). Turn right at light onto College Avenue and go two blocks to campus driveway on left side, past Frederick Street. Enter driveway and park in lot to your right.
