#### **EVANGELISM**

This article is one of a series of articles to be written in the Seminarain and the author hopes that the readers will obtain a fuller sense of what evangelism is in our day and age. These articles are part of a project for the course entitled, Theological and Ethical Issues in Contemporary Evangelism. Your comments are welcome and I hope that each reader will take time to seriously look at the area of evangelism.

Evangelism is very important for the Christian and one could say that it is a central feature of Christianity. If we were to look for a definition of evangelism, we might be satisfied to say that evangelism is proclaiming the good news of Jesus. It was this concern that was on the minds of the early Christians. In Jesus Christ, the early Christiand had experienced the love of God and they wanted to share this love with other people. Michael Green has written that the early christians, "were convinced that Jesus Christ was God's last word to man, the one who brought as much of God to us as we could appriciate in the only terms we could take it in, the terms of a human life; the one who in dieing and rising again was manifestly vindicated in his claims and achievements." It was this Jesus that was proclaimed in a joyous fashion by early Christian men and women.

When we examine the early Christians and see the joy that was in their message, we must ask ourselves if we have a joyous proclamation of the Good News. The need to share with others the message of salvation brought forth by Jesus was at the very heart of the Christian life.j How could one hold the Good News back from those who had never heard? The answer to that question was that a Christian couldn't keep the message to him/herself. There was a constant burning desire to share with others what had been given to all humanking.

Throughout the Roman empire, the message of Jesus Christ was spread to all who would hear. The dangers and sacrifices were all overlooked as the early Christians romed from province to province. The message was one of primitive Christainity and it laxted into the third century. In the third century, Origin summerized the whole evangelistic enterprise of Christianity; "to perpetuate the knowledge of Christ's sojurn upon earth, and to prepare for his second coming, or too bring it aboutg as a present reality in those souls which were willing to recieve ghe word of God as he stood at the door and knocked and sought to come into them." Was this true only for primitive Christianity? This was evangelism inthe early church and next week this series of articles will continue.

YOUTHGRANTS APPLICATION
DEADLINE IS DECEMBER 1
The National Endowment for the
Humanities through its newlyexpanded Youthgrants program will
offer more than 100 awards throughout the nation this fall to students and other young people in
their teens and early twenties

to pursue independent projects in the humanities.

The deadline for submission of completed applications has been extended to December 1, the only deadline during this academic year. Application forms should be on file in college offices which deal with federal grants.

These ederal grants offer up to \$10,000 to groups. They are intended primarily for those between the ages of 15 and 25 who have not completed academic or professional training. While the program cannot provide scholarship support or financial aid for these work, undergraduate work which seems assured of public dissemination can be supported. The humanities include such subject areas as history, ethnic studie, folklore, anthropology, linguistics and the history of art.

Youthgrants have been used by young people to carry out a wide variety of projects such as exhibits of documentary photographs, printed or audiovisual records of local history, and films on anthropological subjects.
