SOCIETY DELAYS ATTENDANCE TALKS

"Who hath gathered the wind in

... Thou knowest!" (Proverbs) was johnny-on-the-spot Tuesday evening when the heralded discussion on attendance regulations was to have taken place at the Society of Inquiry meeting.

What I had anticipated to be a hot and windy airing of views relating te compulsory attendance turned out to be no more than an old-maidish quibbling over the interpretation of Robert's Rules of

Order.

Two metions pertaining to the matter in question did, however, manage to receive the approval of a majority present. (1) The report of the committee which had been assigned to study the present Seminary attendance system was accepted. (2.) A new committee was directed to draw up from this report an agen da to be used as a basis for discussion at a "town meeting" of faculty and students.

What this new committee will come up with is a matter for speculation. After perusing the report myself, I can see only six points which might serve as a substantial basis for faculty-student discussion. When the new committee digs into the gusty report of its predecessors, therefore, it might un-

earth these proposals:

(1.) that the Forden of responsibility for education should lie on the students' shoulders;

(2.) that the listless conduct students in classes would be elim-inated under a non-compulsory sys-

(3.) that poor attendance in a class might well suggest that the professor could improve his lec-

tures;

(4.) that oral student reports class should be dispensed with, because they "are almost always dryly presented and are vague, so that the only one who derives any benefit....is the student who compiled it;"

(5.) that "catch-up work" for absences should be left to the students' own sense of responsibility; (6.) that required attendance at (continued, page 2)
