A CALL TO BE THE CHURCH

"Where the re is no vision, the people perish."
-Proverbs 29:18

1. The people are perishing.

Statistics show a serious decline in the United Church of Christ. Since 1965, while the population of the United States rose 15.6%, membership in the UCC shill 15.9%. In 1978 alone, the UCC showed a net loss of 16,548 members and a net loss in church school enrollment of 24,343. According to the 1979 UCC Yearbook, total OCWM receipts in 1978 showed a loss in real buying power of \$11,379,000 when compared to 1969 OCWM receipts. We must pinpoint and correct the cause of this downward trend if the United Church of Christ is to thrive.

Worse, a declining chruch fails to reach increasing millions of people who live and die apart from Christ.

2. We need a vision of our whole life as a church.

We are being exposed to one-sided extremes: in liberation theologies which fail to allow the transcendent God to act in history apart from human struggles of class, race, and sex; and in fundamentalist theologies which fail to take seriously our mission for social and economic justice.

If the United Church of Christ is to thrive, we need a balanced theological vision which reveals both the spiritual and material dimensions of reality, and affirms both the personal and corporate aspects of salvation.

3. We have such a theological vision.

Our heritage brings us such a vision through our evangelical, reformed, congregational and Christian traditions. The preamble to our UCC Constitution lifts up this hope:

"The United Church of Christ acknowledges as its sole Head, Jesus Christ, Son of God and Saviour. It acknowledges as kindred in Christ all who share in this confession. It looks to the Word of God in the Scriptures, and to the presence and power of the Holy ISpirit, to prosper its creative and redemptive work in the world. It claims as its own the faith of the historic Church expressed in the ancient creeds and reclaimed in the basic insights of the Protestant Reformers. It affirms the responsibility of the Church in each generation to make this faith its own..."

This is who we have been called to be, but we have lost our vision. For this reason the people perish while the church declines. By decision and prayer let us be who we are called to be that our life as a church may thrive by the grace of God.
