EVALENGISM Part 5

This is the final article in a series on evangelism, and I hipe to deal with conversion and summarize evangelism for all of us. If we ask for a biblical concept of conversion, Lesslie Newbigin sugguwst, "Conversion in this context is a turning round in order to participate by faith in a new reality that is the true future of the whole creation. It is not in the first place either saving one's own soul or joining a soceity. It is these things only secondarily because the new reality is one in which every soul is precious, and because ther: is a society that is the first fruit and sign of the new reality. If either of these things is put at the center, distortion follows. Biblically understood, conversion means being so turned round that one's face is towards that summing up of all things in Christ that is promised, and of which the resurrection of Jesus is the sign and first fruit. It means being caught up into the activity of God that is directed to that end."

It was this "turning round" that the early Christians hoped for, when they preached the Good News of Jesus Christ The early Christian evangelists were directing their message to people that knew nothing about Jesus, and it was their sincere wish that people would be transformed by the power of the love of Christ. As this sharing took place, it was felt that people would sense the freedom that Jesus gave to the world. The life and teachings of Jesus were worth proclaiming and the many new Christians expected results: There was no fear of being wrong in their proclamation, for they sensed the rightness of it.

Conversion is a term that frightens many people who are used to the term salvation. The term salvation could be substituted for conversion. When Christ dealt with repentance and discipleship he was dealing with the idea of conversion. Hosea 6: refers to returning to the Lord and this is at the heart

of conversion. Turning to God is conversion and this may be found in the Old Testament and the New Testament. Within the New Testament, Paul Loeffler suggests, "Conversion is in each case essentially commitment to Christ, or more precisely to the Lord (kyrios)."

These was a very strong feeling among early Christian evangelists, that conversion was a turning toward God and neighbor. Fellowship was a very important part of the Christian faith. cern for others became paramount, as one matured in Christian love and understanding. The New Testament speaks of the many instances where sharing was promoted. Not only was oneths own life changed, but the lives of others were changed in a conversion. For the early evangelists, the need for transforming lives was great and at the heart of their faith. This idea was true for them and it suggests a lot to us!

This segment on evangelism is the last in my series and I hope that many of us have seen evangelism in a new light. Evangelism goes far beyond the door knocking that scares us to death. It is a very basic part of how we live as Christians. A glimpse was captured of the many early Christians who took evangelism seriously. They were people who had their lives transformed by the Good News proclaimed by Jesus Christ. Salvation was given to all by this man Jesus and it had to be proclaimed to the unknowing. With a purpose in their hearts, Christians throughout many centuries have sought the conversion of the unknowing masses of people. Confident that God would give them guidance, these believers struggled to and earnestly proclamed their love for the Christ. of us has the ability to deal with evangelism, whether it be in the proclaming. teaching, fellowshipping, or worshipping of God's love for us. To deny the gifts God has given us would be to deny the Christ that came for us. Evangelism is for all of us! The need to live the Good News of Jesus with others is at the base of our faith. All of us have been commissioned to made disciples of all People. Can we as Christians deny our Lord?
