Just as the local pastor has a responsibility to maintain his whole ministry, so does the seminary as it seeks to "find ways to keep its programs ...in phase with the realities of the profession."

As we all seek our personal and collective goals it is absolutely necessary that we "deescalate the fantasy level at which many seminary professors and students think." In all things, we must remain realistic and remember the commitment that calls us together. Our joys and our struggles even here are part of our total ministry. We come to a common present from many differen pasts -- let us unite our varied talents to heighten the over-all competency of our Seminary; and "let our bearing towards one another arise out of our life in Christ Josus. (Philippians 2:5)"
